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CITY OF DETROIT
BOARD OF POLICE COMMISSIONERS MEETING
October 16, at 3:00 P.M.

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3 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHÉ: We will begin by asking for
4 the invocation by Chaplain David Boyd, who's on Zoom.

5 CHAPLAIN BOYD: Hello. Good evening.

6 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHÉ: Good evening.

7 CHAPLAIN BOYD: Everybody's ready; can you hear me?

8 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHÉ: We can hear you?

9 CHAPLAIN BOYD: You can hear me? That's what it's all
10 about. Father, in the name of Jesus. First one to say
11 thank you. Lord, we didn't tell you thank you for last
12 night; we tell you thank you for the day. So, Lord, now
13 we ask that you would just saturate this place today. We
14 pray for every police officer, for every chaplain. Lord,
15 we pray for the chief of police. Lord, we pray for this
16 meeting that is about to take place. We pray that you
17 will give us wisdom, God. Bind us together in unity and
18 love, God, that we follow and cash out the vision that
19 you have placed before us. God, we thank you for being
20 able to be here today, God. So now we ask that you'll
21 give us strength, God. We pray for the City of Detroit.
22 We pray that you will give us everything that we need to
23 make this a better place. And God, we pray that you would
24 bless each and every last person who are on at this
25 meeting or on Zoom or on this platform. God, we thank you

1 for their life, health, and strength. So God, we pray
2 that you continue to cover our DPD, give them what they
3 need, God. Give this committee, this body, whatever they
4 need, God. Bind them together, God. We give you all
5 honor, glory and praise. It is due to your name. In Jesus
6 Christ we pray, amen.

7 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHÉ: Amen. Thank you, chaplain.
8 At this time we'll go to public comment.

9 MS. UNDERWOOD: Thank you, Madam Chair. Our first
10 speaker will be Ms. Fredia Butler. After Ms. Butler will
11 have Ms. Williams.

12 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHÉ: First speaker please. Do we
13 have our first speaker? Oh, okay. She's trying to come
14 up. Okay.

15 MS. BUTLER: Good afternoon.

16 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHÉ: Good afternoon.

17 MS. BUTLER: Commissioners, the governor in Illinois,
18 I believe is doing everything in his power to not allow
19 the president to take over his State. He has called upon
20 all governors to come together and stand against the
21 violation of the Constitution and the rights of the
22 people. Yet, I am not hearing anything from our leaders.
23 Some southern governors are welcoming him. Remember our
24 history. We have had difficult times before. It has been
25 reported that he has fired over 500,000 black women from

1 our first office and professional jobs and replaced them
2 with white people. Before the Civil Rights Bill, we had
3 people with master's degrees and beyond running elevators
4 at the White House. Our black and brown children have
5 been traumatized for the rest of their lives from the
6 event that took place in Chicago. I can say that because
7 of what happened to me as a child in Memphis, Tennessee,
8 [unclear0:03:45], cussing and kicking in our neighbor's
9 room, looking for their teenage sons. I still live with
10 being traumatized by what happened to me in Memphis. In
11 Chicago, they took children from their beds and zip-tied
12 them, and some people were even naked. Are we going to
13 have that here? Will our leaders stand by and say nothing
14 to their constituents? Papers should already have been
15 prepared to go to court. We are that black and brown
16 city, or should I say, blue city he is going to invade.
17 I'm hoping to hear from church leaders too. Thank you.

18 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHÉ: Thank you. Our next speaker.

19 MS. UNDERWOOD: Ms. Williams. [Unclear0:04:47].

20 MS. SMITH: Good afternoon.

21 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHÉ: Good afternoon.

22 MS. SMITH: Good afternoon to our commissioners, and
23 to our guests. Welcome to our commissioners meeting. We
24 are very interesting. Believe it or not, we are very
25 interesting. Well, I am very upset and due to the fact

1 that our police are being – I don't know what I can say,
2 but I will tell you this. I'm a former Chicagoan. I was
3 born and raised there, and I don't like what's going on
4 over there. And I hope with God's help, that they don't
5 come over here and do things to, not only the citizens,
6 but to our police department, because we are qualified,
7 we have efficiency, and there's nothing wrong with our
8 police department. I know it from my heart. Coleman Young
9 assigned me to be a police commissioner on the committee
10 in '73. I happen to be 93 years old. God is good. But I
11 will tell you this, we do not need them [unclear0;05:52],
12 and I hope to God that they don't even come near us, or
13 do anything.

14 Now, what I would like to say is, we're having too
15 many car accidents; we're having too many shootings at,
16 not only the police, but we're just having too much
17 that's going on. Also, what's really on my mind is the
18 mother that had the nerve enough to (unclear0:06:24] have
19 five children. Five, five and six. And I raised them
20 intelligently. I'm proud of them. I have a postmaster. I
21 have a bank executive and then I have one that won't
22 leave [unclear0:06:37] for nothing in the world, going on
23 35 years. So anyway, to make it short, because I'll soon
24 be out of time. I just want to know what was on that
25 mother's mind to bring a knife to school for her daughter

1 to injure another student. I used to work at the school
2 in Bogart in Southwest Detroit, Earhart and Mayberry. So
3 I know what it's [unclear0:07:00] in the schools, and I
4 wish that these parents would take better care and use
5 better judgment than to give their child any kind of
6 weapon to use on another child. I see my time is up.
7 Thank you so much.

8 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you for your comments.
9 Next speaker please.

10 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I would like to say something
11 in response to what she said.

12 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Go ahead.

13 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Mother Bernice, I just want to
14 thank you for reminding our community of our
15 responsibility. Thank you very much. It's very, very
16 important.

17 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you, commissioner.

18 MS. UNDERWOOD: Please state your name for the
19 record, sir.

20 MR. WELBORNE: WELBORNE. Thank you. Go ahead and let
21 me speak. I came here just to give you some information.
22 Last month, I attended this here, if everybody can see
23 it. It pertains to military people; people who were in
24 from 1841 to 1975. The trip is a two- day trip to DC,
25 paid for; food is paid for, and everything else. All you

1 have to do is show up.

2 I learned a lot down there. You can go and see the
3 Vietnam wall. You go to the army air force room, the
4 coast guard. You go to that museum. The best thing I saw
5 down there was the women's museum. It was them. It was
6 great. It was really touching to me. I spent 32 years in
7 the military. I spent 5 years in Vietnam, so I know
8 what's going on. But anyway, let me tell you about this
9 trip. You sign up for it, and you leave from Flint
10 Airport, go down to DC and you go around to different
11 places. They have buses, they have plenty of wheelchairs
12 for people who can't walk. You go to visit every place
13 down there. You see the unknown soldier. You go to
14 everything down there. See building that ---

15 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: I'm sorry, you have 15
16 seconds. So, if you wrap it up.

17 MR. WELBORNE: Anyway, if you want to find out about
18 this, call area code 231834255, and ask for Mr. Green.
19 He's in charge. The email is [www. \[unclear0:10:01\]/hf.org](http://www.[unclear0:10:01]/hf.org)
20 and get the information there; or you can call me at
21 2042477. Thank you.

22 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you so much, sir.

23 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: May I comment please?

24 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Yes, commissioner, go ahead.

25 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Just quickly. Sir,

1 Commissioner Bell is a person who also served in the
2 military. And this trip is one, ladies and gentleman,
3 this is for your parents and anybody else who served in
4 the military, male or female. It's a free trip from
5 Detroit to Washington, DC to see [unclear0:10:49] to
6 Vietnam. They pay for everything. [Unclear0:10:51]. It's
7 sponsored by the United States military. And it's
8 extraordinarily important because the men that I've
9 spoken to have done it in the past. It's only been done
10 once before from here. They said that when they approach
11 the memorials, they are moved in some instances to tears
12 and so forth. There's no [unclear0:11:12] saying that a
13 person can do more than serve their country.

14 And this is a free trip for you to go, and
15 fellowship with other service people who you may or may
16 not have served with. So I totally urge you to talk with
17 them before you leave.

18 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you. Thank you,
19 commissioner. Any others? Thank you so much for that
20 information. So I'm going to call the meeting to order,
21 and ask that we have the roll call by Madam Secretary.

22 MS. GARNIER: Chairperson Dewaelsche - Present.

23 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Woods - Present.

24 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Bernard - Attorney Linda
25 Bernard, present. District 2. MS. GARNIER: Commissioner

1 Banks is excused.

2 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Bell - Present. District
3 4.

4 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Burton - Present. District
5 5.

6 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Carter - Present.

7 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Jones may be present.

8 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Moore is excused.

9 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Smith - Present. District
10 1.

11 MS. GARNIER: 7 Present, Madam Chair.

12 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHÉ: Thank you, Madam Secretary.

13 At this time, I'd like to ask for approval of the October
14 16th agenda.

15 COMMISSIONER WOODS: So moved.

16 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Second.

17 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHÉ: It's been moved by
18 Commissioner Woods, second by Commissioner Bernard.
19 Discussion? All those in favor, indicate by saying, aye.

20 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

21 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHÉ: Thank you. And now I'd like
22 to ask for a motion to approve the minutes of October
23 9th, 2025.

24 COMMISSIONER WOODS: So moved.

25 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Second.

1 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: It's been moved by
2 Commissioner Woods, seconded by Commissioner Bernard. Any
3 discussion? All those in favor, indicate by saying, aye.

4 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

5 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Opposed? The motion carries.
6 Thank you. At this time we will have the chief's report -
7 --

8 [Unclear0:13:07]: Introduction of the staff.

9 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: I'm sorry. You're right.
10 Introduction of the BOPC staff, Chief of Police, Elected
11 Officials, Representatives, and Community Leaders.

12 MS. GARNIER: Madam Chair, through the Chair, present
13 and registered at this time are Corporation Counsel
14 Conrad Mallett, Mary Barber, Teresa Blossom, Drew Fries,
15 Candace Hayes, Artemisia Joshua, Dior Mathis, Felicia
16 Tyson, Jonya Underwood, Chief Investigator Jerome
17 Warfield. Also, Supervising Investigator Tiffany Stewart.
18 Interpreters today are [unclear0:13:51] and Stephanie
19 Beatty. Court reporter is Don Handyside, Enrique Jackson
20 for audio visual. Charles Henry from media services.
21 Assistant Chief Franklin Hayes is here, also
22 [unclear0:14:11], 2nd Precinct community activist. Marie
23 Overall from State Representative Tryone Carter's office.
24 LaDon Davis from Council member Fred Durhal's office,
25 former Commissioner William Davis. We also have Dr.

1 Francis Jackson, our parliamentarian, together with Mark
2 Young, President, Lieutenants and Sergeants; and Ron
3 Thomas of DPOA. And those are the people I have
4 registered at this time.

5 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Thank you, Madam Secretary.
6 We're going to go to the chief's report that you are
7 asking the board to consider for approval. And Assistant
8 Chief?

9 DC HAYES: Yes ma'am.

10 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Because we called you AC. If
11 I could list the names because I have the lists. You
12 could just indicate that you have recommendations in each
13 category.

14 DC HAYES: Yes, ma'am. Madam Chair. Through the
15 Chair, I still would like to share through this honorable
16 body, just going over just a few updates as it relates to
17 the day-to-day operations as a department.

18 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Sure. You could start with
19 that.

20 DC HAYES: I just want to ensure that I welcome
21 driving violent crime down in the city and we continue to
22 see that drop significantly. Homicides, we are down 19%,
23 32 less homicides, going from 165 last year-to-date to
24 133 this year-to-date. Our non-fatal shootings, 497 last
25 year, 383 reflective of a 23% drop off, of decline or 100

1 due to that 114 less incidents. 932 robberies last year.
2 This time this year, we are at 768, which is 164 less
3 incidents reflective of a 17% decrease, excuse me, and
4 our carjacking, where this time last year we had 98; this
5 year we are at 66; 32 less incidents reflective of a 33%
6 increase. So we are continuing to understand that, not
7 only with our officers and members that are on the
8 ground, and partnerships certainly with this model, the
9 community groups [unclear16:42]. So many that are
10 involved in this ecosystem to make public safety that we
11 are seeing results, that is making our city a safer city.

12 Sorry again, I have a lot of anxious folks behind me
13 here. So [unclear16:59] just wanted to highlight the
14 Faith and Blue community brunch happened on Monday, where
15 the department was at the 5th Precinct. I hosted with
16 community residents and they were able to join the 5th
17 Precinct officers and chaplains for brunch to honor the
18 First Responders. On Tuesday, we had Project Green Light
19 [unclear0:17:23] up an open house, where we hosted
20 business partners and potential business owners and
21 Project Green Light, where we highlighted the
22 partnerships and the fact that they were making dealing
23 with ecosystem of making [unclear17:37] so for Detroit.
24 Chief Bettison concluded his series, his Walk-a-Mile
25 series this last Wednesday in the 4th Precinct. The

1 community members were able to talk and speak with the
2 chief. And we talk about the little that we're doing in
3 the community.

4 Look ahead. Next Thursday, October 23rd, the Detroit
5 Police Department's 3rd Precinct will be hosting its last
6 cycling with the community event for the season. The ride
7 will begin at 6 pm at the 3rd Precinct, located at 2075
8 West Grand Boulevard. This would be unique because the
9 community was asked to wear Halloween costumes while
10 they're riding. Domestic violence awareness of
11 [unclear0:18:21], October 23rd [unclear0:18:28] Domestic
12 Violence Unit and the Victim Assistance Program will be
13 hosting a domestic violence awareness event with the
14 [unclear0:18:38] US Detroit Public Safety Headquarters,
15 and we [unclear0:18:41] to attend and join us. On
16 Saturday, October 25th, every Detroit Police Department
17 Precinct will be hosting drop off Saturday from 10 AM to
18 2:00 PM, where members of the community [unclear0:18:54]
19 to dispose of their medications safely by dropping off at
20 any DPD precinct. If you are unable at this time toward
21 to make that event, the Detroit Police Department
22 precinct has a permanent DEO prescription drug takeback
23 box to return used and unwanted prescription drugs at
24 each precinct, 24/7.

25 We have a quarterly Citizens Radio patrol that will

1 be happening on Saturday here at the PSH, from 10:00 AM
2 to 12:00 AM right here in the Scarlet Herbert room, and
3 the community is invited to discuss radio patrol updates,
4 events, and information for the remaining months of 2025.
5 And then the Citywide Initiative, Halloween in Detroit,
6 where on Friday, October 31st, every Detroit Police
7 Department precinct, we'll be hosting a trunk or treat
8 for families to enjoy a safe Halloween in Detroit. A full
9 list of locations and times are available on the
10 department's social media page. Madam Chair,
11 [unclear0:20:59].

12 COMMISSIONER WOODS: Through the Chair.

13 DC HAYES: Sorry, yes.

14 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCH: Yes, commissioner.

15 COMMISSIONER WOODS: Yeah, before you get here, I
16 want to ask, do you have the department's first numbers?

17 DC HAYES: Absolutely not. I'm sorry, through the
18 Chair. Absolutely not.

19 COMMISSIONER WOODS: So the project numbers
20 [unclear0:20:15].

21 DC HAYES: Through the Chair, the manipulate for
22 Nevada is subject to criminal consequences or criminal
23 penalty. That is not confirmed by Chief Bettison nor any
24 member of the Detroit Police Department, sir.

25 COMMISSIONER WOODS: And [unclear0:20:36], in terms

1 of number 6, you guys have been sending to us, and I know
2 there's the FBI, and so when folks put out their
3 [unclear0:20:45] numbers, [unclear0:20:48], and so I just
4 wanted to give you [unclear0:20:52].

5 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Thank you, commissioner. DC
6 Hayes.

7 DC HAYES: Yes, ma'am. Madam Chair, and this
8 honorable body, this is a time of excitement within the
9 Detroit Police Department. This time is inclusive of
10 personal and professional growth. Members competed in the
11 competitive process and based on their performances in
12 that process are now being presented to this honorable
13 body for elevation within the Detroit Police Department
14 by either appointment or promotion. Madam Chair, I
15 believe you have before you the recommendation of Chief
16 Bettison as it relates to the first, the appointment of a
17 member to the rank of captain.

18 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Yes, I do. The Chair will
19 entertain a motion to adopt the chief's recommendation to
20 appoint Lieutenant Toniqua Davis from the rank of
21 Lieutenant to the rank of captain. Is there a motion?

22 COMMISSIONER WOODS: So moved.

23 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Second.

24 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: It has been moved by
25 Commissioner Woods, and seconded by Commissioner Bernard.

1 Are there any questions? All those in favor, indicate by
2 saying, aye.

3 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

4 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHÉ: Opposed? The motion
5 carries. Congratulations. And I'd like to invite the
6 captain to the podium if she would like to say a few
7 words.

8 CAPTAIN DAVIS: Good afternoon. Through the Chair.

9 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHÉ: Good afternoon.

10 CAPTAIN DAVIS: I would just like to say, I
11 appreciate the recommendation, and acknowledgement. I'm
12 also here to support the rest of the team that have
13 earned this. I appreciate this opportunity and I will
14 make sure that I'll [unclear0:22:59] the rank of Captain.
15 I thank you kindly.

16 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHÉ: Thank you. Now, I think the
17 way that I would like for us to hand of the rest of the
18 [unclear0:23:13] that are being recommended, I would ask
19 you to all come as your name is called and stand in front
20 of our tables here, in case people would like to take
21 some pictures, because we have quite a list of
22 categories, and unfortunately, I can't ask that you each
23 speak [unclear0:23:33], but we can at least get together
24 in the front of the room. Is that okay, DC?

25 DC HAYES: Absolutely.

1 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHÉ: Thank you.

2 DR. JACKSON: Madam Chair.

3 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHÉ: Yes.

4 DR. JACKSON: The parliamentarian would ask if the
5 Chair would inquire if any of the commissioners are going
6 to pull a name.

7 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHÉ: That's right. Let me do that
8 before. Should I do that with each category?

9 DR. JACKSON: The parliamentarian would advise that
10 you do that now.

11 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHÉ: Okay.

12 DR. JACKSON: We're not calling up the names of
13 people whose names were voted on separately, and that
14 could be awkward.

15 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHÉ: Okay. Thank you.

16 DR. JACKSON: If the Chair could inquire if any of
17 the commissioners intend to pull a name from the list to
18 be voted upon separately, that they would indicate so at
19 this time. CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHÉ: Thank you. So the
20 commissioners received the list of all the
21 recommendations to review those names, and is there any
22 commissioner that is [unclear0:24:37] to pull any of the
23 names from the categories that they have considered?

24 COMMISSIONER WOODS: I would say this Madam Chair,
25 through the Chair, that I have done my due diligence and

1 read every last one of these recommendations. And I have
2 confidence that these are people who serve the citizens
3 of the City of Detroit with dignity and respect. And so
4 we scrutinized these recommendations very, very
5 thoroughly. And so from my estimation, I have no
6 objection in no shape or fashion.

7 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Through the Chair.

8 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Commissioner Burton.

9 COMMISSIONER BURTON: I agree with my colleague, Vice
10 Chair Darryl Woods. This is a time that we move the
11 department forward and so I have no concerns with these
12 promotions. I'm ready to move forward, and do what's good
13 for the city, but also do good for the men and women.

14 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Thank you to both
15 Commissioners; Commissioner Bernard.

16 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Just quickly, I want to
17 congratulate obviously, the leadership department and
18 from where people could be the future leaders of the
19 department. It's very important that men and women have
20 something to aspire to, and to be within a position, and
21 make for a much better workplace. And so I want to
22 congratulate you on taking a lot of time.

23 This is a lot of work in terms of evaluating
24 people's test scores, and obviously their record with the
25 department. And examining those issues that occurred when

1 they had an issue in their performance and whether the
2 allegations were sustained and not sustained. I thank our
3 director of OCI for that because it's a lot of work to do
4 this. And again, I agree with most of my colleagues. I
5 totally am supportive of raising, if you will, and keep
6 on rising, rise to the top. So that's all I have to say.

7 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you commissioners. Any
8 other comments or questions? Hearing none, then I'll
9 proceed with the recommendations. So the recommendations
10 from the police to promote from sergeant to lieutenant
11 the following names. DC, I ask you to come up again to
12 the front. Sergeant Lawrence Addison, Sergeant Lisa
13 Bryson, Sergeant Joshua Felix, Sergeant Tony Goins,
14 Sergeant Daniel Harnphanich, Sergeant Jamal Hamood,
15 Sergeant Charles Lynem. Is the [unclear0:27:46]

16 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: [Unclear0:27:46] as
17 recommended by the Chief.

18 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Support.

19 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: It has been moved by
20 Commissioner Bernard, seconded by Commissioner Burton,
21 that the promotion from sergeant to lieutenant be
22 approved. Any questions or discussion? Those in favor,
23 please indicate by saying, aye.

24 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

25 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Opposed? The motion carries.

1 Congratulations.

2 Thank you. Anybody want to take a picture?

3 [Crosstalk]. [Unclear0:28:26] come here?

4 DC HAYES: Whatever is the pleasure of the board,
5 Chairperson. [Crosstalk]. Chair, if I may, I understand
6 that we are under the oversight of the board, but I'd
7 like to make a recommendation to you. Could you please
8 join these men and women in this photo?

9 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCH: Sure.

10 DC HAYES: For today's a great day in their career.

11 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCH: If all the board members
12 would like to come up. [Crosstalk]. The second
13 recommendations from the chief's office are from police
14 officer and detective to sergeant. And we have 18. So
15 that's a large number. But let me start. This is the
16 recommendation. Police Officer Bryan Cottrell. And if you
17 could come in again. Police Officer Imer Gozic, Police
18 Officer Brian Ferreira, Detective Ryan Walden, Police
19 Officer Jennifer Cleary. Police Officer Robin Rodgers.
20 Police Officer Malika Nixon, Police Officer William Hill,
21 Police Officer Dominic Vitale, Police Officer Amber
22 Cogborn. Detective Kimberley Cochran, Detective Dillon
23 Hanson, Police Officer Julian Shanti, Detective Brendan
24 Brown, Police Officer Steven Anouti, Detective Heather
25 Reyes-Morales. Detective Marcus Rice, Police Officer

1 Bradley Tobel.

2 Okay. Is there a recommendation to approve these
3 recommendations?

4 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: So moved.

5 COMMISSIONER SMITH: Second.

6 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHÉ: It's been moved by
7 Commissioner Bernard and seconded by Commissioner Smith.
8 Is there any discussion? Those in favor, indicate by
9 Saying, aye.

10 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

11 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHÉ: The motion carries.
12 Congratulations everyone. I should say congratulations to
13 our new sergeants.

14 COMMISSIONER WOODS: Yes.

15 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHÉ: Okay. So let's take the
16 pictures again.

17 DC HAYES: Can we get through ranks. All that's in
18 the back [crosstalk].

19 MS. SMITH: We are coming off the ladder. How about
20 that. That's wonderful. Congratulations, fellas, be safe
21 out there?

22 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHÉ: And finally, recommendations
23 for detectives from the chief and they are as follows:
24 Police Officer Quenton Lindsay, Corporal Felicia
25 Washington, please come up. Police Officer Lamear Downes,

1 Police Officer Amanda Hudgens, Police Officer Caitlyn
2 Patrick-Davidson, Police Officer Davita Rutledge,
3 Corporal Steven Pierce, Police Officer Terrell Williams,
4 Police Officer Rebecca O'Connell, Police Officer Jason
5 Taylor, Police Officer Khristopher Gruben, Police Officer
6 Steven Kosa, Police Officer Tremayne Brooks, Police
7 Officer Julian Aldrich, Police Officer Ciara Helms-Hill.
8 Okay. [Unclear0:35:03] to detective.

9 COMMISSIONER CARTER: So moved. It's been moved by
10 Commissioner Carter.

11 COMMISSIONER SMITH: Second.

12 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Seconded by Commissioner
13 Smith. Is there any discussion?

14 COMMISSIONER WOODS: I would say, Madam Chair,
15 through the Chair. I think this is a great, great day for
16 the City of Detroit. We are [unclear0:35:26] to be able
17 to service the citizens of the City of Detroit. I know
18 they [unclear0:35:31] detectives are promoted so that
19 they can give their services to the citizens of the City
20 of Detroit. So the City of Detroit should be happy that
21 these detectives will be able to give out even more
22 services to the citizens. So [unclear0:35:57] of this
23 particular person.

24 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you. Discussion?
25 Hearing none, those in favor, indicate by saying, aye.

1 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

2 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Thank you. And the motion
3 carries. Congratulations to our new detectives.
4 [Crosstalk].

5 DC HAYES: Madam Chair, that concludes the chief's
6 report.

7 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Thank you. Thank you all for
8 your service to the department. We're excited for your
9 promotion, and [unclear038:48]. Thank you. And now,
10 [unclear0:38:57] presentation to the board. I believe we
11 ---

12 DR. JACKSON: You have the presentations you need to
13 go back to? You want to complete the [unclear0:39:03].

14 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: May I ask a question, Madam
15 Chair?

16 DR. JACKSON: And did you want to ask the
17 commissioners if they had any questions for the chief?

18 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Yes. Okay. Before the
19 reports, commissioners, do you have any questions?

20 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Just really quickly, are you
21 going to give them their badges and their stripes in a
22 separate ceremony? [Unclear0:39:25].

23 DC HAYES: Through the Chair. Yes, we will be having
24 a promotional/appointment ceremony. The minute that the
25 venue and date are selected, I will certainly keep this

1 body informed and we hope that all of you will make it
2 and be in attendance.

3 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Okay. Thank you. I just wanted
4 to make sure we're getting this stuff.

5 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Thank you. And I'm glad that
6 the [unclear0:39:51]. We have to go back and finish oral
7 communications. We started with them, but we have to go
8 back, because we were not finished. So can we have a next
9 speaker please?

10 MS. UNDERWOOD: Yes, Madam Chair. Our next speaker
11 will be Ms. Williams and then we'll go to Zoom. Is there
12 any person that had a comment that they wanted to make?

13 MS. WILLIAMS: Congratulations, especially to this
14 captain, this black woman over here for everyone else,
15 but I like to see that. Okay. Good afternoon. I'm asking
16 Chief Warfield, concerning Internal Affairs, if their job
17 is to investigate officers' behavior, who investigate
18 them when they violate the law. It's not acceptable when
19 you are in a different position. Officers who are
20 supposed to do their job and comply with the law and do
21 not. Like I mentioned before, like that officer who
22 [unclear0:40:46], excuse me, to the 3rd. The lieutenants
23 are these two officers from Internal Affairs. They did
24 not follow [unclear0:40:58] call. Like I've stated
25 before, this is the same Internal Affairs officer that

1 came to 3426 Mack Avenue to pick up their weapons.

2 That's why I said, if you don't have anything
3 tangible about [unclear0:41:12]. I've seen him on the
4 bus. I was giving him the information. But Joe
5 [unclear0:41:20] anywhere, it's unprofessional. You guys
6 have ear buds, and everybody should hear everything, but
7 I can stand on my word, everything I say. I don't have to
8 [unclear0:41:36] make sure when these officers that live
9 in shelters or ex-offenders with badges; Ms. Williams is
10 in here. You had me on FaceTime. Last time I showed,
11 stopping it's illegal. When I come here, hacking your
12 time with badges. Your earbuds are not communicating, and
13 then you delegate and have certain people doing the same
14 things. At the end of the day, I come here to speak about
15 legal protection of the Detroit officer and I say all
16 3000 of the civilian also, because they always have
17 something to say. Also it's unconstitutional. I don't
18 have anything to say. Then the second they transferred
19 him to the 3rd, I see them on the bus; start off the end
20 of the day [unclear0:42:25]. Thank very much.

21 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHKE: Thank you. Next speaker
22 please.

23 MS. UNDERWOOD: Madam Chair, we're going to go into
24 Zoom. I'm sorry. Ma'am, please state your name for the
25 record.

1 MS. ROBERTS: Rashida Rainbow Roberts. My daughter
2 was assaulted in May of 2024. COMMISSIONER BERNARD:
3 Microphone, if you don't mind. Thank you.

4 MS. ROBERTS: Sorry, nervous. My daughter was 12 at
5 the time. My ex attempted to molest her. So I called the
6 police immediately when I became aware of it. She
7 actually was able to get him on a recording and I wasn't
8 contacted back. I tried calling the 8th Precinct. I was
9 transferred around and hung up on. Eventually about a
10 month later Sergeant Young gave me a call and I
11 reiterated the report to her. And then I didn't get
12 contacted again for another two weeks or so. They didn't
13 know if they were going to do it in sex crimes or not.

14 And then months later, after I completed everything
15 with CPS, who informed me that Detroit Police will be
16 handling it from there on, I was informed by another
17 detective, calling me about my youngest daughter's choice
18 that it had triggered an investigation. He looked at the
19 other one for me and said that that detective had closed
20 the case. That no crime was committed. No one contacted
21 me. And when that detective called me a couple months
22 after that detective, I believe it was August of the 8th
23 Precinct, he told me that he closed the case because CPS
24 was going to handle it. And then my daughter, on Monday
25 of this week, she finally came out and revealed that he

1 had already previously raped her on February 2nd, 2024.

2 And I'm scared that nothing's going to be done
3 again. And she's been waking up crying and screaming and
4 scared that he'll come back. I have a personal protection
5 order. I have no way of serving it to him. I've been
6 trying.

7 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: So DC Chief, would you want
8 to---?

9 DC HAYES: Certainly. Both allegations or matters of
10 this nature are extremely serious. Commander Jevon
11 Johnson will be escorting Ms. Roberts up to the Special
12 Victims Unit immediately to open an investigation into
13 this and ensure that justice is served.

14 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Thank you. Thank you so
15 much.

16 DC HAYES: You're welcome.

17 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Also, too in terms, she has
18 just said she has a personal protection order. The police
19 department can serve that order. And as a matter of fact,
20 it's in the statute, as you know.

21 DC HAYES: Thank you. And if I may, to that point,
22 Madam Chair, and both through the Chair, understanding
23 the police department's ability to assist in the service
24 of personal protection orders, we've put out a
25 correspondence that has been published every day for a

1 cadence of 30 days, just to ensure that all members are
2 aware of this. I read this at roll call as a part of
3 their training. So if there is an opportunity to ensure
4 that its service DPD will actually do it.

5 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHÉ: Thank you.

6 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: So that officer can make sure
7 that happens. Thank you. CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHÉ: Any
8 other comments?

9 COMMISSIONER WOODS: Through the Chair, can you make
10 sure that is absolutely [unclear0:45:52].

11 DC HAYES: Absolutely, Vice Chair.

12 COMMISSIONER WOODS: Thank you.

13 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHÉ: Thank you. Any other
14 comments? Hearing none, next speaker please.

15 MS. UNDERWOOD: Thank you, Madam Chair. We'll go into
16 Zoom. Our first speaker will be former Commissioner
17 William Davis. After former Commissioner Davis, we'll go
18 to Ms. Tyler Brown, and Ms. Karen Winston.

19 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHÉ: Thank you.

20 MR. DAVIS: Good afternoon. May I be heard?

21 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHÉ: Yes, you may.

22 MR. DAVIS: Okay. I think it's good that the police
23 are going to assist with personal protection orders
24 because I constantly hear about people having problems,
25 and having problems, and having problems. And those

1 protection orders are not being served. Also, recently, I
2 know in the media they were talking about ShotSpotter and
3 they were saying there was some questionable stuff
4 involved with its approval and it may not be advanced or
5 continued. Do you all have any updates on that? Also, I
6 think there needs to be a greater effort. I think we
7 could possibly help to reduce crime by dis-encouraging
8 more neighbors to know everybody in their neighborhoods,
9 because when I was growing up, if I did something, my
10 parents knew about it before I got home, because it was
11 people calling. You know, we need to make sure our
12 communities are more like communities again. And I
13 strongly encourage people that are active in the
14 community, especially people to go out and look for
15 people to take a more active role in helping people
16 bridge this isolation we have nowadays. And that's all I
17 have for today. Hopefully, you all will have a good day.

18 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCH: Thank you, commissioner.

19 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Madam Chair, I think our
20 corporation council had made a statement to the press
21 about ShotSpotter. I'm sure we can share what happened
22 with the court of appeals, and with the city's position
23 on it.

24 CORPORATION COUNSEL MALLET: Madam Chair, I thank
25 you very much. So first of all, let me very, very clearly

1 see how the community approaches, looking in. The Detroit
2 Police Department went through extraordinary efforts to
3 make sure that the community was aware that the
4 department was looking forward to the use of the
5 ShotSpotter technology. Both the court of appeals and the
6 circuit court ruled that the allegation that they had not
7 profited the community as it relates to technology was
8 far, far, far for the [unclear48:25]. Number two, then
9 either the [unclear0:48:30] of the law department then,
10 died at the [unclear0:48:32] was that because we were
11 introducing technology prior to the introduction of the
12 SeaOS. So it means that going through that process was
13 not required.

14 [Unclear0:48:48], however, was a technical
15 interpretation of the rule. The court of appeals
16 disagreed as they sometimes do with the determination of
17 the law department sent it back to the circuit court for
18 determination as to whether or not a crime had occurred
19 or whether [unclear0:49:08] legal term that time had
20 expired in terms of the exercise of the complaint and the
21 damage that conceivably might have occurred. The bottom
22 line is that the technology process called SeaOS, the
23 department is very, very, very, aware of it, has been
24 attending to it assiduously. And in this particular
25 instance I am sure the community was [unclear0:49:38], to

1 follow the directive of the Chairperson on the Court of
2 Appeals as it relates to the SeaOS earliest demanded
3 process. The case is going back to the trial court, Judge
4 David Allen for determining whether there are damages,
5 but the contract was upheld. Everything associated with
6 the technology was found to be appropriate.

7 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Thank you, corporation
8 counsel. Any questions or comments? Hearing none, thank
9 you, sir. Our next speaker.

10 MS. UNDERWOOD: Ms. Taura Brown.

11 MS. BROWN. Good afternoon, counsel. Initially, or
12 I'm sorry, commissioners. Initially, I wanted to speak
13 about the audio and the video services. They need
14 attention. On Zoom right now, it sounds like everybody's
15 talking underwater and I don't know if you all have
16 replaced somebody, but you need to bring them back. We
17 can barely hear what's being said. And this has been
18 ongoing. That's the first thing. The second thing is Ms.
19 Roberts shouldn't have to come down here and tell the
20 public how her child has been violated by another parent.
21 That should have been attended to immediately. And as a
22 citizen, I don't care if CPS is investigating it, I
23 expected Detroit Police to be all over the fact that
24 children are being sexually assaulted in this city. And
25 when you all talk about how the crime is being reduced;

1 is this the way that the crime is being reduced by simply
2 closing cases and throwing the ball to CPS?

3 Because again, I don't think that Ms. Roberts and
4 her child are going to get the kind of justice from CPS
5 that they would from the Detroit Police Department and
6 the Wayne County Prosecutor's Office. That needs
7 attention. And I'm writing down her name because I'll be
8 following up on that, and I'll be asking about what was
9 the resolution of that again, because that's totally
10 unacceptable. The other thing I wanted to mention is I
11 did miss two of the meetings. I just want to reiterate
12 that the towing presentation that little tow group is
13 trying to get, I still say no, they are not friends of
14 the public. Do not let them come down here and waste the
15 public's time. Yes, they are family businesses, families
16 who have been making money off the backs, supporting
17 white families that have been making money off the backs
18 of poor black people in the City of Detroit by
19 confiscating their cars and using the stickup game to get
20 them back. Yeah, and that's my time. Thank you. And you
21 all have a good evening.

22 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Thank you. Next speaker.

23 MS. UNDERWOOD: Our last speaker will be Ms. Karen
24 Winston.

25 MS. WINSTON: Hello?

1 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Yes.

2 MS. WINSTON: Yes. Thank you for taking my call. I
3 have two issues. I'm a resident of the Bagley
4 neighborhood and I'm wondering if we still have
5 neighborhood police officers, and if so, how do we find
6 out who that person is and how do we make contact with
7 that particular officer? The other issue I have is on
8 three separate occasions; twice last year, I had occasion
9 to go to the 12th Precinct and filed a police report. The
10 officer took my information, he gave me a sheet of paper
11 with a case number, but that was the end of it. I never
12 heard anything else. I was told to go down on the
13 Boulevard and pay \$10 and I could get another report or
14 something. I'm trying to understand what that procedure
15 is, and I don't know why we can't get the proper
16 paperwork mailed out to us. Why do we have to make a
17 second trip to another police station to get any results
18 from it. It should be filed.

19 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you, ma'am. DC HAYES.

20 DC HAYES: Yes, ma'am. Madam Chair, if we can
21 possibly get that caller's information. I will follow up
22 by myself, ensuring that she has an update on her report
23 and I will provide her a copy of that report at no charge
24 via the police department.

25 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you. And she also

1 asked about how to find out about the NPOs.

2 DC HAYES: And with that as well. I will set up an
3 introduction for a meet and greet with not only the NPO,
4 but her precinct commander as well.

5 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHÉ: Thank you.

6 MS. WINSTON: Thank you.

7 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHÉ: Commissioner Woods.

8 COMMISSIONER WOODS: Through the Chair. And I think
9 this adds to the reason why it was so important for us to
10 get these detectives on board, because of course, the
11 citizens really need their responses. And so I appreciate
12 you, DC for following up. Do we have the information for
13 them to be able to get connected?

14 MS. UNDERWOOD: We'll try to get that information.

15 COMMISSIONER WOODS: Alright, thank you.

16 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHÉ: Thank you. Any other
17 questions or comments by the commissioners? Hearing none
18 then. Thank you all for your questions and comments. The
19 next item on the agenda is a presentation to the board by
20 the Detroit Public Safety Foundation. And the Executive
21 Director, Patti Kukula. Hello, Patty.

22 COMMISSIONER WOODS: Chair, before you get started.

23 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHÉ: Yes.

24 COMMISSIONER WOODS: Do you want them to go out there
25 and celebrate right now, and hold them and ---

1 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: It's up to them; what they
2 would like to do [crosstalk].

3 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: But you might want to stick
4 around and hear about the foundation because it does all
5 the stuff that benefits officers, and how they get money.
6 You can help them make some money. They even buy the
7 tickets and stuff like that. COMMISSIONER WOODS: They can
8 go, right?

9 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Thank you.

10 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: The Police Department's
11 Foundation.

12 EXEC. DIRECTOR KUKULA: He worked too hard.

13 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: They should have known what it
14 does. It's their foundation.

15 COMMISSIONER WOODS: They can listen online.

16 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: It's the same thing.

17 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Okay. Ms. Kukula.

18 EXEC. DIRECTOR KUKULA: Thank you so much. I
19 appreciate all of you and congratulations to everyone
20 that was promoted today. Wonderful to see that today.
21 Madam Chair and your honorable body, I really appreciate
22 this opportunity to again, be before you. And I want to
23 thank Ms. Garnier for all of her help in helping me make
24 sure we have this time with you today. So the Public
25 Safety Foundation is the nonprofit for the Detroit

1 Police, Fire and EMS. I'll try and run through to make
2 sure if you have any questions or you can stop me if
3 you'd like. Whatever's best for you. We have been around
4 since 1911. I've actually been here now over 7 years.
5 Before that Kathy Govan was a director, and then there
6 was a short time when Mayor Bing had another person in
7 there.

8 And I'm not sure who that was. It was a man. So
9 really there has only been 3 directors from the
10 foundation. So we have evolved from a police foundation
11 to a public safety foundation where Detroit Fire
12 Department and EMS are also represented with us. We have
13 a very small board, excuse me, a staff. Our board is
14 about 23 people representing the community from
15 everywhere. And we also have a representative all the
16 time from DPD, which is AC Ewing. He never misses a
17 meeting. And from fire, we have Second Deputy Stokes. Our
18 staff. This is it. We have, as you may know, Jeff Lemaux,
19 retired Detroit police officer who operates our gift shop
20 in our DPD museum, and Carter Drewry, who is the head of
21 grants, communications and just about everything else.
22 And then myself and also our bookkeeper, Melinda
23 Williams.

24 And I'm sorry, we don't have a picture of Melinda,
25 but that was Elaine Washington who was with us for 5

1 years. You may remember Elaine, she just retired and
2 Melinda has just started with us as a new bookkeeper. So
3 we only have 3.5 FTEs to run the foundation. The next
4 slide please. Our events. You've heard of our events. I
5 know many of you have come to our events and supported
6 it. Women in Blue, we always have it in May, at MGM
7 Grand. It seems to work out really well because everybody
8 can park in the garage and walk over. We have so many
9 family members that come to represent the officers and
10 firefighters that are being awarded. It is really
11 inspiring. And of course our annual signature event is
12 Above and Beyond. This is the second time we'll have it
13 at the Ford Field, November 13th.

14 And we have great awards ceremonies for outstanding
15 officers and firefighters and EMS folks who have been
16 awarded the Purple Heart or the Medal of Honor. We also
17 have a new award. This is the second year we've been
18 doing this. It's a distinguished service award so that
19 anybody who is a member of the Detroit Police, Detroit
20 Fire can be nominated for distinguished service. And this
21 year we had 66 applications, nominations for DPD alone.
22 And so we are working to sort through all that, to have
23 one winner in that area. We also have two corporate
24 awards or civilian awards that are related to being a
25 community partner. And this year we chose the DAC

1 Foundation where we started a foundation; it's called the
2 Chief's Table. So it does encompass fire and police, and
3 it's with the Detroit Athletic Club Foundation. And
4 they've been very good at supporting us financially.

5 Let's see. Bob Ryan from Harford Hospital this year
6 is going to receive the James B. Nicholson Changemaker
7 Award. So we're really happy to have Bob come out. Now,
8 probably really interesting. What do we really do? The
9 next slide is just a little snippet of the things that we
10 do. We pretty much have a broad mission statement since
11 the officers and leadership of both Fire and DPD have
12 come to us with a lot of programs. All the programs that
13 you hear about that they do, we work with them to help
14 support it with food purchases or games or activities or
15 DJs, things like that. It's really spread out to support
16 many community activities that we can, because that
17 brings that trust level. We know that work in helping
18 reduce crime, you know, has a comfort level with police,
19 especially with the children.

20 We also have a lot of funds that come in for special
21 purchases. Recently, the DAC Foundation and Marathon
22 patrolling funded 40 mountain bikes. They also funded the
23 two new canines for DPD; Atlas and Dequindre. You've
24 probably seen them around a little bit. So it's a great,
25 great thing for the department and for the community. We

1 just go out and about and secure as many donations in
2 kind as well. Amazon will give us pallets of food and
3 drinks and supplies. And I work closely with the United
4 Way Foundation to distribute those in the community. We
5 try to make sure that the officers and some of the
6 meetings have a lot of water and chips and things here to
7 help with their meetings so that they can have a little
8 refreshments, because, you know, seed funds, you can't
9 pay for that, right?

10 And that's kind of why we're here in
11 [unclear0:1:00:54] is where we're flexible. You know, we
12 have a credit card and we can buy things right on the
13 spot and get calls at night for emergencies that we need
14 to help somebody moving into a hotel. The officers, we
15 have a fund through a ceasefire grant that if somebody is
16 in great danger, they're a victim and they need to be
17 relocated through the gang squad and ceasefire, I get my
18 credit card out and get them to a hotel. And so we're
19 able to fund some of those emergencies, and things like
20 that. And we're just so grateful to have that
21 opportunity. I'm going to go into the DFD program just a
22 little bit. So in the projects; so recently we supported
23 the Fire Prevention Week Arson Training. We have an
24 ongoing program with arson training and we also recently
25 funded an EMS special response trailer.

1 And we also had a lot of donations that came in for
2 priority projects like the second DFD Professional
3 Development Conference, which was free. And they had
4 people from all over the State of Michigan, even from
5 Ohio, that came to learn from DFD and we were able to
6 provide the funds to support that. I'm making sure I'm
7 staying within my 10-minutes. The next slide is one of my
8 favorites. Another one; one more. Our mentoring programs.
9 In the last 7 years, I think one of the best things that
10 I've enjoyed is working with the DFD and DPD in
11 particular to develop youth programs. We have grown
12 substantially in that area to help the police develop
13 their brotherhood and sisterhood program. We've had free
14 driver's training for 7 years in 7 Detroit public
15 schools. We've had moving forward, which is funded by the
16 Wayne County Government. But as a product of working with
17 Captain Thirlkill.

18 And at the time, I think it was Sergeant Dunne, with
19 the brother and sister program. Wayne County picked it up
20 as their own separate program. We actually have advisors
21 with Captain Thirlkill. In fact he's with the Moving
22 Forward team now, which is about 30 at-risk youths who
23 have really come in contact with the gang squad or
24 whatever. And they're referred into this program, which
25 is an evening program from about 4 to 9 at night at the

1 Durfee Center. That's been very successful in helping
2 these young folks not become more involved with the
3 police. The 10th Precinct, we have a DOJ grant, which is
4 reducing gun violence. That just started. And that's a
5 really exciting community program with about 4 contracts
6 with different agencies. Boys and Girls Club is one of
7 them.

8 The connection is one of our groups and we're just
9 building that out. That's probably going to be around for
10 another year and a half. DPD Summer Academy. That's a
11 great program. So the kids from the Brotherhood and
12 Sisterhood that want to come into our summer program, we
13 have about 60 of them now. It's been about 4 years since
14 I've done this. We are housed at the Detroit Public
15 Safety Academy, which is, I think, Trumble or Second
16 Street? Second Street, I think. So that program is about
17 a 6-week program. At the end of that program, there are
18 so many parents that come out. I mean, you want to talk
19 about parental responsibility. It's amazing because these
20 kids are there 4 days a week, 6 hours. We feed them, we
21 take them on trips. Officer Gaines and Peabody, they're
22 just amazing with the young people.

23 And then I provide case managers. I have a contract
24 with the United Way Foundation that is specifically
25 working with youths at risk. And so a lot of times my

1 counselor will go in and do a lot of group therapies or
2 individual therapies and it's just really nice to have
3 that portion in with the activities that the Detroit
4 police have developed. We developed the curriculum for
5 it, but the police, of course, have put in their own
6 physical training pieces and their own areas so that
7 hopefully they'll be recruited to become a police
8 officer. So, and I think we had about two of them that
9 have gone on to be police officers. And of course there's
10 also the Explorers program. I'm sure you're very well
11 aware of it. Marathon has been great. They've been
12 spending about 50,000 a year on those kids and their
13 numbers are up at like 111.

14 That's been a fabulous program, because the kids go
15 on all kinds of, I want to say, police mock activities,
16 as well as their regular training and things like that.
17 And I think there have been about 6 kids that I know of
18 that I've met personally who have gone through the
19 academy or else are in the academy. So that's another
20 wonderful tribute to, you know, bringing the kids into
21 the fold of policing in our community. I think I should
22 also mention, yesterday I got \$18,000 from the Huntington
23 Foundation to support the next intramural CVI basketball
24 in sports team. So, I don't know if you knew, but the CVI
25 groups that we have in the city, they decided, they all

1 put in like \$1,000 or something and started intramural
2 basketball. Now think about that, right? That's the kids
3 in the CVI areas on the Eastside, talking to the
4 Westside, through sports, right?

5 Well, sports are conflict resolution a lot of times
6 as we see [unclear01:06:28] of sports. And so to have
7 different groups coming together and really talking about
8 what's going on over here, what's going on over here, how
9 can we help each other. We can now expand it for, I'm not
10 sure how long, but working very closely with Sergeant
11 Bryant who oversees PAL.

12 COMMISSIONER WOODS: Brian George.

13 EXEC. DIRECTOR KUKULA: George. That's right. Brian
14 George. And then he is really detailed on making sure we
15 have everything ticked and tied, so it's professionally
16 done. So we're very excited about having that
17 continuation and expansion. I think with that money, we
18 can do a little bit better than they're doing now. I
19 mentioned the United Way contract I have. I've had that
20 for 5 years and that's grown very well. Wayne County,
21 Moving Forward. I mentioned that. And the City of
22 Detroit, the 10th Precinct. I usually have other
23 contracts with the City of Detroit, like the ceasefire
24 emergency funding. Did I mention I have another one
25 coming up with City Camp. We had a grant years ago from

1 Children's Hospital to go into the middle schools. We
2 were able to secure that grant again through MCOLES. So
3 that's just under the, you know, starting in that
4 respect, the police are in there and we are going to
5 provide prevention coordinators as well as the training
6 for the officers. And that's going to be at Detroit Lions
7 Academy, which is the only alternative school for the
8 City of Detroit and also Fisher Upper or Fisher Middle
9 School, excuse me, because we all know and we want to go
10 back lower to the younger kids. You know, the youth; it
11 just seems like you have to go to 10-and 13-year-olds
12 now, and talk about issues that are going on, and, you
13 know, I don't know if they're learning from their older
14 siblings but I think they need to hear a little bit more
15 about how we can be a guide for them.

16 So our grant funding, aside from that, we were very
17 fortunate at one time we received \$1,000,000 from 5
18 different areas to start the crisis intervention team.
19 You know, the Ballmer Group, Ken Hudson Weber, the Flinn
20 Foundation. And again, there's more need in that area now
21 that there's a lot of data. And so we just received
22 \$400,000 from Hudson Weber. We went back to the Flinn
23 Foundation, and we went back to the Ballmer Group asking
24 for 800,000. So we're working to try and, you know, bring
25 in a lot of groups in collaboration to fund many of the

1 activities through the crisis intervention area. The
2 crisis team with Captain Leonard Gilbert at the head of
3 that. And we started a new program last summer. It's
4 called Project Genesis, and it's at the Detroit Medical
5 Center.

6 It's healthcare careers. We have 5 Detroit schools
7 and right now we've taken 25 kids, 5 from each of the
8 Detroit schools that are on a health career path. And
9 hopefully, also we added to make sure they would go to
10 the DMD for the EMT portion of it. But mostly young
11 people are going through our program in the summer.
12 Gilbert Family Foundation is paid for everything. They
13 get paid \$14 an hour. DMC is providing the things that we
14 need for these young kids, you know, they feed them. I
15 have two former Detroit Public School educators. They
16 were principals or assistant principals that were running
17 the program. And I have a young lady from Income
18 Community College who has a youth ambassador. And those
19 25 kids this year, amazing experiences. Two of the young
20 ladies want to be OBGYN. They saw cesarean sections, the
21 DMC, let them see no show of birth, one young man immune,
22 incredible.

23 And he wanted to work in the emergency room. And
24 they were like, are you sure? They're seniors, you know,
25 they're juniors and seniors, but he wanted to work in the

1 emergency room. And that man saw violence and he helped
2 with the families. He helped transport, he helped hold
3 grandma's hands. He cleaned up some of the blood and he
4 wasn't traumatized. We all said, you know, let's get
5 together and talk about it. He was fine. The young man
6 was ready to go every day. He just knows that young man
7 is going to be a doctor or a nurse or something related
8 to the emergency room, because he adjusted and adapted,
9 and felt so comfortable. So I want to thank the DMC. We
10 hope to expand that program. I was on the phone with
11 Henry Ford Hospital at 2 o'clock today, which made me
12 almost late here to see how we can have some work with
13 them, possibly with the Gilbert Foundation or someone
14 else.

15 I also am with the community Medal of Honor
16 convention that is going to be in Detroit next October,
17 2026, with a fiduciary for that. And the national office
18 has committed to leave money for us to impact youths. And
19 we talked about using that health career program at the
20 VA hospital. We think that would be a nice match because
21 we could also kind of move them back and forth between
22 the VA hospital, which is next door to the main campus
23 for the Detroit Medical Center and go back and forth. So
24 I think, you know, I got a directive from Chief Bettison,
25 was find money and [unclear1:11:41] from Detroit, and in

1 any precinct. And so we've been really looking everywhere
2 and meeting with the schools. Fortunately, we have a MOU
3 with Detroit Public Community School District, so that my
4 caseworkers and everybody, they go through live scan,
5 they get, well, Tamara, you know. They get their approval
6 to go into the schools and work with the kids.

7 And so they're very open to many of our programs. I
8 met with Captain Jackson from the Detroit Public Schools
9 Chief, amazing person, former DPD, 5 years, DPD before he
10 went over [unclear1:12:18] Minster and just an amazing
11 person. And we've been talking a little bit more too
12 about how, you know, maybe some of the things that we're
13 doing with the young people, and in here with the police
14 can work together closer with the schools. So it's just
15 been great and a lot of fun. We love all the folks that
16 come in our office and, you know, I want to thank all of
17 you for your hard work and our all volunteers. But I
18 think the Foundation has been a great asset to just, you
19 know, helping with even morale. Sometimes you just can't
20 understand sometimes when somebody wants to donate food
21 to all the precincts and they'll come to us and we help
22 them organize making sure that those things are recorded
23 and properly thanked and get their letter from us.

24 And so we just love it. And it's a very small staff,
25 but we've really enjoyed it and I think we've grown. We

1 do about \$3 million a year now. Shocking, isn't it?

2 Alright? Thanks.

3 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Well, thank you so much for
4 that presentation. Very informative. Questions.
5 Commissioner Wood, and then Commissioner Smith.

6 COMMISSIONER WOODS: I just wanted to say that the
7 commissioner was calling me, and said hello. He wasn't
8 able to be here today. He texted me, and told me to make
9 sure, he said it was his recommendation to bring you here
10 today and [unclear1:13:49]. So you guys have been doing
11 some remarkable work. Thank you for the time.

12 EXEC. DIRECTOR KUKULA: Thank you.

13 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Commissioner Smith.

14 COMMISSIONER SMITH: Yes. Through the Chair. Thank
15 you Patti, for a wonderful presentation. Me being with
16 Ceasefire, we have been assigned a new demographic in the
17 city that we will be, what is it, judged metric wise. And
18 we have some schools that are in that area that some of
19 the associates need to get in. So how would they go about
20 it. Would they need to come to you, as far as getting
21 screened or is it some type of paperwork that they need?
22 It's been a while since we've done it.

23 EXEC. DIRECTOR KUKULA: The members, like all of you
24 getting your approvals for that.

25 COMMISSIONER SMITH: Yes.

1 EXEC. DIRECTOR KUKULA: You can come to me. I think
2 we can work that out pretty easily.

3 COMMISSIONER SMITH: Okay.

4 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Thank you. Any other
5 commissioner, Bernard.

6 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Thank you, Madam Chair. I just
7 want to personally thank you as a Detroiter, as a native
8 Detroiter for the work that you've done for so many
9 years. I met you when we were with Ed McNamara. Our mayor
10 was chief of staff for Ed McNamara, and you were his
11 right-hand person, all over the place and of course was
12 working with Mayor Young.

13 Commissioner Bell was with Mayor Young, and of
14 course, Mother Bernice. So your history with the
15 department and with the city is absolutely phenomenal.
16 And you are married to a circuit court judge as it is. So
17 both you and your partner in life have given tremendously
18 to this community. But even more importantly than that,
19 Patti was just always Patti, but she has forged
20 relationships with the Titans in this community. Every
21 single one will pick up the phone; if you are Henry Ford,
22 the junior that's over there, and everyone else, we pick
23 up the phone when you call. You are a bad, bad sister. I
24 just want you to know. And all we can do is watch your
25 smoke and here at DPD, we appreciate the \$3 million of

1 you raised this year for DPD. Thank you.

2 EXEC. DIRECTOR KUKULA: [Unclear1:16:19].

3 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Thank you kindly. We
4 appreciate your presentation. EXEC. DIRECTOR KUKULA: You
5 are welcome.

6 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Thank you. We appreciate
7 you.

8 EXEC. DIRECTOR KUKULA: Take care.

9 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Next on the agenda, we're
10 going to go for the report from the board secretary.

11 MS. GARNIER: Through the Chair. Again, under tab 6
12 today, several communications. Please take note
13 specifically for (e), the draft 2026 BOPC weekly
14 calendar. It's that time of year to review. The staff
15 would appreciate the quick response on topics and item
16 matters should be listed on that calendar before it comes
17 for action next month. The announcements for today are:
18 next Thursday and there is a typo. It should be Thursday,
19 October 23rd. We apologize at 3:00 PM here at Public
20 Safety Headquarters. The next meeting is next Thursday,
21 November 13th, 6:30 PM, at the 2nd Precinct at Adams
22 Batzel Recreation Center, 10500 London Street in Detroit.
23 Committee meetings upcoming for the remainder of this
24 month will be next Tuesday, October 21st at 5:00 PM here
25 at Public Safety Headquarters. And those are the

1 announcements and report for today. Madam Chair.

2 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHÉ: Thank you, Madam Secretary.

3 Just one second. There is a resolution that scheduling
4 the Scott dedication of the BOPC Conference Center,
5 Conference room.

6 MS. GARNIER: [Unclear1:18:15] start the last
7 communication from you out to Scott's, if any family to
8 receive hopefully at the end of tomorrow, a couple of
9 dates as you have requested, [unclear1:18:41] share with
10 you. And to see the availability, hopefully at that time
11 can fall before the end of this calendar year for that
12 celebration. Also, next week the [unclear1:18:58] 2025
13 with calendar, the meeting to be held on Thursday,
14 November [unclear1:19:12], October 30th. The motion to
15 cancel that meeting [unclear1:19:16].

16 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHÉ: Correct. Thank you so much.
17 So that October 23rd is not going to work for Mr. Scott
18 [unclear1:19:25] even pretty much that we do it on
19 October 23rd at 3 o'clock. The family was
20 [unclear1:19:37]. So I thought to have this without the
21 [unclear1:19:42], Scott. So we schedule and give a couple
22 dates as the secretary mentioned. Any questions, or
23 comments? Go ahead, commissioner.

24 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Conrad Mallett was talking
25 about the people who were not an integral part of the

1 building, of the relationship that the City of Detroit
2 has with the County and now the success of the city.

3 MALE SPEAKER [Unclear1:20:12]: Thank you, Madam
4 Chair.

5 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCH: Thank you. Okay,
6 commissioner. Commissioner Burton.

7 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Thank you, Madam Chairperson.
8 Over the years, you know, Commissioner Bell, as well as
9 Commissioner Lisa Carter have always advocated for us to
10 be able to go into the schools and have a meeting there
11 once a year, if not twice a year. I'd love it, if looking
12 at the new calendar, if we can possibly continue that. I
13 do like to see Luther King High School added to that if
14 possible. I know Commissioner Bell love East English
15 Village, East [unclear1:20:58] School, which always
16 welcome the board every year. And you know, it would be
17 great if we can continue with that going forward, you
18 know, having some type of visibility at the schools by
19 this body. Those young men and young women, a lot of them
20 are trying to decide what college they want to go into,
21 what career paths. I'm just really overwhelmed by a lot
22 of the success that our young children are having in the
23 school system, but more importantly, how a lot of them
24 are looking for careers in law enforcement, and things of
25 that nature. So, I think that's definitely a good look.

1 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Commissioner Burton, I think
2 that's an excellent idea. And I do recall when we had a
3 couple of sessions or meetings in the schools and we were
4 very well received by, not only the school personnel, but
5 the students who stayed after school to be a part of our
6 meetings. So I think that's an excellent idea. I think we
7 should look into that. And I would ask Madam Secretary to
8 explore that, please.

9 MS. GARNIER: Definitely.

10 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Thank you. Thank you kindly.
11 Any other comments or questions? Okay, hearing none. Is
12 there any unfinished business to come before the board?
13 Is there any new business? Well, actually we have a
14 closed session today under new business. Pursuant to
15 Section 8(a) of the Open Meetings Act, MCL 15.268(a). The

25 MS. GARNIER: 5 yay votes, 2 no.

1 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: So we have two-thirds. Thank
2 you. Now all those in favor indicate by saying aye.

3 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

4 DR. JACKSON: Madam Chair. Motion adopted.

5 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Motion carries. Okay, thank
6 you. Motion carries. We're in Closed Session. Recess for
7 3-minutes.

8 there any discussion? All those in favor, indicated by
9 saying Aye.

10 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

11 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHÉ: Opposed? The motion carries.
12 Is there a motion to adjourn?

13 COMMISSIONER WOODS: So move.

14 COMMISSIONER SMITH: Second.

15 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHÉ: It's been moved by
16 Commissioner Woods, seconded by Commissioner Smith to
17 adjourn. Any discussion? All those in favor, indicate by
18 saying Aye.

19 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

20 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHÉ: Opposed? Motion carries.
