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4 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Good afternoon,
5 everyone.

6 ALL IN ATTENDANCE: Good afternoon.

7 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Today is March 5th,
8 and we're at the BOPC board meeting. I'd like to call
9 the meeting to order. And today giving the invocation is
10 Commander Chaplain Leslie Walker on Zoom.

11 COMMANDER CHAPLAIN WALKER: Good afternoon.
12 Thank you so much for having me. We appreciate it. Let
13 me first start off by saying thank you to this esteemed
14 board for having me to do that invocation. We want to
15 say thank you and happy Ramadan Mubarak to our Arab
16 brothers and sisters, and happy Lent to all those who are
17 celebrating Lent in this most holy season. Let's pray.

18 Father, in your graciousness and your mercy, we
19 thank you for this opportunity coming to conduct the
20 business of the city of Detroit. Give this esteemed
21 board the wisdom, knowledge, and understanding to
22 confront every issue that they're confronted with today.
23 And we thank you, God, for your mercy and your grace that
24 has allowed us to arrive safely, even in this inclement
25 weather. Now, we say thank you today for all that you've

1 done, all that you're doing, and all that you're going to
2 do. Give us power, mercy, and grace to do thine will,
3 and we say thank God, and we say amen.

4 ALL IN ATTENDANCE: Amen.

5 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you.

6 Next, I'd like to have the roll call, please,
7 Madam Secretary.

8 SECRETARY GARNIER: Madam Chair. Commissioner
9 Dewaelsche?

10 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Present.

11 SECRETARY GARNIER: Commissioner Ivey?

12 COMMISSIONER IVEY: Present.

13 SECRETARY GARNIER: Commissioner Morris is
14 excused. Commissioner Boman?

15 COMMISSIONER BOMAN: Present.

16 SECRETARY GARNIER: Commissioner Watts?

17 COMMISSIONER WATTS: Here.

18 SECRETARY GARNIER: Commissioner Carter is
19 excused. Commissioner Camille?

20 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: Present.

21 SECRETARY GARNIER: Commissioner Woods?

22 VICE CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Present.

23 SECRETARY GARNIER: Commissioner Jones?

24 COMMISSIONER JONES: Present.

25 SECRETARY GARNIER: Seven present, Madam Chair.

1 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: I believe you left out
2 Williams, or did -- did you?

3 SECRETARY GARNIER: I was going to -- I don't
4 have -- normally during roll call, if we're expecting
5 them to come a little later, they're not.

6 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay.

7 SECRETARY GARNIER: We received confirmation
8 that he would be here.

9 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay. Thank you.

10 Next on the agenda, I'd like to get --
11 entertain a motion to approve the March 5th agenda which
12 is today's agenda.

13 VICE CHAIRPERSON WOODS: So moved.

14 COMMISSIONER JONES: Support, Madam Chair.

15 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: It's been moved by
16 Commissioner Woods, supported by Commissioner Jones. Is
17 there any discussion? All in favor indicate by saying
18 aye.

19 ALL COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

20 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Opposed? The motion
21 carries.

22 Next, I'd entertain a motion for approval of
23 the minutes of February 26th, 2026.

24 COMMISSIONER BOMAN: So moved.

25 COMMISSIONER WATTS: Support.

1 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: It's been moved by
2 Commissioner Boman, supported by Commissioner Watts. Any
3 discussion? All in favor indicate by saying aye.

4 ALL COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

5 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Opposed? The motion
6 carries.

7 Next, we have the closed session meeting
8 minute- -- minutes for February 26th regarding Eric
9 Wright. Is there a motion to approve?

10 COMMISSIONER JONES: So moved, Madam Chair.

11 COMMISSIONER IVEY: Support.

12 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: It's been moved by
13 Commissioner Jones, supported by Commissioner Ivey. Is
14 there any discussion? All in favor indicate by saying
15 aye.

16 ALL COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

17 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Opposed? The motion
18 carries. Thank you.

19 And now I'll entertain a motion to approve the
20 closed session minutes for February 26, 2026, regarding
21 Justice Roberson.

22 COMMISSIONER JONES: So moved, Madam Chair.

23 COMMISSIONER WATTS: Support.

24 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: It's been moved by
25 Commissioner Jones, supported by Commissioner Watts. Is

1 there any discussion? All in favor indicate by saying
2 aye.

3 ALL COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

4 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Opposed? The motion
5 carries. Thank you.

6 And Madam Secretary, at this time if we could
7 have an introduction of the staff, Chief of Police,
8 elected officials, representatives, and community
9 leaders.

10 SECRETARY GARNIER: Madam Chair, through the
11 Chair, present as of this time are the following:
12 Corporation Counsel Conrad Mallet; Jonya Underwood;
13 Teresa Blossom; Candace Hayes; Dior Mathis; Armani
14 Arnold; Artemisia Joshua; Mary Barber; Felicia Tyson;
15 Drew Fries; and Dr. Francis Jackson, Parliamentarian;
16 Chief Investigator Jerome Warfield; Supervising
17 Investigator Lisonya Sloan. Interpreters for today are
18 Angelique Taylor and -- sorry, Angelique Taylor only at
19 this time. Dr. Beatty is not present yet. Court
20 reporter is Hanson Court Reporting; Audiovisual Charles
21 Henry; Media Services Enrique Jackson; and Deputy Chief
22 Michael Parish is here for Chief of Police Todd Bettison.
23 Ms. Marie Overall; Ms. Fredia Butler of the 2nd Precinct
24 Community; Mark Young, President of the Lieutenant and
25 Sergeants Association. I don't see Mr. Thomas today.

1 Former Police Commissioner William Davis is on Zoom. Oh,
2 my bad. Ron Thomas, Vice President of Detroit Police
3 Officers Association, is on Zoom today. And Dr. Beatty,
4 our other interpreter, has arrived. And those are the
5 persons registered at this time, Madam Chair.

6 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you, Madam
7 Secretary.

8 Under my report, I have three items that I
9 would like to bring to the Board's attention. First, the
10 appointment of the Ad Hoc Committee for the Review of
11 BOPC Bylaws and Standard Operating Procedures. At our
12 last week's Board meeting, the board passed a motion to
13 form an Ad Hoc Committee for the Review of BOPC Bylaws
14 and Standard Operating Procedures and propose revisions
15 to the full board and that those -- and those committee
16 members be appointed by the Chair. The committee members
17 are as follows: Commissioner Camille will be the Chair.
18 Commissioner Jones, Commissioner Watts, and Commissioner
19 Woods will be members of that committee.

20 Next, we -- at last week's meeting, we had an
21 official -- or we approved an official statement to be
22 issued by the BOPC regarding the killing of Da'Quain
23 Johnson in Grand Rapids. And I would like to make a
24 motion --

25 VICE CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Entertain.

1 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Entertain. No, it
2 says here that I would make the motion.

3 VICE CHAIRPERSON WOODS: She -- she makes a
4 motion?

5 PARLIAMENTARIAN JACKSON: Yes.

6 VICE CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Okay.

7 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay. So, I would
8 like -- this was cleared with the --

9 PARLIAMENTARIAN JACKSON: Under the normal
10 circumstances, a chair cannot make a motion. But because
11 of the Open Meetings Act, as a member of the board, she
12 is required to be as open and transparent as ever other
13 commissioner.

14 VICE CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Praise God.

15 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay, thank you. So,
16 I'd like to make a motion that the matter of the official
17 statement of the BOPC in response to the killing of
18 Da'Quain Johnson in Grand Rapids be referred to the Ad
19 Hoc Committee for the Review of the BOPC Bylaws and
20 Standard Operating Procedures for review and
21 recommendation back to the board.

22 VICE CHAIRPERSON WOODS: I second that motion.

23 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay, the motion was
24 made by me, seconded by Commissioner Woods. Is there any
25 discussion? Go ahead, Commissioner Boman.

1 COMMISSIONER BOMAN: I'm just inquiring what
2 the rationale is about, referring it to the Ad Hoc
3 Committee rather than having it dealt with right here.

4 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay. I personally
5 feel that we have to have some discussion about this
6 because it's out of our jurisdiction. We're making a
7 statement about something that occurred out of the city
8 of Detroit, number one, so we'd be setting a precedent.
9 It's not normal. Usually when we do, it's -- it's going
10 to be within our jurisdiction. That would be one. The
11 other is that there was a statement added that we didn't
12 discuss at the end of the statement, which said,
13 basically, we ask for your continued support in these
14 efforts by reporting suspected DPD misconduct that you
15 experience or observe to our Office of the Chief
16 Investigator. I'm not sure that we can make a statement
17 like that for something that is still being investigated.
18 I think there -- it implies something there.

19 I would just like for the full -- I mean, for
20 the committee to review it a little bit more thoroughly.
21 I'm not saying we don't issue the statement. I just want
22 to make sure we're not -- or, you know, maybe the
23 corporation counsel might have some opinion about that
24 that he could mention.

25 CORP. COUNSEL MALLET: In regards to the

1 resolution?

2 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: In regards to the
3 resolution regarding the Grand Rapids person that was
4 killed, the last statement. It -- it was not in the res-
5 -- the resolution we approved last week or the statement
6 that we said we were going to issue.

7 CORP. COUNSEL MALLET: The la- -- the last
8 sentence?

9 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Mm-hmm. The last
10 paragraph.

11 CORP. COUNSEL MALLET: Well, if it -- if it
12 wasn't included in the resolution that was approved last
13 week, how did it get added?

14 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: Through the Chair?

15 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Yes.

16 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: I just have discussion
17 on this. So, to my understanding at last week's meeting,
18 we didn't vote on the full language of a resolution. We
19 voted on that we would draft a statement. And so, this
20 is the draft of the statement.

21 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: It's a draft.

22 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: I didn't take -- I
23 didn't last week's vote as like agreeing on all the
24 language that will be there. So, this is -- this is just
25 a draft.

1 PARLIAMENTARIAN JACKSON: Madam Chair?

2 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHE: Go ahead,
3 Parliamentarian.

4 PARLIAMENTARIAN JACKSON: Yeah, the
5 Parliamentarian would advise that if the motion to refer
6 this to this committee is adopted, that the purpose of
7 referral is to view this in the context of whatever SOP
8 is created to respond to situations that occur. In other
9 words, it's not just a matter of reviewing this. You
10 don't need a committee to do that.

11 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHE: Mm-hmm.

12 PARLIAMENTARIAN JACKSON: But what the
13 committee's responsibility would relate to is a policy or
14 procedure that says these are the circumstances under
15 which we do these things.

16 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHE: Right.

17 PARLIAMENTARIAN JACKSON: And bring that back
18 to the board. Then this particular document is then
19 viewed within the context of what they would be
20 recommending would be the SOP for approving resolutions
21 of this nature. Is that clear to people?

22 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHE: Yes.

23 PARLIAMENTARIAN JACKSON: In other words,
24 there's nothing -- my understanding is that there's no
25 current policy --

1 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay.

2 PARLIAMENTARIAN JACKSON: -- that addresses
3 resolutions that respond to situations that occur in
4 other cities. Is that correct?

5 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Right.

6 PARLIAMENTARIAN JACKSON: And so, what the
7 board wants to do is to have consistency in how it
8 responds and to have a policy so it's not personal. It's
9 not just a reaction to this.

10 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay.

11 PARLIAMENTARIAN JACKSON: But it's a policy
12 that says this is how we function. This is what we do.
13 This is how we operate. So that if something comes up
14 next week, next month, you're not just reacting in terms
15 of the emotion of what's occurring.

16 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Right.

17 PARLIAMENTARIAN JACKSON: You have a policy
18 that says this is how we do things.

19 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Right. And -- and,
20 you know, I would like some clarity, board, on whether a
21 letter would be sufficient as opposed to a resolution.

22 PARLIAMENTARIAN JACKSON: All of that can be
23 addressed --

24 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Right. At the
25 committee.

1 PARLIAMENTARIAN JACKSON: And then there's --
2 there's something in writing, there's something for the
3 -- if another commissioner wants to draft a resolution
4 about something else, we have something to give to that
5 commissioner to say, this is how this is done by this
6 body.

7 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Right.

8 COMMISSIONER WATTS: Madam Chair?

9 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Yes, Commissioner
10 Watts.

11 COMMISSIONER WATTS: Yes. Thank you for that,
12 because that was going to be my question. Not saying we
13 can't get there, but especially since you indicated this
14 is beyond city of Detroit, we've never done it before, I
15 really like that recommendation from our parliamentarian.
16 That way, moving forward, if any of us have it in
17 circumstances like this, we already have a template.
18 Something that's already -- that's been approved by the
19 committee and something that's just, you know, a template
20 --

21 PARLIAMENTARIAN JACKSON: Well, the committee
22 would bring it back to the board for approval.

23 COMMISSIONER WATTS: Yes, for approval.

24 PARLIAMENTARIAN JACKSON: Right.

25 COMMISSIONER WATTS: So, I like that

1 recommendation.

2 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: Madam Chair?

3 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Commissioner Boman --
4 oh, oh, wait. Corporation Counsel, did you want to
5 respond to --

6 CORP. COUNSEL MALLET: The only thing I wanted
7 to say, Madam Chair, is that the last sentence is just
8 something for the board to consider. It's not -- it's --
9 if the board says that they want people who -- to -- who
10 observe inappropriate police behavior to make a phone
11 call, and you all adopt that motion, there's -- there's
12 nothing about it that is inappropriate or illegal. But,
13 you know, the board has to make that decision. It's the
14 board's decision as to what you want this to say. And I
15 think that Dr. Jackson is suggesting that it go back for
16 a policy review. But as the board is -- as the committee
17 or whoever's going to review this, the last sentence that
18 -- that some people may have a problem is not illegal, is
19 not inappropriate to the motion, can be included as a
20 decision of the board. But the board has to make that
21 decision.

22 COMMISSIONER WATTS: Madam Chair?

23 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Thank you,
24 Commissioner Watts.

25 COMMISSIONER WATTS: For me --

1 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Sorry. Wait, I'm
2 sorry, Commissioner. I think Commissioner Boman was
3 first, and then Commissioner Watts, and then Commissioner
4 Woods.

5 COMMISSIONER BOMAN: I was going to make a
6 motion then to amend the primary motion to include a
7 statement that we would like the committee, in addition
8 to reviewing this resolution, to return with a -- a
9 recommended policy concerning how we handle resolutions
10 outside of our jurisdiction regarding matters outside of
11 jurisdiction.

12 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay. A motion has
13 been made, and that supersedes the other, right? Is
14 there a second?

15 COMMISSIONER WATTS: I'm sorry --

16 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: Can you repeat it?

17 COMMISSIONER BOMAN: Oh, sure. That in
18 addition to the original motion, which involved the
19 particular resolution, that the committee also return
20 with recommendations regarding what our standard
21 operating procedure should be concerning other motions or
22 resolutions concerning outside of our jur- -- you know,
23 matters outside our jurisdiction.

24 COMMISSIONER WATTS: I support that.

25 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay. A motion has

1 been made by Commissioner Boman and supported by
2 Commissioner Watts. Is there any further discussion?

3 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: Madam Chair -- well, I
4 think Commissioner Woods was before me, but --

5 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELESCHE: And then Commissioner
6 --

7 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: Okay. I just wanted to
8 -- and I don't -- I don't have an issue with this going
9 back to committee. It's -- it's prolonging the board
10 addressing the issue. It's already not very timely, but
11 if it goes back to committee, that's fine. I do want to
12 clarify though that the board followed that same process
13 with Renee Good, which was also outside of our
14 jurisdiction where we came to a meeting, we approved a
15 motion that we would go back and draft, and then that
16 that draft came back the following meeting and -- and we
17 voted to approve that language. So, we -- there is some
18 precedence there.

19 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELESCHE: Mm-hmm.

20 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: I agree that we should
21 have documented -- a documented process for it. And --
22 but I just want to clarify that this has occurred before
23 with this board.

24 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELESCHE: Thank you. Go ahead,
25 Commissioner Woods.

1 VICE CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yeah. And I'll shut
2 up because what I'm about to say is it becomes verbal
3 gymnastics, you know. You know, this -- this stuff is
4 tomato-tomato type stuff, you know. It's going to go to
5 the -- the committee -- Ad Hoc Committee is going to look
6 at all of the SOPs and all of that type of stuff. And
7 so, that's going to be a cure that need to be added in
8 this. You don't need no motions and for the motion for
9 the motion and a motion, you know, and because, you know,
10 we don't want to continue to prolong our meetings with
11 the verbal gymnastics and stuff like that, you know. You
12 know, that's -- that's -- that's my thoughts and feelings
13 about it.

14 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Any other comments?

15 PARLIAMENTARIAN JACKSON: Madam Chair?

16 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Yes.

17 PARLIAMENTARIAN JACKSON: Parliamentarian would
18 only ask that if Commissioner Boman or the other
19 commissioners are concerned about this having the
20 appearance of kicking the can down the road, then the
21 board can say to the Ad Hoc Committee, report by this
22 date. You could -- in other words, if I'm understanding
23 Commissioner Woods, there may be a concern that this is
24 sort of just being delayed as we go through this process.

25 VICE CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yeah, I --

1 PARLIAMENTARIAN JACKSON: There could be a
2 motion to say the special committee will report back to
3 the board with a recommendation by March 25th, so that
4 this particular policy is not delayed in terms of this
5 recommendation and it coming back to the board.

6 VICE CHAIRPERSON WOODS: That's not -- what --
7 what I'm saying is that, you know, we can vote for the
8 resolution to be passed and then whenever they get the
9 SOP or the vote up or down on it, on the -- on what's
10 before us, say yay or nay, and they're going to handle
11 all the SOPs and the policies going forward anyway. You
12 know, so I -- you know, I'm ready to vote on it, you
13 know, just say yes or no.

14 PARLIAMENTARIAN JACKSON: Well, right now, to
15 be clear, because I don't want people to get lost, the
16 matter immediately pending is the amendment --

17 VICE CHAIRPERSON WOODS: The amendment, yeah.

18 PARLIAMENTARIAN JACKSON: -- that -- that the
19 committee will come back with a recommendation. When you
20 get back to the motion as amended, those who don't want
21 it to refer can vote that down and then just move to
22 adopt if the motion as amended is defeated. So, if the
23 motion as amended is defeated and it's not referred, then
24 there can be a motion moved to -- a motion made to adopt
25 the resolution as presented.

1 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: Madam Chair?

2 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay, Commissioner.

3 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: Thank you. I would be
4 interested, because it sounds like -- and maybe there's
5 more language that's of concern, but it sounds like some
6 of the concern is around the last statement that asked
7 the public to contact OCI if they see police misconduct.
8 I would be interested to know what the concern is about
9 that language, given that we have that -- we ask people
10 to do that through our website and all of our literature.
11 In general, we ask -- that's the purpose of --

12 PARLIAMENTARIAN JACKSON: Madam Chair, that --
13 that request at this time is not in order. It's not
14 germane to the secondary amendment.

15 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay, we're at --

16 PARLIAMENTARIAN JACKSON: Back to the mo- -- to
17 the main motion, then that question can be raised.

18 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay.

19 PARLIAMENTARIAN JACKSON: But in terms of the
20 secondary amendment, that question is not in order at
21 this time.

22 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay. At this time,
23 are there any other comments? Hearing none, all those in
24 favor indicate by saying aye.

25 UNIDENTIFIED COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

1 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELESCHE: Opposed?

2 VICE CHAIRPERSON WOODS: No.

3 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: No.

4 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELESCHE: Okay, there are two?

5 VICE CHAIRPERSON WOODS: No.

6 PARLIAMENTARIAN JACKSON: The amendment is
7 adopted.

8 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELESCHE: Yeah, it's adopted.
9 This is the second one.

10 PARLIAMENTARIAN JACKSON: Now you're back to
11 the main motion as amended.

12 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELESCHE: Now we're at the main
13 one, which was to refer this to the subcommittee for
14 recommendation to the board.

15 PARLIAMENTARIAN JACKSON: And with the
16 amendment.

17 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELESCHE: I'm sorry?

18 PARLIAMENTARIAN JACKSON: And with the
19 amendment now.

20 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELESCHE: And with the
21 amendment.

22 PARLIAMENTARIAN JACKSON: That a policy would
23 be brought back.

24 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELESCHE: A policy would be
25 brought back as well --

1 PARLIAMENTARIAN JACKSON: Yes.

2 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELESCHE: -- as the
3 recommendation. Okay, is there a second? Is -- no, we
4 -- that's already been -- all in favor, indicate by
5 saying aye.

6 UNIDENTIFIED COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

7 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELESCHE: Opposed?

8 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: No.

9 VICE CHAIRPERSON WOODS: No.

10 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELESCHE: Okay. The motion
11 carries, correct?

12 COMMISSIONER WATTS: Yeah.

13 VICE CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yeah.

14 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELESCHE: Okay. We'll move to
15 the next item under my report, and that is a BOPC
16 resolution for -- regarding the BOPC resolution for
17 appointment and hiring of an independent board attorney.
18 I move that the matter of the appointment and hiring of
19 an independent board attorney be referred to the
20 Committee on Personnel and Training for review and
21 recommendation.

22 COMMISSIONER JONES: I support the motion,
23 Madam Chair.

24 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELESCHE: It's been seconded by
25 Commissioner Jones. Is there discussion?

1 COMMISSIONER WATTS: Madam Chair?

2 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Yes, Commissioner
3 Watts.

4 COMMISSIONER WATTS: I just want to confirm, we
5 do have money in the budget to get our own -- retain our
6 own? It's already in the budget?

7 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Madam Secretary, is
8 that something that the fiscal manager indicated last
9 week?

10 SECRETARY GARNIER: There is a line item for an
11 attorney.

12 COMMISSIONER WATTS: Okay, thank you.

13 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Any other discussion?
14 Commissioner Woods.

15 VICE CHAIRPERSON WOODS: And it depends on how
16 much you get -- you know, have, whether you're going to
17 get a bootleg lawyer or what.

18 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: I don't -- I don't
19 have the exact amount, but I know that there's a line
20 item.

21 COMMISSIONER WATTS: Madam Chair, maybe I
22 should have said how much is the line item.

23 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Do we have that, Madam
24 Secretary?

25 VICE CHAIRPERSON WOODS: But do this, refer --

1 COMMISSIONER WATTS: Yeah.

2 VICE CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yeah, you know.

3 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Right. We're going to
4 refer it to the Personnel and Training Committee. Is
5 there a -- we -- did we get a second? Yeah, Mr. Jones.
6 Any other discussion? All in favor indicate by saying
7 aye.

8 ALL COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

9 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Opposed?

10 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: No.

11 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: The motion -- okay,
12 opposed?

13 COMMISSIONER BOMAN: Nay.

14 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Two nays. The motion
15 carries. Thank you.

16 SECRETARY GARNIER: Madam Chair, may I ask who
17 -- where the nay votes were?

18 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Commissioner Boman,
19 Commissioner Camille, any others?

20 SECRETARY GARNIER: Thank you.

21 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you. Did you
22 get the other nay votes for the other?

23 SECRETARY GARNIER: Yes.

24 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay.

25 SECRETARY GARNIER: Thank you.

1 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: At this time, we're
2 going to ask Deputy Chief Michael Parish to give the
3 Chief of Police report.

4 DEPUTY CHIEF PARISH: Thank you, Madam Chair,
5 through you to the rest of this honorable board.
6 Starting off with our crime data, speaking first to
7 homicides, we are up 27 percent in homicides. To put
8 that in the right context, that is to say we're up six
9 homicides compared to this time last year. We are down
10 24 percent in non-fatal shooting incidents. We are down
11 9 percent in robberies. We are up 5 percent in part one
12 violent crimes at this time, and we are down 14 percent
13 in carjackings.

14 Moving to significant events, a DPD detective
15 helped save a child left in a towed vehicle. We want to
16 highlight one of our 9th Precinct detectives whose
17 actions helped save the life of a 13-month-old in an
18 incident that has received widespread news coverage.

19 On February 27, 2026, at approximately 3:30 AM,
20 Orlando Linson abandoned his vehicle in front of a
21 residence in the 20,600 block of Damond Street in Harper
22 Woods, leaving the child inside. At approximately 3:30
23 PM, Harper Woods police officers were dispatched to a
24 residence for a report of an abandoned vehicle. Upon
25 their arrival, Harper Woods officers located the

1 defendant's vehicle. Officers did not observe anyone
2 inside of the vehicle and subsequently had it impounded.

3 On February 28, 2026, the child's mother
4 reported the child missing to the Detroit Police
5 Department. An investigation by the Detroit Police
6 Department led officers to an impound lot in the 22,700
7 block of Lexington Street in Eastpointe, where the child
8 was discovered inside of the vehicle. The child was
9 transported by officers to a local hospital for
10 treatment. That individual has been charged with second-
11 degree child abuse, and child abuse leaving a child in a
12 vehicle resulting in physical harm.

13 Moving to the next significant event, charges
14 have been filed after a child was shot with an unsecured
15 weapon. On March 1, 2026, at approximately 9 o'clock AM,
16 Detroit police officers were dispatched to a residence in
17 the 8,800 block of Artesian Street for a reported
18 shooting. When they arrived, officers located the victim
19 in a bedroom of the home, suffering from a gunshot wound
20 to the shoulder and thumb. Officers transported the
21 victim to a local hospital for treatment.

22 Following an investigation by the Detroit
23 Police Department, the Wayne County Prosecutor's Office
24 has charged Marcellis Dushaun Williams in connection with
25 the nonfatal shooting of his six-year-old daughter. It

1 is alleged that the child found an unsecured handgun in
2 the home and fired it, striking herself in the shoulder
3 and the thumb. Williams has been charged specifically
4 with firearms - safe storage violations, premises under
5 individual's control - minor present and inflicted
6 serious impairment of a bodily function upon herself or
7 another.

8 To the next significant event, charges were
9 filed in the fatal shooting of a child with an unsecured
10 gun. On March 2, 2026, at approximately 12:06 PM,
11 Detroit police officers were dispatched to a restaurant
12 located in the 9,700 block of Harper Avenue for a
13 reported shooting. Upon their arrival, officers observed
14 the child suffering from a gunshot wound. Medics arrived
15 on scene and transported the child to a local hospital,
16 where she succumbed to her injuries and was pronounced
17 deceased.

18 Following an investigation by the Detroit
19 Police Department, the Wayne County Prosecutor's Office
20 has charged Tonya Johnson, 41 years old, of Detroit, in
21 connection with the fatal shooting of her six-year-old
22 daughter. It is alleged that the defendant left her five
23 children, ages 2 to 11 years old, unattended in her
24 vehicle while she was inside of a restaurant. It is
25 further alleged that the defendant's 11-year-old son

1 found an unsecured handgun in the vehicle and fired it,
2 striking the 6-year-old victim in the head, fatally
3 wounding her. Tonya Johnson has been charged with
4 firearms - safe storage violations, premises under
5 individual's control - minor present and inflicted death
6 upon self or another, three counts of second-degree child
7 abuse, and four counts of felony firearm.

8 DPD officers also made an arrest in a non-fatal
9 shooting on Tuesday, March 3, 2026, at approximately
10 12:50 PM, in the area of Puritan and Prevost, a suspect
11 fired shots into a victim's vehicle, striking a male
12 victim in his 20s, leaving him in critical condition.
13 Three children, ages 10, 1, and 7 months old, were inside
14 the vehicle at the time. Thankfully, they were not
15 injured. The victim was able to drive away, and EMS
16 responded to treat him. Images of the suspect were
17 shared with the news media. Later that evening, officers
18 were able to take the suspect into custody. The
19 investigator's report will be submitted to the Wayne
20 County Prosecutor's Office.

21 Turning now to our traffic enforcement efforts,
22 from February 22nd to February 28th, the Traffic
23 Enforcement Unit conducted operations in the 36th and 9th
24 Precincts. Officers made a total of 577 traffic stops,
25 issuing 1,229 tickets for moving violations and 251

1 tickets for speeding.

2 For community updates, again on Saturday, March
3 7, 2026, the Detroit Police Department will be hosting a
4 community summit to strengthen the relationship between
5 policing and the needs of the community. Community
6 members are encouraged to voice community concerns and
7 learn about the procedures police use to accomplish their
8 duties. A community meeting will be held at the SAY
9 Detroit Play Center located at 19320 Van Dyke Avenue.
10 Register by calling 313-900-9377.

11 There is also a prom dress giveaway kickoff set
12 to take place on Sunday, March 8, 2026. The 9th Precinct
13 welcomes any female students in need of a prom dress,
14 shoes, and accessories to visit the precinct and select
15 from donated items so they can attend their prom with
16 proper attire. Pickup dates are March 8th, 14th, 21st,
17 and 28th at 11187 Gratiot Avenue from 12:00 to 3:00 PM.

18 No members were critically injured last week
19 according to police medical records. And that concludes
20 my report. Thank you.

21 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you, Deputy
22 Chief. And, Commissioner Watts, you have some questions?

23 COMMISSIONER WATTS: Thank you, D.C. Parish,
24 for that report. It's very concerning, especially since
25 it's just the beginning of March, March 5th to be exact,

1 and to hear that any loss of life, especially when we're
2 talking about our children, so many, and that's
3 heartbreaking. But I want to have a question for you
4 going back to the 13-month-old that was found in the car
5 after the vehicle was towed. And I know it was found and
6 towed away in Harper Woods. However, it is concerning to
7 see how so many people missed that a child was in the
8 back of a car. Can you walk us through towing? You
9 know, DPD, when we call for a vehicle to be towed, what
10 is the process? Is the vehicle checked out on the inside
11 by the tow driver? Is pictures being taken? What is the
12 process?

13 DEPUTY CHIEF PARISH: So, speaking to Detroit,
14 Detroit only, so procedure requires us to contact either
15 one of our own tow trucks or an authorized tower. While
16 the member is waiting for that truck to arrive, they are
17 supposed to conduct an inventory of the vehicle. Now --
18 and we are authorized under the Fourth Amendment to
19 conduct inventory searches of vehicles, so there's --
20 without a warrant. There's case law to establish that.
21 If the vehicle's doors are unlocked, we will inventory
22 the exterior of the vehicle, and we will inventory the
23 interior of the vehicle. However, if the vehicle's doors
24 are locked, and I don't know what the case was with the
25 Harper Woods police officers, but if the vehicle's doors

1 are locked, we are not authorized to break open those
2 doors.

3 The purpose of an inventory search is to make
4 sure that all your property is properly secured and
5 accounted for. And so, we're not authorized to break
6 your vehicle open. So, that could frustrate a proper
7 inventory search if the vehicles are locked, same thing
8 with the trunk, same thing with the glove box. But no,
9 if the vehicle is accessible, we are supposed to conduct
10 a full and thorough inventory of that vehicle and to
11 regard the results of the inventory within the Govtow
12 impound system.

13 COMMISSIONER WATTS: So, if windows had -- were
14 tinted, say for example, because to your point, you can't
15 break into it because you don't want to damage the
16 vehicle, it would be difficult. That -- that's another
17 layer of concern.

18 DEPUTY CHIEF PARISH: Absolutely. If the
19 vehicle's doors are locked and the windows are tinted,
20 you may not be able to see everything that's inside of
21 the vehicle. I -- I would hope that the Harper Woods
22 officers did a full and thorough inventory to the extent
23 they were legally permitted to do it. We just don't have
24 that information at this time.

25 COMMISSIONER WATTS: Well, we know that hope

1 failed. But thank you. No more comments.

2 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Any other questions?
3 Are there any other questions?

4 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: Madam Chair?

5 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Go ahead,
6 Commissioner.

7 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: I have a couple
8 questions for the Chief. Thank you for the updates,
9 Chief. I have a few more questions here. So, for drag
10 racing and loud cars, and it seems like we're getting
11 into some pre-season activity already. So, one, my
12 question is, when does the drag racing detail start? And
13 then how are noise ordinances enforced when the noise is
14 coming from vehicles? So, we're talking about music as
15 well as cars that are modified to be very loud. When
16 these are in -- they're in motion, so how does -- how
17 does enforcement of noise ordinances work?

18 DEPUTY CHIEF PARISH: So, if I'm not mistaken,
19 and I would like to double-check this before committing
20 to the answers, but I do know that the City of Detroit
21 has loud noise ordinances, both that emanate from a
22 house, but also emanating from a vehicle. There are also
23 violations that address the noise, but you're not writing
24 the violation for them. So, for example, there is a
25 violation regarding squealing your tires. Not

1 necessarily a noise ordinance, but it is a moving
2 violation that goes -- that may address at least one
3 cause for noise coming from the vehicle. So, there are
4 enforcement options with respect to excessive noise
5 coming from vehicles. Unfortunately, I don't recall the
6 specific ordinances or what the specific language is. I
7 do believe there is a -- an amount of footage outside of
8 which, if you can still hear it, it would violate it. I
9 want to say for homes it's 50 feet and for vehicles it's
10 10 feet, but I'd like to verify that before committing to
11 the answer.

12 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: Okay, thank you. And
13 then what about the drag racing detail? When does that
14 start?

15 DEPUTY CHIEF PARISH: I'm not aware of a date
16 right now. I can shoot off a text to see if I get an
17 answer to that and report back to you as soon as I get a
18 response.

19 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: Thank you so much.
20 Madam Chair, a couple more questions.

21 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELESCHE: Go ahead.

22 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: So, as part of the
23 budget process, I also requested a description of the
24 duties of all of the task positions that are in the
25 department, because those job descriptions are very

1 generic and the responsibilities and pay for those roles
2 can vary widely. So, it was originally requested to Mr.
3 Fries, who was in touch with Mr. Nazarko, and I believe
4 they also brought in Director Patillo in regards to that
5 question. Just wanted to know if that's being worked on
6 and if we know when the board will be able to see those
7 descriptions.

8 DEPUTY CHIEF PARISH: Commissioner, I
9 apologize. I received a text and I was trying to be
10 responsive to it. Could you repeat the question? I had
11 -- no disrespect was intended.

12 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: Sure, no problem. No
13 problem, Chief. So, in the budget process, I requested
14 some -- some -- like a summary of each of the task
15 positions that are in DPD, so we could understand,
16 because those are very generic positions, so the job
17 descriptions are very generic. And so, the people who
18 are in charge of in those roles can have very different
19 responsibilities, very different pay ranges. And so, I
20 was just checking to see where we are with working on
21 providing that information. There have been
22 communications with Mr. Fries, Mr. Nazarko, as well as
23 Director Patillo about it.

24 DEPUTY CHIEF PARISH: I know the inquiries were
25 being made. I'm not sure the status of it. I can fire

1 off an email and try to get back to you before the --

2 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: Okay. Thank you so much
3 for that. And then the last one is that DPD has been
4 delivering some presentations in community, both at block
5 clubs and neighborhood associations regarding DPD
6 purchasing drones to respond to calls for service. Was
7 that information presented to the BOPC previous --
8 perhaps previous to our tenure?

9 DEPUTY CHIEF PARISH: So, the board had
10 previously approved a drone specification report back in
11 2024. However, the use case is being modified, so we
12 will be submitting an updated specification report to the
13 board, as well as a drone policy to the subcommittee. I
14 checked with D.C., he is -- he is still working on the
15 language of the policy, but I anticipate we will have
16 that -- that to the board within the next couple of
17 weeks.

18 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: Okay, so the use case is
19 different. So, I'm -- the reason I'm concerned is that -
20 - and we're a new board now, so some of that I'm sure has
21 something to do with it. However, like if information is
22 being presented in the community before the BOPC
23 understands it, we could get questions about it. In
24 addition, if a new C-OTS (phonetic) request is coming
25 through, it just, it makes sense to me that it would be

1 socialized with the board prior to being socialized in
2 community.

3 DEPUTY CHIEF PARISH: We'll do better,
4 absolutely.

5 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: Thank you. That's it,
6 Madam Chair.

7 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHE: Thank you,
8 Commissioner. Commissioner Woods?

9 VICE CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yeah, yeah. And thank
10 you for uplifting that, Commissioner Camille, because I -
11 - you know, I've been -- I've been watching on TV. I've
12 been seeing drones flying around, and I'm like, no type
13 of demonstration has been done to this board in no shape,
14 form, or fashion. That has not been brought to us in no
15 type of way, you know, and so that's kind of, you know,
16 offensive to me, you know, that something like that would
17 happen without us knowing, you know.

18 DEPUTY CHIEF PARISH: We'll get a presentation
19 lined up right away.

20 VICE CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yeah.

21 DEPUTY CHIEF PARISH: I understand the concern.

22 VICE CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yeah, and -- and thank
23 you as it relates to the children who've been shot, you
24 know. It's disheartening, and I strongly encourage you
25 all to continue to get the message out to the community

1 about, you know, you know, gun safety and all of that.
2 Because it's important for the community to do it, the
3 department to do it, the city to do it, the county,
4 everyone need to spread that word about safe storage of
5 guns, you know. This is disheartening to see two six-
6 year-olds, you know, shot like that, one dead. You know,
7 so please continue to spread that message.

8 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Thank you.
9 Commissioner Boman?

10 COMMISSIONER BOMAN: Yeah, on that note -- and
11 Commissioner Woods is correct, we really should make
12 people aware that. There are also the tools of helping
13 to secure the weapons, being the gun locks. And I recall
14 during the previous, you know, version of this board back
15 last year, or maybe even a year before that, hearing
16 about some commissioners having -- handing out gun locks
17 themselves at community meetings and things like that.
18 Are -- is that something that's accessible to us at
19 present to have, you know, several of them to take to a
20 community meeting if people need any?

21 DEPUTY CHIEF PARISH: I do believe that all
22 precincts have gun locks available in probably the
23 community -- I'm sorry not the community groups, the
24 community assignments within the precinct, but I can
25 verify that information just to make sure that's still

1 the case. We've had several, you know, gun lock drives
2 where we passed them out in the community, but I can get
3 a present state report and get back to the commission.

4 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Any other questions?
5 Commissioner Watts?

6 COMMISSIONER WATTS: Yeah, I was just going to
7 say on that point, to the Chief, and definitely you can
8 let us know, we'd love to support as well any effort we
9 can do to engage the community in our perspective, you
10 know, districts. I know that the Wayne County Sheriff
11 has gun locks, they give out, MSP does that, DPD, and a
12 lot -- especially in Wayne County communities and I know
13 law enforcement do it too, but we need to continue to get
14 that word out in any way we can support that effort,
15 please let us know.

16 DEPUTY CHIEF PARISH: I -- we appreciate that
17 and we will not let any other department out do us, so
18 we'll make sure that we're getting -- we'll make sure
19 that we're getting those gun locks out, if it's not
20 already being done, which I believe it is.

21 Commissioner Camille, if I could through the
22 Chair, I just learned that March 13th is the anticipated
23 date to start the drag racing detail. I'll get you an
24 answer to the other inquiry shortly.

25 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: Thank you.

1 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you. Any other
2 commissioners? Questions? All right, hearing none,
3 thank you, Deputy Chief, appreciate it.

4 Next item on the agenda are oral communications
5 and public comments, and please remember to limit your
6 comments to two minutes and inappropriate language and
7 comments will not be tolerated and they may delay the TV
8 broadcasts and video posts. So, could we have our first
9 speaker?

10 MS. UNDERWOOD: Yes, Madam Chair, our first
11 speaker will be Ms. Bernice Smith followed by Ms. Fredia
12 Butler, next Ms. Williams.

13 MS. SMITH: They move this farther and farther
14 away from me. Good afternoon to my commissioners.

15 ALL COMMISSIONERS: Good afternoon.

16 MS. SMITH: I am glad that you brought up about
17 the children and the gun locks. All this week -- well,
18 every day I listen to a channel 2 at 11 o'clock in the
19 morning, the news. And the main topic has been the
20 shooting and killing in our city of Detroit. I am so
21 frustrated, I'm mad, and anything else you can say that
22 can be in my mind. This is not our city. We know
23 better, and we know to be more careless -- more careful
24 and conscious about our -- especially our children. Why
25 would you leave your children in the car, and then you

1 have a gun in there also? That's not decent, and it's
2 not supposed to be.

3 Now, what I would like to do, I'm not familiar
4 with our candidates that won the election to be on this
5 board and it's one thing that I will take care of when
6 the meeting is over to introduce myself and to know who
7 you are and what you're all about because I'm not
8 familiar with your face. You, Boman, I know about you.
9 You've been around a long time. But the two, the lady
10 and the gentleman there, I would like to meet you and
11 find out what you are -- who you are and what you're all
12 about. Beverly, been around since Coleman days, so -- of
13 course she's not as old as I am though. She's still a
14 beautiful young lady.

15 What I would like to know, what are we going to
16 do about crime in our city? I spoke with some people --
17 friends of mine there in Chicago. I always brag about
18 Detroit and talk about what's going on in Chicago.
19 That's my hometown there and I was born there. I
20 intended to go to Jackson's funeral, but I didn't get a
21 chance to go. But I did talk with some of my friends
22 over there, and they're -- they're bragging about how
23 their police department is better than ours and, well,
24 you know what I said about that. But the fact is we must
25 do better than what we're doing. For the last couple of

1 weeks, it's been terrible, especially about the children.
2 And I can't understand why parents would not get the
3 safety locks. We've been talking about safety locks for
4 the last couple of years.

5 MS. UNDERWOOD: Thank -- thank you. Thank you.

6 MS. SMITH: My time up?

7 MS. UNDERWOOD: Thank you.

8 MS. SMITH: Oh, all right. Well, see about
9 getting the safety locks to the parents. That's all.
10 Thank you.

11 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you.

12 MS. BUTLER: Good afternoon.

13 ALL COMMISSIONERS: Good afternoon.

14 MS. BUTLER: I think I've mentioned before that
15 I'm Fredia Butler, and I'm a community activist. I'm no
16 longer the president of the 2nd Precinct. Commissioners
17 -- thank you, Commissioner Camille, for requesting a
18 facilitator to do a presentation regarding ICE. I have
19 asked an officer, a sergeant, and a lieutenant whether
20 they have received any information regarding whether to
21 assist United States Immigration and Customs Enforcement
22 officers in detaining anyone accused of being
23 undocumented. And the response I received was no.

24 Look at the person who has given ICE its
25 directions and why. From the article I read in the

1 Detroit Free Press, Oakland County wants to end all
2 collaboration with an agency called CLEMIS, which is
3 short for Courts and Law Enforcement Management
4 Information System. That system collects data on any
5 person's interaction with the law, allowing any agency to
6 research one's information. A quote from the article
7 from Oakland County quote, ICE has devolved into an
8 organization that deploys mask-wearing thugs, thinks it's
9 above the law, and proudly tramples on our rights
10 guaranteed by the United States Constitution.

11 I believe others, not being a part of ICE, will
12 use masks to commit crimes. It has been reported that
13 ICE has a great -- has a goal, excuse me, to achieve each
14 week with [sic] every black and brown person could be a
15 part of that goal. The only politician I've heard
16 talking about ICE is Congressman Shri Thanedar. I have a
17 --

18 MS. UNDERWOOD: Thank you, Ms. Butler. Thank
19 you, Ms. Butler.

20 MS. BUTLER: Next week.

21 MS. SMITH: Pretty short, ain't it? Behave
22 yourself.

23 MS. WILLIAMS: I'm always. I'm going to
24 exercise my First Amendment right. Can you guys hear me?
25 Hi. Okay, we're going to talk about illegal voting in

1 this city. Okay. We have ex-offenders on the Detroit
2 Police Department, I always state that, and illegal
3 immigrants. They work here, they in here. So, this is
4 what they are doing. I was at the Secretary of State's
5 office a couple weeks ago. So, the President mandated
6 that you show your birth certificate. Okay, but the
7 documentations are fake for all. Voting is very
8 important to me. So, when you disrespect the
9 Constitution, you are not here legally, and you are a
10 Detroit police officer, and you go vote, this is how they
11 put people in office. This is the bottom line. I think
12 they should mandate it when you go to the Secretary of
13 State office, fingerprints. Because a fingerprint is
14 going to identify exactly who you are, especially with
15 these ex-offenders and illegal immigrants. And I'm tired
16 of coming to these meetings and these people in
17 positions, bosses. Hacking is illegal; stalking is also.
18 So, I'm here every -- every time I come, it's an issue,
19 like last week.

20 You all need to get an Oscar for that fake role
21 last week, because that's some -- it's going to be
22 subpoenaed from 3:00 to 4:30, what really was going on
23 out in that hallway. The bottom line is, if you are not
24 going to do your job by the Constitution, the law, or the
25 charter, no one should be sitting at these tables,

1 including the bosses, the top to the bottom, the Chief,
2 Chief of OCI, and the Chief of Internal Affairs. That's
3 the bottom line. Because if you were doing your job, and
4 you get paid good money to do this job, and these people
5 are working underneath you, coming into these precincts
6 all the time, and you always talk about, we see
7 everything. So, you should see them coming in these
8 buildings every day. Thank you, and have a great day.

9 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you. Real
10 quick, I just want to acknowledge, I forgot to
11 acknowledge that Corporation Counsel Mallet joined us,
12 and also Commissioner Williams joined us for the record.
13 Thank you.

14 MS. UNDERWOOD: Our next speakers will be Mr.
15 Ronald Foster, followed by Lieutenant Mark Young, then
16 we'll go into Zoom.

17 MR. FOSTER: Good evening through the Chair.

18 ALL COMMISSIONERS: Good evening.

19 MR. FOSTER: In my time in the military, it was
20 March 26 of 03, I invaded Iraq. My job was security
21 forces, law enforcement. I had a responsibility of
22 training, fighting with, and supporting indigenous
23 people, in particular the people of Kurdistan, the
24 Kurdish people that you hear about today. The only way
25 that I was able to obtain and do that was through

1 empathy. I had to learn their language. I had to eat
2 their food. I had to respect their customs in order to
3 do that.

4 Furthermore, I literally fought against the
5 current president of Syria on the same battlefield, and
6 so the same passion that I fought for, these rights that
7 everybody speak about, immigration and everything else,
8 there's people that made sacrifices. They made
9 sacrifices so that you could go to school and get
10 education. They made sacrifices so that you could speak
11 freely. They made sacrifices so that you could live a
12 life without penalty and without putting yourself in
13 harm's way to protect that so-called democracy.

14 Democracy is important here, and if you didn't
15 fight for it, just rest assured it's not given to you, it
16 was earned through blood, okay. And so, I just want to
17 point that out. Part of that democracy is the people
18 voted. The Supreme Court made a decision on April 2nd,
19 2025. The Michigan Supreme Court ruled that the odor of
20 marijuana does not constitute probable cause for police
21 to conduct warrantless searches of motor vehicles. What
22 they're saying is you have to change your stigmas and
23 perceptions and get along with current values here. When
24 it comes down to ERPO, everything the officers do is
25 based on good faith. You have to have a reasonable

1 person standard to do anything here in this city, okay?

2 I got plenty more to say, but I appreciate you listening.

3 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHE: Thank you.

4 LIEUTENANT YOUNG: Today, I come before you
5 respectfully at a couple meetings, including two weeks
6 ago, a commissioner stated that he had an issue with our
7 arbitration -- our arbitration process. When we do
8 negotiations, they're not done in a vacuum. They're done
9 with vigorous dialogue and debate, with an understanding.
10 Arbitration is a factor that provides fairness. It
11 provides fairness, just like we want fairness for our
12 victims, for our suspects, our person of interest, and
13 our perpetrators, everyone, including you. Allegations
14 are made against us, it's not true, often. I don't have
15 to tell you that. You see it, sometimes on Thursdays.

16 To make a comment about destroying arbitration
17 for the men and women that I represent, and I am one of
18 them, I was lied on. It was an accusation against me, a
19 false lie, and the person knew that they lied. They
20 thought that they was going to take my livelihood and my
21 freedom. They failed. It happens every day to these men
22 and women that's out here, every day, because we're easy
23 targets. We stand in front of you, we don't even tell
24 the truth to the public that their complaints had no
25 merit. How do you think that makes us feel when you talk

1 about taking away arbitration? It is the totality of the
2 circumstances. Even people that come before you that get
3 suspended without pay, didn't even finish the
4 investigation, wasn't even completed, but we're going to
5 jump to the gun. A suspension without pay is an
6 irrevocable harm. I don't care what nobody tells you,
7 that's exactly what it is. I could lose my house, my
8 spouse, my dog, everything about me, without the totality
9 of the circumstances, and many times when the
10 investigations are complete, it's the reversal. We jump
11 the gun. Be careful when you talk about arbitration for
12 people that make split-second decisions. They don't get
13 to look at the video again. They don't get the Monday
14 morning quarterback. Slow down. Thank you.

15 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you. Next
16 speaker?

17 MS. UNDERWOOD: Mr. Charles Cousin.

18 MR. COUSIN: Hello. Five years ago, I bought a
19 house from the land bank in the city of Detroit. Two
20 weeks ago, two females set it on fire, and damn near
21 burned it down. I know, like, you know, some people
22 might think it's funny, but it's not funny, you know.
23 Like, if your house got burned down, you'd be really
24 upset, and the officer, Jay Hall, he's in charge of the
25 arson case. We brought the ladies in. I put some

1 feelers out. Feelers hit me back, let me know where they
2 were at, and I called 9-1-1. I'm on the phone with 9-1-
3 1, the call drops. No call back. They let the two
4 ladies go, who burned down my house. You know, I don't
5 know how to feel, you know. I'm not from here. I came
6 out here chasing the American dream, and I'm living a
7 nightmare. And Jay Hall -- Officer Jay Hall, I would
8 like him not on this case because he seems to be looking
9 at me like I'm some kind of joke when these ladies
10 trespassed and set my house on fire. You know what I'm
11 saying? I know I'm a black man, and people don't really
12 have empathy and sympathy for us, and people think that
13 we out here clout chasing and whatnot. I didn't, you
14 know, come up here a couple of weeks ago and ask to be a
15 part of y'all commissioner's board for clout. I did it
16 because my friend is the chief of police here, and he
17 needs help. You know, he can't be screaming on
18 everybody, but somebody needs to scream on some of these
19 people and wake them up, you know, that people can't just
20 get away with crime here. That's all I have to say.

21 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: D.C., is there any way
22 we could reassign this case as he's requested?

23 DEPUTY CHIEF PARISH: I'll have to talk to the
24 commanding officer about reassigning it, but I can
25 certainly get his information and follow up with the

1 commanding officer.

2 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you. Oh,
3 Commissioner Williams has a question.

4 COMMISSIONER WILLIAMS: Yeah, for the --

5 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: For the gentleman?

6 COMMISSIONER WILLIAMS: No.

7 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: With the D.C.?

8 COMMISSIONER WILLIAMS: Yep.

9 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay.

10 COMMISSIONER WILLIAMS: If a citizen calls 9-1-
11 1 and their call is dropped, is there a procedure that 9-
12 1-1 handles? Do they call the caller back, or is that
13 just a dropped call and the caller has to call them back?
14 I'm only asking because me hearing that right now,
15 there's no telling how many other people possibly had
16 that encounter or will have that -- that issue.

17 DEPUTY CHIEF PARISH: My understanding is that
18 if the drop -- if the call is dropped under -- under
19 extraordinary circumstances, a call back is mandatory. I
20 will verify that with the commanding officer of
21 communications and make sure that it's still in practice.
22 I believe that is the standard.

23 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you. Any other
24 questions? Go ahead, Commissioner -- oh, I'm sorry. Go
25 ahead, Commissioner Ivey.

1 COMMISSIONER IVEY: Charles, what is your last
2 name?

3 MR. COUSINS: It's Cousins.

4 COMMISSIONER IVEY: Cousins? Thank you. Thank
5 you, Madam Chair.

6 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Any others? Hearing
7 none, our next speaker, please.

8 MS. UNDERWOOD: Thank you, Madam Chair. We're
9 going to go into Zoom. Our first caller will be Mr.
10 Jadante Smith, followed by caller with the last three
11 digits, 482. Can you unmute, Mr. Smith? We'll go to the
12 next caller. Caller with the last digits, 482. Mr.
13 Smith, can you go ahead?

14 MR. CROWLEY (ZOOM CALLER 482): Yeah, what up
15 doe?

16 MR. SMITH (ZOOM): Yeah, I can't hear you.
17 Give me one second. May I be heard?

18 MS. UNDERWOOD: Yes, sir.

19 MR. SMITH (ZOOM): Perfect. I want to start
20 off by saying congratulations to the People's
21 Commissioner, Darius Morris, on beating a bogus
22 investigation launched by the OIG for made-up conduct
23 concerns. From Lieutenant Mark Young, you are a liar,
24 and you need to step down -- go ahead. You need to step
25 down and get a new haircut. There's something wrong with

1 the haircut. Also, to Dinosaur Bernice Smith, I hate to
2 do it. You're a 90-year-old black woman, but you're one
3 foot -- you're a banana peel away from the grave. You
4 need to worry about your health, your high blood
5 pressure, leave people alone who are not bothering you,
6 and also you never bring any family members with you
7 because I feel like -- I feel like they probably don't
8 like you, unfortunately.

9 Also, Officer Dion Dawson, badge number 389,
10 assigned to the 6th Precinct, has a history of
11 misconduct, and he is a perfect candidate for an
12 emergency risk protection order. I had to serve him
13 personally with a personal protection order because he
14 threatened to shoot a domestic partner in the head, which
15 is an egregious misuse of power as a Detroit police
16 officer. It's very sad that, you know, he could -- he
17 could go around and not have a firearm -- not have
18 firearm privileges because of a PPO that has been
19 sustained in court two different times by a judge, and he
20 still can be suspended with pay. He is suspended
21 (indiscernible), no gun. I would ask that any
22 commissioner, and all the commissioners, think very, very
23 seriously about submitting a motion to suspend Officer
24 Dion Dawson without pay. Because if he can't have a
25 firearm, he can't be a police officer anyway. And so, if

1 there's a sustained personal protection order against him
2 for him making a threat of shooting someone in the head
3 who's a domestic partner, we should look at that very
4 seriously. Because we just had a former Detroit police
5 officer who had a domestic complaint, even though he was
6 fired in Roseville, and he shot a Roseville police
7 officer because of his conduct. So, if we have a
8 situation like that where there's an officer Dion Dawson
9 who lives in Inkster, has some type of situation where
10 somebody makes him enraged, and he shoots someone because
11 he has his firearm privileges, or he comes after someone
12 who may have served him a PPO, or comes after a domestic
13 partner who may be a part of the suspension, it's going
14 to be on all of your hands.

15 And also, Conrad Mallet, you don't need to be
16 there, and I hope that we can remove you as soon as
17 possible. You're terrible. Thank you.

18 MS. UNDERWOOD: All right, we're going to call
19 it with the last three digits, 482.

20 MR. CROWLEY (ZOOM CALLER 482): Yeah, what up
21 doe? Now, it's been five years since Kaniesha Coleman
22 was murdered. Now, this investigation says the name of
23 who is responsible, and y'all ain't took the tag of her
24 mama, Nini's (phonetic) mother -- Nini's mama, Kaniesha
25 Coleman, DPD case 20-11112 [sic]. So now, I got to do

1 the Mr. Rou.

2 Now, sitting at that table over there is Conrad
3 Mallet, Jr., who sat right beside Janice Winfrey when she
4 lied on Zoom in 2024. She lied April 27th, 2024. I know
5 she did because I did an investigation into that as well.
6 And we've uncovered absentee ballot fraud here in the
7 city of Detroit. Now, Conrad is on the Detroit Election
8 Commission, and all elected officials in Detroit have
9 been cheated in. The ones that they got in there, the
10 whole City Council, the mayor, school board, and the
11 Board of Police Commissioners, and the four appointees
12 are appointed by a cheated in mayor. Now, y'all know I'm
13 telling the truth. So, Nini's got to get what she wants,
14 so that's why I got to do what I got to do.

15 I gave the information about the absentee
16 ballot fraud to number 47, the President of the United
17 States. Right now, the United States of America is at
18 war.

19 VICE CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Oh, Jesus.

20 MS. UNDERWOOD: We're gonna go to the caller
21 with the last three digits, 7- -- I mean, excuse me, 973,
22 and then we'll go to Jawana, and that will be your last
23 speaker.

24 ZOOM CALLER 973: Hello, can you hear me?

25 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Yes, we can.

1 ZOOM CALLER 973: Okay, thank you so much. To
2 the commissioners, I wanted to make a comment. I know
3 there was a caller that made a comment about Mother
4 Bernice, and I just want to say, to say that she was 90,
5 she's next to a banana peel, I just want him to know, you
6 never know where the death angel is at. So, you can go
7 before a 90-year-old. I just wanted to make -- sometimes
8 we get arrogant and think because people are older, death
9 will get them first. No, death can come get you before
10 them, so I just wanted to make that comment.

11 I wanted to also make a comment. The President
12 just fired the Homeland Security Kristi Noem, which she
13 should have never been in that position. And I think
14 because of the activism of the people in Minnesota,
15 especially after the loss of the nurse -- the ICU nurse,
16 and Ms. Renee Good, and Alex that -- and the people in
17 activism, because it started with the President, but he
18 knew the impact with that, so she just got fired. We
19 knew it wasn't going to be long for her. So, hopefully
20 what's happening with ICE, because we know there have
21 been citizens also kidnapped off the street with ICE, so
22 I just, you know, thank God for the activism of the
23 country.

24 Also, I wanted to hope that for the Deputy
25 Chief, if you -- if we can give a report out, there have

1 been a lot of missing children. I know last week the
2 breaking news story, it was a child reported on Sussex
3 Street, an attempted kidnapping, so if we can do a, you
4 know, just speak on our missing children, because whether
5 a child leaves without permission, there are children
6 being missed, and we've seen the tragic situation with
7 those young girls that were found in a suitcase in
8 Cleveland, Ohio. So, I'm just hoping more would be done,
9 because I know under the federal government, there was
10 money pulled from human trafficking. So, I just hope
11 that the Mayor -- Mayor Sheffield, they start making
12 these reports about these missing children, so I hope
13 that would --

14 VICE CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yeah, through the
15 Chair?

16 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Go ahead, Commissioner
17 Woods.

18 VICE CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Through the Chair, can
19 you update us and maybe come, and through the Chair if --
20 with the support of the Chair, about the AMBER Alert.
21 How's that working for the city, and how people can tap
22 into that?

23 DEPUTY CHIEF PARISH: Absolutely. Would the
24 board like a presentation? A 10-minute presentation?

25 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: That would be nice,

1 yes.

2 VICE CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes.

3 DEPUTY CHIEF PARISH: Okay. I'll work with the
4 Board Secretary on setting that up.

5 VICE CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Okay.

6 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you. And I
7 would just add that there is a weekly social media
8 announcement that comes out every week, or as it happens.

9 DEPUTY CHIEF PARISH: I believe it's weekly.
10 (indiscernible) is still here, maybe she could offer some
11 insight on it. I believe we publish on social media our
12 missing stats.

13 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Right, missing
14 children, and actually missing -- missing people, I think
15 too.

16 DEPUTY CHIEF PARISH: She indicated she
17 publishes it every Friday.

18 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Every Friday. I knew
19 it was regularly, definitely. Okay, thank you. Any
20 other questions? Commissioner Williams?

21 COMMISSIONER WILLIAMS: I've got a question,
22 and I just want to know for my own information about that
23 Officer Dawson, is there a file, or a case, or findings
24 available, just so I can view for my viewing purposes?

25 DEPUTY CHIEF PARISH: It would be with the

1 Professional Standards Bureau. I can see what -- the
2 status of any investigation we have on file for him.
3 Absolutely.

4 COMMISSIONER WILLIAMS: Thanks, I'd like to get
5 that information. I just want to look through it.

6 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you. Any other
7 comments? Commissioner Watts?

8 COMMISSIONER WATTS: Yeah, Madam Chair, at our
9 Policy Committee meeting, I had Board Secretary, she's
10 already referred back to OTI to look into that and give
11 us more information, and I know she sent that
12 communication. So, we're just waiting for an update on
13 that particular incident, and then we'll share it with
14 everyone.

15 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay. Commissioner
16 Williams? Okay. Any other comments? Commissioner
17 Boman, go ahead.

18 COMMISSIONER BOMAN: Yeah, I just wanted to
19 kind of react briefly to some of what I heard in citizen
20 comments. That I think any derogatory remarks -- or
21 personal attacks and derogatory remarks are a bad idea
22 anyway. But specifically, remarks that impugn an entire
23 group of people are even worse, and I'm speaking
24 specifically of ageist remarks. That's a form of
25 bigotry, and it's unacceptable.

1 VICE CHAIRPERSON WOODS: I'd like to associate
2 my- --

3 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Commissioner Woods, go
4 ahead.

5 VICE CHAIRPERSON WOODS: I'd like to associate
6 myself with those remarks as well, that it was
7 disheartening to hear something like that. You know, and
8 that is part of ageism, and we should not be using
9 discriminatory remarks in our meeting towards classes of
10 individuals that come to our meetings.

11 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you. Any other
12 comments? Questions? All right, do we have any more
13 speakers? Oh, I'm sorry, Commissioner Ivey first.

14 COMMISSIONER IVEY: Oh, that's okay. I wanted
15 to reiterate what Commissioner Woods just said. If we
16 find that people are going to be calling with those kinds
17 of remarks, is there a way that they could be cut?

18 ZOOM CALLER 973: Yeah.

19 COMMISSIONER IVEY: That the mic could just be
20 cut? Because if you're going to call and insult people,
21 I don't know what the purpose of it is, but I think it
22 needs to be cut immediately. They shouldn't be talking
23 any further.

24 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Would you like to make
25 the motion to that?

1 COMMISSIONER IVEY: I'd like to make a motion
2 on that.

3 ZOOM CALLER 973: Support.

4 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Oh, wait, corporation
5 counsel has something to say about that. Go ahead.

6 CORP. COUNSEL MALLETT: Commissioner Ivey, Lord
7 knows, I agree with you, but we cannot do that. The Open
8 Meetings Act allows for those kinds of comments, and
9 there have been many, many cases written about the verbal
10 abuse that public officials have to take, as long as
11 curse words are not used, and words that are designed to
12 -- using Commissioner Boman's words, you know, bigotry
13 words, calling people, --

14 COMMISSIONER IVEY: Foot in the grave kind of
15 comments.

16 CORP. COUNSEL MALLETT: Well, I mean, directed
17 at me, that would be okay.

18 VICE CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Right.

19 CORP. COUNSEL MALLETT: Directed at Mother
20 Bernice, it's not.

21 COMMISSIONER IVEY: It's not okay, period.

22 ZOOM CALLER 973: It's not okay, period.

23 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Yes, agreed.

24 VICE CHAIRPERSON WOODS: It was God.

25 ZOOM CALLER 973: Oh, I thought I was on mute.

1 I'm sorry.

2 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Corporation Counsel,
3 so you're saying, as it relates to public officials, but
4 Commissioner Ivey is saying, when we're attacking people
5 in the audience who come here, they're the public, and
6 they come here, and they have rights too.

7 CORP. COUNSEL MALLET: They do, indeed.

8 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: So, can we stop the
9 tape for --

10 CORP. COUNSEL MALLET: You -- Madam, you have
11 to intervene. You have to say to whoever is making the
12 inappropriate comments, you must stop or you will be
13 excused from this session. You've got to give them an
14 opportunity to correct their behavior.

15 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Gladly, I'll do that.

16 CORP. COUNSEL MALLET: So, that's -- that's --

17 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: I'll try to do that.

18 CORP. COUNSEL MALLET: Well, and then, if they
19 don't follow the direction, then you can direct that it
20 be cut off. Direct it at --

21 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay.

22 CORP. COUNSEL MALLET: -- direct it at me,
23 direct it at Lieutenant Young.

24 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay.

25 CORP. COUNSEL MALLET: We are public officials,

1 and we have to take what's coming.

2 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: All right, thank you.

3 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Speak for yourself.

4 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: I've asked corporation
5 counsel in the past, you know, whether that is allowed,
6 that kind of language and attacking people. And he has
7 said, yes, it's, you know, freedom --

8 CORP. COUNSEL MALLET: It's the Open Meetings
9 Act.

10 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Oh, Open Meetings Act,
11 yes. So, I have asked numerous times. The next speaker,
12 do we have more?

13 MS. UNDERWOOD: Yes, ma'am. Our next speaker,
14 Ms. Jawana. And then, after Ms. Jawana, we'll go to
15 iPad.

16 MS. OLIVER (ZOOM): Can I be heard?

17 CORP. COUNSEL MALLET: Yes.

18 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Yes, we can hear you.

19 MS. OLIVER (ZOOM): Okay, good afternoon to all
20 the commissioners. I would like to say good afternoon to
21 my commissioner, Commissioner Camille. Thank you for the
22 resources that you have provided. I do see a difference
23 with police patrol already within the daytime. Still
24 working on night, but we -- I have been in
25 communications, so thank you for that. That will be my

1 update for this week. We do see a difference. The
2 connections are connecting, so I appreciate that. Things
3 are looking good.

4 I want to mention the gun locks. I think that
5 would be a good idea because the gun locks have been --
6 they're giving them out everywhere. You can go in the
7 precinct. You can go everywhere and get a gun lock. I
8 don't know if it's the uncomfortability [sic] of people
9 going in and, me being the president of the Littlefield
10 Eaton (phonetic) Block Club, I wouldn't mind just
11 dropping them off at certain doors or, you know, asking
12 some of my neighbors to help out. Because I -- something
13 has -- something more does have to happen. So, I think I
14 would appreciate if you all looked into that more and
15 with community leaders trying to push them out there as
16 well.

17 And also, I heard someone saying about does the
18 police call back. Yes, they do. If the call is
19 disconnected, they do call back. I know that from
20 previous experience from recent to past, and they've been
21 doing it for some years now. So, they do do that.

22 And I just want to say thank you. I appreciate
23 everything all you all are doing. I see everything that
24 all of you commissioners are doing. Not just sitting
25 there, but off in the streets and, you know, helping and

1 doing things as well as y'all social media. I appreciate
2 that because I follow a lot of you all as well, and that
3 keeps me updated and posted. So, I do appreciate that.
4 Thank you all. Have a great day and continue doing what
5 you're doing.

6 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you. Next
7 speaker.

8 MS. UNDERWOOD: Our last speaker is iPad.

9 IPAD (ZOOM): Yes, I just want to speak on the
10 general disrespectful comment. There's been disrespect
11 coming from the Board of Commissioners from the very
12 beginning. The language may not be as clear to some
13 people. However, the vocabulary is very obvious.
14 However, disrespect is disrespect on any level. When
15 you're not upholding the law of nature and when you're
16 exercising and holding people to a law, and you're being
17 deceptive in the rules and the policies, that's major
18 disrespect. So, everybody's being disrespectful. Even
19 the ones that don't know they're being disrespectful.
20 So, look in the mirror first before you decide to point
21 the finger when everybody, beginning with the Board of
22 Commissioners, are out of order. There's no need for
23 community meetings when the so-called Board of
24 Commissioners who oversee the police are out of order.
25 So, that's disrespect as well. So, if we're going to

1 talk about disrespect, we have to cover all grounds. So,
2 as adults, get in order, get in law, because everybody's
3 outlawed right now at this moment. So, until you stand
4 up and take accountability and responsibility for your
5 actions, don't speak about each other being
6 disrespectful. That's my two minutes.

7 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Any other speakers?

8 MS. UNDERWOOD: That is your last speaker,
9 Madam Chair.

10 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you.

11 At this time, we have a report from the
12 Secretary.

13 SECRETARY GARNIER: Madam Chair, through the
14 Chair, under your tab 6, commissioners, you'll find the
15 reports for this week, facial recognition and shot
16 spotter. Also, item 6E, you received earlier via email,
17 but a hard copy for your convenience is presented there
18 as well. 6F, the policy committee memorandum giving the
19 highlights from the Policy Committee that occurred this
20 week, Tuesday.

21 Also, the announcements for today are as
22 follows: The next board meeting is the March community
23 meeting. Next Thursday, March 12th, 6:30 PM. We will be
24 in the 10th Precinct at the Helen Moore Community Center,
25 11825 Dexter Avenue, Detroit 48206. The April community

1 meeting, which is also to be held at 6:30 PM on Thursday,
2 April 9th. We will be in the 9th Precinct on that day at
3 City of Detroit Heilmann Recreation Center, which is
4 located 19601 Brock Avenue in Detroit 48205. Upcoming
5 committee meetings tomorrow, Friday, March 6th. Public
6 meeting of the Personnel and Training Committee, 3:00 PM,
7 here in Detroit Public Safety Headquarters. Tomorrow,
8 Friday, March 6th, 3:00 PM. Next week, Tuesday, March
9 10th at 3:00 PM, is the Citizen Complaints Committee
10 meeting at that time.

11 Those are the announcements and report for
12 today, Madam Secretary [sic].

13 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you. Any
14 questions?

15 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: Madam Chair?

16 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Yes, Commissioner.

17 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: By way of announcement,
18 can I acknowledge the event that we received in our
19 packets today?

20 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Yes.

21 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: Thank you. So, for the
22 benefit of the community, we received a flyer today in
23 regards to an event happening this evening from 6:00 to
24 8:00 at the Partridge Auditorium of Wayne State
25 University Law School, where Hadley Pritchard is going to

1 be doing, like, a workshop on how to make a persuasive
2 public comment. So, for those who come to these meetings
3 and other public meetings, this might be a benefit to
4 you. She'll be using ShotSpotter as an example, but the
5 skills that are shared here would be applicable to
6 anything that you are looking to influence elected
7 officials around. So, if anyone is in the room, would
8 like this flyer, I'm willing to share that. And for
9 those online, again, it's this evening from 6:00 to 8:00
10 at the Partridge Auditorium of Wayne State Law. Thank
11 you.

12 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Thank you,
13 Commissioner.

14 I also have another announcement. I think we
15 kind of jumped. We skipped unfinished business because
16 it is about the Grand Rapids situation. We discussed
17 that at length already. So -- but I do have an
18 announcement. There is a meeting tonight, the Mayor --
19 Mayor Sheffield's community forums that she's been
20 holding throughout the city. It's at the Community --
21 it's at the Eastside Community Network. It used to be
22 Warren Conner. And it's located at, I believe it's 4401
23 Conner, which is Warren Conner area. If anybody is
24 interested, it starts at 5:30 until about 8:00. So, if
25 you -- if you can't go to that meeting, there are going

1 to be a couple more meetings on Saturday. It's a youth-
2 focused forum. So, if you go to the City of Detroit
3 website, you can get the dates and the times. Please
4 participate and fill out the survey that the mayor has
5 online so that she'll know what citizens of Detroit want
6 for her to focus on. Thank you.

7 Any -- any other comments under -- new -- do we
8 have new business?

9 DEPUTY CHIEF PARISH: Madam Chair?

10 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Go ahead.

11 DEPUTY CHIEF PARISH: Madam Chair, I'm sorry.
12 May I interject just briefly, not to delay the meeting.
13 Through you to Commissioner Conneal. Our agency CFO,
14 Nevrus Nazarko, indicated that the information regarding
15 the task positions was submitted as part of the budget
16 packet. If you'd like, I can forward -- just forward it
17 to the Board Secretary, if that's what's being requested.

18 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: You know what? I do
19 recall a very lengthy chart of the task workers. I
20 wasn't sure if it was that information, but it is
21 available. We have it.

22 DEPUTY CHIEF PARISH: It's the job descriptions
23 you were asking for, or did I just misunderstand the --

24 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: Through the Chair?

25 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Go ahead.

1 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: Yeah, we can -- maybe we
2 can sit down and look at it together because I know in
3 committee we took a look at it and there was a listing
4 where it indicated, like, what area they worked in, but
5 it wasn't a description of what they do. And so, I was
6 looking for more detail. But if that's been submitted
7 since --

8 DEPUTY CHIEF PARISH: So, what I have, what I'm
9 looking at, I'm happy to forward it to Lydia, is -- this
10 is literally every comprehensive job description that we
11 have, the positions you're talking about. I'll forward
12 it. If you inspect it and you need more information,
13 please let me know.

14 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: Thank you. I appreciate
15 it.

16 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you. Anything
17 else?

18 VICE CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Motion to adjourn.

19 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: I'll entertain a
20 motion to adjourn.

21 COMMISSIONER WATTS: Second.

22 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: I can't even -- it
23 happened so fast. Commissioner Woods made the motion,
24 Commissioner Watts seconded. Any discussion? All in
25 favor indicate by saying aye.

1 ALL COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

2 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Opposed? Motion
3 carries. Thank you for being here this evening.

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
