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4 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Good evening,
5 everyone. Thank you for joining us tonight. Evening.
6 Today is March 12th, and we're at the community --
7 evening meeting of the Board of Police Commissioners.
8 I'd like to call the meeting to order, and we'll start
9 with the invocation by Commander Chaplain Leslie Walker,
10 who is on Zoom.

11 COMMANDER CHAPLAIN WALKER: Good evening,
12 everyone, and thank you so much for the privilege to come
13 before this great board to pray. We ask our choice
14 blessings of God be upon our Christian brothers in this
15 season of Lent, and to our Muslim brothers in this season
16 of Ramadan Mubarak. Let's pray.

17 Father, we thank you now for your goodness,
18 mercy, and grace. We thank for your divine wisdom that
19 lead this great, August Body of the Detroit Police
20 Commissioners in conducting their business today. Give
21 us spirit of peace. If there be any inflicted among us,
22 heal, deliver, and set free. Now, spirit, have your way
23 now, and we give you praise, and we say, thank God.
24 Amen.

25 ALL IN ATTENDANCE: Amen.

1 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you.

2 Next, Madam Secretary, if I could have the roll
3 call.

4 SECRETARY GARNIER: Madam Chair, through the
5 Chair. Commissioner Dewaelsche?

6 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Present.

7 SECRETARY GARNIER: Commissioner Boman?

8 COMMISSIONER BOMAN: Present.

9 SECRETARY GARNIER: Commissioner Camille?

10 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: Present.

11 SECRETARY GARNIER: Commissioner Carter?

12 COMMISSIONER WATTS: Here.

13 SECRETARY GARNIER: Commissioner Ivey?

14 COMMISSIONER IVEY: Present.

15 SECRETARY GARNIER: Commissioner Jones?

16 COMMISSIONER JONES: Present.

17 SECRETARY GARNIER: Commissioner Morris?

18 COMMISSIONER MORRIS: Present.

19 SECRETARY GARNIER: Commissioner Watts?

20 COMMISSIONER WATTS: Here.

21 SECRETARY GARNIER: Commissioner Woods?

22 VICE CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Present.

23 SECRETARY GARNIER: Commissioner Williams is en
24 route.

25 Madam Chair, we have nine present at this time.

1 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHÉ: Thank you.

2 Next on the agenda is approval of the March
3 12th agenda, today's agenda.

4 COMMISSIONER JONES: So moved, Madam Chair.

5 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHÉ: It's been moved by
6 Commissioner Woods.

7 VICE CHAIRPERSON WOODS: No, Jones.

8 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHÉ: Second -- I'm sorry?

9 VICE CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Jones. I second.

10 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHÉ: Moved by Commissioner
11 Jones and seconded by Commissioner Woods. Is there any
12 discussion? All in favor, indicate by saying, aye.

13 THE BOARD: Aye.

14 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHÉ: Opposed? The motion
15 carries. Thank you.

16 Next, we have approval of the minutes of March
17 5th. Is there a motion?

18 COMMISSIONER JONES: So moved, Madam Chair.

19 COMMISSIONER WATTS: Support.

20 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHÉ: It's been moved by
21 Commissioner Jones, supported by Commissioner Watts. Is
22 there any discussion? All in favor, indicate by saying,
23 aye.

24 THE BOARD: Aye.

25 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHÉ: Opposed? Motion

1 carries. Thank you.

2 Now, Madam Secretary, could we have an
3 introduction of the BOPC staff, Chief of Police, elected
4 officials and representatives, and community leaders?

5 SECRETARY GARNIER: Madam Chair, through the
6 Chair. Present and registered at this time are the
7 following: Jonya Underwood, Teresa Blossom, Dior Mathis,
8 Armani Arnold, Candace Hayes, Mary Barber, Artemisia
9 Joshua, Drew Fries, Felicia Tyson, Chief Investigator
10 Jerome Warfield Sr., Supervising Investigator Elgin
11 Murphy, Katrina Patillo via Zoom. Our interpreters today
12 are Lindsay Weingand (phonetic) and Stephanie Beatty,
13 court reporter - Hanson Reporting, Enrique Jackson and
14 Richard Barnmore (phonetic) for audio services, Charles
15 Henry - video services. Our Chief of Police Todd
16 Bettison, Deputy Chief Jacqueline Pritchett, Chief of
17 Staff Shanda Starks, Commander Phillip Rodriguez, and
18 Captain Amber Roberson. We also have registered Alvin
19 Stokes, who is the President of the Tenth Precinct
20 Community Relations Council as well as the President of
21 the Citywide CRC.

22 On behalf of the Board of Commissioners, we
23 extend appreciation to the City of Detroit Recreation
24 staff and the Helen Moore Center team led by Lauren
25 Palmer, who I also understand is in attendance. Former

1 Police Commissioner William Davis is also here. We also
2 have former Wayne County Commissioner Keith Williams for
3 Sheriff Washington, Marie Overall, Denise Lyles of
4 District 5 Community Advisory Council, John Conyers III.

5 On Zoom, we have Nicole Fisher of the Fourth
6 Precinct and from our Youth Advisory Panel we have
7 Hezekiah Bailey and Neda Agha, I believe, are both
8 present. And that's who we have registered at this time,
9 Madam Chair.

10 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you. Thank you
11 for that. You did say that the Director of the Center
12 was here?

13 SECRETARY GARNIER: I'm sorry?

14 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Oh, did you say the
15 director was here of the center?

16 SECRETARY GARNIER: I believe she was. I was
17 given her name. Maybe she's out in the hall.

18 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay, if she is, if
19 she would like to say a few words or a welcome, we could
20 ask her to come up. Okay. I guess they're going to get
21 her.

22 Beautiful Center. This is the first time I've
23 been here. It's absolutely beautiful. And Ms. Moore is
24 a wonderful person, so thank goodness that she has this
25 center named after her.

1 Did you want to --

2 COMMISSIONER WATTS: Yes.

3 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELESCHE: Yes, go ahead.

4 COMMISSIONER WATTS: Thank you, Madam Chair. I
5 just want to say this is definitely District 5, while
6 we're waiting to see if she can come. And of course, I'm
7 Beverly Watts, Commissioner Watts. I represent District
8 5. And I just want to say I am so overwhelmed and proud
9 to see everyone who turned out. Let's give a round of
10 applause.

11 I definitely just want to say it is really
12 refreshing to be back in this facility. Years ago, when
13 I was Director of Wayne County Parks, and then we had the
14 Honorable Commissioner Keith Williams here, who he really
15 advocated for funding for this particular center through
16 our Wayne County park millage. It was a lot of dialogue,
17 but I just want to say that we have him here now, even
18 though he's representing someone else. I want to make
19 sure we give honor to him because this was probably back
20 in 2006/2008, and he's been fighting for this center to
21 be improved and have funding put here, and he was
22 successful through the Wayne County park millage. So,
23 thank you, Commissioner Williams.

24 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELESCHE: All right, we'll wait
25 one -- one -- just a few seconds. Is she coming?

1 Just wanted to know if you wanted to say a few
2 words of welcome to the people that are here today.
3 Thank you kindly for letting us use your facility.

4 MS. PALMER: Hello, everybody. My name is
5 Lauren Palmer. I am the Recreation Center Supervisor
6 here at Helen Moore. I would like to welcome everybody
7 to the center. I just want to say a few words about what
8 we have going on. We have activities for youth, teens,
9 adults, and seniors. We have activity programs at the
10 front desk if you all want to check it out. We're also
11 always welcome for ideas about what you all want to see
12 here at the Community Center. My name is Lauren Palmer,
13 and I'll be around. Thank you.

14 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you so much.

15 Next on our agenda is the Chief of Police
16 Report and the Tenth Precinct Report.

17 CHIEF BETTISON: Good evening, honorable board.
18 I'll start out and give an update on our status of where
19 we are here today. So, in criminal homicides we're up 28
20 percent. What does that mean? Last year this time, we
21 had 24. This year we're sitting at 30. Sexual assaults,
22 up 7.2 percent. Last year we had 83. This year we have
23 89. The majority of those assaults are individuals that
24 know -- that know each other in some form or fashion.
25 Aggravated assaults, 5.4 percent. We're up. Aggravated

1 assaults are where someone is assaulted with a weapon.
2 It could be a stick, brick, knife, gun. Robbery. We're
3 down in robberies 15 -- 9.9 percent. Burglary, which is
4 a crime that really shakes the core when somebody's
5 entered your dwelling, we're down 22.8 percent. Our
6 larcenies, where someone has stolen something from you, a
7 cell phone or something being stolen out of a retail
8 store, we're down 12.3 percent. In motor vehicle theft,
9 we're continuing the trend down. We're down 19.5
10 percent. So, compared to last year this time, we have
11 208 fewer vehicles that were stolen. Part 1 property
12 crime, down 16 percent. Part 1 violent crime, 4.3
13 percent up. Non-fatal shootings, we're down 20 percent.
14 So, last year this time, we had 60. This year 48. And
15 carjackings which has just -- that trend has been going
16 down year over year over year. And so, last year at this
17 time, we had 16. This year we have a total of 13. So, I
18 have to believe that Project Greenlight, the technology,
19 the things that we're doing has made a tremendous
20 difference when it comes to crime in the category of
21 carjackings.

22 Something of note that I'll just highlight
23 really quick is we had over in the Tenth Precinct a cold
24 case that was closed from back in 2024. We still
25 relentlessly work those cases to bring justice to

1 families. So, on December 16, 2024, the victim went to
2 sell a firearm in the area of West Buena Vista and
3 Wildmere Street in the Tenth precinct. The victim
4 stopped communicating with his loved ones causing
5 concern. They tracked his cell phone, that led to the
6 discovery of his abandoned vehicle. The Detroit Police
7 Department's Missing Unit responded to the area using
8 canines. They did locate the deceased victim inside of
9 the vacant building. It was alleged that the victim and
10 the defendants met in the building to test fire the gun.
11 The victim was fatally shot, and both defendants fled.

12 We were able to identify those defendants a
13 short time later but didn't have enough to actually get
14 criminal charges. But just as of recently, still working
15 it and working with the Prosecutor's Office, the
16 defendants were charged. And so, we have a Jalen
17 Williams and a Hodari Heatley in connection with the
18 fatal shootings, and both defendants were taken back into
19 custody and charged. So, we were able to bring closure
20 to that cold case right there.

21 Also, right here in the Tenth Precinct,
22 officers working responded to a home in the 2200 block of
23 Kendall Street for a reported argument between family
24 members. And they were able to take a defendant into
25 custody and recovered two guns from that location.

1 And then over in the Fourth Precinct, officers
2 were on routine patrol, ended up stopping an individual,
3 placed him into custody and guess what they found on this
4 individual? Two kilos of cocaine. So, two keys taken
5 off the street. And we know that narcotics laced with
6 fentanyl and other things, who knows how many lives were
7 saved as a result of that.

8 And of course, as a concern for the community
9 in general, number one complaint that I get is traffic.
10 You know, speeding cars. And so, last week, our Traffic
11 Enforcement Unit issued 202 tickets for speeding and over
12 1,000 tickets for other various moving violations. And
13 so, we track where accidents are occurring in the city.
14 We deploy our traffic units to where those are occurring
15 to try to curtail that as well.

16 DPD had a women's walk because it is the month
17 -- it is the Women's History Month. And so, with that
18 being said, we've had various activities where the ladies
19 in DPD and just celebrating women within the profession
20 as well.

21 And something very special that will be
22 occurring is we are approaching prom season. And so,
23 being proactive just to give back to the community and
24 help, we have a prom dress pick-up date, and that's going
25 to be on March the 14th, the 21st, the 28th. It's going

1 to be from 12:00 PM to 3:00 PM. The Detroit Police
2 Department's Ninth Precinct, located on 11187 Gratiot
3 Avenue, is hosting prom dress pick-up days. High school
4 girls in the community are welcome to choose from a
5 variety of sizes and styles. They will be gently used
6 prom dresses, shoes, and accessories. And we want to be
7 a contributing factor to helping our young ladies be
8 properly prepared for prom.

9 That concludes my report, and I'm open to
10 taking questions at this time.

11 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you, Chief. Are
12 there any questions for the Chief? Any comments? All
13 right, hearing none, thank you for your report.

14 CHIEF BETTISON: Thank you.

15 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Chief, will we be
16 getting a report from the Tenth Precinct at all?

17 CHIEF BETTISON: Yes, you will.

18 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay.

19 CHIEF BETTISON: So, at this time, if it's
20 appropriate, --

21 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Yes.

22 CHIEF BETTISON: -- I'll ask the Tenth Precinct
23 commander and the captain to come up and do their Tenth
24 Precinct report for the community.

25 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you.

1 COMMANDER RODRIGUEZ: Thank you, Chief. I
2 appreciate it. Good evening.

3 THE BOARD: Good evening.

4 COMMANDER RODRIGUEZ: My name is Phillip
5 Rodriguez. This is Captain Amber Roberson, and we are
6 the commanding officers of the Tenth Precinct. On behalf
7 of our command staff and members of the Tenth Precinct, I
8 would like to welcome the board of commissioners for the
9 Tenth Precinct, and thank the Helen Moore Community
10 Center. I'd also like to recognize D.C. Pritchett, and
11 the strong show from my community of members of the Tenth
12 Precinct. We've been working really hard to try to get
13 our members established in a relationship where we can
14 have communication openly.

15 At the conclusion of year 2025, the Tenth
16 Precinct achieved a notable major crime reduction,
17 demonstrating the effectiveness of targeted enforcement
18 strategies, strong partnerships with investigative and
19 community stakeholders. I'm happy to report the precinct
20 recorded the following reductions: Violent crime, part
21 1, decreased by 6.6 percent. Property 1, part crime
22 [sic], decreased by 8.9 percent. Overall, part 1 crime
23 decreased by 8.1 percent. Our homicide rate, and I say
24 this as not a victory, and pay homage to the victims and
25 their families for this unfortunate category, the Tenth

1 Precinct received a 20 percent reduction in homicides in
2 2025. That's 16 victims compared to 20 in 2024. Again,
3 pay homage to the families and send condolences. Our
4 non-fatal shootings, the precinct achieved a 27.5 percent
5 reduction with 37 victims compared to 51 in 2024.

6 Precinct Detective Unit also significantly
7 improved our investigative outcomes, achieving a 53
8 percent closure rate for our non-fatal shootings compared
9 to 31 percent the previous year. The Tenth Precinct
10 continues to implement a multi-layered violent crime
11 reduction strategy, which includes proactive enforcement,
12 intelligence-driven investigations, and strong
13 partnerships with local and federal agencies in our
14 community. Key enforcement outcomes include: The Tenth
15 Precinct members confiscated 299 guns, targeted
16 enforcement areas, and we conduct restore order
17 operations on a weekly basis. Our strategic partnerships
18 include: Michigan Department of Corrections and Home
19 Checks, collaboration with our Homicide, Gang
20 Intelligence, our Major Crimes, Major Violators, and Vice
21 Enforcement Units, along with our federal partners of
22 ATF, DEA, and FBI. The precinct continues to participate
23 in GunStat, working collaboratively with federal partners
24 to address gun-related crimes. This effort focuses on
25 our non-fatal shootings, carrying concealed weapons,

1 felons in possession of firearms. These coordinated
2 efforts allow for enhanced intelligence sharing,
3 investigative support, and prosecutorial collaboration.

4 Crime trends. Despite the overall reductions
5 that we had this past year, we experienced several
6 emerging trends. Our first is carjackings. Our
7 carjackings at the end of 2025 showed an 83.3 percent
8 increase from 6 in 2024 to 11 in 2025. Through
9 coordination with our Commercial Auto Theft Unit, the
10 precinct achieved a 65 percent closure rate of those
11 crimes that occurred. The other crimes, when I spoke to
12 CATS, also included some that were reported falsely, and
13 other investigations that were waiting on DNA evidence.

14 Excuse me. Larcenies. In the precinct, we
15 experienced a 4.2 percent increase in larcenies. To
16 address these trends, we implemented targeting strategies
17 that included deployment of additional patrol resources
18 to identify hotspots, business inspections to address
19 quality of life violations, expanded Project Greenlight
20 video review and intelligence analysis, MDOC compliance
21 checks for our known offenders, the individuals that are
22 repeatedly committing these larcenies in our precinct,
23 and directed surveillance operations, trafficking
24 enforcement initiatives in our high crime corridors.
25 Ongoing enforcement efforts will include weekly restore

1 order operations, bi-weekly business compliance
2 inspections, monthly MDOC phone checks, ceasefire
3 disruption activities, non-fatal shooting wraparound
4 investigations, and proactive patrol in our commercial
5 corridors. The precinct continues to partner with our BC
6 entity to address illegal after-hours establishments that
7 contribute to our increase in criminal activity.

8 Our community engagement initiatives through
9 our NPO officers and our NPO program. We sponsor senior
10 appreciation nights. We conducted our trunk retreat and
11 our holiday food distributions. We also have a gun lock
12 safety campaign. Our youth explorers and mentoring
13 programs and our conflict resolution. We utilize our
14 embedded social worker, who assists our citizens with our
15 personal protection orders and works with our officers
16 and chaplains to decrease domestic violence.

17 And with that, the conclusion of my report
18 pending any questions?

19 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you very much.
20 Are there any questions or comments?

21 COMMISSIONER WATTS: Madam Chair, I just have a
22 comment.

23 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Go ahead, Commissioner
24 Watts.

25 COMMISSIONER WATTS: Thank you for your report,

1 especially related to the gun locks. And as we indicated
2 in our meeting last week, because in the last month,
3 unfortunately, we have some children who have lost their
4 lives due to that, guns just being not secure. So,
5 again, I just want to reiterate, anything that I can do,
6 or I'm sure any other commissioner, if we can help you in
7 making sure that the public is aware of the Gun Lock
8 program, please, please let us know.

9 COMMANDER RODRIGUEZ: Yes, ma'am.

10 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Any other questions or
11 comments? I do have a question, just very quickly. You
12 mentioned, if I heard correctly, that there was an
13 increase in carjackings from 8 to 11, or something like
14 that?

15 COMMANDER RODRIGUEZ: Yes, ma'am. It was 6 --

16 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Oh, 6.

17 COMMANDER RODRIGUEZ: -- in 2024 to 11 in 2025.

18 Yes, ma'am.

19 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay. However, you
20 said that the close rate -- right, the close rate was
21 significantly good.

22 COMMANDER RODRIGUEZ: Yes, ma'am. 65 percent
23 of those cases had arrests.

24 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Great. Just wanted to
25 clarify that. So, even though there were a few numbers

1 more, you're finding the people.

2 COMMANDER RODRIGUEZ: Yes, ma'am.

3 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay, great. Thank
4 you. Any other questions or comments? Thank you so much
5 for your report.

6 COMMANDER RODRIGUEZ: Thank you.

7 VICE CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Thank you.

8 Madam Chair, I would like to make a motion to
9 make new business next.

10 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: On the agenda?

11 VICE CHAIRPERSON WOODS: On the agenda, yeah.

12 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay. There's been a
13 motion by Commissioner Woods.

14 COMMISSIONER JONES: Support, Madam Chair.

15 COMMISSIONER MORRIS: What's the motion?

16 VICE CHAIRPERSON WOODS: To make new business
17 next.

18 COMMISSIONER MORRIS: Oh, okay.

19 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: And it's been seconded
20 by Commissioner Jones. Is there any discussion? All in
21 favor indicate by saying aye.

22 THE BOARD: Aye.

23 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Opposed? The motion
24 carries.

25 So, we'll go from this agenda item straight to

1 new business, and that's regarding the appointment of
2 senior investigators. So, go ahead, Commissioner Woods.

3 VICE CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes. I would like to
4 state by direction of the Personnel and Training
5 Committee, I move to appoint Destini Staffney -- if
6 Destini Staffney, you can come forward, and Nicole
7 Meisner, you can come forward as well -- to the position
8 of Senior Investigator with the BOPC Office of the Chief
9 Investigator. And to designate Investigator Mary Simmons
10 as the alternate for a prospective future Senior
11 Investigator position.

12 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Great. Thank you.

13 Would you and OCI Chief Warfield go up? They
14 have badges they want to present as well.

15 VICE CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Okay. After the vote.
16 After we get the vote.

17 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Oh. That was a
18 motion, that's right. Is there a second?

19 VICE CHAIRPERSON WOODS: We don't need a
20 second.

21 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: Second -- oh.

22 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay. You don't need
23 a second for this because it was recommended by the
24 Personnel Committee. Any discussion? All in favor
25 indicate by saying aye.

1 THE BOARD: Aye.

2 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Opposed? The motion
3 carries.

4 Congratulations and welcome. And we would
5 probably ask you to come up front here. So, could we get
6 some pictures taken? And with the Chief as well. You're
7 welcome to go up. Any other commissioners that would
8 like to go up are welcome. The Personnel Committee,
9 everybody. Whoever wants to go, please.

10 (At 6:55 PM, off the record for photos to be

13 SR. INVESTIGATOR MEISNER: I just wanted to say
14 hello. I'm Investigator Meisner, and -- well, Senior
15 Investigator Meisner. And I'm so excited. Thank you so
16 much. I'm so appreciative of the board and Chief and
17 Lydia and everybody. And I just wanted to say thank you,
18 and I'm very excited to continue to grow my career.
19 Thank you.

20 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you.

21 SR. INVESTIGATOR STAFFNEY: Again, I would like
22 to reiterate exactly what she said. Being promoted to
23 Senior Investigator -- from an Investigator role to a
24 Senior, I look forward to helping the community, citizens
25 and continue to grow as an employee in the city of

1 Detroit. Happy to be here. Thank you.

2 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you. Thank you
3 both, and welcome aboard. We're excited that you're
4 joining us. Thank you.

5 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: Madam Chair?

6 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Yes, Commissioner.

7 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: Can I have a moment for
8 a comment please? I just wanted to say that I had the
9 joy of seeing Investigator Meisner and Investigator
10 Staffney come into OCI and have seen their growth over
11 the years. I've had the opportunity to also work
12 directly with Investigator Staffney on some very critical
13 cases. And I just wanted to commend both of them for
14 their work, for their diligence. These investigations
15 that are done on behalf of the residents of Detroit are
16 critical, and OCI serves a very important role to our
17 residents of Detroit. And so, I am fully confident in
18 their capability to continue to advocate for justice for
19 our residents. And again, just congratulate them, and
20 thank you so much for your work.

21 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you so much for
22 that. Any other comments or questions?

23 COMMISSIONER MORRIS: Yes, Chair.

24 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Commissioner Morris.

25 COMMISSIONER MORRIS: Yeah. I just want to

1 say, you know, both investigators, we are proud of you,
2 what you do for the Office of Chief Investigator. You
3 have beautiful spirits, you love what you do, you love
4 the citizens, you love to serve, and you don't serve like
5 it's a job, you serve like it's a calling, and to find
6 people like you is very rare. So, we are thankful and
7 privileged to have you, and we're looking forward to the
8 future. Thank you.

9 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Thank you,
10 Commissioner. Any other comments or questions?

11 VICE CHAIRPERSON WOODS: I will just share the
12 sentiments. Most definitely, all the candidates that
13 interviewed were fantabulous. Fantabulous. Not
14 fabulous, but fantabulous. The Reverend tried to stop
15 me. But they have taken on special cases as Commissioner
16 Camille has said, and they have worked tirelessly and
17 have brought a lot of encouragement to other
18 investigators. And so, when you see us walk up with
19 these folders right here, this is the work of our
20 investigators. And you see all these -- this table is
21 filled with folders. And so, this is the major work of
22 the Board of Police Commissioners in terms of answering
23 citizen complaints. And they investigate and they have
24 done a great, great job. And so, I'll end it like that.

25 And I have some more new business I would like

1 to, you know, outside of that to say that tomorrow we'll
2 have a special meeting. We'll be taking up a special
3 item in terms of whether or not we suspend a certain
4 officer without pay. I'm sure you have seen that in the
5 media. We couldn't do it today because of contractual
6 issues, but we didn't want to prolong it another week.
7 And so, the Chair ensured that we had a quorum for
8 tomorrow to take up that item on tomorrow. So, rest
9 assured, we can't talk about it, anything of that nature,
10 but rest assured that we will take that item up tomorrow
11 morning. And it's posted on the website. I think the
12 meeting is at 10:00 AM at Public Safety Headquarters if
13 anyone want to know. And so, we just want to make sure
14 that you are informed on that.

15 And a special shoutout to Keith Williams back
16 there, a good, good friend and brother. And I see
17 Coleman Young -- I mean, not Coleman Young, John Conyers
18 III, my good friend. God bless you all.

19 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you for joining
20 us. Any other comments or questions? Commissioner
21 Boman.

22 COMMISSIONER BOMAN: Yeah, hi. First of all, I
23 was proud to be able to make the interviewing of our
24 senior investigator candidates my first real significant
25 action on a committee of this board. And I want to be

1 clear that what I'm about to say is not anything toward -
2 - I don't wish to put anything negative on either of
3 these wonderful investigators or anyone -- any of the
4 investigators, but I would have issues with the process.
5 And I'm hoping, that next time we do interviews of this
6 type, that I have more information ahead of the
7 interview, that we -- that all participants of the
8 committee have more information ahead of the interviews,
9 just to be more thorough in the process. That's one
10 observation I'm going to take away from having had this
11 experience. But I am very proud of the investigators
12 that we have at OCI and of the senior investigators that
13 we promoted today. So, I just want to be clear on that,
14 but I do think the process can be improved.

15 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you. It's
16 noted. Thank you. Any other comments or questions? Go
17 ahead.

18 VICE CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Through the Chair. I
19 would have to push back on that. Through the Chair, that
20 the information was sent out in a timely manner. And it
21 was only, you know, six candidates to review their
22 resumes and all of the supporting documents. And so,
23 that stuff was sent out to the committee members. And
24 maybe you missed it in your emails or whatever, but it's
25 very important to read emails when they're sent to you

1 because that information was sent out in a very timely
2 manner. And so, I would like to thank the secretary as
3 well as the chief investigator and HR for getting that
4 information out to us in a timely manner.

5 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Any other comments or
6 questions? Hearing none, then we'll move on to the next
7 item, and that is oral communications and public comment.
8 Please remember that our comments are limited to two
9 minutes, and inappropriate language and comments will not
10 be tolerated and they may delay TV broadcasts and video
11 posts. So, do we have our first speaker, please?

12 MS. UNDERWOOD: Yes, our first speaker will be
13 Former Commissioner William Davis, then Ms. Bernice
14 Smith, then Minister Eric Blount.

15 FORMER COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Good afternoon.
16 Where's the clock at?

17 THE BOARD: Good afternoon.

18 FORMER COMMISSIONER DAVIS: I'm glad to see all
19 of y'all over here at the Dexter-Elmhurst Center. It
20 used to be part of District 7 when I was the police
21 commissioner because District 7 got squeezed because we
22 had more people than District 5 and other districts.
23 But, I'm pleased to see y'all. I hope that y'all are all
24 reading your cases because, when I was a police
25 commissioner, I used to read cases regularly. In fact, I

1 read so many and had so many questions that the
2 chairpersons I had stopped giving 'em to me because I had
3 too many questions. Hopefully y'all are questioning what
4 y'all read and y'all know what y'all doing. Other than
5 that, y'all have a nice day.

6 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Our next speaker,
7 please.

8 MS. SMITH: I have so much to say, and I don't
9 have the time to say it in. My Chief, I am so glad that
10 you're back with us again, and I was glad that our mayor
11 made a decision not to touch you, all right? That's what
12 I'm glad about. And, to my baby, your assistant, that
13 you don't go nowhere without her, I'm glad to see that
14 you're here with us because I still love you still, all
15 right?

16 Now, also, another news bulletin. This young
17 man that you all know as John Conyers, Jr.

18 MR. CONYERS: The third.

19 MS. SMITH: The third? All right. That shows
20 you how I forgot. Would you believe that I babysat him?
21 And the fact that his parents -- they were very good
22 parents. They loved me dearly. They knew I was going to
23 take care of this young man. But, I'm speaking in -- I'm
24 taking to meetings, that's what I'm speaking about. Not
25 at home. Not at home. So, it's been a pleasure to come

1 here to see Helen's Center. Helen and I marched a many
2 of time. I'm not going to tell you how long, but we've
3 been here a long time. I'm older than she is. I happen
4 to be 93. But the fact is, God is good. Good to me.

5 And, I would like to tell my dear chief, who I
6 love truly, he does everything for me, so don't you guys
7 get mad, all right? For instance, now, don't -- get your
8 mind out the gutter now. For instance, I was invited to
9 his party, the Valentine's party. And, I was invited
10 also by the mayor then and him to the Christmas party.
11 So, I thank you, I thank you, I thank you for loving me,
12 all right?

13 Now, what else do I gotta tell you? Well, most
14 of you know that I've been with the police commission for
15 years, so -- and I love them all. Everyone that they
16 appoint, I do approve of. There was only one, but he's
17 no longer here, which I'm glad of that. But the fact is,
18 we have a wonderful commission. And I'm very proud of
19 all of you. So, keep up the good work, and do a good
20 job. Believe me, we will be watching you. And, if you
21 do anything wrong, you know I'm going to have to take you
22 in the corner and talk to you, and tell you, do better.

23 Again, I love all of you, and I want all of you
24 to be brave, and I want you to take care of our police
25 department --

1 MS. UNDERWOOD: Thank you. Thank you.

2 MS. SMITH: -- because I truly love you. Is my
3 time up?

4 MS. UNDERWOOD: That is your time.

5 MS. SMITH: Oh, Lord. Thank you, Chief. Love
6 you, baby.

7 CHIEF BETTISON: Thank you, Mother Bernice.

8 MINISTER BLOUNT: Good evening, board, and
9 everyone here. I'm Eric Blount, Minister Eric Blount
10 from Sacred Heart Catholic Church, right here in Detroit.
11 This is the neighborhood I grew up in. I went to
12 Winterhalter. I played baseball behind the playground of
13 the Tenth Precinct. So, this is special to me, so that's
14 why it's important.

15 I don't want anyone to be deceived, or fooled,
16 that all of these speeches and reports about crime is
17 really a deflection. This board is to address police
18 officer misconduct. That's it. Not a crime summit.

19 To the new senior investigators and their
20 family, it's a heavy lift. Because these investigators
21 are really the truth-tellers about what happens to our
22 community. If they don't tell what really happened, it's
23 almost impossible for these commissioners to do their job
24 effectively. So, we -- we pray, and we ask for everyone
25 to support these investigators and their families who

1 will pay a heavy price for being truth-tellers.

2 The -- to the Tenth Precinct, again, this is
3 about police officer misconduct, this meeting, this
4 board. So, we really need to know what methods and
5 systems do you have in place to detect and deter police
6 officer misconduct? And for those who have been
7 misbehaving or committing crimes, how many police
8 officers in the Tenth Precinct are on suspension? And if
9 they are, have they served their full time of suspension?
10 We know the union has a backdoor way of eliminating any
11 suspension that these commissioners give.

12 For overall, the People's Body-Worn Camera
13 Ordinance, the ordinance that the City Council has
14 approved is so diluted it's almost meaningless. We want
15 body-worn camera footage to be released within 7 days, so
16 we know the truth and we know it right away. Thank you.

17 MS. UNDERWOOD: Our next three speakers will be
18 Marcel Ulacia, Mr. Ronald Foster, and Ms. Audrey Foster.

19 MR. ULACIA: Hello, my name is Marcel, and I'm
20 a member of the Detroit Alliance Against Racist and
21 Political Oppression. We have seen multiple instances of
22 police conduct and clear disregard for the community's
23 safety by the Detroit Police Department too many times.
24 Whether it's the multiple instances where a Detroit
25 police officer aided in a deportation of a citizen

1 calling them a potential Pablo Escobar Jr. and in saying
2 they better start speaking English or they're going to
3 jail, or in the recent disgusting act by a DPD officer
4 confiscating a woman's phone and sending her nudes to his
5 -- his own phone and the police -- yeah, and sending it
6 to his own phone. So, that's why I'm here today to
7 formally demand the BOPC endorse the People's Bodycam
8 Ordinance as drafted by CPTA.

9 This board's function is to hold DPD
10 accountable when one of their officers inevitably
11 brutalize the members of our community and to then enact
12 punishment in a way that deters further injustices by the
13 police force as a whole. One of the other functions of
14 the board is to increase transparency between the
15 community and the police. Both of these functions are
16 present in our Bodycam Ordinance. It lowers the release
17 of bodycam footage to seven days, bans editing and muting
18 of bodycam footage, and forces DPD to upload all bodycam
19 footage to a publicly accessible website.

20 This is not asking for more. This is asking
21 for the bare minimum from our police force, who time and
22 time again abuse their power. If this slate of
23 commissioners really wants to be different and make a
24 real -- and make real concrete changes as opposed to the
25 commissioners historically, you can show that you're on

1 our side and not DPD's.

2 Enough with the bad apple rhetoric from
3 Bettison. How many officers are going to get that
4 excuse, and how many more members of our community do we
5 need to see killed or brutalized to acknowledge the lack
6 of discipline within your force? Thank you.

7 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you.

8 MR. FOSTER: Good evening. Through the Chair.

9 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Good evening.

10 MR. FOSTER: A few things. I did want to step
11 out today very briefly and to speak about the procedural
12 justice summit that I attended on Saturday. I think it
13 was very, very good for the community. Have to find ways
14 to get more community out to be engaged in these events,
15 to have dialogue, to be able to sit down and talk about
16 some of the conflicts between the community and police.
17 With that said, I think it's important that our police
18 understand that even our rookies make more than 34
19 percent of this city's family make combined together.
20 So, you make twice as much as what average family, 34
21 percent of this family make combine. That's important to
22 understand that when you're out on the streets, your
23 perspectives are going to be different than the people in
24 whom you are policing.

25 Thirdly, in preparation for the summer/spring,

1 I think now is the time that we start to get things in
2 order for our youth. Last year we had one of the highest
3 youth violence events in our city, gang activity, a lot
4 of other things. We cannot wait until that moment
5 approaches us to start trying to get plans to round
6 people up and do different things. You have to put your
7 brains together right now and come up with concrete plans
8 to prevent, deter, and stop those things from happening.

9 Then lastly, when we look at gun locks, it
10 sounds good on paper, but the fact that gun locks are
11 needed means that people still feel the need to have
12 guns. If they have that need to have guns, then they
13 more than likely feel the need to use them or have them
14 expeditiously. So, gun locks, from their perspective,
15 may be one of the issues that communities face if they
16 feel maybe an intruder is coming in. We had an incident
17 last year where a parent woke up with their child with a
18 knife to their neck. Will a gun lock be a deterrent
19 there? So, we have to find ways to mitigate it on both
20 sides of the spectrum. Thank you.

21 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you. Next
22 speaker?

23 MR. FOSTER: My daughter Audrey said she'll
24 pass, so thank you very much.

25 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you.

1 COMMISSIONER IVEY: Through the Chair? Through
2 the chair?

3 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Commissioner Ivey.

4 COMMISSIONER IVEY: Yes, Madam Chair.

5 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: One second.

6 COMMISSIONER IVEY: Yes. I wanted to
7 acknowledge we did have a speaker in the audience, but
8 she had a hard leave today. Her name is Raquelle Harris,
9 and she just wanted to talk a little bit about an article
10 she wrote on ICE in Detroit. But I wanted to just make
11 mention that she was here and that she did pass out some
12 literature. So, I hope everybody was able to get it and
13 look at it. And also, check out the article at BET.com.
14 She was going to speak a little bit about that tonight,
15 but she had to leave.

16 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you,
17 Commissioner. Any other --

18 MS. UNDERWOOD: Yes, Madam Chair. Our next
19 three speakers will be Ms. Howell, Devin Dobias, and Ms.
20 Williams. Please state your name for the record.

21 MS. HOWELL: Hello. I'm Shea Howell, and I'm a
22 resident of District 2. And I want to first thank all of
23 you for being in this space. I've known Helen Moore for
24 fifty-some years, and I do not know another human being
25 in this city who has done more for our children than

1 Helen Moore. So, thank you, and thank you for the work
2 to create this wonderful space together.

3 And when I think of Helen Moore, I think about
4 commitment and courage. And I'm here tonight to ask you
5 for more commitment and courage, particularly in giving
6 your expertise and advice to the Detroit City Council,
7 which appears to lack both. And we are especially
8 concerned about the Bodycam Ordinance that the City
9 Council passed. You may remember that ordinance was
10 originally created to make bodycam imagery easily
11 accessible to citizens. It was motivated by the fact
12 that the police altered and edited bodycam imagery in
13 ways that distorted what actually happened in events.
14 That's what gave birth to our coalition in the Hakim
15 Littleton case.

16 The second thing we've discovered is that the
17 police will not release bodycam information, often
18 without FOIAs, and then they want to charge thousands of
19 dollars to people to get information that, if we lived in
20 Chicago, would be instantly available on a website,
21 unedited, as it transpired. We can help you do your job
22 holding police accountable, but we need tools to do that.
23 And bodycam information, which is unedited, accessible,
24 and available, would help all of us, including the
25 police, be more accountable.

1 So please use your voice, create some channels
2 between you and the City Council so that the City Council
3 understands you have expertise and connections that will
4 make us a stronger city together. Thank you.

5 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you.

6 MR. DOBIAS: Hi there. My name is Devin. I'm
7 with the Detroit Alliance Against Racist and Political
8 Oppression. I'm also here tonight to ask the BOPC to do
9 what they can in order to get the bodycam ordinance
10 passed as drafted by the CPTA. So, I just wanted to lend
11 another voice to that, and hopefully we can get it done.
12 Thank you.

13 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you.

14 MS. WILLIAMS: Hello, people. It's very
15 unfortunate the Chief left. I wanted to ask him a few
16 questions.

17 Okay, so last week, a non-U.S. citizen was able
18 -- this is what I was talking about, illegal voting. So
19 how does this person, went through the academy,
20 graduated, walked across the stage with a different
21 identity. He was at the headquarters just last week,
22 1301, in a gray suit. And I'm talking about illegal
23 voting. It's very unfortunate because we had to fight
24 extremely hard just to vote. My father settled in North
25 Carolina. It's unfortunate that people are taking

1 advantage and disgracing what that really means. How
2 hard it is. How hard it was for us to vote. Period.
3 This is not acceptable.

4 So, you all sit up here on this committee every
5 week with the same old garbage. Last week, did not
6 Conrad say we are entitled to say what we choose to.
7 It's in the charter. We have a constitutional right.
8 It's not for you to decide what's not appropriate and
9 what is appropriate, especially when you are not doing
10 your job correctly by the Constitution nor of the law.
11 Period.

12 I've been complaining about a whole lot of
13 stuff, but I'm not going to even speak about it because
14 you already know. I'm just going to say true deal. Have
15 a good day.

16 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you. Next
17 speaker?

18 MS. UNDERWOOD: Our next two speakers in the
19 audience will be Charles Cousin and Teron Haynes.

20 MR. COUSIN: Good evening. Can you guys hear
21 me?

22 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Good evening.

23 MR. COUSIN: So, at the last meeting, I let it
24 be known that my call dropped from 9-1-1, in which the
25 commissioner directed a question to the deputy chief

1 seeing if it was mandatory to, I guess, call back. I was
2 in the elevator yesterday at headquarters and I just
3 happened to be on the elevator with a 9-1-1 operator, and
4 I told her my story about how my call dropped and no one
5 called me back. And she told me that it's not required
6 for her to call back. But I did some research and I
7 found out that it is a part of the policy and that
8 there's a missing link between the board and the 9-1-1
9 operators. And it's really important because that
10 dropped call can be the difference between saving a life
11 or someone dying. So, if you guys can, like, holler at
12 them today, that would be, like, awesome. That's --
13 that's it. Thank you.

14 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you.

15 COMMISSIONER WATTS: Through the --

16 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Commissioner Watts.

17 COMMISSIONER WATTS: Yes, Madam Chair.

18 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: One second.

19 COMMISSIONER WATTS: Yes. I recall this did
20 come up last week, and I believe D.C. Parish responded.

21 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Speak into the
22 microphone.

23 COMMISSIONER WATTS: Can we -- can you hear me?

24 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Yes.

25 COMMISSIONER WATTS: Oh, he's behind us. Can

1 we get clarity on that? Because we did hear different
2 opinions on what's supposed to happen. And in our view,
3 especially if someone's calling 9-1-1 because usually if
4 they're calling 9-1-1 it's an emergency and sometimes
5 things can be disconnected because they may be in
6 distress. So, can you get clarity on that? That -- will
7 the operator call back? What is the policy and the
8 procedure when that happens?

9 D.C. PARISH: Absolutely. So, the current
10 practice is that if there is any evidence that the
11 individual that was on the call was in a state of
12 distress, such as if it's a domestic violence situation
13 or something like that, they will do a call back. If
14 they cannot reach the individual, they will go so far as
15 to send a vehicle out there. So, it is case by case.
16 Their focus on -- they focus resources, call back and
17 response resources, on the seriousness of the situation.

18 I did bring your concern, Mr. Cousin, to the
19 deputy chief over communications. He is reviewing the
20 current policy with the commander, and there may be
21 updates based on this concern. I hope that helps, Mr.
22 Cousin.

23 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Speak -- speak into
24 the microphone so we can hear.

25 MR. COUSIN: Like I was saying, I spoke to an

1 operator yesterday. So, you know, like last week, I'm
2 trying to come to some kind of resolution. And there's
3 no clear communication to them that both of you guys...

4 D.C. PARISH: I'll reiterate Mr. Cousin's
5 concerns to the deputy chief and hopefully address them.

6 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Commissioner Morris.

7 COMMISSIONER MORRIS: Sir, you said while you
8 were at the headquarters you called a 9-1-1 operator?

9 MR. COUSIN: No, no. I just happened to be in
10 the elevator with a 9-1-1 operator.

11 COMMISSIONER MORRIS: Okay.

12 MR. COUSIN: But two weeks ago I had to call 9-
13 1-1 for a situation.

14 COMMISSIONER MORRIS: Was it an emergency or
15 was it a non-emergency issue?

16 MR. COUSIN: It was sort of an emergency.

17 COMMISSIONER MORRIS: Okay. And you were able
18 to get help?

19 MR. COUSIN: Yeah.

20 COMMISSIONER MORRIS: Okay.

21 MR. COUSIN: We had to call, like, several
22 times.

23 COMMISSIONER MORRIS: Okay.

24 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you. Any other
25 questions?

1 All right. The next speaker, please?

2 MS. UNDERWOOD: Thank you, Madam Chair. We're
3 going to Zoom. Oh, I'm sorry, sir.

4 MR. HAYNES: Thank you for the opportunity to
5 speak, Madam Chair. May I be heard?

6 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Yes, sir.

7 MR. HAYNES: My name is Teron Haynes, and I'm a
8 resident of District 5. Shout out to my D-5'ers and
9 Commissioner Watts. I'm a former DPD civilian employee
10 through its Crime Scene Services Unit or Forensics Unit.
11 For those unfamiliar, the Crime Scene Services Unit are
12 the individuals responsible for processing, documenting,
13 and evidence collection from incidents ranging from home
14 invasion to fatal shootings. I'm very appreciative of
15 the time I spent there. I was a forensic scientist by
16 occupation and education, having earned my bachelor's
17 degree in forensic science and justice studies. I state
18 this because the love I had for the discipline became
19 tainted by the department's lack of care for the unit.

20 For comparison, the Realtime Crime Center is
21 paraded as the technological marvel for DPD. The Crime
22 Scene Services Unit works out of a vehicle tow lot in an
23 office whose heat was repaired after two years of being
24 defective. Forensic technicians process biological
25 evidence out of their personal desks and vehicles instead

1 of sterile working spaces as best practice mandates,
2 simply because the Department does not provide proper
3 resources. Vehicles that have been processed in
4 conjunction with crime scenes have had litters of animals
5 being born in them because of how unsecured and unkept
6 the vehicle storage garage is. Needless to say, this
7 oversight has contaminated major pieces of evidence,
8 potentially corrupting cases, leaving Detroiters without
9 justice, not to mention those vehicles are given back to
10 their owners.

11 I speak not as an alarmist but as someone who
12 believes that victims and Detroit citizens deserve the
13 best chance at justice. DPD has the second-largest
14 budget in the city. Their mismanagement with this unit
15 not only looks negatively on the department, but poses a
16 significant public safety risk for the citizens of
17 Detroit. I use this time to request that the Board and
18 the People's Chief, who left, look into this matter.
19 Imagine how much better the city would be if they
20 invested in their Forensic Department properly. Thank
21 you for your time.

22 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you.

23 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: Madam Chair?

24 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: I -- I -- Commissioner
25 Boman and then Commissioner Camille.

1 COMMISSIONER BOMAN: Yeah, I'm not sure if the
2 representative of Mr. Bettison -- or Chief Bettison,
3 Deputy Chief --

4 D.C. PRITCHETT: Pritchett.

5 COMMISSIONER BOMAN: Pardon me?

6 D.C. PRITCHETT: Pritchett.

7 COMMISSIONER BOMAN: Pritchett, okay. Is it
8 possible for us to get a tour of the crime scene services
9 facility, and -- so we can kind of see some of this
10 firsthand?

11 D.C. PRITCHETT: I don't see -- through the
12 Chair, I'm sorry, I don't see an issue with you guys not
13 being able to tour the crime scene services section. I
14 will let Chief Bettison know tomorrow, and he can get
15 reach -- get back with you guys and set up an appointment
16 date and time for the commissioners to go see it for
17 themselves.

18 COMMISSIONER BOMAN: Okay. Thank you very
19 much. Yeah, because this is disturbing to hear that this
20 really needs to be a pristine facility because we're
21 talking about evidence that needs to be testable and
22 usable in the courtroom. And that's rather disturbing to
23 learn. Thank you.

24 MR. HAYNES: I don't mean to speak more time
25 than I already have lost, but I actually have pictures

1 from my co-workers -- my former co-workers of biohazard
2 bags with items in them stored on the ground, which is
3 obviously not something -- somewhere they should be.
4 There's a drying cabinet that can only be used for
5 typically one item per the guidance from the manual, but
6 the cross-contamination that occurs within that drying
7 chamber also poses a risk with a lot of the cases that we
8 see. And I just think it's blatantly unfair that the
9 department has a real-time crime center in their DPD
10 Green Light program, which is effective and necessary,
11 but this department, who sees so much of the worst of
12 Detroit in a lot of instances, has to go with such a lack
13 of resources. We almost ran out of latex gloves last
14 year, so that just goes to show you. And a lot of this
15 can be corroborated by many people.

16 COMMISSIONER BOMAN: Can you forward that by
17 email to scott.boman@michigan- -- detroitmi.gov, I mean.

18 MR. HAYNES: I can forward it to all of you.

19 COMMISSIONER BOMAN: Thank you. The whole
20 board, yeah, absolutely.

21 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Commissioner Camille.

22 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: Thank you, Madam Chair.
23 And this is more for Commissioner Watts in regards to our
24 Policy Committee, which I do sit on. So, I'm concerned
25 about what's been shared about the 9-1-1 call center as

1 well as this crime scene services -- is that -- is that
2 the name of it?

3 MR. HAYNES: Yes.

4 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: -- unit. And I just
5 want to make sure that we have within our scope as a
6 committee to be looking at the policies for those units
7 as well as their desk-level procedures. Because
8 sometimes the policies don't get into the detail that we
9 need to know, and so I would ask that as a committee we
10 take some time to look at the policy and desk levels for
11 both of those units and talk about how some audits can be
12 done to make sure that those policies and desk levels are
13 being followed and any changes that we want to recommend.

14 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELESCHE: Thank you,
15 Commissioner.

16 COMMISSIONER WATTS: Yes.

17 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELESCHE: Commissioner Watts.

18 COMMISSIONER WATTS: Yes. Thank you,
19 Commissioner Camille. As you know, as Chair of the
20 Policy Committee, and you are a member, we will be
21 looking at all policies. These two definitely include a
22 lot of policies, but that's the charge of the committee,
23 so no need to worry about that endeavor. Also, thank you
24 so much for bringing this -- this to our, you know --
25 you're very dynamic. You know, I know you. So, thank

1 you so much for that concern.

2 Madam Chair, I was wondering if any of the
3 information, so all of the commission can get it, could
4 be put through Chief Warfield. And we could get the
5 information so -- or through Lydia, Board Secretary.

6 SECRETARY GARNIER: You can -- I will give you
7 BOPC inbox information. In fact, if you'll go to the
8 table and give them your email address, so we'll make
9 sure it's prioritized to receive it, and they'll give you
10 the email address.

11 MR. HAYNES: Yes, ma'am.

12 COMMISSIONER WATTS: Through the Chair. Please
13 make sure we get everything that he has to give.

14 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay. Any other
15 questions or comments? Sir, when you're done, if you
16 could speak with the secretary or the staff, Teresa
17 Blossom.

18 MR. HAYNES: Yes, ma'am.

19 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Any other -- oh, I'm
20 sorry. Thank you.

21 Any other questions? Comments? Hearing none,
22 the next speaker, please?

23 MS. UNDERWOOD: Thank you, Madam Chair. We'll
24 go into Zoom. Our first caller is a caller with the last
25 three digits 4-8-2. And then Jawana, and then that'll be

1 the end of public comment.

2 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Speaker, are you
3 there?

4 SPEAKER 4-8-2 (ZOOM): Okay, this is up right
5 now in the city of Detroit, this is what's going on.
6 Janice Winfrey was busted cheating in elections. She's
7 been cheating in elections for years, okay. The Detroit
8 Police Department Homicide Unit is covering up murders.
9 Three of them. Kaniesha Coleman, DPD case 20-11112,
10 (indiscernible), Isaiah White. I ain't got tickets,
11 y'all. I'm Mr. Rue. You need to ask for some help with
12 (indiscernible). Kaniesha Coleman, and DPD case number I
13 gave you. Now, Janice Winfrey, Daniel Baxter, Gina
14 Avery-Walker been cheating. That's the Director of the
15 Detroit Department of Elections. I gave the information
16 to number 47, President of the United States of America.

17 I ain't no joke. Don't play with nobody. I'm
18 Young Blood, for real. Back it down, come on. I'm about
19 what I'm about. (indiscernible) wants what the F she
20 wants. Y'all don't want to give it to her. Y'all wanted
21 to play games. Now, y'all left me no choice. I'm about
22 to make a change. And then (indiscernible). Then
23 (indiscernible) going to roll out with everything she
24 asked for, requested, and deserved. My word. Everybody
25 in Detroit City right there online, come on, come

1 forward. I ain't runnin'. Not afraid of sugar, honey,
2 iced tea, either. I'm one of the cousins. Y'all hear
3 that clearly? One of the cousins from Young Bloods, from
4 the (indiscernible) projects --

5 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Next speaker?

6 MS. OLIVER (ZOOM): (indiscernible). Sorry.
7 My name is Jawana, Littlefield-Eaton Block Club
8 President, 2nd Precinct, 7th District. Hello, good
9 evening to everyone. Commissioner Camille, thank you for
10 everything that you do. I just wanted to say -- I'm so
11 sorry, I'm laughing at this man. I just wanted to say I
12 agree with finding summer programs for kids. That's why
13 I want to thank Commissioner Morris for opening the doors
14 of his company to help kids to use their hands in a
15 constructive way, as well as making money. That's a good
16 thing. I'm gonna try to inbox you, and try to get
17 information to make flyers and hand them out when I do do
18 my newsletter. So, I just wanted to say thank you,
19 Commissioner Morris, for doing that. And that's
20 something that the kids can do in the summer as well.
21 Starting off right now. So, that's a good thing, and I
22 just wanted to say thank you. Thank you all for
23 everything that you are doing, and have a great evening.

24 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you.

25 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: Madam Chair.

1 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Yes, Commissioner.

2 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: May I have a moment just
3 to address some of --

4 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Of course.

5 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: -- what I heard in
6 public comment today. So, thank you, Ms. Jawana, for
7 always coming on and acknowledging us and for our work.
8 And thank you for your work as a block club leader
9 because that is no small feat, and I look forward to
10 continuing to work with you.

11 So, we've heard several members of the public
12 bring forward concerns around the ordinance language that
13 currently exists around the release of police video
14 footage. And these community members have done, Madam
15 Chair, just an enormous amount of work over several years
16 drafting and researching thoughtful ordinance language to
17 increase transparency when DPD harms a member of the
18 community. And although City Council did pass some
19 language last year governing the release of the police
20 video footage, even City Council acknowledged that the
21 ordinance could be further edited. And as an oversight
22 board of DPD, as well as Advocates for Civilian
23 Oversight, we really should be supportive of the language
24 that's being put forth by these groups and submit a
25 letter to City Council letting them know that they should

1 reopen that language, and we should be supporting the
2 language that's being put forth.

3 So, I move that the board submit a memo to City
4 Council requesting they revisit the ordinance related to
5 the release of police video footage to increase
6 transparency in the ways that CPTA and DAARPR have
7 proposed in their draft ordinance, which was shared with
8 all of us in advance.

9 COMMISSIONER BOMAN: I second.

10 COMMISSIONER MORRIS: I'll support.

11 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Motion has been made
12 by Commissioner Camille, seconded by Commissioner Boman.
13 Is there a discussion? Commissioner Wood- --
14 Commissioner Jones?

15 COMMISSIONER JONES: Can I hear the motion
16 again, please?

17 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: Madam Chair?

18 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Yes.

19 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: Want me to repeat the
20 motion?

21 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Yes.

22 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: I move that the board
23 submit a memo to City Council requesting they revisit the
24 ordinance related to the release of police video footage
25 to increase transparency in the ways that CPTA and DAARPR

1 have proposed in their draft ordinance.

2 COMMISSIONER JONES: Have they -- through the
3 Chair?

4 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Yes.

5 COMMISSIONER JONES: Has the City Council
6 already acted on that?

7 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: May I -- may I respond?

8 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Yes, go ahead.

9 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: No, City Council has not
10 acted on the language that these groups have put forth.

11 COMMISSIONER JONES: Okay. Thank you. Thank
12 you, Madam Chair. Thank you, Commissioner.

13 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Any other discussion?
14 All in favor indicate by say- -- Madam Secretary?

15 SECRETARY GARNIER: I'm -- I'm not certain what
16 the language is so that we have it documented for the
17 record. What language is being proposed as if a sta- --
18 if the motion passes?

19 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: As -- so the -- Madam
20 Chair?

21 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Yes.

22 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: So, the commissioners
23 received the draft ordinance, at least I received it in
24 my inbox, from the organizations in advance. So, I'm
25 proposing that that language is what we support to City

1 Council.

2 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Commissioner Camille?

3 SECRETARY GARNIER: I just want to know so I
4 can check.

5 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: I'm not sure.

6 SECRETARY GARNIER: Okay. I just wanted to
7 let, through the Chair, that I'm not aware of the
8 proposed language.

9 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: Madam Chair, I'm happy
10 to forward it to the staff.

11 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay. Commiss- --
12 yeah.

13 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Through the Chair?

14 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Commissioner --

15 COMMISSIONER CARTER: I have not received
16 whatever Commissioner Camille is talking about. So, I'd
17 like to see whatever it is with the language that she's
18 talking about before I vote on a motion.

19 COMMISSIONER MORRIS: Through the Chair, she
20 just said the language. It's not going to be no
21 different on paper than it is in what came out of her
22 mouth. She just said the language.

23 COMMISSIONER CARTER: No, I'm talking about the
24 memo that she got from somebody in an email that she
25 assumes that everybody else got. I didn't get it.

1 COMMISSIONER MORRIS: What memo?

2 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: The actual ordinance
3 language.

4 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay. Commissioner
5 Watts, did you have a question?

6 COMMISSIONER WATTS: No, I was going to just
7 say when she referenced the memo, I would like to see the
8 memo. I haven't got it either.

9 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: Through the Chair?

10 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Commissioner.

11 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: So, it was -- what I
12 received was the draft ordinance and a request from CPTA
13 and DAARPR. Is it possible to invite one of the members
14 up to share who they sent it to so that we can -- I would
15 hate to have people not receiving emails that are being
16 sent in from the community.

17 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Just so you know, I
18 thought you were talking about an ordinance -- a draft
19 ordinance that the City Council sent you. That's what I
20 thought you were talking about.

21 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: No, ma'am.

22 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: So, I'm confused as
23 well. Commissioner Jones?

24 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: They sent it to us.
25 They emailed it to us.

1 COMMISSIONER JONES: I just want to --

2 COMMISSIONER MORRIS: Well, where's the
3 representative?

4 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: Madam Chair, is it
5 possible --

6 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Yes.

7 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: -- for a representative
8 from the groups to come up and indicate who they sent --

9 COMMISSIONER MORRIS: You emailed it to us,
10 right?

11 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: -- the emails to?

12 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Yes.

13 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: I don't understand why.

14 MR. ULACIA: So, our organization has sent it
15 to the whole board.

16 COMMISSIONER MORRIS: I've got the email. I
17 got it.

18 MR. ULACIA: Yeah, exactly. So, it's in your
19 emails 100 percent. We already -- it's in your inboxes.
20 All you guys have to do is read it.

21 COMMISSIONER MORRIS: Okay, so Boman got it. I
22 got it. You got it.

23 COMMISSIONER CARTER: I didn't get it.

24 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay. Commissioner,
25 you're -- Camille, you're asking to draft a memo to the

1 -- to the City Council?

2 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: Yes, Madam Chair. I'm
3 recommending that we draft an ordinan- -- I'm sorry,
4 draft a memo to City Council saying that as a board, we
5 support the proposal from CPTA and DAARPR for amending
6 the ordinance.

7 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHÉ: Okay. And since there
8 are commissioners who say they have not read that, I
9 don't know how they can vote on it.

10 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Madam Chair, I'd move
11 that we postpone this until next week.

12 COMMISSIONER JONES: Support.

13 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHÉ: Okay.

14 COMMISSIONER WATTS: Madam Chair?

15 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHÉ: Yes. Wait. Let me
16 just -- a motion has been made to postpone this motion
17 till next week by Commissioner Carter, seconded by
18 Commissioner Jones. My understanding is that that motion
19 would take precedent. So, is there any discussion?

20 COMMISSIONER WATTS: Yes, Madam Chair.

21 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHÉ: Yes, Commissioner
22 Watts.

23 COMMISSIONER WATTS: Yes. I just wanted to
24 say, on its face, I'm not opposed to it. I'm totally
25 not. You know, I'm definitely for it. I just wanted --

1 when it was referenced something read. I want to make
2 sure that I've read it. Maybe I received it, maybe I
3 didn't, but I want to make sure I've read it. But just
4 on its face, when we're talking about it, I'm definitely
5 not against it, just for the record.

6 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: Through the Chair?

7 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELESCHE: Okay, Commissioner.

8 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: Can we get a commitment
9 from the commissioners that they'll read it by next
10 Thursday?

11 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELESCHE: I think that's what
12 the motion is.

13 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: Well, the motion was to
14 postpone. It wasn't a commitment to read it by next
15 Thursday.

16 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELESCHE: Well, it -- we're
17 talking about postponing your motion. So, they would
18 have had to have read it in order to vote on it, because
19 that's what they're saying right now. So, yes, --

20 COMMISSIONER IVEY: Through the Chair?

21 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELESCHE: I assume -- go ahead.

22 COMMISSIONER IVEY: Can we ask the gentleman,
23 what date did you send this letter out?

24 COMMISSIONER MORRIS: Sir?

25 COMMISSIONER IVEY: No, I'm serious. I mean,

1 we need to know so we can track it. That's the purpose
2 of me asking. I read my emails. I just need to track
3 what email was sent out.

4 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: It hit my inbox on the
5 6th.

6 COMMISSIONER MORRIS: That's when it hit mine
7 too.

8 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: Of March.

9 MR. ULACIA: So, all of you guys should have
10 gotten it March 6th, so as Victoria Camille said, so...

11 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: And through the Chair,
12 there's attachments on the email. One of the attachment
13 says open letter to BOPC, and the other is a copy of the
14 draft ordinance itself.

15 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay. Commissioners,
16 any other questions or comments?

17 COMMISSIONER WATTS: No, Madam Chair. I just
18 wanted to say again, I reiterate, for me, I'm definitely
19 for this. And if some of the commissioners have said
20 either they got it or they got it and they haven't read
21 it, I don't see the issue next -- because we have a
22 meeting next Thursday, and it sounds like it definitely
23 will be approved. It's just give them that opportunity
24 to look at their email, and go back and look at it, March
25 6th. Because I think the sentiment is most are for it.

1 COMMISSIONER JONES: Madam Chair?

2 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Commissioner Jones?

3 COMMISSIONER JONES: I just wanted to --

4 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Speak into the
5 microphone.

6 COMMISSIONER JONES: I just want to let it be
7 known, I'm looking at March 6th right now in my -- I
8 don't have it in here.

9 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay.

10 MR. ULACIA: It must have disappeared then.

11 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: I think it's
12 established that some of us have not gotten it. All
13 right, so I'm calling for the question if there aren't
14 any other comments. All those in fav- -- all those in
15 favor of postponing until next week, indicate by saying
16 aye.

17 COMMISSIONER JONES: Aye.

18 COMMISSIONER IVEY: Aye.

19 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Aye.

20 COMMISSIONER WATTS: Aye.

21 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Opposed?

22 COMMISSIONER BOMAN: Nay.

23 COMMISSIONER MORRIS: Nay.

24 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: Nay.

25 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Two nays.

1 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: Three nays.

2 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Three nays. The
3 motion carries.

4 All right, now do we have to go -- remind me,
5 we have to go to the original motion.

6 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: The original -- yes, the
7 original.

8 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Yes. Okay. The
9 original motion --

10 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: But you said the motion
11 carried to postpone.

12 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Right.

13 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: So, it's postponed,
14 right, Madame Chair?

15 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: All right, yes. So,
16 we don't have to go to the original motion.

17 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: That's my understanding.

18 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: All right, thank you.

19 COMMISSIONER MORRIS: Through the Chair.

20 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Yes, Commissioner
21 Morris.

22 COMMISSIONER MORRIS: Sir, when you resubmit
23 that email, instead of doing it individually, can you cc
24 everybody so we can see who all got it and who didn't get
25 it? What do you -- you have it?

1 COMMISSIONER BOMAN: I just forwarded it to
2 everybody.

3 COMMISSIONER MORRIS: OK.

4 COMMISSIONER BOMAN: I think I did.

5 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Yes.

6 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Your names are all on
7 it.

8 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: Yeah, it --

9 COMMISSIONER IVEY: So, through the Chair?

10 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: Look through that, so we
11 can verify that the emails are correct.

12 COMMISSIONER MORRIS: These are correct. These
13 are correct.

14 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay. Could you --

15 COMMISSIONER IVEY: Through the Chair?

16 COMMISSIONER MORRIS: Yes, those are correct.

17 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Commissioner Ivey, go
18 ahead.

19 COMMISSIONER IVEY: So, it was sent out, but
20 it's addressed -- when you look at it, it doesn't say
21 what it's actually for. It just have, like, Detroit, it
22 has -- it's kind of generic. So, it doesn't really speak
23 to saying, you know, what it needs to say. So, give --
24 could you -- when you send it, just it will be safe for
25 you when you do this again -- because I'm not opposed to

1 it, let's be clear, none of us are. Just send it to our
2 secretary, that way you know for a fact we all got it.

3 We're not saying we didn't have it because we
4 didn't read it, or we being lazy, or what people may be
5 thinking. It's just simply an over- -- like you sent it
6 individually, and believe me, we have lives, we work.
7 And so, when we read these emails, we read them. But it
8 would be better for it to go to our secretary, so it
9 would go directly to everybody, where this confusion
10 won't happen. So, please understand, this board is very
11 efficient. So, we're trying to stop -- it's not -- this
12 kind of chaos, we don't want to present ourselves that
13 way. So, I'm just speaking for us all. I see it, but
14 when I saw it, I bypassed it like, okay, it was probably
15 something sent from Detroit. I read it because Detroit
16 sends a lot of stuff too. City of Detroit sends a lot of
17 stuff. So, please forgive us if we did not read it. It
18 wasn't intentional.

19 MR. ULACIA: Okay, yeah. And respectfully, I
20 think when you get an email, you should read it.

21 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Yes. Sir, will you
22 coordinate that with our secretary?

23 MR. ULACIA: Absolutely.

24 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you.

25 MR. ULACIA: Yeah.

1 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you.

2 COMMISSIONER MORRIS: Mr. Conyers, did you have
3 a word?

4 COMMISSIONER JONES: Whoa, whoa.

5 COMMISSIONER WATTS: Through the Chair, wait a
6 minute.

7 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Wait a minute. Hold
8 on one second. What do we have?

9 MR. CONYERS: I have a question about this
10 situation, if I may really quick?

11 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Is he allowed to speak
12 after we're beyond public comment?

13 MS. UNDERWOOD: If you would allow him.

14 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: All right. I will --
15 I'll allow it. Go ahead.

16 MR. CONYERS: I'll be really brief.

17 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Sure.

18 MR. CONYERS: I'm not familiar with their side,
19 nor am I familiar with this side. But it seems what
20 would be most efficient if Commissioner Ivey has it, and
21 his is an external email coming into -- I know it
22 probably gets filtered through spam. It might be easier
23 if you just forward it to everybody on the commission to
24 make it --

25 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: No. I -- I understand

1 what you're saying, but we want to go through the
2 official process of going through our secretary. Because
3 that way, we can hold our secretary responsible.

4 SECRETARY GARNIER: Thank you, Madam Chair.

5 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you.

6 COMMISSIONER IVEY: Through the Chair. Through
7 the Chair. Just one more comment through the Chair, if
8 possible.

9 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Yes, go ahead.

10 COMMISSIONER IVEY: Even if we sent them now,
11 we still -- the other commissioners need time to read it.
12 And so, that's the problem. We just want to read it,
13 okay? And yeah, so you know, we're not trying to say
14 that we are opposed to any of this because we are with
15 you on that.

16 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Well, we don't have a
17 decision right now.

18 COMMISSIONER IVEY: We just want to have time
19 to read it, that's all.

20 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Commissioner, we don't
21 have a decision right now. That's what we're saying.
22 So, okay, thank you. Hearing any other comment? Hearing
23 none, then there are no presenta- -- that concludes our
24 oral communications, correct?

25 MS. UNDERWOOD: That is correct, Madam Chair.

1 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: All right, there are
2 no presentations to the board at this time. The Board
3 Secretary, do you have announcements?

4 SECRETARY GARNIER: Madam Chair, through the
5 Chair, there were two additional attendees today. One in
6 person from City Council Renata Miller's office, J.G.
7 Love, Director of Public Safety for District 5, and
8 former Police Commissioner Ricardo Moore is on Zoom
9 today.

10 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you.

11 SECRETARY GARNIER: The report today: Under
12 your tab six, commissioners, are the weekly reports
13 together with the incoming communication with the request
14 from the chief's office for administrative leave without
15 pay but with medical benefits. That will be the action
16 item for the special meeting on tomorrow morning. You

15 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you.

16 SECRETARY GARNIER: That ends the report, Madam
17 Chair.

18 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you, Madam
19 Secretary.

20 Is there any unfinished business? Hearing
21 none, I'll entertain a motion to adjourn.

22 COMMISSIONER JONES: So moved, Madam Chair.

23 COMMISSIONER WATTS: Support.

24 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: It's been moved by
25 Commissioner Jones, seconded by Commissioner Watts.

3 favor indicate by saying aye.

6 all for attending tonight.
