A Master Plan is a roadmap for future development and change

Recommendations will focus on aligning land use policy with:

- A shared vision for Detroit's future
- Other priorities like transportation, housing, and economy

"Land Use": what exists today or could be built in the future on a piece of land (homes, parks, shops, and more) "Policy": a guideline that helps us make decisions about how our city should grow, develop, and function






During These Conversations



"Being able to keep the area we live in safe and clean."






OUTCOMES
