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M E E T I N G

CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Good afternoon. Thank you for joining us today. Today is February 5th. This is our Board of Police Commissioners meeting. We don't quite have a quorum yet, so I'm gonna begin by asking Commander Chaplin Greg Wilson to give the invocation.

COMMANDER WILSON: All right. Good afternoon to all the Board of Commissioners. Let's pray. Father, we first want to say thank you. Before we ask you to do anything, we want too thank you for all that you've done in our lives. Thank you for lighting us up in strength. Lord, now we ask that you give these commissioners the wisdom that they need, God.

We understand that all authority rests in your hands. Your word tells us that righteousness exalts a nation. So we ask that you now let your wisdom guide every decision made in this room. Grant the commissioners clarity of mind and integrity of heart and courage of conviction as they handle matters that affects families, neighborhoods, and even future generations. Let them hear not just the loudest voices, but those that are overlooked and forgotten. We give you all the glory, honor, and the praise. We

1 ask you to do this for us in the maximus name of Jesus
2 the Christ. Amen.

3 COMMISSIONERS: Amen.

4 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you, Chaplin.
5 Next, we're gonna go to oral communications and public
6 comment.

7 SECRETARY: We have a quorum now, Madam
8 Chairman.

9 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: I'm sorry?

10 PARLIAMENTARIAN: You have a quorum now.

11 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay. Thank you,
12 Madame Parliamentarian. We now have a quorum, so I'm
13 going to ask the secretary to do the roll call, please.

14 SECRETARY: Commissioner Dewaelsche?

15 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Present.

16 SECRETARY: Commissioner Boman?

17 COMMISSIONER BOMAN: Present.

18 SECRETARY: Commissioner Camille?

19 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: Present.

20 SECRETARY: Commissioner Ivey is excused.

21 Commissioner Jones?

22 COMMISSIONER JONES: Present.

23 SECRETARY: Commissioner Morris is excused at
24 this time. Commissioner Watts?

25 COMMISSIONER WATTS: Here.

1 SECRETARY: Commissioner Williams?

2 COMMISSIONER WILLIAMS: Present.

3 SECRETARY: Six present, Madame Chair.

4 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you, Madame
5 Secretary. And now I'd like to ask for approval of the
6 February 5th agenda. Is there a motion?

7 COMMISSIONER JONES: So moved, Madame Chair.

8 COMMISSIONER WATTS: I give support.

9 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: It's been moved by
10 Commissioner Jones and supported by Commissioner Watts.
11 Is there any discussion? All in favor indicate by
12 saying aye.

13 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

14 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Opposed? The motion
15 carries. Thank you. And now, could we get an approval
16 of the minutes from January 9, 2026?

17 COMMISSIONER JONES: So moved, Madame Chair.

18 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: It's been moved by
19 Commissioner Jones.

20 COMMISSIONER WILLIAMS: Second.

21 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Second by
22 Commissioner Williams. Any discussion? All in favor
23 indicate by saying aye.

24 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

25 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Opposed? The motion

1 carries. Thank you. We had a closed session and there
2 are minutes for January 22, 2026, regarding Katrina
3 Patillo. Is there a motion to approve?

4 COMMISSIONER JONES: So moved, Madame Chair.

5 COMMISSIONER WILLIAMS: Second.

6 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: It's been moved by
7 Commissioner Jones and seconded by Commissioner
8 Williams. Is there any discussion? All in favor
9 indicate by saying aye.

10 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

11 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Opposed? The motion
12 carries. Thank you. And there was another closed
13 session and we have minutes for January 29, 2026,
14 regarding Yahaira Gomez. And is there a motion to
15 approve?

16 COMMISSIONER JONES: So moved, Madame Chair.

17 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Motion has been made
18 by Commissioner Jones. Is there a second?

19 COMMISSIONER WILLIAMS: Second.

20 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Second by
21 Commissioner Williams. All those -- is there any
22 discussion? All those in favor indicate by saying aye.

23 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

24 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Opposed? The motion
25 carries, thank you. Now I'd like to ask the Madame

1 Secretary if she could do introductions of the staff,
2 Chief of Police, and elected officials and community
3 leaders.

4 SECRETARY: Madame Chair, present as of this
5 time, Madame Chair through the Chair, our
6 Parliamentarian, Dr. Frances Jackson, Teresa Blossom,
7 Candace Hayes, Dior Mathis, Armani Arnold, Artemisia
8 Joshua, Mary Barber, Drew Fries. We also have Chief
9 Investigator Warfield. Supervising Investigator Slone
10 is also present.

11 Our interpreters today are Dr. Beatty, as
12 well as Angelique Taylor. Court reporter from with
13 Hanson Reporting. Audio Visual, Enrique Jackson.
14 Charles Henry from Media Services. Deputy Chief
15 Michael Parish is here for Chief of Police office.
16 Marie Overall, Freyja Butler, Ron Thomas DPOA Vice
17 President. Former Commissioner William Davis is on
18 Zoom. Former Commissioner Ricardo Moore is via Zoom.
19 As well as Nicole Fischer, 4th Precinct Community
20 RELATIONS committee. Those are all that we have
21 registered at this time, Madame Chair.

22 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Okay. Thank you,
23 Madame Secretary. Under the BOPC Officers Report, we
24 have a resolution, and I'm gonna ask Commissioner Jones
25 if he would read that for us, please?

1 COMMISSIONER JONES: Thank you, Madame Chair.
2 This is a resolution honoring retired Sergeant William
3 Shine. Whereas, Officer William Shine joined the
4 Detroit Police Department on July 13, 1959. And upon
5 graduating --

6 SECRETARY: Commissioner Jones, I'm sorry to
7 interrupt, but we really need in the mic, please.

8 COMMISSIONER JONES: Thank you, ma'am.

9 SECRETARY: Thank you.

10 COMMISSIONER JONES: Can you hear me?

11 SECRETARY: Yes.

12 COMMISSIONER JONES: Thank you. I'll start.
13 This is a resolution honoring retired Sergeant William
14 Shine, and this is posthumous. Whereas Officer William
15 Shine joined the Detroit Police Department on July 13,
16 1959. And upon graduating from the Detroit
17 Metropolitan Police Academy was assigned to the 1st
18 Precinct. During his career Officer Shine served with
19 distinction in the Precinct Support Unit and the
20 Executive Protection Unit under Mayor Jerome Jerry
21 Cavanaugh.

22 And whereas on August the 20th, 1966 Officer
23 Shine was promoted to the rank of sergeant and was
24 assigned to the Tactile Operations Unit where he
25 continued to serve with dedication and professionalism

1 until his retirement on September 15th, 1981. And
2 whereas Sergeant William Shine's career reflected a
3 steadfast commitment to duty, public safety and the
4 highest traditions of the Detroit Police Department.
5 Retired Sergeant William Shine honorably served the
6 Detroit Police Department and the citizens of the city
7 of Detroit for more than 22 years.

8 And whereas on February the 4th, 2026 the
9 Family Advocate and Management Liaison for Engagement,
10 FAMLE, received notification of the passing of Retired
11 Sergeant William Shine. Therefore we have resolved
12 that the Detroit Board of Police Commissioners does
13 hereby honor and recognize retired Sergeant William
14 Shine for his 22 years of faithful and honorable
15 service to the Detroit Police Department and the
16 citizens of the city of Detroit.

17 Madame Chair, this concludes the reading of
18 the resolution and I move that it be approved.

19 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you. A motion
20 has been made by Mr. Jones. Is there a second?

21 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Second.

22 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: It's been seconded
23 by Commissioner Watts. Any discussion?

24 COMMISSIONER CARTER: No, Carter.

25 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: I'm sorry. Seconded

1 by Commissioner Carter. Any discussion? All in favor
2 indicate by saying aye.

3 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

4 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Opposed? Thank you.
5 The motion carries. And may the record reflect that
6 Commissioners Carter and Woods have joined us. Thank
7 you. Thank you Commissioner Jones. At this time we
8 have the Chief of Police Report which will be present
9 by Deputy Chief Michael Parish.

10 DC PARISH: Good afternoon, honorable Board.

11 COMMISSIONERS: Good afternoon.

12 DC PARISH: For the Chief of Police's report,
13 we'll begin with crime. For homicides, we are down 9
14 percent. For nonfatal shootings, we are down
15 26 percent. For robberies, we are down 9 percent. For
16 total Part 1 violent crimes, we are up 3 percent. For
17 carjackings, we are down 40 percent.

18 Turning to high visibility case closures.

19 Charges were brought in 2025 for a double homicide. On
20 March 11, 2025 Detroit police officers were dispatched
21 to a residence in the 8700 block of Desoto Street for a
22 reported dead person observed. On arrival, the
23 officers located two deceased persons in the basement
24 of the home. On January 27, 2026, Defendant Muhammad
25 Murphy was arrested by Yipsilanti Police Department in

1 connection with the homicides and turned over to the
2 Detroit Police Department. The Wayne County
3 Prosecutor's office charged the defendant with two
4 counts of first-degree premeditated murder in
5 connection to both homicides. So great work there.

6 Charges were brought also in a case involving
7 animal cruelty. On January 30, 2026 Detroit Police
8 Officers received information regarding a dog believed
9 to be deceased in the 1900 block of Eureka Street.
10 Upon arrival, the officers observed that the dog was
11 still alive and in need of urgent medical care. The
12 dog was transported to the veterinary hospital for
13 treatment for hypothermia, dehydration and emaciation.
14 Following an investigation by the Detroit Police
15 Department, the Wayne County Prosecutor's office
16 charged Defendant Darnel Robinson with killing and
17 torturing an animal and abandonment and cruelty to an
18 animal.

19 Turning to traffic enforcement. On January
20 25th through the 31st, the Traffic Enforcement Unit
21 conducted operations in the 2nd, 7th, 8th, and 11th
22 Precincts. Officers made 430 traffic stops, issuing a
23 total of 948 tickets for moving violations, and 117
24 tickets for speeding.

25 For narcotics enforcement from January 26th

1 through February 1st, Narcotics Unit executed several
2 search warrants making two felony arrests and 19
3 misdemeanor arrests. Officers recovered various
4 amounts of cocaine, marijuana pills, and 61.9 grams of
5 suspected fentanyl.

6 On the community front, there was the Cupid's
7 Bing go with the Chief. On Friday February 13th, 2026
8 Chief of Police Todd A. Bettison will be hosting
9 Cupid's Bingo with the Chief. Chief Bettison invites
10 seniors in the community for fun games of bingo with
11 the chief of police. The bingo will take place at the
12 Detroit Public Safety Headquarters in the Skylar room
13 from 12 o'clock to 3 o'clock p.m. Senior community
14 members will be able to enjoy free brunch, healthy
15 heart tips and prizes. Please RSVP by February 12,
16 2026, with Neighborhood Police Officer Deborah Matthews
17 at 313-500-5037.

18 The Department will be hosting a procedural
19 justice and police legitimacy forum on Saturday
20 March 7, 2026. Community members are encouraged to
21 voice their concerns and learn the procedures police
22 use to accomplish their duties. This community meeting
23 will be held at the City of Detroit Play Center at
24 19320 Van Dyke Avenue, Detroit, Michigan 48234 and this
25 will start at 9 o'clock a.m.

1 And I'll just note that we did have an
2 officer that was involved in a car accident recently,
3 but the member is off work attending physical therapy
4 and will be okay. That concludes the Chief's report,
5 Madame Chair.

6 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you, DC
7 Parish. Are there any questions for the -- regarding
8 the report? Commissioner?

9 COMMISSIONER BOMAN: Yeah. The summary that
10 you read. I'm looking, I have a bunch of documents in
11 a folder for Chief's report. And I have -- I
12 apologize, but of course I'm new at this. And got --
13 in my binder here also, I got a number of documents
14 that seem to be the same as what we got e-mailed to us.
15 I'm trying to -- the actual report that you delivered,
16 though, I'm having trouble locating it as far as having
17 a copy in print.

18 DC PARISH: These are notes that I'm reading
19 from. I don't believe that they're shared with the
20 board. They're notes prepared by the Office of the
21 Chief and they're added and subtracted from, all the
22 way up until the BOPC meeting.

23 COMMISSIONER BOMAN: Okay. Thank you.

24 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Any other questions?

25 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: Madame Chair?

1 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELESCHE: Go ahead,
2 Commissioner.

3 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: Thanks for the report,
4 Chief. And first I just want to commend AC Hayes,
5 Commander Sims, Captain -- what's it, Egg -- am I
6 pronouncing -- Edgars from the DDC. And then there was
7 another captain, as well, and I wasn't able to write
8 down her name as well.

9 DC PARISH: Captain Carter? Laurie Carter?

10 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: Captain Carter, yes.
11 Absolutely. So they gave several of us a tour of the
12 Detroit Detention Center this week. And I know I
13 personally learned a lot about the DDC and its
14 operations. And as we discussed while we were there,
15 I'm looking forward to some of the improvements that
16 the department is looking at, such as the
17 air-conditioning unit. Some updates, like
18 modernization of the space, as well as broadening the
19 meal options to include some options for vegetarians
20 and vegans for detainees while they're there. So thank
21 you for that. I look forward to hearing updates.
22 Madame Chair, I have a couple other items as well.

23 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELESCHE: Sure.

24 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: Chief, where can the
25 public get a download of the most recent COM Stat

1 reports? Is that available online somewhere?

2 DC PARISH: I don't believe our -- when you
3 say our COM Stat reports, are you talking about our
4 crime reports?

5 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: I'm not sure if
6 they're the reports that we get that get published on
7 the BOPC website, if that's the same information, or if
8 there's something specific from the COM Stat meetings
9 that is made available. Is that the case? Or no?

10 DC PARISH: So there are -- we have COM Stat
11 meetings and we have COM Stat slides that we use to
12 facilitate the meeting. Those are not posted publicly.
13 Then there are various, I suppose, you might call them
14 COM Stat reports. There are crime summaries and, you
15 know, crime reports. And I don't know if those are
16 published. They are not -- I can say that they are
17 shared with various groups, but I'm not sure if they
18 are actually published online. I can look into that
19 and get back to you.

20 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: Okay. Thank you so
21 much.

22 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: DC, if I could just
23 interject? At the community relations meetings at the
24 12th Precinct, I think we were, like, able to -- or
25 they provided us with copies of those kinds of reports.

1 I thought they were called COM Stat reports?

2 DC PARISH: I know that the reports are
3 shared. I don't want to confuse the COM Stat slides
4 that we use --

5 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHE: Okay.

6 DC PARISH: -- every two weeks with COM Stat
7 reports. That's why I'm being a little careful about
8 the terminology that we're using. I can definitely
9 look in to see. I know that we have various crime
10 reports. They're not -- I'm not sure that they're
11 publically available for download, but they're not
12 secret.

13 We do share them such as at community
14 meetings and other events, so I can look into getting
15 clarity on where exactly those reports are located. I
16 do know that open data portals also exist, but I'm not
17 sure. I've never worked on that side of the
18 department. But I can get more information and get
19 back to you.

20 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHE: Okay. Go ahead.

21 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: Thank you, Chief.
22 Thank you, Madame Chair. So also in our packets, we
23 get a report of members that have separated from the
24 department. And I was just wondering what happens to a
25 member's badge when they leave the department? Does

1 that badge ever get recycled? And if so, how long is
2 it left dormant before it gets recycled?

3 DC PARISH: Well, it definitely gets
4 recycled. How long it's left dormant depends on
5 hiring. Some people will request a specific badge
6 number. Others just will take the first one that's up.
7 How often they are exactly dormant before they're
8 recycled, again, depends on a lot of factors. I don't
9 have a good answer for you.

10 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: Okay. That's fine.
11 Thank you. Is it possible to get badges added to that
12 report? The pension numbers are there right now. I
13 don't know why we would need the pension numbers. But
14 I think the badge numbers are probably a bit more
15 relevant to us.

16 DC PARISH: I suppose badge numbers could be.
17 Although, I would caution the board, your pension
18 number is your unique identifier, not your badge
19 number. My badge number that I had when I was a police
20 officer is being worn on somebody else's chest as we
21 speak; same with my sergeant badge number and
22 lieutenant badge number. So the unique identifier, the
23 number that stays with you from beginning to end is
24 your pension number. So that's actually the preferred
25 number internally. I can check with HR about adding

1 the badge number, just know that those could be subject
2 to change with enough time.

3 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: Understood. Through
4 the Chair, I also noticed on the administrative
5 messages that there are two training opportunities
6 coming up for department members. So there's a four
7 hour resiliency mind body connection course for law
8 enforcement. And then there's an eight-hour mental
9 health first-aid training course.

10 Is there any way that as commissioners we may
11 be able to observe part of those courses or even
12 participate in those to understand better what officers
13 are getting as far as training on maintain their
14 composure in stressful situations and also addressing
15 mental health crisis?

16 DC PARISH: I don't see any reason why a
17 commissioner or two, or, you know, the entire body
18 would not be allowed to audit the course. So if you
19 give me the names of the individuals that are
20 interested in attending, I can let Captain Shell know
21 that they'll be stopping in.

22 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: That's awesome. Thank
23 you, Chief. And then the last thing I wanted to bring
24 forward and to my fellow commissioners -- we received
25 an e-mail about this, as well -- is a concern that came

1 up in the community. I would like to thank AC Hayes,
2 as well, for his responsiveness to the concerns that I
3 raised on behalf of Detroit residents regarding
4 suspicious, unmarked vehicles that were posted on
5 Monday near a school. The occupants of which claim to
6 be DPD. And then over time as we were getting more
7 information and looking into this, it was confirmed
8 that the one license plate obtained did not belong to
9 DPD. And the badge number that was quoted by the other
10 is not an active DPD badge that's currently being used.

11 And so it's deeply concerning for the
12 residents that reached out. I also gave Commissioner
13 Carter a heads up about that, because the school is
14 close to my district but it's actually in District 6.
15 So just a couple things regarding that. First I just
16 want to acknowledge the community organizations and
17 individuals that are standing up in these times. This
18 is seriously like neighborhood watch on steroids.

19 Folks are out there looking out for each
20 other. And I'm certainly praying for your safety out
21 there. Make sure that you're getting -- that you're in
22 community doing this type of work and that you're
23 getting proper training. And also remember that 911 is
24 a resource for you when you are seeing suspicious
25 activities or any one impersonating DPD.

1 And then for you, Chief, if you could just
2 please remind all DPD members that especially in this
3 time, they have to identify themselves to members of
4 the public with their name, their badge and showing ID
5 if it's requested. And we understand that if they're
6 uncover, they're under cover. They're not gonna
7 identify themselves as DPD. But if they come from
8 under cover, for the sake of, like, trust and
9 transparency, they have to do that.

10 And then the other thing I'd like to also
11 remind the Department is that DPD has reiterated
12 multiple times that you do not collaborate with ICE or
13 Boarder Patrol. So DPD members must not set out on
14 their own volition and individually collaborate with
15 ICE and Boarder Patrol. And if we find out about that,
16 we just have to take a zero tolerance approach to that
17 if that comes up. Members of the department need to
18 feel safe to step up and they have a duty to intervene
19 if they see this going on. And we have to protect
20 whistle blowers, because if it's happening, we need to
21 make sure that it's uncovered.

22 And then the last thing I'd just like to say,
23 for all the other alphabet agencies that are running
24 around Detroit, we just have a lot -- we have enough to
25 sort out between our communities and DPD. And we don't

1 need that type of confusion. So do not impersonate
2 DPD. If you have the courage to come to Detroit and do
3 whatever it is you're doing, then do it as yourself.
4 Do not tell members of the public that you are DPD.
5 Detroiters will take your picture. Detroiters will
6 video you and we will find out what you're doing and
7 you will be exposed. So I just want to make sure that
8 the community feels like they are supported and that
9 the Department is also supported in anything that we
10 can do to make sure the integrity of the department is
11 maintained.

12 COMMISSIONER WATTS: Madame Chair?

13 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Yes, Commissioner?

14 COMMISSIONER WATTS: Thank you Chief for your
15 report and the inquiry that I had forwarded last
16 weekend, it was resolved. I just want to state, last
17 night, Council Advisory Board in District 5 had their
18 first meeting. I want to commend the Commander and the
19 team, a lot of them showed up last night. It was a
20 nice crowd. So some of the questions they asked -- it
21 was a lot of things. A lot of them not dealing with
22 safety, some of them did. But I just want to let you
23 know, sir, that they were commending --

24 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Commissioner, bring
25 the microphone closer just a little.

1 COMMISSIONER WATTS: They were commending the
2 Commander and his team, for one, showing up in full
3 force. For two, being more engaged with them more than
4 ever. It came up that they wanted to thank them for
5 their lack of participation when it comes to ICE in
6 their community, and just basically being there when
7 they need them. So I thought it was important that you
8 hear that feedback.

9 DC PARISH: Thank you. And thank you for
10 making that public too.

11 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Any other comments?

12 COMMISSIONER CARTER: I have a comment.

13 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Go ahead,
14 Commissioner Carter.

15 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Through the Chair, I
16 want to thank Commissioner Camille for the heads up on
17 the incident. There was a picture that was in the
18 e-mail. Is that a picture of the person who identified
19 themselves as DPD?

20 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: Yes.

21 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Is it possible to put
22 that picture somewhere on the DPD website or out there
23 on Facebook? Because this person is saying that he is
24 a DPD officer and he is not. So I just want to know if
25 there's some way to put that picture out on the website

1 or on your Facebook page so that people know that this
2 person is not a DPD officer?

3 DC PARISH: There definitely is a way. I was
4 turning my head to look at our media representative, so
5 absolutely we can work on that.

6 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Thank you. Thank you,
7 Madame Chair.

8 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Thank you. Any
9 other comments or questions for the chief? Go ahead,
10 Commissioner Boman.

11 COMMISSIONER BOMAN: Thank you, Chairperson
12 Dewaelsche. I observed right before really coming over
13 here. There was a report on the news. This has
14 probably been in the news before, but it became, you
15 know, was one of the lead stories. There was a woman
16 who testified she had been shot six times by a DPD
17 officer. There is video that shows a cruiser on both
18 sides of her vehicle from someone else's camera at some
19 distance away that they were showing on the news. And
20 they also mentioned that at least one officer that was
21 involved was suspended without pay.

22 I know that kind of thing is usually in a
23 closed session, but it was on the TV news, so it's out
24 there. And I guess I'm just wondering -- I don't
25 recall anything like that, coming before us. Is that

1 something that had already gone before the previous
2 board?

3 COMMISSIONER WOODS: Yeah. Through the
4 Chair, the Board took action on that. And that's now a
5 subject of a lawsuit, you know, so that's the case.

6 COMMISSIONER BOMAN: Okay. Thank you.

7 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Any other questions
8 or comments? Hearing none, thank you, Chief, for that
9 report. We appreciate it.

10 PARLIAMENTARIAN: Madame Chair?

11 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Yes.

12 PARLIAMENTARIAN: There is a recommendation
13 to appoint, has that been deleted?

14 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: I was gonna go to
15 that next. It's on my agenda after the report.
16 However, what I was gonna -- you know, we just received
17 a one-page document and I'm gonna ask the Madame
18 Secretary, is there anything else that came with this?
19 Usually we get a packet, or at least a couple of
20 documents maybe a letter from the Chief indicating --
21 or an e-mail indicating that he's asking for this? Did
22 we get anything?

23 SECRETARY: The entire packet was forwarded
24 to board members yesterday. We are trying to get
25 copies, but this is a compilation. The request came

1 over and the request sent out as incoming
2 correspondence, I believe it was, like, on a Monday.

3 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay.

4 SECRETARY: And we sent out the entire
5 packet. As soon as we receive the full report from the
6 Chief Investigator, the entire packet was the summary
7 and we were attempting. We apologize that the entire
8 packet is not in there.

9 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Yeah, usually we
10 have it in the binder, but I do remember receiving an
11 e-mail. I guess my question is gonna be: Did all the
12 board members have a chance to review that because if
13 there's someone requesting a motion --

14 SECRETARY: If I may, if we could have,
15 maybe, a five-minute recess, and we could get those
16 copies down here.

17 COMMISSIONER WOODS: Through the Chair?

18 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Go ahead.

19 COMMISSIONER WOODS: I'm just say, I'll make
20 a motion to move that item to a different portion of
21 the agenda as you get the information so that we won't
22 postpone this meeting.

23 SECRETARY: Thank you.

24 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: So we can go to
25 public comment. And then after public comment, we can

1 take this matter. Is that okay?

2 PARLIAMENTARIAN: The parliamentarian has a
3 question. Did Commissioner Woods make a motion?

4 COMMISSIONER WOODS: Yes.

5 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHE: Okay.

6 PARLIAMENTARIAN: What was the motion?

7 COMMISSIONER WOODS: To move this item to
8 after public comment.

9 COMMISSIONER BOMAN: Second.

10 PARLIAMENTARIAN: Okay. So the motion is to
11 postpone?

12 COMMISSIONER WOODS: No. To move this item.

13 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHE: Move it in the
14 agenda.

15 PARLIAMENTARIAN: I'm saying, that's a proper
16 motion is to postpone this matter till after.

17 COMMISSIONER WOODS: Okay. Motion to
18 postpone until after public comment.

19 COMMISSIONER BOMAN: Second.

20 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHE: Okay. A motion has
21 been made by Commissioner Woods, seconded by
22 Commissioner Boman to move this after public comment --
23 or to postpone this until after public comment. Is
24 there any discussion? All in favor indicate by saying
25 aye.

1 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

2 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Opposed? The motion
3 carries.

4 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Thank you,
5 commissioners.

6 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you. Next,
7 we're gonna go to public comment and oral
8 communications. Please be advised that your comments
9 are limited to two minutes. And inappropriate language
10 and comments may delay broadcast and video posts, and
11 will not be accepted. So thank you. And who was our
12 first speaker?

13 MS. BLOSSOM: Through the Chair, we have nine
14 speakers in Skylar Herbert today and three -- excuse me
15 -- five online. The first speakers are Mr. Jahdante
16 Smith. Mr. Rue, Mr. Charles Cousin. When you come to
17 the mic, please state your name for the record. Thank
18 you.

19 MR. SMITH: Good afternoon. My name's
20 Jahdante Smith. I want to start by saying Conrad
21 Mallett was re-appointed 6 to 3. I know a couple of
22 you up here are very happy about that, but that does
23 not mean he's gonna stay in that position. For a week
24 straight citizens have called in to get him not to be
25 re-appointed to the Law Department position. He sits

1 on this board week in and week out and advises elected
2 board of officials about officers who he then defends.
3 This board holds officers accountable, so he's advising
4 people who are to hold officers accountable outside of
5 the Chief's office. And then, he sits and fills the
6 lawsuits and represents the officers on the other side.

7 I asked DC Parish about this question. He
8 said he would refer me to who, Corporation Counsel. I
9 have a question. How many people are on the Missing
10 Person's Unit for the city of Detroit? Through the
11 Chair, to anybody who can answer it. And also, how
12 many detectives does the Homicide Unit for the Detroit
13 Police Department have with all these resources?

14 Also, what is the job title of Angelique
15 Mayberry Peterson for \$80,000 in 25 hours, stipulated?
16 What is her job responsibility set list? Because
17 Conard Mallett offered me a job to make \$35,000 and I
18 was probably gonna work 40 hours a week and work like a
19 dog for 40 hours a week, but she makes \$80,000 for 25
20 hours.

21 Also, Mr. Williams, you know I ain't forgot
22 about you. Auntie Linda is still out there with that
23 lawsuit against you. And Lady Gloria, who you forged
24 her signature, people don't wake up with new signatures
25 every day, right? So you signed a completely different

1 signature than the lady had on her mortgage
2 application. That is fraud. You had a husband sign
3 for a wife. You had a son sign for a mother. That is
4 fraud. You can't do that on nominating petitions.

5 There's a 50-page lawsuit that I have. I
6 don't have it with me. It's in my work truck, but I'm
7 gonna bring it. I'm gonna make sure I go to the media.
8 And I'm talking about Conrad. I'm gonna talk about a
9 couple people on this board. And also to my
10 commissioner, I'm very disappointed that you
11 un-friended me on Facebook. Doesn't matter. I'm still
12 gonna officially contact you all the time.

13 And to you Officer Woods, I hope that you're
14 happy. You and also Chairperson Dewaelsche. I hope
15 you guys are happy. I'm still gonna find every way I
16 can to make Conrad Mallett as uncomfortable as he can
17 be because he is usurping the powers of the official
18 lawyer that needs to be here that you have a budget
19 for. Please use the budget and hire a lawyer. Common
20 sense.

21 MS. BLOSSOM: That is your time, sir.

22 MR. SMITH: That's a conflict of interest.

23 MR. RUE: All right. Butch is dead. He's
24 gone, be with the ancestors, so he can't back me up on
25 this. So I'm a young blood from the Brewster Projects

1 in 1980. Make no bones about it, Janice Winfrey been
2 caught cheating in elections. Conrad Mallett who
3 represents this Board was sitting right next to her
4 April 25th, 2024 when she lied on public record. It's
5 on Zoom recording at the Detroit Election Commission
6 meeting.

7 Now, I'm sick of it. All of it. You, Darryl
8 Woods -- Todd, Mimi, she want what she want and all the
9 rest of y'all in this room. I stand up on 100. I got
10 a 45-year reputation of being stand up 100. Darryl
11 Woods, you ain't got that. You was in prison for about
12 28 years. He was there with Mark McCloud. Next time
13 he call you, you talk to him on the phone, you ask him
14 about Rue. That's what they used to call me at Cody
15 High School.

16 Now, Mimi asked me for some help with her
17 mama, Kaniesha Coleman. DPD case 20-11112. I did it.
18 I investigated. I found out Charmaine McCloud --
19 Charmaine McCloud is the killer responsible for the
20 injury that caused the death of Kaniesha Coleman. And
21 her daughter Mimi asked me for the help with her mama.
22 She was four years old. Mimi is coming to Detroit.
23 She's not here now. She'll be here February the 18th.
24 And we're going to dinner. She's gonna ask me
25 something else. I'm gonna tell her the truth. Did you

1 hear that Darryl Woods? Now Willie Bell was in the
2 way. Now you decide you want to jump up in the way.
3 Dewaelsche, get it together, because I'm coming.

4 MS. BLOSSOM: Mr. Cousin is the next speaker,
5 followed by Bonita Davis, Ms. Williams, and Claude
6 Norwood. Thank you.

7 MR. COUSIN: Good afternoon everyone.

8 COMMISSIONERS: Good afternoon.

9 MR. COUSIN: My name's Charles Cousin. I'm
10 39 years old. Originally from Albany, New York. And
11 I've been proud to call Detroit home for the past five
12 years. Just two weeks ago, I didn't even know what a
13 police commissioner was. But after doing my research,
14 I believe I am an ideal candidate for the role -- for
15 the vacant role. I've attended every Walk A Mile on
16 Wednesday with the Chief. And I saw a lot of you
17 there, including Commissioner Darryl Woods. And I
18 didn't see a lot of you guys there. I hope to see you
19 guys next year.

20 I have a bachelor's degree in communications
21 and business from St. John's University, and I also
22 attended law school at the University of Havana. And
23 over the past ten years I've worked across multiple
24 jurisdictions, effectively holding police accountable,
25 both formally and informally.

1 As an international city, Detroit benefits
2 from diverse perspectives. Having worked with police
3 around the world, I believe I can bring a fresh, global
4 outlook to this board. I work well with others and I
5 believe that the Chief would vouch for my integrity and
6 commitment. Yeah. I recently saw there was a vacant
7 opening, and you know, I just really came to find out
8 information about it. And if, you know, there's gonna
9 be an election?

10 COMMISSIONERS: (Inaudible).

11 MR. COUSIN: Okay. Thank you.

12 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you. We can
13 have you speak with, maybe Ms. Blossom. Or is there
14 someone on in our office that could speak with this
15 gentleman about the police commission?

16 MS. BLOSSOM: Sir, if you could come and just
17 put your number on the card and we can speak later.

18 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you. Next
19 speaker please.

20 MS. DAVIS: Good evening, everyone.

21 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Good evening.

22 MS. DAVIS: My name is Bonita Davis. I want
23 to address my two minutes to the (inaudible). I don't
24 know his religious denomination, but the pastor, I
25 guess. Could you please be more specific when you say

1 your God? Because there's a lot of disorder in this
2 room and the most high of the universe doesn't
3 recognize any of these titles, any of these unfair
4 business practices, any of this corporate,
5 unconstitutional birthright.

6 So by you being a pastor, and you
7 representing the biblical in any capacity, the people
8 are playing the role of Esau and the State is Jacob.
9 Everybody's rights are infringed upon. So we have to
10 -- again, we have to go back last week, it was the
11 Constitution. You don't recognize it. You don't
12 respect it. It understand. I comprehend it. I don't
13 understand it.

14 And now, do you understand Esau and Jacob's
15 relationship? And how the State is claiming our
16 states. So that's why I always say we have to go back
17 to the politics. We have to address the roots.
18 Otherwise, it's gonna always be disorder, more
19 complaints and no resolve -- nothing resolved. So we
20 can't include God in this, because God doesn't even
21 have a name. It's a universal practice of the
22 universal law. It's a law of nature, mother nature.
23 Everything else is foreign. That's why it's called
24 foreign policies. It's not recognized.

25 So everybody's out of order at this point.

1 It's too many people with titles trying to be false
2 gods. So there's my two minutes. I'll be back next
3 week.

4 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Thank you. Next
5 speaker.

6 MS. WILLIAMS: Hello. So it's been about a
7 year or so. When I came to you guys concerning Cheryl
8 Hall, LaShonda Houston, Chauncey Gardner, and Frank.
9 Don't know his last name, but I know he works here at
10 the headquarters. The bottom line, when I came to you
11 guys -- when somebody threatens your life, you all did
12 not do anything about none of this.

13 Cheryl Hall's been on the force for over
14 15 years. Michelle Hall is her alias, taking up a
15 housing voucher from a homeless person. I live at 628
16 Delaware, 3rd Precinct. Two weeks ago, five SUVs came
17 around there. It was time for the ex-offenders to go
18 to work. They live at that building, taking up housing
19 vouchers.

20 So the same man I made a report on several
21 different occasions, who done broke inside my
22 apartment. It took Officer Simmons -- I knocked on the
23 window. And he was like -- he came back upstairs.

24 I was like: Okay -- I said -- this man been
25 breaking inside my apartment on so many different

1 occasions.

2 He was like: Well, Ms. William's -- no, he
3 didn't call me --

4 He said: Well today, he's arrested.

5 But see, that was the just the playoff.
6 Because, like I said, LaShonda Houston, she lives at
7 628 Delaware. I'm tired of all this. You all are not
8 doing your job. You're not complying to the
9 Constitution, the laws, or the Charter. Because if you
10 were doing your job correctly, it would be an
11 investigation on why officers threaten to kill me.

12 I've been talking about ex-offenders on the
13 Detroit Police Department for quite some time. And the
14 man that raped me work at the 3rd. His name is Tim --
15 his fake name -- wear glasses, a bad eye. I see this
16 every day because I live around the corner from the 3rd
17 Precinct. I don't have to live around the corner. I
18 be on transit. I see all this every day. Thank you.

19 MS. BLOSSOM: Claude Norwood, followed by
20 Minister Eric Blount, followed by Jay Gregory Love.

21 MR. NORWOOD: Good morning, everyone -- I
22 mean, good evening.

23 COMMISSIONER WOODS: Good afternoon.

24 MR. NORWOOD: My name is Claude Norwood. I'm
25 the president of the Grand River Community Block Club.

1 And also newly elected for the Community Advisory
2 Council for the city of Detroit. And I also first work
3 for the people of the city of Detroit. So in my few
4 times in my meetings -- well, let me back up a little
5 bit.

6 The purpose of the Community Advisory Council
7 is to take the concerns from the community to the
8 Council and then to the Mayor, if necessary. So the
9 concerns we've been taking to the City Council, is that
10 the CAC is not funded. Now in the middle we speaking,
11 yesterday -- well Tuesday, the President, he informed
12 me of what I already informed him, what the Charter
13 says. It's not funded. Instead of getting to a
14 resolution, saying the same thing but going nowhere.

15 So it's a reflection of what's going on at
16 the City Council, because the City Council can't even
17 fill their own seats in their own house. That means
18 people not interested in coming down here to hear what
19 you got to say. You either not interested, disengaged,
20 or don't believe the City is gonna do a thing about it.
21 Which relates back to why I'm bringing that up.

22 It's because, as the CAC our role is to
23 assist them by working with the community, but we need
24 money to do that. And to assist the BOPC and the
25 police department, the fire department, the community

1 groups, the association, but everybody needs some
2 funding to do what they need to do. And first of all,
3 the first job is they don't -- they think they're doing
4 us a favor. They work for the people, and so it's
5 their obligation. If you not doing that, that means
6 you breaking the laws of the Charter. You need to be
7 prosecuted. You need to be removed if you can't do
8 your job.

9 And Lastly, two cases that's come across my
10 plate, has been Ms. Williams and another lady that
11 they've been at these meetings and the City Council
12 meetings, and they haven't got any justification. Ms.
13 Williams said she's been raped. Why does she still
14 have to keep coming down here two years to get some
15 clarification on these people that violated her rights?
16 The other lady said her family had to go out there and
17 find her assailant.

18 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay, sir, your time
19 is up.

20 MR. NORWOOD: Thank you.

21 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Commissioner Jones?

22 COMMISSIONER JONES: Sir, I just have one
23 quick question for you. When you got up, you had
24 mentioned you were the new Chair of the Grand River
25 Community Association?

1 MR. NORWOOD: The president.

2 COMMISSIONER JONES: I'm sorry. The
3 president. What are the boundaries of that
4 association?

5 MR. NORWOOD: Our boundaries run all the way
6 up to the -- well, it's just two blocks that we
7 actually cover, that we do door-to-door work on. But
8 the boundaries actually go from Grand River up to
9 Fullerton. And then off the street behind that, as
10 well. That's the boundary.

11 COMMISSIONER JONES: Thank you, Madame Chair.

12 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Thank you.
13 Commissioner Woods and then Commissioner Boman.

14 COMMISSIONER WOODS: Yes. You know, I heard
15 what you said in terms of you saying that someone came
16 in here and advised the Board that got raped, as if we
17 ignoring something like that. I want to make it
18 absolutely clear, when those types of allegations come
19 to us, we don't ignore anything of such.

20 And you better believe that DPD has reported
21 to us in terms of the nature of their investigations
22 and them looking into all serious allegations that come
23 to us. Someone been raped, someone been killed,
24 whatever the situation is, when someone comes to us
25 with those types of allegations, we immediately get

1 responses back from the DPD on these situations. We
2 would not litigate on one person situation in the
3 public. But be absolutely clear, that we are
4 laser-sharp focussed on those types of allegations that
5 will come before us.

6 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Commissioner Boman.

7 COMMISSIONER BOMAN: Yeah, a couple things.
8 First of all, a factual matter. When we have a matter
9 to be investigated and it goes to the Office of the
10 Chief Investigator and they do an investigation, and I
11 believe they're doing thorough investigations, there is
12 this issue of consequences. And if a case is over a
13 year-old, there are no direct consequences to the
14 officer and that's under contract.

15 So that isn't something we can act on, if
16 that's the case. I'm just giving a general statement
17 in general. So if anyone does have a complaint, it's
18 important to bring it up, like, immediately so there's
19 a chance of it getting investigated in time. For
20 consequences.

21 MS. WILLIAMS: Okay, but wait. What if he
22 was (inaudible) afterwards?

23 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Madame --

24 MS. WILLIAMS: Okay. Make this make sense.

25 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay. Commissioner,

1 are you finished?

2 COMMISSIONER BOMAN: I had another thing to
3 say.

4 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Go ahead.

5 COMMISSIONER BOMAN: I just wanted to get
6 that out there. I'm not getting into a discussion
7 about it. I can talk about it later. I don't want to
8 do it right now. I'm just saying, it's a fact. And I
9 think anybody who runs into a situation where they feel
10 a need to complain from this day forward, keep that in
11 mind. There is a clock ticking on these. It doesn't
12 mean we don't investigate them. It just means that the
13 consequences you may want, may not happen. The other
14 thing is are you in District 5? Or 7?

15 MR. NORWOOD: District 7.

16 COMMISSIONER BOMAN: 7. Okay. I thought it
17 was the first CAC. Great. I was the petitioner that
18 helped formed the District 4 CAC. And I was well aware
19 at the time of doing that, that yes, the Charter says
20 that we do not get funding from the city. However,
21 what I would recommend is doing fundraising, as often
22 charitable organizations or non-profits need to do.
23 You can do that. You can do fundraising. So that
24 would be my suggestion as to how to handle the fact
25 that you are not getting money from the city.

1 MR. NORWOOD: Well, the bottom line is that
2 the City Charter is outdated. It needs to be amended.
3 And the results are those empty seats sitting up there
4 at the City Council meeting. That's the answer from
5 the people. No. It's the same thing the City Council
6 is saying, so it's not just about the funding. It's
7 about not doing your job. How can the City Council
8 represent the people when they don't represent the law
9 themselves? That means the City Charter is out of
10 date. It needs to be amended.

11 COMMISSIONER BOMAN: Can I make one response?

12 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Yeah, go ahead,
13 Commissioner.

14 COMMISSIONER BOMAN: Yeah. I'm gonna have to
15 close, because obviously, this whole meeting isn't
16 about the CAC. We're the Board of Police
17 Commissioners, so I don't want to overstep the fact
18 that I happen to have this in my past. But I just
19 wanted to add that regarding the Charter, the voters in
20 Detroit had an opportunity to vote on the new charter.

21 And by the way, it would have included
22 funding for CAC. They voted against it. In fact, it
23 would have included a lot of things concerning how the
24 BOPC is run, as well. But the voters voted against it,
25 so at least for the next few years, that matter is

1 closed and you just gotta work with what you got, which
2 isn't necessarily what you wanted.

3 MR. NORWOOD: They didn't vote against it.
4 They didn't vote against it. 400,000 people didn't
5 show up out of 500,000 people. They just never said
6 nothing. Thank you.

7 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: All right. Thank
8 you. Any other comments?

9 COMMISSIONER WATTS: Madame Chair?

10 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Yes, Commissioner
11 Watts?

12 COMMISSIONER WATTS: Excuse me, sir? I just
13 want to say last night at the CAC meeting in District
14 5, that issue was brought up about the lack of pay.
15 Most of the people in audience were not aware. Some of
16 them weren't aware that there was no pay. Individuals
17 was concerned, because it wasn't like you had water or
18 even had copies of the agenda. So it had to be
19 reminded to them that individuals stepped up to run for
20 office. You get no pay. You have you no salary. You
21 have no budget.

22 Thankfully, I want you to know the sentiment
23 in the meeting last night by most of the individuals,
24 was stating that they advocate, you know, and the
25 Commissioner. The City Council representative was

1 there last night. And she let them know, she pledged
2 that she is going to make a proposal during budget
3 time, but that's only one vote. So I think it was
4 important for you to hear that comment from District 5
5 residents last night advocating that the CAC members
6 should get some sort of compensation or budget.

7 MR. NORWOOD: The point is, it's not about
8 the money.

9 COMMISSIONER WATTS: Yes.

10 MR. NORWOOD: It's the (inaudible).

11 COMMISSIONER WATTS: Exactly.

12 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Okay. Thank you,
13 Commissioner. Next speaker, please.

14 MINISTER BLOUNT: Good afternoon, Board. I'm
15 Minister Eric Blount from Sacred Heart Catholic Church
16 right here in Detroit. I have no problems looking face
17 to face with Chief Bettison and giving him my honest
18 criticism. But today I want to thank you. For today
19 we all need to say her name, Tracey Allen. This is a
20 young woman that was shot over seven times by DPD
21 unjustly. And Chief Bettison stepped up and said he
22 supports the \$25 million lawsuit that her and her
23 attorney have decided to file against the City. But
24 let's make no mistake about it, a life being shot,
25 that's in the neighborhood of \$25 trillion, not

1 millions. Because all life is precious. So say her
2 name, Tracey Allen. You need to say it because she is
3 still alive and that's why the corruption is exposed.

4 And I say that because, Porter Burks didn't
5 have that opportunity. Porter Burks was murdered by
6 five DPD police officers when he was shot over 38
7 times. But no, no, no outrage. But the systemic
8 corruption really includes the union contract. When
9 you can continue to employ someone and even promote
10 someone without looking at the disciplinary history,
11 that is a sure sign that there is corruption up and
12 down this organization, and somebody needs to stop
13 it.

14 I also want to thank Attorney General Dana
15 Nessel. She has created a website where people can
16 post their complaints against ICE. We need something
17 similar to that right here in Detroit. So when
18 somebody whips out their camera and video records a
19 police officer doing something that they should not be
20 doing, that information ought to be almost automatic --
21 automatic and instantaneous.

22 **A lot like when we saw Alex Purdy or when we**
23 **saw Renee Good. Those officers never came out with**
24 **anything about what happened or what was said. It was**
25 **people with their cellphones recording things. And**

1 that's why -- that's the only reason why we know what
2 happened to George Floyd, because a bystander recorded
3 what happened. The police report said, oh, no, he died
4 of medical complications. Oh no, his face was too
5 close to the tailpipe.

6 MS. BLOSSOM: Thank you, sir. Our next
7 speaker is Jay Gregory Love.

8 MINISTER BLOUNT: (Inaudible) for your
9 future.

10 MS. BLOSSOM: Followed by Michael Noma.
11 Again, please state your name for the record. And
12 after Mr. Noma, we have speakers on Zoom. Thank you.

13 MR. LOVE: Good afternoon to the BOPC. My
14 name is Jay Gregory love. Here representing District 5
15 council member Renata Miller. We oftentimes don't --
16 first of all, I need to say something because the
17 spirit in this room is tight. You have an awesome job,
18 with a lot responsibility. So what you're getting, I
19 don't know.

20 I will say this to the DPD, I live at
21 Jefferson and Van Dyke. And we asked our commander of
22 the 7th Precinct for more surveillance at the corner of
23 Van Dyke and Jefferson. That's the Sunoco gas station.
24 We -- our neighbors petitioned not to have at that as
25 24-hour facility, because we knew what could come with

1 it. A lot of crime. A lot of robbery. A lot of B&Es
2 and that has happened. But I have to give kudos to the
3 DPD because Thursday the 22nd at about 4:00 a.m. the
4 Watch Commander and several vehicles zoomed in on that
5 particular location and they did a wonderful job.

6 When you make a complaint to the DPD and that
7 complaint is resolved, it's really incumbent upon you
8 to say thank you. And we thank the DPD for the work
9 that they're doing. Council Member Miller has made it
10 a big point to be a major supporter of the BOPC. And
11 we plan to be there and I will be the representative
12 for public safety in District 5. So we want to thank
13 you again, both BOPC, as well the DPD. Thank you.

14 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you. Next
15 speaker.

16 MS. BLOSSOM: Mr. Noma. I apologize if I
17 mispronounced your name. Michael Moza?

18 MS. MOZA: Good afternoon.

19 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Good afternoon.

20 MS. MOZA: I am Michael's momma. I want to
21 say two things to Chairman Boman and Commissioner
22 Woods. You both sat up her and just sat up here and
23 told us that when something serious happens in the city
24 and it's reported to you guys, you guys are so active
25 and you're proactive and you're on it. That's not

1 true. I've been fighting back and forth with you guys
2 for about two years. So I think I found a method that
3 may work and that will also hold you guys accountable,
4 as well. So, Commissioner Boman, your my commissioner
5 for District 4, correct?

6 COMMISSIONER BOMAN: Yes. By the way, I just
7 wanted to -- through the Chair -- I'm not the chair.

8 MS. MOZA: Okay. Hold on. So I have six
9 questions I'd like to have answered. What date -- and
10 I provided this. I'm sorry. For the record, I've
11 provided a copy for all of you guys, as well as -- I'm
12 not sure of this officer's name. I have a copy for
13 you, too. Okay.

14 So, I have six questions. What date did
15 officers go to the first location that Michael was seen
16 and what officers was sent to that location? Was
17 Michael Singer and girlfriend both questioned since
18 they were the last to see him in possession of his
19 phone and wallet? They claimed it was because their
20 power was off.

21 Did officers verify that with DTE? And if
22 so, on what day and which officers verified this? Did
23 officers check to see if Michael had gunshot residue on
24 his hands? If so, what date was it done and what
25 officer did the test? Did officers take fingerprints

1 of the gun to determine if only Michael's fingerprints
2 were on the gun? If so, what date and the officer that
3 conducted the test? Five, what did the official
4 Missing Person's Facebook post say verbatim? I would
5 like a copy of that pos. Six, was Michael's body,
6 clothing and blanket tested for DNA?

7 I expect to have an answer. I think six
8 questions -- I think they should have that in their
9 files. So I'm expecting -- Commissioner Boman, you're
10 a part of my district, I'd like you to make sure you
11 reach out to DPD to make sure that my questions are
12 answered. I will be here next Thursday for said
13 answers.

14 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Commissioner Woods?

15 COMMISSIONER WOODS: Yeah. DC Parish, can
16 you -- whoever detective was involved, or if it's a
17 detective --

18 MS. MOZA: It was Detective Genatick(sic).

19 COMMISSIONER WOODS: Okay. If they're still
20 here or if they're still operating, can you make sure
21 that she gets these answers, you know --

22 MS. MOZA: Thank you.

23 COMMISSIONER WOODS: And be able to sit down
24 with her. You know, it's my hope and prayer that you
25 know, you -- you're a mother. I'm very, very sensitive

1 to that. These type of situations that we can have,
2 you know, communication and dialogue. And I know it's
3 been long and exhaustive, but if you have other
4 questions, these seem to be very -- in my opinion --

5 MS. MOZA: Very easy. Cut and dry.

6 COMMISSIONER WOODS: Easy questions to
7 answer.

8 MS. MOZA: Absolutely.

9 COMMISSIONER WOODS: You know, so, I believe
10 that you deserve it.

11 MS. MOZA: Thank you.

12 COMMISSIONER WOODS: We don't do criminal
13 things, you know, but you a mother and you deserve some
14 answers in this regard. So I'm prayerful that we can
15 get that resolved and there be a point person for if
16 she has other things and concerns that she be able to
17 contact that person. Rather it be Homicide, whatever,
18 she feel that she have new information or whatever to
19 be able to share. Because I believe that you deserve
20 the dignity to have questions answered. And your
21 questions don't bother us in no shape, form, or
22 fashion. You know, so I pray for your peace.

23 MS. MOZA: Thank you.

24 COMMISSIONER WOODS: And I definitely want to
25 be able to see that accomplished.

1 MS. MOZA: I appreciate that.

2 COMMISSIONER WOODS: And please report back
3 to us that this has been accomplished.

4 MS. MOZA: I appreciate that. I will.

5 COMMISSIONER WOODS: And I'm talking to DC
6 and you can, too.

7 MS. MOZA: Absolutely.

8 DC PARISH: Absolutely, if I could just ask,
9 could you leave your name and your phone number with
10 Ms. Blossom?

11 MS. MOZA: Absolutely.

12 DC PARISH: I already have sent your
13 questions to the Homicide section.

14 MS. MOZA: Thank you. I appreciate that.

15 DC PARISH: So we'll get you some answers as
16 soon as possible.

17 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you. Next
18 speaker.

19 MS. MOZA: He has his hand raised. He wants
20 to say something.

21 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Oh, go ahead,
22 Commissioner.

23 COMMISSIONER BOMAN: Since you are in my
24 district, and also you have asked that I correspond
25 with you. I'm gonna give you some information. This

1 is actually on the website. Anybody can use this
2 information to contact me. The e-mail address is --

3 MS. MOZA: Give me one second. Let me grab a
4 pen. Sorry guys.

5 COMMISSIONER BOMAN: Of course. It's also on
6 the website, but I'm happy to give it out directly
7 here.

8 MS. MOZA: Go ahead.

9 COMMISSIONER BOMAN: Okay.
10 Scott.Boman@detroit.mi.gov. And I have a phone number.
11 Cell phone number.

12 MS. MOZA: Ready.

13 COMMISSIONER BOMAN: Okay. That cellphone
14 number is 313-316-2378.

15 MS. MOZA: Got you. Thank you so much. I
16 appreciate you guys.

17 COMMISSIONER BOMAN: You're very welcome.

18 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you. Next
19 speaker please.

20 MS. BLOSSOM: We will now be going into Zoom.
21 William Davis, former police commissioner. You have
22 the floor, sir.

23 MR. DAVIS: Oh, good afternoon. Can I be
24 heard?

25 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Yes, you may.

1 MR. DAVIS: I am pleased to see that you all
2 are starting your meetings a little bit earlier than
3 what has been happening. I'm pleased to see that, you
4 know, that you have a quorum, because it looks terrible
5 when I tune in and, you know, there's no quorum. You
6 know, you lucky you did public comment.

7 So hopefully in the future, we'll be able to
8 make sure more people get there and get there on time.
9 Or maybe you might need to adjust the starting time
10 from 3:00 to 3:30 or 4 o'clock. I know you could do
11 that if need be. Because I have an advantage over some
12 of y'all, because I'm retired. I was retired when I
13 was on the Board of Police Commissioners. That's why I
14 was able to make every meeting and make every meeting
15 on time.

16 But, you know, ideally it would be good to
17 make sure that the public don't have to wait long to
18 get started and to actually be able to make their
19 comments. Ideally, most of the time, the public should
20 be able to make comments before you go into closed
21 session. Especially, closed session, you know, you
22 might say, 3 or 5 minutes, but it might take an hour or
23 over a half hour. So hopefully we can get the Board to
24 move in the right direction.

25 I called into City Council a little while ago.

1 I also spoke against Conrad Mallett. I also believe
2 that the Board should have its own independent
3 attorney. I think the Board would be looked at better
4 if you had your own independent attorney to represent
5 you all, not the city in general. Because if you have
6 2 or 3 masters, you're not really serving anybody.
7 That's what Conard Mallett and having a city attorney
8 is doing for all y'all. So I wish all y'all well. And
9 hopefully, y'all will improve. Thank you.

10 MS. BLOSSOM: Our next speaker, Ms. Tara
11 Brown.

12 MS. BROWN: Good afternoon. Thank you
13 Commission. My name is Tara Brown and I wanted to call
14 in -- last week I had a family emergency and couldn't
15 call in. But the previous week, I had spoke about
16 having the Detroit Police Department's Unsheltered
17 Population Response Team present in front of the
18 Michigan Homeless Policy Council and I hadn't received
19 a callback.

20 Shortly after that public comment, I
21 immediately received a call from Commander Starks who
22 apparently hadn't got my e-mail. She called me. She
23 followed up. She connected me with Lieutenant Hewitt
24 who works directly with the Unsheltered Population
25 Response Team. He also put me in -- he connected me

1 with Captain Griffin. We had a three-way call. Yeah.
2 They will be presenting -- I don't know what month --
3 before the State of Michigan Homeless Policy Council
4 and they'll give us a better idea of what they do and
5 how they serve the homeless.

6 And the feedback that I have heard, that has
7 been brought to me about them has been positive. I was
8 very surprised. Just the compassion that they have
9 shown some of these unhoused and homeless people on the
10 streets. The way they have dealt with them when it was
11 time for these people to be displaced. I'm very happy
12 about that. And that is a presentation that I would
13 actually like to see them give in front of the Board of
14 Police Commissioners, as well. Because I don't think
15 that the public knows that they're out there. I don't
16 know that the public knows what they do.

17 And when we hear stories about police
18 shooting people six times, stopping and frisking them
19 at the gas station, allegedly beating them up for no
20 reason, it's always nice to hear something good that
21 they're doing in the community. I think that that
22 should be elevated. And like I said, I work the
23 homeless. I worry about the homeless. And to know
24 that, you know, they are not be criminalized, or so it
25 seems, by the Detroit Police is always a good thing.

1 Thank you.

2 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Thank you. Next
3 speaker.

4 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: Madame Chair?

5 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Yes, Commissioner?

6 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: I also would like to
7 see the presentation on the Unsheltered Response Team.
8 I know we have several requests for information in the
9 department. If that could be put somewhere in the
10 queue for eventually to have a presentation here at one
11 of our meetings.

12 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Yes. Madame
13 Secretary, could you arrange that?

14 SECRETARY: So noted.

15 MS. BLOSSOM: Your next speaker is Tijuana
16 Morris, followed by Denise Lises, and that will be the
17 last speaker.

18 MS. MORRIS: Hello. My name is Tijuana
19 Morris. And I am a member of Barton McFarland
20 Neighborhood Association in District 7. I am speaking
21 on behalf of some of the -- not only homeless, but the
22 indentured citizens that are living in the apartment
23 building 8100 Schafer. This landlord is awful. The
24 things that he has done, like impounding people's cars.
25 Signing illegal documents and making false statements,

1 causing harassment and harm to those that are living in
2 this building. I want to expose him. I do have
3 evidence. I am a retired police officer and the
4 investigator for the Detroit Coalition Against Police
5 Brutality. I am stepping forward for these people,
6 because they cannot speak for themselves. And I'm
7 protective. I'd like to be able to talk to somebody,
8 show them evidence that has been done on this apartment
9 building which were unfounded. He's totally harassing
10 and violating their civil rights.

11 COMMISSIONER WOODS: Can you freeze the
12 caller, through the Chair?

13 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELESCHE: Yes.

14 COMMISSIONER WOODS: Yeah, can we freeze her?

15 MS. MORRIS: I'd like to bring the people so
16 they can bring charges for these false allegations.

17 MS. BLOSSOM: Excuse, Ms. Morris. Could you
18 pause? The Commissioner has a comment.

19 COMMISSIONER WOODS: Yes. How you doing, Ms.
20 Morris. It's Commissioner Woods. If you could make
21 sure you stay on the line. I don't know if we have her
22 information. But I would like for the Department to
23 make sure that we connect with her, make sure we get
24 her information, because I didn't want her to get
25 offline before she got off. She's a very honorable

1 lady and has great credibility in this community. And
2 I know that when she makes those types of statements,
3 there's something very serious, so I ask that you guys
4 look into that and follow up with us on that. Through
5 the Chair.

6 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Yes.

7 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: Through the Chair?

8 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Go ahead,
9 Commissioner Camille.

10 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: Thank you. I do have
11 Ms. Morris's contact information. We've been in
12 communication several times about this matter. And
13 trying to figure out how to get some resolution for
14 that. She been advocating for this community in that
15 apartment building for sometime. So, Ms. Morris, I
16 appreciate you for coming on and making the concerns
17 public, because it's important that people know what's
18 going on. But I do have her contact information.
19 Commissioner, I can definitely bring you in on this.

20 COMMISSIONER WOODS: Okay. Thank you.

21 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you. DC, did
22 you want to say something?

23 DC PARISH: Yes. I would just ask that --

24 LT. MANNING: If he could let them know --

25 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: One moment. Deputy

1 Chief Parish is going to make a comment, as well.

2 DC PARISH: I would just ask that the contact
3 information be shared if there's a way we can help with
4 that.

5 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay. We're also
6 gonna share your information with DC Parish.

7 MS. MORRIS: Thank you.

8 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay. Go ahead.
9 You can continue.

10 MS. MORRIS: We just need to let these people
11 and the indigent know they're self-worth and we care
12 for them. We're trying to make our community better, a
13 better life for everybody. And the Department reacted
14 based on false allegations. And like Camille, we've
15 been talking. And yes, I'm willing to work with you to
16 do what we have to do to get the situation better.
17 Thank you.

18 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay.

19 MS. BLOSSOM: To our Zoom callers --

20 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you so much.

21 MS. BLOSSOM: Excuse me, Madame Chair. To
22 our Zoom callers, we have staff in the office currently
23 at 596-1830 who can take your call and get your
24 information to staff and to the Department as needed.
25 Our next speaker, Denise Lises, followed by Juana and

1 that will be the last speaker on Zoom. Thank you,
2 ma'am.

3 MS. LISLES: Good afternoon, Commissioners.

4 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Good afternoon.

5 MS. LISLES: First and foremost, I'd like to
6 address Commissioner Scottie Boman and say thank you
7 for letting it be known that there are more than one --
8 there is one more than one CAC. There's three CACs in
9 Detroit. I am a District 5 CAC person, so -- he is
10 District 7. He doesn't speak for the entire CAC.

11 Secondly, I would just like to thank our
12 Commissioner, Ms. Beverly Watts. We appreciate you.
13 Everything you've done so far. And we expect and know
14 you're going to be doing great things in the public.
15 We thank you. I'm kind of partial to Precinct 10,
16 guys, so I always want to make sure I give them a shout
17 out and our MPOs for all they do. And they're moving
18 forward with trying to get more connected to the
19 communities and work with them.

20 Because if we're not transparent and we don't
21 build up -- build those bridges, how can we expect our
22 children not be afraid of the police? So I just want
23 to commend them for wanting to step forward and build
24 these bridges. Thank you Commissioners for all you do.
25 I know you get a lot of flak, but you're in the

1 position and you're doing -- you're there to help us,
2 so we appreciate you.

3 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Thank you. Next
4 speaker.

5 MS. BLOSSOM: Juana, speaker on Zoom. Juana.

6 MS. JUANA: Hi. This is Juana from the 7th
7 District, 2nd Precinct. I just want to say hello to
8 all the commissioners, my commissioner, Commissioner
9 Camille. I'm grateful for Commissioner Camille. I'm
10 grateful for actually all of the commissioners that
11 have been selected, that's on board right now. I'm
12 grateful for you all.

13 Our word for church this year is believe and
14 I'm so big on that, because I already believe and have
15 faith, so I think that's not a big thing for me. But I
16 believe that you all are going to make a difference. I
17 believe that we all are going to come together. I
18 believe we're gonna get these neighborhoods together.
19 I do believe everything is gonna come together. It's
20 gonna take time. People putting the pressure on, but I
21 believe you all can handle it. And we're gonna come
22 together and make a difference. I believe that's gonna
23 happen this year.

24 I also I want to send a shout out to Officer
25 (inaudible) for everything that he does at the 2nd

1 Precinct with community relations for Littlefield Block
2 Club. I'm sorry. I am the president of the
3 Littlefield Block Club. I also want to -- for the
4 commissioners and whomever to actually get the city
5 inspectors out to actually hold people accountable. As
6 well just a little bit more police patrol, only just to
7 make neighbors and our elderly feel a lot better. And
8 for home owners to come and board up their houses or do
9 what it is that they have to do.

10 For two years, I've been cleaning their
11 house, raking the leaves, doing the snow, cutting the
12 grass, all of that, and own supply. So this year, I'm
13 looking for the owners to come out and do their part,
14 or even just get them boarded up. As well as the
15 fields, if no one owns the fields --

16 MS. BLOSSOM: Madame Chair, that was your
17 last speaker.

18 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay. Thank you.
19 We're gonna go back to the item regarding the chief's
20 recommendation for an appointment to the rank of
21 Captain of Lieutenant Damian Manning. DC?

22 DC PARISH: Madame Chair, before we
23 transition to that, could I provide the Board with just
24 a couple of updates. There was a question following
25 the Chief's comments regarding the availability of

1 crime data. I think we talked about whether it was COM
2 Stat data or crime data. But if the data is available
3 at data.detroitmi.gov. That is our open data portal
4 that I mentioned in response. So if the Board would
5 like to explore that site. If there's any additional
6 information it's looking for, we're happy to provide
7 it.

8 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay. And that data
9 is available to the public?

10 DC PARISH: Yes. Data.detroitmi.gov. If you
11 go to that site, click on public safety, and you'll see
12 different crime data collections.

13 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay. Great. Thank
14 you, Chief. All right. Personal committee?

15 COMMISSIONER WOODS: I would like to
16 entertain a motion to accept the Chief's recommendation
17 of Damian Manning. If he could come up to from the
18 position of lieutenant to the position of captain.

19 LT. MANNING: Good afternoon, everybody.

20 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Good afternoon.

21 COMMISSIONER WOODS: I'll make the motion.

22 COMMISSIONER JONES: I will support it,
23 Madame Chair.

24 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: A motion has been
25 made by Commissioner Woods, supported by Commissioner

1 Jones. Is there any discussion? Go ahead,
2 Commissioner Boman.

3 COMMISSIONER BOMAN: Yes, there is. I'm not
4 even sure it's appropriate outside of a closed session.
5 But, I mean, if it's on this paper, am I allowed to
6 discuss it?

7 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: I'm not sure.

8 DC PARISH: I'm not sure what paper you're
9 referring to?

10 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: It's the summary of
11 complaints, CCRs, primarily.

12 COMMISSIONER WOODS: And we do have the full
13 package of it. I don't know if you read the full
14 package or if you read your e-mails.

15 COMMISSIONER BOMAN: I don't recall this.

16 COMMISSIONER WOODS: If that's the full
17 package that they put right there. It breaks down and
18 things of that nature. So it's not a true picture, you
19 know?

20 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: And it was e-mailed,
21 according to Madame Secretary on Tuesday to everyone.
22 Madame Secretary?

23 SECRETARY: On Tuesday and again last
24 evening.

25 PARLIAMENTARIAN: Madame Chair?

1 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Yes?

2 PARLIAMENTARIAN: The Open Meetings Act only
3 allows you to discuss personnel matters in closed
4 session if the employee requests it.

5 COMMISSIONER WOODS: Okay. I stand by my
6 motion. I think that this is a very honorable young
7 man who was done some phenomenal work in the
8 department. In fact, he has done some outstanding work
9 in terms of his investigation. I think he was
10 operating in Internal Affairs working in that unit.

11 LT. MANNING: Absolutely.

12 COMMISSIONER WOODS: And has yielded some
13 powerful results. And I've watched this young man
14 within the last couple years. I was deeply impressed
15 with him. You know, so I stand by that motion.

16 COMMISSIONER WATTS: Madame Chair?

17 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Go ahead,
18 Commissioner Watts.

19 COMMISSIONER WATTS: I want to say hello to
20 you, and even to the Chair of the Personnel Committee.
21 What I have to say is this is nothing to do with
22 basically whether I agree or not agree. It's just
23 really a process for me, because I understand the Chair
24 got it to us on Tuesday or Wednesday. Both of those
25 nights I was in community meetings. So I apologize

1 that I have not been able to read that.

2 So my question is: Being new, when we get
3 something like this for a candidate's promotion, who is
4 probably well-deserved, how much time do we, especially
5 as new members, have a chance to review it? Yes, it
6 may have come to us Tuesday, but that doesn't mean that
7 our schedule's just waiting for this e-mail to come to
8 review and really review the information to not delay
9 the process? That's my question.

10 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Madame Secretary,
11 usually we get it, in most cases, the same week or the
12 week before?

13 SECRETARY: Yes. Sometimes much earlier.
14 Oftentimes, there are more. Since my tenure, we've had
15 them come in, 60, 64 at a time, or as small as a dozen.
16 I think this may be the second occasion there was one.
17 And the process thus far, when we receive the
18 recommendation from the Chief, it goes out to board
19 members together with the packet that is sent along
20 with that.

21 As well as, we request from the Office of the
22 Chief Investigator for a review of cases that may --
23 complaints that may have been filed. And as you see in
24 your packet, a clearance letter, if I may. And at that
25 time, and then staff, your admin staff goes through and

1 does the summary that was given, the one-pager, to give
2 a summary of what's in that entire packet. Because
3 more often than not, there's far more voluminous than
4 this.

5 COMMISSIONER WATTS: Madame Chair?

6 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Yes?

7 COMMISSIONER WATTS: I'm not disputing the
8 packet. What I'm stating is I haven't reviewed the
9 packet (inaudible), so I'm not gonna delay this. I'm
10 just saying, especially for the new commissioners, it's
11 better to learn the process, because we have not had
12 the pleasure of being here for years. And we don't
13 want to delay a process like this, so we need to
14 discuss this further. But I just wanted to say that
15 for the record.

16 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you.

17 DC PARISH: Madame Chair?

18 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Go ahead, DC.

19 DC PARISH: I do have a one-page summary and
20 some highlights about Lieutenant Manning if the Board
21 would like to hear it?

22 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Yes. I think that
23 would be good. Thank you.

24 DC PARISH: Thank you. Okay. Lieutenant
25 Damian Manning was appointed to the Detroit Police

1 Department on May 31, 2000 and has served the City of
2 Detroit with distinction for more than 25 years. After
3 graduating from the Detroit Police Academy, he served
4 on multiple patrol assignments performing core law
5 enforcement duties in crime investigation, scene
6 preservation, and protection of persons and property.

7 Promoted to Sergeant in 2016. Sergeant
8 Manning supervised personnel at the 7th Precinct. He
9 led a Special Operations and Cease Fire Units. He has
10 also conducted internal controls investigation,
11 involving criminal misconduct, corruption, and policy
12 violation. In September of 2023 he was promoted to
13 lieutenant and assigned to Risk Management where he
14 identified high-risk patterns of targeted compliance
15 training. Evaluated use of force incidents and
16 coordinated the review and release of video footage
17 associated with people requiring hospitalization due to
18 police action.

19 Lieutenant Manning has completed extensive
20 specialized training in dignitary protection, advance
21 investigative interviewing, detective operations, and
22 behavioral health crisis response. He is currently
23 assigned to Downtown Services as the acting officer in
24 charge. And throughout his career, he has consistently
25 demonstrated professionalism, accountability, and

1 unwavering commitment to the Detroit Police Department
2 and the community it serves.

3 I want to emphasize to the Board, that this
4 is a well-rounded lieutenant who is going to bring a
5 wealth of experience both from patrol, specialized
6 units, internal affairs investigation, risk management.
7 And he initiated the Risk Management Unit for the
8 Detroit Police Department, so he helped create it and
9 build it. So he's at the forefront of these
10 initiatives that are so important to us today. And
11 having a captain like that out in the field is going to
12 benefit the department on many levels. Thank you.

13 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you, DC
14 Parish. Commissioner Woods?

15 COMMISSIONER WOODS: Absolutely. Again, I
16 can't over emphasize, I'll be the first one to reject
17 and go against a candidate that has been a front to the
18 citizens of the city of Detroit. Again, I've actually
19 had the pleasure of seeing this young man in action in
20 terms of his work. And I'm telling you it's stellar.
21 It's stellar. And I think if we could hear from the
22 candidate, it'll help, you know, the commissioners
23 comfortability. Through the Chair, if that's possible?

24 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Oh, would you like
25 to speak --

1 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: Through the Chair?

2 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHE: Yes.

3 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: Before we hear from
4 the candidate, can I just ask the Chief a question?

5 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHE: Go ahead.

6 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: I apologize if I
7 missed it. Do we know what the planned assignment is
8 if promoted to captain?

9 DC PARISH: I don't know that and I'm not
10 sure if that decision has been made. Lieutenant
11 Manning might now, however. Have you been notified?

12 LT. MANNING: Absolutely. Once again, good
13 afternoon and through the Chair, I have been notified.
14 I am working Downtown Services, as well as over the
15 Gaming Unit that is responsible for overseeing the
16 casinos downtown.

17 DC PARISH: Yeah, and I did just get a text
18 confirming that he would be assigned to Downtown
19 Services.

20 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHE: Okay.

21 LT. MANNING: Through the Chair, one second.
22 I looked at my own disciplinary history, as well CCRs,
23 and I have absolutely no CCRs. I'm been on the job
24 25 years. You can't get into Internal Affairs if you
25 have any blemishes. I'm not entirely sure what the

1 concern is?

2 COMMISSIONER WOODS: I think if we can just
3 hear from you in terms of your posture -- through the
4 Chair -- and make a statement to this board in terms of
5 who you are.

6 LT. MANNING: Exactly.

7 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: And speak closer
8 into the mic, so the audience can hear.

9 LT. MANNING: Exactly, like I said before,
10 I've been on the job 25 years, 15 of which has been on
11 patrol. We patrol 13th Precinct, which is Central
12 District everything from Highland Park all the way back
13 through the Jefferson corridor. It's very dynamic in
14 which it had residential. It had commercial, as well
15 hospitals. So you're pretty well-rounded in that
16 regard, as well as the university district.

17 I spent 15 years there. From there I was
18 promoted to sergeant, actually in the first round.
19 Went to the 7th Precinct. Again, worked on patrol
20 operations. Did such a good job that I was asked to
21 work Cease Fire at the very beginning of the stages to
22 help establish that in Detroit coming from New York.
23 In working Cease Fire, we also worked Special
24 Operations in which we took the complaints of the
25 neighbors. I went to the actually neighborhood

1 meetings, talked to them, and resolved whatever issues
2 we had there.

3 From there, I applied to go to Internal
4 Affairs. They did a very extensive background check on
5 me. I went to Internal Affairs. I was at Internal
6 Affairs for almost a decade. Had some pretty
7 high-profile cases. Those case -- actually, some of
8 the cases I've had was on the news. And some of them
9 have actually changed policy within the department.

10 I played a very integral role in that. In
11 fact, the actual report that I typed up, is still used
12 as a template to this very day for incoming new
13 investigators, as well as sergeants at that location.
14 Any stint in Internal Affairs resulted in my studying
15 extensively, once again. Getting promoted to
16 lieutenant in which I was in the first round, again.

17 In the first round, I talked to the former
18 chief, Chief White, who requested me, my services at
19 Risk Management which was a new established venture
20 that the Department wanted to put together to look at
21 high-risk officers. In doing so, what we did was, we
22 through a lot of measurables, we looked at
23 calculations, mass profiles. Everything that you do
24 from a car accident to every CCR, your encounters with
25 citizens, we watched. Not only did we watch the

1 material within the database, we also watched the BWCs
2 to correlate what was going on in the actual report
3 into the actual BWCs that they have to wear.

4 We also did compliance checks where we go to
5 precincts to make sure the officers are equipped with
6 equipment that the department furnished them and not
7 the specialized equipment they brought themselves. We
8 also did officer involved shooting presentations in
9 which we reviewed this material before it even hits the
10 Chief of Police and we can brief out with him on the
11 infractions that we see and share with the rest of the
12 department.

13 And from there, this position presented
14 itself through my hard work, through my associations,
15 through people that I've met, worked for. I was
16 considered for this position.

17 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Through the Chair?

18 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHÉ: Thank you.

19 Commissioner Carter?

20 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Deputy Chief, if you
21 could, could you explain a little bit about the process
22 that the executive team goes through? Because there
23 are many lieutenants throughout this department and for
24 you as the executive team to select one person, there
25 has to be something special about this person.

1 CHIEF: Absolutely. Many lieutenants are
2 considered for the position of captain. Very few are
3 chosen. There was a vacancy. The typical process is
4 through the leadership, candidates are brought. They
5 are considered. And a lot of discussion and planing
6 goes into whether or not this is the right person. You
7 could have a stellar career. You may not be the right
8 person for that particular job that's opening up.

9 I can't emphasize enough. Every aspect of
10 the officer is examined. Their background is examined.
11 To be offered a position as a captain or higher, really
12 speaks loudly to what you've accomplished in your
13 career. So if this candidate is before you, it was a
14 very deliberate decision and again, speaks volumes to
15 what he has accomplished since 2000 when he first
16 joined the police department.

17 COMMISSIONER CARTER: This is an appointment,
18 and not a contractual obligation?

19 DC PARISH: Yeah, this is an appointment.
20 You are not contractually entitled to a promotion of
21 this rank. It was selected by the Chief, of course,
22 and vetted through the board.

23 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Thank you.

24 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Any other comments,
25 Commissioners? Commissioner Boman?

1 COMMISSIONER BOMAN: Okay. And I may ask
2 right now, because of what the parliamentarian
3 clarified. Is that questions only need to go into
4 closed session if the person subject of the questions
5 requests it. And do you mind if I go ahead and ask
6 some things about some issues that are printed on this
7 document that I got some issues about?

8 DC PARISH: Could I just ask that if you're
9 gonna question him from a document, that the candidate
10 be provided a copy so that he can read along with you?

11 COMMISSIONER BOMAN: Sure. And I can point
12 out a few of the page numbers.

13 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Before you answer
14 that question. We have the OCI Chief who wants to make
15 a comment.

16 CHIEF WARFIELD: Through the Chair, I just
17 wanted to make sure that the board members are very
18 clear with the packet that was presented from the
19 Office of the Chief Investigator. The last CCR that we
20 have filed with Lieutenant Manning's name in it dates
21 all the way back to 2015. So there has been nothing
22 from 2015 to the current date.

23 The latest or the earliest dates back to
24 2003, 2004. There are only, I think, nine CCRs. And
25 when you look at someone's career with a 25-year

1 history, in our office, that's pretty rare to only have
2 that few CCRs. And I think only one was sustained.
3 Out of all the allegations that were given, only one
4 allegation was sustained and that was a procedure
5 allegation. So I just wanted to give those who had not
6 had the chance to read the packet just some perspective
7 from our office.

8 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELESCHE: Yes. I'm glad you
9 made that point that those are complaints that were
10 made, but most of them were not sustained. So I think
11 out of nine, one was, or something like that.

12 COMMISSIONER BOMAN: So maybe I can ask
13 Investigator Warfield this question, the chief
14 investigator. These complaints on the backside here,
15 all of those have been investigated and not sustained?

16 CHIEF WARFIELD: Yes, sir. So when you look
17 at -- when you look at all of the incidents on the
18 back, we list everything, right? So you have -- you
19 have the dates there, this --

20 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: Through the Chair.
21 Those are use of force. Those are not the CCRs on the
22 back.

23 CHIEF WARFIELD: And through the Chair.
24 There are times when we see use of force, we'll send it
25 over as Commissioner Camille referenced to, IA. So we

1 don't investigate use of force above or below a
2 Category 3.

3 COMMISSIONER BOMAN: So is -- through the
4 Chair?

5 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHE: Yes.

6 COMMISSIONER BOMAN: This letter sent by
7 Janita Jones, is that -- it says Detroit Police
8 Department Disciplinary Administration is that part of
9 IA?

10 DC PARISH: Disciplinary Administration
11 reports through a different chain than the Internal
12 Controls division. So Disciplinary reports up to me in
13 the current setup of the department. Internal Affairs
14 reports directly through the chief of police.

15 COMMISSIONER BOMAN: Okay. Thank you. I
16 guess the other part -- so again, there were two things
17 where I didn't see whether it was sustained or not
18 sustained. But there is an issue regarding -- and I'm
19 looking here to the benefit of the candidate, it's page
20 Number 1 of 15, but they're separate, kind of,
21 duplicate page numbers in here. At the top, it says:
22 CCR, 34197. I'm looking through it. And it does say
23 at one place resolved. Was that then not sustained?
24 Or what happened with that?

25 CHIEF WARFIELD: Through the Chair. This

1 goes all the way back to 2003 which predates, even me.
2 So back then, I think there was a different criteria of
3 finding. But if it was an allegation that was upheld,
4 it still would have said sustained. It not have said
5 resolved.

6 COMMISSIONER BOMAN: Okay. So I think one
7 more thing -- and I'm looking at another one. This is
8 2015. So this would have been among the more recent
9 ones that we had on here. I don't really see a
10 disposition, really, in this one.

11 CHIEF WARFIELD: So on the -- this is on
12 page 15 of 16, for those of you who are following in
13 your packet. It says the finding is void. When you
14 have a void finding there -- because it says it right
15 there -- it basically means that that officer's name
16 was inadvertently been put on that report, and should
17 not have been put on that report. But we still
18 maintain the record of it, all those mistakes, so void
19 literally means that it should not have been there.

20 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Mr. Boman?

21 COMMISSIONER BOMAN: Yeah. I just wanted to
22 make a statement that -- I really have no further
23 questions then. And just to make it clear to everyone,
24 I just want to make it sure that I'm not being a rubber
25 stamp and I'm going thorough and I feel like I've done

1 that now. Thank you.

2 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Thank you.

3 COMMISSIONER WOODS: And through the Chair.
4 (Inaudible) but I will say that I appreciate you
5 Commissioner Boman for your thorough critic of this,
6 because that's what this is all about. Because I would
7 not dare rubber stamp one of these. In fact, I have
8 been against several, you know, and so I appreciate
9 your, you know, judicious behavior towards this.

10 You know, this is a new commission. We just
11 getting all these documents. We have to go through
12 this. This has nothing to do with you personally. If
13 we can get this stuff, at least two weeks in advance,
14 Chief DC, please advise the Chief Office -- and through
15 the Chair --

16 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Yes.

17 COMMISSIONER WOODS: -- at least two weeks in
18 advance so that we can be able to go through it. We
19 would deeply appreciate that.

20 DC PARISH: Absolutely.

21 COMMISSIONER WOODS: I call to question.

22 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: Madame Chair?

23 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Yes, Commissioner?

24 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: Can I ask one
25 question?

1 PARLIAMENTARIAN: That motion doesn't
2 (inaudible). We don't have to deal with that.

3 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Support.

4 PARLIAMENTARIAN: It's a non-debatable
5 motion.

6 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: So no questions?

7 PARLIAMENTARIAN: No questions.

8 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: All right.

9 PARLIAMENTARIAN: Calling to question, means
10 end the debate.

11 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay. All those in
12 favor indicate by saying aye.

13 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

14 PARLIAMENTARIAN: Sorry. Because it requires
15 2/3s, we need to at least have --

16 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: We have to do roll
17 call, all right.

18 PARLIAMENTARIAN: You don't have to have roll
19 call. But they need to at least raise their hands. It
20 requires 2/3s to adopt the motion.

21 COMMISSIONER BOMAN: On a point of order --

22 PARLIAMENTARIAN: Point of order goes through
23 the Chair.

24 COMMISSIONER BOMAN: I just want to be clear
25 that the first vote, I believe, would be to end debate.

1 And the second vote would be on the actual original
2 motion?

3 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay, so --

4 PARLIAMENTARIAN: When a motion to call to
5 question is adopted, you will immediately vote on the
6 pending motion which is to accept the Chief's
7 recommendation to promote Lieutenant Damian Manning to
8 the position of captain and there would be no further
9 debate, no further question.

10 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay. So there's
11 two motions. One motion to end the debate, and then
12 the second one --

13 PARLIAMENTARIAN: The highest ranking motion
14 that's on the floor, so it has to go first.

15 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: The highest ranking
16 motion is?

17 PARLIAMENTARIAN: The motion to call to
18 question is a higher ranking motion than the motion to
19 accept the Chief's recommendation, so you have to vote
20 on that.

21 COMMISSIONER WOODS: Can I withdraw my
22 motion?

23 PARLIAMENTARIAN: So right now, the
24 Commission is voting on whether you want to end the
25 debate.

1 COMMISSIONER WOODS: Okay.

2 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay. All those in
3 favor, indicate by saying aye.

4 PARLIAMENTARIAN: No. It requires 2/3s --
5 I'm sorry, Madame Chair.

6 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: All right. So we
7 have to raise our hands?

8 PARLIAMENTARIAN: At least raise your hand.

9 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay, so I should
10 say that. All those in favor raise your hand.

11 PARLIAMENTARIAN: Thank you. Seven in favor.

12 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Those not in favor,
13 raise your hand.

14 PARLIAMENTARIAN: There's one.

15 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay. The motion
16 carries.

17 PARLIAMENTARIAN: You immediately go to the
18 motion to promote.

19 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay. A motion has
20 been made. We don't have to make it again, right?

21 PARLIAMENTARIAN: No.

22 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: A motion has been
23 made by Commissioner Woods, seconded by Commissioner
24 Jones to approve the Chief's recommendation to promote
25 Lieutenant Damian Manning, to the position of captain.

1 Is there any discussion?

2 PARLIAMENTARIAN: No.

3 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: No, no discussion.

4 All in favor indicate by saying aye.

5 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

6 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Do we have to raise
7 our hand for that one? No, okay.

8 PARLIAMENTARIAN: It only requires a majority
9 vote.

10 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay. Those -- any
11 nays? Okay. The motion carries.

12 PARLIAMENTARIAN: There you go.

13 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you.

14 Congratulations, Captain Manning. Would you like to
15 say any words?

16 CPT. MANNING: Absolutely.

17 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Sure.

18 CPT. MANNING: And I thank Commissioner Boman
19 for bringing that to clarity. I appreciate you.

20 Through the Chair, first I'd like to thank the Chief of

21 Police, Todd Bettison for the opportunity. I'm

22 tremendously humbled and honored that he considered me

23 for this position. Also, I'd like to thank his

24 executive staff for giving me any consideration in

25 regard in this matter, as well as you guys. So I'd

1 like to thank you for your vote of confidence. We just
2 hashed that out. I appreciate that.

3 Additionally, I would like to thank my family
4 for supporting me throughout this journey, for all the
5 sacrifices they made to assist me in achieving these
6 endeavors that I've been treading to accomplish.

7 I do have a commitment to the city to
8 continue to uphold the integrity and the standards of
9 this department, and encourage everybody that I come in
10 contact with to do the same. I'm a proud product of
11 this city. I lived in this city a majority of my life,
12 on the east side of Detroit. And I will continue
13 earnestly to serve this community with respect and
14 dignity and give it the compassion that it deserves.
15 And once again, I thank everybody for this opportunity
16 of elevation. Thank you.

17 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Thank you, Captain
18 and congratulations. At this time, we have no
19 presentation to the board. I'll ask the board
20 secretary, if she has a report.

21 SECRETARY: Under the appropriate tabs are
22 the weekly reports. Together with -- there is an
23 applicant appeal letter that was sent out to the
24 appellate, Mr. Thompson. Take note because that item
25 came in incoming correspondence some weeks ago and has

1 been resolved and the applicant will be reapplying.

2 The announcements for this week are as
3 follows: Our next board meeting is the February 2026
4 community meeting 6:30 p.m. in the 11th Precinct. It
5 will be held at Pleasant Grove Missionary Baptist
6 Church. 13651 Dequindre.

7 The March Community meeting will be Thursday
8 March 12, 6:30 p.m. The location, 10th Precinct. And
9 that will held at the Helen Moore Community Center,
10 11825 Dexter Avenue, Detroit. Those are the
11 announcements and report for today, Madame Chair.

12 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you. Is there
13 any unfinished business?

14 COMMISSIONER WOODS: I think we're on to
15 closed session, right?

16 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Yes. Under New
17 Business, we do have a closed session pursuant to
18 Section 818A of the Opening Meeting Act MCL15.268A.
19 The Department's request for the Board to consider
20 administrative leave without pay but with medical
21 benefits for police officer Cory Davis, badge number
22 474 assigned to the 2nd Precinct. Is there a motion?

23 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Motion.

24 COMMISSIONER WOODS: Second.

25 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: A motion has been

1 made by Commissioner Carter, seconded by Commissioner
2 Woods to go into closed section. Any discussion? All
3 in favor indicate by saying aye.

4 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

5 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Opposed? Okay.

6 Motion carries. A two-minute recess.

7 (Open session ended at 4:45 for closed
8 session and commenced at 5:23 p.m.)

9 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: All right. Could I
10 have the secretary -- we're gonna call the meeting back
11 to order. Could I have the secretary do the roll call?

12 SECRETARY: Commissioner Dewaelsche?

13 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Present.

14 SECRETARY: Commissioner Woods?

15 COMMISSIONER WOODS: Present.

16 SECRETARY: Commissioner Boman?

17 COMMISSIONER BOMAN: Present.

18 SECRETARY: Commissioner Camille?

19 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: Present.

20 SECRETARY: Commissioner Carter?

21 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Here.

22 SECRETARY: Commissioner Ivey is excused.

23 Commissioner Jones?

24 COMMISSIONER JONES: Present.

25 SECRETARY: Commissioner Morris is excused.

1 Commissioner Watts?

2 COMMISSIONER WATTS: Here.

3 SECRETARY: Commissioner Williams?

4 COMMISSIONER WILLIAMS: Present.

5 SECRETARY: Eight present, Madame Chair.

6 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay. Thank you.

7 What is the pleasure of the Board? Is there a motion?

8 Okay. There is no motion, so the next item -- is there

9 a motion to adjourn the meeting?

10 COMMISSIONER WILLIAMS: Motion.

11 COMMISSIONER BOMAN: Doesn't there need to be

12 a motion on this? Doesn't there need to be vote on

13 this matter before us?

14 COMMISSIONER WOODS: It fails.

15 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: It fails. There's

16 no motion made. Yeah, so there's a motion to adjourn

17 the meeting by Commissioner Williams. Seconded by?

18 COMMISSIONER WATTS: Second.

19 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Commissioner Watts.

20 Any discussion? All in favor indicate by saying Aye.

21 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

22 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Opposed? Motion

23 carries. Thank you for attending today's meeting.
