10 BOARD OF POLICE COMMISSIONERS MEETING

11 July 31, 2025 at 3:00 P.M.

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3 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Good afternoon everyone, and
4 thank you for joining us for the Detroit Board of Police
5 Commissioner's meeting. It's July 31st. I'd like to call
6 to order the meeting. And we have the invocation that
7 will be given by Commander Chaplain Wilson James.
8 Commander, are you here?.

9 CMDR. JAMES: I'm here. Can you hear me?

10 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Yes, we can.

11 CMDR. JAMES: Alright. Let's bow heads. Father, in
12 the name of Jesus today, God, that we unequivocally with
13 undoubted accuracy, God, come to you and say, thank you
14 because you're good, you are awesome. Father, you know,
15 we don't know; you see what we don't see. And so, God,
16 today I pray, God, that you enlighten the ears of your
17 people in this meeting. We blessed the Chair today, God.
18 We blessed the vice chair. We pray now, God, that on
19 today, that wisdom will be used, integrity will be
20 installed today. And so, God, I thank you for every word
21 that's about to be said today, God. I pray to God, that
22 we will open our ears and our eyes to see and to hear
23 what you tell us. Now, bless every person that is in this
24 meeting, God. I pray even for their families, for their
25 home life, not just this meeting, but for their home

1 lives. I pray to God, that today, that as they go into
2 this meeting, that there'll be nothing missing, nothing
3 lacking, and definitely nothing broken in their lives and
4 what they're trying to do. I pray, God, that you allow
5 these strategic minds to come together, God, to resolve
6 things, God, and to be what you call them to be. Now, I
7 bless you because you're good. I bless you because you
8 are wonderful, and I thank you. It is in Jesus' name I
9 pray today. Amen.

10 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Amen. Thank you, Commander
11 James.

12 CMDR. JAMES: Bless you all.

13 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: And now Madam Secretary, the
14 roll call, please.

15 MS. GARNIER: Chairperson Dewaelsche - Present.

16 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Woods - Present.

17 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Bernard - Attorney Linda
18 Bernard, District 2 present.

19 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Banks - Present.

20 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Bell - Present, District
21 4.

22 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Burton, excused.

23 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Moore - Present.

24 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Pressley - Here.

25 MS. GARNIER: Seven present, Madam Chair.

1 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you. And at this time
2 I'd like to request a motion to approve the July 31st
3 agenda.

4 COMMISSIONER WOODS: So moved.

5 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Support.

6 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: It's been moved and
7 supported. Is there any discussion? All those in favor
8 indicate by saying, aye.

9 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

10 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Opposed? Thank you. The
11 motion carries. And now I'd like to ask for a motion to
12 approve the minutes of July 24th, 2025.

13 COMMISSIONER WOODS: So moved.

14 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: It's been moved and
15 seconded. Any discussion? All those in favor indicate by
16 saying, aye.

17 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

18 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Opposed? The motion carries.
19 Madam Secretary, if you could introduce the BOPC staff,
20 chief and elected officials

21 MS. GARNIER: Present as of this time, Madam Chair,
22 Corporate, Chief Investigator Jerome Warfield, Drew
23 Fries, Felicia Tyson, Mary Barber, Theresa Blossom,
24 Candace Hayes, Artemisa Joshua Dior, Mathis, John
25 Underwood, and Office of Chief Investigators who is

1 advising investigator Tiffany Stewart, DPD HR Director
2 Katrina Patillo via Zoom. For the Office of Chief of
3 Police is Assistant Chief Eric Ewing. Our interpreters
4 today are Ms. Yakata and Dr. Beaty. The court reporter is
5 Don Handyside. Enrique Jackson for audio visual. Jason
6 Gantt for Media Services today. The elected officials or
7 representatives registered at this time are as follows,
8 Marie Overall via Zoom for State Representative Tyrone
9 Carter, and as Vice President of the Fourth Police
10 Precinct, Ms. Fredia Butler, 2nd Precinct community
11 relations President, Ms. LaDon Davis for the Office of
12 Counsel Member Fred Durhal III via Zoom. Mark Young,
13 president of the Lieutenants and Sergeants Association.
14 We also have Scotty Bowman via Zoom and former Detroit
15 Police Commissioner William Davis via Zoom. And those are
16 the persons we have registered at this moment.

17 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHKE: Thank you, Madam Secretary.
18 For the Chair's report we are going to have a resolution.
19 One of our commissioners, QuanTez Pressley. This is going
20 to be his last meeting. He has resigned from the board.
21 And we're going to be very, very sad to lose him. He has
22 a very good reason. He's working on his doctorate and
23 he's going to be starting very soon. And maybe you might
24 want to just indicate a little bit about that.

25 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Sure.

1 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Please go ahead.

2 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Yeah. So, I am grateful for
3 the opportunity to have served on the Detroit Board of
4 Police Commissioners. I remember getting a text message
5 on January 28th, 2022, saying the mayor might call you.
6 And I had no clue at the time of what I would be getting
7 myself into, but I do kind of that honor to have served
8 the board. I would be remiss if I didn't take this
9 opportunity to mention the name of Martin Jones. Because
10 I'm here because of him. His untimely passing is what led
11 to my appointment. And I've kept him in mind and in
12 spirit as I've served on this board, a true community
13 activist, an advocate; someone who was a spokesperson and
14 leader for the Detroit 300. Someone who has been
15 commended from numbers of community organizations for his
16 tireless service.

17 And so I do say his name and honor his legacy even
18 in this time. But as you all know my full-time job is
19 that I'm the lead pastor of an amazing church here in the
20 City of Detroit. And I've always felt it was needed to
21 have thoughtful and deliberative faith leaders. And so in
22 doing so, I am grateful that I'll be embarking upon
23 getting my doctorate in ministry from the Union
24 Theological Seminary and the Program of Spirituality
25 Leadership and Justice which begins next month. And so my

1 classes are on Thursdays which will prevent me from being
2 active and present for the commission meetings. And so,
3 noting the necessary work that is being done here at the
4 table, I just think it is appropriate to have a
5 commissioner who can be fully present and attentive to
6 the needs of the citizens of Detroit as we engage in
7 police oversight.

8 And so I have submitted my letter of resignation,
9 which I'm sure the board will accept shortly. That will
10 be effective as of tomorrow. So that I might complete any
11 of my business today. But let me again, express my
12 gratitude and thanks to Mayor Mike Duggan for providing
13 me this honor to serve on the board. To my colleagues who
14 I thank both personally and professionally for what they
15 have contributed to my growth and development as a
16 person, as well as a leader. To the entire staff, those
17 who are present and those who have retired or
18 transitioned to other roles. I'm grateful for the work
19 that you all do because as a pastor, I'm clear that it is
20 oftentimes the people behind the scenes who make the
21 people in front of the cameras look like they know what
22 they're doing.

23 And so I'm very grateful for our staff. And so, as I
24 reflect on my tenure, there are just a few things that I
25 walk away with holding near and dear to my heart. One,

1 having had the privilege of working with two police
2 chiefs both who are amazing men who have led our
3 department with great leadership and integrity. But then
4 also to have had the opportunity to serve as the chair of
5 this board, which indeed was a labor of love. But during
6 that tenure, we saw our budget being increased because
7 the City Council had greater confidence in the work that
8 we're doing. We saw new staff members in both our OCI
9 director as well as our board secretary be brought on
10 board. We were able to be fully staffed for the first
11 time in a while.

12 I'm grateful we were able to secure a case
13 management system that has aided the effectiveness of our
14 investigators; a dashboard which provides our citizens
15 the opportunity to see cases in real time. And the number
16 of collaborations that we've been able to engage with the
17 department, particularly around our CTI crisis
18 Intervention officers in seeing that flourish. And so,
19 again while there is so much work to be done, and I know
20 that oftentimes in moments like these, we stress the
21 highlights and don't necessarily speak about the things
22 that are left undone. And so I do leave feeling a bit
23 burdened that the backlog is still as significant as it
24 is. But I'm encouraged because again, in my tenure, we
25 were able to pass the standard operating procedures,

1 which I think will greatly enhance being able to reduce
2 that backlog over the next year.

3 And so again, I thank my colleagues, the staff, the
4 citizens of the City of Detroit. And let me say this in
5 closing that you know, there's real work to be done. And
6 now that I'm leaving, I can say this. You know,
7 oftentimes residents come to the meeting and they call us
8 out as commissioners for what we are or are not doing.
9 But I want to challenge the citizens as well. I think
10 that the effectiveness that you see on this board depends
11 on the engagement that you have with this board. And I
12 think that there's a great mass of our community that is
13 not tapped in when it comes to the work that this board
14 is doing. And we see that with the vacancies that are
15 coming up in the election cycle.

16 And I just think it's of the utmost importance that
17 if we're going to truly have effective oversight the
18 community needs to be involved to a greater degree. Now,
19 I know you know, that sounds kind of out of place for the
20 commissioner to be challenging the community, but I truly
21 do believe in people power, and it comes with your
22 engagement. And so the best that we can do, I know I'm
23 speaking to the choir for those who are here, but to
24 widen the tent and the community of care so that there's
25 greater engagement with this board, I think will enhance

1 the effectiveness that you see in the work that we're
2 doing. So, again, thank you, Chair for this honor and
3 opportunity and I look forward to continuing to work
4 along this board on the outside, no longer as a
5 commissioner.

6 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCH: Thank you so much. That's a
7 great message to all of us. I would like to also ask oh,
8 I want to acknowledge that Commissioner Smith has joined
9 us. And I want to ask Commissioner Woods, if he would
10 read a resolution that we have honoring our commissioner
11 who is retiring

12 COMMISSIONER WOODS: Absolutely. It would be my
13 pleasure. Resolution honoring Police Commissioner QuanTez
14 Pressley.

15 WHEREAS QuanTez Pressley has etched a lasting mark
16 on the City of Detroit, its residents, its institutions
17 doing many years of civic leadership and community
18 service, including recently as a member of the Board of
19 Police Commissioners; and.

20 WHEREAS Police Commissioner Pressley joined the
21 board in March, 2022, following his appointment to a
22 five-year term by Mayor Mike Duggan, and confirmation by
23 the City Council during a critical time. He helped steer
24 the board, the police department, and the city through
25 the Twin Global challenges remaining from the COVID-19

1 pandemic and a new era in police reform after the murder
2 of George Floyd by a Minneapolis, Minnesota Police
3 Officer; and.

4 WHEREAS along with his powerful commitments to
5 community involvement and public service, Commissioner
6 Pressley contributed greatly to the Board of Police
7 Commissioners through his remarkable experience on boards
8 starting as the first youth representative on the board
9 for the Detroit Public Schools.

10 Most notably, Commissioner Pressley served as vice
11 chair and extended to chair during a crisis through which
12 he stirred the board, the police department community. He
13 also made numerous contributions in his roles as
14 committee chair, having a tremendous impact on core
15 mandates for handling non-criminal complaints against
16 police officers in the entire department, transmitting
17 the annual department budget to the mayor, and selecting
18 finalists for police chief of one of the nation's top law
19 enforcement agencies, and.

20 WHEREAS Commissioner Pressley continues to be a
21 forceful leader for uplifting and improving the community
22 in his many other leadership roles in local and state
23 organizations, including as lead pastor of Third New Hope
24 Baptist Church,. He resigns his service as a police
25 commissioner this month. The board and the community will

1 long remember his contributions and impact.

2 THEREFORE BE T RESOLVED.

3 That the Detroit Board of Police Commissioners
4 awards this resolution and recognition of dedicated and
5 diligent service by Police Commissioner QuanTez Pressley,
6 whose dedication and commitment to civilian oversight to
7 the City of Detroit and local residents merit our highest
8 regards. We salute you, Commissioner QuanTez Pressley for
9 a job well done, and wish you continued success in the
10 future. Signed by all police commissioners.

11 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you so much. And is
12 there a motion to approve?

13 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: So moved.

14 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Support.

15 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: It has moved and supported.
16 All those in favor indicate by saying, aye.

17 COMMISSIONER WOODS: Discussion first.

18 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay. I was going to have a
19 discussion after the motion, but that's fine. Before we
20 vote on the motion, is there a discussion?

21 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I want to say something.

22 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Go ahead.

23 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: QuanTez, you're a very
24 valuable member of our community and of this board. I
25 think two things that weren't mentioned in the resolution

1 though, that I know that are very important to you, is
2 the fact that you are a Morehouse man like Reverend Dr.
3 Martin Luther King. And as I understand it, you are a Que
4 Omega Psi Phi, which is obviously both Reverend Jesse
5 Jackson's fraternity, as well as the honorable Elijah
6 Muhammad. You are what Jesse would say "With tall
7 cotton." So I just want to say it's been a pleasure
8 working with you. It's obviously a pleasure knowing you
9 and that we'll continue. You're very effective and very
10 kind and very good to people, and also to your
11 congregation. You're an exceptional leader. I wish you
12 the best. God bless you. And if there's anything I can do
13 for you privately or publicly, just holler as Mayor Kwame
14 Kilpatrick used to say, oh, he's a reverend now, too. So,
15 thank you.

16 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Thank you.

17 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Thank you commissioner.

18 Anybody else wish to comment?

19 COMMISSIONER WOODS: Well, I'll comment. I want to
20 thank you wholeheartedly for your compassion and your
21 love and support for the citizens of the City of Detroit
22 and your dedicated service. Thank you for being a great
23 inspiration to me personally and professionally. You have
24 inspired me in so many ways. And your dedicated service
25 to the community is excellent, par excellent. And I know

1 that you would be deeply missed in terms of your
2 knowledge and your skills and your abilities that you
3 apply to this board. And being able to lead during some
4 trying times in the City of Detroit is just remarkable.
5 And I know that you're already a doctor, but you're just
6 about to sell it at one of the greatest institutions in
7 the country. And so we don't take that lightly where
8 you're going to get your doctorate from. It's not a
9 bootleg institution. It's a very powerful institution.
10 And we really, really appreciate the sacrifices that you
11 have made for the citizens of Detroit. And also being a
12 great mentor to me coming into this space, because I came
13 in having to learn a whole lot, and you taught me a whole
14 lot. And I appreciate that.

15 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Thank you.

16 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you, commissioner.

17 Anybody else?

18 COMMISSIONER BANKS: I'll go last.

19 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Go ahead. Go ahead.

20 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Anybody else? Okay. Well, first
21 of all, me and Commissioner Pressley, we started
22 together. I sit right here; you sit right there. We
23 started together and I saw him rise on this board, the
24 chairman, and he's been a great inspiration to me. I just
25 love the way he flows to get up here and speak and just

1 flow so effortlessly; just a beautiful flow. I told you
2 that many times behind the scenes. I just love your flow,
3 man. It's just so effortless. But at the same time, I
4 never called you Commissioner Pressley. I never called
5 you Reverend Pressley. I never called you Pastor
6 Pressley. I always called you what?

7 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Doctor.

8 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Doctor. As a prophet. I always
9 saw a doctor. I didn't know when it was coming, but I
10 always called you Dr. Pressley. I'm though.

11 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY Thank you.

12 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHKE: Thank you, commissioner. So,
13 just very quickly, I want to say I've only been on the
14 board for less than a year this term, and in that short
15 period, I have seen such professionalism, and such
16 expertise and knowledge on how to be a board member and
17 to provide us guidance. And not only that, to keep us on
18 track, because you are very knowledgeable about Robert's
19 Rules of order and all of that. So, thank you for that. I
20 appreciate your leadership, and we're going to miss you
21 terribly. So, thank you, Reverend.

22 COMMISSIONER BANKS: I have one more thing, Chair.
23 It's just time for him to go. The Lord is opening up new
24 doors now, so he can rise to new levels. Whenever God
25 closes a door, he opens a door. Your time is up here.

1 It's time for you to move on and go to new heights and
2 new levels. The time you spent here, you did incredible.
3 But it's time for you to move on now. And you know, I'm
4 going to miss you.

5 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you commissioners for
6 those nice comments. I do want to say --- did you want to
7 say --- I'm sorry. Yes, we have a vote coming. He's
8 keeping us on track. We were in the middle of a vote. So
9 all those in favor, indicate by saying, aye.

10 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

11 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Opposed? Motion carries.
12 Thank you all. And I want to acknowledge ---

13 COMMISSIONER BANKS: What was that?

14 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: The motion to adopt the
15 resolution.

16 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Oh, okay.

17 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: We were right in the middle.

18 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Right. I'm sorry. I'm sorry.

19 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay. I just want to
20 acknowledge that Commissioner Carter joined us, and we're
21 going to take some pictures.

22 COMMISSIONER BANKS: As a whole board involved in
23 these pictures.

24 COMMISSIONER BERNARD You can be in the picture.

25 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Hey, I didn't know. I just

1 thought it was just the bigwigs.

2 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: No, no, no.

3 COMMISSIONER BANKS: I didn't know.

4 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I guess we're not balanced,
5 right? You got it now?

6 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Madam Chair, if I may?

7 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: If I could just make one
8 quick announcement. So right after the meeting, we are
9 going to have refreshments in honor of Commissioner
10 Pressley's retirement. So please stay for a few minutes
11 and we'll celebrate his leaving and how we're going to
12 miss him. Thank you. Go ahead.

13 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Madam Chair, thank you for
14 allowing me to make this statement. Before I came down, I
15 was watching the news report on the officer that was
16 killed in New York City. It's raining torrentially there
17 now. Every officer was standing there in their uniform. I
18 mean, water dripping from their hat, from their face all
19 over the place. It's a very, very sad thing that
20 happened. He's part of our organization because he's an
21 officer in blue. He serves his community or served his
22 community in New York City.

23 And having said that, Madam Chair, when I walked in
24 today, there was a man sitting right there in that blue
25 shirt. He's here from New York City and ---

1 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Welcome.

2 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: He came to, and his plane is
3 leaving today at 5 o'clock. But he came to this meeting
4 both I think, to honor both his fallen; a DPD officer. He
5 lives just two blocks from where the gunman obviously
6 assassinated four or five people. And he's committed,
7 obviously to men and women in blue. So he came to our
8 meeting today during the time of the funeral, and he also
9 met as you can see, sitting there right in front, a
10 leader of ours here in the department, Lieutenant Young,
11 who's head of the Lieutenants and Sergeants Association.
12 So it's a cathartic experience, at least for me, and I
13 think for all of us, because we're all saddened by what
14 happened. And it's nice to have a supporter of the police
15 department for the City of New York, and obviously for
16 DPD. And also Lieutenant Young gave him a pin to remind
17 him of the Detroit Police Department. So if we could just
18 take maybe a moment, moment of silence.

19 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Yes. Absolutely.

20 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Thank you.

21 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you everyone. And I'd
22 like to invite you up to see if you wanted to just say a
23 few words if you're willing to say a few words. Okay.
24 We're happy to have you. Thank you.

25 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Thank you, Madam Chair.

1 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you, commissioner.

2 Okay. At this point we have the Chief's report and

3 Assistant Chief Ewing will be providing that. Thank you.

4 AC EWING: Good afternoon.

5 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Good afternoon.

6 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: I'm not sure the microphone
7 is working for you. And turn it on.

8 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: It never works. You give him
9 that one, please.

10 AC EWING: Alright. Can you hear me now?

11 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Yes.

12 AC EWING: Let's try that again. Alright. As you
13 know, in the past weeks in the Chief's report, we
14 continually show a decrease in violent crime in the City
15 of Detroit. We're still down in all categories.

16 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: I'm sorry. I think we're
17 still having a hard time. Could you try the other one?
18 Yes.

19 AC EWING: Okay. Better?

20 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: That's much better.

21 AC EWING: We're still down in all categories in
22 terms of Part one, crimes, homicide is down 16%. Non-
23 Fatal shootings down 31%, robberies down 12 with total
24 part one crime down 7%. An amazing thing is carjackings
25 are down 30 in the City of Detroit. So, just an amazing

1 job that the women and men of the Detroit Police
2 Department are doing. Unfortunately, we're going to talk
3 about some things that may probably make some of us here
4 a little uncomfortable. I have to report, sadly, that in
5 the past week or so, we've had three children shot in
6 notable incidents. One happened on July 27th, 2025. At
7 approximately 8:56 PM, the officers were dispatched to
8 the 17,000 block of Angling in the 11th Precinct. A 6-
9 year-old boy was shot and struck by a stray bullet, and
10 unfortunately succumbed to his injuries. This appears to
11 be an incident where two vehicles were shooting at one
12 another.

13 And a bullet, as you all know, does not have an
14 address, traveled down the street and unfortunately
15 killed this young kid. In addition to that, this morning,
16 about 6:20 AM in the same precinct, a 1000 block of
17 Arcola, we had two children, eight and seven. One girl,
18 one boy were asleep upstairs in their home. They were
19 both shot. One was hit, I believe, in the arm, and the
20 other one was in the foot. The individuals who
21 perpetrated this were in two black pickup trucks. The
22 information is being given that the passenger in these
23 particular pickup trucks got out, fired at the house, and
24 ended up shooting these children. I'm happy to report
25 that they are non-life-threatening injuries. They will

1 recover, but they will not be able to gauge what type of
2 mental capacity these children are going to have for the
3 future in terms of, you know, dealing with this traumatic
4 injury that had taken place today.

5 We're just asking for the help from the public. You
6 know, if anyone has any information on either one of
7 these shootings that I just talked about, you call the
8 11th Precinct 596-1140, Crime Stoppers at 1800-SPEAK UP.
9 And also, you could submit tips to detroitrewards.tv. We
10 had a quadruple shooting that occurred on July 28th at
11 approximately 4:00 AM at the 3300 block of Puritan. Two
12 individuals lost their lives in this shooting. Two were
13 injured, but are still alive. This resulted in an
14 incident where the victim and the perpetrator got into an
15 argument. The perpetrator fired shots, and of course, two
16 of the individuals succumbed to their injuries. I'm happy
17 to report that that particular individual was identified
18 and he was arrested. He is currently awaiting charges
19 with the Wayne County Prosecutor's Office. On Tuesday,
20 July 29th, the Detroit City Council voted to increase the
21 fines for parents of youth who violate curfew. The first
22 offense would be \$250. Second offense will be
23 approximately \$500. There will be a mandatory court
24 approval program to go along with this. So, what we are
25 essentially saying is there's going to be different

1 avenues with regard to the fines themselves. This is not
2 a punitive type thing, we are just trying to change
3 behavior. And hopefully with these fines being increased,
4 we will get more parents to take responsibility for their
5 children.

6 On Saturday, July 26th, we had the Community
7 Violence Intervention Youth Basketball League game. Those
8 of you that came through, thank you for doing that. We
9 had the CVI basketball game that took place at Coleman
10 Young Rec Center. We had youth from 11 to 17. Just a
11 perfect, just great event. We had a number of teams come
12 out, played basketball against each other. Good
13 competition. We had mentorship there. We have peers
14 there, healthy environment, safe environment. And it went
15 off without a hitch. And I tell you; I was very impressed
16 to see it. I think we need more of that in our city. Just
17 a little teaser, I know that the PAL is going to be
18 opening up their gym shortly, and we're committed to
19 making sure that this program continues to happen in the
20 City of Detroit. In addition to that, you all know that
21 every year, we have the National Night out. That's
22 closely approaching, August 5th, this coming Tuesday,
23 Detroit Police Department.

24 Each precinct will be hosting their National Night
25 Out event. There'll be opportunities for the community

1 members to engage with law enforcement. It'll be free
2 food, entertainment and more. You can check the local
3 listings. We will have postings on our Detroit Police
4 Department Facebook page, as well as the individual
5 precinct Facebook pages. Next Wednesday, August 6th will
6 be the next iteration of the Walk Mile Wednesday with the
7 chief. This will be in the Brightmoore Council Rouge
8 areas in the Sixth Precinct. We'll assemble at 5:30 at
9 the God Land Unity Church, located at 22450 Schoolcraft.
10 The walk will begin at 6:00 PM So all of you get your
11 shoes together, come on out there and let's get our walk
12 on. And yesterday, I'm proud to report we had a promo
13 actually for a graduation ceremony for reservists.

14 We had nine reservists who graduated from the
15 academy yesterday, well attended. Great service family
16 members came out, really had a chance to enjoy and
17 celebrate their loved ones joining the reserve program.
18 We even had one young lady who actually works within, as
19 a part of our professional staff. She became a reservist,
20 but we found out her son is actually on the job and he
21 actually had an opportunity to pin his mom to badge on.
22 So, just a great event yesterday. That concludes the
23 Chief's report. If there's any questions, I'll take them.

24 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCH: Are there any questions for
25 the Chief? Any questions?

1 COMMISSIONER MOORE: I have a question.

2 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHÉ: Yes.

3 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Chief, what's the process that a
4 report goes through until it gets to the prosecutor's
5 office for acceptance or denial? Because I know you were
6 a past investigator years ago.

7 AC EWING: So, we have the job of gathering the
8 evidence and we type up the investigative report. We
9 submitted it to the Wayne County Prosecutor's Office who
10 will make the determination on the charges themselves.
11 The charges do not come from the Detroit Police
12 Department. We only gather the evidence and send it forth
13 to the Wayne County Prosecutor's Office.

14 COMMISSIONER MOORE: And is there a check and balance
15 for the investigator to send a report? Like do they have
16 to talk to the Pit Sergeant or ---

17 AC EWING: Each warrant is reviewed by either the
18 administrative sergeant or the lieutenant in charge of
19 the PDU and make sure that it has all the information
20 that it needs to go forward.

21 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Alright. Thank you, sir.

22 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHÉ: Any other questions?
23 Commissioner Banks and then Commissioner Bernard.

24 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Through the Chair, I just want
25 to ask you, when is Commissioner Hernandez going to be

1 replaced? It's been three months now. And we thank God
2 for his serving too. He was loyal to his duties, but when
3 is he going to be replaced so we can get back to a full
4 staff on the board of 11 members?

5 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: I can give you an update.
6 Yesterday at City Council, Robert Jones was approved by
7 City Council to join the police commission board. And so
8 he's going through the process now, going before the city
9 clerk to be sworn in, and then he will come hopefully
10 soon after that. So within I would say, a few weeks.

11 COMMISSIONER WOODS: Through the Chair. I would say
12 by next week he should be sworn in. The clerk swears him
13 in and then he will be onboarded and stuff, but he should
14 be able to have the ability to sit at the table by next
15 week.

16 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Okay. And then we'll have
17 Commissioner Pressley's position that will be vacant. So
18 we'll be looking for someone to replace his position as
19 well. So that's where we're at. Anything further?

20 COMMISSIONER BANKS: I'm all set. Thanks.

21 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Thank you. Commissioner
22 Bernard.

23 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Just quickly; you've mentioned
24 a number of tragedies that have occurred actually this
25 week, in the last three weeks. Can your office perhaps

1 advise our board secretary of any of the funeral
2 arrangements for people who have been hurt, as well as,
3 if people who are in our community are in the house. I'd
4 just like to know how --- I can send it through you. I
5 know they may not want anything going to their house
6 personally or something like that. But I just need to
7 know when, what and where. That's all I'm asking for, if
8 you don't mind.

9 AC EWING: Yes, ma'am. We'll get you a copy of the
10 funeral arrangements.

11 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I would appreciate that.

12 AC EWING: Absolutely.

13 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHE: Thank you.

14 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Because I want to communicate
15 with them.

16 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHE: Yes. Thank you.
17 Commissioner. Any other questions for the Assistant
18 Chief? I have just one question. With regard to the
19 fines, you did indicate that the highest fine would be
20 500, I think that's for a second offense.

21 AC EWING: Yes.

22 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHE: Second offense. But along
23 with that, there's an alternative. Did you mention that?
24 That there's some training or something that the parents
25 can take if they can't afford to pay the 500?

1 AC EWING: So, all that is going to be outlined. It's
2 currently being written out right now; outlined. We'll
3 get that out, but there will be opportunities for that to
4 happen.

5 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Thank you. Commissioner
6 Woods.

7 COMMISSIONER WOODS: Yes, and I think the key aspect
8 of this ordinance, which is something that is very, very
9 powerful, is that it has decriminalized the ordinance.
10 The ordinance that carried jail time and significant jail
11 time. You know if you violate a couple of times, you
12 could face up to 90 days in jail. So they decriminalize
13 the ordinance. There's no criminal penalty where you
14 could do any jail time; and has connected with so many
15 services to be able to bless the community and the
16 families, and the children. It's unprecedented that
17 something like this has happened in a sense that you took
18 the criminal penalties out and gave them services and
19 opportunity. Had we not seen a change in that ordinance
20 yesterday, you would still have a criminal penalty there
21 and you still were going to get a fine without any type
22 of services and opportunities. So this was an opportunity
23 to wrap arms around the community to help them in a way
24 that they need some help. Again, they decriminalized it.
25 So those who want to keep those jail penalties on there,

1 you know, then you keep that ordinance that you had
2 before. But if you didn't want to see the jail time taken
3 away and give people the opportunity to get some
4 services, then that was it right there.

5 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Thank you, commissioner.
6 Commissioner Bernard.

7 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Just quickly. I agree with
8 what Commissioner Woods just said. It was a misdemeanor
9 to not know where your kid is. Now, it's no longer a
10 misdemeanor. But my only concern about it, well, I think
11 it's similar to yours, Madam Chair, in that the \$250 is a
12 lot of money. I said to Counsel, the only people who can
13 afford to just usually write that check today out of the
14 people in this room. Meaning the people in the City
15 Council chamber and certainly \$500. And my concern was
16 that if in fact you missed your appointment, I don't know
17 how this is going to be structured and so forth, if it
18 really will accommodate. Most people in Detroit are
19 single parents, and many of them, as you and I both know,
20 work two jobs.

21 So if it's going to truly accommodate those sort of
22 scheduling concerns. But more importantly than that, if I
23 miss the appointment or I get a second offense, my kid
24 is, you know, just a heathen, as my grandma would say,
25 and Mono Bay and I get these offenses, those are

1 significant penalties, Madam Chair and those penalties.
2 The city of Detroit has a debt collection agency, which
3 they call me about a parking ticket. I have, for example,
4 I get a text every month. But anyway, back to the point,
5 and an individual's credit rating is important too, and I
6 don't want our credit collection agency, I've got their
7 name to harass people about the collection of these
8 fines. And then once you're in that system, as you know,
9 it has devastating effects on your ability to get
10 housing, a car, anything.

11 So I just wanted people, the judge, maybe it is
12 something we could say to the courts to make sure that
13 they are empathetic and sympathetic to grandmothers, for
14 example, who have custody of kids; they can't track them
15 down at night. They come and they go; and people like me
16 when I leave here, sometimes six, seven, I go to my
17 couch, I'm asleep until four o'clock in the morning, on
18 the couch. I wouldn't know if the kid was there or not,
19 but I'm just saying that we just have to do this, I think
20 with empathy for all communities within the city. Because
21 kids now are different than they were, you know, when
22 they talked about the streetlight thing that doesn't
23 exist anymore. As we know, kids are on their phone,
24 they're all doing all kinds. And you're a mother of five
25 Tamara, so, you know, six, I'm sorry of six. So, you know

1 exactly what I'm talking about. There's a limit to what
2 parents can really do these days.

3 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHE: Thank you commissioner.
4 Commissioner Woods.

5 All of that is false, you know, because the ---
6 excuse me. Through the Chair, the attorney for the city
7 outlined unequivocally that there are exceptions to the
8 rules, and this is being applied in different types of
9 ways, you know, and so parents who have those types of
10 situations, there's a lot of grace in it already. And
11 then, the only thing yesterday, what was done yesterday
12 was the fee was increased and it was decriminalized, and
13 then they put the services around it, and it also says
14 that you have to meet a certain criteria for you to even
15 get, you know, penalized. You know, so there's a lot of
16 grace in there in so many ways. So none of that is true.
17 The attorney for the city outlined that very, very good.
18 And I encourage people to look at what has been written
19 legally by legal professionals.

20 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Pardon me, Madam Chair, may I
21 respond.

22 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHE: Go ahead.

23 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: A civil violation is a civil
24 violation. That could be parking tickets, it could be
25 anything. I'm saying that the fines, fees, and penalties

1 mount up, and the city has a kind of contract with a
2 collection agency to collect fines, fees, and penalties.
3 We're not talking about the criminal aspects of it. It is
4 a civil penalty and it will be charged to an individual
5 pursuant to a ticket and pursuant to notice. If they
6 ignore that notice, then unfortunately, they will be
7 fined in court. \$250 or a second offense, \$500. The
8 bottom line for me is our community; Commissioner Burton
9 says it all time, the poorest blackest city in the
10 country. And therefore, I'm concerned about what happens
11 to people's credit rating, to them having these debts,
12 particularly senior citizens related to grandchildren and
13 others who do not obey.

14 And the real problem as you know deputy chief are
15 guns. I mean, you're right about the streetlights being
16 on, but our disputes were handled with fisticuffs. It
17 was, they were not handled with guns. So the
18 proliferation of guns is what has caused the absolute
19 horrific situation that exists in Detroit. And we need a
20 task force, I think, to address, how do we get those
21 guns? Do we need to pay them \$1,000 a gun? I don't care
22 what it is we do, as long as we do something to deal with
23 guns. Guns are creating the tragedies that we see in our
24 community.

25 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Thank you. Commissioner

1 Banks, and then Commissioner Smith. Thank you.

2 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Through the Chair. There was
3 some truth that Commissioner Bernard put out there on the
4 floor when she said that kids are different from back in
5 the day. We are in a whole new era now. Back in the day,
6 a village raised its children. You are down the street
7 cutting up, you would get a whooping from your neighbor,
8 and then when you got home, you get another whooping. We
9 don't have a village today. The village is gone, but we
10 still have people from that era. But I don't know if they
11 are enforcing it, you know what I'm saying? I don't know
12 if they enforce it, but we still have people from that
13 era. If you are about 50 years old, you are from the
14 village era.

15 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you, commissioner.

16 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Thank you.

17 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Commissioner Smith.

18 COMMISSIONER SMITH: Yes. I'm listening, through the
19 Chair, I'm listening to what you all are saying, but in
20 my opinion, parents need to be and have to be held
21 accountable.

22 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I agree.

23 COMMISSIONER SMITH: Just as this morning at 7:00 AM,
24 we have two children that reside in the city that were
25 shot. Seven and eight years old. One in the foot and one

1 in the forearm. We have a 4-year-old that is deceased,
2 and we now have a 6-year-old who I stood over in the
3 hospital room watching this deceased child on a gurney
4 who was six years old. This is something that I do daily
5 in my profession, that I've chosen to help deter the
6 crime here in the community. Parents need to be held
7 accountable. These children are out of control. They are
8 not the same children that was once in the Coleman Young
9 era. These are not the same children. Laws have changed.
10 They need to change because we have to deal with what
11 we're dealing with today. I understand that \$250 is not
12 affordable. \$500 cannot be affordable. But I often hear
13 parents who are raising and looking for GoFundMe's to
14 fund their funeral services for their children. So if we
15 can save your life with a \$250 fine to a \$500 fine, I
16 would rather do that than to bury your child.

17 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Thank you, commissioner. Any
18 other comments or questions? Hearing none, just one quick
19 comment. I'm getting a lot of people telling me or asking
20 me, what is the police department doing besides the
21 curfew and the fines? We understand that. Are there any
22 other initiatives, programs or ideas that the police
23 department is pursuing to try to stop these shootings of
24 children. I mean, that's all I'm hearing from the
25 community is we have too many children that are being

1 shot. What is the police department going to do? So,
2 Assistant Chief?

3 AC EWING: Through the Chair. As you know, we have a
4 number of things going on right now.

5 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Microphone. We can't hear.

6 AC EWING: Most notably is our partnership with our
7 CVI groups. Each area, which we've already identified in
8 each precinct that has had notable high shooting areas.
9 They're going in and they have community programs for
10 these young children. The CVI basketball league, I just
11 spoke about that. We have Detroit PAL. You know, the
12 Detroit Police Department has their cadet program. And
13 all these programs we have throughout. We have city
14 camps, those types of things. So we're constantly trying
15 to find ways to keep these kids occupied. But we have to
16 get the parents to bring them down. They have to get them
17 involved. And we cannot be a program where it's a
18 babysitting program. We need the parents involved also.
19 And we really do that. And again, if we can start there,
20 I think we'll have a good basis to make sure that we can
21 start a good process of trying to solve this issue.

22 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Commissioner Woods.

23 COMMISSIONER WOODS: Yeah. Through the Chair. I was
24 at the CVI basketball game. And that was a very, very
25 powerful event where you had rival gang members in the

1 same room through the CVI groups, being able to squash
2 beef, get them on the basketball court and through
3 sports, being able to bring them together. I was
4 absolutely amazed by it. And it's not a one-off, this is
5 not just one game. They're meeting with these young
6 people every day, but bringing them together to be able
7 to say, hey, I may be a Crip, I might be a Blood you
8 know, they put it down and just talk through certain
9 major beasts, you know? And so that was a very, very,
10 very powerful program and a very proactive program. And I
11 know that you have the explorers and all of that inside
12 the schools. And I don't know if you guys have it in
13 every school, but I know you are at least in 10 schools,
14 because when I'm in the schools, I've seen and worked
15 with them inside the schools as well. So there are a
16 number of things, but community members also have the
17 ability to bring ideas to the department, right?

18 AC EWING: That's correct.

19 COMMISSIONER WOODS: And if they have ideas, you are
20 open to those ideas, right?

21 AC EWING: Absolutely.

22 COMMISSIONER WOODS: Okay. Thank you.

23 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHÉ: Thank you, commissioner.
24 Commissioner Moore.

25 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Just briefly, Madam Chair. You

1 know, those programs that the Assistant Chief mentioned,
2 I've been a part of them. They're great programs, but the
3 battle is really in the spiritual realm. We talked a lot
4 about how physical policing by nature is to react. I
5 mean, the science of policing is to react to situations.
6 But it's really a spiritual battle. I mean, when we look
7 at the different things that this city is going through,
8 children who are defenseless, getting killed, and we
9 don't acknowledge God enough. There's not enough
10 collective prayer taking place in this city. And once we
11 start getting on that level of talking about collective
12 prayer and people coming together in prayer, then I think
13 we'll do better. Thank you.

14 COMMISSIONER WOODS: Yeah. Through the Chair. He has
15 to be a prophet, because tomorrow at 12 noon, hour power,
16 you have a number of pastors and leaders throughout this
17 entire city. And everybody in this room is invited. The
18 department will be there. The sheriff's department will
19 be there. Numerous pastors will be there. School
20 officials will be there, right. at Spirit Plaza. Pastor
21 QuanTez Pressley, when we called him about it and stuff,
22 he immediately said that he would be there. Like I said,
23 a lot of folks pray first and foremost.

24 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCH: What time?

25 COMMISSIONER WOODS: At 12 Noon. Hour power right

1 there on Spirit Plaza. Everybody's invited to do Exactly.
2 What my good friend just suggested is such a great,
3 excellent idea. I was going to talk about it before it
4 ended. And but thank you so much for uplifting that
5 Commissioner.

6 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you. Oh, Commissioner
7 Banks

8 COMMISSIONER BANKS:: Commissioner Moore,. I didn't
9 know you were a prophet.

10 COMMISSIONER MOORE: I didn't even know, either.

11 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Hey, take it, and run with it,
12 baby. But what I wanted to say, I wanted to chime in on
13 Commissioner Moore. What he said was so accurate because
14 any battle that's in your life, if you are about to get
15 sick or somebody is about to get shot or whatever, it
16 always starts in the spiritual realm first. That battle
17 starts in the spiritual realm first, before it comes in
18 the natural realm. So I just want to let you know, you
19 were correct, you were accurate.

20 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you. Commissioner
21 Smith.

22 COMMISSIONER SMITH: Yes. Through the Chair. I was
23 just thinking to be more mindful and more strategic in
24 our actions as citizens, as adults here within the city.
25 If you know you are a CPL holder or an open carrier, a

1 citizen, whatever it is, when you go somewhere, think
2 about your weapon and think about how you can't take your
3 weapon in. And think about when you leave your weapon in
4 the car that your car could possibly be broken into. That
5 weapon is taken and recycled amongst the community of the
6 youth that are committing most of the crimes. If we lived
7 in a city right now where the youth are not committing
8 the crimes, we probably will almost be in a crime less
9 city. Because It's not anyone else right now, but the
10 youth that are committing the heinous crimes that we're
11 living in. We have to be more strategic. We have to think
12 differently. We are dealing with different times.
13 Different times, different people are not the same
14 children that you are used to dealing with.

15 Right. Thank you. Any other comments or questions?
16 Hearing none. Thank you for that lively discussion.

17 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Hey, this has been a great
18 meeting.

19 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHÉ: Thank you.

20 COMMISSIONER BANKS: We've been flowing beautifully.

21 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHÉ: Thank you for that. Next is
22 our oral communications, public comments. And remember,
23 we have a two-minute limit and inappropriate language and
24 comments may delay the meeting. They will not be
25 tolerated. Thank you. Our first speaker, please.

1 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Inappropriate language.

2 Yeah, I'm sorry. Language and comments. Next our speaker
3 please.

4 MS. UNDERWOOD: Thank you, Madam Chair. Our first
5 speaker will be Ms. Sharon Pinnell. Ms. Fredia Butler,
6 Lieutenant Mark Young.

7 MS. PINNELL: Good evening.

8 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Good evening.

9 MS. PINNELL: Last week I had an outburst and I want
10 to apologize, but I did not like the fact that Vice Chair
11 Woods would not acknowledge Sergeant Lockhart, that's his
12 name, right? Ron Lockhart. He's an excellent person.
13 Monday there were so many people giving him so many good
14 accolades. And that's the first time in 16 years --- I've
15 been coming down here for 16 years. That's the first time
16 I ever heard that. I was just appalled by it. And can you
17 ask the Chief; can we have a gun buy-back? You know, when
18 I get off the guns, but you might get some and it might
19 help. That's all. And I wasn't mad at you, commissioner.
20 I just didn't like the fact that he did not want to sign
21 that resolution.

22 COMMISSIONER WOODS: May I respond?

23 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Yes, you may.

24 COMMISSIONER WOODS: I thank you for that critique
25 and I respect what you're saying; and it wasn't against

1 him. It had nothing to do with him in no shape, form, or
2 fashion. It's always been my practice to do the due
3 diligence to be able to review as far as the background
4 so that we can do it the proper way. And so it has
5 nothing to do with him. And please wish him God's speed.
6 I got the information that I needed. I appreciate his
7 service to the citizens of the City of Detroit, and
8 absolutely. Hey, I've read what I needed to read about
9 him. And so I have no qualms with him in no shape, form
10 or fashion. I'd just like to do my due diligence

11 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Next speaker, please.

12 MS. BUTLER: Good afternoon.

13 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Good afternoon.

14 MS. BUTLER: I would like to thank Commissioner
15 Pressley for the work and representing us, the City of
16 Detroit. I appreciate the way you conduct yourself at all
17 times. Thank you. And the other topic was about the
18 problems with the children, but it's home first, church
19 and school. Now, that is what I came to say. Several
20 people have been here speaking before you about what is
21 happening in their area of our city. I am concerned
22 because I believe them. I read some time ago about
23 Congresswoman Tlaib speaking to Mayor Duggan, and he told
24 her the people were illegal. Commissioners, I am
25 concerned because I'm hearing and reading about what is

1 happening to people here with ICE, wearing masks, taking
2 people away, and in some instances with our officers
3 assisting ICE. I am reading and hearing what other
4 leaders are saying about ICE and nothing from our leaders
5 here.

6 We are all human beings and should be respected.
7 Because of certain behaviors being seen and heard in my
8 friend's neighborhood, she wanted to contact ICE, and I
9 encouraged her to call our police department. If you are
10 listening, the Supreme Court is allowing President Trump
11 to deport people, black and brown people to different
12 countries, not from where they came from. It has even
13 been suggested by this administration that people
14 receiving Medicaid should take the place of the deported
15 farm workers if they weren't employed. For our young
16 people, please stop killing each other and settle your
17 differences as intelligent people who you really are.
18 Wake up sleeping giants and think.

19 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you. Next speaker.

20 LT. YOUNG: Good evening.

21 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Good evening.

22 LT. YOUNG: I support the parents responsibility.
23 Curfew violation is long overdue. The problem is we're
24 making excuses. We made excuses for these young people
25 and others from the parents to the kids. There are no

1 expectations, there's no accountability. And they don't
2 understand their responsibility until they become adults
3 themselves. And then they become victims to people like
4 themselves. I want to talk about something else, too. I
5 just came back from a convention where I was reelected to
6 my position on the National Association of Police
7 Organizations Board. During that, I led a round table
8 where we talked about some of the challenges that we are
9 facing that came out of this very room. Respectfully, no
10 one wants to be a law enforcement officer anymore. All
11 the major departments from Boston, LA, New York, Detroit,
12 and other places. They're all suffering from shortages
13 because they took all the phone booths. That's why
14 Superman has no place to change.

15 I'm not even being funny. Right now, no one wants to
16 be a law enforcement officer because of the scrutiny.
17 It's not supported. That's also empowering, while some of
18 these young people are doing what they're doing today. If
19 we are wrong, bring it righteously. Hold us accountable,
20 righteously. But when we are right, I understand that I'm
21 not in the perfect profession. I understand that there's
22 no perfect profession. The FBI got an Internal Affairs
23 board. But what I am going to tell you is our department
24 is a bright and shiny beacon on a hill that other
25 departments are looking at. And you should be taking some

1 credit for that. Not vilifying us, not making accusations
2 that are unfounded, tossing things in the atmosphere,
3 polluting the air. They are also empowering some of these
4 young people to think that the villains are the police
5 when they are actually carjacking and terrorizing their
6 own parents. And if I may say the last point, these kids
7 are not poor. They're not. They're entitled; feel
8 privileged and empowered because the police are weakened.
9 There is no phone booth for us to change.

10 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Thank you.

11 MS. UNDERWOOD: Our next speaker, Madam Chair. Our
12 next speakers will be Minister Eric Blount. Ms. Williams
13 and Mr. Dana Lund.

14 MINISTER BLOUNT: Chairperson. Well, Co-chairperson,
15 Assistant Chairperson Woods knows what I'm going to say.
16 This lengthy discussion about curfews has absolutely
17 nothing to do with police officer misconduct. But yet we
18 are going to do this three-ring circus all around the
19 real issue of why we are here. I'll just give you one
20 example of what you could have done with that discussion.
21 Time. You could have admired Derek Perry. For those of
22 you who don't know who he is. He was in Traverse City, a
23 black man, long dreadlocks with a gun who decided he was
24 going to take action to deescalate a maddening situation.
25 So much of what he did and what he said and how he

1 described his spirit could be learned by DPD and so many
2 others. But no; curfew, curfew, curfew, curfew is all we
3 want to talk about. Eternal hope lies with the
4 replacement of any board of police commissioner here
5 today. Far too many on this board use this board to cover
6 their illegal activities and sometimes even political.
7 And I'll go down the list. Byron Ferguson used his
8 position to try to get out of being with prostitutes.
9 Linda Bernard, so many times shows that she is here to
10 show her support for her legal profession. And now we
11 have Willie Burton who wants to run for City Council. How
12 many times do people have to show you who they really
13 are? It's hard to find any of you who are really here to
14 address police officer misconduct.

15 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Next speaker.

16 MS. WILLIAMS: Hello everyone. Through the Chair.
17 This is for you, Chief Warfield. All the complaints I've
18 been making concerning these officers, are they not
19 Detroit police officers? LaShonda Houston and Cheryl
20 Hall? Are they not police officers in the Detroit Police
21 Department? So I'm not sitting up here making up
22 anything, falsifying, making assumptions about Detroit
23 police officers living in shelters. You have to
24 understand. Darryl Woods, where I live, somebody has been
25 contacting you every time something happens. So how would

1 you even know what's going on? Let's keep this 100. You
2 sit up here on this board every week. Lie, listen in my
3 eyes and all this stuff you are saying; like I said, the
4 FBI because they are in these shelters taking up bed
5 spaces. So you tell me, I need to hear this? Are they
6 officers? Chief Warfield?

7 Okay, my whole point. Have you all been lying,
8 conspiring with each other, with the chief, everybody
9 lying to the City Council saying there are no Detroit
10 police officers living in shelters. If yesterday an
11 incident occurred, an officer. So when I went back and
12 said, it's like recruiting from the eighties, you never
13 know what you are going to get. This officer told me to
14 shut the F up and this, this and that. You're recruiting
15 people out of the shelters with mental illness who are
16 taking medication or drug addicts. You clean them up a
17 little bit. You give them an incentive. They want to be
18 officers because they want this money. They want this
19 \$3,000. They want to start off at 55 and they're not
20 paying any money. So this is how the incentive is, and
21 house vouchers permanently only pay 30%. So make it make
22 sense, while you all sit up here every week and lie and
23 act like this does not exist where officers are living in
24 shelters. Contact the FBI Darryl Woods.

25 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCH: Next speaker, please.

1 MR. LUND: Question Who's the head person of the ---

2 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Could you identify yourself,
3 please?

4 MR. LUND: I'm Mr. Lund.

5 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay. Thank you.

6 MR. LUND: The head of the commissioner's council?

7 Well the commissioners?

8 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: The board.

9 MR. LUND: You?

10 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Yes.

11 MR. LUND: Do you control civil rights?

12 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: No.

13 MR. LUND: With civil rights? Well, everybody that I
14 call at the City Council and everywhere else, they said,
15 call you people for civil rights because my civil rights
16 are violated.

17 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Yeah. We handle citizens'
18 complaints.

19 MR. LUND: Pardon me. I don't want to waste my two
20 minutes.

21 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: No, no. I'll give you extra
22 time. We handle citizens' complaints for the police
23 department and we provide oversight.

24 MR. LUND: Well, every time I call 596-5918 and they
25 send me to you guys. And the officer, Jeremy Foster,

1 violated my civil rights. That man kept me in handcuffs.
2 I had surgeries on my hand. I had my throat cut and
3 everything. And I had surgery on my shoulder and nothing
4 happened. I don't even know what that officer is doing.
5 He's still on the street to my understanding.

6 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Have you filed a complaint
7 with our ---

8 I filed complaints. I have paperwork stacked. I have
9 two ---

10 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Did we have someone talk
11 with him?

12 MR. LUND: I even went and got a bullhorn. Do I have
13 to stand outside and talk about this? I don't understand
14 what's going on. I went to the Supreme Court, the Sixth
15 Circuit Supreme Court. It's still in motion right now
16 because of this one officer. You have an attorney Philip
17 Hiltner who withheld evidence to this day. And he just
18 released it ever since 2016 to the 24th 2024 to this
19 date. And I just went down there. I just left the Coleman
20 A. Young Center. I Googled Mayor Duggan and he did
21 nothing. I never got any return to anything. But this
22 Officer Forrester is still on patrol. And you guys say
23 that you are hiring new officers, no disrespect to the
24 ones who are doing their job, but you are all hiring
25 these young officers that have no training; you don't

1 train them right. And they are out there doing wrong. And
2 the other thing really quick, give these parents back
3 their rights to beat these kids down. Not kill them, but
4 beat them down, and they wouldn't do the things that they
5 do. And you wouldn't have to come here. But you're taking
6 the rights from the parents. And that's what the kids do
7 because they think they have rights. Now, they shouldn't
8 have rights until they're adults.

9 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay. Thank you. I'd like to
10 see if Chief, we could have someone speak with him
11 regarding his complaints.

12 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Excuse me. Through the Chair.

13 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Yes.

14 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: I think the Chief was
15 indicating that we might have a CCR on file already. Do
16 we know what day that CCR was filed?

17 CI WARFIELD: Through the Chair?

18 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Yes, we --- sir.

19 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Pardon me?

20 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: I was asking the chief
21 investigator, do we already have a citizen complaint
22 filed for you? And he's saying yes. And I'm asking what
23 date was that CCR filed?

24 CI WARFIELD: CCR that was filed was not for ---
25 through the Chair. The CCR file was not for the specific

1 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: That he just spoke of?

2 CI WARFIELD: That he just spoke of.

3 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Okay. So it's another
4 complaint.

5 CI WARFIELD: There are other complaints.

6 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: So we can have someone speak
7 with him today,

8 CI WARFIELD: The supervising investigators.

9 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay.

10 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: But can I get a clarifying --
11 -

12 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Yes, go ahead.

13 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Here to our public commenter.
14 The date of the incident, of the fourth allegation of
15 force that you're making. What year was that?

16 MR. LUND: It was in 2016. I'm still in motion right
17 now because I had to file a complaint against the judges.
18 I had to go to the grievance office today because the
19 judges didn't even want to hear. I never even got a court
20 case.

21 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Well then yes, one of our
22 investigators will definitely assist, but noting that the
23 incident occurred in 2016 and this CCR will be filed
24 today, there'll be some difficulty, but the investigation
25 should be able to go forward. Is that correct, Chief

1 Investigator?

2 CI WARFIELD: Through the Chair. We actually did take
3 a report back in 2016.

4 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY About this incident?

5 CI WARFIELD: About that incident. I have it right
6 here in front of me.

7 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Okay. Thank you.

8 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHÉ: Okay, sir, somebody's going
9 to follow you.

10 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: I'm sorry.

11 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHÉ: Go ahead.

12 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: I'm a little bit
13 discombobulated by this. Has he been contacted at all? He
14 is from OCI. Okay. Sir, we'll do our best to follow up on
15 the CCR that's already on file for your case.

16 MR. LUND: All I've been doing is getting thrown
17 under the bus.

18 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Yeah, I apologize for that.
19 And it still might feel that way just to be quite honest
20 with you, noting the investigation that has to be done,
21 but we'll do our best.

22 MR. LUND: Thank you.

23 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHÉ: Thank you. Next speaker.

24 MS. UNDERWOOD: Thank you, Madam Chair. Our next
25 speakers will be Ms. Beverly Watts. Ms. Bernice Smith.

1 And then we'll go into Zoom.

2 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you.

3 MS. WATTS: Good afternoon.

4 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Good afternoon.

5 MS. WATTS: Beverly Watts, District 5, president of
6 Harbortown one, as well. First I wanted to say, I want to
7 commend you, Commissioner Pressley, for all the work that
8 you've done. I want to thank you for that. It's not easy
9 to serve. I've been on both sides of the table, so I get
10 it. I also want to voice my support for the curfew fine.
11 I understand anytime you hit families with financial
12 situations, it could be an expense on you. However with
13 the crime that we're having, especially curfew violations
14 that's not the only issue for the crime increase. But we
15 have to do something. And sometimes when you don't put a
16 value on something, people don't take it seriously. So we
17 applaud that because the price is too high on the other
18 side with the car thefts, with the shootings.

19 And they're not the only ones. They're adults too.
20 But we have to start at home. So I applaud the police
21 department for proposing to the mayor and everyone else
22 who was behind that, that we all have to be that village.
23 Going to the point of what the gentleman said, the
24 commissioner about a village. We have to do that. You
25 know, we know what we used to have when our parents were

1 raising us, but we have to do that and be that village.
2 As I said, I'm president of Harbortown one. We make sure
3 we go online in our area and we know the commander, we
4 know all the programs that are there. But the problem is,
5 and we've attended some of those, they're not attended.
6 So what we have to do as a community, as parents, because
7 some parents have two or three jobs.

8 Let's be that village. Let's take their kids for
9 them when they can't come. But we need to go to some of
10 these programs. And also on the other side, for the
11 police department, let's reevaluate some of the programs
12 and see what's effective. What is measurable? Maybe we
13 have to get them involved and see what program will work.
14 But the hardest thing I'll always tell people, it's
15 easier to sit there and criticize anyone. The hard part
16 is taking off your shoes and stepping on someone else. So
17 I want to applaud everyone just for giving your time and
18 trying to make a difference. Thank you.

19 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHÉ: Thank you.

20 MS. SMITH: Wonderful. I raised her. I am so proud of
21 her, and I'm glad that she ---

22 COMMISSIONER WOODS: Before she speaks, can I say
23 something?

24 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHÉ: Yes, Commissioner Woods.
25 Just one second please.

1 COMMISSIONER WOODS: Yeah, I want to just point at
2 that big stack over there, that's next to the chief
3 investigator. Those are cases upon cases upon cases,
4 probably hundreds of cases; 200 cases right there in
5 which all these commissioners had to review to be able to
6 give answers to the citizens. We get these folders every
7 single week. This is a sacred process. And we're not
8 going to litigate people's personal situations in public.
9 You know, that's a sacred process. The Office of Chief
10 Investigator is where you file citizen complaints and
11 you're going to get treated in a dignified manner. And I
12 agree with Minister Blount, that we do need to be able to
13 carve out a space and time, at least once or twice a
14 month, particularly in our community meetings so that we
15 can give a detailed report as relates to the Office of
16 the Chief Investigator. But that is a lot of cases to
17 review; 200 cases. You know we have to read every last
18 one of them, and we have to sign off on them, and we have
19 to challenge them sometimes and scrutinize them. And so
20 that is a very, very lengthy process. And that's the work
21 that a number of the commissioners are doing on a weekly
22 basis.

23 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Thank you. Commissioner. Go
24 ahead, please.

25 MS. SMITH: You have me standing up here this long,

1 while you are doing all this?

2 COMMISSIONER WOODS: You going to get ---

3 MS. SMITH: You apologize to me when we're ---

4 COMMISSIONER WOODS: You are going to get me, I know.
5 I deserve it.

6 MS. SMITH: Ewing, good to see you, my dear. You
7 know, we have gone through a whole lot of crime action
8 for the last month or so. I have been talking about these
9 youngsters for the longest, because I raised five myself,
10 so I know what it takes. In the meantime, we do have to
11 pay more attention to what our children are doing when
12 they're at our site. We definitely do. And I'm a great-
13 grandmother now, and I still care for what my children
14 are doing and what my grandchildren are doing. But the
15 fact is, what has happened for the last month or so, I'm
16 very disgusted about it. And I don't know what we could
17 do. But I do have one suggestion. We used to have the
18 police in the neighborhood. Ewing, what happened to that
19 program we had. Every time you looked up, we saw one of
20 our police that was in the neighborhood, what do they
21 call it? The NF or whatever.

22 But can we have that back in our neighborhoods
23 again? Would that be impossible to have? Because I think
24 that was a great effort of the police department. And I
25 love my police department. I love every one of them.

1 Every time you put that uniform on, you're taking care of
2 me and everybody else sitting in this room, and outside.
3 So I just want that suggestion. Could we bring them back
4 in the neighborhood so when we look out our door, we can
5 see a police officer in the neighborhood or somewhere
6 near our homes because it's getting ridiculous. Every day
7 when I look at my TV at 11 o'clock, I hear something
8 about the kids shooting, they're hijacking. The other
9 day, there were 12-year-olds hijacking. They showed a
10 picture of them hijacking. That's ridiculous. We have to
11 do something.

12 It's time to put our foot down, see if we can bring
13 the police back in the neighborhood so they can be
14 visible in our city. And Pressley baby, I'm going to miss
15 the heck out of you. You know that, don't you? I'm sorry
16 that you're going to leave us. You have done a wonderful
17 job since you've been on this board and I've been very
18 proud of you, of what you have been doing. As a matter of
19 fact, all of you have been doing a good job. I don't have
20 any complaints about any of you, but the fact is, we have
21 to do better as far as our city is concerned and taking
22 care of our city. This young man that's come from New
23 York. I know what New York is like. I wouldn't live there
24 for nothing in the world, because ---

25 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Thank you.

1 MS. SMITH: Alright. You have a good day, and bless
2 all of you. Believe me. Talk to the good Lord, because I
3 went to Bible study the other day and it was good. And
4 that's another problem I have. I saw two of our policemen
5 there. I'll talk about it next week.

6 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHÉ: Thank you. Next speaker.

7 MS. UNDERWOOD: Thank you, Madam Chair. We're going
8 to go into Zoom. We have three speakers in Zoom. Our
9 first speaker will be former Commissioner William Davis,
10 Mr. Smith and Ruby. And then that would be the end.

11 MR. DAVIS: Good afternoon. Can I be heard?

12 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHÉ: Yes, you may.

13 MR. DAVIS: Okay. Let's start off by saying, I'm
14 going to miss the commissioner who is leaving, that has a
15 church in my neighborhood. I would prefer to see him and
16 others not leave until January. But when I was a kid
17 growing up, you know, we had neighborhood schools, and if
18 you act up in school, you would get paddled. You know,
19 parents used to be able to do physical adjustments to
20 you, and they didn't have to worry about going to jail.
21 So I think, the parents have responsibility, but some of
22 the responsibility also is on the city and the state,
23 because we had schools in the neighborhood. We had after
24 school programs. We have a number of things that have
25 deteriorated over the years.

1 You know, I remember going, and having the Swim
2 mobile, the bookmobile, all sorts of stuff that would
3 come into the communities. Especially some communities
4 that don't have Rec centers that don't have some of the
5 stuff that they should have. When I was a kid, I used to
6 go to the Rec center. I used to wrestle, box, you know,
7 do all sorts of stuff, you know, shoot basketballs, what
8 have you. Some kids don't have that. I had the benefit of
9 having two parents who made sure I did what I was
10 supposed to do. And when the streetlights came on, if I
11 wasn't on the porch, my foot had to be on the step. So I
12 think we, not to just look at the parents, but we need to
13 look at society and put, when I was a kid, we had
14 actually had police and firefighters living in our
15 community. So there are a whole lot of factors that you
16 need to step back and look at. Thank you.

17 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you, commissioner.
18 Next speaker.

19 MS. UNDERWOOD: Mr. Jahdante Smith. I'm having a
20 little difficulty unmuting him, so we'll just go to the
21 next speaker.

22 MR. SMITH: I'm here.

23 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Go ahead.

24 MR. SMITH: May I be heard?

25 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Yes.

1 MR. SMITH: Jahdante Smith speaking. I guess I'll
2 call out endorsement. I was running for District 5 Police
3 Commissioner, but E'yandra Otis, I think that's who I
4 support for District 5 Police Commissioner. I want to say
5 that as far as the meeting today, the meeting has run
6 smoothly, more smoothly than usual, but it's not enough
7 about the purpose of the meeting, which is civilian
8 police complaints. Also, when it comes to the youth, a
9 lot of crimes are being committed by the youth, because
10 they don't have anything to do. They don't have, like
11 Commissioner Davis said, they don't have a lot of things
12 to do and they're being punished. And also the parents.
13 And my thing is, I hate to say it, CVI is touted so much,
14 and CVI is not doing enough. There's something called the
15 Martin Luther King home projects on the east side of
16 Detroit that should have its own CVI project because that
17 is one of the most dangerous places to live for anybody
18 in the City of Detroit. And there is not even a focus.
19 The 7th Precinct doesn't even touch it. They don't go
20 near it. They won't work with me; they don't work with
21 the community on it. And it's just a violent, and very
22 terrible place to live. The residents have to deal with
23 that. Also, these fines are not going to do anything.
24 Here are our poor, not privileged. Mark Young, you need
25 to shut up. Whatever you're saying is not correct. You

1 are very tone deaf, and there are plenty of white people
2 who love to be police officers in the City of Detroit
3 because they can come in and they can be racist towards
4 black citizens and they love it. This profession is not a
5 dying profession. Policing is not dying. We see ICE
6 coming in, and raiding southwest Detroit and all of these
7 people who are being called illegal and it is stolen
8 land.

9 It's not a dying breed. They're making a hundred
10 thousand plus a year to become police officers and raid
11 with masks on. And we have people like them, and that is
12 why we have to fight them, even though she's not much
13 better because she's attacking protestors, Palestinian
14 protestors. But it's ridiculous that you would say this
15 is a dying profession, Mark. You need to go outside and
16 do some research, touch some grass, and do some research.
17 Also, Commissioner Pressley, I don't think you've done an
18 excellent job. I think you've done a very pitiful job. As
19 a commissioner, you blocked a lot of things. You weren't
20 nice. I know I saw you at the NAACP dinner and I was nice
21 to you, but I don't think your service has been great.
22 And I hate to say it, but I'm glad to see you go. Glad
23 we'll get a replacement. Have a nice day. Goodbye.

24 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCH: Next speaker.

25 MS. UNDERWOOD: Ruby. Ruby, please go ahead and

1 provide your comment.

2 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Next speaker.

3 MS. UNDERWOOD: Ruby, go ahead and provide your
4 comments. Madam Chair, there may be some problem.
5 Perhaps, maybe next time we can extend the ---

6 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay. We'll go on to the
7 next item on the agenda. There's no presentation to the
8 board, correct, Madam Secretary?

9 MS. GARNIER: Correct. Not today, Madam Chair.

10 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: We'll have a report from the
11 board Secretary

12 MS. GARNIER: Under your tab six in your binders, you
13 will please note the documents, A through D Towing
14 Committee memorandum. I want to make a special note that
15 the handout from the meeting that was held yesterday, is
16 a compilation of presentations made by the Towing
17 Committee's meetings, which was a three-part series over
18 the past three months. Very useful information ---

19 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Filing complaints, and for
20 whatever reason, they weren't filing complaints. Maybe
21 they didn't think that, you know, their rights were
22 violated, whatever the situation was, but they weren't
23 filing complaints. So, thank you Chief.

24 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Commissioner Banks.

25 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Yeah. I just want to say that's

1 pretty good what you put out there about the bum rush
2 because the community needs to know about that. That's
3 really good, what the officers are out here doing
4 Standing for justice. That's good stuff, commissioner.
5 Good stuff.

6 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you. Any, any other
7 comments? Hearing none then, is there any new business?
8 New business? No new business. I'll entertain a motion to
9 adjourn.

10 COMMISSIONER WOODS: So move.

11 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: It's been moved and
12 supported. All those in favor indicate saying, aye.

13 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

14 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Opposed? Motion carries.
15 Thank you for attending tonight's meeting.

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
