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CITY OF DETROIT
BOARD OF POLICE COMMISSIONERS MEETING
October 23,2025 at 3:00 P.M.

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3 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHÉ: I am going to be starting
4 the Board of Commissioners Meeting for October 23rd,
5 2025. So we're going to start, first by Keisha from
6 Chaplain Soka Taylor. She's here.

7 CHAPLAIN TAYLOR: Let us bow our heads. Gracious and
8 almighty God, we come before you this afternoon with our
9 hearts, and acknowledge you as the source of all wisdom,
10 justice and peace. We thank you, Father, for the
11 opportunity today to gather in this space to discuss
12 matters, Father, that impact the lives of the people and
13 the future of this great city, Detroit. Father, we ask in
14 the name of Jesus for your presence to fill this room.
15 Let your peace set the climate, let your spirit guide the
16 dialogue and let [unclear00:49] every person that is
17 here; the commissioners and officers, and even the guests
18 that are here in this room. Father, we thank you that
19 [unclear00:56] integrity, fairness, and even compassion.
20 Father, bless us right now in the name of Jesus and our
21 Savior, as we continue to hear and to flourish in Jesus'
22 name, and respect our belief and [unclear01:08], amen.

23 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHÉ: Thank you, Chaplain. Next we
24 will go to public communications, and please remember
25 there's a two-minute for your comments. Inappropriate

1 language and comments may delay the TV broadcast and
2 video posts. Could we get the first speaker?

3 MS. UNDERWOOD: Thank you, Madam Chair.

4 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHE: Thank you.

5 MS. UNDERWOOD: Our first speaker will be Ms.
6 [unclear01:35] Gadsden. And if you can all come back to
7 the mic. Please state your name for the record.

8 MS. GADSDEN: My name is [unclear01:51] Gadsden. I
9 didn't want to start until my two-minutes starts or
10 whatever.

11 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHE: Go ahead.

12 MS. GADSDEN: Okay. I'm being stalked by the Detroit
13 Police. I am [unclear01:59] constantly under
14 surveillance. Prep 24/7 for over three years until I
15 filed a stalking report at the 3rd Precinct around
16 [unclear02:13]. That's when I realized that it's the
17 police stalking me. I[unclear02:17] followed
18 [unclear02L18] photographed, video recording, personal
19 phone calls, [unclear02:23] to my laptop and
20 [unclear02:31] to my computer sometimes, and have even
21 [unclear02:40] documents. [Unclear02:41] suspected
22 [unclear02:43]. It's just not true. I have no knowledge
23 of [unclear02:52] activities. I'm a God-fearing citizen.
24 [unclear03:00], therefore, I'm still out there. Police
25 brutality. On July 21st arriving [unclear03:06], I was

1 treated in the ER at General Third Hospital to
2 [unclear03:10]. I learned I have [unclear03:15] arthritis
3 of the spine. I was [unclear03:17] a CT scan technician
4 and undercover detective, a [unclear03:23].
5 [unclear03:29] of course no, possibly aggressively to
6 eclipse. He kept calling [unclear03:36] medical
7 professional and [unclear03:41] had his hair on me, a law
8 enforcement officer, and [unclear03:47]. She is mean
9 [unclear03:47]. I'm one of his brutality and I'm tired of
10 being harassed by the police. I haven't committed any
11 crimes. That's all I have to say.

12 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you, ma'am. Excuse me.
13 Have you spoken with the chief investigator? Chief, do
14 you have someone ---?

15 CI WARFIELD: Ma'am, we have Supervising Investigator
16 LiSonya Sloan here, and she certainly is willing to go
17 outside and speak with you to take your complaint and we
18 can follow up on your complaint.

19 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you.

20 MS. UNDERWOOD: Madam Chair, our next speaker will be
21 Mike's McCain and after him, Mr. Eric Blount.

22 MR. KELLY: How are you all doing today? Hello, my
23 name is Boswan Kelly IV. I'm from Metro Detroit. I'm 25
24 years old. I have my bachelor degree in criminal justice.
25 I also have my master degree. I'm here today to listen in

1 and on a meeting. I'm from Metro Detroit. I went to
2 school in three states, Youngstown State University,
3 Upper Iowa University, Prairie View, A&M University, HBCU
4 in Texas. I've lived in the south, I've lived on the
5 east. I'm [unclear05:15] and I'm excited to be; I'm happy
6 and full of energy. I'm soaking in the moment. I played
7 in the UFL with the Memphis Showboats. I've played
8 professional football in Brazil with Team Gallo. Coach
9 Johnny Mitchell was my coach. First round draft pick in
10 the NFL 1992 to New York Jets. This was my mentor and my
11 leader, my guidance while I was out of the country for
12 five months playing professional football.

13 Him being a first-round draft pick in 1999 to speak
14 to the caliber and the profession, the expertise of a
15 person you have to be, to be a first-round pick draft in
16 the NFL. So that's who I spent five months with before I
17 came back to the USA. That's my first professional
18 football opportunity of the United States of America. And
19 you know, this is my first time being back home, so I'm
20 trying to suck up, be a sponge, you know, be present,
21 live in the moment and put myself in doors and show up,
22 you know, show up. Both my parents are school teachers.
23 My mom just retired from Green Acres Elementary. She's
24 taught that for 30 years. My dad also does driver's
25 education. He gives kids their license. He's in the car

1 with them doing the classes. He comes home, does zoom
2 meetings online.

3 So there's a passion for cars, automobiles, working
4 out. He played football as well at Central Michigan
5 University as a dean. I'm [unclear06:29] to see you. I'm
6 happy to be here. This is Detroit. And we know it across
7 the globe, so I'm happy to be here. Thank you.

8 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Thank you. Commissioner.
9 [Crosstalk].

10 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Go ahead, you go first.

11 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Commissioner Banks.

12 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Thank you. I just wanted to say
13 to the young man, that was a great accomplishment being
14 drafted in the first round in the NFL by the New York
15 Jets. Who [unclear07:02] at that time?

16 MR. KELLY: 1992. I can't say off the top of my head,
17 but Johnny Mitchell came from Nebraska, flew in from
18 Nebraska. So that's who I was underneath in Brazil.

19 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Okay.

20 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Commissioner Bernard.

21 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I want to first of all
22 congratulate you on your success academically and
23 otherwise. And I mean, you are the perfect example of
24 everything that our Chief Hayes would --- he's the same
25 kind of guy you are. He's sitting right there --- that he

1 would love to have on the Detroit Police Department.
2 You're educated, you are compassionate; you care about
3 your community, you love Detroit, and we'd love to see
4 you talk to the --- if you have time when this is over,
5 Chief Hayes, maybe we can chat with him a little bit.
6 Because he doesn't have to be, you know, a patrol
7 officer. He can be anything with his credentials.

8 AC HAYES: It would be my pleasure.

9 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Thank you so much.

10 MR. KELLY: Thank you so much.

11 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Push him out there, so these
12 kids on the streets [unclear08:00] stuff, but, you know,
13 we have guns, but we'll get the message that that's
14 really not necessary. He can communicate with them
15 probably better than I can, or you can.

16 MR. KELLY: That's exactly what I would love to do.
17 Come from an educated background. My parents were married
18 my whole life and the expectation and the standards in
19 the house been so high since I was a kid, showing up the
20 time, turning to work in and some questions, and you
21 don't know what to do. I remember being a kid and my mom
22 was reading extra books to me in the evening before I
23 went to bed, you know, I get a little bit time outside.
24 We come in, we sit at the table as a family, eat dinner.
25 We come back in, then it's time to do some homework

1 again; go to sleep; do it again the next day. So it's
2 been very structured the way I've grown up and I've been
3 thankful enough to be able to see, you know, my friends,
4 they might have come from the same type of background. So
5 I've been fortunate enough to just come from the
6 background I do. I remember being in 2018 telling my mom,
7 [unclear08:50].

8 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you so much.

9 MR. KELLY: I appreciate it.

10 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay. Thank you.

11 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Through the Chair. And you have
12 a criminal justice degree, which will fit [unclear09:08]
13 into law enforcement.

14 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you, commissioner.
15 Next speaker, please.

16 MINISTER BLOUNT: Good afternoon, board. I'm Minister
17 Eric Blount from Sacred Heart Catholic Church right here
18 in Detroit. In case any young black person, especially
19 male, didn't need to know, but forgot, they are hunted in
20 this city for very little things that they do wrong. Just
21 this month, in fact, the last couple of weeks, the
22 nightclub incident from a hundred feet away, I guess the
23 officers knew that they were in the clear; a cop was
24 intoxicated and therefore he needed to be investigated to
25 the [unclear10:00] degree.

1 And yes, he [unclear10:03]. We found and believe
2 that if they want you, whether you are [unclear10:13] or
3 not, they're going to get you. So [unclear10:17], and
4 that's where a lot of [unclear10:23] false narrative
5 begins. So he's got a gun and then he's pointing it at
6 him and he soars unto the roof of a building.
7 [Unclear10:36], we guess; we surmised, but the body worn
8 camera footage that was released to the public was not
9 showing any of that. The thing that was shown, it was
10 clear. His hands were there. So if that gun on the
11 building was there for two years, we don't know. They say
12 it's his, but yet they didn't even say he had his
13 fingerprints on it.

14 And so another incident at McDonald's, or your
15 license [unclear11:15] isn't quite right. You investigate
16 it to the [unclear11:19] degree. So pick your
17 [unclear11:23] 50/50 chance of getting from the police,
18 and sometimes that's all they want to do. Thank you.

19 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you.

20 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Madam Chair.

21 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Yes, commissioner.

22 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Minister Blount alluded to the
23 video, and I don't want to put words in your mouth,
24 minister, the video being edited. Can you speak to that
25 assistant chief?

1 AC HAYES: Through the Chair. We released the video
2 within the 30 days as the chief has committed to do. So
3 I'm not sure what part of it. It is somewhat of a
4 production as it relates to the DPD ranking member
5 narrating the video. So I'm not sure at which point has
6 arisen the concern of Minister Blount. But again, it has
7 been shared with the public, the incident that occurred
8 that night.

9 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Because personally, through the
10 Chair, I didn't see Officer A thoroughly from start to
11 finish. There was a lot of back and forth between Tony,
12 I'm sorry, Commander O'Rourke going back and forth. So it
13 appeared to be even, you know, in my speculation, it was
14 edited.

15 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: It was edited.

16 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Okay. So I was just curious
17 about that. Thank you, Madam Chair.

18 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Okay. Commissioner Bernard.

19 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I have similar concerns. Under
20 the law, when the young man was retreating [unclear12:52]
21 from a stop, he indicated that for [unclear12:58]
22 alcohol, so he is running away. [Unclear13:00] retreat.
23 You are not usually --- why would you pursue him? He's
24 running; he is not a threat to you or to anyone else at
25 that point. So, then we hunt him down, he gets rid of the

1 weapon, you said, and throw it on top of a roof, and he's
2 still hunted, which makes no sense, does it?

3 AC HAYES: Through the Chair, what was shared in the
4 video was that while pursuing and while giving the orders
5 ---

6 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: While pursuing the what, I'm
7 sorry?

8 AC HAYES: While the orders to stop while they were
9 pursuing the individual that was shot, he dropped a
10 firearm. And then at that point, he then ran back to arm
11 himself with the firearm that was on the ground, which
12 precipitated the actions by the officers that were there.
13 Not getting into much further details. This is still
14 under review but just on what you spoke of as related to
15 the video that was there, I wouldn't be able to share
16 much more with you certainly as an attorney, you
17 understand through the rest of the process. But that was
18 the event that was narrated in that video.

19 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: If I may, ma'am.

20 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Sure.

21 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: The other thing, I know that
22 now we have production, every video that we have is a
23 production. There's a preamble that's printed out from
24 the department and so forth. And then of course, the
25 actual video, as you pointed out, commissioner, was

1 actually edited down to maybe a minute or two in terms of
2 action. Most of it is the department talking. The video
3 itself is totally circumscribed. So I don't understand,
4 because other cities aren't doing that, as, you know,;
5 not in Memphis. Remember where the guy got shot by a six
6 foot --- the guy that was shot in the belly got shot six
7 times. No one else is doing that. No one else is creating
8 a production for purposes of the community versus just
9 the straight-out facts.

10 AC HAYES: In the spirit of transparency, it is
11 extremely important that we provide context to what we
12 put out and what we narrate. Because oftentimes when it
13 is put in the media, there is context, and oftentimes
14 there's not an account for the other side of the story.
15 So in being transparent and being forthcoming, this is
16 the version of what happened or the accounts that
17 happened within, again, that context that we provide the
18 community so they understand that opportunity to educate
19 and, and again, narrate what it is. Because a video alone
20 could be very damning again, without that understanding
21 or at least that attempt to communicate with the
22 audience.

23 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Madam Chair, I have a ---

24 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Go ahead, commissioner.

25 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I'm just going to say the eye

1 in the sky does not lie. I can see, I know what I see
2 here. I really don't need it interpreted quite frankly.

3 COMMISSIONER MOORE: And through the Chair, I just
4 think it's a difference between transparency and a guided
5 tour. I'll just leave it there. Thank you, Madam Chair.

6 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Commissioner Banks.

7 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Thank you. Through the Chair.
8 [Unclear16:20], he has a weapon, but his back is turned
9 and they shoot at [unclear16:40]. What's the protocol
10 that, I mean, [unclear16:44], his back is turned. He's no
11 threat. Kind of back off now a little bit. What's the
12 procedure and the protocol in that?

13 AC HAYES: [Unclear16:57], where I can share our use
14 of force continuum, our fatal force policy with this
15 body. I can provide it so that it can speak clearly.
16 There are a lot of circumstances with that, but this is
17 our guiding policy as to when we can engage in fatal
18 force. So I'll make sure you have a copy.

19 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Thank you.

20 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Any other comments,
21 commissioners? Thank you. Thank you, Minister Blount. Go
22 ahead.

23 MINISTER BLOUNT: I would just suggest that you issue
24 force, especially a shooting. You issue it jointly with
25 the Board of Police Commissioners. Hold somebody else

1 responsible than just yourselves. And that's when we get
2 the guided tour, or we suspect. Thank you.

3 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you. We've been joined
4 by Commissioner Smith. And now that we have a quorum, we
5 will go to the agenda. Could we please have the roll
6 call, secretary.

7 MS. GARNIER: Chairperson Dewaelsche - Present.

8 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Bernard - Present,
9 District 2.

10 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Banks - Present, District
11 3.

12 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Bell is excused.

13 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Burton is excused.

14 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Jones - Present.

15 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Moore - Present.

16 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Smith - Present.

17 MS. GARNIER: Six present, Madam Chair.

18 MS. GARNIER: Thank you. At this time, I'd like to
19 ask for approval of the October 23rd agenda.

20 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: So moved.

21 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Support.

22 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: It's been moved by
23 Commissioner Bernard, seconded by, was it Commissioner
24 Moore?

25 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Yes, ma'am.

1 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: By Commissioner Moore.

2 Questions, discussion? Hearing none, those in favor,
3 indicate by saying, aye.

4 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

5 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: The motion carries. And then
6 if I could get the approval of the minutes for October
7 16th, 2025.

8 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: So moved.

9 COMMISSIONER [Unclear16:57]. Support.

10 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: It's been moved by
11 Commissioner Bernard, supported by Commissioner
12 [unclear19:02] Any discussion? Hearing none, indicate by
13 saying, aye.

14 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

15 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Opposed? The motion carries.
16 Now, could we have the secretary introduce the staff of
17 the BOPC, Chief of Police and Elected Officials and
18 Community Leaders?

19 MS. GARNIER: Madam Chair, through the Chair. This
20 afternoon, registered as of this time, the BOPC Staff;
21 proud to announce our [unclear19:33] to the
22 administrative Bureau of BOPC Staff, [unclear19:35,
23 Teresa Blossom. Drew Fries, Candace Hayes, Artemisia
24 Joshua Felecia Tyson, Jonya Underwood, Chief Investigator
25 Jerome Warfield, Supervising Investigator LiSonya Sloan.,

1 DPD HR Director Katrina Patillo, who is present on Zoom.
2 Assistant Franklin Hayes is sitting in for the Chief of
3 Police. Interpreters are Jolene Taylor and Stephanie
4 Beatty. Court reporter is Don Handyside, Enrique Jackson,
5 Audio Visual, Charles Henry, Media Services. Elected
6 Officials or Representatives. Nicole Fisher, 4th Precinct
7 Community Relations, [Unclear20:24], Community Activist,
8 of the 2nd Precinct, LaDon Davis, Office of Council
9 Member Fred Durhal III.

10 I'm sorry, I do not see Mr. Young. And Mr. Thomas.
11 Marie Overall, of State Representative Tyrone Carter's
12 Office. And finally, former Detroit Police Commissioner
13 William Davis. Those are the only individuals I have
14 listed at this time, Madam Chair.

15 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you, Madam Secretary.
16 Under the Officer's report, is a resolution. I've asked
17 Commissioner Jones to read that, please.

18 COMMISSIONER JONES: Thank you, Madam Chair. Can you
19 hear me?

20 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Yes.

21 COMMISSIONER JONES: This is a memorial resolution
22 honoring retired Police Officer Darren Stallworth.

23 WHEREAS retired Police officer, Darren Stallworth,
24 was appointed to the Detroit Metropolitan Police Academy
25 on November 20th, 1995. Upon graduation, he was assigned

1 to the Patrol Officer Section with the 9th Precinct on
2 May 2nd, 1996; and.

3 WHEREAS Officer Stallworth found a home in the 9th
4 Precinct as he served and patrolled its communities and
5 neighborhoods continuously during his career, where a
6 reorganization assigned him to the Eastern District from
7 September 14th, 2005 to January 6th, 2014, he remained a
8 cornerstone for the thousands of residents, youth,
9 business owners, and others that he had encountered since
10 his first day on patrol.

11 After his official reassignment to the 9th Precinct
12 on January 6th, 2014, Officer Stallworth continued to
13 patrol and protect the beloved Eastside until his
14 retirement on November 24th, 2015; and.

15 WHEREAS during active service, he was the deserving
16 recipient of numerous honors. His acknowledgements
17 include the 2005 Major League Baseball All-Star Game
18 Award, the Rosa Parks Funeral Award, and the 2006 NFL
19 Super Bowl XL Award, as well as numerous accommodations
20 from supervisors and letters of appreciation from the
21 citizenry. During his 20 years with the Detroit Police
22 Department and long after his retirement, he remained
23 widely respected in the community and in law enforcement
24 as the consummate professional; and.

25 WHEREAS retired Police Officer, Darren Stallworth,

1 was a tremendous resource and mentor to many across metro
2 Detroit. Sadly, he passed away on October the 10th, 2025
3 at 57 years old, leaving his family, friends and his
4 former colleagues at the police department and throughout
5 the public safety and law enforcement to mourn the loss
6 of a remarkable and dedicated public servant.

7 THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED.

8 That the police, I'm sorry, the Board of Police
9 Commissioners recognizes retired Police Officer Darren
10 Stallworth posthumously in honor of his years of
11 dedicated service to the 9th Precinct, the Police
12 Department, and the City of Detroit. The board joins with
13 the community in mourning his passing and extends sincere
14 condolences to his family and friends.

15 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you, Commissioner. Is
16 there a motion to approve?

17 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: So moved.

18 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Support.

19 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: It's been moved by the
20 Commissioner, sorry. Yes, Bernard, second by Commissioner
21 Moore. Is there any discussion? Hearing none, please
22 indicate by saying, aye.

23 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

24 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Opposed? The motion carries.
25 Are there any --- Secretary --- of the family?

1 MS. GARNIER: Madam Chair, I believe the visitation
2 is ongoing at this time and the services are tomorrow and
3 the resolution has been passed to those officers who will
4 present it.

5 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Thank you. Thank you all.
6 [Unclear24:47] just for the record that Commissioner
7 Carter has joined us. And next on the agenda is the Chief
8 of Police report. AC Hayes, please.

9 AC HAYES: Good afternoon, Madam Chair and this
10 honorable body, as well as those that are in attendance,
11 both in person and virtually. We want to share our crime
12 data as it continues to go down in record numbers here in
13 the City of Detroit. Our homicides continue to decrease
14 with 134 year-to-date that have occurred this year,
15 compared to 170 that occurred last year for a 21%
16 reduction. Our non-fatal shootings. This year we've had
17 387 compared to last year, where we had 508, a 24%
18 reduction. Our robberies. This year we've had 783
19 compared to last year-to-date, 947, a forty 17%
20 increase. And carjackings. This time last year, we had
21 100. This year-to-date, we are at 70 for a 30% reduction.
22 So we continue to drive these numbers down in making a
23 commitment to making a safer Detroit.

24 A couple events that are going on that we just
25 wanted to share with this honorable body and the

1 community are going on today at the 3rd Precinct, cycling
2 with the community is happening at 6:00 PM, located at
3 2875 West Grand Boulevard, whether it be a community bike
4 ride in the 3rd Precinct. And those that attend are
5 encouraged to wear Halloween costumes for this ride, in
6 the spirit of Halloween. On Friday, the Domestic Violence
7 Unit and the Victim's Assistance Program will be hosting
8 a domestic violence awareness event at Memorial. The
9 [unclear26:53], the weekend here, at 9:30, Saturday,
10 every Detroit Police Department precinct will be hosting
11 a drop off Saturday from 10:00 AM to 2:00 PM where
12 community members will be able to dispose of unused
13 medication safely by dropping them at any DPD precinct.
14 Our Citizens Radio Patrol will also be hosting their
15 quarterly meeting this Saturday on October 25th at 10:00
16 AM here at Detroit Public Safety Headquarters in this
17 very room.

18 And we're invited to discuss the radio patrol
19 updates, events with the program and information of
20 things that are going on for the rest of 2025. And
21 lastly, at the 9th Precinct. On Wednesday, October 29th,
22 there will be community and cops game night. Those that
23 are interested, there will be various board games, card
24 games whatever it may be. The officers who have their
25 families as well, we would just like to have a friendly

1 game night with the community. And that's at the 9th
2 Precinct at 1118 7 Gratiot. And if you can, those that
3 would like to come, please, RSVP by calling their NPO the
4 9th Precinct at 313 596 5900 for again, RSVP and join DPD
5 for game night. And lastly, citywide Initiative Halloween
6 in the D will be taking place Friday, October 31st, where
7 every DPD precinct will be hosting a trunk or treat for
8 members of the community to come out and enjoy a safe
9 Halloween.

10 And a full list of locations and times is available
11 on the department's social media page. Madam Chair, that
12 is [unclear28:45] brevity, but that is this week's chief
13 report.

14 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Thank you, Assistant Chief.
15 Any questions? Commissioner Moore.

16 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Through the Chair. Chief, today,
17 I guess it was today or yesterday, a Michigan Bridge
18 Detroit had an article that said that the City of Detroit
19 is only solving 4 out of 10 violent crimes. Can you speak
20 to that? Is that true? Between 2019 and 2024? I believe
21 they gave as the years.

22 AC HAYES: Through the Chair. I am unfamiliar with
23 that article. I know that for our homicide, closure
24 alone, we trend in some of the highest levels as it
25 relates to major cities in comparison for those closure

1 rates. So I can get with our detective bureau and provide
2 actual closure rules to this body.

3 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Okay. And also, just a quick
4 question. What is a gang? GANG.

5 AC HAYES: Through the Chair. As in the definition;
6 as in the actual definition?

7 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Your definition, the
8 department's definition, FBI definition. What does the
9 department consider to be a gang?

10 AC HAYES: If you can give me context to this
11 question, I can ---

12 COMMISSIONER MOORE: [Unclear30:01] What would you
13 consider a gang to be.

14 AC HAYES: If you are speaking to a Gang Intelligence
15 Unit? I cannot speak to their mission. I'm pulling up
16 with [unclear30:16].

17 COMMISSIONER MOORE: I understand. I wanted to talk
18 to you a couple minutes before, because I don't want to
19 have a "got you" moment. But you came in, and when you
20 came in and so --

21 AC HAYES: If I may, I would like to be addressing or
22 speaking to the standard operation or procedures or the
23 SOP of the Detroit Police Department Gang Intelligence
24 Unit, as well as their database or what it is and how
25 they collect and gather information. I've also provided

1 that to the board secretary for each member of this body.
2 The federal definition of a gang, and this is under
3 definitions. Section one the federal definition of a gang
4 is used by the Department of Justice. And the Department
5 of Homeland Security is association of three or more
6 individuals whose members collectively identified
7 themselves by adopting a group identity, which they used
8 to create an atmosphere of fear or intimidation
9 frequently by employing one [unclear31:29] father, a
10 common name slogan, identifying sign, symbol, tattoo, or
11 other physical marking, style, colors, clothing,
12 hairstyle, hand sign, graffiti, whose purpose is to
13 engage in criminal activity, to use as violence or
14 intimidation to further its criminal objectives; whose
15 members engaged in criminal activity or acts of juvenile
16 delinquency that if committed by an adult, would be
17 crimes with the intent to enhance or presume the
18 association's power, reputation, or economic resources.

19 The association may also possess some of the
20 following characteristics. The member may [unclear32:15],
21 join, and operate in association. The members may meet on
22 a recurring basis. The association may provide physical
23 protection of its members from others. The association
24 may seek to exercise control of the particular geographic
25 vocational region, simply defer perceived interests

1 against rivals. And the association may have an
2 identifiable structure.

3 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Do we still have a gang problem?
4 I know a couple months ago that we were saying the City
5 of Detroit had a gang problem. Do we still have a gang
6 problem?

7 AC HAYES: We've done a great job addressing gang
8 violence, but there are still groups and gangs throughout
9 the city. Not that at the level that we've seen in other
10 cities where there are large organized groups. We are
11 seeing more very microstructures where maybe 10 or 12 may
12 have a certain area or a certain block of which they have
13 marked them as their territory. So not at the large
14 organized scale, but yes, we do have those issues that
15 through our CVI partnership and others and our gang
16 intelligence unit, we are continuing to address.

17 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Okay. And the next statement or
18 question, I do have the gang intelligence that you
19 provided, the policy that you provided to the board, and
20 what I was seeing with the video that we discussed
21 earlier, as well as the shooting that happened at the
22 McDonald's, nothing in here reflects the actual militia,
23 I'm sorry, what we saw or heard about the last couple
24 shooters with the Gang Intelligence Unit doesn't reflect
25 what the mission is for them in here. So that just

1 brought concern to me because it's talking about working
2 with the FBI you know, shipping information to the
3 prosecutor's office, what have you. But what they're
4 actually doing is like a glorified 30 series. And for the
5 record, the citizens 30 series operate other precincts
6 plain clothes.

7 And I don't see them doing chop shops. I don't see
8 them doing human trafficking. I don't see them doing
9 narcotic related nexus to gangs. So that's just my
10 comment. Also, some citizens have compared those
11 incidents to the 1970s with stress. And you know, I'm
12 just looking forward to the preliminary information that
13 you provided to be finalized so we can know exactly what
14 went on. So thank you assistant chief.

15 AC HAYES: We look forward to providing, sorry,
16 through the Chair. We look forward to providing you with
17 that information. And when we talk about how our Gang
18 Intelligence Unit is deployed. They're in areas that
19 these groups as mentioned in the characteristics or the
20 definition should I say, where they frequent. And within
21 those areas, not only is it the enterprise that these
22 groups and gangs may operate, but in the sense of, trying
23 not to use the street vernacular, but I will say as the
24 ops, or the beef, the retaliation may be brought on that
25 very same area, someone may take over.

1 So within that geographical footprint, we have
2 directed patrols of our Gang Intelligence Unit. If this
3 is the area where you will monitor as the data dictates
4 we are seeing violence incidents. And from that there may
5 be interactions or constitutionally able to engage others
6 as traffic violations or whatever that may be. As we
7 know, guns don't have legs, they don't have feet, they
8 don't drive, and vehicles are often the mode to get guns
9 from one side of the city to the other or from wherever
10 they may be into the city. So it's a robust program. We
11 look forward again, to having that conversation and
12 speaking to their function, their mission, and also the
13 direct impact that they've had as a unit and driving
14 those numbers down that I shared with you earlier during
15 the chief's presentations.

16 COMMISSIONER MOORE: So just finally, one thing,
17 Madam Chair. So I guess where my confusion comes in, and
18 maybe you can clarify it. If it's a Gang Intelligence
19 Unit, would they be into the collecting of the data? And
20 you're saying they're deployed to certain areas, but
21 they're more so like a 30 series. It's not like gang
22 intelligence according to the way it's outlined in here.

23 AC HAYES: Through the Chair. And not to take up this
24 meeting or this agenda. There is a street or an
25 enforcement component of that. We have all that

1 information, right? And when they have that intelligence,
2 they act on it. So that may go up to and including
3 executing a search warrant. They collaborate with the
4 federal partners often, as well as other precincts. This
5 is a citywide entity so they can come in and partner with
6 the special operations or the ceasefire units from other
7 precincts or throughout the city.

8 So again, I would love to talk more in depth,
9 perhaps it's time that we bring in gang intelligence for
10 a presentation to this body. But again, in the full
11 spirit of transparency, whatever is [unclear37:12] and
12 desire as it relates to sharing as much as possible in
13 the inner workings of this entity, we're committed to
14 doing just that.

15 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Thank you.

16 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Thank you. I'd like
17 [unclear37:24] to give a presentation. If we could
18 [unclear37:27], secretary. Commissioner Bernard.

19 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Thank you. I want to thank
20 you, Madam Chair, and also, you, chief for volunteering
21 to make the presentation on "Gang issues," regarding gang
22 intelligence, excuse me, in Detroit. My question to you
23 though is since you seem to have seen sort of what you
24 would call an uptick with respect to gun issues and young
25 people. Do you have a unit in the department that goes to

1 --- we don't have that many students anymore in Detroit
2 Public High Schools?

3 I think less than 50,000. So we don't have the real
4 schools like we used to have when [unclear38:11] was big
5 and before it was big and Northwestern High School. I
6 think it's closed altogether. But in any event, during
7 [unclear38:18] that goes to the schools, I would think
8 even a semester of younger officers or whatever that can
9 speak to young people about this issue. It is, to me,
10 very important. But before [unclear38:37], sir, I want to
11 congratulate the department for yesterday for what you
12 did for former congresswoman Carolyn Cheeks Kilpatrick.
13 It was an outstanding display of enforcement activity
14 there and for us to learn collectively. The mayor spoke
15 for almost 45 minutes. It was great. We [unclear39:05]
16 that she was the first Congress person in history, and no
17 one has done it since, that brought \$2.5 billion into the
18 City of Detroit.

19 Because she insisted on being on the appropriations
20 committee. She was a bad sister. And yesterday, former
21 leader and our former mayor, Kwame Kilpatrick, did an
22 outstanding job eulogizing his mother, referring to
23 himself as Peter, the flamed disciple. And of course,
24 Paul was the most magnificent disciple of all in the
25 Bible. But anyway, I just want to let you know that the

1 department did a great job yesterday on that. But back to
2 the point on gangs.

3 AC HAYES: So to this honorable body, I would like to
4 introduce our new head of those initiatives. This is
5 Captain Derrick Griffin. He just transferred to the
6 office. Chief Neighborhood of Liaison Captain Griffin is
7 a 26 plus year veteran that has a strong investigative
8 background as well as a community sense. Went to U of D,
9 a graduate of U of D, and has also spent time in the US
10 Army Services, a captain in the United States Army. He
11 brings a wealth of knowledge and understanding. So the
12 program that I'm going to highlight, I just wanted to put
13 a face with the name as he has hit the ground running
14 since he started this past Monday. So Captain Griffin,
15 welcome to the party, to this work, but this is Captain
16 Griffin, but I will speak to some of the initiatives that
17 you mentioned. It isn't a layered approach in reaching
18 our youth, which are most vulnerable, and those that we
19 must concentrate our efforts in to protect within the
20 realm of what Captain Griffin oversees as our brotherhood
21 and sisterhood program.

22 A layered approach and with many initiatives to
23 [unclear41:01] crime it's not just us, and we can't
24 arrest all of them. So our CVI partners and their groups,
25 they partner with the Detroit Public Schools, as well as

1 some charter schools that they have access to go in and
2 speak to the students, both male and female to encourage
3 better decision making, teach them conflict resolution
4 skills and also give them some options. And that option,
5 I'll get to last. Partnership. We have partnerships with
6 Detroit Public School police themselves that we are
7 coming in and we're speaking and we're helping and even
8 encouraging; just through presence, encouraging better
9 decision making, like at high school football games and
10 things of that nature to interact. For more hands-on
11 partnership. And again, meeting and knowing officers and
12 teaching them, you know, life skills and again, how to
13 make a decision outside of violence.

14 They can join our Detroit Police Explorers. And when
15 we talk about options, it's no better option, a greater
16 option than to serve. Police recruiting goes in and
17 recruits out of high schools, as we know, the
18 qualifications to be a Detroit police officer is 18 years
19 old, a driver's license and no felonies. And that's a
20 sworn opportunity. But we also have non-sworn positions
21 as well. So when we say resources, we literally come in
22 with resources. When we're talking to our high school
23 students and those that may want a career in public
24 service or law enforcement, we'll take them. I'm an
25 example of that. I joined when I was 18, so that program

1 worked. So I'll just say that to say that it is a tight
2 layer approach, but we are. Absolutely interacting with
3 our youth at school and at other places that they gather
4 geographically in their neighborhoods. An opportunity
5 again was the CVI basketball league that we had this
6 summer. So we are continuing to do this work that is our
7 commitment, our brotherhood and sisterhood program, in
8 several high schools, both male and female throughout. We
9 have summits, so we are working with our youth.

10 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Do you have an office at these
11 high schools, and junior schools? I mean, coming and
12 going [unclear43:06]. But I think first of all, I think
13 you have far more [unclear43:10], than the police
14 department. And the PS. I'm not impressed, but am
15 impressed by other departments. To me. I mean, it's not
16 [unclear43:20]. You have to attack a situation at the
17 root. You can't deal with it up here. So I'm just saying,
18 it is just something that you [unclear43:32] actually
19 participating, not just waiting on the DPS, but DPD,
20 which is the police, the largest police department in the
21 State of Michigan. We've got more than a thousand
22 [unclear43:43] officers and the State Police has, and we
23 are the same. I won't say what the other word is. But in
24 [unclear43:49],. So I really want; I really think a more
25 personal contact is important from the police. Mr.

1 [unclear43:59]?

2 AC HAYES: Yes, ma'am. We'll strive to continue in
3 that area.

4 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Male or female officers?

5 AC HAYES: Yes, ma'am.

6 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHKE: Thank you, [unclear44:07]
7 Commissioner.

8 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Just briefly. [Unclear44:10].
9 What does a [unclear44:15] cup and an obscure license
10 plate have to do with gang violence?

11 AC HAYES: I'm sorry.

12 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Okay, because the way a cup was
13 [unclear44:28] drew the first group of officers, the
14 first situation, it was a cup.

15 AC HAYES: Okay.

16 COMMISSIONER MOORE We talk a lot. That was the first
17 incident. The second was the license plates at
18 McDonald's. So I'm just asking, what does that have to do
19 with the actual definition of the gang intelligence team?

20 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I agree.

21 AC HAYES: So if I'm trying to add; it is not shared
22 with you. This is still good. I would t tell you,
23 although their assignment is Gang Intelligence Unit.
24 While they're out patrolling, they're still duty bound to
25 address crimes that they see in the performance of their

1 duty. And if someone is loitering in a parking lot, in a
2 place of business out drinking, and that's not what that
3 parking lot is designed for, they're tailgating at night,
4 for lack of a better term of doing that.

5 Whether it's a gang intelligence unit, they don't
6 get to just drive by and do nothing. If it's a patrol
7 unit, that is their responsibility as a member of the
8 police department. And that investigation, where it led
9 to interacting with someone that we, and again, not
10 getting too lightly, someone that was armed that legally
11 shouldn't have been. And again, whether it's a traffic
12 violation that you mentioned, whether you're gang
13 intelligence, whether it's me, and I'm driving around as
14 the assistant chief. If I observe a crime or a crime
15 being committed or the suspicion of a crime, I'm duty
16 bound to act as well. So again, without getting into the
17 weeds of those investigations again, as to my
18 understanding, and speaking from a place of ignorance,
19 but I'm not aware that the findings have come back from
20 the prosecutor's office yet. As far as the charging
21 decision, as you know every time ---

22 COMMISSIONER MOORE: I think I'm the first one.

23 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Through the Chair.

24 AC HAYES: I haven't seen it. So I'm just saying that
25 again, out of my ignorance, so I don't want to speak on

1 that. Not knowing if the prosecutor has rendered a
2 decision based on the actions of the officer, was the
3 stop lawful was the use of force lawful. And from that I
4 can speak to you further, but because I don't have that
5 information, I feel it would be unintelligent for me to
6 speak on those specific circumstances at this time.

7 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHÉ: Commissioner Bernard.

8 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Just really quickly. If you
9 see people that you think are in the parking lot of
10 Palmer Park and they're adults or using or drinking, do
11 you ever use the microphone that you have in your car?
12 Sweet. If there is no drinking in this park. If you are
13 drinking, you can't. Have you ever thought about just
14 [unclear46:54] to people, that's what the microphone is
15 for.

16 Linda, pull over. You use it when you're pulling me
17 over, but you're not using it with youth to get them to
18 self- correct, if you will, their behavior. Does that
19 make sense?

20 AC HAYES: That that is an option, through the Chair?
21 That is an option that an officer may use, but the
22 officer has the discretion and the authority to address
23 that action, especially if we don't know if it's a repeat
24 offender. If we don't know that this is a continued
25 problem. And in every city park signs are posted that it

1 says no drinking, and these are the park hours. So there
2 are ---

3 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: They don't stop adults
4 [unclear47:29].

5 AC HAYES: Each incident has to be judged, or
6 assessed on its individual intricacies from what happened
7 in circumstances of that. So that is a scenario that at
8 times, yes, they may be told to move, but at other times,
9 the officers may lawfully enforce the Detroit City code
10 of not drinking in public.

11 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Just one final point. You
12 know, several years ago, I said, a friend of mine once
13 said, the only place that's safe for four or five black
14 men to be is a basketball court. If they're together in a
15 car there, they're easily stopped. And there's this
16 search, and then there's these inquiries and these
17 questions, et cetera. These people are not bothering
18 anybody. They're just there one evening. And we wouldn't
19 have said anything, had it been people with gray hair to
20 adults. We did it intentionally. As was said earlier, you
21 are targeting youth, although no one else is targeted.
22 And I don't think, to be quite honest, if it were
23 reversed, if it were white people, black kids wouldn't
24 have been targeted.

25 AC HAYES: [Unclear48:45]. Respectfully that that is

1 your opinion, commissioner ---

2 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: That is true.

3 AC HAYES: The fact of the matter is that residents
4 here, taxpayers' voters here in the city of Detroit,
5 deserve a quality of life. And where they don't have to
6 walk out and hear loud music playing in their

7 neighborhoods in the middle of the night or for months,
8 MALE SPEAKER [Unclear49:08:] I'd be contributing to
9 that noise as well, if we were [unclear49:07].

10 AC HAYES: And the Detroit Police Department's focus,
11 we will address quality of life crimes. Years ago when a
12 lot of people say, well, you wouldn't have done this, or,
13 you know, why are you all stopping me now? Well, years
14 ago, and to be very candid, we had a violent crime issue.
15 But now that it is shared with you, the numbers, the
16 reductions that we've had, then we're now focusing our
17 attention on the quality of life issues as violent crimes
18 are trending down. So to spend time, I would just leave
19 it at that and upholding responsibilities, but to, I
20 don't want to pontificate, but to justify engaging, and
21 discussion, to try to litigate or allow someone that's
22 breaking the law to say that that's okay.

23 Because if we drive by and something happens, then
24 we would be neglected in our duty. They would say, well,
25 what did the police department do? If a young man had

1 that gun and the conflict would break out and shoot, and
2 they say, well, the police just drove by. Because if we
3 didn't engage, then we would be looking at as we are now.
4 And that is one thing that we are not. So the duties that
5 we are responsible for, the same as they say, tell the
6 true Detroit, that same action that we have, you won't
7 walk through downtown. Just like you won't walk through
8 the neighborhoods drinking. And they deserve that quality
9 of life. And it has nothing to do with age. The data is
10 showing you that right now, the drivers of violence are
11 youth, and that is who has our attention. Make no mistake
12 about it. If it's an adult that's violating or violating
13 the law, they can get our attention too. So again, I
14 certainly respect your opinion. But again, the officers
15 did what they were supposed to do and as indicated or as
16 addressed which I haven't seen, but if the first
17 submission of the warrant has come as it relates to the
18 incidents involving the cup, Madam Prosecutor has spoken.

19 And if there was no violation, if the officer was
20 not acting unofficially in their duty, if he was not,
21 again, misconduct an office, then the actions that he
22 took wouldn't be appropriate and lawful or he had to
23 [unclear51:27] to approach [unclear51:27] justice for
24 this.

25 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: This topic [unclear51:29]

1 continues, sir. Thank you, chief, for your report.

2 AC HAYES: Thank you.

3 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHÉ: At this point, we will
4 continue with oral communications.

5 MS. UNDERWOOD: Thank you, Madam Chair. We have two
6 speakers here in the room, and then we'll go to Zoom. Ms.
7 Bernice Smith, and then after Ms. Smith. Mr. Smith. If
8 you could state your name for the record.

9 MS. SMITH: All of it? Well, good afternoon.

10 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHÉ: Good afternoon.

11 MS. SMITH: I'm your first police commissioner under
12 Coleman Young in '73. So is that good enough for ID?
13 Yesterday was the most beautiful day, Bernard, you took
14 some of it away from me. I saw you too. My police
15 department, Hayes, when you walked in, you were the
16 chief. I was so happy to see you. I was on the other side
17 of the church. I was very happy to see you. And I saw so
18 many, most of you know, I've been in politics since
19 Coleman Young days, so it was like a reunion for me at a
20 sad occasion. But it was a beautiful service. And yes, I
21 did see the family at the museum, so I didn't have to,
22 you know what I mean? But I will tell you, this Judge
23 Strong, he's something else. He had to come with his pink
24 sequin [unclear53:05], and he took the occasion of
25 everybody looking at him.

1 And you know what? He went straight to the family
2 and introduced himself. But I want to tell you, Bernard,
3 you did say something that I want to say. My police
4 department, they looked good yesterday. They were lined
5 up with the motorcycles all the way, half down the block
6 on that street. They looked good yesterday. They were
7 clean, shiny and everything. I later came out and sat in
8 the lobby, [unclear53:37] came by, and he said, Mother
9 Bernice. I said, come on over here. So I got my picture
10 with him, which I was glad to see. But I just want to
11 tell my police department today, and you tell the chief.
12 I love him truly as always. You all did a beautiful job,
13 and I decided that I didn't see the newspaper out there
14 taking pictures of you because you were something to be
15 seen. I was even honored when the chief saw me.

16 I was even honored. You have a transportation Mother
17 Bernice? Yes, sir, I do. My son-in-law was there. I have
18 a Red Pacific car, but he was on 7 [unclear54:19], so
19 naturally he couldn't come down the street to pick me up.
20 But when I told the chief that I had transportation, but
21 my car can't come down this way, he said, yes, it can. He
22 was kind enough as usual to tell the police, let that red
23 car, he described it and everything and let it come down.
24 And it picked me up right there on the side. Not only am
25 I happy to know that we have a beautiful police

1 department, and they do the best job; they're risking
2 their lives every day when they put their uniform on.
3 I've said this often. I'm very proud of them and the fact
4 that they are doing the job, I don't have any compliment.
5 I mean, no complaints against what they're doing. But
6 yesterday, we all should be very proud of what they did.
7 And it was a large crowd.

8 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHÉ: Thank you. Thank you. Your
9 time is up.

10 MS. SMITH: Yes. I'm sorry. Well, thank you so much.
11 I'm just glad to be here. That's all I can say.

12 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHÉ: Thank you. Next speaker,
13 please.

14 MR. SMITH: Good afternoon. I am going to say before
15 I start, I apologize to Commissioner Burton. I'm a very
16 big supporter, if he was in a --- I gave Commissioner
17 [unclear55:37] respect and an apology. She didn't deserve
18 it, but Burton deserved his apology. Like I said, I
19 didn't like his comment. I would say I've witnessed the
20 Wayne County Sheriff's Department pulling people. So,
21 Commissioner Moore, I appreciate your question and also
22 you as well, Commissioner Bernard. I have seen the Wayne
23 County Sheriff's Department pulling people over in the
24 7th Precinct. Deputy Chief, could you speak to that? Why
25 is that happening? They're preying on regular people not

1 committing crimes. They're pulling people over down Mack
2 Avenue, Chene Avenue, and also Warren, and it's double
3 police with [unclear56:07]. That's not an extremely
4 violent area. I've looked at the CompStat numbers. They
5 should be on the west side around where [unclear56:12]
6 ruling the People's Action District is.

7 Also, I want to say, when it comes to quality-of-
8 life crimes, can we police downtown? We see a lot of
9 intoxicated Caucasian [unclear56:23], downtown
10 intoxicated, walking around the tigers' lines, pistons,
11 concerts [unclear56:27] for the black people, they do it
12 for white people. Because I can come in here, and
13 [unclear56:32] the commissioner. So are we going to do
14 that? We are going to play that [unclear56:35] and drive
15 our blackest [unclear56:37]. Like coming [unclear56:38].
16 But my thing is, this is different for people who
17 understand their rights. A lot of people are preyed upon
18 for driving while black. [Unclear56:46] black people in
19 the car [unclear56:46] for you. I also want to say the
20 solve rate for homicides to [unclear56:51], I've heard, I
21 think is around 58%, for homicides. And then for non-
22 fatal shootings at around 62%. We saw 135 shootings last
23 year, and we're bragging about that for 600,000 around
24 600,000, to 700,000 population C. That's nothing. That's
25 a lot when it comes to [unclear57:09] like Boston who

1 have 20, 30 homicides and they have double, triple,
2 quadruple the population.

3 I think that's nothing to hang your hat on. I think
4 that's a big thing. I also want to say, I saw an ICE
5 arrest of 15 suspects on Grand Boulevard and Jefferson.
6 But I saw Sergeant Brown escalate the situation that I
7 had to deescalate. There was a young black officer, just
8 walking. Sergeant Brown is right, of course, a young
9 black man recruiting them. I had a deescalate situation
10 because he escalated the situation. We did a lot more
11 training around cultural sensitivity in the police
12 department because we have a lot of officers who escalate
13 the situation with black residents and then they don't
14 understand how to deal with us. They're not from our
15 neighborhoods. They don't look like us and they don't
16 understand us. So I think we need to have a lot more
17 cultural sensitivity change, because we have so many
18 identification cases before City Council every day, and
19 we're moving dollars for lawsuits against the Detroit
20 Police Department.

21 And also, [unclear58:02] is very responsible. So we
22 have a tea bag killer. We have all these killers like
23 Vince's [unclear58:09] and others who are [unclear58:10],
24 who are contact killers. That's not funny at all. We have
25 families who have homicides.

1 MS. SMITH: That's not fair. That's not fair.

2 MR. SMITH: Like I said, we have a lot of families
3 who are working with homicide, who have been to homicide,
4 and they [unclear58:26] have victims' homicide, and they
5 have solutions. We've got [unclear58:29].

6 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Thank you.

7 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Madam Chair. Can I just say ---

8 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Yes.

9 COMMISSIONER MOORE: He did make a comment about the
10 Wayne County Sheriffs. I have asked Deputy Chief Pierce
11 to look at memorandums.

12 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Mr. Smith, please.

13 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Mr. Smith, please. [Crosstalk].
14 Assistant Chief, just for the record. I have asked Deputy
15 Chief Pierce to look at memorandums of understanding, not
16 only with the Wayne County Sheriff, but with the Oakland
17 County Sheriff and anybody who patrols jointly or who do
18 operations within the City of Detroit. Because I think it
19 needs to be some type of understanding between the
20 organizations. I've been told that Oakland County will
21 come into Detroit and raid someplace, but they don't want
22 to tell Detroit because they don't want Detroit to mess
23 it up. So they don't tell us. So again, I think those
24 memorandum are understandingly necessary. And I look at
25 either my time on the commission now or when I'm standing

1 at the podium to see if those memorandums go through.

2 Thank you.

3 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHE: Thank you.

4 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Madam Chair.

5 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHE: Commissioner Bernard.

6 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: [Unclear59:49], and so forth.

7 But they also come into Detroit and say they have a right
8 to and have high speed chase situations, although our DPD
9 does not engage in high-speed chases because we know that
10 at times they can be fatal. But they do come into Detroit
11 and do that. And I think we do have to address that. It's
12 just a thought for your recommendation.

13 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHE: Thank you. [Crosstalk].

14 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: It's a two-way street, it's
15 not a one-street. You can't come into my community and do
16 it. I can't come into yours and do it.

17 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHE: AC Hayes [unclear01:00:16].

18 AC HAYES: Yes. As it relates to the Wayne County
19 Sheriff, as well as the Michigan State Police within
20 their authority, they can come and take police action
21 within the City of Detroit. As it relates to other
22 agencies, we have protocols. As it relates to zone
23 clearances, and when they come in to enforce that and any
24 time that we find or to take action. And oftentimes it is
25 court ordered action. But it has been the mandate from

1 Chief Bettison and when he speaks to regional chiefs as
2 it relates to whether they want to call it courtesy or
3 whether we just draw a line in the sand, that when you
4 come in the city, they do have a protocol that they need
5 to announce that let us know where they will be and a
6 timeframe.

7 And when that doesn't happen they are addressed. And
8 I will speak to that eloquently, but conversations are
9 had to ensure that that does not happen. Again, as it
10 relates to high-speed chases, we've had conversations and
11 members of council have as well have spoken with their
12 counterparts. And just to set a tone, here in the City of
13 Detroit, you will be mindful of our residents and take,
14 excuse me, there's no place for high-speed chases. And
15 again, the chief has met with our [unclear01:01:38]
16 agencies to address that as well. Those incidents for a
17 while, it seemed like they were happening all the time.
18 There has been a reduction in that, and we continue to
19 hope, and insist that that is abided by when other
20 agencies come in here into the city and take police
21 action.

22 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHKE: AC. [Unclear01:02:03]. I
23 think Commissioner Bernard [unclear01:02:13] in terms of
24 if they could conduct a high-speed chase,
25 [unclear01:02:16].

1 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I think we have about 30 of
2 those agreements.

3 AC HAYES: As far as an MOU as it relates to that,
4 I'm not sure any agency would sign that as the Detroit
5 Police Department wouldn't sign that.

6 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHÉ: The Detroit Police
7 Department, sir?

8 AC HAYES: No, I mean, we wouldn't enter into an
9 agreement. And certainly we have, and I guess this would
10 be my opinion, as we have Grant Ha, our second legal
11 advisor as well as corporation counsel, but there are
12 actions that we're duty bound to take if we are pursuing
13 a killer; someone that we found that has committed a
14 heinous crime, and we are in pursuit. If they go across 8
15 Mile, we're going with them. So I mean, it works two
16 ways, but we are incredibly mindful that if we engage in
17 that, they can only be for certain things.

18 No, we're not going to chase someone that has an air
19 freshener hanging or for a small traffic violation. It
20 has to be a violent felony. And their action, if shown
21 that they do not want to go to jail and possibly would
22 re-offend again. So there are circumstances where the
23 Detroit Police Department could be in violation of any
24 type of mutual agreement with that. So that granular as
25 it relates to cooperating with agencies, I don't think we

1 will ever get that.

2 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Madam Chair.

3 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Go ahead, commissioner.

4 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Court protocols, are they
5 around?

6 AC HAYES: Yes.

7 COMMISSIONER MOORE: But you just mentioned that they
8 are writing.

9 AC HAYES: Through the Chair. I'm not sure how the
10 other agencies have memorialized it, but we shared
11 whether they need to be conflicted, if they're coming in
12 the City of Detroit as well as a zone notification.

13 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Have we written ours to them?

14 AC HAYES: Yes. We have a policy and we've
15 communicated that with them. So if you're asking, has it
16 been memorialized? I don't know if they've memorialized
17 it, but we've shared this information with them as to the
18 expectations here in the City of Detroit. As to what they
19 will do, both from a deconfliction standpoint, as well as
20 an zone, area and clearance.

21 COMMISSIONER MOORE: And just to wrap it up, am I
22 understanding it's a skeleton, it's a framework or what
23 happens when certain things happen. So it's not like I
24 would say or believe that you're not going to chase or
25 anything like that. But if you do chase and you enter

1 into the City of Detroit, these are our expectations as a
2 city, as a department of which you will or won't do. So
3 that's what it is. It's not a, you're not going to do
4 this.

5 It's just an understanding when these things happen.
6 Because they are going to chase. Michigan State Police,
7 obviously Warren is going to come in, but are you going
8 to notify our zone dispatchers when this happens? That's
9 the purpose of a memorandum understanding because
10 citizens feel victimized that they're just being ran
11 over. Buildings, property, posts, places, and things.
12 It's just a free for all. I thank you.

13 AC HAYES: I'll share some of the same sentiments,
14 Commissioner Moore and I will leave that to the lawyers,
15 but I will certainly make sure that your concern is
16 addressed. Yes, sir.

17 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Questions? Thank you.

18 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: This is not an insult to the
19 lawyers [unclear01:05:14] because we have to be out
20 millions and millions of dollars for these types of
21 incidents.

22 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you. Next speaker.

23 MS. UNDERWOOD: Madam Chair, we'll go into Zoom.

24 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Madam Chair, can I say
25 something.

1 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Just one second.

2 Commissioner Banks.

3 COMMISSIONER BANKS: This will be [unclear01:05:32[.
4 want to say, I want to say it to Captain Griffin. Captain
5 Griffin comes from the 11th Precinct. That's the precinct
6 number 11. Captain Griffin has a good touch with the
7 community. Congratulations, captain, on your promotion.
8 Okay. Promotion comes from the Lord. I know you serve him
9 too just like myself, but promotion comes from within
10 before you. And I'm happy for you.

11 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you, commissioner.
12 Next speaker.

13 MS. UNDERWOOD: Thank you, Madam Chair. Next speaker.
14 The last three digits of your phone is 263.

15 MR. CRAWFORD: Hello? Hello? Can you hear me? Can you
16 hear me?

17 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Go ahead. Hello? Yes. Hi, my
18 name's Reggie Crawford. Can you hear me?

19 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Yes, we can.

20 MR. CRAWFORD: Hello? Yes. Good evening everyone.
21 Commissioners, and also Chief Hayes. There was this talk
22 of one of Commissioners Ricardo Moore mentioning the Gang
23 Intelligence Unit. Well, I'm calling on behalf of the
24 community's citizens' intelligence. I've received a
25 number of phone calls and just conversations over the

1 last week or so pertaining to some instance involving
2 police officers involved shootings. And I saw some of
3 them, or I saw the entire so-called edited video of one
4 of the shootings pertaining to the one where alleged, the
5 man threw the gun on the roof and he was shot by the
6 officer. A video did it.

7 I spoke of. Production. This is a video production.
8 This is Detroit, not Hollywood. I stated that to Chief
9 Hollywood Craig, when I was on the commission as a
10 commissioner. Videos that are edited that hit the
11 Hollywood cutting floor, so to speak, don't speak to the
12 entire incident as to what happened. And it can never be
13 stated as the police department that's transparent. Also,
14 there was a raid of the wrong house on the Westside. Need
15 I remind everybody, remember Ayana Jones and a raid that
16 occurred on Lily Bridge Street; also to Breonna Taylor,
17 that rape that occurred in Louisville, Kentucky. So just
18 to bring this to a point, and make a claim; is the
19 citizens well, actually, your commissioners, you are the
20 civilian oversight and it needs to be a call for all
21 video and or body cam footage and Green Light footage to
22 be released immediately. Thank you.

23 MS. UNDERWOOD: [Unclear01:09:06].

24 MR. DAVIS: Hello? Hello? Hello. Can I be heard?
25 Hello?

1 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: We are coming in?

2 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Go ahead.

3 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: [Unclear01:09:44] Go ahead,
4 commissioner.

5 Mr. DAVIS: Oh, can I be heard?

6 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Yes. Go ahead. The audio was
7 really, really bad the last couple weeks on Zoom. Also
8 separately, I would like to say that you know, Detroit
9 Police can do a whole lot better because I know, and this
10 board could do a whole lot better by maybe broadcasting
11 on one of the cable channels live more frequently so that
12 people could go and easily engage without having to go
13 through, you know, zoom or what have you. Also, I do know
14 for a fact like Ferndale comes into the City of Detroit
15 and write tickets, you know, for people up and down 8
16 Mile, getting off the freeway. That was really bad a
17 number of years ago, and I talked to the chief of police
18 at that time there, and we had them cut back on that.

19 But I think somebody needs to be looking at some of
20 these border cities around Detroit. There are fleecing
21 Detroit residents, especially black people driving
22 through their communities. Also, a number of people
23 complain about the fact when they do go downtown for
24 sporting events, frequently they see a number of white
25 people walking around with beer bottles and drinks and

1 cans and stuff. And nothing seems to happen to them, but
2 yet a black person, especially a young black person,
3 could be stopped just because they think they might have
4 something. So we still are not quite equitable and fair.
5 Also, a greater attempt should be made to have more
6 meetings like a high school once a year, a community
7 college once a year, and a university once a year. We
8 need to try to engage more young people to be actively
9 involved in what's going on, because far too often, most
10 of the people who come to the meetings are, let's say,
11 very mature. We need to encourage more young people to
12 take more activities in what's going on in our city.
13 Thank you.

14 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Thank you. Commissioner.
15 Speakers [unclear01:11:59]. Thank you so much.
16 [Unclear01:12:02] Commissioner Woods has joined us. There
17 are no presentations to the board at this meeting. Can we
18 have the report from the board Secretary, please.

19 MS. GARNIER: Madam Chair and through the Chair. If
20 you note, commissioners under tab six, the communications
21 that are listed under that tag. Also reminding attendees
22 today, that next week's meeting, October 30th, 2025, has
23 been canceled and approved by the board. Several meetings
24 ago. Thursday, October 30th, The BOPC will not be
25 meeting. The next board meeting will be November 6th,

1 3:00 PM here at Detroit Public Safety Headquarters. And
2 [unclear01:12:59], the community meeting will be at the
3 2nd Precinct at the Adams Butzel Rec. Center, 10500
4 Lyndon Street, Detroit. [Unclear01:13:15] at 4:00 PM.
5 [Unclear01:13:19] at 4:00 PM, Policy Committee meeting.
6 And I believe those are the announcements for today,
7 Madam Chair.

8 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHÉ: Thank you. Under item 7, we
9 have unfinished business. We had a Closed Session on the
10 agenda last week. And information pursuant to Section 8
11 of the MCL 15268(a). The department's request for the
12 board to consider administrative leave without pay, but
13 with medical benefits for Police Officer Ali Dakhallallah,
14 Badge 4380, assigned to the 7th Precinct and convening
15 public to vote two-thirds required. There was discussion
16 about postponing it again this week to [unclear01:14:13].

17 COMMISSIONER WOODS: If we can for this vote. I'll
18 make a motion to postpone if we're not ready for it.

19 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Second.

20 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHÉ: [Unclear01:14:22] to
21 postpone it and seconded by Commissioner Bernard.

22 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Madam Chair.

23 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHÉ: Discussion. Go ahead,
24 commissioner.

25 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Why was it on the agenda if we

1 weren't ready?

2 COMMISSIONER WOODS: Through the Chair. The
3 parliamentarian said, you have to keep it there.

4 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Okay.

5 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Exactly. Go ahead.
6 Commissioner Carter.

7 COMMISSIONER CARTER: No. Can we just note that it'll
8 be on the next meeting agenda and the motion.

9 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Before you, so you
10 [unclear01:15:01], are you okay with that?

11 COMMISSIONER WOODS: [Unclear01:15:04].

12 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Secretary could just get
13 clarification before [unclear01:15:08]

14 MS. GARNIER: [Unclear01:15:20] November 6th,. The
15 parliamentarian's opinion on last week was, of course, as
16 the commissioners know, you postponed the wish is to move
17 again to postpone and be at the next scheduled meeting to
18 be November 6th. So I'm not sure there is a need to amend
19 the motion, but just to postpone it to the next regular
20 scheduled meeting of Thursday, November 6th.

21 COMMISSIONER CARTER: That wasn't said. So I think
22 that it needs to be said that it'll be at the next
23 available meeting. That's what I'm saying.

24 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay. So we need to include
25 that date [unclear01:16:04]. So any discussion? All in

1 favor? Indicate by saying, aye.

2 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

3 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Opposed? The motion carries.

4 Thank you. Under new business, Commissioner Bernard, do
5 you have a motion?

6 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Yes. I simply ladies and
7 gentlemen move to adopt as Policy Item 8a, Directive
8 403.5 Drug and Control Substance Abuse. We spent
9 considerable time discussing this policy. There are not
10 many radical changes. I must say that the members of the
11 department who participated were very thorough. Chief in
12 their discussion about and answering all of our
13 questions, quite frankly, regarding drug abuse and
14 substance abuse by department members. And our initiative
15 will be, of course, to attempt to provide employee
16 assistance to employees that have this problem. It's not
17 to be punitive, it is to be restorative. So I urge you to
18 adopt this policy.

19 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: So by recommendation of the
20 Policy Committee?

21 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Yeah. By recommendation of the
22 Policy Committee.

23 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay. Motion has been made
24 to adopt the Policy 403.5, Drug and Controlled Substance
25 Abuse. Those in favor, and [unclear01:17:28].

1 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Sustain, Madam Chair.

2 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Okay. No abstention. The
3 motion carries. Thank you.

4 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Thank you.

5 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: And now, motion to adjourn.

6 COMMISSIONER MOORE: So moved.

7 COMMISSIONER WOODS: Second.

8 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: It's been moved by
9 Commissioner Moore, seconded by Commissioner Woods to
10 adjourn. Those in favor, indicate by saying, aye.

11 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

12 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Thank you everyone for
13 attending today's meeting. Have a good evening.
