4 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELESCHE: Good afternoon,
5 everyone. Thank you for being here. Today is Thursday,
6 January 29th, and you're at the Board of Police
7 Commissioners meeting. And I would like to get started.

8 We may have a quorum. Okay. We have a quorum,
9 so, I'm going to call the meeting to order. And we have
10 the invocation today that is going to be given by Chaplain
11 Troy Dantzler. Did I pronounce that right?

12 CHAPLAIN: Yes, ma'am.

13 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELESCHE: Okay. Great.

14 Thank you, sir. If you may, please.

15 CHAPLAIN: Jeremiah 33:3 records.

16 Call to me, and I will answer you, tell you great and
17 hidden things that you have not known. Father God, we are
18 calling you this afternoon, calling you with open hearts,
19 calling you with open minds, praying for a spirit of
20 excellence. Father God, we know you are not the author of
21 confusion. We thank you right now, Father God, for these
22 men and women of blue, for your word recourse. Blessed
23 are the peacemakers.

24 We thank you for this community right here,
25 Father God. This is not a room of a big eye and a little

1 you, so in all our getting, Father God, we pray for an
2 understanding. It is in our Father's name that we touch,
3 agree, and pray, and say amen.

4 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Amen. Thank you so
5 much, Chaplain. At this time, I'll ask the Secretary to
6 do a roll call, please.

7 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Dewaelsche?

8 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Present.

9 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Woods?

10 MR. WOODS: Present.

11 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Camille?

12 MS. CAMILLE: Present.

13 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Ivey?

14 MS. IVEY: Present.

15 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Carter?

16 MS. CARTER: Here.

17 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Jones?

18 MR. JONES: Present.

19 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Morris?

20 MR. MORRIS: Present.

21 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Watts?

22 MS. WATTS: Here.

23 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Williams?

24 MR. WILLIAMS: Present.

25 MS. GARNIER: Nine present, Madam Chair.

1 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you. At this
2 time, we'll ask for an approval of today's January 29th
3 agenda. Before we have a motion, I believe, Mr. Woods?

4 MR. WOODS: Madam Secretary, I would like to
5 make a motion to move the closed session before the Chief
6 of Police report, due to a scheduling conflict. I have to
7 catch a flight. I don't want to be able to --

8 MS. GARNIER: Madam Chair, Vice Chair Woods,
9 speak into the mic, please.

10 MR. WOODS: All right. Yeah, I'm sorry.

11 Thank you.

12 Making a motion to move the closed session
13 before the Chief of Police report.

14 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay. So, the motion
15 is to move the closed session, which is under New
16 Business, Section 8, up to before the Chief of Police
17 report, which would be then number 3, Section 3.

18 The motion has been made by Commissioner Woods, seconded
19 by Commissioner Jones. Is there any discussion?

20 All in favor indicate by saying, aye.

21 THE BOARD: Aye.

22 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Opposed? The motion
23 carries. Thank you. Next, we have approval of the
24 minutes for January 22nd, 2026.

25 MS. CAMILLE: Madam Chair, point of information.

1 I'm sorry, did we just vote to approve the adjustment of
2 the agenda or for the whole agenda? Because I had a
3 question about the agenda as well.

4 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: You're right, we moved
5 to approve an amendment to the agenda. But I believe once
6 we have that amendment, that is the agenda. So, unless
7 I'm, maybe Corporation Counsel, can you help with that?
8 We just made an amendment to the agenda and we approved
9 it. Another motion for the agenda? Okay.

10 So let me do that and then when we get to the
11 discussion. Is that where you want to indicate? Okay.
12 So now, let me go back and ask that we approve the agenda
13 as amended for January 29th. Is there a motion?

14 MR. JONES: So moved.

15 MS. WATTS: Second.

16 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: It's been moved by
17 Commissioner Jones. Seconded by Commissioner Watts.

18 MS. CAMILLE: Point of information, Madam Chair.

19 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Yes.

20 MS. CAMILLE: If there's unfinished business
21 items that are not captured on the agenda right now, do we
22 need to amend the agenda to add those? Or is it okay to
23 just bring them up at unfinished business?

24 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Madam Secretary, I
25 think we can just bring them up, correct?

1 MS. GARNIER: I believe so, unless Corporate
2 Counsel has -- I received no unfinished business items
3 prior to the meeting to place on the agenda or to be on
4 the agenda.

5 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Right. So just as we
6 add new business items, unfinished business would be the
7 same. So, you can bring them up.

8 MS. CAMILLE: Thank you, Madam Chair.

9 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Yes. Any other
10 questions before I call for the question? All right.
11 Hearing none. All those in favor indicate by saying, aye.

12 THE BOARD: Aye.

13 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Opposed? The motion
14 carries. The amended agenda is approved. And I just want
15 the record to reflect that Commissioner Boman has joined
16 us.

17 All right. Now we're down to -- I'm sorry.
18 Madam Secretary, did we approve the minutes of January
19 22nd? Okay. So, back up to approval of the minutes for
20 January 22nd, 2026.

21 MR. WOODS: So moved.

22 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: All right.

23 It's been moved by Commissioner Woods.

24 MS. CAMILLE: Motion to amend, Madam Chair.

25 I have two amendments to the minutes.

1 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay. Wait.

2 Okay. That'll come under discussion.

3 All right.

4 It's been seconded by Commissioner Jones.

5 Any discussion?

6 MS. CAMILLE: Madam Chair, I have two motions
7 for the minutes. I move to amend the statements
8 Commissioner Camille inquired about non-personnel
9 expenditure funds. And, if DPD goes through, and this is,
10 I'm sorry, this is under item 9A. I move to amend the
11 statement; Commissioner Camille inquired about non-
12 personnel expenditure funds. And if DPD goes through city
13 procurement when spending those funds to instead state,
14 Commissioner Camille inquired about non-personnel
15 expenditure funds. And if DPD goes through city
16 procurement and the CEOX process when spending those
17 funds.

18 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Madam Secretary, do you
19 have -- did you take a note of that?

20 MS. GARNIER: Madam Chair, no, I,
21 hopefully, it's -- is that the same --

22 MS. CAMILLE: I submitted inquiry prior.
23 I didn't submit any language. This is, the only added
24 words here are, and the CEOX process. Those four words.

25 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay. So that's

1 amendment one that you're recommending. And you have a
2 second one?

3 MS. CAMILLE: Yes. Should we vote on that one
4 or do you want to --

5 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHÉ: I have a question.
6 We're approving the minutes. Do we have to make a new
7 motion for the amendment of the minutes? Or are we just
8 correcting, are we correcting those minutes? Is asking,
9 so we have to do that twice because she has two. Okay.
10 So, the motion has been made and seconded to approve the
11 minutes.

12 MR. MALLETT: Okay. So now she's making an
13 amendment to the motion that's on the floor. So, let's go
14 through the exercise of voting on the amendment so we can
15 finally vote on the minutes.

16 MR. WOODS: I second the motion for the
17 amendment to the minutes with the necessary corrections.

18 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHÉ: Okay.
19 It's been moved by Commissioner Woods.

20 MR. WOODS: Second.

21 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHÉ: And seconded.

22 MR. JONES: Second by me.

23 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHÉ: The motion was made by
24 Commissioner Camille. Seconded by Commissioner Woods. Is
25 there any discussion? All in favor indicate by saying,

1 aye.

2 THE BOARD: Aye.

3 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHE: Opposed?

4 Okay. That motion carries.

5 Now, your second.

6 MS. CAMILLE: Thank you. And then the second
7 amendment, Madam Chair, in that same section 9A, where it
8 states Commissioner Camille inquired about an expenditure
9 in July in the amount of \$703.56, and if that expenditure
10 was for the gun range at Rouge Park to also add the
11 statement and requested that DPD provide the date that
12 they ceased testing explosives in the area.

13 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHE: Okay. A motion has
14 been made. Is there a second?

15 MS. WATTS: Second.

16 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHE: It's been seconded by
17 Commissioner Watts. Is there any discussion?

18 MS. GARNIER: Okay. Madam Secretary.

19 MS. GARNIER: Madam Chair, I'm still unclear,
20 but if it's approved by the board that the transcript
21 record what the motion to amend is, because it's slightly
22 different than what was sent earlier to amend and the
23 question that was tracked to get the response. So, if
24 that's approved by the board, rather than attempting to
25 rewrite in detail what Commissioner Camille has said,

1 because I'm unclear of the motion. What is being amended?

2 MS. CAMILLE: Madam Chair, I can clarify what
3 the added language is.

4 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Commissioner, go ahead.

5 MS. CAMILLE: The added language is and
6 requested that DPD provide the date that they ceased
7 testing explosives in the area. The added language.

8 MS. GARNIER: As the transcript was reviewed,
9 the response from DC Bliss was that there was no testing
10 of explosives. So, I'm unclear of a date certain.

11 However, I just need clarification on the amendments of
12 the minutes that the question was asked and what was
13 responded to if we are going to capture that.

14 MS. CAMILLE: Madam Chair, this is why it's
15 important for us to capture this because while DC Bliss
16 did indicate that he was not aware of any explosives being
17 tested, we then had a discussion back and forth and that
18 included, also, Commissioner Ivey, that we are aware of
19 that having happened previously and DC Bliss indicated
20 that he would go back and look into it. So that's an
21 outstanding item that the board is waiting for a response
22 on for DC Bliss' research to find out what was occurring
23 and the date that it ceased. So, I do want to make sure
24 that that's captured and that it's something that we'll
25 find out about.

1 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Yes. And we did
2 consult with the parliamentarian and what she indicated is
3 what we're doing exactly and that is you're making
4 amendments to the minutes so that it is reflected and we
5 will follow that recommendation of the parliamentarian.
6 So, what you need to do, Madam Secretary, is just record
7 exactly what Commissioner Camille is recommending as an
8 amendment to the minutes. Regardless of what the response
9 was from --

10 MS. GARNIER: Thank you. Okay.

11 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: DC Bliss.

12 All right. So, an amendment has been made.

13 Is there a second?

14 MR. WOOD: Seconded by Commissioner Watts.

15 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Commissioner Watts.

16 Oh, we were in discussion. All right. Any other further
17 discussion? Hearing none. All in favor indicate by
18 saying, aye.

19 THE BOARD: Aye.

20 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Opposed? Okay.

21 The motion carries.

22 Now we have the motion to approve the agenda --

23 I'm sorry.

24 The minutes with the amendments.

25 Do we have to make a new motion?

1 MR. WOODS: I move to approval of the minutes
2 with the necessary corrections, Madam Chair.

3 MR. JONES: I'll support that.

4 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: With the amendments.
5 Commissioner Woods made the motion and Commissioner Jones
6 seconded it. Is there any discussion? Hearing none.
7 All in favor indicate by saying, aye.

8 THE BOARD: Aye.

9 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Opposed? The motion
10 carries. Thank you.

11 Next, I'm going to ask the secretary to please
12 introduce the staff, the chief's office, elected
13 officials, representatives, and community leaders.

14 MS. GARNIER: Madam Chair, through the chair,
15 those persons attending today, Corporate Counsel Conrad
16 Mallett, Janya Underwood, Drew Freese, Felicia Tyson,
17 Armani Arnold, Mary Barber, Candace Hayes, Armechia Joshua,
18 Dior Mathis, Chief Investigator Jerome Warfield,
19 Supervising Investigator Elgin Murphy (phonetic). Court
20 reporter today is Megan Harder with Don Handyside Court
21 Reporting Audio Visual. Enrique Jackson, Jason Ganti for
22 Media Services. Our interpreters today are Stephanie
23 Beattie and Mr. -- thank you.

24 Deputy Chief Tiffany Stewart for Chief of
25 Police, Todd Bettison. Also registered at this time are

1 Frieder Butler with the Second Precinct Community
2 Relations. Marie Overall, Ron Thomas, DPOA Vice
3 President, Former Police Commissioner, William Davis, is
4 on Zoom (phonetic). And those are the persons registered
5 at this time.

6 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Thank you, Madam
7 Secretary. Under my report today, we have three
8 resolutions. And I'm going to ask Commissioner Carter if
9 she could read the first two resolutions.

10 MS. CARTER: Resolution honoring Detective Don
11 Dent, whereas Officer Dent joined the Detroit Police
12 Department on November 28th, 1994. After successfully
13 completing the Detroit Metropolitan Police Academy, he was
14 assigned to the Eighth Precinct. On June 14th, 1999, he
15 transitioned to headquarters surveillance, where he
16 participated in the apprehension of violent offenders and
17 the investigation of serious crimes, such as bank
18 robberies and other high-profile cases. And whereas, on
19 August the 7th, 2001, Officer Dent was assigned to the
20 Crime Scene Services. There, he showcased exceptional
21 skill in processing crime scenes, collecting and
22 documenting evidence and supporting investigators
23 citywide.

24 His professionalism extended to providing expert
25 testimony in court, demonstrating his deep expertise in

1 evidence handling and investigation. And whereas on
2 November 19th, 2002, Officer Dent joined the Special
3 Victims Unit Crime Abuse Section, dedicating himself to
4 protecting vulnerable children. He investigated cases
5 involving abuse, neglect, fatalities and missing children,
6 while also assisting the Homicide Section in cases
7 involving children who lost parents to violence. Beyond
8 his investigative work, he trained new detectives and
9 officers, led community initiatives during Child Abuse
10 Awareness Month, organized holiday programs for children
11 in need, and mentored youth through the Brotherhood and
12 Sisterhood Program.

13 And whereas Officer Dent was promoted to
14 detective on August 15th, 2014, continuing his service
15 within the Special Victims Unit Child Abuse. As the
16 department's liaison for Child Abuse matters, he
17 strengthened collaboration with the Wayne County
18 Prosecutor's Office. Throughout his distinguished career,
19 Detective Don Dent earned numerous awards and
20 accommodations, including MLB All-Star Game, Rosa Parks
21 Funeral Award, NFL Super Bowl 40 Award, Conclusion of
22 Consent Award, 2014 Ford Fireworks Award, and Confinement
23 Judgment Award. Therefore, be it resolved that the
24 Detroit Board of Police Commissioners hereby expresses its
25 deepest appreciation and gratitude to Detective Dent for

1 his 31 years of faithful and exemplary service to the
2 Detroit Police Department and the citizens of the City of
3 Detroit. His passionate dedication to law enforcement and
4 his many contributions to public safety for Detroit
5 residents merit our highest regards.

6 Madam Chair, I move for adoption of the
7 resolution.

8 MR. WOODS: Support.

9 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: It's been moved by
10 Commissioner Carter, supported by Commissioner Woods. Is
11 there any discussion? All in favor, indicate by saying,
12 aye.

13 THE BOARD: Aye.

14 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Opposed?

15 The motion carries. Thank you.

16 MS. CARTER: Thank you, Madam Chair.

17 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: The second resolution,
18 please.

19 MS. CARTER: Resolution honoring Detective Ben
20 Biddle. Whereas on January 6, 1997, Detective Biddle was
21 appointed to the Detroit Police Department. Upon
22 completion of the Detroit Metropolitan Police Academy,
23 Police Officer Ben Biddle's first assignment was the
24 Detroit Police Department's Fourth Precinct. On November
25 13th, 2000, Officer Biddle was assigned to child abuse.

1 Then, there, he was tasked with investigating
2 crimes against children and child deaths. Officer Biddle
3 was tasked with teaching the command staff and the Wayne
4 County Prosecutor's Office, along with the student police
5 officers, about child abuse and what is required of the
6 child abuse unit. And, whereas in 2003 and 2004, Officer
7 Biddle was chosen to represent the Detroit Police
8 Department Child Abuse Unit for the Governor's Task Force
9 on Children's Justice and Family Independence Agency,
10 assisting with writing forensic interviewing protocol for
11 the state of Michigan. And, whereas on August 15th, 2014,
12 Officer Biddle was recognized and officially promoted to
13 the rank of detective.

14 At his current assignment, Special Victims Unit
15 Child Abuse, he continued to excel, operating as the
16 Detroit Police Department's liaison for child abuse.
17 Bridging the gap to the Wayne County Child Protective
18 Services, Detective Biddle was a part of several programs,
19 such as Child Abuse Month, Adopt a Family, Trunk or Treat,
20 National Night Out, and the Brotherhood and Sisterhood
21 Program, mentoring young men and young women from the city
22 of Detroit. And, whereas, throughout his stellar career,
23 Detective Biddle was a recipient of the MLB All-Star Game
24 Award, Rosa Parks Funeral Award, Super Bowl NFL's 40th
25 Super Bowl Award, Conclusion of Confinement Award, 2014

1 Ford Fireworks Award, Conclusion of Consent Judgment
2 Award, two life-saving citation awards, Perfect Attendance
3 Award, numerous citations, letters of appreciation and
4 recommendation. Therefore, be it resolved that the
5 Detroit Board of Police Commissioners hereby expresses its
6 deepest appreciation and gratitude to Detective Biddle for
7 his 29 years of dedicated service to the citizens of the
8 city of Detroit. His passionate dedication to law
9 enforcement, and his many contributions to the public
10 safety for Detroit residents merit our highest regards.

11 Madam Chair, I move for adoption of the
12 resolution honoring Detective Biddle.

13 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: A motion is made.

14 MR. BOMAN: Second.

15 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Seconded by
16 Commissioner Boman. Is there any discussion?

17 All in favor indicate by saying, aye.

18 THE BOARD: Aye.

19 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Opposed?

20 The motion carries.

21 Thank you, Commissioner Carter.

22 MS. CARTER: Thank you.

23 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: We have a third
24 resolution that will be read by Commissioner Jones.

25 MR. JONES: Thank you, Madam Chair. This is a

1 resolution honoring Investigator Heath-Fisher. Whereas
2 Investigator Heath-Fisher was appointed to the Detroit
3 Police Department on January 17th, 1995. After successful
4 completion of the Detroit Metropolitan Police Academy, she
5 was assigned to the Sixth Precinct and fulfilled her
6 patrol assignments with diligence.

7 On September 9th, 1996, she worked in the
8 Personnel Services Division, and, whereas, on August 23rd,
9 1999, she was promoted to Investigator, assigned to the
10 Northwestern District Investigative Operations Unit. On
11 June 25, 2012, she was assigned to the Criminal
12 Investigations Unit, which is now known as the Detective
13 Bureau. And, whereas, during her career with the Detroit
14 Police Department, Investigator Heath-Fisher was a
15 recipient of numerous awards which included the Chief's
16 Merit Award, the 2014 Fireworks, I'm sorry, Ford Fireworks
17 Celebration Ribbon Award, the Conclusion of the Condition
18 of Confinement Consent Judgment Award, the NFL Super Bowl
19 40 Recognition Award, the Rosa Parks Funeral Recognition
20 Award, and the MLB All-Star Baseball Recognition Award.

21 Whereas, on Monday, February 2nd, 2026, with
22 more than 31 years of service, Investigator Glinda Heath-
23 Fisher, assigned to the Eight Precinct Investigative
24 Operations Unit, will be retiring from the Detroit Police
25 Department. Therefore, be it resolved that the Detroit

1 Board of Police Commissioners hereby express its deepest
2 appreciation and gratitude to Investigator Heath-Fisher
3 for her faithful and exemplary service to the Detroit
4 Police Department and the citizens of the City of Detroit.
5 Her passionate dedication to law enforcement and her many
6 contributions to public safety for Detroit residents merit
7 our highest regards.

8 Madam Chairwoman, I move that this resolution
9 honoring investigator Glinda Heath-Fisher be adopted.

10 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: A motion has been made
11 to adopt the resolution. Is there a second?

12 MR. WILLIAMS: Second.

13 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: It's been seconded by
14 Commissioner Williams. Is there any discussion? All in
15 favor indicate by saying, aye.

16 THE BOARD: Aye.

17 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Opposed?

18 The motion carries.

19 Thank you, Commissioner Jones.

20 And now we have moved up the new business. And
21 so, we're going to go into closed session pursuant to
22 Section 8(1)(a) of the Open Meetings Act, MCL 15.268(a),
23 the Department's request for the Board to consider
24 administrative leave without pay, but with the medical
25 benefits for Police Officer Yahaira Gomez, Badge 986,

1 assigned to Police Recruiting. And I am requesting a
2 motion to go into closed session.

3 MS. CAMILLE: So moved.

4 MR. JONES: Second.

5 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: It's been moved by
6 Commissioner Camille. Seconded by Commissioner Jones.
7 Any discussion? All in favor indicate by saying, aye.

8 THE BOARD: Aye.

9 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Opposed?

10 Okay. The motion carries.

11 We're in closed session.

12 Two-minute recess.

13 (At 3:25 p.m., off the record.)

14 (At 4:11 p.m., back on the record.)

15 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay.

16 I'm going to call the meeting back to order.

17 Can we please have a roll call, Madam Secretary?

18 Present.

19 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Dewaelsche?

20 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Present.

21 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Woods?

22 MR. WOODS: Present.

23 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Boman?

24 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Camille?

25 MS. CAMILLE: Present.

1 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Carter?
2 MS. CARTER: Here.
3 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Ivey?
4 MS. IVEY: Present.
5 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Jones?
6 MR. JONES: Present.
7 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Morris?
8 MR. MORRIS: Present.
9 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Watts?
10 MS. WATTS: Here.
11 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Williams?
12 MR. WILLIAMS: Present.
13 MS. GARNIER: Nine present, Madam Chair.
14 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: What is the pleasure of
15 the Board, please?
16 MS. CARTER: Madam Chair.
17 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Commissioner.
18 MS. CARTER: I'd like to move that we follow the
19 recommendation of Chief Bettison and place Officer Gomez
20 on administrative leave without pay but with medical
21 benefits.
22 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: A motion has been made.
23 Is there a second? Is there a second?
24 MS. IVEY: I second.
25 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: It's been seconded by

1 Commissioner Ivey. Is there any discussion?

2 I'm sorry, go ahead.

3 MR. BOMAN: I have a question. How -- what
4 level of discussion is really possible outside of closed
5 session?

6 MR. MALLETT: Very little.

7 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Right.

8 But nobody's saying anything. Okay.

9 All those in favor, indicate by saying, aye.

10 THE BOARD: Aye.

11 MR. MALLETT: Excuse me. Through the Chair, you
12 need to do a roll call. It's not clear.

13 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Okay. Madam Secretary.

14 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Woods.

15 MS. WOODS: No.

16 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Boman.

17 MR. BOMAN: No.

18 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Camille.

19 MS. CAMILLE: No.

20 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Carter.

21 MS. CARTER: Yes.

22 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Ivey.

23 MS. IVEY: Yes.

24 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Jones.

25 MR. JONES: Yes.

1 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Morris.
2 MR. MORRIS: No.
3 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Watts?
4 MS. WATTS: Yes.
5 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Williams?
6 MR. JONES: No.
7 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Dewaelsche?
8 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHÉ: Yes.
9 MS. GARNIER: Five nay votes. Five yay votes.
10 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHÉ: Corporation Counsel?
11 MR. MALLETT: I don't know.
12 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Madam Chair, if I may,
13 pursuant to the city charter, it would have to be a two-
14 thirds majority.
15 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHÉ: Okay.
16 So, the motion fails. Correct?
17 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Yes.
18 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHÉ: Okay.
19 Thank you everyone.
20 At this time, we're going to go to the Chief's
21 report. DC Tiffany Stewart.
22 MS. STEWART: Thank you.
23 Good morning, good morning.
24 I'm sorry, good afternoon.
25 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHÉ: Good afternoon.

1 MS. STEWART: I am Deputy Chief Tiffany Stewart,
2 and I am going to start out with crime stats for
3 1/28/2026. We're down 22 percent in homicides, 37 percent
4 in non-fatal shootings. 6 percent in robberies, 38
5 percent in carjackings. Our total part one violent crime
6 is actually a 5 percent increase. That comes about
7 because there is slight increases in sexual assaults and
8 aggravated assaults year over year for this time frame.

9 Moving on to significant events, I don't know if
10 you all had an opportunity to see the unsheltered
11 population response team was on Fox 2 News the other day.
12 They're a team of five members and a team of officers
13 assist the city's unsheltered population with finding
14 housing and providing them with essential clothing items
15 to donate clothing or essential items. Please reach out
16 to the unsheltered team or the public safety foundation.
17 You can email to drop off clothes here, Detroit Public
18 Safety Foundation. I know, at one point, they were
19 dropping off clothes for the community closet at the Sixth
20 Precinct as well. But the email address is
21 unshelteredpopulationresponseteam@detroitmi.com.

22 Great story. Again, if you had an opportunity,
23 a lot of those officers, they come out of their pockets
24 for a lot of the stuff. Anywhere that they can find to
25 ensure that people have housing available or shelter

1 available during this difficult time out here. Traffic
2 enforcement stats for the week, we are still in Precincts
3 9th, 10th, 11th, and 12th, doing traffic enforcement
4 operations. Officers conducted a total of 390 traffic
5 stops and issued over 1,000 tickets for moving violations,
6 as well as speeding tickets.

7 Search warrant recoveries. This week, in the
8 9th Precinct, we conducted two search warrants, one of
9 which recovered a gun and arrested a juvenile for an armed
10 robbery. Another search warrant and arrest was made for
11 assault with intent to murder. Domestic violence arrest
12 made and gun recovered this week in the 4th Precinct. A
13 husband and wife had an argument, and the husband offender
14 threatened the wife with a firearm. He was later charged
15 with firearms possession by a prohibited person and
16 felonious assault.

17 Going into community updates, I don't know, we
18 have procedural justice and police legitimacy forum coming
19 Saturday, March 7th. Stay tuned for that. I don't know
20 if you all, some of the new commissioners have had an
21 opportunity to go to a procedural justice forum. They are
22 wonderful, if I must say so myself.

23 If you have not availed yourself of the
24 opportunity to go and experience that initiative with the
25 community, I would certainly invite you. It is an all-day

1 affair; it's usually six hours at the location. We do
2 feed you because it's an all-day affair. But I think you
3 all would get a lot out of it and see some of the work
4 that we're doing in the community to try to provide
5 healing between law enforcement and members of the
6 community. Community members are encouraged to voice
7 community concerns and learn about the procedures police
8 use to accomplish their duties. The meeting will take
9 place on the 7th, Detroit Public Safety Headquarters.

10 And just a few recruiting updates for you.
11 Last week, Monday, as a matter of fact, we started a new
12 academy class of 30 student police officers. They began
13 the training academy. Monday, February 2nd, we'll be also
14 hiring professional staff such as office management
15 assistants and crime analysts. They'll be starting on
16 those days. And, for anyone interested in joining the
17 Detroit Police Department as an officer or a civilian
18 professional staff, visit joindetroitsfinest.org for
19 opportunities.

20 And that is the chief's report.

21 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you, DC.

22 Are there any questions?

23 Deputy Chief, go ahead.

24 MR. WILLIAMS: I got a question. It's not about
25 your report. My question to you, I see that city council

1 mentioned that they want to ban face masks, and I remember
2 in a meeting, a commissioner's meeting, a few years ago,
3 they spoke on the mask, and it was during the COVID era.
4 What is the policy for face masks and officers interacting
5 with the community? I want to know that, and I want to go
6 into something else concerning that as well. Because when
7 citizens need to make a complaint, I've been told, by
8 many, that they've been approached, jumped out on,
9 officers come up with their mask on and they're not
10 identifying themselves, nor do they know what the officers
11 look like. So how can they, you know, properly make a
12 complaint?

13 MS. STEWART: So, there is not a policy with
14 regard to face masks for Detroit Police Department.
15 Although, certainly, in this heightened time, we have
16 certainly had conversations with our officers regarding
17 face masks and not wearing them. We have had extended
18 conversations for any officers working in enforcement
19 duties, any officers in uniforms to not put masks on their
20 face at this point in time. We do not want to provide
21 unnecessary fear to the citizens. We want to be as
22 transparent as possible.

23 Their uniform should have their name and their
24 badge numbers on it, at all times. Citizens can request,
25 should an officer have their face mask on, have a face

1 mask on, citizens can request for them to pull it down, so
2 that they can see their face. And, certainly, they can
3 call any precinct, ask for the supervisor on the desk to
4 file a complaint or come to this board to file a
5 complaint, should an officer not pull their mask down and
6 provide their identity.

7 MR. WILLIAMS: And what about officers
8 ID'ing themselves? Because I've witnessed officers, from
9 afar, being asked by citizens to ID themselves by name or
10 badge number, and they will just look at them.

11 MS. WATTS: So, officers should be identifying
12 themselves upon citizens' request. They are required to
13 do that. For those officers who do not, again, they can
14 go through the complaint process. They can ask for a
15 supervisor on scene, to report to the scene, if that's
16 what they need to do. Officers should not be ignoring
17 them when requested to provide their name and their badge
18 number.

19 It should be on their uniforms, quite frankly.
20 All of our officers have to wear uniforms. It should be
21 on their outer garment, their name, as well as their badge
22 number. And, if it's not, please, let us know.

23 MR. WILLIAMS: Okay. And I just ask that for
24 understanding purposes. And also, the times that we live
25 in, there are a lot of CPL holders out there. And, let's

1 just say, you have an officer that jumps out on an
2 individual and he's fearing because they don't know that
3 that's the police right away. You get some guys jumping
4 out, face masks, what's your first reaction? Defense.

5 MS. STEWART: Understandable.

6 MR. REED: That's why I brung that up.

7 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Thank you,
8 Commissioner.

9 Commissioner Watts?

10 MS. WATTS: Yes, just to follow up on that, what
11 Commissioner Williams was saying. Say, if they're not
12 identifying themselves, is it easier, sometimes, to go
13 back and check their body camera? Because are they
14 required to have the body cam camera on at all times?

15 MS. STEWART: Through the Chair, yes,
16 Commissioner Watts, they are. They're having citizen
17 contact. There should be body camera footage of their
18 communication with said citizen. Again, they can
19 certainly go to any police precinct to make a complaint or
20 before this board. And we will certainly pull that body
21 worn camera footage and go through the disciplinary
22 process, if need be.

23 MS. WATTS: And you do track how many
24 occurrences when people don't have it on?

25 MS. STEWART: So, do we track occurrences when

1 they don't have it on?

2 MS. WATTS: Yes. Like when the camera should
3 have been on and it's not.

4 MS. WATTS: Oh, yeah, well. Yeah, yeah, yeah, I
5 believe we do that. DC Parrish? Are we tracking when
6 officers are not wearing their body worn camera footage?

7 MR. PARRISH: Yes, the Civil Rights Division
8 conducts audits and inspections on compliance with the
9 body worn camera policy, absolutely.

10 MS. WATTS: So, you said there's an audit?

11 MR. PARRISH: Yes, it's an audit to --

12 MS. WATTS: How often is that audit conducted?

13 MR. PARRISH: Civil Rights is always looking at
14 body worn camera, to be honest. How often the audits are
15 published, I would have to get back with you on that. I
16 want to say quarterly, but I'd like some grace to actually
17 look that up.

18 MS. WATTS: Okay. Great. Because I'd like to
19 see that and see, you know, I know everyone's supposed to
20 be having it turned on at all times, but just see the
21 gravity, just a measurable. You know, what that
22 percentage is, is it going up, what's your audit? What do
23 you find with that? Do you find a hundred percent of the
24 officers keep that camera on all the time, or is it 95
25 percent?

1 MR. PARRISH: It's been greater than 95 percent.
2 I want to say the last audit was around 97.2 percent, so
3 overwhelming compliance. But the officers do make
4 mistakes out in the field.

5 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: And, I would just add,
6 Commissioner Watts, that we also track that on the
7 complaints that we receive. And I know Commissioner, I
8 mean, OCI Chief is not here, but he could speak to that as
9 well.

10 MS. WATTS: Yeah, that's why I asked, because
11 that's great. He says 95 percent, and I know I just
12 started, probably not even a month, because my number so
13 far is different from his. But I've only been here a
14 month. Time will tell.

15 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: All right. Thank you.
16 Commissioner Ivey?

17 MS. IVEY: I'm sorry. Just for clarification.
18 I know we -- probably a dog chasing his tail, but aren't
19 those cameras supposed to be on once they leave the
20 station, until they return back to the station, or their
21 prospective precincts?

22 MS. STEWART: Through the Chair, no, the policy
23 dictates when they're having citizen interaction.

24 MS. IVEY: Okay. I just wanted to be clear,
25 because I was like I thought, but I'm glad you clarified

1 that for me.

2 MS. STEWART: Thank you.

3 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELESCHE: Thank you,
4 Commissioner. I'm not sure who was first, Commissioner
5 Morris and then Commissioner Camille.

6 MR. MORRIS: Just to be fair about it, for
7 clarity purposes, are there provisions put in place for
8 officer safety? Let's say, in the event that an officer
9 is working undercover, they come back to do a raid, and
10 then they have to keep their face closed, so that their
11 identity isn't exposed, so that the department can
12 continuously use them for future operations. Are there
13 any measures in place in an instance like that, where the
14 officer is not mandated to reveal their identity for
15 safety purposes?

16 MS. STEWART: So, through the Chair,
17 historically speaking, in that specific situation,
18 officers would come back with their mask on, but we just
19 really feel, in this heightened time of fear, and just
20 with other law enforcement, not having their mask, we just
21 don't want the unnecessary fear. So, we've asked, even
22 those officers, to take their masks off.

23 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELESCHE: Commissioner Camille.

24 MS. CAMILLE: Thank you, Madam Chair.

25 Just to follow up, and thank you, Commissioner

1 Watts, for raising the body-worn camera questions that you
2 did. Is it possible for the board to have a copy of the
3 policy and or the desk-level procedures for civil rights
4 on how they go about conducting those audits, how they
5 sample, how frequent? Is it possible for us to receive
6 that?

7 MS. STEWART: Through the Board, yes, I do
8 believe it's possible for you to receive that. If you
9 could just submit the question to the chief's office and
10 we'll get you what you're looking for.

11 MS. CAMILLE: Thank you.

12 Madam Secretary, could you please follow up on
13 that?

14 MS. GARNIER: We will, and we will also do our
15 best to pull, there was a presentation within the last
16 four or five months from civil rights. So, we will do our
17 best to try to pull that and send it out as soon as
18 possible, as well.

19 MS. CAMILLE: Thank you so much, Madam Chair.
20 I just have a few more items. I do want to just, to the
21 chief, commend Interim Commander Darshell Brown (phonetic)
22 out of the Second Precinct. Commissioner Williams and I
23 had an opportunity to get a tour of the precinct today.
24 It was a very good tour. That is my home precinct, and so
25 I know what the lobby looked like before the renovations.

1 And, you go in there and it's, like, okay,
2 what's going on in here? So, the renovations are coming
3 along nicely. We got a lot of good information and
4 looking forward to continuing to build relationships with
5 the precinct and between the officers and the community.
6 **A couple of questions just to follow up on some things. I**
7 **do have some constituents that reached out with concerns**
8 **regarding a man that was found dead in the area of**
9 **Majestic and Rangoon, and I know in our packets there's a**
10 **little bit of information about that. I didn't know if**
11 **the department had anything more to share.**

12 MS. STEWART: Through the Chair, unfortunately,
13 I'm not aware of the Majestic and Rangoon situation, so I
14 can't report out on that. But if there's any information
15 you would like regarding it, just please submit something
16 to the chief's office and we'll get an answer for you.

17 MS. CAMILLE: Okay. Thank you so much.

18 And then, I had a question in regards to
19 responses to shot spotter alerts. So, if there's a multi-
20 shot spotter incident, what is your protocol for how many
21 scout cars are typically sent out to canvass that area and
22 determine if there's something actually going on?

23 MS. STEWART: Through the Chair, I believe that
24 when you say multiple shots by area, explain that a little
25 bit more for me.

1 MS. CAMILLE: I'll do the best I can. It's
2 something that I read in the CCR. But I'm taking it that
3 a multi shot spotter incident is where an alert comes
4 indicating that there are multiple shots were heard in the
5 area.

6 MS. STEWART: Yeah, yeah, yeah. Sometimes that
7 happens, the shot spotter will pick up. It might be, if
8 this is what you're referring to, instead of two or three
9 shots, it might be 18 shots or something along those
10 lines. They'll still dispatch that one car out to that
11 area to look for any evidence related to bullet casings or
12 anything along those lines. That's just what they'll do,
13 it would just be one car. They're not going to tie up a
14 whole lot of cars, when they could just have one and just
15 have them out of service for a little bit longer. And
16 oftentimes that is due because of semi-automatic handguns.

17 MS. CAMILLE: Okay. Thank you so much for that
18 response. Through the Chair, a couple more, I'm sorry,
19 bear with me. So, is it the mobile field force that's
20 assigned to protests and other First Amendment activities
21 like marches and that?

22 MS. STEWART: Yes, it is.

23 MS. CAMILLE: Okay. Do they use their regular
24 department badge numbers or do they have some other type
25 of identifying number that they might be using?

1 MS. STEWART: No, they use their regular badge
2 numbers.

3 MS. CAMILLE: Okay. And, just like everyone
4 else, they're required to give their name and badge if the
5 public asks, right?

6 MS. STEWART: Yes.

7 MS. CAMILLE: Okay. Perfect. And then my next
8 question is about the Executive Protection Unit, which I
9 am most certainly not as familiar with. Do they adhere to
10 the same policies as your other units, or do they have
11 their own set of policies specific to their roles?

12 MS. WATTS: No, all police officers follow the
13 same rules and regulations, the same policies. Executive
14 protections are typically going to be assigned to chief of
15 police. So, they're certainly not wearing masks because
16 they're with him, if you will, but they are duty bound by
17 the same rules and regulations.

18 MS. CAMILLE: Do they wear badge numbers and
19 identification? Can you identify who they are by looking
20 at them? Or are their uniforms different?

21 MS. STEWART: So, I think it depends on the
22 chief's schedule. Oftentimes, they're in a uniform and
23 then oftentimes they're in suits. I think it just depends
24 on the chief's schedule, what's on his agenda for the day.

25 MS. CAMILLE: Okay. Thank you.

1 And, that's the same, because that unit's also
2 assigned to city council and other -- it's not just for
3 the chief, right?

4 MS. STEWART: So, yes, we have members assigned
5 to city council as well and also the mayor.

6 MS. CAMILLE: Okay. Thank you.

7 Last question, I promise. So, there's been a
8 lot of interest in wrongful convictions. And, of course,
9 we know Wayne County Prosecutor has a conviction integrity
10 unit looking into certain cases. And then some
11 individuals and families are pursuing their own course of
12 action. And, I would say it's probably safe to say that a
13 path to conviction starts with DPD's investigators, those
14 who are the detectives on the case, as well as the
15 supporting staff. What quality controls does DPD have in
16 place to make sure that your staff is adhering to policy
17 and preserving constitutional rights during questioning?

18 MS. STEWART: Through the Chair, so questioning
19 for offenders should be on video. That's one of your
20 policies; it can be reviewed at any given time once the
21 entire investigation package is presented to the Wayne
22 County Prosecutor's Office. Is there another portion of
23 your question?

24 MS. CAMILLE: So, then that's excellent that
25 they are on video. Is there any type of control mechanism

1 in place where, say, a supervisor is reviewing those at
2 random just to verify that everyone's following the rules
3 and that we're catching any type of missteps before
4 someone's down the path in court?

5 MS. STEWART: Thank you for that. So yes, there
6 is a supervisor assigned to every squad, every homicide
7 squad. When the warrant package goes over it, it does,
8 and it is reviewed by the commanding officer, your captain
9 or your commander over the homicide unit before it's
10 submitted to the Wayne County Prosecutor. Additionally,
11 at one point, the Wayne County Prosecutor's Office had a
12 space within this building, where the officers can apprise
13 them of the investigation as they're going along, so that,
14 quite frankly, the prosecutor's office can also ensure
15 that they're following the law constitutionally with
16 regard to the investigation.

17 MS. CAMILLE: Thank you.

18 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Thank you.

19 Any other questions?

20 MR. WILLIAMS: I just want to say this, through
21 the Chair, that me and Commissioner Camille, did go over
22 to the Second Precinct. But I also want to state and give
23 kudos out to the 12th Precinct, to Commander McCoy and
24 Captain Jones (phonetic), as I met with them Monday. And
25 we had a great conversation and expressed our views and

1 expectations. And they were very open and transparent
2 with me as I expressed to them how important it was for me
3 to build a relationship with my district, the city. And
4 when complaints are brought to me, that they will be
5 accessible and available to hear them.

6 MS. STEWART: I'm glad to hear.

7 MR. WILLIAMS: I just wanted to just put that on
8 the record. Sometimes you have to acknowledge these
9 officers for the work that they do. Sometimes, in these
10 meetings, we don't always do that. But I definitely want
11 to acknowledge them for making time to listen to my
12 concerns.

13 MS. CAMILLE: Thank you for that. I will
14 definitely pass along the positive vibe that you all have
15 given the Second Precinct and 12th precinct. I'm glad
16 that you like how the Second Precinct has turned out. It
17 has been a labor of love. It's been a lot of work. I
18 used to work in the building for a while, so I know how it
19 used to look too. And, that's been a labor of love over
20 there, so.

21 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you,
22 Commissioner. I missed Commissioner -- did you raise your
23 hand?

24 MS. WATTS: Yeah.

25 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Commissioner Watts and

1 then Commissioner Ivey.

2 MS. WATTS: I just want to say, also, I want to
3 thank all of the officers, especially the commander in
4 district five. We had a wonderful town hall meeting last
5 night with one of the council people. It was a huge
6 turnout. The chief came out as well.

7 And then, last week, we had three or four
8 engagements at senior citizens buildings. And your
9 officers was there, the NPOs and the commander. So, I
10 just want to say thank you to them. They're very keyed
11 in.

12 We're going to have a Valentine's theme for some
13 of them in a month. I donated to that, you know, and
14 that's all the officers chipping in their own money. And,
15 that's what I was amazed at, and the seniors are so
16 excited. So of course, I chipped in. So of course, they
17 said, we want your number. We've got lots of events.

18 But I just wanted to let you know that, and I
19 told the chief last night too, but they're very engaging
20 in the community. So, thank you for that.

21 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you.

22 Commissioner Ivey.

23 MS. IVEY: Thank you. Through the Chair, I
24 Just also to want to commend Commander Lever (phonetic)
25 over at the Eighth Precinct. Myself, and Commissioner

1 Morris, had the opportunity to go over there, during a
2 community meeting. I live in that district. I'm District
3 1 as well.

4 And he was right there after a whole hour and a
5 half of meeting with the citizens. Gave us a tour of the
6 precinct, which was an amazing tour. Met some of the new
7 officers, and they didn't bring me lunch, but it was okay.

8 But I want to also just say to the officers in
9 the city of Detroit, your job is hard. One bad apple does
10 not spoil the whole basket, right? I want to commend you
11 guys for putting your lives on the line every day when you
12 walk in the community to do the job that you do. It's not
13 an easy job, I know.

14 I have a child in service as well. And, to get
15 a call, not knowing if your child's going to come home or
16 get a call that something has happened, when they're out
17 there risking their lives in these streets to make them
18 safe, is very scary. So, I want to be the first to say,
19 well done. Keep up the good work.

20 Work with us commissioners, because we're here
21 to help and not hinder. We just want to see safe
22 communities. We want to see, you know, policing get
23 better. If it's already good, keep it good, and work with
24 us as we work with you.

25 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Thank you.

1 MS. IVEY: You're welcome.

2 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you.

3 Mr. Jones and then Commissioner Boman.

4 MR. JONES: Thank you, Madam Chair. I just
5 wanted to say, and Commissioner Ivey may have forgotten, I
6 was also at the 8th Precinct.

7 MS. IVEY: Yes, I do. Yes, you were.

8 All of us were there.

9 MR. JONES: Yeah, I was there. And, that being
10 the case, I live in the 8th Precinct, even though I serve
11 as an at-large commissioner. But it was outstanding. And
12 I just wanted to co-sign, but I was also at that meeting.

13 MS. IVEY: My apologies.

14 He was there.

15 MR. JONES: That's okay. Thank you.

16 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you.

17 Any other commissioners?

18 Commissioner Boman.

19 MR. BOWMAN: Well, I suppose you probably
20 have access to this. And it's something I probably could
21 have looked up, but it just came in my mind, and maybe you
22 could answer it. I know we have a policy of not
23 interacting, as far as, we're not being involved in an
24 assistance way or being a co-participant in the activities
25 of ICE. In the most recent situation, which a lot of

1 people kind of lump into the same category, but it's
2 actually not ICE. Apparently, it's a Border Patrol agent
3 involved in the death of Alex Pretti. And, I'm wondering,
4 does the policy that we have about non-involvement with
5 ICE, carry over to Border Patrol, or not?

6 MS. STEWART: It does.

7 MR. BOMAN: How broad does it go?

8 MS. STEWART: What do you mean?

9 As far as?

10 MR. BOMAN: It includes ICE, Border Patrol.

11 Is there anything else, or are those the two?

12 MS. STEWART: Those would be the two.

13 MR. BOMAN: Thank you.

14 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Any other? All right.

15 Thank you so much for that report and for
16 answering all of the many questions that we had. We
17 really appreciate it. Thank you. Next, we're going to be
18 going to oral communications and public comment.

19 And do we have our first speaker?

20 MS. UNDERWOOD: Thank you, Madam Chair.

21 Our first speaker will be Mr. Dana Lunn. After
22 Mr. Lunn, we'll go with Ms. Berdita Butler, and then Ms.
23 Williams (phonetic).

24 MR. LUNN: Good afternoon. I'm Mr. Lunn.

25 I did come down here for something else, but

1 after I was speaking with this young man -- I wanted to
2 get this young man's card. If so, I wanted to know who
3 the new attorney is for the city of Detroit.

4 MR. MALLETT: Excuse me, through the Chair, the
5 new attorney for the city of Detroit. I'm Conrad Mallett,
6 the Corporation Counsel for the city of Detroit.

7 MR. LUNN: That's on the fifth floor?

8 MR. MALLETT: Yes, sir.

9 MR. LUNN: May I have your number where I can
10 speak with you about the situation that I've been having
11 with the city of Detroit?

12 MR. MALLETT: Certainly.

13 MR. LUNN: That's about one of the things that I
14 wanted to get. And, what they were speaking on about the
15 officers, is there a sheet that they can give to the
16 public of what the officers can do when they walk up on
17 people that's not doing anything, that's just regular
18 walking? That -- what rights do we have as citizens, that
19 they can't just walk up on you and check you, even though
20 you're not doing anything?

21 MR. MALLETT: There's no sheet of the kind that
22 you're describing that comes from the law department.
23 I'll defer to the police department.

24 Do we have a citizen's rights booklet of some
25 sort?

1 MR. LUNN: Well, what I'm saying is, like, the
2 list of -- I'm saying, like, I wear these dark glasses
3 regardless, in the summer, and they can't just walk up on
4 a person because of the way he dresses. And, if they got
5 a mask on because of COVID-19 or something like that, and
6 they can't just check a person because of his appearance,
7 am I correct? And just make them put their hands up
8 against the wall and all that?

9 MR. MALETTL: Yeah. So, Mr. Lunn, maybe we
10 should take this offline so that we can understand the
11 nature of the problem that you're describing, because I'm
12 not --

13 MR. LUNN: Well, I was just, I didn't mean to
14 cut you off like that. I was just going by what the young
15 man was saying over there about the police officers
16 wearing masks, because I know several of them, they all
17 wear masks, and they won't pull their masks down. They're
18 the, not just Detroit, all officers around in Michigan,
19 they're acting like the ICE workers now. They're treating
20 people like trash. And I'm just saying.

21 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Through the Chair.

22 MR. MALLETT: Yeah. So, Mr. Lunn, the DC did
23 describe to you the circumstance that the Detroit Police
24 Department is operating in vis-a-vis the wearing of masks.
25 So, I don't know what other police departments are doing.

1 We are responsible here, as you know, for what DPD does.

2 MS. CARTER: Commissioner Camille.

3 Chair Dewaelsche had to leave so I'm going to
4 finish out the meeting. So, Commissioner Camille and --

5 MS. CAMILLE: Thank you, Madam Chair. It sounds
6 like, you said Mr. Lunn, is that what's your name?

7 MR. LUNN: Yeah, Lunn, L-U-N-N.

8 MS. CAMILLE: So, it sounds like you're looking
9 for some, like, know-your-rights resources. And there are
10 several entities in Michigan and throughout the country
11 that work to put these resources together for community
12 members. One that's very well-known is the ACLU, the
13 American Civil Liberties Union. They have some really
14 good know-your-rights information online.

15 And so, if you're going to be here afterwards, I
16 can assist you with locating that information. And there
17 are others online as well. But your request is not, it's
18 common, these days, where people are asking, like, how do
19 I find out what my rights are. And the ACLU is usually
20 pretty good about that.

21 MR. LUNN: Okay. Because I was just asking the
22 young lady, she's gone right now, about the Freedom
23 Information Act. But nobody never gives any answers.

24 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Deputy Chief, you can
25 go ahead.

1 MS. STEWART: I want to correct myself on the
2 record. I just been given a text. We do have a policy
3 related to masks. But it's the balaclava mask, and it's
4 for special response team or traffic in weather-related
5 conditions, when they're out there for an extended time,
6 weather-related conditions. Regular traffic stops or
7 anything along those lines, the officer should not have on
8 masks.

9 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you.

10 Sir, I'm going to suggest that you see
11 Commissioner Camille after the meeting, and also
12 Corporation Counsel Mallett. Thank you.

13 MR. LUNN: Okay. No problem.

14 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you.

15 Ms. Underwood, next speaker, please.

16 MS. WILLIAMS: Good afternoon, Commissioners.

17 THE BOARD: Good afternoon.

18 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: I'm no longer the
19 president of the Second Precinct. I am a community
20 activist, and I speak as a community activist. But I'm
21 asking all of us to wake up, Sleeping Giants, because we
22 do have power. The Pennsylvania governor stated that they
23 are prepared if the president decides to send ICE to his
24 state.

25 The president is going to send ICE to his state

1 and to Michigan, too. The president is responsible for
2 what happened in Minneapolis, and the people who committed
3 the murders might think they have total immunity. But the
4 president cannot pardon state crimes. I wonder how many
5 in Detroit have joined ICE. The bonus they are offering
6 to sign up is \$50,000.00.

7 One leader has already stated that the people
8 are here illegally. I've stated that before. They are
9 not illegally. ICE has detained off-duty black police
10 officers in Minneapolis and other black people because of
11 the color of their skin, and the Supreme Court has given
12 them permission to do that.

13 I have spoken to my African friends, warning
14 them to be careful. One African told me that this is the
15 United States, and my response, "learn the history of
16 blacks in this country and think." A Catholic priest
17 said, how do you say no to evil? Commissioners, how are
18 we, and our leaders, saying no to what's coming to
19 Detroit? And, I'm very concerned about the safety of all
20 of us, as I have addressed this, at least four times.

21 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you for your
22 comments.

23 MS. UNDERWOOD: Madam Chair, our next speaker
24 will be Ms. Williams, Ms. Michelle George, and Jimmy
25 McHurl.

1 Please state your name for the record.

2 MS. WILLIAMS: Sharnita Williams.

3 Can you hear me?

4 THE BOARD: Yes.

5 MS. WILLIAMS: Absolutely, this board was
6 started in 1974 for the citizens of Detroit because of the
7 corruption of the Detroit Police Department. So, when I
8 sit here, this meeting started at 3:00. All that you guys
9 have done is not for the citizens. So, the Chair got up
10 and left.

11 The bottom line is everybody play a position.
12 It's poison in this city. I cannot say every last police
13 officer, they dirty. Can't say that. So, you can't say
14 all ICE agents are dirty because you wouldn't know that.

15 But I do know that we have illegal immigrants on
16 the Detroit Police Department and ex-offenders. That's a
17 certain. Like the chief said, both of them, they see
18 everything they want to see through these green lights.
19 So, you all, City Council, Mayor paid \$5 million. It's
20 unacceptable. It's 12 precincts in the headquarters,
21 cameras all around, same officers that walked across the
22 stage receiving a badge with a fake name.

23 The bottom line is you cannot change the
24 Constitution. You can't change the laws. You might want
25 to believe you can. The same way people are complaining

1 about ICE, I'm upset about the Detroit Police Department.

2 The people who are running this city, they are
3 liars, all type of liars. They say, oh, this is not going
4 on. This is impossible. But you getting a cut back. You
5 sit up here, on these committees, and act like there's
6 nothing going on in this city, and it is.

7 When you continue to cover up illegal
8 activities, conspire to cover up illegal activities,
9 that's conspiracy. That's the bottom line. There's no
10 way in between. We have the Constitution. We have a
11 charter. It's the law.

12 Conrad has been sitting up here for how many
13 months? And I've been talking about --

14 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: That's your time.

15 Thank you.

16 MS. UNDERWOOD: Ms. Michelle George.

17 MS. GEORGE: Good afternoon to all the
18 commissioners, and I want to congratulate all the new
19 commissioners on the board, and also to Attorney Corporal
20 Mallett. You know I always want to say Judge, but
21 Mallett. So, I just want to say, just listening in,
22 because I know I haven't been here in a while, and my
23 heart does grieve because being a nurse, what happened to
24 Pretti, just broke my heart because I know how hard ICU
25 nurses work and what he did to lose his life. So that's

1 something is in my prayer that ICE will leave and will not
2 come here.

3 So, I can't comment on your situation, sir. I
4 would like to know what had happened to this gentleman,
5 but hopefully, what is happening around the country would
6 not embolden officers. I know the second police precinct
7 officers are wonderful officers. I know Chief Bettison is
8 a wonderful chief, and so we do support him.

9 So, as I listen, I know we've been busy in the
10 hospital, and I will give a report to this board because
11 there are a lot of infectious diseases that are out there
12 that I know police officers will come in contact with
13 while they are doing their work. One thing I would say
14 is, wash your hands and make sure the car is cleaned out
15 because I see what happens in the emergency department
16 when they bring patients in.

17 So, but I just want to say welcome to a lot of
18 the new commissioners, and we hope we can work together.
19 As I listen to see what the issues is, I can't comment on
20 too much because I have to know what is going on, what I
21 used to comment back on in the past. So, I just want to
22 say welcome. Thank you.

23 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you, and welcome
24 back. It's been a while.

25 MR. MCCAROL: Good afternoon.

1 THE BOARD: Good afternoon:

2 MR. MCCAROL: I'm just here to, it's going on,
3 it'll be two years, on the 13th of February. There's been
4 a complaint I filed in 2024. I got two claim numbers. I
5 got three OCI investigators involved. Patrick Townsend,
6 the lieutenant, James Warfield Sr. I think he's like the
7 commissioner of my district.

8 I don't even know what -- I live in the red
9 zone. 48205, that's the exit at the red zone at the 9th
10 precinct, right? Am I correct? I've been trying to get
11 closure.

12 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: I've heard --

13 MR. MCCAROL: I've been trying to get closure.

14 It's been almost two, it'll be two years, like I
15 said, February the 13th. I've been trying to get closure
16 for the incident that they did to me. They took my
17 weapons and destroyed my house. The warrant wasn't even
18 for me, and I got served at the precinct. But anyway, the
19 footage, FOIA, I appealed twice.

20 The state department, I mean, the state, the
21 Detroit police, I got the letters right here. It's your
22 emblem right here. Y'all denied me the footage. All of
23 them had body cams on. It wasn't just the police. It was
24 the state police, the Detroit Police Department, and the
25 feds.

1 The warrant wasn't even for me. Y'all came in,
2 destroyed my house, took my weapons, and it's two years
3 and running. I can't even go to court until this is
4 resolved. This case ain't even got nothing to do with me.
5 Explain this to me. I can't even get in the courtroom. I
6 can't even file a motion yet until y'all figure out what
7 happened.

8 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Sir, that's your time.

9 I'm going to ask that supervisor and
10 Investigator, please talk to the gentleman and is there
11 anybody from the department that wants to --

12 Commissioner, do you have a question?

13 MS. IVEY: Hi.

14 What's your name, again, darling?

15 MR. MCCAROL: Jimmy McCarol (phonetic).

16 MS. IVEY: Jimmy McCarrol, were you here --
17 didn't we --

18 MR. MCCAROL: Last week. Yes, I was.

19 MS. IVEY: Right. So, what was your resolve of
20 that?

21 MR. MCCAROL: Ms. Hunter contacted me and Ms.
22 Holmes didn't. And I talked to -- I talked to Ms. Smith.
23 I left a voicemail with Ms. Cox.

24 MS. IVEY: So have you been able to speak with
25 someone in person at all since --

1 MR. MCCAROL: I submitted everything that y'all
2 required by me by law. They got the emails, the videos,
3 all of that. It's proof that I did it. But until this
4 investigation is concluded, I can't go no further than
5 this.

6 MS. IVEY: Okay. Thank you.

7 MR. MCCAROL: You're welcome.

8 MS. IVEY: Madam Chair.

9 MS. WATTS: It was like Commissioner Ivey.
10 Someone was supposed to talk to him.

11 MR. MALLETT: Yeah, the supervisor walked
12 out with him.

13 MS. IVEY: But from a week ago.

14 It was supposed to be resolved then. So,
15 I'm wondering what's the feedback from a week ago that
16 this man has to come back again today with the same issue.
17 That's kind of bothering to me.

18 MR. MORRIS: Through the Chair, I believe he
19 mentioned a Townsend. So, I have a sheet of all the
20 officers and personnel out of 9th Precinct. I actually
21 know it by heart. The Townsend, I believe, was out of the
22 9th Precinct. That's who he said he spoke with. So, we
23 need to figure out what happened there and what Mr.
24 Townsend is doing to be able to help him address this
25 situation.

1 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Okay. If we could get
2 someone from the police department to speak with him as
3 well, that would be appreciated. Thank you.

4 Next speaker, please.

5 Thank you.

6 MS. UNDERWOOD: We have one speaker in Zoom.

7 Ms. Jawana (phonetic)

8 MS. JAWANA: Hello. Good afternoon.

9 THE BOARD: Good afternoon.

10 MS. JAWANA: I would like to say hello to
11 Commissioner Camille and also give her a shout out. I
12 appreciate everything that you're doing. I'm looking at
13 everything you're able to keep me informed with the
14 meetings, a lot of information. So, I definitely
15 appreciate that. And, as I always say, come here with
16 your boots on the ground. She's definitely doing that.
17 I'm glad that you went to the 2nd Precinct and had a
18 meeting with them.

19 So, I see that you're doing your thing and I
20 definitely appreciate it. And it's going to help me be a
21 better me, by how you're performing. So, I appreciate
22 that. And I think that's all I have. That's all I have.
23 Thank you for your time.

24 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you for your
25 comments.

1 MS. CAMILLE: Through the Chair.

2 Thank you, Ms. Jawana, and we'll talk soon.

3 MS. JAWANA: Yes, ma'am.

4 MS. UNDERWOOD: Madam Chair, that's your last
5 speaker.

6 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Wonderful.

7 Madam Secretary, your report.

8 MS. GARNIER: Through the Chair, if you would
9 note, please, under tab, I believe it's still marked 6,
10 even though we moved the closed session up. It's under
11 tab 6, should be. The reports, weekly reports. There's
12 also a memorandum from several commissioners. Noted
13 they're the same memorandum you should have as well from
14 last week.

15 The announcements for this week are next week,
16 3:00 p.m., here at Public Safety Headquarters, is the
17 weekly meeting. And the February community meeting is
18 Thursday, February 12th, 6:30 p.m. The location has now
19 been confirmed. In the 11th precinct, it will be at
20 Pleasant Grove Missionary Baptist Church, at 6:30 p.m., on
21 February 12th. That address is 13651 Dequindre Street,
22 Detroit, 48212. And those are the announcements and
23 report for today, Madam Chair.

24 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you, Madam Secretary.

25 Is there any unfinished business, Commissioners?

1 MS. CAMILLE: Madam Chair, I have a few
2 unfinished business items. I'm not aware of another
3 mechanism for the commissioners and the public to keep
4 track of these items, so just bear with me. I have a
5 couple things to follow up on. So, the first one is, last
6 week, DC Bliss and DC Haque (phonetic) did a really nice
7 job of giving a brief definition of CJIS. They offered a
8 more in-depth presentation for the board and the public.
9 Just wanted to check in with staff to provide an update on
10 coordinating that with the department, if we know when
11 that'll be scheduled or if that's still being worked on.

12 MS. GARNIER: Through the Chair, there are a
13 number of requests that have come through the chair during
14 public comment or from commissioners during this month
15 alone. Presently, we have, let me make sure, in excess of
16 40 requests. I and DC Parrish, together, with, I believe
17 I've spoken to DC Hayes, we're all working together to get
18 an update on the status. We work on them daily. Some
19 have been responded to; some were responded to during the
20 meetings. We will be able to give a more detailed update
21 next week on the exact status.

22 DC Parrish and I, just one example, have usually
23 talked weekly. Last week, we had a conversation on, yet
24 again, compiling the responses. I believe,
25 administratively, we will be making some proposals and

1 recommendations by the time the orientation, that has now
2 been delayed because of a conflict with the graduation
3 ceremony, on exactly how the board chooses, will go
4 forward choosing to report out on the responses. Clearly,
5 some information will be confidential, privileged, and so
6 we will consult where that is the case with corporate
7 counsel. But for that specific request, by Commissioner
8 Camille today, I do not have an update, but we will do our
9 best to, by this meeting time, next week, to have a more
10 detailed report and hopefully push out to the board, prior
11 to this meeting, so you'll have time to review it.

12 MS. CAMILLE: Thank you, through the Chair.
13 Thank you, Madam Secretary, and definitely appreciate the
14 volume of requests that you all are handling. So, thank
15 you for keeping track of those. The next one is, two
16 weeks ago, DC Parrish reported a very high compliance rate
17 of gas station body-worn camera audit that was conducted
18 by civil rights and also committed to provide the board
19 with more details about that audit. Do we have a status
20 on where that is for us to receive that, through the
21 Chair, to Madam Secretary, or is that one that's
22 outstanding to be looked into?

23 MS. GARNIER: That is one as well. In fact,
24 reading here, the over 40 that we have, I don't have
25 detailed information, and we are working towards to get it

1 in a form, a user-friendly format, if I may. The
2 procedure has been a little different, prior to January
3 1st, and so there are several things procedurally and
4 administratively, as you and I, and the Chair Dewaelsche,
5 have talked about. In the past, when the requests have
6 come forth from specific commissioners at the table, if I
7 may, at the board table, that is done administratively,
8 reporting back. Now, we have potentially asking that they
9 be publicly responded to, and so that is something, and in
10 what format, we will have to, it will begin to continue to
11 evolve, if I may use that. But detailed information on
12 those specific requests, I do not have it in front of me
13 this afternoon.

14 MS. CAMILLE: Thank you.

15 Thank you, Madam Secretary.

16 And then, Madam Chair, the last two are actually
17 for Corporation Counsel. So, through the Chair to
18 Corporation Counsel, do you have a status on the legal
19 opinion regarding DPD staff member that there was
20 questions about her eligibility to hold that office?

21 MR. MALLETT: I do.

22 In fact, we're talking about Ms. Mayberry.

23 MS. CAMILLE: Yes, sir.

24 MR. MALLETT: I distributed that to the chair
25 and to the chief today. I meant to send it to all of the

1 members, all of the BOPC, and I'll do that this evening.

2 MS. CAMILLE: Thank you so much, Corporation
3 Counsel. And then, the last question, just to circle
4 back, so after the meeting on the 15th, you provided us
5 with a sample of lawsuit report using some 2025 data.
6 We've had two weeks to take a look at that. It looks fine
7 to me, except for the fact that the defendants are not
8 listed on there, which is also publicly available
9 information. So just requesting that that can be added to
10 the report, and then if we can move forward with receiving
11 that report on some regular basis.

12 MR. MALLETT: So, Commissioner Camille, you and
13 I had this discussion, and we will put the names on the
14 report so we can discuss it during closed session, so that
15 you have it then, and when we discuss during closed
16 session, in most instances, I just want to remind the
17 Board of Police Commissioners that all we're going to have
18 is the plaintiff's complaint. In some instances, we will
19 not have the answer being supplied by the law department.
20 By definition, then, it's going to appear to be very
21 imbalanced, and so I just want to kind of present that
22 with the caveat, but we can certainly understand and go
23 over the cases as they come in, with the specific
24 objective that you described, to see whether or not, based
25 on the allegations made, there are policy adjustments that

1 the board might want to initiate. This would not be an
2 opportunity to examine discipline or anything like this,
3 this is for a very, very specific purpose associated with
4 the creation of policy, and so we need to understand that
5 that's why this particular closed session is going on.
6 The adjudication will not have occurred post-adjudication.
7 The regular processes will be in place, but yes, ma'am.
8 So, we can add that back in and get it scheduled.

9 MS. CAMILLE: Thank you, Corporation Counsel.
10 Through the Chair, just if I could clarify. So the report
11 will start to have the defendant's names on it, and then
12 if we want to discuss, because maybe we don't want to
13 discuss it, but if we do want to discuss it, we will go
14 into closed session to do that, and then some of them, as
15 on the report that you have, some of those have been
16 closed out, so there were settlements amount on them, and
17 then the ones that are still open, we won't have
18 settlement amounts until those get closed and we get a
19 future report that shows the settlement.

20 MR. MALLETT: That's correct.

21 MS. CAMILLE: Okay. Thank you so much.

22 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: In the regularity, did we
23 get an answer on that? Yes?

24 MR. MALLETT: So, what you have for you,
25 Commissioner Carter, when we did the initial run for

1 Commissioner Camille, I think, I can't remember the
2 number, I'm sure, Commissioner, you have it at your
3 fingertips. How many names are on that list?

4 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: No, I mean how often
5 will we get the report?

6 MR. MALLETT: Well, and so I was thinking
7 quarterly.

8 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Okay. Quarterly.

9 MS. CAMILLE: Quarterly? So, the original, I'm
10 trying to remember, the original request was for us to get
11 an updated report monthly?

12 MR. MALLETT: We can certainly do monthly.

13 MS. CAMILLE: Well, actually, the original
14 request was every two weeks, and then I think we talked
15 about it and we're comfortable with monthly.

16 MR. MALLETT: And, yeah, we can do monthly.

17 I don't think it's going to be that many, but we
18 can certainly do monthly. There may be some months,
19 Commissioner, where there'll be nothing that has been
20 considered by Detroit City Council, no active cases, which
21 obviously is a very, very good thing.

22 MS. CAMILLE: Thank you.

23 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you.

24 If there's no other business --

25 MS. WATTS: Madam Chair, just a quick one.

1 Just want to follow back up about the request.

2 Did I hear you correctly when you said we receive about 40
3 requests? That's since January, this month?

4 MS. GARNIER: The requests that have been made?

5 MS. WATTS: Yes.

6 MS. GARNIER: During the board meetings?

7 MS. WATTS: Uh-huh.

8 MS. GARNIER: Through the Chair, yes, ma'am.

9 MS. WATTS: From this body and the public?

10 MS. GARNIER: Yes, ma'am.

11 MS. WATTS: Okay. Thank you.

12 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Is there a motion for
13 adjournment?

14 MR. JONES: Second.

15 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Is there any discussion?

16 All in favor?

17 THE BOARD: Aye.

18 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Those opposed?

19 Meeting is adjourned. Thank you.

20 Thank you all.

21 (At 5:11 p.m., meeting adjourned)
