5 MR. WOODS: Hello. Thank you for having us. Have  
6 at it. We need your blessings.

7 PASTOR FORSYTHE: Bless you. Thank you,  
8 Commissioner. And welcome, everyone, to Pleasant Grove  
9 Baptist Church. A church that has been very active in this  
10 community for over 100 years and have also been partners  
11 with the 11th Precinct, and we are very honored to host  
12 the meeting on tonight, so thank you again for this  
13 privilege. Shall we pray? O God, our help in ages past,  
14 our hope for years to come, our shelter from the stormy  
15 blasts and our eternal home, under the shadow of thy  
16 throne, O God, the saints have dwelt secure. Sufficient is  
17 thine arm alone, and our defense is sure. Oh, God, our  
18 Heavenly Father, we recognize that you are not only our  
19 help in ages past, but you are our hope and help for  
20 today. So dear God, we come this day, this hour, praising  
21 you and thanking you for your faithfulness and your love.  
22 We thank you, dear God, that you are the God that hears  
23 and answers our prayers, that you, O God, do all things  
24 well. So dear God, on this evening, as people of faith and  
25 goodwill, we are praying for the women and men who serve

1 as commissioners of the Detroit Board of Police  
2 Commissioners. Asking that you give them wisdom in their  
3 decisions, give them peace, even in their disagreements,  
4 and give them O God, the fruit of thy Holy Spirit. We ask,  
5 dear God, to keep each commissioner safe from harm and  
6 danger, and in your loving care that you may empower them,  
7 enable them to carry out their civic duties. May they not  
8 get weary in what they do, but may they be encouraged to  
9 know that they do all things for those who live in Detroit  
10 City. That they are making a difference in the lives of  
11 all who live in Detroit. So God, we give you thanks, we  
12 give you praise and we ask this prayer now, in the name of  
13 your son, Jesus, the Christ, our Lord, amen.

14 MR. WOODS: Amen. As a introduction of the staff  
15 and elected officials and things of that sort, I would ask  
16 the Honorable Councilman Scott Benson to introduce himself  
17 and say what he needs to say as an introduction of the  
18 staff, and as well as Councilwoman Mary Waters.  
19 Councilman.

20 MR. BENSON: All right, thank you. And so just  
21 quickly, number one, my name is Councilman Scott Benson,  
22 and as always it is an honor and a privilege to come  
23 before you this evening, and I truly want to thank you all  
24 for coming into the Third District and hosting your  
25 community meeting this evening. And I want to thank Pastor

1 Forsythe for opening up the church for the community to  
2 come out. These are such important meetings and to have  
3 the opportunity to do this in the district and in the  
4 community is also a privilege. So just thank you all for  
5 doing that. I want to support you all in any way that we  
6 can, so thank you all for being here this evening.

7 MS. WATERS: I shall echo the same. I'm right  
8 here in the Third District and Councilmember Scott  
9 Benson's district. It's an honor to be here. I'm Mary  
10 Waters, your Councilmember-at-Large. That means I  
11 represent the whole D. I love saying that. Don't I, Chief?  
12 Oh and it's really good to see Pastor Forsythe again, but  
13 you know, Member Benson and I was just over at Farwell  
14 Recreation Center this evening, and we had a town hall  
15 meeting regarding deed fraud. And I was walking in the  
16 door Chief says he's on that. He's going to be working  
17 with us on deed fraud, helping us to protect people. Your  
18 hard-earned dollars. People are finding ways to steal your  
19 property, and so we want to make sure that we get the word  
20 out to people as much as possible. You all, as police  
21 commissioners, certainly have a venue to help us do  
22 exactly that so that we can protect our citizens. So thank  
23 you so very much for the opportunity.

24 MR. WOODS: Thank you for those wonderful  
25 introductions. Madam Secretary, you may finish the

1 introductions of our guests.

2 MS. GARNIER: Through the Chair, present as of  
3 this time are the following staff members. Joyna  
4 Underwood, Teresa Blossom, Dior Mathis, Candace Hayes,  
5 Mary Barber, Felecia Tyson, Drew Fries, Artemisia Joshua,  
6 Chief Investigator Jerome Warfield, Supervising  
7 Investigator Tiffany Stewart, Katrina Patillo, DPD HR  
8 Director. Our interpreters on Zoom this evening are Toi  
9 Bogan and Stephanie Beatty. Court Reporter is Hanson  
10 Court Reporting. Audiovisual by Sergeant Enrique Jackson.  
11 Media Services Charles Henry. Our own Chief of Police,  
12 Todd A. Bettison, is present with us, as well as Deputy  
13 Chief Arnold Williams and I see number of other executive  
14 leaders with the Detroit Police Department. The 11th  
15 Precinct is represented by Captain Shannon Hampton. 11th  
16 Precinct Community Relations President Kim Jackson. Marie  
17 Overall. Mark Young, Lieutenant and Sergeant Association  
18 President. Former Commissioner William Davis is on Zoom  
19 and former Commissioner Ricardo Moore is also on Zoom. And  
20 those are the persons registered at this time. Vice Chair  
21 Woods.

22 MR. WOODS: Thank you very kindly. Madam  
23 Secretary, did I miss out on the approval of the minutes?  
24 I know I did the closed door session. Did I make a motion  
25 for the regular minutes?

1 MS. GARNIER: I'm sorry.

2 MR. WOODS: Did I make a motion for the regular  
3 minutes or just the closed door session? Do I need to  
4 make a motion for that? Well, just to be on the safe  
5 side, I would just say, I would just say, yeah, I would  
6 like to entertain a motion for the approval of the minutes  
7 for February 5th, 2026.

8 COMMISSIONER JONES: Motion.

9 COMMISSIONER WILLIAMS: Second.

10 MR. WOODS: Moved by Commissioner Jones,  
11 seconded by Commissioner Williams. Any discussion? All in  
12 favor say aye.

13 BOARD: Aye.

14 COMMISSIONER WOODS: Anyone opposed? The motion  
15 is carried. I don't have a report, but I will go to the  
16 resolution for the retired Sergeant David Babcock.

17 MS. CARTER: Through the Chair. Through the  
18 Chair, I'm over here. I'm sorry. Commissioner Carter.  
19 Okay. I just wanted to note that I was here for the  
20 record.

21 MR. WOODS: Okay. I didn't see you.

22 MS. GARNIER: Too far.

23 MR. WOODS: Yeah. Thank you. Let it be noted.  
24 And Commissioner Boman. Thank you. Go ahead.

25 COMMISSIONER WILLIAMS: Resolution honoring

1 retired Sergeant David Babcock, posthumously, whereas  
2 Officer David Babcock joined the Detroit Police Department  
3 on August 18th, 1969, following his graduation from the  
4 Detroit Metropolitan Police Academy. He was assigned to  
5 the 2nd Precinct. Officer Babcock had the opportunity to  
6 work in various assignments, which included the aviation  
7 section of the 7th Precinct and the Crime Laboratory  
8 Section, a division responsible for analyzing evidence  
9 from crime scenes in interpreting laboratory findings. And  
10 therefore, it be resolved that the Detroit Board of Police  
11 Commissioners hereby honor and recognize retired Sergeant  
12 David Babcock for his 33 years of faithful, no, his 53  
13 years of faithful and honorable service to the Detroit  
14 Police Department and the citizens of the city of Detroit.  
15 I pass this, I move for this to go forward.

16 MR. WOODS: Move for approval?

17 COMMISSIONER WILLIAMS: Yes, sir. Move for  
18 approval.

19 MR. WOODS: Okay. Thank you.

20 MR. JONES: Second, Mr. Chair.

21 MR. WOODS: A move by Commissioner Williams to  
22 further approve of the resolution and second by  
23 Commissioner Jones. Any discussion? All in favor, say aye.

24 BOARD: Aye.

25 MR. WOODS: Anyone opposed? The motion is

1 carried. We will go to the Chief of Police Report. Chief  
2 Todd Bettison.

3 CHIEF TODD BETTISON: Thank you, Chair Woods.  
4 I'll start out with our crime stat report. The category of  
5 homicides, we are down 15 percent, same date compared to  
6 last year. Nonfatal shootings down 31 percent. Same period  
7 as last year, robberies, down 14 percent, and carjackings  
8 down 27 percent. In the category of aggravated assault, we  
9 are up 3 percent. Burglary we are down 31.9 percent and  
10 then motor vehicle theft, we are down 35 percent. So we  
11 had, of course record, low numbers last year and continue  
12 to trend in that direction this year. In regards to  
13 response time, which I will report out as well, last week  
14 the prior week for priority one calls for service, the  
15 average time from call intake to officer arrival was 10  
16 minutes, 11 seconds. So, the men and women of the DPD  
17 continue to work hard. Report out also on a significant  
18 narcotic seizure on February 5th, 2026. Officers from the  
19 narcotic unit executed substantial or simultaneous search  
20 warrants at an apartment complex, a senior apartment  
21 building. In the 8300 block of East Jefferson Street, the  
22 investigation revealed that the suspect was producing  
23 illegal substances and distributing them in the building.  
24 Officers made one felony arrest, confiscated large amounts  
25 of cocaine, fentanyl, and marijuana. Officers also

1 received three handguns and one AR-15 rifle. So, you know,  
2 continuing to ensure that we're protecting our seniors in  
3 the buildings there, and we will continue that type of  
4 enforcement based off complaints that we get. Traffic  
5 enforcement from February 1st through the 7th, our traffic  
6 enforcement unit conducted operations in the 8th, 9th,  
7 11th, and 12th precinct. So, you probably saw a lot of  
8 traffic stops being conducted. Some folks called me to ask  
9 what was going on, but continuing to do traffic  
10 enforcement, which is one of our number one complaints  
11 from citizens. Officers conducted a total of 462 traffic  
12 stops and issued a total of 1,011 tickets for moving  
13 violations and 201 tickets for speeding. On Monday,  
14 February 9th, Assistant Chief Ewing swore in and appointed  
15 16 new police chaplains. I would have to say that the  
16 Detroit Police Department has one of the largest chaplain  
17 corps, which, support our families in need, support our  
18 officers, especially during times of crisis. Thank you to  
19 our chaplain corps. DPD chaplains have been active for  
20 over 50 years. The unit is made up of volunteers who  
21 assist officers and support families through spiritual  
22 support and prayer. And so, congratulations to our newest  
23 chaplain corps members.

24 Also, you probably saw on television the scam alert.  
25 So I just want to constantly warn our community. February

1 11th, the Department shared a recent scam regarding  
2 fraudulent texts from the 36th District Court concerning  
3 unpaid parking citations. Please do not respond or click  
4 on any links or provide any personal information. Instead,  
5 delete the message and report it as spam. If you have been  
6 scammed or witnessed a scam, you can report it to the  
7 Federal Trade Commission, as well. And tomorrow I want to  
8 wish everybody here an early happy Valentine's Day. And,  
9 of course, our neighborhood police officers will have  
10 events across the city. I'll have a bit at headquarters,  
11 Cupid Bingo with the chief. So I'm inviting seniors out  
12 for fun game bingo. I mean, it's going to be in the Skylar  
13 Herbert room. Also, you need to know when we get to the  
14 11th precinct report, they'll report out on what they're  
15 going to be doing for Valentine's Day as well. Then we  
16 have a procedural justice and police legitimacy forum and  
17 that's going to be on Saturday, March the 7th. The Detroit  
18 Police Department will be hosting that event. Community  
19 members are encouraged to come voice their concerns and  
20 learn procedures that the police use to accomplish their  
21 duties and the community meeting will be held at Say  
22 Detroit Police center, which is located at 19320 Van Dyke  
23 Avenue. Start time is 9 a.m. and to register you should  
24 contact Sergeant Justin Hearn, 313-900-9377 and I'm pretty  
25 sure it'll be on our social media page as well.

1           So, now switching topics really, really quickly to a  
2 more serious matter. Last Thursday, I had the opportunity  
3 to go before city council, and I definitely want to thank  
4 our Mayor, Mayor Sheffield, for reappointing me as chief  
5 of police and I went through the interview process before  
6 the city council. And then also, thank you again to this  
7 board for your unanimous support for me being chief of  
8 police. One of the questions that came up and has come up  
9 frequently is, how does Detroit police interact, and do we  
10 enforce immigration laws? You have heard me state  
11 publicly that we do not. That is against our policies, our  
12 rules, our procedures. It has, in times when you say,  
13 well, during traffic stops, if the individual who has been  
14 stopped doesn't speak English, what do we do? Do you  
15 contact a federal agency such as Border Patrol or others  
16 to assist with language translation? That is against our  
17 policy as well. Contacting Border Patrol, ICE, or other  
18 federal agencies for translation services is strictly  
19 prohibited, as it invariably subjects individuals to  
20 extreme scrutiny, unrelated to any offense. DPD is  
21 expected to enforce based on their origins or native  
22 language. Such actions on the part of any member of the  
23 DPD constitute an egregious violation of local and  
24 department policy. DPD holds contracts with certified  
25 translation services that can be contacted 24 hours per

1 day, seven days per week. There is absolutely no reason to  
2 contact federal law enforcement agencies to assist with  
3 translation services.

4 I say that because on February 9th, at approximately  
5 3:15 p.m., I had a sergeant of the Detroit Police  
6 Department respond to an officer's request for a  
7 supervisor for a traffic stop. The officer requested the  
8 sergeant to the scene, because the subject did not speak  
9 English. Ultimately, the sergeant made the decision to  
10 contact Border Patrol, which is a violation of our  
11 department policy. Border Patrol did arrive. Border Patrol  
12 conducted their investigation. Border Patrol determined  
13 that the individual was not a U.S. Citizen, and, as a  
14 result, the individual was taken by Border Patrol. So, I  
15 have suspended that sergeant. And of course, as chief of  
16 police, I can only suspend with pay. However, I did submit  
17 today to the board a request to suspend without pay. Now,  
18 body-worn camera. We check and we audit what we inspect.  
19 So, we have procedures in place where we audit body-worn  
20 cameras.

21 During an audit of our body-worn cameras,  
22 supervisors determined that on December 16th, 2025, a  
23 police officer was investigating an individual on a felony  
24 warrant at a location on the west side. And, ultimately,  
25 this police officer, believing that the individual was not

1 a U.S. Citizen, decided to contact Border Patrol. Border  
2 Patrol did respond and Border Patrol ultimately took this  
3 individual. So, I will say this to the community. I will  
4 say this to everyone that 99 percent of our officers do it  
5 the right way each and every day. They're out there  
6 working hard but I do have 1-2 percent that decide to  
7 violate our rules, our policies, and our procedures. And  
8 to those officers, I will hold them accountable. That's  
9 what I told city council. Councilmember Santiago-Romero  
10 said; Chief, we need you to hold individuals accountable  
11 when they violate policy. I gave my commitment. That's  
12 what I'm about, and that's what this administration under  
13 me will do. And so, I, too, have submitted that officer's  
14 name. I suspended that officer immediately, and have  
15 submitted to the board that they be suspended without pay  
16 as well and I will say this. I intend to terminate them.  
17 One of the things also because I wanted to look into it is  
18 to see how frequently the language line services is being  
19 utilized, I am paying for it, right? I wanted to make sure  
20 that people will be using it. And my Patrol Officers and  
21 my investigative officers last year in 2025, they called  
22 and utilized the language service hotline, where you  
23 through notification and control 1522 times. So the  
24 majority of members are doing the right way but those who  
25 choose to do it the wrong way, and think that they are

1 going to enforce immigration laws because that's not our  
2 lane, shame on them, and they will be held strictly  
3 accountable for that. Thank you.

4 MR. WOODS: Thank you, Chief. We have received  
5 those suspensions without pay. We plan on taking these up  
6 next week and so, we would not ask questions regarding  
7 that because we have to have closed door sessions on these  
8 matters. But I will open up to Commissioners for questions  
9 and as I say, be very careful in your questioning because  
10 we have to make decisions. Commissioner Watson and  
11 Commissioner Williams.

12 COMMISSIONER WATTS: For your report and I  
13 think you kind of answered the question at the end, one of  
14 my questions and I understand that, you know, right now,  
15 out of all of the men and women on your team, right now,  
16 we currently have a handful that call Border Patrol. Do  
17 you think you're going to do a refresher course with some  
18 of them or just let them know the rules, is any proactive  
19 retraining or maybe just going over. I'm just wondering,  
20 is there a plan for that?

21 CHIEF TODD BETTISON: Through the chair,  
22 Commissioner Watts. We have issued teletypes. We have  
23 trained. This is not anything new. But being proactive I  
24 actually had a meeting today, where I called in all of my  
25 Commanders, I called in the commanders, the captains, and

1 I stressed to them the necessity to go to roll calls to  
2 let their members know, and to let them know what the  
3 penalties will be, how severe it is that we do not do  
4 immigration enforcement. We do not call federal agencies  
5 for translation services. We have translation services  
6 that we pay for. So, right now, on your cell phone, you  
7 don't need to. We got AirPods and everything. It can  
8 translate for you. So, there's no excuse and it will not  
9 be tolerated.

10 COMMISSIONER WATTS: Thank you for that,  
11 because I'm glad to hear you say that, because especially  
12 in this time, not just because this is the time and what  
13 we're dealing with the administration, but any time. And  
14 I'm glad to see you taking that stance, because that  
15 should not be tolerated, period.

16 MR. WOODS: Commissioner Williams.

17 COMMISSIONER WILLIAMS: Yeah, I just want to  
18 echo some of what Commissioner Watts said. And I'm glad  
19 that you actually brought it to the meeting and addressed  
20 it publicly so that the citizens can hear that top  
21 leadership is acting on it and no one is above the law  
22 when it comes down to that, that you are seeking no pay.  
23 You are seeking termination. I think that helps. It helps  
24 make the citizens more believable with the department,  
25 what's going on out here today. Everybody's in an uproar.

1 So, I just think that it just helps hearing it come from  
2 you.

3 CHIEF TODD BETTISON: Thank you, Commissioner.

4 MR. WOODS: Commissioner Camille.

5 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: Thank you, Mr. Chair.

6 Thank you so much, Chief. I just want to echo the  
7 sentiments of my colleagues as well. Nobody expects DPD to  
8 be perfect. And it's not reasonable for a picture to be  
9 painted that missteps don't happen. And so, I really  
10 appreciate your transparency and your clarification today,  
11 because it's important to bring to the community where  
12 mess-ups happen and that you're taking those very  
13 seriously. So, thank you for that. I have a question in  
14 regards to LEIN, because I believe you clarified before  
15 that if someone is taken into DDC, that ICE can see in the  
16 LEIN system that they're being detained there, and then  
17 with a signed judicial warrant, then you'll be required to  
18 allow ICE to come and take them. Is there anything in  
19 LEIN, like during a traffic stop, that will pop up and  
20 draw ICE to a traffic stop, or would LEIN not reflect that  
21 they're having an interaction with DPD that quickly? Do  
22 you follow what I'm asking?

23 CHIEF TODD BETTISON: I'm not aware of that it  
24 would. But what I would say, for example, during a traffic  
25 stop, when we run them, even if it was something in the

1 system that stated that they had an immigration hold and  
2 we saw it as DPD, we still would not detain them from a  
3 traffic stop, because we don't do immigration enforcement.  
4 In regards to your question, I will circle back around to  
5 you so that I'm spot on and correct. I just need to verify  
6 and check, but that's an excellent question. But that  
7 individual would already be gone if we don't have a  
8 criminal offense to arrest for. So, it would have to be an  
9 offense where they violated one of our local ordinances or  
10 state law. That's the only thing that the Detroit Police  
11 Department and our officers are authorized to enforce.  
12 Just like the FBI, when they're driving throughout the  
13 city of Detroit, and they see somebody blow a red light,  
14 you're not going to have a federal agent pull you over for  
15 a traffic offense, just like we're not going to detain  
16 someone for an immigration offense.

17 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: Thank you for that,  
18 through the chair. I just have a couple other questions,  
19 if that's okay. Well, first, I want to just commend a few  
20 people on your staff, first. So, I had a chance to do a  
21 ride-along at the 10th Precinct, actually. So, Commander  
22 Rodriguez and Master Sergeant Vogel were great. I learned  
23 a lot and look forward to spending additional time  
24 learning about the patrol operations from them. Also,  
25 today, several of us had an opportunity to tour the Real-

1 Time Crime Center and spend some time there with A.C.  
2 Hayes and Captain Frederick. Question about the facial  
3 recognition reports that we're receiving on a weekly  
4 basis. Those have been showing no data for several weeks  
5 now. Does that mean that the technology has not been used  
6 in these time frames, or are you familiar with what those  
7 reports have been showing?

8 CHIEF TODD BETTISON: I'll have my team report out on  
9 that piece, because I don't want to misspeak but, so,  
10 somebody from my team, I need you to report in regards to  
11 that.

12 DEPUTY CHIEF FRANKLIN HAYES: Yes, sir, through  
13 the chair. Commissioner Camille, that is correct. There  
14 have not been facial recognition queries or ran in the  
15 last, I believe it's two reporting periods, two weekly  
16 reports.

17 CHIEF TODD BETTISON: And through the chair,  
18 Commissioner Camille, we often will get requests from  
19 citizens to actually use facial recognition and run it and  
20 sometimes they are very angry when we don't do it because  
21 our standards are really strenuous. We will only run it  
22 for the violent crimes, the part one crimes. And so, say,  
23 for example, and I'll give you the perfect example where  
24 individuals were requested. A home invasion, too. That is  
25 a crime where someone has broken into your house and you

1 are not home. You have cameras throughout your house and  
2 you capture their face in your house. And so, you don't  
3 know who they are. Police Department, we don't know who  
4 they are and we are trying to identify them and they're  
5 saying, detective, just put it in your facial recognition.  
6 We're like, well, we can't do it. They're like, you know,  
7 you got it, do it. And so, we're very, very particular and  
8 we do not use it a lot. We utilize it for those more  
9 serious and violent crimes. I think that we probably have  
10 one of the most stringent facial recognition restrictive  
11 policies in the country. And I'll, once again, give it up  
12 for the Board of Police Commissioners, who have ensured  
13 that through CIOGS and other means that we do everything  
14 to protect the civil liberties of our citizens. And so,  
15 thank you for that. It don't always feel good at the time  
16 we are going through it, but I can definitely appreciate  
17 it. So, thank you.

18 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: Thank you for that,  
19 Chief. Through the Chair, this is my last question, I  
20 promise.

21 MR WOODS: Right, go on.

22 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: And this is, I'm trying  
23 to help out some constituents that have asked some  
24 questions about this. When a person files a police report,  
25 what type of personal information about themselves do they

1 have, are they asked to provide? and are they able to not  
2 give some of that information, or file anonymously, or  
3 send a proxy? If for whatever reason they're not  
4 comfortable coming forward themselves.

5 CHIEF TODD BETTISON: Depends on what type of police  
6 report it is. If you're making and we receive information  
7 to investigate crime in various ways. Narcotics  
8 complaints. We don't need your personal information and so  
9 that's one form, but if you're talking about a  
10 standardized police report where you have been the victim  
11 of a crime, then, at that particular point, we need your  
12 personal information because it'll be assigned to a  
13 detective. Ultimately, if a crime is, we have probable  
14 cause that a crime has been committed, then we will send  
15 that over to the prosecutor's office and if you want to  
16 proceed with pressing charges and holding that individual  
17 accountable, then the prosecutor is going to need your  
18 information because every accuser, ultimately, when it  
19 goes to court, has the right to face their accuser. And so  
20 in those particular situations, if you've been the victim  
21 of a crime, then we need all of your information. But if  
22 you're just making a crime report and notifying us that  
23 crime has taken place, we don't need your information. You  
24 can do things like that, anonymous. That's why we even  
25 have things like 1 or 800-SPEAK-UP, and we have other

1 methods to be able to just take the information and we'll  
2 investigate it.

3 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: Thank you, Chief.

4 MR WOODS: Okay, thank you. Any further  
5 questions? No further questions. Again, thank you for your  
6 leadership. I just want to acknowledge that the Chief,  
7 when I was in DC, he so happened to be there, too at the  
8 same conference. I didn't know he was coming to County  
9 End, and he did a phenomenal job as it relates to vapes in  
10 the city of Detroit. And him and actually, Councilman  
11 Benson did a panel and people all around the country  
12 acknowledged that. We did some action with some of our  
13 congressional leaders after that, and we were able to get  
14 a letter from the Arab American Chamber of Commerce, sent  
15 it to all businesses and we'll make that available,  
16 admonishing their folks not to sell tobacco and vapes to  
17 children, which has been a terrible, terrible problem here  
18 in the city of Detroit. So, thank you for your leadership.  
19 It was phenomenal. All the folks really, really was coming  
20 to him and the Councilman saying that they don't have  
21 these policies in their States and their cities, you know  
22 and how do they get them implemented in there. Because he  
23 has closed down a number of businesses that sell vapes and  
24 tobacco products to children. So, again, thank you. Let's  
25 go to Deputy Chief Arnold Williams and Captain Shannon

1 Hampton to come in and give the 11th precinct report and  
2 we do have Police Community Relations Council President  
3 Kim Jackson give us the remix. Thank you.

4 CAPTAIN SHANNON HAMPTON: Well, through the  
5 chair and good evening, everyone. First, I want to start  
6 off by introducing myself. My name is Shannon Hampton. I'm  
7 the newest precinct captain at the 11th precinct, and it's  
8 a pleasure to meet everyone. I'm happy to report out the  
9 chief has already given us a brief of the stats for the  
10 city right now. But overall, the 11th precinct is trending  
11 down in part one crimes. We finished off 2025 with an  
12 overall 22.9 percent reduction. So this year, we're in  
13 competition with ourselves. We are working really hard to  
14 bring that crime rate down. We are going to continue to  
15 work with our community partners and do just that. For  
16 example, just the other day, we hit an area; One of the  
17 first areas everybody told me about was John R and Six  
18 Mile, and the narcotics activities and things that are  
19 going on over there. So, in a collaborative effort with  
20 many Detroit units, city and federal agencies, we were  
21 able to get over there, go into this one location. I think  
22 we hit five that day in total. We boarded up the house, we  
23 closed down the house that was housing a lot of those  
24 people who were engaged in those narcotic activities. And  
25 we were able to get large amounts of cocaine, crack

1 cocaine, fentanyl, an unknown amount of cash and jewelry,  
2 out of all of the locations that we hit. So those are the  
3 kind of efforts that we're going to continue in the 11th  
4 precinct. I'm sure you all know my sergeant, the NPO  
5 sergeant, Sergeant Spruce. If you have any issues or  
6 concerns, you know his team, the NPOs, they are out here  
7 working hard for you. And barring that is, I'm sorry, we  
8 have some upcoming events. The chief alluded to them, so  
9 tomorrow, if you don't feel like playing bingo, you can  
10 come over. You can come over with us and we're having a  
11 senior Valentine's Day dance at the American Serbian Hall.  
12 It starts at 10 o'clock tomorrow. So, if you want to come  
13 over and have a good time, please come on over. And I also  
14 want to mention the 11th precinct community council  
15 advisory board meeting that happens every Tuesday, the  
16 second Tuesday of the month. Our next meeting will be  
17 March 10th. Is that correct. Yep. March the 10th and that  
18 is the report for the 11th precinct. Any questions?

19 MR. WOODS: Very, very great report. Any  
20 questions? I just want to acknowledge you guys as well. I  
21 was in Pershing High School yesterday. Some of your  
22 officers were in there. The 911 project that they're  
23 working on with DPD is second to none to be able to train  
24 youngsters to work the 911 call centers. They have a law  
25 enforcement class there, and it was good to see officers

1 there engaging with those children, being able to make  
2 sure that the children of the city of Detroit understand  
3 that there's a future for them to work inside the police  
4 department, not necessarily as officers, but they could be  
5 911 operators. I thought that was very powerful and  
6 beautiful. So thank you and your team.

7 CAPTAIN SHANNON HAMPTON: Thank you.

8 MR. WOODS: There being no other questions, we  
9 can't skip the El President. Kim Jackson. Phenomenal  
10 woman. Come on.

11 KIM JACKSON: Yeah. Thank you. Good evening. My  
12 name is Kim Jackson. I'm the president of 11 Precinct  
13 Police Community Relations Council. So before I welcome  
14 the board, I must acknowledge our pastor first. So thank  
15 you, Pastor Foresythe, for inviting us into your church.  
16 And now I can say welcome board, and thank you for coming  
17 here to the 11th Precinct. I appreciate that. So first of  
18 all, I'm going to brag about my officers at the 11th  
19 Precinct because I know I have the baddest ones in town. I  
20 want to give my kudos to Sergeant Spruce, to Officer D  
21 Rob, to Officer Williams, to Officer Hill, to Officer  
22 Nichols. I know I call them morning, noon and night. And  
23 when I call, they come, they help. And I only call them  
24 when I need them. I try to do it by myself, but when I  
25 need them, they're there for me. So I always thank them

1 for that. Also, we do have a couple of community members  
2 in the audience, so I do want to recognize them as well.  
3 We have Zelma Joyce Turner. She could raise her hand while  
4 she's here. We have Regina Jordan Brown. Thank you. We  
5 have Vernita Little. Thank you, my dear. We have Dawn  
6 Calloway, and she's with the Love Detroit Prevention  
7 Coalition. So thank you, my dear. I appreciate you coming  
8 as well. I also saw Pastor Mo in the house. Thank you for  
9 coming out. I appreciate you as well. And then we also  
10 have Derrick Hill, and he's the legislative aide for our  
11 Commissioner Martha G. Scott. Okay, and thank you everyone  
12 for coming tonight. I appreciate that. Any questions for  
13 me?

14 MR. WOODS: Questions? I'll say thank you for  
15 your service. It takes community.

16 KIM JACKSON: Thank you so much.

17 MR. WOODS: Let's go to oral communications.

18 MS. UNDERWOOD: Thank you, Mr. Chair. Our first  
19 speaker will be Rella May. After Rella May, Michael's mom  
20 and Regina McBride. Please state your name for the record.

21 RELLA MAY: Good evening. My name is Rella May.  
22 I am Michael's grandmother. I sat here and I listened to  
23 the Chief speak about accountability and holding police  
24 officers accountable for doing their jobs or lack thereof  
25 and not doing their jobs. I know you guys are probably

1 familiar with my grandson's case. I am sure my daughter  
2 has been before you many times, but I have a couple  
3 questions for you guys. I want to know who is going to be  
4 held accountable for the negligence within my grandson's  
5 death for police officers not fully investigating this  
6 death. I want to know if police officers went and  
7 recanvassed the neighborhood for ring doorbell cameras,  
8 asking questions to determine if they saw anything  
9 suspicious. I want to know did they go and do the  
10 ShotSpotters, if they received a ShotSpotter call or  
11 notification of gunshots fired at that location during the  
12 time of his death? And if so, what officers did that or  
13 conducted that search? I want to know did anybody view the  
14 real time crime center cameras because we gave you  
15 specific information of where to look and what to go look  
16 for. As a taxpayer and a constituent, I don't work for  
17 y'all. Y'all work for us. My taxpayer dollars pay for  
18 this. I pay my taxes. I do all of this, but yet and still  
19 I can't get no city services. We've asked these questions.  
20 I want to know you mentioned all the reports today except-

21 MR. WOODS: That's your time, ma'am. Next  
22 speaker.

23 CHIEF TODD BETTISON: Through the chair, it's on our  
24 city website. Our missing report numbers are there posted.  
25 It's public. Our website is public. You can go right there

1 and see it. Next time I'll make sure I report that for  
2 you. You are welcome.

3 MR. WOODS: There you go, Michael Mom.

4 MICHAEL'S MOTHER: Well, grandma done it. So I  
5 want to say first and foremost, I told you guys last week,  
6 after providing the questions for the board as well as  
7 Chief Parish, that I would report back on what  
8 happened. And so I would like to say that I got  
9 confirmation today, literally here, by Chief (inaudible)  
10 that they do have the answers. However, Chief Bettison  
11 would like to be debriefed on those questions. Fine,  
12 great. Commissioner Boman actually reached out to me and  
13 asked me to give him those questions again. I did reach  
14 out and give him those questions. When I called him back  
15 to follow up if he had gotten any answers for me, however  
16 I did not receive a response. I want to say; Chief  
17 Bettison, I do understand that you kind of inadvertently  
18 inherited my case because of the lack of commitment for my  
19 son's case, and so I'm trying to be patient, allow you  
20 time to do your job, and take your process but I also  
21 would like to acknowledge that when I came to the meeting  
22 in January the 12th, you told me yourself that you were  
23 going to look into Michael's case that Monday. When I  
24 reported and came back to the commissioners board meeting  
25 that following Thursday, you informed that it had been

1 busy. I do understand. However, this is a repetitive cycle  
2 that's been going on. There's always going to be  
3 something. There's always going to be crime. There's  
4 always going to be a job to be done. So I would just like  
5 to ask that when we're doing these jobs, if we could just  
6 get it right initially. If everybody can just do their  
7 job, because I'm really not asking for anything too much  
8 other than everyone to do the job that they were sworn in  
9 to do. That is it. Again, I'm going to allow you that  
10 time. I understand, get debriefed and I really hope that I  
11 get a call and I do not have to come back down here next  
12 Thursday for said answers. Thank you.

13 MR. WOODS: Thank you very kindly. Next speaker.

14 COMMISSIONER BOMAN: Yeah, I just want to  
15 respond that while I sent it only a few minutes ago, I did  
16 respond with the written answers to the questions.

17 MR. WOODS: Next speaker, please.

18 MS. UNDERWOOD: I think she needs some little  
19 time.

20 MR. WOODS: Did you notify the next speaker?

21 MS. UNDERWOOD: Minister Eric Blount will be  
22 next.

23 REGINA MCBRIDE: Hi, my name is Regina McBride.  
24 I'm here for my son, James McBride. He was in that  
25 accident June 13th, 2021, during COVID time. He was in a

1 motorcycle accident. I got a call from the hospital to  
2 come down. Never did see a police officer or anything.  
3 Didn't get a response from them. I went down three days  
4 later to get a police report and I got the response that  
5 he needs to come. He's in ICU, don't know if he's going to  
6 live or die, and we're still waiting. Haven't heard  
7 anything. Just want to know the proper procedure, how to  
8 get answers for me and him so my son can be at ease. He  
9 doesn't have any faith in the police department at all.  
10 I'm losing my hope also, because I got the runaround. I  
11 got the answer that it's on the desk of the prosecutor,  
12 was looking into it. I just need to know the directions to  
13 go to find out how to get information so that I can be at  
14 rest and my son can be at rest for what happened to him.

15 CHIEF TODD BETTISON: Through the chair, when you say  
16 you were told that it's on the desk of the prosecutor,  
17 that means an investigation was done, that means we've  
18 submitted a warrant request for it to be over there, and  
19 that the prosecutor is making a determination as to what  
20 will occur next. So I'm going to ask for Deputy Chief  
21 Williams to get some more of your information now so that  
22 we can follow up with you. We'll make a phone call over to  
23 the prosecutor's office so that you can get a status  
24 update to the best of our ability. Now I can't make the  
25 prosecutor do anything because I'm not her boss, but I

1 will get you an update.

2 MS. REGINA MCBRIDE: That I understand. But we  
3 need to go to what is the next step. Because it has been a  
4 long time. And I have not got no response. Getting the run  
5 around to this person and that person. Well no by looking  
6 into it. It is kind of frustrating and we cannot get  
7 nobody looking into it. So I was like you know, that's it.

8 CHIEF TODD BETTISON: Deputy Chief Williams is in the  
9 back waiting for you.

10 MR. WOODS: Next speaker.

11 MINISTER ERIC BLOUNT: Good evening board. I'm  
12 Minister Eric Blount from Sacred Heart Catholic Church,  
13 right here in Detroit. Chief Bettison, I want to tell you  
14 to your face, I've had many criticisms for you, but I want  
15 to say to your face, I want to thank you for supporting  
16 Tracy Allen and her lawsuit against the city. To be shot  
17 five times when she did everything that the police officer  
18 asked her to do and yet she lived. God has a witness. But  
19 let's be fully transparent. When you talk about suspending  
20 officers with or without pay, how many times does that  
21 really happen? How many times do officers actually serve  
22 their full suspension, and without pay, for how long? And  
23 if they are terminated, are they still allowed to be  
24 employed as a law enforcement agent somewhere, else within  
25 the state, within the city, within the nation? Because

1 true punishment corrects behavior, but the lack of  
2 punishment just reinforces bad behavior. Just this week a  
3 Chicago judge ordered the release of body-worn camera  
4 footage for what national law enforcement was lying about.  
5 We don't want to go there to have a judge demand DPD  
6 release body-worn camera footage. So again, we ask, we  
7 beg, we demand, that body-worn camera footage be released  
8 within at least seven days, so that we will know what's  
9 really happening, and it cannot be tampered with. And so  
10 yes, at my church, I am sponsoring a seminar this Monday  
11 at 6 o'clock that simply says this: you see us, we see  
12 you. Thank you.

13 MR. WOODS: Thank you. Next speaker.

14 MS. UNDERWOOD: Thank you, Mr Chair. Our next  
15 speaker will be Mr. Smith and Caleb Smith and Miss Bonita  
16 Davis.

17 MR. SMITH: Good afternoon. Jahdante Smith, for  
18 the record. Do not worry, you're going to be just like me.  
19 I got two of them, it ain't just one. I'm going to use  
20 four minutes, so my son, I'm using his time as well.  
21 Parliamentarian, you have to kill me, but I'm using four  
22 minutes. You cannot stop me. So there's a DDC incident  
23 where a young lady was turned around and she had a  
24 boyfriend outside who had a firearm. She was turned  
25 around, she's in the parking lot, she was forced to leave

1 outside of DDC, and she was chased immediately when she  
2 got back in her vehicle by her angry boyfriend, chased her  
3 to her sister's house and fired shots at the vehicle.  
4 That's a travesty, right? That man could have been locked  
5 up right there on the spot, and he was not. That needs to  
6 be changed. There were 35 deaths in the three-month span  
7 in just District 3 from September to December 2025. I see  
8 Little Peace, Passion Mo over there. The (inaudible) zone.  
9 We got to do better than that. That's \$750,000, which I  
10 helped y'all get. That's a lot of money to get. Through  
11 the chair, as you all like to say, through the chair. That  
12 is a lot of money to get. And not pass out to the people  
13 who helped get the money and not be doing a good job with  
14 it. 35 deaths just in one district is egregious. Also,  
15 anyway, the amount of abandoned homes that are in District  
16 3 needs to be addressed as well. Those are open to  
17 trespass and able to be bodies to be dumped. Also, I grew  
18 up with Michael. I used to play basketball with Michael.  
19 Went to middle school and high school with Michael. I'm  
20 going to be very involved in that case. I'm going to come  
21 to everybody. I'm going to be very involved in it. Also, I  
22 want to know if Conrad Mallett is going to remain the  
23 attorney on this board because there is an \$80,000 budget  
24 on this board, if not more, because of the fact that we  
25 shouldn't have corporation Counsel. It's a conflict of

1 interest. I cannot represent officers and then advise the  
2 board of elected officials who are individual citizens,  
3 who, in turn, hold those same officers accountable. I  
4 can't play plaintiff attorney and attorney for prosecutor.  
5 He is literally a prosecutor as well. So if we keep doing  
6 that, I'm going to find a way. I'm going to sue the city.  
7 No problem. I just send other people to talk for me. I  
8 won't be able to talk, I'll send other people to talk for  
9 me. Also, I see you Mr. Williams. Gloria Height. You faked  
10 her signature on your nominating petitions for District 2.  
11 I do have a lawsuit right now in my possession. It's not  
12 with me right here. It's at the house, but I'm going to  
13 bring it and I'm going to have it for the proof. So that's  
14 my first two minutes. I'm going to go with my second two  
15 minutes.

16 MS. UNDERWOOD: Thank you, Mr. Smith.

17 MR. SMITH: Caleb is my son, so I'm going to use  
18 his two minutes too.

19 MR. WOODS: Thank you.

20 MS. UNDERWOOD: Mr. Smith, could you please let  
21 Miss Davis come up. Next speaker.

22 BENITA DAVIS: My name is Benita. I'm from the  
23 east side. I always come to the meetings. I'm kind of  
24 fairly new here, but I always say now that we're in the  
25 church, I have to hold the pastors accountable. The

1 pastors that are out of order. I only think it's the ones  
2 that's not following the Constitution, which is a valid  
3 international agreement between the states and the people.  
4 So you cannot invoke a 1963 Michigan Constitution, which  
5 is for fictional things, and enforce it on the people and  
6 don't be honest with them about the information. So again,  
7 this mother's coming in here. She's crying for justice.  
8 I've been here the last two Thursdays. She still hasn't  
9 gotten any answers. There's other cases as well, but until  
10 we follow the law and stop trying to reinvent history,  
11 then everything—we wouldn't have any complaints. We're  
12 adults here. We have to act like it. Like you said, nobody  
13 is above the law. Universal law. We're talking about  
14 corporate law. We got the Great Seal and the Seal of  
15 Michigan State Seal. And then we got the scales of  
16 justice. It's simple, everybody's an alumni of this  
17 General Board of Education. Can't put your heads together  
18 and figure out what common law is instead of arguing back  
19 and forth playing false gods, with these false corporate  
20 titles. Until we follow the law of the land, Mother  
21 Nature, you're always going to have men fighting, playing  
22 the role of God. Now that's law.

23 MR. WOODS: Next speaker.

24 MS. UNDERWOOD: Thank you, Mr. Chair. Our next  
25 three speakers will be J.G. Love, Terry Jones, and Pastor

1 Mo. Then we'll go into Zoom.

2 J.G. LOVE: How you doing, my friend? Good  
3 evening to the Chair and the honorable Board of Police  
4 Commissioners, the Chief of Police, Todd Bettison, his  
5 officers, and those members of this great church for  
6 having us here tonight. This is an open meeting of the  
7 Board of Police Commissioners. So I'm from District 5, and  
8 I come here tonight representing the newly elected Renata  
9 Miller of District 5. We have some things that we'd like  
10 to say, but I know time is of the essence, so I'll be  
11 brief. I want to say to Chief Bettison, thank you so much.  
12 Thank you so much. This past week there was a drug bust in  
13 the 8300 block of East Jefferson, two doors from where I  
14 live at. That's in the Gold Coast community, right on the  
15 river. 1,000 grams of cocaine. 69 grams of fentanyl. 1,975  
16 grams of marijuana. \$105,000 in cash. This is a vertical  
17 block. I call high-rises vertical block for a reason.  
18 Every single floor has 20, some up to 25 units on a floor.  
19 Tell me that's not a block if it's 15 floors. That's a  
20 block. This was one individual with this kind of  
21 narcotics. He was supplying that particular building not  
22 all up and down Jefferson, just that building and the  
23 complaints were everywhere. Your narcotics team did an  
24 outstanding job, Chief. An outstanding job and we want to  
25 thank you for that. Councilmember Miller is committed to

1 unprecedented collaboration with your department, and you  
2 will see that. Thank you so much.

3 MR. WOODS: Thank you very kindly. Next speaker.  
4 How you doing?

5 TERRY JONES: My name is Terry Jones. I'm in the  
6 9th Precinct area. I've been trying to reach you for a  
7 month. Nobody would give me your number. The 9th Precinct  
8 came to my house at (inaudible). My house been defrauded.  
9 I had Lieutenant Curtis pull his gun out on me inside of  
10 my house. I have officers at the 9th Precinct talk to me  
11 like I was scum. Lieutenant Curtis tried to lock me up in  
12 the 9th Precinct. I would like him suspended without pay.  
13 I want the whole police station at the 9th Precinct  
14 reassigned. I want new officers there. I want them  
15 officers to be accountable for everything they have done  
16 to me. I'm out of my house right now through defraud.  
17 Can't get no police reports done by them. Can't get  
18 nothing done by the 5th Precinct. I deal with Oakland  
19 County. I know all the lieutenants and all the sergeants.  
20 You call them right now they'll tell you about me. They'll  
21 back me up on everything I say. I need to get your number.  
22 I need that 9th Precinct to get their act straight because  
23 these officers running lights. They run lights. I have  
24 seen them run lights. I have seen the officer come in  
25 stores talk to people like they ain't nothing. Time out

1 for that. I'm 52 years old. I've been in the city since I  
2 was born. I've been jumped on by police before they got  
3 this body cam. I'm not saying all Detroit police bad. You  
4 got to deal with the 9th Precinct. Get rid of them bad  
5 apples over there. Even the 5th Precinct, I got a ticket.  
6 Officer told me; if I catch you driving anything, I'm  
7 taking it. I looked at this man, I am 52. I was 51 at that  
8 time. This man is half my age. Young dude.

9 MR. MORRIS: Mr. Jones, when did the lieutenant  
10 pull the gun on you? What date was that when he put the  
11 gun on you?

12 TERRY JONES: It happened around about June of  
13 2024.

14 MR. MORRIS: And you never made a report or  
15 contact it?

16 TERRY JONES: I contacted everybody. Nobody  
17 wants to help me. I'm tired.

18 MR. MORRIS: What can we do to have that looked  
19 in to?

20 MR. WOODS: The chief about to address it.

21 MR. MORRIS: Okay.

22 MR. WOODS: The chief about to address it. And  
23 then Mr. Boman. Commissioner Boman.

24 CHIEF TODD BETTISON: Through the chair, I definitely  
25 have Deputy Chief Arnold Williams in the back. He's over

1 the entire east side, so that's every precinct on the east  
2 side. So that is number 9, number 5 and number 3. He is  
3 standing there. You so can give him your information and  
4 you also have the Office of the Chief Investigator, police  
5 oversight. Chief Investigator Warfield will ensure that  
6 somebody takes the complaint as well. So we will look into  
7 it. She is standing there with her computer so she will be  
8 able to take your complaint. So we will look into it and  
9 we will be able to take it from there.

10 MR. TERRY JONES: Okay. Because, like I said,  
11 they do not want to do no reports there. I seen it. I deal  
12 with Oakland County Sheriffs

13 MR. WOODS: Deputy Chief, can you report back to  
14 the board via email as expeditiously as in terms of when  
15 you look at everything and report back to the board via  
16 email, in terms of your findings on this. And we can have  
17 a investigator take your complaint as well. Thank you god  
18 bless.

19 TERRY JONES: Thank you.

20 MR. WOODS: Thank you. Next speaker. I think it's  
21 Pastor Mo.

22 MS. UNDERWOOD: Yes sir.

23 PASTOR MO: Good evening, everybody.

24 MR. WOODS: Good evening.

25 PASTOR MO: To Commissioner, bless you, to my

1 Chief, to Pastor Forsythe, to the people of the 11th  
2 Precinct, I greet you. I'm Pastor Maurice Hardwic, Pastor  
3 Mo. It really amazes me. People talk about \$700,000, talk  
4 about the 70 kids I just took home at the Farwell Rec  
5 Center. We just spent 70 burgers out of our pocket.  
6 Discuss that money. We bought 70 pairs of gym shoes we buy  
7 these kids with their report cards last week out of our  
8 pocket. Y'all want to talk about money. Let's talk about  
9 the phone call I got from Captain Hampton today about a  
10 young man who got shot in the face. That's out of my zone  
11 and I still went and prayed with their mother today and  
12 their family and ministered to them today. That's out of  
13 my budget. Let's talk about every call over here, that is  
14 (inaudible) on those 33 murders. 35.

15 MR. WOODS: Speak to the commission.

16 PASTOR MO: It ain't about two of them.

17 (inaudible) These murders have been impulse murders.  
18 Discuss the fact that, impulse murder, first of all. They  
19 not structural. The gangs are partnered with us. The YN is  
20 are with us. (inaudible) I came here tonight to get the  
21 pastors to (inaudible) Monday for all the pastor to meet  
22 with me to pray about this district. So everybody on board  
23 They have been impulse. You cannot police impulse but  
24 guess what happened? There hasn't been one homicide of  
25 retaliation behind one of those murders. Nobody because we

1 at IP is on the block the same day they get shot. I ain't  
2 never seen you out there.

3 MR. WOODS: Speak to the chair. Point of order.  
4 No outbursts in here. Stop ourbursting and speak to the  
5 chair. Period. Point blank. Yes sir.

6 PASTOR MO: I do not want to hear you today. We  
7 have a meeting Monday. I'm calling all the pastors in this  
8 whole district. We are coming together to do a prayer  
9 strategy. We're going to do a peace rally over here, where  
10 it's most hot at. I got hit with four homicides on the  
11 first of August, on the first of November. Every first  
12 quarter I get hit. The Bible says this kind only comes out  
13 by fasting and prayer. We went on a fast on February the  
14 first. We have not had one murder in our zone in 12 days  
15 since that fast. This is spiritual warfare. The men and  
16 women of God, we ready to go. God bless y'all.

17 MR. WOODS: Thank you. I do want to recognize  
18 the great work that Pastor Mo has done in this community.  
19 I have been in this community with him, with families  
20 crying, paying for funerals, wrapping arms around folks, I  
21 am not a CVI holder here in this city, in any shape form  
22 or fashion. But because of his leadership and others in  
23 this community saving lives of young people, we must  
24 continue to lift that up and be a part of the solution and  
25 a part of the problem. So, thank you Pastor MO for your

1 leadership. Yeah it's all good, it's all good, it's all  
2 good. Next speaker.

3 MS. UNDERWOOD: Next speaker is Mr. Roo and  
4 then we will go into Zoom.

5 MR ROO: Okay. Nene is going to be in Detroit  
6 on the 20th, the 21st and the 22nd that tag is still on  
7 her mama, false bogus tag of suicide. Kenisha Coleman did  
8 not shoot herself. (inaudible) Now I'm saying that in  
9 front of everybody in here. The Chief is here. Assistant  
10 Chief, Deputy Chief, 11th Precinct put an arrest warrant  
11 request in for me for smacking a crack head across the  
12 neck, with the back of a meat cleaver, on my porch after  
13 he threatened to kill me. I sent them the video and they  
14 put a warrant request in at Wayne County Prosecutor's  
15 Office that was denied. That's Lieutenant Paul, Sergeant  
16 Greg (inaudible), and Detective Peyton. Now I'm sick of  
17 this stuff. I ain't broke no laws and committed no crime  
18 in a long time, and I am who I am. I'm getting ready to  
19 turn the whole city upside down. I already turned the city  
20 upside down. Now I'm going to make it shake because I can  
21 do it and now everybody will see it. Dennis Winfrey been  
22 cheating in elections for 15 years but I can only proof  
23 since 2020, 2021, 2022 and 2024. The president to primary  
24 now gave the information to number 47 President Donald  
25 Trump. I am the 93rd Precinct Republican delegate for the

1 state of Michigan. My Republican peers nominated me and  
2 voted me and be on executive republican committee for the  
3 state of Michigan. We going to have a meeting coming up.  
4 I'm about to blow the lid off all this corruption here in  
5 Detroit, Wayne County, and the state of Michigan and  
6 that's my word.

7 MR. WOODS: Next Speaker.

8 MS. UNDERWOOD: Thank you, Mr. Chair. Our next  
9 speaker will be former Commissioner William Davis and then  
10 after that will be Ms. Tara Brown.

11 WILLIAM DAVIS: Good evening. Can I be heard?

12 MR. WOODS: Yes, sir.

13 WILLIAM DAVIS: I'd like to let everybody know  
14 that Metro Detroit All PAC is having meetings on the  
15 second Friday of every month. It is the All PAC for  
16 community leaders and civil rights leaders along with law  
17 enforcement, state, federal, county, and various local  
18 police departments. Tomorrow, we have speakers from the  
19 ACLU Michigan and the Michigan Immigrant Rights Center to  
20 discuss legal rights and guidance around law enforcement  
21 agencies and immigrant enforcement. We do number of  
22 things. We hope to encourage cooperation and build  
23 bridges, you know, between communities and between various  
24 aspects of law enforcement. Hopefully before the end of  
25 the year we could have a meeting at Public Safety

1 Headquarters. I think that would be an excellent location.  
2 I figure I let the chief hear me suggest that now so he  
3 know. I think that we need to be doing more to build more  
4 cooperation and lower the temperature in Detroit. You  
5 know, far too often, we got too many people arguing,  
6 fighting, and we need to be... come together and standing up  
7 for each other, and doing a better job of doing what we  
8 should be doing. You know, being, you know, our neighbors,  
9 you know, being friends, being community support type  
10 people. You know, so there's a whole lot more we can and  
11 should be doing. Under my citizen leadership with the  
12 ALPAC and the Chief of Police from Dearborn, you know we  
13 hope to accomplish a number of things this year. Also, the  
14 Chief of Police of Dearborn, he was the first Arab-  
15 American that's on the MCO.

16 MR WOODS: Thank you. We will definitely be  
17 interested in talking about bringing the All-PAC meeting  
18 to Public Safety Headquarters and we definitely welcome  
19 the invite from Chief Shahin (Phonetic), who is a good  
20 friend. Some of my staff members attended the last All-PAC  
21 meeting, and we definitely want to continue to be engaged.  
22 Next speaker.

23 MS. UNDERWOOD Ms. Brown.

24 MS. TARA BROWN: Good evening, Commission. This  
25 is Tara Brown. I noticed Scott Benson and Mary Waters

1 started the meeting talking about defraud. Don't let them  
2 hang that on y'all. If somebody comes down there to make a  
3 complaint about defraud and they have evidence, take a  
4 police report. That's what the Detroit Police should do.  
5 What needs to happen is the next time there's a gala and  
6 Mary Waters and Scott Benson are attending it and Jocelyn  
7 Benson is there, they need to tell her to do something  
8 with her home girl Dana Nessel about prosecuting defraud,  
9 because that's why we still have deed fraud in Detroit,  
10 because the notary law is not being enforced. That's the  
11 first thing I want to say.

12 The second thing I want to say is maybe there needs  
13 to be some cutbacks and rearrangement of funds in the  
14 Detroit Police Department, because we have people coming  
15 in here complaining that their reports are not being taken  
16 seriously, that their missing children are not being  
17 investigated because there are not enough investigators  
18 working in the office. I mean, how many more times are we  
19 going to hear from Michael's mom? Because that has my  
20 attention. She has been here routinely. Now they're  
21 bringing grandma. Now I want answers, and I don't know any  
22 of these people. The other thing I want to bring up is  
23 Wednesday the Detroit Police Department's Unhoused Persons  
24 Response Team did a presentation for the Michigan Homeless  
25 Policy Council. Sergeant Whitfield and Captain Griffin

1 came in and gave a presentation, and they did an excellent  
2 job. And I just want to say; As contributors to that,  
3 Sergeant Whitfield, Commander Starks, and Lieutenant  
4 Hewitt helped with that, and they should definitely be  
5 recognized. That presentation needs to be presented in  
6 front of the Board of Police Commissioners, because they  
7 did an excellent job. It was very informative, lots of  
8 information, and that presentation was presented to the  
9 State of Michigan. I do believe there will be a recording  
10 on the Michigan Homeless Policy website. If there's not, I  
11 will ask that it be put up there, because it was very  
12 informative and a very good presentation. Thank you so  
13 much.

14 MS. UNDERWOOD: Our last speaker is Roosevelt  
15 Lawrence.

16 MR. WOODS: Next speaker?

17 MR. ROOSEVELT LAWRENCE: Good afternoon. Thank  
18 you for this opportunity. If you can hear me. My name is  
19 Roosevelt Lawrence. And I am a resident of the City of  
20 Detroit, retired law enforcement from Detroit after 31  
21 years of service. I am currently a Detroit police  
22 chaplain, where I volunteer as a police chaplain in the  
23 11th Precinct. I want to say good evening. I haven't had  
24 an opportunity to sit in on police commission meetings in  
25 a while, but I will make it a point to do so moving

1 forward. Good evening, Chief Bettison and to your  
2 executive team, especially the neighborhood Police  
3 Officers group. They do an excellent job in the 11th  
4 Precinct and in the community. That's all I have. Thank  
5 you very much and please remember to always pray.

6 MR WOODS: Thank you very kindly. That's the  
7 last speaker. There are no presentations to the board.  
8 Let's go to the report of the Board Secretary.

9 MS. GARNIER: Through the chair, if I at first  
10 may, first, recognize that we did have members of the BOPC  
11 Youth Advisory Panel here tonight: Christopher Plummer  
12 (phonetic) and Hezekiah Bailey. I believe Christopher had  
13 to leave. Oh I am sorry. Yes.

14 MR WOODS: Let's give them a hand. Stand up  
15 young man. Thank you.

16 MS. GARNIER: Through the chair, there was  
17 another member that left as well, Alex Escotto (phonetic)  
18 from the Youth Advisory Panel.

19 MR WOODS: Let's give him a hand in his absence.  
20 Send it to him. All right.

21 MS. GARNIER: Theresa has something else.

22 MS. BLOSSOM: I apologize. Through the chair,  
23 we actually had five Youth Advisory Panel members here  
24 tonight. The others have left.

25 MR. WOODS:: Give them a hand too. Through the

1 chair. I will be thankful when I do no have this gavel.  
2 Last year we did a scholarship for the youngsters, and  
3 Chief Warfield and myself funded that out of our own  
4 personal pocket in fact Commissioner Dewan contributed as  
5 well. I would like to continue to challenge and encourage  
6 this board to come together and possibly do another  
7 scholarship this year for these youngsters, and stuff.  
8 Especially the ones who are going to college or are in  
9 college. Go ahead, Madam Secretary.

10 MS. GARNIER: Commissioners, under Tab 6 you  
11 will find the reports as listed. The weekly reports  
12 together with the committee assignments are also in hard  
13 copy to follow up the electronic message that was sent  
14 earlier this week. Also the other items are incoming  
15 communications that will come up for action at subsequent  
16 meetings. The announcements for today are as follows: The  
17 next board meeting will be next Thursday, February 19th,  
18 3:00 p.m. at Detroit Public Safety Headquarters. For  
19 March, the community meeting will be Thursday, March 12th  
20 at 6:30 p.m. in the 10th Precinct, in which we will be at  
21 the Helen Moore Community Center located at 11825 Dexter  
22 Avenue and that is the report for this evening sir.

23 MR. WOODS: Thank you very kindly. Let's go to  
24 unfinished business. We don't have any unfinished  
25 business.

1 MS. CAMILLE: Through the chair, I have two  
2 items to follow up on the business. There is a lawsuit  
3 report that Corporation Counsel was putting together for  
4 the board. Madam Secretary, do you know the status of  
5 that? We haven't received it on incoming correspondence.

6 MS. GARNIER: The communication from Corporation  
7 Counsel is not in yet. Corporation Counsel is still  
8 revising that to include the information he spoke to at  
9 the last meeting regarding the column of defendants'  
10 names. And with the understanding that it will be reviewed  
11 monthly?

12 MS. CAMILLE: Monthly.

13 MS. GARNIER: Monthly. Corporation Counsel is  
14 not here tonight. The last meeting he was also before the  
15 City Council so we hope by the beginning of the week we  
16 will have an update and that the report will be in next  
17 week's incoming communication.

18 MS. CAMILLE: Thank you, Madam Secretary.  
19 Through the chair and then the other item I want to follow  
20 up on about a month ago now DC Parish reported the  
21 outcomes of the gas station body-worn camera audit. Has  
22 that been received by our office? That we were supposed to  
23 get, as a board, the details to that report. Has that come  
24 in yet, or?

25 MS. GARNIER: To my knowledge we have not

1 received that yet. Okay. We'll reconcile tomorrow morning.  
2 Because we have a smart sheet going back and forth, so  
3 we'll reconcile in the morning, and I'll update you  
4 tomorrow.

5 MS. CAMILLE: Thank you. Thank you.

6 MR. WOODS: Yes, it's unfinished business?

7 MR. MORRIS: No, it's not.

8 MR. WOODS: Okay, we're still on the unfinished  
9 business. We're gonna go to new business after that. New  
10 business, any new business. You got new business?

11 MR BOMAN: Yeah, I do.

12 MR. WOODS: All right, go ahead.

13 COMMISSIONER BOMAN: Yeah, I'd like to make a  
14 motion and I'm gonna read as follows how I wish to have it  
15 worded. The motion is that I move that the Board of Police  
16 Commissioners direct that all correspondence intended for,  
17 impacting, or addressed to the board be promptly  
18 distributed by the initial recipient to each individual  
19 commissioner in full, without omission.

20 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: Second that motion.

21 MR. WOODS: What do that mean. Motion made by  
22 Commissioner Boman and seconded by Commissioner Camille.  
23 Any discussion? You got a question. Okay, go ahead.

24 MR. BOMAN: I was going to speak to the motion.

25 MR. WOODS: Okay. Yeah.

1 MR. BOMAN: There's been a lot of talk about  
2 certain things, and then sometimes we'll get emails that  
3 apparently the chair or other members of the board have  
4 gotten without the rest of us receiving that. And then  
5 often we find out late. Eventually, we usually do get that  
6 information. I say most of the time, everything's fine,  
7 and we get all our information. But I have heard  
8 complaints from other commissioners that they find out  
9 about communications that are only going to some  
10 commissioners, not all of them. And we just need to be  
11 more transparent with each other to carry out business as  
12 a unified board. Thank you.

13 MR. WOODS: Yes, sir.

14 MR. MORRIS: I'm glad Commissioner Boman brought  
15 that up, because that's exactly what I was getting ready  
16 to touch on. Madam Secretary, I've been waiting and  
17 working with you for over a week now for you to advocate  
18 on our behalf, to make sure that when things take place in  
19 our district, that we are notified. A lot of times we're  
20 notified through social media, through the media. We're in  
21 the dark about a lot of stuff that's going on in our  
22 district, and I've asked you and we went back and forth  
23 about this about doing something with the department, so  
24 we're notified when things occur in real time. I mean, I'm  
25 sitting up here in the dark right now. I've noticed this

1 woman has been here a few times, Michael's mom, about  
2 what's going on with her situation. I don't know what  
3 happened to Michael. I don't know who's the investigator,  
4 who's supposed to be handling his case, what  
5 communications he had with them, if he dropped the ball,  
6 or if they're expecting something that he just can't  
7 provide. I don't know nothing. I'm in the dark. But I'll  
8 tell you one thing, we don't look at situations like that,  
9 and I don't want a parent or a mother or somebody in my  
10 district to experience and go through what they're going  
11 through, crying out for justice. When things happen in our  
12 district, as an elected commissioner, we should be  
13 notified in real time. We shouldn't have to see it through  
14 social media and through other parties. We should be  
15 notified in real time.

16 MR. WOODS: Let me say this, if I may. Are you  
17 finished making your point, And before I can clarify.

18 MR. MORRIS: I've been trying to make my point  
19 to Madam Secretary for over a week now.

20 MR. WOODS: Okay, but.

21 MR. MORRIS: Where are we at with that?

22 MR. WOODS: Let me say this, Commissioner. That  
23 situation – we're not the Detroit Police Department. We're  
24 the Board of Police Commissioners. We do not handle  
25 criminal investigations.

1 MR. MORRIS: I'm not trying to investigate.

2 MR. WOODS: But let me finish. We don't handle  
3 criminal investigations in no shape, form, or fashion.

4 MR. MORRIS: Fight for the people.

5 MR. WOODS: But—

6 MR. MORRIS: But I need to know what's going on  
7 in my district to fight for the people. I'm not a sellout.  
8 I'm out of here.

9 MR. WOODS: Have a nice day. We do not  
10 investigate criminal cases in no shape, form, or fashion.  
11 We do not. We get alerts on our telephones, if anyone has,  
12 or emails. You know, so the fact of the matter is is that  
13 we're not the police. We are the Board of Police  
14 Commissioners. And we do not handle no criminal  
15 investigations. Period. Point blank. Period. Point blank.  
16 You know, so we're not gonna have this narrative out here  
17 as if we handle criminal cases. That is absolutely wrong  
18 and false. We need to read the Charter of the City of  
19 Detroit. And we need to be able to understand the roles  
20 and the responsibility of a police commissioner. If  
21 someone have problems with services that they're getting  
22 or not getting, then they can file a complaint with the  
23 Office of Chief Investigator, and they investigate those  
24 cases, and we review those cases. In times when we can  
25 make some interventions and make calls and try to bridge

1 the gap between the community and the department, then we  
2 do that. You know, and so when we talk about these emails,  
3 and we were in the middle of a motion and we were  
4 discussing the motion. The motion was made by – you want  
5 some more discussion?

6 MS. CARTER: I do have something to say through  
7 the chair. I just want to say that it's unfair to put all  
8 of that on the board secretary.

9 MR. WOODS: Absolutely.

10 MS. CARTER: I think that she has a big job, a  
11 huge job, trying to satisfy eleven personalities, as well  
12 as put together a weekly meeting with the limited staff  
13 that she has. We're not City Council; we don't have a  
14 bunch of staff members. Each of us don't have staff  
15 members to put all–

16 MR. WOODS: You're out of order. Excuse me,  
17 you're out of order. Please do not use obscenities in this  
18 meeting. Do not use obscenities in these meetings. And  
19 quit running around in these meetings. This is the Board  
20 of Police Commissioners. You got to have discipline here.  
21 This is a public meeting, and everyone trying to hear, and  
22 you keep and continue to be disruptive in these meetings,  
23 sir. Yeah, you are– I feel threatened by what you're  
24 saying, what you're saying that. Okay, thank you. I feel  
25 threatened. Yeah, go ahead.

1 MS. CARTER: I'm sorry, I just wanted to say  
2 that- put that on the record. Thank you, sir.

3 MS. CAMILLE: Through the Chair?

4 MR. WOODS: Yes.

5 MS. CAMILLE: I know, Mr. Chair, that you  
6 mentioned that we're getting notifications on our phones.  
7 I just want to make sure, because perhaps you're not  
8 aware, the new commissioners haven't been getting those  
9 yet. I do believe there were some conversations today that  
10 is remedying that. And we're being updated on some  
11 additional devices, so hopefully we will get those real-  
12 time notifications starting either this evening or  
13 tomorrow, and we'll be certain to follow up if that does  
14 not happen. But if the existing commissioners were getting  
15 it, the new commissioners have not been getting it.

16 MR. WOODS: Yes, we will be getting that  
17 notification and control and if that need to be remedy, it  
18 can be remedied. I think the board secretary wants to  
19 speak.

20 MS. GARNIER: If I may. I have been in  
21 communication with Chief of Staff together with DC Hayes,  
22 and we're working feverishly to get this done. We will be  
23 calling each board member, again, tomorrow to make certain  
24 the numbers that are given to DPD leadership to receive  
25 those notifications. As far as the communications that

1 come to the BOPC inbox, the process has been that those  
2 communications are forwarded to the board member or board  
3 members that are specifically addressed on those  
4 communications. At which time, any commissioner or  
5 commissioners choose to have that forwarded on to other  
6 commissioners, staff has done so and as you know, if the  
7 board decides differently and directs us to do  
8 differently, we will so follow.

9 MS. CAMILLE: Through the chair, additional  
10 discussion, since it seems like we're going back to the  
11 discussion about the motion that's on the table. And so I  
12 think the motion that is being put forward today  
13 clarifies, if adopted, the expectation that even if other  
14 commissioners – if it's not directly addressed to all  
15 commissioners, but if other commissioners are CC'd, or if  
16 the matter involves the full board, then the expectation  
17 is that whoever received that communication forwards it to  
18 the rest of the commissioners so that we're all informed  
19 timely. Since we operate collectively on decisions that we  
20 make at this table, so that's why I support the motion. I  
21 don't know if there's additional discussion about it.  
22 Certainly, open to that.

23 MS. WATTS: Through the Chair.

24 MR. WOODS: Yes.

25 MS. WATTS: Just for clarification– thank you

1 for that, Commissioner Camille. So, the motion is if  
2 something is addressed to all of the Board of Police  
3 Commissioners, or if a commissioner receives a  
4 communication that another commissioner is referenced,  
5 that's what the motion is? Because in that case I would  
6 support it, but if a communication come in to a particular  
7 commissioner, with no one else's name mentioned, I would  
8 say that leaves it up to the commissioner to spread it out  
9 to everyone else. I just wanted clarification.

10 MS. CAMILLE: Through the chair, it may make  
11 sense to have the motion repeated so that we all can be  
12 clear about the language. Is that okay?

13 MR. WOODS: Yeah, yeah.

14 MR. BOMAN: Sure, I will repeat it. I have it  
15 that; I move that the Board of Police Commissioners direct  
16 that all correspondence intended for, addressed to, or  
17 impacting the board, be promptly distributed by the  
18 initial recipient to each individual commissioner in full,  
19 without omission.

20 MS. WATTS: "Impacting" could be through-the-  
21 chair interpretation, but go ahead. I don't want to  
22 belabor this because I know we're about to close.

23 MR. WOODS: Yep, if no further discussion, I'll  
24 call for the question. All in favor- yep, you got  
25 discussion, go ahead.

1 MR. BOMAN: If that word is going to sink the  
2 motion, then I would be willing to accept a motion to  
3 amend the part about "impacting." I'd rather have the  
4 move pass without it.

5 MS. WATTS: Through the chair. No, it wouldn't  
6 impact my vote.

7 MR. BOMAN: In that case, we can move forward.

8 MR. WOODS: I'm going to call the question. All  
9 in favor say aye. Anyone opposed say no,

10 BOARD: Aye.

11 BOARD: No.

12 MR. WOODS: Roll call.

13 MS. CAMILLE: Through the chair, was that a vote  
14 to call the question? That wasn't a vote on the motion,  
15 right?

16 MR. WOODS: That's what I'm calling the  
17 question.

18 MS. CAMILLE: I don't know that everyone was  
19 clear that that was the vote to call the question.

20 MR. WOODS: All right, we just. All in favor of  
21 the motion say aye.

22 BOARD: Aye.

23 MR. WOODS: All the ones opposed say no.

24 BOARD: No.

25 MR. WOODS: The no's have it. What is the

1 pleasure of the board?

2 MS. CARTER: Move for adjournment, sir.

3 MR. WOODS: A motion to adjourn by Commissioner  
4 Carter. Anyone seconded?

5 MR. JONES: Support.

6 MR. WOODS: Supported by Commissioner Jones. Any  
7 discussion? All in favor say aye.

8 BOARD: Aye. Aye.

9 CHAIRPERSON: Anyone opposed? The motion is  
10 carried. This meeting is adjourned.

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
