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4 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Good afternoon,
5 everyone. Welcome. Welcome to the Board of Police
6 Commissioners meeting. It's February 19th. And I'd like
7 to call the meeting to order. We'll start with the
8 invocation. And it's going to be given by Jihad Taleb,
9 who will be here in person, correct? Okay, would you
10 please? Yes.

11 MR. TALEB: Thank you. Peace be with you.
12 I'll recite a short prayer. And I'll be saying it in
13 Arabic, then in English. In the name of God, the most
14 compassionate, the most merciful, all praise belongs to
15 God, the Lord of all worlds. O God, guide us toward what
16 is best for the city and its people, citizens, and
17 residents. And bless us with justice, wisdom, and
18 compassion in all our decisions. O God, guide us toward
19 what is best for the city and its people. And bless us
20 with justice, wisdom, and compassion -- I'm repeating
21 myself over here -- in all our decisions. Help us to be
22 among those who seek truth and justice, serving our
23 community with sincerity, guidance, and truthfulness, and
24 trustworthiness. Unite our hearts and let our efforts
25 bring peace and safety to our community. O God, grant us

1 good in this life and in the hereafter and protect us
2 from hellfire. Grant us a pure heart full of love and
3 humanity. Thank you.

4 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you. Amen.

5 Next, thank you. Our secretary, could we have
6 the roll call?

7 SECRETARY GARNIER: Commissioner Dewaelsche?

8 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Present.

9 SECRETARY GARNIER: Commissioner Woods?

10 VICE CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Present.

11 SECRETARY GARNIER: Commissioner Bowen?

12 COMMISSIONER BOMAN: Present.

13 SECRETARY GARNIER: Commissioner Camille?

14 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: Present.

15 SECRETARY GARNIER: Commissioner Carter?

16 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Here.

17 SECRETARY GARNIER: Commissioner Ivey?

18 COMMISSIONER IVEY: Present.

19 SECRETARY GARNIER: Commissioner Jones?

20 COMMISSIONER JONES: Present.

21 SECRETARY GARNIER: Commissioner Morris?

22 COMMISSIONER MORRIS: Present.

23 SECRETARY GARNIER: Commissioner Watts?

24 COMMISSIONER WATTS: Here.

25 SECRETARY GARNIER: Nine present, Madam Chair.

1 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you. I don't
2 think you mentioned Commissioner Williams.

3 SECRETARY GARNIER: I'm sorry, I wasn't looking
4 up. I apologize. Commissioner Williams?

5 COMMISSIONER WILLIAMS: Present.

6 SECRETARY GARNIER: Ten present.

7 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you.

8 Next, I'd like to have approval of the February
9 19th agenda, today's agenda. Is there a motion?

10 COMMISSIONER JONES: So moved.

11 COMMISSIONER WATTS: Support.

12 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: It's been moved by
13 Commissioner Woods, seconded by Commissioner -- I'm
14 sorry.

15 VICE CHAIRPERSON WOODS: No.

16 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Commissioner Jones,
17 seconded by Commissioner Watts. Is there any discussion?
18 All in favor indicate by saying aye.

19 ALL COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

20 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Opposed? The motion
21 carries. Thank you.

22 And now, could I get approval of the minutes
23 for February 12th, 2026.

24 VICE CHAIRPERSON WOODS: So moved.

25 COMMISSIONER JONES: Support.

1 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELESCHE: It's been moved by
2 Commissioner Woods, supported by Commissioner Jones. Is
3 there any discussion? All in favor indicate by saying
4 aye.

5 ALL COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

6 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELESCHE: Opposed? The motion
7 carries. Thank you.

8 Now, Madam Secretary, could we have the
9 introduction of our guests, staff, police personnel, and
10 elected officials and representatives.

11 SECRETARY GARNIER: Madam Chair, through the
12 Chair, present, recorded at this time are as follows:
13 Corporation Counsel Conrad Mallet, Jonya Underwood,
14 Artemisia Joshua, Dior Mathis, Armani Arnold, Candace
15 Hayes, Mary Barber, Felicia Tyson, Drew Fries, Dr.
16 Francis Jackson - Parliamentarian, Chief Investigator
17 Jerome Warfield, Supervising Investigator Elgin Murphy,
18 DPD HR Director Katrina Patillo. Our interpreters today
19 are Angelic Taylor and Dr. Stephanie Beatty. Court
20 reporter today, Hanson Court Reporting. Audio Visual,
21 Charles Henry. Media Services, Enrique Jackson.
22 Assistant Chief Franklin Hayes is with us for Chief
23 Bettison's Office. Ms. Marie Overall - 2nd Precinct,
24 Fredia Butler of the 2nd Precinct, Nicole Fisher - 4th
25 Precinct, Community Relations Council President is on

1 Zoom. Mark Young is present, Lieutenant and Sergeant
2 Association President. Ron Thomas, Vice President of the
3 Detroit Police Officers Association. Former Police
4 Commissioner William Davis is on Zoom. And also, Former
5 Police Commissioner Ricardo Moore is on Zoom.

6 And that ends who's registered at this time,
7 Madam Chair.

8 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Thank you, Madam
9 Secretary.

10 For today's meeting, I just want to make a note
11 that we have five closed sessions today. And so, given
12 that that is added to the end of our meeting and will
13 take quite a bit of time, I'm going to limit the public
14 comment to one minute instead of two minutes.

15 MS. DAVIS (FROM AUDIENCE): Unconstitutional
16 already. That's a violation. We the people. You cannot
17 --

18 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: I'm going to limit the
19 public comment to one minute instead of two minutes.

20 MS. DAVIS (FROM AUDIENCE): Who gives you that
21 authority?

22 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Next, we have the
23 Chief of Police report.

24 DEPUTY CHIEF HAYES: Thank you, Madam Chair.
25 Representing the Office of the Chief, I am Franklin

1 Hayes, Assistant Chief of the Office of Support
2 Operations.

3 We wanted to talk about our crimes here in our
4 city. We -- compared to this time last year, we are up
5 one homicide. We are down 16 non-fatal shootings. We
6 are down five robberies and down about four carjackings
7 in the city. As we continue to work with our strategy
8 and drive these issues down, we had a significant
9 incident yesterday that is still an open investigation,
10 and we certainly ask for the community's help if they
11 have any information and that occurred in the 4th
12 Precinct. It's on South Ethel where we had three
13 individuals found deceased inside of a home -- inside of
14 a residence. Anyone with information regarding that
15 incident, please contact Detroit Police Homicide or
16 Rewards TV or Crime Stoppers at 1-800-SPEAK-UP.

17 Some more significant work done by the men and
18 women of the Detroit Police Department. On Wednesday,
19 February 11th, at -- 2026, officers from the Detroit
20 Police Department Narcotics Unit executed three search
21 warrants on the east side, the 1200 block of Coplin, the
22 2900 block of Drexel, and the 1300 block of Lakeview.
23 Officers made one felony arrest and confiscated cocaine,
24 fentanyl, three firearms, and over \$11,000 cash as well
25 as packaging and processing materials for the

1 distribution of these illegal drugs as well as
2 ammunition. Anyone with more information, again on any
3 of this narcotics or illegal activity, can text us --
4 call us, 911, text us at 911, or make a report at 313-
5 267-4600 and report this illegal activity if you're
6 seeing them in your neighborhood.

7 Another significant event that rocked our
8 community happened on Tuesday, February 10th at 4:28 AM
9 when a 60-year-old victim at a gas station in the 15,700
10 block of Joy Road was at a gas station when a vehicle
11 entered -- when an individual entered his vehicle from
12 the driver's side and strong armed -- committed a
13 carjacking, took his vehicle, including physically
14 attacking him, striking him multiple times, and fatally
15 injuring him with his own car, running him over. That
16 individual was later pursued by Michigan State Police in
17 the city of Dearborn where he was subsequently arrested.
18 Charges were submitted to the Wayne County Prosecutor's
19 Office, and the warrant was signed for felony murder,
20 first-degree murder, and carjacking. Just a note to the
21 great work done by our investigators and the officers
22 that took this individual into custody. Our hearts go
23 out to the victim and his family for this senseless and
24 tragic crime.

25 Community updates. Tomorrow, February 20th, we

1 will be graduating 26 student police officers who will
2 take their oath and become full sworn Detroit police
3 officers. It will commence tomorrow morning at 10:30 AM
4 at Second Ebenezer Baptist Church -- I'm sorry, Second
5 Ebenezer Church located at 14601 Dequindre Street. And
6 anyone interested you can come up and support these new
7 men and women that are joining this agency, or you can
8 also visit joindetroitsfinest.org to apply.

9 On upcoming, March the 7th, 2026, Saturday, DPD
10 will be hosting a procedural justice and police
11 legitimacy forum to strengthen the relationship between
12 policing and the needs of the community. Community
13 members are encouraged to voice their concerns and learn
14 the procedures police use to accomplish and carry out
15 their duties. This meeting will be held at SAY Detroit
16 Play Center located at 19320 Van Dyke in the 11th
17 Precinct at 9:00 AM. To register, please contact
18 Sergeant Justin Hearn at 313-900-9377.

19 Brevity is the call on today's agenda so at
20 this point, Madam Chair, I will conclude the Chief's
21 report.

22 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you, Chief. Are
23 there any questions?

24 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: Through the Chair?

25 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Yes, go ahead.

1 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: Thank you.

2 Thanks for the report, Chief. Can you provide
3 for the benefit of the public an update around the
4 situation with Ms. Tracey Allen? And I know there's a
5 lawsuit so I'm not here to talk about that at all. But I
6 understand that last year the BOPC took action to approve
7 administrative leave without pay for the officer that
8 shot her, and then I saw an article that as of the 5th of
9 this month the officer is on admin pay without --
10 administrative leave without pay but with benefits. Is
11 that still that officer's status?

12 DEPUTY CHIEF HAYES: Through the Chair, that is
13 correct.

14 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: Okay, thank you. And
15 then do we have a status on the -- on the warrant? I
16 know it's routine for the Department to submit a warrant
17 to the prosecutor's office. Any updates on that?

18 DEPUTY CHIEF HAYES: Through the Chair, I have
19 seen nothing in writing as it relates to the prosecutor's
20 decision whether or not to charge.

21 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: Okay, thank you so much
22 for that update.

23 And then through the Chair, one other question.
24 Given the updates that the Chief gave the BOPC last week
25 as well as to city council this week in regards to the

1 two cases of border patrol being called, has the
2 department ramped up ways to uncover additional
3 noncompliance like increased auditing or anything like
4 that?

5 DEPUTY CHIEF HAYES: Through the Chair, yes,
6 from the command level down to frontline supervision and
7 also the members themselves being reminded in many of the
8 policies that have been published through teletype and
9 electronically. Also the duty to intervene where if an
10 officer sees another member committing misconduct or a
11 violation of any policy, certainly that member's
12 responsibility, but certainly the supervisor's as well,
13 when they're conducting body warrant audits and the
14 increase of that. The in-car -- vehicle camera audits
15 and again, so to your answer, yes, ma'am.

16 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: Thank you, Madam Chair.

17 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHE: Thank you.

18 Commissioner Watts?

19 COMMISSIONER WATTS: Thank you. Hi, how are
20 you?

21 DEPUTY CHIEF HAYES: Good, how are you?

22 COMMISSIONER WATTS: Great, great. Thank you
23 for that -- for that report. Just a quick question going
24 back to that unfortunate fatality at the gas station, and
25 thank you and your team for the quick apprehension. I'm

1 just curious, quick question, was that gas station a part
2 of the Greenlight program?

3 DEPUTY CHIEF HAYES: Through the Chair, it was
4 not.

5 COMMISSIONER WATTS: Okay. Thank you.

6 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you. Any other
7 questions? I'm not sure if I missed it but do you have
8 an update on the three bodies that were just found
9 yesterday?

10 DEPUTY CHIEF HAYES: Madam Chair, that
11 investigation is still on- --

12 MS. DAVIS (FROM AUDIENCE): You don't care
13 about them bodies because you only give us a minute to
14 speak so don't even do that. The fact that you don't
15 care about --

16 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Ma'am, please.

17 MS. DAVIS (FROM AUDIENCE): Ain't no ma'am.

18 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Let us hear what the
19 Chief has to say.

20 MS. DAVIS (FROM AUDIENCE): I didn't come here
21 for this, and you're gonna give me a speak up there
22 acting like you're worried about them bodies.

23 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Let us hear what the
24 Chief has to say.

25 MS. DAVIS (FROM AUDIENCE): You ain't worried.

1 You --

2 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Please.

3 MS. DAVIS (FROM AUDIENCE): I have a -- more
4 than two minutes to speak. Who are you?

5 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Please. Let us hear
6 what the Chief has to say.

7 MS. DAVIS (FROM AUDIENCE): You ain't gotta a
8 badge. (indiscernible).

9 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: If you continue to be
10 out of order, we're going to ask you to leave.

11 MS. DAVIS (FROM AUDIENCE): You out of order.

12 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: We're going to ask you
13 to leave if you continue this.

14 MS. DAVIS (FROM AUDIENCE): Who is we?

15 DEPUTY CHIEF HAYES: Madam?

16 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Chief, go ahead.

17 DEPUTY CHIEF HAYES: Madam Chair, a lot has
18 transpired since that discovery was made this afternoon.
19 Assistant Chief Fitzgerald will be doing an update to the
20 community at 3:30 here shortly to talk about where that
21 investigation is and I will gladly (indiscernible) that
22 information to this body shortly thereafter.

23 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you. Are there
24 any other questions? Yes, Commissioner Morris.

25 COMMISSIONER MORRIS: How you doing, Assistant

1 Chief Hayes? Good to see you. There was a lot of also
2 media coverage and social media coverage on a young lady
3 up on Gratiot Avenue not too far from the 9th Precinct
4 who reported that she was robbed while she was selling
5 Valentine's Day baskets and she was also assaulted. Do
6 you have more information on that?

7 DEPUTY CHIEF HAYES: Through -- through the
8 Chair, we saw that, and we immediately started leveraging
9 technology and canvassing the areas to see if we could
10 find the individuals that she identified as robbing her.
11 That investigation is still open at this point. I will
12 reach out to the Precinct to see if they have an update,
13 but as of now, my understanding is that that is an active
14 investigation.

15 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you. Any other
16 questions? Comments? Hearing none, thank you, Chief,
17 for that report.

18 Now, we're going to go to oral communications
19 and public comment. Comments today are going to be
20 limited to one minute. Inappropriate language and
21 comments may delay TV broadcasts and video posts. Could
22 we have our first speaker?

23 MS. UNDERWOOD: Thank you, Madam Chair. The
24 first speaker will be Ms. Elena Herrada, then Ms. Fredia
25 Butler -- Ms. Fredia Butler, and then Lieutenant -- then

1 Mother Bernice Smith.

2 MS. HERRADA: Good afternoon. Thank you. I am
3 Elena Herrada. H-E-R-R-A-D-A. I just wanted to clarify
4 for the Secretary who is always trying to make an effort
5 to say my name right.

6 I would like to just mention that many of us
7 are concerned about the collaboration between ICE and the
8 Detroit Police Department, and we also are aware of the
9 complications of arbitrator decisions when it comes to
10 really being able to discipline officers for serious
11 offenses against the community, and I was just wondering
12 if there would be a point when the public can understand
13 what the implications of the arbitrator's decision are to
14 the actual actions of officers. Thank you.

15 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you, Elena. Oh,
16 comment? Go ahead.

17 COMMISSIONER BOMAN: Yeah, I wanted to comment
18 on Ms. Herrada's inquiry. The -- there is a contract
19 between the DPOA and the Detroit Police Department, and
20 also between the Sergeant Lieutenant's Association and
21 the Detroit Police Department. In that contract, they
22 have rules that conflict with the Charter, and the
23 arbitrator and the courts are recognizing the contract
24 above the Detroit Charter. The Charter is up for
25 negotiation starting very soon and on through 2027. So,

1 anyone who's concerned about that problem of us not being
2 able to have any teeth when we deny a promotion needs to
3 get engaged with the whole negotiating process over that
4 contract. Thank you.

5 MS. HERRADA: Thank you.

6 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Any other comments or
7 questions?

8 All right, next speaker, please.

9 MS. BUTLER: Good afternoon.

10 ALL COMMISSIONERS: Good afternoon.

11 MS. BUTLER: I'm going to read this very fast.

12 ICE is having -- is buying warehouses to detain black and
13 brown people in the city of Detroit and from other
14 places. Who has given permission to sell buildings in
15 Detroit to ICE? It seems as if our leaders are behind in
16 informing the people in Detroit of what they are doing to
17 keep ICE out of our city and the state. Are they being
18 complicit in working with the President to have
19 concentration camps here? It has taken 400 years for us
20 to get this far, and we are not going back. Both black
21 and white are demonstrating against ICE because we know
22 that democracy is at stake for all of us. Wake up,
23 sleeping giants, and think. Let's not be divided.
24 Observe, listen, and be informed. We have got a lot of
25 work to do between now and November to inform people what

1 is at stake. Some people that I've spoken to think that
2 what's happening is not affecting them. It's happening
3 to other people who don't look like them. They are sadly
4 mistaken. Democracy and everything else are on the
5 ballot. Let's get smart. The President is working to
6 suppress our votes.

7 MS. UNDERWOOD: Thank you.

8 MS. BUTLER: Thank you.

9 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you. Next
10 speaker, please.

11 MS. UNDERWOOD: Ms. Bernice Smith.

12 MS. SMITH: Good afternoon.

13 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Good afternoon.

14 MS. SMITH: I haven't been to our meetings in a
15 couple of weeks, and I found some disturbing news that
16 was given to me, not only this week, but I'm gonna hurry
17 up since you said it's a minute, baby?

18 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Yes.

19 MS. SMITH: Oh, my goodness. But anyway, I
20 want all of you to know being with the police department
21 since '73 under Coleman Young when most of you were all
22 babies, I have faith in them, in the chiefs. And I want
23 you to know Chief Bettison, he has done a wonderful job
24 so far, as long as he's been in that position, and my
25 Southfield chief, I've known him the same way, and I

1 called him and said, don't worry about it. Just pray to
2 the good Lord. And I want all of you to know, leave my
3 police alone. Let them do their job. If they were
4 wrong, I feel as though that they should be punished in a
5 way that is according to what we would do. But don't
6 fire them. I don't want them to fire them because they
7 -- they need their jobs.

8 And for all you police, be happy with your job
9 and be safe out there. And I want you to know, I
10 appreciate you, but the --

11 MS. UNDERWOOD: Thank you.

12 MS. SMITH: -- city don't. So, take care of
13 yourselves.

14 And young lady, this is a meeting that we have
15 every weekend. We don't tolerate disrespect.

16 MS. UNDERWOOD: Thank you. Thank you.

17 MS. DAVIS (FROM AUDIENCE): They don't tolerate
18 our constitutional --

19 MS. SMITH: Be kind. Be kind. Just be kind.

20 MS. DAVIS (FROM AUDIENCE): I'm very kind.

21 MS. UNDERWOOD: Our next three speakers will be
22 Ms. Williams, Ms. Guadalupe Avalos, and Mr. Rou. So,
23 please state your name for the record.

24 MS. WILLIAMS: Charnita Williams. Okay, I'm
25 going to make this real quick and simple. We have ex-

1 offenders on the Detroit Police Department, and I'm not
2 knocking nobody if you're on the police department
3 legally without these fake names. The 3rd Precinct have
4 a whole lot of ex-offenders that work overnight. Like I
5 said, the man that raped me worked nights, overnights at
6 the 3rd with a bad eye. Todd -- Tim, excuse me. Tim
7 with a bad eye. So, you all sit up here and talk every
8 week, hacking into my devices, bosses, hacking, stalking,
9 all of this. It's unconstitutional. Stalking is
10 illegal. And you up here, like we in Hollywood, all this
11 is just for show and tell.

12 MS. DAVIS (FROM AUDIENCE): Absolutely.

13 MS. WILLIAMS: They sit up in here a lot. The
14 same officers, Cheryl Hall and LaShonda Wilson --
15 Houston, she work at the 3rd. The man that continued to
16 break inside my apartment. Houston's daughter live
17 underneath me, coming through the vents. I'm tired of my
18 life being upside down because you guys chose to -- all
19 this illegal corruption. It's time for the FBI to take
20 it back. Thirteen years, you can't handle it. They need
21 to do their -- y'all jobs. Plain and simple.

22 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Next speaker?

23 MS. AVALOS: Good afternoon. My name is
24 Guadalupe Avalos. I am from the 4th Precinct in
25 Southwest Detroit and I'm here to ask you guys to please

1 hold your officers accountable for working with ICE. We
2 have a big issue of mistrust in our community with the
3 police and increasing that trust with our community
4 begins by holding police officers accountable. I urge
5 you to please support the charter that keeps police
6 officers from working with ICE and keeps our community
7 safe. Detroit police officers are here to work for the
8 citizens in the community, not to work for the federal
9 government. Thank you.

10 MS. DAVIS (FROM AUDIENCE): Ain't no
11 government.

12 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you, next
13 speaker.

14 MS. UNDERWOOD: Mr. Rou, --

15 MR. ROU: Yeah.

16 MS. UNDERWOOD: -- then Ms. Bonita Davis.

17 MR. ROU: Turn up time.

18 MS. UNDERWOOD: And then Cheryl.

19 MR. ROU: Turn up time, y'all.

20 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER (FROM AUDIENCE): Turn it
21 up.

22 MR. ROU: Hey. Nene (phonetic) is going to be
23 in town tomorrow. She's going to ask me some questions,
24 and I got some answers for her. Charmaine McCloud did
25 it. Did you hear that, Conrad? Yeah. And I got it, got

1 it, got it. For real, for real. Conrad Mallet Jr., the
2 cuffs have been on me ten times. Nine times to the
3 Detroit Detention Center since 2020 when I started
4 investigating this and one time to the Detroit Receiving
5 Hospital Samaritan Behavior Center, where I had to stay
6 there for 13 whole days until I was able to get up out of
7 that sugar, honey, iced tea. And they tried to inject me
8 with six different psychotropical [sic] medications.
9 Freddie Burton Jr., Chief Probate Judge, issued the
10 order. Didn't happen. And I'm still here. Kaniesha
11 Coleman, DPD case 20-11112, did not shoot herself and my
12 name is Youngblood from the Booster Projects of 1980. I
13 put my whole reputation on it.

14 MS. UNDERWOOD: Thank you.

15 MR. ROU: Now, y'all cheated in. Cheated in --

16 MS. UNDERWOOD: Thank you, Mr. Rou.

17 MR. ROU: -- by Janice Winfrey, --

18 MS. UNDERWOOD: Ms. Bonita Davis.

19 MR. ROU: -- Gene Ervin Walker (phonetic), and
20 Daniel Baxter (phonetic).

21 MS. DAVIS: Good evening, everybody. I'm just
22 passionate about what I stand on. Well, let me address
23 something. Sovereign is an act of nature. A United
24 States citizen is a sole proprietorship, a partnership, a
25 C-corp, an S-corp, a non-profit, an LLC, or a trust in a

1 state. Unless any of y'all identify as that, that's what
2 you are. And we are not the public. It's called we the
3 people. You gotta take it back to the Constitution.
4 They have a contract with us. What they did is they took
5 a Michigan State Constitution in 1963, and they overrode
6 the Constitution that they have to abide by. So, it's
7 our position as people is to make sure that we keep these
8 counterfeits out of office. Otherwise, it's going to be
9 a mess. All of this prayer, all of these fictitious
10 titles, all of these fake gods, none of that matters.
11 Until we stand up and the Constitution -- and respect --
12 the Constitution is just like an employee handbook.
13 Anywhere you go, if you don't do your job, you got to go.
14 So, it's no different with these people. Stop giving
15 them authority. They have none. They're uneducated,
16 miseducated, and because you guys don't know, this is why
17 they get away with their abuse. So, that's a fact. I'm
18 just passionate about what I stand on. And I'm not
19 attacking anybody. But right is right. Now we got the
20 Great Seal, or we got the Michigan State Seal.

21 MS. UNDERWOOD: Thank you. Thank you.

22 MS. DAVIS: We're North America. Understand
23 territory.

24 MS. UNDERWOOD: Next three speakers will be
25 Cheryl or Chery, please state your name at the mic, Mr.

1 Smith, and then Michael's mom. And then we'll go into
2 Zoom.

3 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER (FROM AUDIENCE):
4 (indiscernible).

5 MS. CHERY: Yeah. Hi, everybody. I am with
6 the Community Relations Manager. Good evening. We just
7 want to just encourage you to come out. It's important.
8 The community conversation on procedural justice and
9 restorative practices is taking place on Saturday, March
10 7th at the SAY Detroit Play Center. And this event is
11 designed for the residents to come together, to learn, to
12 ask questions, and to have honest dialogue. Without
13 dialogue, you can't bring about change. It's about
14 policing in our community. You have the opportunity to
15 learn about the history of policing, understand current
16 policies and procedures. Videos will be shown, officers
17 will be present, and most importantly, your voice
18 matters. Again, your voice matters. If you or someone
19 you know that has had an experience with law enforcement,
20 whether positive or negative, this space -- this is a
21 space to learn, to share, and to be heard. Though it's
22 housed on the east side, everyone is welcome to be there.
23 We recognize that procedures and policies don't always
24 ease the frustration or pain of people. But if you still
25 feel unheard, this is an opportunity to speak openly and

1 contribute to meaningful change. Breakfast and lunch
2 will be provided. Thank you so much. Please come out.
3 It's important. Your voice does matter.

4 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Thank you. Next
5 speaker?

6 MS. DAVIS (FROM AUDIENCE): Oh, and by the way,
7 it's self-governance.

8 MS. UNDERWOOD: Mr. Smith?

9 MS. DAVIS (FROM AUDIENCE): You don't need a
10 leader as an adult.

11 MR. SMITH: Good afternoon. Jadante Smith for
12 the record. I come here -- I come here a lot.
13 Generally, I think people know my name, but I just wanted
14 to say hello, Mr. Conrad Mallet. I am working as hard as
15 I can to remove your law license from you because you are
16 a -- you tried to bribe me with the job. You're a
17 terrible corporation counsel. You shouldn't sit on this
18 Board. You sitting on this Board is a conflict of
19 interest. How do you advise a board of elected officials
20 who you have no authority over to hold officers
21 accountable and then turn around and defend those same
22 officers when they get lawsuits? It's a conflict of
23 interest. You can't do both sides. You can't be a
24 plaintiff representative and a defendant representative.
25 Also, I think that the vote for these officers

1 to be suspended for violating clear policy should be
2 unanimous. If it's not, we got a problem, because if you
3 violate clear policy that states you do not work with
4 ICE, that's a problem.

5 Also, I'll be making sure I bring in Mothers
6 Keeping Boots on the Ground and their families to come
7 and talk about their murdered loved ones who they do not
8 get proper assistance with. Very, very sad we only get
9 one minute, but thank you.

10 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you. Next
11 speaker?

12 MS. UNDERWOOD: Michael's mom.

13 MICHAEL'S MOM: Hey, y'all. So quick, since I
14 only got a minute, I asked the Board and the Chief Parish
15 a couple of questions last week. I would like to share
16 some of the answers. The questions were basically to
17 find out what was done as it pertains to my son's death
18 investigation. The first thing I'd like to acknowledge
19 is that Michael was found by my family and I on 2-24-
20 2024. By 2-25-24, the ruling of his death was suicide.
21 I was told on that day of 2-24 that his case would be
22 looked at as a homicide. So, I would like to first find
23 out how long does it take to start, open, and investigate
24 an investigation? Because from what I have here from
25 Captain McCord, as well as Detective Mackie (phonetic),

1 that in 24 hours they determined that it was a suicide.
2 Where was the investigation done at? They did not do any
3 ballistics on the gun. They did not take any
4 fingerprints. They did not test the body or anything for
5 DNA. So, what did they do as it pertains to an actual
6 investigation?

7 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Any comment, Chief?
8 Can we give an update? Oh, D.C. Parish?

9 DEPUTY CHIEF PARISH: Yes, through you to the
10 rest of the Board, we recently met with a council member
11 regarding this case. We've also followed up with the
12 homicide section. We're going to be scheduling a meeting
13 that includes, we're going to extend invites to the
14 Board, obviously Michael's mom, as well as to the council
15 member that's expressed interest in this, just so that
16 all groups are on the same page as to what we did, why we
17 did it, and why we couldn't do anything more under the
18 circumstances. So, hopefully that will bring resolution
19 to this matter, at least understanding, if not hopefully
20 agreement.

21 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you. Thank you.
22 Any -- any other comments?

23 Okay. Hearing none, next speaker?

24 MS. UNDERWOOD: Thank you, Madam Chair. We're
25 going to go into Zoom. Our first speaker will be Zoom

1 User, Avery Bolt, and then Ms. Taura Brown. Can you
2 unmute? Zoom User, can you unmute? Madam Chair, we'll
3 go to the next person. Avery Bolt?

4 MS. BOLT: Good afternoon. Can I be heard?

5 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Yes, you may.

6 MS. BOLT: I thank you for letting me speak. I
7 just wanted to also raise my concerns about the
8 collaboration between DPD and ICE and Border Patrol. I
9 was part of -- I was listening to the meeting a little
10 while back where Chief Bettison, you know, claimed that
11 he had no knowledge of any collaboration between Detroit
12 police officers and ICE. Well, we now have, you know,
13 irrefutable proof that is -- that is false, that that --
14 this is happening, and it probably has been happening and
15 it will continue to happen. And I want to urge this
16 Board and the police chief to continue a thorough
17 investigation on this matter and to continue to monitor
18 strictly the behavior of their officers to make sure this
19 does not continue to happen. And that if it does, they
20 are swiftly and justly punished for their behavior.
21 Thank you.

22 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you. Next
23 speaker?

24 MS. UNDERWOOD: Ms. Taura Brown?

25 MS. BROWN: Good afternoon, Board. I want to

1 echo the sentiments of Elena Herrada. She was dead on.
2 I do believe that Denise Wallet should be fired and fired
3 immediately. She is a 27-year vet on the Detroit Police
4 Department Police Force, and you don't mean to tell me
5 she didn't know what the consequences were going to be by
6 calling Detroit -- by calling Border Patrol. She's been
7 a Detroit police officer long enough to know that under
8 this administration, exactly what would happen. I am
9 curious to know how many times over the past five years
10 she's reached out to the interpreter service. I also
11 want to know how many times since January 1st of 2025 has
12 she reached out to ICE and Border Patrol on duty as a
13 Detroit police officer. Because I just don't think that
14 this was the first time that she did this. I think this
15 is something she's been doing, and she just happened to
16 get caught. And again, in this climate, a white woman
17 who's been a police officer 27 years for the Detroit
18 Police Department knew damn well better than to be
19 calling the Border Patrol than anybody else for
20 interpreter services. She should be fired without
21 question.

22 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you. Next
23 speaker?

24 MS. UNDERWOOD: Our next speaker will be Chris
25 Gilmore-Hill, Ash Rose, Former Commissioner William

1 Davis.

2 MR. GILMORE-HILL: Hi, good afternoon. May I
3 be heard?

4 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Yes, you may.

5 MR. GILMORE-HILL: My name is Chris Gilmore-
6 Hill. I'm a lifelong Detroitter, resident of the city's
7 2nd District, and a candidate for state rep in House
8 District 8. I'm calling in to echo the sentiments of
9 Elena and many other calls before me. This board needs
10 to do whatever needs to be done to hold the officers
11 accountable for calling ICE in violation of our city's
12 policies and the basic human decency in our city. We
13 know what it means to call ICE on someone right now.
14 That's why we have a city policy that that's not going to
15 happen. And violating that is a violation of every
16 Detroitter's civil rights and basic trust in the
17 institutions of our government. I want to thank
18 Commissioners Camille, Boman, and Ivey for taking
19 leadership and speaking out and demanding more answers on
20 this. I want to call on this whole board, not just to
21 make sure these officers are fired, although they
22 absolutely need to be fired, but to do everything you can
23 to get answers. We need to know about every call that
24 was made from any officers to ICE. We need to know about
25 what's being done to make sure this never happens again.

1 Thank you.

2 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Next speaker?

3 MS. UNDERWOOD: Ms. Rose?

4 MS. ROSE-DAVIS: Hi. Can I be heard?

5 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Yes, you may.

6 MS. ROSE-DAVIS: Hi, my name is Ash Davis. I'm
7 a Detroit resident in 48208. I'm asking that the names
8 of the two police officers who called Border Patrol
9 during traffic stops be released and that those officers
10 be fired immediately and held accountable for their
11 actions. The individuals arrested deserve to be
12 compensated for legal fees and all the difficulties
13 they've experienced. And we need to set a precedent that
14 collaboration between DPD and immigration agencies will
15 not be tolerated in the city. We need safety and care
16 for our community members and not reporting them to ICE.

17 I also would like to echo the previous caller's
18 sentiment that we need to make sure -- we need to find
19 out how often this has been happening and hold everyone
20 accountable and find ways to make sure that it never
21 happens again. Thank you.

22 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you.
23 Commissioner Boman?

24 COMMISSIONER BOMAN: Yeah, this is pertinent to
25 the content or at least the topic of the public comment.

1 I had an agen- -- well, first of all, last week we had a
2 meeting where Mr. Bettison said that he was suspending
3 the officers who had violated our policy and that we were
4 going to be voting on that matter in closed session
5 today. And I even saw an agenda where there was a much
6 longer closed session. And now I'm looking in my packet,
7 and I see absolutely nothing about that. Have we
8 reversed and decided not to suspend those officers?

9 MR. SMITH (FROM AUDIENCE): Great question.

10 VICE CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Through the Chair?

11 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Go ahead.

12 VICE CHAIRPERSON WOODS: If you see on the
13 agenda that we have five closed door sessions and all
14 those matters are on there, and so --

15 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Second page. Second
16 page.

17 VICE CHAIRPERSON WOODS: And so, you will have
18 a different binder going into closed session because it's
19 so voluminous. You know, so that's -- we're going to
20 closed session.

21 COMMISSIONER BOMAN: So, we can't see the
22 binder until closed session?

23 VICE CHAIRPERSON WOODS: No. You can see it
24 now.

25 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: He doesn't have a

1 binder.

2 COMMISSIONER BOMAN: Yeah, I do see them on the
3 second page. Sorry about that.

4 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Under new business.

5 VICE CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Not a problem.

6 MR. MALLET: You have it electronically? And
7 we're bringing the books downstairs now.

8 COMMISSIONER BOMAN: Thank you.

9 MR. MALLET: You're welcome.

10 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay. And that's --

11 VICE CHAIRPERSON WOODS: And through the Chair,
12 let me clarify the record.

13 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Go ahead.

14 VICE CHAIRPERSON WOODS: All of the materials
15 have been sent to every commissioner. All the
16 confidential information has been sent to commissioners
17 via electronically. Custom -- you know, ceremonially, we
18 have a physical binder to look at too. But everyone has
19 the information that has been sent electronically. So,
20 let the record reflect that.

21 COMMISSIONER BOMAN: Okay. Through the Chair?

22 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Go ahead.

23 COMMISSIONER BOMAN: I'll confirm that I found
24 the information I was looking for.

25 VICE CHAIRPERSON WOODS: And it was sent two

1 days ago.

2 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay. Thank you.

3 Next speaker, please?

4 MS. UNDERWOOD: Thank you, Madam Chair. Our
5 next speaker will be Former Commissioner William Davis.

6 FORMER COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Hello, can I be
7 heard?

8 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Yes, you may.

9 FORMER COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Okay, I'd like to
10 say I wholeheartedly agree with Elena Herrada and all the
11 people that have spoken about the fact that these are
12 officers that clearly violate policy and endanger the
13 life of these people that they call on. Should they --
14 y'all should follow the recommendation of the chief, and
15 y'all should encourage officers to know in the future if
16 they do this, they're endangering the life and liberty of
17 Detroiters in general, no matter their status, that
18 that's going to be the outcome. You need to show the
19 people that you are here to support the people who live
20 here in this city and who even visit this city that they
21 are safe. You know, the worst thing you can do is let
22 people think that they are not safe and that they don't
23 need to call the police and let people know that when
24 things are being in -- when their lives are being
25 endangered. So, hopefully y'all will step up to do the

1 right thing today. Thank you.

2 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHE: Thank you,
3 Commissioner. Next speaker?

4 MS. UNDERWOOD: We're gonna go back and try the
5 first call, Zoom User. Can you unmute Zoom User?

6 ZOOM USER: Hello? Can you hear me?

7 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHE: Yes, we can.

8 ZOOM USER: Okay, my name is Veronica, and I
9 live in District 6, and I wanted to talk about the
10 February 9th incident. You can clearly see in the video
11 that was on social media and everywhere else that there
12 were three DPD vehicles. So, I'm wondering why there's
13 only two being fired when you clearly see, and you should
14 hold accountable, your fellow officers. So, I also
15 believe that the families deserve compensation for their
16 legal fees. They're very expensive, and any other
17 hardship that the individuals and their families face
18 during the time that they are incarcerated or detained.

19 And also, I want to request a body camera
20 recording of all the officers that were involved and were
21 on the scene that day of February 9th. And let's bring
22 forward the fact that these people are not criminals,
23 especially the ones on February 9th. But according to a
24 law in place, not a memo, they do have the right to --

25 MS. UNDERWOOD: Our next two speakers in Zoom

1 will be Kathy Montgomery and Jordi, and then we have
2 three speakers in the audience that I failed to call
3 originally.

4 MS. MONTGOVERMY: Hello?

5 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Yes.

6 MS. MONTGOMERY: Can you hear me?

7 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Yes, we can.

8 MS. MONTGOMERY: Yes, hi. Okay, hi. This is
9 Kathy Montgomery, a resident of Detroit District 1. And
10 I agree with all the previous speakers who believe that
11 the police officer and sergeant involved in contacting
12 ICE regarding some Detroit residents that did not speak
13 English, and as a result these people were detained.
14 Both the police officer and the sergeant should be
15 suspended without pay immediately, and firing should be
16 pursued immediately. They knew that they were violating
17 the policy of the Detroit Police Department. They knew
18 what the rules were, and they deliberately chose to
19 disobey them, and we can't tolerate that. Immigrants in
20 this country are suffering tremendously because of ICE.

21 MS. DAVIS (FROM AUDIENCE): Only immigrants in
22 the United States --

23 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Next speaker?

24 MS. UNDERWOOD: Jordi, are you there? We'll go
25 to the last Zoom speaker then. Andrea [sic] Mitchell.

1 MS. MITCHELL: Hello, can you hear me?

2 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Yes.

3 MS. MITCHELL: Hi, my name is Anthea. I'm a
4 resident of Detroit's 3rd District, and I'm calling in to
5 echo the sentiments of other speakers here in demanding
6 that officers working with Border Patrol and ICE be
7 fired, and that more be done to prevent that type of
8 behavior in the future. It doesn't make our community
9 safer. Thank you.

10 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you. Next
11 speaker?

12 MS. UNDERWOOD: Our next three speakers in the
13 room is Charles Cousin, Nicole [sic] Bellanger, and
14 Alexis Escoto.

15 MR. COUSIN: Hello, everyone. My name is
16 Charles Cousin. Last week, I announced that I was
17 interested in the vacant police commissioner's role.
18 Last night, my house was arsoned [sic] and burnt down.
19 While I don't know if these two events are connected, I'm
20 asking for help from whoever's listening or can find it
21 in their hearts to pick up the pieces. My Cash App is
22 Outside the Universe. It's dollar sign Outside the
23 Universe.

24 Also, at the last city council meeting, I made
25 a statement that the Board of Commissioners probably

1 should get paid. So, yeah, that's going to be a part of
2 one of the agendas that I'm pushing. You guys have a
3 good day.

4 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you. Chief, did
5 you want to say something?

6 DEPUTY CHIEF HAYES: Through the Chair, I was
7 just having one of the team members here. If we can get
8 Mr. Cousin's information. He indicated that he believed
9 he was a victim of arson.

10 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Right.

11 DEPUTY CHIEF HAYES: We wanted to make sure
12 that that matter was thoroughly investigated.

13 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you. Next
14 speaker?

15 MS. BELANGER: Good afternoon, everybody.

16 ALL COMMISSIONERS: Good afternoon.

17 MS. BELANGER: My name is Noelle Bellinger. I
18 am a resident of District 6 here in Detroit, and I wanted
19 to speak to show my support for the calls and demands
20 made by other Detroiters here today around the
21 termination of the police officer and the sergeant who
22 called CBP during traffic stops. This is clearly in
23 violation of the policy, but more so than that, two
24 people got detained. This is life-threatening. It's
25 been affecting many Detroiters here. It's been affecting

1 many people living here in the city. This just seems
2 like the correct course of action to follow through in
3 order to not only just gain trust, but to keep people
4 protected from this. I'm also part of the People's
5 Assembly. I've spoken here before in part of the
6 People's Assembly. We've seen CBP and ICE on the same
7 streets along with the Detroit Police Department. So,
8 these things need to be amended. There's much more I can
9 say in not just five seconds, but I hope you follow
10 through on this and make the right decision. Thank you.

11 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you. Next
12 speaker?

13 MS. UNDERWOOD: Madam Chair, we have two more
14 speakers on Zoom, and then after these two, then I think
15 that'll be it.

16 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay.

17 MS. UNDERWOOD: Our last two speakers is Ms.
18 Tanya (phonetic) and Jordi. Oh.

19 MS. ESCOTO: Hello, everyone. My name is
20 Alexis Escoto. I'm a resident at Detroit District 6 and
21 a member of the People's Assembly. I'm here to urge the
22 Board to continue the termination of the two officers
23 that called Border Patrol because we need more -- we need
24 more protection for our community. Day by day, our
25 community, and especially Southwest Detroit, is afraid to

1 call the cops for any help. If the Board wants to build
2 that relationship with the community and the police, they
3 need to start doing accountability with the police
4 officers by getting rid of the ones that's not working
5 with the community, that's not even helping or protecting
6 the community. We need to get rid of all the police
7 officers that's not protecting or serving, and they need
8 training too.

9 MS. DAVIS (FROM AUDIENCE): Who gives another
10 man a right to tell another man he can't --

11 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you. Next
12 speaker.

13 MS. DAVIS (FROM AUDIENCE): What gives another
14 man a right to have authority --

15 MR. LUCERO: Hi, my name is Jordi Lucero. May
16 I be heard?

17 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Yes.

18 MR. LUCERO: Hi, I'm a resident of District 3,
19 and I just want to echo what other people have said about
20 calling for these officers to be held accountable. They
21 need to be fired, and if our police can't be trusted to
22 follow public policy and keep us safe, then they should
23 not be entrusted with serving this community. And as an
24 institution, if these things can't be guaranteed, then I
25 don't know why they would deserve our taxpayer money.

1 So, yeah, thank you for your time.

2 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you. Next
3 speaker?

4 MS. UNDERWOOD: Madam Chair, that was your last
5 speaker.

6 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: All right. Thank you.

7 And now, we don't have any presentations to the
8 Board. We postponed the two that we had. And at this
9 time, I'll ask the Board Secretary to give her report.

10 SECRETARY GARNIER: Madam Chair, through the
11 Chair, under your tab 6, Board Members, are the listed
12 documents, the two weekly reports. There's also the
13 opinion related to the matter before you in closed
14 session today. Together with, there is the first report
15 regarding DPD legal representation there as well. And
16 also another item, incoming communication that will be
17 set for action within two weeks.

18 The announcements for today are as follows:
19 Next Thursday, here at Detroit Public Safety Headquarters
20 at 3:00 PM is the next BOPC Board meeting, Thursday,
21 February 26th. The March community meeting will be held
22 March 12th at 6:30 PM in the 10th Precinct. And that
23 will be held at the Helen Moore Community Center, 11825
24 Dexter Avenue, Detroit 48206. The next committee meeting
25 for the Board is the Budget Committee meeting, which will

1 be on Tuesday. I'm drawing a blank on the date. The
2 25th I believe it is, February 25th, Tues- -- next
3 Tuesday, here in the Public Safety Headquarters, and it
4 will be held in the Woodward Room.

5 And that ends the report for today, Madam
6 Chair.

7 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you, Madam
8 Secretary. Is there any unfinished business to come
9 before the Board?

10 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: Through the Chair?

11 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Yes, Commissioner
12 Camille.

13 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: Madam Chair, two items
14 just to follow up with the Secretary, please, and this
15 one is also for Corporation Counsel Mallet. Do we have a
16 status on the lawsuit report that's been in progress?

17 SECRETARY GARNIER: If I may, Madam Chair,
18 through the Chair, I believe that is listed as item B
19 under your tab 6, the first report.

20 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: Thank you. I appreciate
21 that.

22 SECRETARY GARNIER: Correct?

23 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: I'll take a look at it.
24 Thank you so much.

25 SECRETARY GARNIER: Okay.

1 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: That just came just a
2 moment before the meeting, right?

3 SECRETARY GARNIER: It was --

4 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: Either way, if we have
5 it, that's fine.

6 SECRETARY GARNIER: Okay.

7 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: I appreciate it. Thank
8 you. I'll take a look at it.

9 SECRETARY GARNIER: Mm-hmm.

10 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: And then also, Madam
11 Secretary, do you have a status on the data sharing
12 information memo that was submitted on the 22nd of
13 January? It was a request to the department. Do we know
14 where we are with that one? There was a memo requesting
15 data sharing information from Commissioner Ivey,
16 Commissioner Boman, and myself. You can follow up with
17 us later. It's fine.

18 SECRETARY GARNIER: I would like that
19 extension. I will have to check with D.C. Parish. We
20 had a very lengthy meeting yesterday reconciling the
21 transmittal. So, if we could have at least until next
22 week to get a status update?

23 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you. D.C.
24 Parish wants to speak, I believe.

25 DEPUTY CHIEF PARISH: Yeah, just briefly. I

1 know that the research was being done. I'm not sure what
2 the current state of it is, but we can definitely have an
3 answer by next week.

4 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: Thank you so much.

5 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you. Any other
6 unfinished business?

7 DEPUTY CHIEF HAYES: Madam Chair?

8 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Go ahead.

9 DEPUTY CHIEF HAYES: To complete the Chief's
10 report, First Assistant Chief Fitzgerald is present to
11 provide this body an update on the triple homicide that
12 occurred in the 4th Precinct.

13 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: That would be great.
14 Thank you. Is he here?

15 ASSISTANT CHIEF FITZGERALD: Good afternoon,
16 through the Chair. First Assistant Chief Fitzgerald.

17 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you.

18 ASSISTANT CHIEF FITZGERALD: So, to give a
19 quick update from yesterday, it was probably one of the
20 worst things I've seen in quite some time. And I'm going
21 on almost 32 years. We have three gentlemen that were
22 inside the home, a 72-year-old, 76 -- and I'm sorry, 72,
23 66, and 65. They all received blunt force trauma. They
24 were left in the basement covered in old, dirty clothing
25 and carpeting. Just awful. But we do have someone we

1 want to get out to the community. We're looking for a
2 black male between 5'5", 5'7", dreadlocks, light-
3 complected, probably in his early 30s. So again, we ask
4 for any kind of help we can get from our most valuable
5 partners, the community. Anyone coming and going from
6 that area, we would gladly help. Call 1-800-SPEAK-UP or
7 Rewards TV. Any questions I'll take if I can answer
8 them.

9 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELESCHE: Are there any
10 questions or comments for the Chief? Hearing none.
11 Thank you. Thank you. We appreciate that update.

12 I also want to acknowledge that we have Former
13 Commissioner Willie Burton here. Is that him behind --
14 thank you for coming. Thank you.

15 All right. So, under -- no further unfinished
16 business, then new business. We're going to be going
17 into closed session. Pursuant to Section 8(1)(a) of the
18 Open Meetings Act, MCL 15.268(a), the Department's
19 request for the Board to consider administrative leave
20 without pay, but medical benefits for Sergeant Anthony
21 Williams, badge S-2, assigned to the 5th Precinct. Is
22 there a motion?

23 VICE CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Madam Chair, I would
24 request, if it's in conformity with corporation counsel,
25 to go into closed session on item A-E.

1 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay. So, would I
2 have to read every single one then?

3 VICE CHAIRPERSON WOODS: On item A-E. Want me
4 to read? I can read them.

5 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Well, we have five
6 different --

7 VICE CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Madam Chair, I would
8 request that we go into closed session pursuant to
9 Section 8 of the Open Meetings Act, the department
10 requests for the Board to consider administrative leave
11 without pay, but with medical benefits of Sergeant
12 Anthony Williams, badge S-2, assigned to the 5th
13 Precinct. And I will also include a closed session
14 pursuant to Section 8(1)(a) of the Open Meetings Act, the
15 request for the Board to consider administrative leave
16 without pay, but with medical benefits for Sergeant
17 Denise Wallet. Also --

18 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: The badge number,
19 please?

20 VICE CHAIRPERSON WOODS: The badge number S-
21 712. And closed session pursuant to Section 8(1)(a) of
22 the Open Meetings Act, MCL 15.268(a), the department's
23 request for the Board to consider administrative leave
24 without pay, but with medical benefits for Police Officer
25 James Corsi, badge number 5063. And closed session

1 pursuant to Section 8(f) of the Open Meetings Act, MCL
2 15.268(f), Candidate Eric Wright for the Board to
3 consider disqualified applicant appeal from the DPD
4 hiring process. And then closed session pursuant to 8(f)
5 of the Open Meetings Act, MCL 15.268(f), Candidate
6 Justice Roberson for the Board to consider disqualified
7 applicant appeal for DPD hiring process.

8 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Is there a second?

9 COMMISSIONER JONES: I would support, Madam
10 Chair.

11 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay, the motion has
12 been married by Commissioner -- married -- has been made
13 by Commissioner Woods, seconded by Commissioner Jones.
14 Is there any discussion? Hearing none, all those in
15 favor indicate by saying aye.

16 PARLIAMENTARIAN JACKSON: Madam Chair?

17 ALL COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

18 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Yes?

19 PARLIAMENTARIAN JACKSON: It calls -- requires
20 roll call.

21 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Two-third -- okay.
22 Two-thirds vote.

23 PARLIAMENTARIAN JACKSON: You have to do roll
24 call vote to go into closed session.

25 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay. Madam

1 Secretary, could you do the roll call?

2 SECRETARY GARNIER: Commissioner Dewaelsche?

3 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Present. I mean, yes.

4 SECRETARY GARNIER: Commissioner Woods?

5 VICE CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes.

6 SECRETARY GARNIER: Commissioner Bowman?

7 COMMISSIONER BOMAN: Aye.

8 SECRETARY GARNIER: Commissioner Camille?

9 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: Yes.

10 SECRETARY GARNIER: Commissioner Carter?

11 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Yes.

12 SECRETARY GARNIER: Commissioner Ivey?

13 COMMISSIONER IVEY: Yes.

14 SECRETARY GARNIER: Commissioner Jones?

15 COMMISSIONER JONES: Yes.

16 SECRETARY GARNIER: Commissioner Morris?

17 COMMISSIONER MORRIS: Yes.

18 SECRETARY GARNIER: Commissioner Watts?

19 COMMISSIONER WATTS: Yes.

20 SECRETARY GARNIER: Commissioner Williams?

21 COMMISSIONER WILLIAMS: Yes.

22 SECRETARY GARNIER: Ten yay votes, Madam Chair.

23 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay, motion carries.

24 We're in recess for three minutes. Thank you.

25 (At 4:00 PM, the Board entered into Closed

1 Session)

2 (At 7:54 PM, the Board returned to Open

3 Session)

4 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: We're ready to return
5 to open session, and I'll call the meeting to order.

6 Could I please have a roll call?

7 SECRETARY GARNIER: Commissioner Dewaelsche?

8 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Present.

9 SECRETARY GARNIER: Commissioner Woods?

10 VICE CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Present.

11 SECRETARY GARNIER: Commissioner Boman?

12 COMMISSIONER BOMAN: Present.

13 SECRETARY GARNIER: Commissioner Camille?

14 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: Present.

15 SECRETARY GARNIER: Commissioner Carter?

16 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Here.

17 SECRETARY GARNIER: Commissioner Ivey?

18 COMMISSIONER IVEY: Present.

19 SECRETARY GARNIER: Commissioner Jones?

20 COMMISSIONER JONES: Present.

21 SECRETARY GARNIER: Commissioner Morris?

22 COMMISSIONER MORRIS: Present.

23 SECRETARY GARNIER: Commissioner Watts?

24 COMMISSIONER WATTS: Here.

25 SECRETARY GARNIER: Commissioner Williams?

1 COMMISSIONER WILLIAMS: Present.

2 SECRETARY GARNIER: Ten present, Madam Chair.

3 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay, first let me say
4 that we have three closed session hearings that we're
5 gonna take action on. Two -- the last two, which were
6 appeals for disqualified applicants are gonna be -- well,
7 I need to find out from the Board what they want to do
8 with those two.

9 PARLIAMENTARIAN JACKSON: Madam Chair?

10 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Is there a motion? Go
11 ahead.

12 PARLIAMENTARIAN JACKSON: Madam Chair, if it is
13 the will of the Board to postpone those, it has to be
14 done individually.

15 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay.

16 PARLIAMENTARIAN JACKSON: You can't postpone a
17 class of business. You can't postpone a class. You have
18 to say postpone item, whatever it is on the agenda.

19 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: D and E. It's gonna
20 be D and E.

21 PARLIAMENTARIAN JACKSON: Right, there have to
22 be individual motions to postpone whatever it is you're
23 gonna postpone.

24 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay, Madam
25 Parliamentarian, so should I just go down each A, B, C, D

1 -- A, B, C first, and then when we get to D, ask what the
2 Board wants to do, right?

3 PARLIAMENTARIAN JACKSON: Actually, you could
4 do the motion to postpone now.

5 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay.

6 PARLIAMENTARIAN JACKSON: If that's what the
7 Board wants to do.

8 VICE CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yeah, Madam Chair?

9 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: That's what I'm gonna
10 do.

11 PARLIAMENTARIAN JACKSON: Postpone them in
12 gross.

13 VICE CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Okay, Madam Chair, I
14 will make a motion to postpone item D and E on the
15 agenda.

16 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: You can only do them
17 individually.

18 VICE CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Okay, Madam Chair, I
19 will make a motion to postpone the closed session of --
20 for the appeal of --

21 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Candidate Eric Wright.

22 VICE CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Of the candidate Eric
23 Wright.

24 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay, a motion has
25 been made to postpone.

1 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Second.

2 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: It's been se- -- by
3 Commissioner Woods.

4 COMMISSIONER BOMAN: Point of order, are we
5 going to be postponing it to a specific date, like the
6 next meeting, for instance.

7 VICE CHAIRPERSON WOODS: It goes to the next
8 meeting.

9 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: To the next meeting,
10 okay.

11 COMMISSIONER BOMAN: Okay.

12 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: To the next meeting,
13 if you wanna add that?

14 VICE CHAIRPERSON WOODS: It goes automatically.

15 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Automatically, okay.
16 It's been moved by Commissioner Woods to postpone the --
17 D on the agenda, and seconded by Commissioner Carter.
18 Any discussion? All in favor indicate by saying aye.

19 ALL COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

20 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Opposed? That motion
21 carries.

22 Now, for item number E.

23 VICE CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yeah, Madam Chair, I
24 will make a motion to postpone the item number E, which
25 is the appeal of Candidate Justice Roberson until next

1 week.

2 COMMISSIONER BOMAN: Second.

3 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay, it's been moved
4 by Commissioner Woods for -- to postpone item E, and
5 seconded by Commissioner Boman. Is there any discussion?
6 All in favor indicate by saying aye.

7 ALL COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

8 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Opposed? The motion
9 carries.

10 Okay, now we're going to go to item A, which is
11 the department's request for the Board to consider
12 administratively without pay, but with medical benefits
13 for Sergeant Anthony Williams, badge S-2. What is the
14 pleasure of the Board?

15 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Madam Chair?

16 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Yes?

17 COMMISSIONER CARTER: I move that we adopt the
18 rec- -- the -- I'm sorry.

19 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: The recommendation.

20 COMMISSIONER CARTER: The recommendation by
21 Chief Bettison to suspend -- to place Officer -- Sergeant
22 Anthony Williams on administrative leave without pay, but
23 with medical benefits.

24 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay, a motion has
25 been made to replace -- I'm sorry, by the Chief

1 recommendation -- to approve the Chief's recommendation
2 to request the Board consider administrative leave
3 without pay, but with medical benefits for Sergeant
4 William -- Anthony Williams. Is there a second?

5 VICE CHAIRPERSON WOODS: I'll second it.

6 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Commissioner Woods is
7 going to second the motion. Is there any discussion?
8 All in favor -- go ahead, Commissioner.

9 COMMISSIONER BOMAN: I mean, I don't know how
10 much discussion can be had outside of closed session.

11 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Well, --

12 PARLIAMENTARIAN JACKSON: As long as you're not
13 discussing anything that was said in closed session.

14 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Right.

15 COMMISSIONER BOMAN: Well, I'm just going to
16 say that I think that we should -- we should give this
17 person the benefit of the doubt regarding what was said
18 in closed session.

19 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay, any other
20 discussion? All in favor, indicate by saying aye. Oh,
21 I'm sorry, is this a two-thirds vote?

22 PARLIAMENTARIAN JACKSON: Commissioner --
23 Corporation Counsel, I believe it requires two-thirds to
24 suspend a police officer. It requires two-thirds. The
25 Parliamentarian would recommend roll call.

1 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay. A roll call
2 vote, please, Secretary.

3 SECRETARY GARNIER: Commissioner Woods?

4 VICE CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes.

5 SECRETARY GARNIER: Commissioner Boman?

6 COMMISSIONER BOMAN: No.

7 SECRETARY GARNIER: Commissioner Camille?

8 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: No.

9 SECRETARY GARNIER: Commissioner Carter?

10 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Yes.

11 SECRETARY GARNIER: I'm sorry?

12 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Yes.

13 SECRETARY GARNIER: Commissioner Ivey?

14 COMMISSIONER IVEY: No.

15 SECRETARY GARNIER: Commissioner Jones?

16 COMMISSIONER JONES: Yes.

17 SECRETARY GARNIER: Commissioner Morris?

18 COMMISSIONER MORRIS: No.

19 SECRETARY GARNIER: Commissioner Watts?

20 COMMISSIONER WATTS: No.

21 SECRETARY GARNIER: Commissioner Williams?

22 COMMISSIONER WILLIAMS: No.

23 SECRETARY GARNIER: Three yay votes. Oh, I'm

24 sorry. Commissioner Dewaelsche?

25 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Yes.

1 SECRETARY GARNIER: Four yay votes; six nay
2 votes.

3 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHÉ: It fails because you
4 need seven. Is that correct?

5 VICE CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yeah.

6 PARLIAMENTARIAN JACKSON: Yeah, it did not get
7 two-thirds.

8 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHÉ: Okay.

9 PARLIAMENTARIAN JACKSON: Did you announce the
10 motion failed?

11 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHÉ: Yes, I just did.

12 Okay. For item number B, we're voting to
13 accept the department's re- -- or the Chief's request for
14 the Board to consider administrative leave without pay,
15 but with medical benefits for Sergeant Denise Wallet.

16 COMMISSIONER BOMAN: I have a motion.

17 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHÉ: Did you want to -- I
18 thought you --

19 VICE CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yeah.

20 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHÉ: Okay, go ahead.

21 VICE CHAIRPERSON WOODS: I think Commissioner
22 Ivey had a motion.

23 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHÉ: I'm sorry. I saw
24 Commissioner Ivey go like this before you raised your
25 hand.

1 COMMISSIONER IVEY: So, we move to suspend with
2 pay for 30 days.

3 VICE CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Second.

4 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: So, your motion is to
5 move to suspend for 30 days?

6 COMMISSIONER IVEY: 30 days.

7 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: And you're seconding
8 the motion?

9 VICE CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yeah, I'm seconding
10 it.

11 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay. There's a
12 motion to suspend, but for 30 days.

13 COMMISSIONER IVEY: Correct.

14 VICE CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Without pay.

15 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Without pay, but with
16 benefits. And that was made by Commissioner Ivey and
17 seconded by Commissioner Woods, right, to be placed on
18 administrative leave without pay, but with medical
19 benefits for 30 days. The motion has been made,
20 seconded. Is there a discussion?

21 COMMISSIONER BOMAN: Yes, I would like to move
22 to postpone pending the opportunity to view the
23 uncensored video that we had sought a portion of during
24 closed session. And I guess that postponement would
25 probably be to the next meeting, at which point we'll

1 find out if we had a chance to see that video.

2 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Madam Parliamentarian,
3 that motion --

4 PARLIAMENTARIAN JACKSON: The motion to
5 postpone is a higher ranking motion than the main motion,
6 but that motion needs to be seconded in order for it to
7 be discussed and voted upon.

8 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay, is there a
9 second?

10 PARLIAMENTARIAN JACKSON: Fails for lack of a
11 second.

12 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: All right, the motion
13 fails.

14 COMMISSIONER MORRIS: I was getting ready to
15 second it. She came up too fast.

16 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay, so you're
17 seconding?

18 COMMISSIONER MORRIS: Second.

19 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay, that motion has
20 been seconded by Commissioner Morris.

21 PARLIAMENTARIAN JACKSON: Madam Chair?

22 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Yes?

23 PARLIAMENTARIAN JACKSON: I would advise the
24 Board that the motion to postpone in debate, you can only
25 debate whether you want to postpone. You cannot debate

1 the merits of whether or not the Chief's recommendation
2 should be accepted or not. All you can debate is should
3 we postpone or should we not. Thank you.

4 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay, so the motion
5 has been made and seconded.

6 COMMISSIONER MORRIS: Not in -- not -- excuse
7 me, Madam Chair. Not in those terms. Originally, the
8 way he presented it as though he wanted to postpone it so
9 that he could see the full video, but because we --
10 there's no guarantee that he'll see the video because she
11 said that portion can't be put into the motion, only that
12 it can be postponed, I can't -- I'm not seconding that.

13 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay, now I'm
14 confused.

15 MR. MALLET: That isn't what I heard her say.

16 COMMISSIONER MORRIS: That's what you said,
17 right?

18 PARLIAMENTARIAN JACKSON: I -- I think that
19 there's confusion about what's happening. The motion to
20 postpone to next week does not rest on whether or not you
21 see the video or not. What you're saying as a Board is
22 that we're not yet ready to vote on this, and it could be
23 for any number of reasons. You don't really need a
24 reason to postpone except you're not ready. The Board
25 could, at next week, if the video's not ready, postpone

1 to the following week. I mean, you can kick that can
2 down the road for a while.

3 So, the real issue for the Board is, do you
4 want to delay voting on this matter? The commissioner
5 has expressed his reasons for why he wants to postpone,
6 and that is to see the full video. If the commissioners
7 agree, then they need to vote in favor of postponing. If
8 they disagree, then they need to vote against postponing.

9 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: So, his motion stands
10 as he indicated, as he worded it, but now Commissioner
11 Morris is saying he's not going to second it because he's
12 speaking to the video.

13 PARLIAMENTARIAN JACKSON: The commissioner has
14 the right to withdraw his second.

15 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay.

16 PARLIAMENTARIAN JACKSON: I'm sorry. Did you
17 state the motion to postpone, Madam Chair?

18 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: No. I did not state
19 --

20 PARLIAMENTARIAN JACKSON: Okay, since you have
21 not stated the motion to postpone, then the commissioner
22 can withdraw his second, which means that the maker of
23 the motion is now looking for someone to second that
24 motion, or it is not going to be before the Board.

25 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay. So, are you

1 withdrawing your second?

2 COMMISSIONER MORRIS: I'm withdrawing.

3 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay. So now, is
4 there a second to the motion that was made by
5 Commissioner Boman? Okay, hearing none, then the motion
6 fails.

7 PARLIAMENTARIAN JACKSON: It also lacks a
8 second.

9 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay. We have --

10 PARLIAMENTARIAN JACKSON: Back to the main
11 motion.

12 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: We're going back to
13 the main motion, which is to approve the department's
14 request for the Board to consider administrative leave
15 without pay, but with medical benefits for Sergeant
16 Denise Wallet for 30 days. Correct?

17 PARLIAMENTARIAN JACKSON: Yes.

18 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay. Is there any
19 discussion?

20 COMMISSIONER BOMAN: Point of information?

21 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Yes.

22 COMMISSIONER BOMAN: So, would that mean that
23 after 30 days, the individual could potentially be
24 reinstated? Is that what I'm getting out of that motion?

25 VICE CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Whatever the findings

1 are, you know.

2 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Based on the findings.

3 COMMISSIONER BOMAN: Okay.

4 VICE CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yep.

5 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Any further
6 discussion? Okay, could we have -- for this, we need a
7 roll call vote.

8 PARLIAMENTARIAN JACKSON: Yes ma'am.

9 DC: Yes.

10 SECRETARY GARNIER: Commissioner Woods?

11 VICE CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes.

12 SECRETARY GARNIER: Commissioner Boman?

13 COMMISSIONER BOMAN: Yes.

14 SECRETARY GARNIER: Commissioner Camille?

15 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: Yes.

16 SECRETARY GARNIER: Commissioner Carter?

17 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Yes.

18 SECRETARY GARNIER: Commissioner Ivey?

19 COMMISSIONER IVEY: Yes.

20 SECRETARY GARNIER: Commissioner Jones?

21 COMMISSIONER JONES: Yes.

22 SECRETARY GARNIER: Commissioner Morris?

23 COMMISSIONER MORRIS: Yes.

24 SECRETARY GARNIER: Commissioner Watts?

25 COMMISSIONER WATTS: Yes.

1 SECRETARY GARNIER: Commissioner Williams?

2 COMMISSIONER WILLIAMS: Yes.

4 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Yes.
