CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Good afternoon everyone. Thank you for joining us today. Today's March 19th, and we are here at the Board of Police Commissioners board meeting. I'd like to call the meeting to order. And we have our invocation today being given by Commander Chaplain Leslie Walker on Zoom.

CHAPLAIN: Good afternoon. Chaplain (Inaudible) here. Let us look to the Lord. Father God, we come before you now thanking you for this day, thanking you for your loving kindness and your mercy. God we ask that you will be in this meeting. Bless the leaders. Bless each commissioner. Give them wisdom and knowledge of what to do and how to do. Lord, we ask you to continue to bless our Chief of Police, our mayor, our citizens. We thank you for this time of gathering and you being everything and everything be done decent and in order. This our prayer in Jesus's name, our Father, we ask. Amen.

CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you so much. And now, could we have the roll call, please, Madame Secretary?

SECRETARY: Commission Dewaelsche?

1 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Present.

2 SECRETARY: Commissioner Boman?

3 COMMISSIONER BOMAN: Present.

4 SECRETARY: Commissioner Camille?

5 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: Present.

6 SECRETARY: Commissioner Ivey?

7 COMMISSIONER IVEY: Present.

8 SECRETARY: Commissioner Jones?

9 COMMISSIONER JONES: Present.

10 SECRETARY: Commissioner Morris?

11 COMMISSIONER MORRIS: Present.

12 SECRETARY: Commissioner Watts?

13 COMMISSIONER WATTS: Here.

14 SECRETARY: Commissioner Williams?

15 COMMISSIONER WILLIAMS: Present.

16 SECRETARY: Madame Chair, seven present, and

17 thus far the remaining three commissioners have

18 indicated they will be present.

19 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay. Thank you,

20 Madame Secretary. Can I receive -- can I get an

21 approval for the March 19th agenda, please?

22 COMMISSIONER JONES: So moved.

23 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: It's been moved by

24 Commissioner Jones.

25 CHAIRPERSON WATTS: Support.

1 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Supported by
2 Commission Watts. Is there any discussion? All in
3 favor indicate by saying aye.

4 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

5 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: The motion carries.
6 Thank you. Can I get a motion to approve the minutes
7 of March 12, 2026?

8 SECRETARY: Chairperson Dewaelsche?

9 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Yes?

10 SECRETARY: There's one correction for
11 Commissioner Williams, was present. We wasn't present
12 at roll call, but he was present at the meeting.

13 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Oh, for the minutes,
14 you're saying?

15 SECRETARY: Yes. I apologize for that error,
16 Thursday, March 12th.

17 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay. All right.
18 So for the minutes of March 12th with that correction,
19 is there a motion to the approve minutes?

20 COMMISSIONER WILLIAMS: So moved, Madame
21 Chair.

22 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Well, I think it was
23 moved Mr. -- Commissioner Williams.

24 COMMISSIONER JONES: I'll support.

25 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: And seconded by

1 Commissioner Jones. Any discussion? All in favor
2 indicate by saying aye.

3 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

4 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Opposed? The motion
5 carries. Thank you. And then, could we get approval
6 of the minutes -- I mean, a motion to approve the
7 minutes of March 13, 2026?

8 COMMISSIONER WILLIAMS: So moved.

9 COMMISSIONER JONES: Support.

10 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Commissioner
11 Williams moved. It was supported by Commissioner
12 Jones. Any discussion? All in favor indicate by
13 saying aye.

14 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

15 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Opposed? The motion
16 carries. Thank you. Could we also get a motion to
17 approve the closed session minutes of March 13th, 2026
18 regarding police officer Derond Crawford.

19 COMMISSIONER WILLIAMS: So moved.

20 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: It's been moved by
21 Commissioner Williams.

22 COMMISSIONER IVEY: Support.

23 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Supported by
24 Commissioner Ivey. Is there any discussion? All in
25 favor indicate by saying aye.

1 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

2 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHE: Opposed? The motion
3 carries. Thank you. I'd like to acknowledge that
4 Commissioner Boman has joined us. All right. Thank
5 you. Could we get the, Madame Secretary, introduction
6 of the staff, Chief of Police, officials and elected
7 officials and representatives and community leaders,
8 please?

9 SECRETARY: Through the Chair, present at
10 this time are as follows. Jonya Underwood, Teresa
11 Blossom, Dior Mathis, Candace Hayes, Armani Arnold,
12 Artemisia Joshua, Mary Barber, Felicia Tyson, Drew
13 Fries, Dr. Frances Jackson, Parliamentarian is present
14 via Zoom, Deputy Chief Mark Bliss for the Office of
15 Chief of Police, DOPC Chief Investigator Jerome
16 Warfield, Sr. I believe Senior Investigator --
17 Supervising Investigator Tiffany Stewart is also
18 present.

19 Today's interpreters are Angelique Taylor and
20 Stephanie Beatty. Court Reporter, Hanson Court
21 Reporting. Audio, Enrique Jackson. Media Services,
22 Jason Gant. Also registered at this time are Marie
23 Overall, Vice President 4th Precinct Community
24 Relations Council and representing State Legislator
25 Tyrone Carter's office. Ms. Fredia Butler, 2nd

1 Precinct Community Activist. That will conclude those
2 who are registered at this time, Madame Chair.

3 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you. Let the
4 record that Commissioner Woods has joined us. At this
5 time, for my report -- well, I just have one thing I
6 want to say and that is Commissioner Watts's birthday
7 is today and she's here. That's truly commitment, if I
8 say so myself. So happy birthday, Commissioner.

9 SECRETARY: Chair?

10 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Go ahead.

11 SECRETARY: I just received a couple other
12 persons who are registered at this time.

13 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay, go ahead.

14 SECRETARY: Jay Gregory Love of Council
15 Member Renata Miller's office, city council. Also,
16 Nicole Fisher of the 4th Precinct Community Relations
17 Council. And William Davis, former Police
18 Commissioner. As well as former Police Commissioner
19 Ricardo Moore. And I believe those are all that are
20 registered at this time. Thank you, Madame Chair.

21 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you. Also
22 under my report, we're gonna have a couple of
23 resolutions. And I know one is supposed to be read by
24 Commissioner Carter, so I'm gonna do Commissioner
25 Boman's first and hopefully she'll be in by then. So

1 Commissioner Boman, you have a resolution?

2 COMMISSIONER BOMAN: Oh, okay. I can just
3 read it directly here? Okay.

4 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Yes.

5 COMMISSIONER BOMAN: Sorry. I just got here.
6 All right. So here we go.

7 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Can I just ask --
8 oh, no. This is for a church or a group, right?

9 COMMISSIONER BOMAN: Yeah. It's for Remnant
10 Worshipers Ministry which is a church here.

11 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay.

12 COMMISSIONER BOMAN: So yeah, this is a
13 resolution honoring the Remnant Worshipers Ministry.
14 Whereas, the Remnant Worshipers Ministry founded in
15 2004 under the leadership of Pastor G. Peggy McIntosh
16 has faithfully served the city of Detroit for over two
17 decades through spiritual guidance, outreach and
18 community service. And the Ministry has demonstrated a
19 strong commitment to supporting residents by addressing
20 food insecurity through large-scale food distribution
21 and providing clothing, supplies, and resources to
22 individuals and families in need.

23 And whereas, through the partnership and
24 outreach efforts, including initiatives led by Rev. Dr.
25 Eddie Connor, the Ministry has served tens of thousands

1 of individuals and supported vulnerable populations,
2 including those experiencing homelessness.

3 And, whereas the Ministry also promotes
4 mental health awareness and overall wellness
5 contributing to a stronger and more resilient
6 community. And whereas, Detroit Board of Police
7 Commissioners recognizes the vital role of community
8 organizations and enhancing public safety and improving
9 quality of life.

10 And therefore, be it resolved that Detroit
11 Board of Police Commissioners hereby honors the Remnant
12 Worshipers Ministry for its dedication, compassion and
13 outstanding service to the people of Detroit and
14 expressing its sincere appreciation for it's continued
15 impact on the community.

16 And, be it further resolved that a copy of
17 this resolution be presented to Remnant Worshipers
18 Ministry as a symbol of the Board's gratitude and
19 recognition.

20 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Great. And you're
21 making motion to approve this?

22 COMMISSIONER BOMAN: Yes, I am.

23 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Okay. A motion has
24 been made by Commissioner Boman.

25 COMMISSIONER WILLIAMS: Second.

1 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Seconded by
2 Commissioner Williams.

3 COMMISSIONER IVEY: Support.

4 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: And supported by
5 Commissioner Ivey. I think that's it, right? Okay.
6 We have enough motions. All right. Any discussion?
7 All in favor indicate by saying aye.

8 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

9 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Opposed? The motion
10 carries. Thank you. Our next resolution, you haven't
11 heard from Commissioner Carter yet?

12 SECRETARY: Not as of yet.

13 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay. We're gonna
14 go ahead and ask Commissioner Williams if he'll read
15 it, right?

16 COMMISSIONER WILLIAMS: Right. The
17 resolution honoring retiring civilian Reginald Burkes.
18 Whereas, Reginald Burkes began his career with the City
19 of Detroit on November 12, 1985, as a microbiologist at
20 the waste water treatment plant and the Water Sewage
21 Department. In 1987, he transferred to the Detroit
22 Police Department where he began his distinguished
23 career as a photographer with Central Photographic
24 Arts, ultimately becoming a highly respected expert in
25 his field.

1 And whereas, Mr. Burkes photographed
2 thousands of police cadets, department personnel,
3 executive leaderships, identification images, and
4 countless community events, contributing significantly
5 to the Departments public image and historical record.
6 His professional excellence extended beyond the
7 department, benefiting numerous law enforcement
8 agencies.

9 In 2006, he attended advance training at the
10 FBI academy in Quantico, Virginia becoming the first
11 member of Central Photo to achieve this distinction.

12 And whereas, Mr. Burkes has photographed notable
13 political figures, athletes and political figures while
14 also documenting major civic events, including,
15 championship events, the Grand Prix, the Detroit Winter
16 Tug across the river, and the Free Press International
17 Marathon.

18 Among his most cherished professional
19 experiences was documenting the historic 1990 visit of
20 South African President Mandela where he was granted
21 full access to the event from a rival through public
22 address. And whereas, Mr. Burkes holds a bachelors
23 degree from the University of Michigan, is a proud
24 member of Kappa Alpha Phi fraternity, and has been
25 inducted into the Detroit Negro League Softball Hall of

1 Fame in recognition of his photographic contributions
2 to the preservation of the sport's history.

3 Beyond his professional accomplishments, his
4 career reflects unwavering commitment, professionalism,
5 and a deep dedication to both the Detroit Police
6 Department and the people it serves. Therefore be
7 resolved that the Detroit Board of Police Commissioners
8 hereby recognizes with deep appreciation and respect,
9 Reginald Burkes with his remarkable career, outstanding
10 service, dedication and contributions to the Detroit
11 Police Department and the city of Detroit.

12 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Do you want to make
13 a motion?

14 COMMISSIONER WILLIAMS: I motion for it to be
15 passed.

16 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay. A motion has
17 been made by Commissioner Williams. Is there a second?

18 COMMISSIONER IVEY: Second.

19 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Commissioner Ivey
20 has seconded the motion. Any discussion? All in favor
21 indicate by saying aye.

22 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

23 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Opposed? The motion
24 carries. Thank you so much. And I think the officer
25 had his retirement yesterday, or at least that's what I

1 was told. So he is not present today, but we'll make
2 sure he gets this resolution. Thank you so much. And
3 at this time we're ready for the Chief's report. Thank
4 you, DC Bliss.

5 DC BLISS: Good afternoon.

6 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Good afternoon.

7 DC BLISS: At the Board's pleasure. I could
8 do the Chief's report or the recommendation. Which one
9 would you like first?

10 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: The recommendation.

11 DC BLISS: Through the Chair, would you like
12 the Commander recommendation first?

13 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Sure. That's how I
14 have it in the agenda.

15 DC BLISS: I recommend Captain Laurie Carter
16 be appointed to the rank of Commander. Captain Laurie
17 Carter joined the Detroit Police Department on November
18 15th, 1999, serving in multiple precincts and roles,
19 including patrol, field training officer, and
20 school-based assignment where she mentored at-risk
21 youth and provided executive protection details.

22 Promoted to sergeant in 2013, she supervised
23 patrol operations, conducted internal enforcement
24 investigations, and implemented crime reduction
25 strategies. In 2017, she was promoted to lieutenant --

1 sorry -- she was promoted to lieutenant where she led
2 patrol operations, managed detention center functions,
3 and worked closely with the Wayne County Prosecutor's
4 office on investigations. In 2022, she was promoted to
5 captain and has since held leadership roles across
6 several commands, including Special Victims,
7 Disciplinary Administration, and the Detroit Detention
8 Center.

9 Captain Carter holds a bachelors degree in
10 criminal justice, a graduate certificate in business
11 leadership, and a masters in business administration.
12 She is a dedicated and enthusiastic leader committed to
13 mentoring others and serving the Detroit community. I
14 recommend her appointment to the rank of commander.

15 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Okay. Thank you.
16 Is there a motion?

17 COMMISSIONER JONES: So moved, Madame Chair.

18 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: It's been moved by
19 Commissioner Jones.

20 COMMISSIONER WATTS: Support.

21 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: It's been moved by
22 Commissioner Jones, seconded by Commissioner Watts.
23 Any discussion? All in favor indicate by saying aye.

24 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

25 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Opposed? The motion

1 carries. Thank you. You have another motion? I mean,
2 another recommendation, DC?

3 DC BLISS: Yes. The recommendation for
4 Lieutenant John Garner to be appointed to the rank of
5 captain. Lieutenant John Garner was appointed to the
6 Detroit Police Department on November 12, 2003 and
7 began his career in patrol at the 9th Precinct
8 following graduation from the training academy.

9 Around his tenure as a police officer, he
10 served in multiple precincts and specialized units
11 gaining extensive experience in patrol operations,
12 surveillance, investigations, and crime scene
13 management. Promoted to sergeant in 2016 and later to
14 master sergeant in 2019, Garner demonstrated strong
15 leadership in patrol, special operations, and cease
16 fire initiatives.

17 In 2023, Garner was promoted to lieutenant
18 and continued his assignment in 9th Precinct Special
19 Operations, focussing on violent gang crime. His
20 leadership and efforts contributed to a 10 percent
21 reduction in homicides and a 58 percent decrease in
22 nonfatal shootings and a 29 percent decline in gunfire
23 incidents through shots-fired enforcement.

24 Lieutenant Garner holds a bachelors degree in
25 business administration from Clare University and is

1 currently enrolled in the Detroit Police Department
2 Leadership Academy at Wayne State University. He has
3 completed extensive specialized training and service
4 with Lieutenants and Sergeants Association Board of
5 Directors. I recommend his appointment to the rank of
6 captain.

7 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you. Is there
8 a motion?

9 COMMISSIONER WATTS: So moved.

10 COMMISSIONER JONES: Support.

11 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: It's been moved by
12 Commissioner Watts, supported by Commissioner Woods.

13 COMMISSIONER WOODS: Jones.

14 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: I'm sorry.
15 Commissioner Jones. Is there any discussion?

16 COMMISSIONER WOODS: Yeah. The discussion I
17 have -- and through the Chair -- is that I see that
18 this was dated for the 16th. The first one was dated
19 for the 16th, and the other one was dated for the 13th.
20 Have we done all our due diligence with these and have
21 been able to research this thoroughly?

22 SECRETARY: Through the Chair, could you give
23 me those dates again? I'm trying to understand.

24 COMMISSIONER WOODS: It says -- this is on
25 March 16th, 2026.

1 SECRETARY: On?

2 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: For the commander.

3 COMMISSIONER WOODS: For the commander. And
4 March 13th for the captain. And I want to know what
5 kind of due diligence was done to vet both of these
6 candidates?

7 SECRETARY: I'm not certain -- okay. So the
8 appointment -- requests for the appointment was dated
9 from the Chief's office March 13th. And both the
10 appointment to rank of the captain and appointment to
11 the rank of commander were received in your office on
12 March 17th. Immediately thereafter, we received the
13 clearance letter and documents from the Office of Chief
14 Investigator, as well as we received a packet from DPD
15 from All Command.

16 COMMISSIONER WOODS: Yeah, but -- so --

17 SECRETARY: And the --

18 COMMISSIONER WOODS: So excuse me. So we had
19 no opportunity to really vet these candidates at all,
20 you know? And this -- you know, to rush this through
21 and jam this through is not how we supposed to operate,
22 you know? You talking about a day, you know, we have
23 not read anything. I'm not a rubber stamp guy. And
24 you know, that don't go to say anything about any of
25 these candidates. You know, what I'm seeing

1 peripherally, I could see, you know, there's a merit to
2 them, but I haven't gotten a chance to digest none of
3 this and review any of this stuff. And I don't know if
4 any other commissioners had the opportunity to do it
5 either.

6 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Go ahead, Madame
7 Secretary.

8 SECRETARY: Madame Chair, as has been the
9 process in your staff's office upstairs, immediately
10 upon receipt, the Chair was notified. We immediately
11 notified the Office of Chief Investigator to review his
12 records, together -- with working together with the
13 Chief's office, all of the information was provided.
14 The summary was as soon as your staff could assemble it
15 and send it out. So we followed the outline process
16 that has been in operation with all appointments,
17 promotions, recommendations, et cetera.

18 COMMISSIONER WOODS: Yeah, but you talking
19 about a day or two, you know, this is not proper
20 protocol.

21 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Yeah. When was this
22 sent out? When was this sent out to the commissioners?

23 SECRETARY: It was received in the office.

24 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Friday?

25 SECRETARY: Yes. And it was sent out before

1 all staff departed on Friday. It was sent to all
2 commissioners on March 17 --

3 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: 13th.

4 SECRETARY: 13, right. As soon as we
5 received it in the office.

6 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay. So it was
7 e-mailed to all commissioner March 13th?

8 SECRETARY: I will check the dates to confirm
9 that.

10 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: I think -- because
11 Commissioner Woods is saying that the one that we just
12 approved was dated March 16th, which would be, like,
13 Monday, I think.

14 COMMISSIONER WOODS: Yeah.

15 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Yeah, Monday. And
16 then you sent out the information to all the
17 commissioners on Friday, so it's almost a week that
18 they've had the information.

19 SECRETARY: I will check the dates and I'll
20 have staff check them.

21 COMMISSIONER WOODS: Yeah, through the
22 Chair --

23 SECRETARY: It was immediately sent out as
24 normal.

25 COMMISSIONER WOODS: Yeah, through the Chair.

1 If it's the 16th, either somebody had a typo or
2 something.

3 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Yeah, could be a
4 typo.

5 COMMISSIONER WOODS: Could be.

6 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay. You'll check?

7 SECRETARY: Yes.

8 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay. Commissioner
9 Boman, you had a question or a comment?

10 COMMISSIONER BOMAN: Yeah, my comment, first
11 of all, is the one promotion we just voted on to the
12 rank of commander, that has already taken place.

13 COMMISSIONER WOODS: Right.

14 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Yes.

15 COMMISSIONER BOMAN: The second -- the one
16 that was beginning to be under discussion just now, has
17 not been voted on yet. And I think that given some of
18 the concerns expressed by some of my colleagues, I
19 think it would be appropriate to table that vote until
20 the next meeting which would be on the 26th? Would
21 that be appropriate?

22 PARLIAMENTARIAN: Madame Chair, this is the
23 Parliamentarian.

24 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Yes, Madame
25 Parliamentarian, go ahead.

1 PARLIAMENTARIAN: The proper motion is to
2 postpone. It could be postponed to next week. And if
3 the Commission is still not ready, you can postpone it
4 again, but the proper motion is not to table.

5 COMMISSIONER BOMAN: Sorry. Okay. I meant
6 to postpone, then.

7 PARLIAMENTARIAN: The proper motion is to
8 postpone. It's a higher ranking motion than the main
9 motion. You would vote on the motion to postpone
10 first. And if that motion passes, then this matter
11 then is set aside until next week. And the next week,
12 it would be under Unfinished Business.

13 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHÉ: Okay. And we're
14 only talking about one of the recommended promotions.
15 The other one --

16 PARLIAMENTARIAN: Madame Chair?

17 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHÉ: Yes?

18 PARLIAMENTARIAN: The Parliamentarian would
19 also like to advise the Board that if the Board is
20 concerned about the approval that was just voted on,
21 someone who voted in the affirmative, which I believe
22 was everybody, could make the motion to reconsider
23 which would open that motion back up for another vote.
24 That would be the easiest way if the Board wants to go
25 back to that approval because of concerns. The

1 Parliamentarian is not suggesting you to do that. I'm
2 just telling you, if the Board wants to do it, that's
3 the way to do it.

4 COMMISSIONER WOODS: That's a good
5 suggestion, through the Chair.

6 PARLIAMENTARIAN: So the motion to reconsider
7 could be made. It has to be made by someone who voted
8 in favor of the motion. It does not change what you
9 do. It only reopens that case back up for
10 consideration. Thank you.

11 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELESCHE: Madame
12 Parliamentarian, if we do that, then that
13 reconsideration means that we would do both of them
14 next week?

15 PARLIAMENTARIAN: Well, what would have to
16 happen is this, if you do reconsideration, someone who
17 voted on the prevailing side would say, and I quote,
18 "having voted on the prevailing side, I move to
19 reconsider the motion just adopted to promote, whatever
20 the person's name is."

21 Now, that only requires majority vote to be
22 adopted. If that vote for reconsideration is adopted,
23 now you're back to the question of adopting the Chief's
24 recommendation for promotion. That motion would then
25 needing made to adopt the Chief's recommendation, and

1 then the motion to postpone would be made to put it off
2 until next week.

3 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay. Did everybody
4 get that?

5 COMMISSIONERS: Yep.

6 PARLIAMENTARIAN: I'm here. I'll help you.

7 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: All right.

8 Wonderful. Okay. Somebody else has a question?

9 COMMISSIONER BOMAN: Yeah. I think I had
10 made a motion and you seconded it. And I believe it
11 still went on the floor then.

12 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay. But if the
13 Parliamentarian made a recommendation for your motion
14 that was not to be tabled, but to be postponed.

15 COMMISSIONER BOMAN: Postponed.

16 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: So do you want to
17 restate your motion?

18 COMMISSIONER BOMAN: I move to --

19 PARLIAMENTARIAN: No, Madame Chair, he
20 doesn't have to. He can just change it to the proper
21 terminology.

22 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay. All right.
23 The motion has been made to postpone the vote for the
24 rank -- the Lieutenant John Garner. It was seconded by
25 Commissioner Morris. Is there any discussion?

1 COMMISSIONER WATTS: Yes, Madame Chair?

2 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHÉ: Commissioner Watts?

3 COMMISSIONER WATTS: Yes. I just want to say
4 -- because I know there was an original motion on the
5 floor. And I do understand that the colleagues and I
6 will yield to that, because we have had this discussion
7 before, making sure we have the information prior so
8 that we can digest. However for the record, these two
9 I did review. So I did have the opportunity to read
10 them and review them, and that's why I had, you know,
11 supported the second motion and approved the first.

12 However, I would make a suggestion to our
13 colleagues -- because we spoke about this before about
14 concerns having the information prior. If we're
15 talking about promotions, we're gonna make sure that
16 we're not trying to rubber stamp anything. We can have
17 the discussion moving forward to say, hey, seven days.
18 We have to have it -- it can be however many days as
19 you want -- prior to us taking any action on the
20 promotion moving forward. Thank you.

21 COMMISSIONER MORRIS: Through the Chair?

22 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHÉ: Go ahead,
23 Commissioner -- oh, I'm sorry. One second,
24 Commissioner. Madame Parliamentarian, were you gonna
25 comment?

1 PARLIAMENTARIAN: No, ma'am.

2 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay.

3 PARLIAMENTARIAN: I have nothing to say.

4 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Commissioner Ivey?

5 COMMISSIONER IVEY: Yeah. I'll (inaudible)
6 myself. Commissioner Morris had a question, and I'll
7 follow after him.

8 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay.

9 COMMISSIONER MORRIS: I just wanted to say
10 when I supported this motion, I'm fine with the first
11 one, with Captain Laurie Carter. I'm fine with that
12 one. So I'm just supporting him, as to the second
13 aspect with the second promotion.

14 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay.

15 COMMISSIONER IVEY: And through the Chair?

16 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Commissioner Ivey?

17 COMMISSIONER IVEY: Yeah. I'm going to say
18 kind of similar to what Commissioner Morris said. The
19 second one, I do want to kind of dig into a little bit.
20 I have some concerns, so I'm going to stand with that
21 one, too, as well as.

22 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay. Any other
23 commissioners?

24 COMMISSIONER WATTS: I can support that, as
25 well. Sticking with my vote for the first, and then we

1 can delay for the second.

2 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay. Well I think
3 that if there are other commissioners who feel that
4 same way, we would just not do the second motion that
5 Madame Parliamentarian mentioned as it relates to the,
6 you know, having them both postponed. All right. Any
7 other comments by commissioners? Okay. All in
8 favor --

9 PARLIAMENTARIAN: Reminder, the Board is
10 voting on the motion to postpone.

11 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Right.

12 PARLIAMENTARIAN: The motion to adopt the
13 Chief's recommendation for promotion.

14 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Was it to just
15 postpone the second recommendation?

16 PARLIAMENTARIAN: That's the only one that's
17 before the Board at this time, Madame Chair.

18 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Yes. All right.
19 All in favor indicate by saying aye.

20 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

21 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Opposed? The motion
22 carries. Now, is there -- now would I ask for a motion
23 if they want to postpone both, Madame Parliamentarian?

24 PARLIAMENTARIAN: Madame Chair, you could ask
25 if any board member wants to take action on the first

1 motion that was made to adopt. If no one says
2 anything, then continue on with your meeting.

3 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay. Is there any
4 other -- do the commissioners want to take any actions
5 on the first promotion that was approved? Hearing
6 none. Okay, we'll move on to the next item.

7 COMMISSIONER WOODS: And if I may, Madame
8 Chair?

9 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Go ahead.

10 COMMISSIONER WOODS: It would behoove the
11 department to get this to us at least two weeks in
12 advance to be able to look at these. You know, so
13 please get that message to the Chief. Do not send this
14 stuff to us and try to jam this down like that, you
15 know? So we need at least two weeks in advance.

16 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay. Now we can go
17 on to the Chief's report.

18 DC BLISS: Through the Chair, would you like
19 Commander Carter to say --

20 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Oh, I'm sorry. Yes,
21 since that promotion was approved, we would like to ask
22 if Commander Laurie Carter would like to say a few
23 words?

24 COMMANDER CARTER: Hello. First of all, I
25 would like to thank this board for the nomination and

1 the support. I'm humbled by this experience. I know
2 quite a few of the commissioners. I have been
3 dedicated to this department for a very long time and I
4 promise to do the very best job that I can. Right now,
5 I am at the Detroit Detention Center. And I know that
6 this is a hot topic. I promise to care for the
7 detainees in a constitutional way; to show them
8 humility; to show them empathy when it comes to their
9 care and getting them in there and out of there timely.
10 Thank you for this opportunity and I appreciate you
11 all.

12 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Thank you. And
13 congratulations. Thank you.

14 DC BLISS: Good afternoon. I'll start with
15 the Chief's report with the no critically injured
16 members that is reported this week. There is none.
17 Moving on to the crime data as of the 19th of March.
18 Under Homicide, currently, year-to-date we're at 31.
19 The same time last year, we were at 27. It's a change
20 of an increase of 15 percent.

21 For non-fatal shootings, we are currently at
22 55. Last time, last year, we were at 62. It's a
23 reduction of 11 percent. For robberies, we are
24 currently at 152 year-to-date. 2025, year-to-date, we
25 were at 163 for a reduction of six percent. For total

1 Part 1 Violent Crime, for 2026 year-to-date, we're at
2 1,844. At the same time last year, 1,817 for an
3 increase of 2 percent. For carjacking, specifically,
4 2026 year-to-date, we are at 13. At the same time last
5 year, we were at 17, for a reduction of 24 percent.

6 Moving on to case closures, charges and
7 fatale stabbings. On March 10th, 2026 at approximately
8 11:54 p.m., a verbal altercation occurred at a liquor
9 store in the 14800-block of Livernois Avenue. It was
10 alleged that the female defendant gave the male
11 defendant a broken glass bottle. The male defendant
12 stabbed the male victim multiple times in his neck.
13 The victim was privately transported to a local
14 hospital where he succumbed to his injuries and was
15 pronounced deceased.

16 On March 13th, 2026 following an
17 investigation by the Detroit Police Department, the
18 Wayne County Prosecutor's office charged Mr. Steven
19 Louis Hooks and Bernice Shaneka -- I'm gonna say this
20 wrong -- Chenevert in connection with the fatal
21 stabbing. Both were charged with premeditated
22 first-degree murder and were arraigned and remanded to
23 jail.

24 Detroit and BC shut down bar after shooting.
25 On March 17th, 2026, the Organized Crime Division and

1 partners of BC conducted an emergency closure of the
2 Wall Street Lounge after a non-fatal shooting and
3 several assaults occurred at the location. The safety
4 at bars and restaurants is a priority to the
5 department. We want to work with business owners,
6 ensuring their compliance, and we look forward to a
7 safe summer.

8 Charges filed in shooting outside Detroit
9 Edison Public School Academy. On February 27th, 2026,
10 a non-fatal shooting occurred outside the Detroit
11 Edison Public School Academy. 7th Precinct
12 investigators, with the help of our community, news
13 media, and the Southfield Police Department made two
14 arrests, charging both the suspect and the victim with
15 gun charges. Several firearms were recovered after the
16 execution of search warrants.

17 11th Precinct arrest and gun seizure. On
18 March 4th, 2026; a female victim made a report that a
19 suspect threatened her with a gun in the 18800 block of
20 (Inaudible). On March 11, 2026, officers conducted
21 surveillance and executed a search warrant. The
22 offender was arrested and recovered where four long
23 guns, two handguns, ammunition, suspected cocaine, and
24 other narcotics. The offender has been charged with
25 possession of control substance, firearm possession by

1 a prohibited person, assault with a dangerous weapon,
2 and felony firearm.

3 Traffic Enforcement: From March 8th through
4 March 14th, 2026 the Traffic Enforcement Unit conducted
5 operations in the 2nd, 9th, and 12th Precincts.
6 Officers made 540 traffic stops, issued 1,198 tickets
7 for moving violations, and 251 tickets for speeding.

8 Narcotics Enforcement: From March 9th
9 through March 15th, 2026 the Narcotics Unit executed
10 several search warrants, making four felony arrests,
11 confiscating four firearms, 48 grams of cocaine,
12 68 grams of fentanyl, and 45 pills.

13 Moving on to Community Updates. Tied to
14 Success. The Office of Community Outreach and
15 Engagement in collaboration with Lieutenant Mark Young
16 and Sergeant Rodney Sizemore, is seeking donations of
17 new and gently used ties for our upcoming Brotherhood
18 Submit. Detroit residents can drop off donations in
19 the lobby of Detroit Public Safety Headquarters.
20 Donations will be accepted through March 26, 2026.

21 Finally, prom dress pick up days. The
22 Detroit Police Department 9th Precinct is currently
23 hosting prom dress pick up days for high school girls
24 in the community. Girls can pick out any of our gently
25 used dresses, shoes, and accessories. Various sizes

1 and styles are available. On March 21st and March 28th
2 pickup will be available at the 9th Precinct, located a
3 11187 Gratiot Avenue from 12:00 p.m. to 3 o'clock p.m.
4 That concludes the Chief's report.

5 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Thank you, Chief.
6 Are there any questions or comments?

7 COMMISSIONER IVEY: Through the Chair, can I
8 share your flier to social media for the time?

9 DC BLISS: Yes, you can.

10 COMMISSIONER IVEY: Thank you.

11 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Thank you.

12 Commissioner Woods?

13 COMMISSIONER WOODS: Without getting into the
14 nuances of it, we've some horrible things today in
15 terms of a press conference saying that a Detroit
16 police officer -- former police officer was accused of
17 a serial rape. You know, being a serial rapist, what
18 is the statement from the Chief on that? Did he make a
19 statement on that?

20 DC BLISS: Through the Chair. This morning
21 at our COM Staff, Chief Bettison did address the
22 Command staff regarding this retired sergeant. And
23 reiterated the fact that no one is above the law. And
24 it was Detroit police that pushed ahead to make sure
25 that this person was brought to justice. And it truly

1 is a tragedy, what happened, but everyone, including
2 current or former law enforcement officers is held to
3 that standard. And we will be vehemently -- we will go
4 and do everything we can to put those criminals behind
5 bars, regardless if they used to have a badge or
6 currently have a badge.

7 COMMISSIONER WOODS: Thank you.

8 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELESCHE: Thank you. Any
9 other questions?

10 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: Madame Chair?

11 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELESCHE: Commissioner
12 Camille?

13 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: I have several
14 questions, so I just appreciate the Board's patience.
15 Thank you, Vice Chair (Inaudible) for raising that
16 because I had similar questions. I'm still working to
17 digest the information that's been coming through
18 throughout the day. Is it possible and is it
19 acceptable to share when that individual left DPD and
20 if that was voluntary or involuntary?

21 DC BLISS: Through the Chair. I don't have
22 the information, but if you make a request, we can get
23 that information to you.

24 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: Okay. Thank you very
25 much. And as we continue to digest the information

1 that comes out, perhaps we'll have some additional
2 questions. My other questions are related to some
3 other items. So in respects to green light locations,
4 so business do pay some type of fee structure in order
5 to have DPD monitoring the green light locations;
6 that's correct, right?

7 DC BLISS: No, that's not correct. They pay
8 for the installation.

9 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: Okay.

10 DC BLISS: But there's no payment to the
11 Detroit Police Department. They pay to have the
12 cameras installed through a separate third-party
13 installer. It has nothing to do with the Detroit
14 police department.

15 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: I can't hear him
16 very well. Is is speaker working?

17 COMMISSIONER WOODS: You gotta bring it in
18 closer.

19 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Yeah. I think it's
20 his microphone.

21 DC BLISS: Through the Chair. Sometimes, I
22 can hear it, other times I can't.

23 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Yeah, I know. It's
24 going in and out.

25 DC BLISS: I don't want to yell. But at the

1 same time, I want to be respectful to the Board.

2 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHE: Okay. Maybe that
3 would work better. I'm sorry. Go ahead.

4 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: Thank you, Chief, for
5 clarifying. So what the businesses are paying for is
6 the installation of the equipment, and then they sign
7 up for the Green Light Program with DPD, but there's no
8 cost for that program?

9 DC BLISS: Through the Chair, yes.

10 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: Okay. Thank you.

11 DC BLISS: Did we hear that?

12 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: It's very crackly now.

13 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHE: I don't know what's
14 going on with it.

15 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: Okay. Thank you for
16 that. And then, if there is an incident that captured
17 on that footage, there is no reason why the person
18 that's reporting that or the victim that's reporting
19 that to DPD, there's no additional costs or anything to
20 retrieving that as part of investigation or anything?

21 DC BLISS: Through the Chair, no. No.

22 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: Oh, okay. All right.
23 There was an inquiry to me in regards to it and I want
24 to make sure that I understood the process correctly.
25 Thank you for that.

1 So my next question is, victims of gun
2 violence, are they compelled to cooperate with the an
3 investigation?

4 DC BLISS: Through the Chair. Compelled, if
5 there is an investigation, we elicit a response from
6 the victims. But they're not compelled for that.

7 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: Okay. So I mean,
8 because we know gun violence is very traumatic, right.
9 And there may be victims that are not ready to confront
10 that trauma at that time or have those conversations,
11 and so it could be that DPD is asking for a statement
12 or wants to ask some questions, and the person's like,
13 I'm just not ready. I don't want to do that right now.
14 Is it acceptable for the Department, would you just
15 drop it? Or there's no practice of persuing that
16 victim or surveilling that victim or anything?

17 DC BLISS: Through the Chair. So with
18 regards to the case, it all depends on the case. I
19 would say that, if you're investigating a case, you
20 would like to get -- due to the recollection, you would
21 like to get it as soon as possible. So we would like
22 to get that information as soon as possible, because
23 time is of the essence, you know? There is a victim of
24 a crime and there is perpetrator that is still out
25 there, so we would definitely like to arrest the

1 perpetrator and get as much information as we can.
2 Now, that being said, each case is different. It would
3 depend upon the circumstances of the case. There is no
4 overriding blanket where, you know, in every case we do
5 this; in every case, we do that. It depends upon the
6 circumstances. It depends upon what additional
7 witnesses, what additional evidence we have, things of
8 that nature.

9 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: Okay. Thank you for
10 that. There's a particular case that I want to have a
11 conversation about, so I'll follow up in regards to
12 that.

13 The next question I have is body worn camera
14 footage for an incident. So let's say there's an
15 incident, someone makes a request for the body worn
16 camera footage. Is what is shared through a FOIA just
17 the incident of the officers that arrive on the scene
18 and deal with that specific, like, the core activities
19 of the incident? Or when other DPD staff, such as
20 technicians from Crime Scene Services, if they're
21 wearing body worn camera and they're collecting
22 evidence, is all of that body worn camera footage
23 packaged with that incident? Or is it just the
24 immediate situation?

25 DC BLISS: Through the Chair. I would have

1 to look into that to get you accurate information, but
2 if you do submit that question to us, we can definitely
3 get you an answer to that.

4 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: I'll do that. And
5 then lastly, this is my last question. I see on our
6 Facial Recognition Report here, so far this year, there
7 hasn't been any data on there. And there's one now for
8 a murder investigation of the -- this was a suspect is
9 a black male, it shows here. So it doesn't seem like
10 DPD is using facial recognition very often. This is
11 the first inquiry that you've made this year. And DPD
12 is no longer using your own software now, right?
13 You are using MSP's, Michigan State Police?

14 DC BLISS: Through the Chair. That is
15 correct.

16 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: Is there a cost when
17 DPD makes an inquiry to the Michigan State Police?

18 DC BLISS: Through the Chair, not that I'm
19 aware of. No.

20 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: Oh, okay. And then my
21 last question on that is, under what circumstances is
22 DPD using the facial recognition technology? Because
23 again, it doesn't seem like it's often. So what is
24 that criteria that says now we need to, kind of, step
25 it up and use this technology and make an inquiry?

1 DC BLISS: Through the Chair. There is no
2 stepping up. If it's a violent crime and there has to
3 be certain things that are vetted in order to allow an
4 investigator to use facial recognition technology.
5 Again, it's a tool in our tool box, so it's not
6 something that can always be used. Matter of fact, due
7 to, you know, the type of technology, we have added --
8 you know, it has to be approved, supervisor approval,
9 certain types of violent crimes, so some cases may fit
10 the criteria and some may not. So we do follow the
11 policy very closely in order to make sure, because we
12 understand how sensitive this type of technology is.

13 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: Thank you. And I just
14 want to say, I'm glad to see DPD is not using it
15 frequently. So I was just -- I was curious about the
16 fact that there was so little data around it and glad
17 that there's some thorough vetting that's being done
18 before it's being used. Thank you, Madame Chair.

19 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Yes. And I would
20 like to add to that. I asked the same question about a
21 year ago, because I noticed that it was being used very
22 infrequently. So I would just add that that, you know,
23 it's been quite a while that it has not been used that
24 often. So, thank you.

25 Also, there were several requests for

1 questions. I would ask that you go through the
2 secretary. Any questions that you're asking of the
3 Chief or his representatives, please go through the
4 secretary so we have a record of it and we can keep
5 track of those requests and the responses. Thank you.
6 All right. Anything else? Any other questions?

7 COMMISSIONER WATTS: Madame Chair?

8 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Yes, Commissioner
9 Watts?

10 COMMISSIONER WATTS: Hi. Thank you for your
11 report. I got a couple inquiries. I just wanted to
12 know, since spring is starting tomorrow, the inquiry
13 was DPD having any plans to beef up or targeting
14 initiatives at gas stations and after-hour facilities?
15 Especially the last couple weeks with the recent
16 shootings there, so that's the question.

17 DC BLISS: Through the Chair. We're always
18 looking at crime strategies and some of them are for
19 the entire department. And we also allow our
20 precincts, our commands to do what they're seeing in
21 regards to that. So I mean, overall, there is a focus
22 on that. I don't want to really get into our crime
23 strategy, per se, but just know that there's several
24 different layers. There's a city-wide layer. And then
25 also, from each precinct on what they're going to do,

1 because nobody knows those locations better than the
2 precincts. Those commanders and captains at the
3 precincts, you know, they may have a little tweak to
4 say, okay, in addition to this, we are also going to do
5 that.

6 So rest assured that we are definitely
7 looking at it. We know that spring is here. We know
8 -- I think we can all safely say that we're happy that
9 it's warming up, so, you know, we're also gonna get
10 ready for, you know, just the warm up.

11 COMMISSIONER WATTS: Thank you for having
12 that strategy in place. Thank you.

13 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Any other comments
14 or questions? Thank you, Chief, for that report. We
15 appreciate it. Next, we have on the agenda, Oral
16 Communications and Public Comments. Comments are
17 limited to two minutes. Inappropriate language and
18 comments will not be tolerated and may delay the TV
19 broadcast and video post. So could we have our first
20 speaker, please?

21 MS. UNDERWOOD: Thank you, Madame Chair. Our
22 first speaker will be Ms. Bernice Smith, followed by
23 marcel (Inaudible) and Cassandra Rodriguez. Please
24 state your name for the record.

25 PUBLIC: Good afternoon. First of all, I'm

1 gonna give you some good news. Woods, you have made me
2 proud have you, young man. And the reason why, you
3 were on TV Sunday. After I got through looking at my
4 church program, you came on next with -- what is it?
5 Sunday morning -- what is it -- my hearty mind. You
6 know what that program is, because you were on it. I
7 was quite surprised. I saw his picture and I said, I
8 gotta listen and see what he gotta say. And I was
9 quite surprised with you, young man, because the fact
10 that I have dealt with you for so long. No one knows
11 it, but I don't need to bring it out. But anyway, your
12 history was explained to the audience that was
13 listening. And he stated, he spoke about the family,
14 your family, your bringing up in the world and what you
15 have gone through, all right?

16 Also, my reasoning for bringing this up is
17 because I had a little bit to do with your involvement
18 because of my son being in the same situation you were
19 in. And that fact was, I'm just proud of you, young
20 man, because you've come a long way. And the fact that
21 we all have pasts and we want to get rid of them and we
22 do better by doing better, and you did better. And I
23 know lot of times I get your attention and tell you
24 come on over here so we can talk. I know you're busy.
25 But I am proud have you baby, I really am. And that

1 means him being incarcerated and that's all I'm gonna
2 say. I was there. I saw what he did, because I was
3 visiting my son. And the fact that I was honored at
4 Ryan Correction and I'm very happy about that. I can
5 remember that. And that's been over ten years ago. So
6 I'm just letting you know, it's never too late to let
7 your past come before you and know that you did darn
8 good. I can't cuss, now. Now, if only they could see
9 you at Ryan. That's all I gotta say. Now, as far as
10 my police concern --

11 MS. UNDERWOOD: Thank you.

12 PUBLIC: Is my time up?

13 MS. UNDERWOOD: Yes, it is.

14 COMMISSIONER WOODS: You spent it all on me.

15 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Thank you. Next
16 speaker?

17 PUBLIC: Hello. My name is Marcel. And I'm
18 part of the Detroit Alliance Against Racist and
19 Political Oppression. I know there was some confusion
20 in the last meeting about whether or not the e-mail was
21 sent, so I apologize and hopefully you've had the time
22 to review the documents and the language used in the
23 People's Body Cam Ordinance. I'm here today to demand
24 the BOPC pass a motion to ask City Council to review
25 it's watered-down body cam ordinance and for it to

1 involve the language of the People's Body Cam
2 Ordinance.

3 There's a desperate need in the community for
4 accountability in the Detroit Police Department when
5 they inevitably brutalize members of our community.
6 The police take way too long to release body came
7 footage and the People's Body Cam Ordinance forces them
8 to release the footage within seven days. In too many
9 cases have we seen the footage -- when the footage is
10 released, it's strategically muted and edited, which
11 our People's Body Cam Ordinance outright bans.

12 None of these measures are taken in City
13 Council's watered-down Body Cam Ordinance. This
14 Board's function is to hold DPD accountable when one of
15 their officers brutalize the members of our community
16 and to then enact punishment in a way that deters
17 further injustices by the police force as a whole.

18 One of the other functions of the Board is to
19 increase transparency between the community and the
20 police. Both of these functions are present in our
21 body cam ordinance. Again, it lowers the release of
22 body cam footage to seven days. It bans editing and
23 muting of body cam footage and forces DPD to upload all
24 body cam footage to a publically accessible website.

25 This is not asking for more. This is asking

1 for the bare minimum from our police force who time and
2 time again, abuse their power. Endorse the People's
3 Body Cam Ordinance, enforce City Council to revise
4 their watered-down body cam ordinance.

5 And just to know, the officer who is a serial
6 rapist is not a one-off issue. Just this month, a
7 police officer was found sending himself nudes through
8 a detainee's phone. We need to control the DPD through
9 the community. Thank you.

10 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELESCHE: Next speaker?

11 PUBLIC: Hi. My name is Cassandra. I'm here
12 as concerned community member and also an organizer
13 with the Detroit Community Action Committee. And I
14 came here to support DAARPO in their effort to ask this
15 body to sponsor and endorse the body cam ordinance
16 drafted by CPTA, And I'd like to explain why.

17 I think that there is some clear arguments
18 that Marcel had previously said before. But also just
19 that in a majority black city it concerns us a lot
20 about how we get policed. And I think that those of us
21 who do come to these meetings, we want to feel like
22 we're represented here. And part of being represented
23 here is taking some of those community concerns and
24 making them your own. And part of that is taking
25 drafted ordinances from local community organizations.

1 And even if maybe some of the wording has to get
2 tweaked, some of it has to be looked at, reviewed, but
3 taking that concern seriously and actually going
4 through the formal process of trying to adopt something
5 like that shows your community that you care.

6 So I just want to voice my support and tell
7 this body that they do have an option to show that
8 support to their community and part of that is being
9 able to endorse some community organizations and what
10 they put forward to you guys. So I hope you guys will
11 support this ordinance. And I encourage everybody in
12 the crowd, if you guys are confused about what this
13 body can ordinance represents, what differences there
14 are, currently, and with what we currently have adopted
15 and what DAARPO and CPTA want to adopt. You can grab
16 any of the little handbills that are being passed
17 around right now, and you'll be able to see the clear
18 differences in what we're asking for. Thank you.

19 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Thank you. Next
20 speaker.

21 MS. UNDERWOOD: The next three speakers will
22 be Ms. Fredia Butler, Tyron Hayes, Jacob Smith.

23 PUBLIC: Good afternoon. Commissioners,
24 since September 30, 2025, I've been before you talking
25 about not having any leaders addressing the issue of

1 ICE coming to Detroit. I'm afraid that some of the
2 leaders agree with the president, as some governors
3 have been called out for their behavior. The President
4 has expressed what his intents are and have
5 demonstrated by nationalizing and deploying National
6 Guards and Boarder Patrol officers in cities and even
7 by concentration buildings would house the, quote,
8 "catch of the day."

9 It has been reported that several of these
10 troops have been accused of committing murder and
11 brutalizing citizens. And in observing what is
12 happening in other cities, our leaders, I believe,
13 should be informing citizens of their civil rights
14 which will help eliminate confusion and possibly
15 violence when ICE is deployed here.

16 Commissioners, I have relatives in Memphis
17 and Mississippi where ICE is operating and the fear
18 many are experiencing. In our monthly meeting,
19 March 11, 2026, it was reported ICE detained a young
20 black man in our city. I was also told about a black
21 officer called Toby, referring to the character in the
22 firm Ruth. I hope these incidents are reported and
23 investigated. No unacceptable behaviors by officers
24 should be tolerated by officers to cause division.

25 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Thank you. Any

1 other speakers?

2 PUBLIC: Good afternoon. Madame Chair, may I
3 be heard?

4 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Yes. And please,
5 just state your name and speak into the speaker.

6 PUBLIC: Yes. My name is Tyron Hayes. I
7 live in District 5. First, I want to say happy
8 birthday to Commissioner Watts. I'm gonna get you your
9 pop that I know you love drinking.

10 COMMISSIONER WATTS: Thank you.

11 PUBLIC: I just wanted to spend my time real
12 quick talking about Shot Spotter. I know that that
13 contract renewal is coming up later this year in the
14 summer. And so Shot Spotter alerted in 2025 to 9500
15 incidents, but only 1300 incidents were -- there were
16 only 1300 cases where shell casings were recovered,
17 which calculates to about a 15 percent efficiency rate.
18 Shot Spotter also doesn't increase response time.
19 Traditional response times are about 12 minutes, with
20 Shot Spotter dispatches being 40 minutes.

21 And that data is actually reported with the
22 Michigan Advance with the information coming from Sound
23 Thinking, which is the ownership company over Shot
24 Spotter. And I think it's troubling that that agency
25 had to get that information from the parent company or

1 ownership company of Shot Spotter rather than DPD
2 itself.

3 I think it's important to recognize that the
4 last expansion was about an estimated \$7 million with
5 an obvious likely expansion, again, later this year
6 which is equal or greater in value. In 2021, the Board
7 of Police supported the expansion of Shot Spotter. And
8 since there has been no evidence that Shot Spotter has
9 impacted Detroit's crime reduction, I think it's also
10 important to recognize that cities like Chicago who
11 have similar crime reductions have done so without the
12 use of Shot Spotter and actually have eliminated Shot
13 Spotter from their own department.

14 So I would ask the Board not to support this
15 expansion and instead divert whatever moneys that are
16 going to Shot Spotter currently or would go to Shot
17 Spotter to any community intervention programs or
18 community programs. Thank you.

19 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Thank you. We have
20 the next speaker?

21 SECRETARY: Through the Chair, Commissioner
22 Boman has a question.

23 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Commissioner Boman
24 has a question.

25 COMMISSIONER BOMAN: Yeah. And I may have

1 wanted to ask this during Chief's report. I was
2 wondering about the Shot Spotter data we get. We get
3 data that tells about the number of events when it
4 happens, you know, when there's a response. What I
5 don't see -- and I'm wondering if we can get this
6 information -- is, how many violent incidents are
7 interrupted as a result of Shot Spotter where there was
8 no other call, no other -- no one else going to 911,
9 for instance, calling that would have brought officers
10 over anyway? And how many cases are there where Shot
11 Spotter was used resulted in the arrest of people for a
12 violent crime?

13 And I know it's illegal to discharge a
14 firearm away from a range in the city limits. That's
15 not what I'm referring to. I mean a violent crime
16 where someone was actually intending to shoot someone,
17 how many arrests were resulting from Shot Spotter in
18 that area?

19 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: DC?

20 DC BLISS: Through the Chair. If you could
21 you submit that, we would definitely answer your
22 questions. I don't have that information available to
23 me right now. We'd have to pull that and get it for
24 you. But just to make sure for the accuracy of your
25 request, if you could please submit it through the

1 secretary so we can address it for you, sir.

2 COMMISSIONER BOMAN: Thank you, DC Bliss.

3 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you.

4 COMMISSIONER WOODS: Through the Chair?

5 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: I think,

6 Commissioner Ivey, did you have something?

7 COMMISSIONER IVEY: No. I was just

8 (inaudible).

9 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay, thank you.

10 COMMISSIONER WOODS: Through the Chair. It's

11 (inaudible), right, through this question, you know, so

12 the secretary has it. You know, so she can get the

13 transcript and send it over.

14 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay. Any other

15 questions or comments? All right. Hearing none -- go

16 ahead. I'm sorry.

17 PUBLIC: Hello, my name is Jacob Smith. I'm

18 away the Detroit Alliance Against Racist and Political

19 Oppression, and I'm a resident of District 5. I'm

20 speaking here today to urge the Board to pass the

21 aforementioned motion to send the new body cam

22 ordinance language to the city council to be reviewed.

23 The current ordinance that we have right now, is at

24 best, a half measure, and at worst, a roadblock that

25 stands in the way of true accountability for the

1 Detroit Police Department.

2 The new language as proposed, is in my
3 opinion, the bare minimum of transparency owed to the
4 people of this city. This ordinance, the one that we
5 were proposing, the People's Body Cam Ordinance, is not
6 an impossible risk, and it's not unprecedented, either.
7 Body cam ordinances with language very, very similar to
8 this one have been passed in other cities, like for
9 example, Milwaukee and Chicago. We actually based the
10 language of this one off the ordinance that exists in
11 Chicago right now. Yeah, so it's possible. It's been
12 done before.

13 So once again, I urge you to pass the motion
14 that was set forth at the last meeting. Detroiters
15 deserve accountability. Detroiters deserve
16 transparency. And Detroiters deserve community
17 control. Thank you.

18 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Next speaker.

19 MS. UNDERWOOD: Our next three speakers will
20 be Ms. Williams, Casey Clark, and Ms. Michelle George.

21 PUBLIC: I speak the honest to God truth.
22 Hello everyone. I'm gonna continue to vote, but talk
23 about illegal voting, like I did last week and the week
24 before. So, like I was stating last week, so we have
25 ex-offenders on the Detroit police department, non-U.S.

1 citizens, voting. And guess what, when you got
2 ex-offenders with new names, they can vote two times.
3 This is not acceptable.

4 You all want to talk about accountability.
5 This is joke. I've been coming to these meetings for
6 three years. It's some garbage -- social media, you
7 talk about the wrong stuff, because this is not for you
8 to discuss. None of this. It's for the citizens.
9 That's why Coleman Young started it in '74. I don't
10 know what parts you guys don't understand? We talking
11 about accountability. Okay, how is it possible that we
12 have illegal immigrants on the Detroit police
13 department, ex-offenders. Sitting up here on this
14 Board of Commissioners -- I'm tired of this garbage.

15 You all sit up here like you do not know what
16 I'm speaking about. Conrad back today. I've been
17 talking about this. He's an attorney, so what you
18 gotta say about an ex-kingpin from the (inaudible),
19 Butch Jones on the Detroit police department. It's
20 just unacceptable. And then Terrance Reynolds, is the
21 man that raped me. He's on the Detroit police
22 department with a fake name. He work at the 3rd. Fake
23 name Tim. I don't care where you move him, what
24 department, what schedule, he still is on the Detroit
25 police department with a fake name.

1 I come here all the time. I'm tired of
2 people with badges hacking into my devices, recording
3 me. And want to talk about no one is above the law. A
4 whole lot of you guys think you are above the law,
5 that's the bottom line. And I'm gonna continue to talk
6 about this illegal corruption. You said
7 accountability. Last week, I went to the 3rd. He
8 gonna tell me I'm all over the place. How you gonna
9 tell me how I feel about what's going on in my life?
10 And how many stripes did he have on him? Make that
11 make sense.

12 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Next speaker.

13 PUBLIC: Hi. My name is Casey. And I'm with
14 the Detroit Alliance Against Racism and Political
15 Oppression along with my fellow organizers here today
16 urging you to support the People's Body Cam Ordinance.
17 Detroiters deserve a policy that releases all footage
18 of harm, makes it publically accessible, requires
19 release within seven days, and prevents DPD from
20 withholding or editing footage. Thank you.

21 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Next speaker.

22 PUBLIC: Good afternoon to the Chair and to
23 the Board of Police Commissioners. I wanted to come
24 and I was gonna try to find out when you were gonna
25 have the presentation about the missing children. And

1 I wanted to ask the Deputy Chief, did they find the
2 young girl with the dog? They did find them?

3 COMMISSIONER WOODS: From my understanding,
4 they did.

5 PUBLIC: Okay. That's a blessing because we
6 know what's happening with exploiting children and a
7 lot of missing children. The Federal Government has
8 cut over \$88 million, you know, with funding. So even
9 though what they found out about Epstein, he had
10 trafficked over 1,000 women and children. So that ring
11 could still go on, so I just wanted to make sure.
12 Because every time it pops up on the phone, it said
13 missing child, but if she's found, good. Grace be to
14 God, because we have been praying for her.

15 I also wanted to comment -- I can't comment
16 too much on the cameras, but it's a national
17 organization that started with the George Floyd -- a
18 lot of our families in our organization. So hopefully,
19 I know that officer that shot at Tracey Allen seven
20 times. And it's nothing against DPD, because we do
21 have fine officers. But hopefully they're not going to
22 do anything where it's not going to be any
23 transparency, because we do not need that. We need
24 those body cams to go on. And I know a lot of our
25 families, National Action Network, a lot of the

1 families that are in our organization, that we were a
2 part of the legislation going on with those body cams.
3 So hopefully, that's not gonna happen. I know I'll be
4 going to New York in a few weeks and we'll be able to
5 get some federal information on that, so hopefully
6 that's not happening.

7 But I don't know about the officer.
8 Hopefully he's not still an officer that shot at Tracey
9 Allen seven times. She could have died and thank God
10 she did not. So I just want to make sure we keep up
11 making sure that's not happening. Thank you.

12 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Next speaker?

13 MS. UNDERWOOD: Madame Chair, we'll go into
14 Zoom. Our first caller, former Commissioner William
15 Davis. After Mr. Davis, we'll go to Ms. Tiara brown.

16 PUBLIC: Good afternoon. Can I be heard?
17 Okay. I'd like to start off by wishing young
18 Commissioner Beverly J. Watts happy birthday.

19 COMMISSIONER WATTS: Thank you.

20 PUBLIC: Two of my questions I was gonna ask,
21 Commissioner Woods asked, you know, so that's good. It
22 saves me from asking. Because I think, you know, we
23 was asking about a policy, you know, years ago, about
24 we should have the information -- y'all should have the
25 information at least two weeks before y'all voting on a

1 promotion for an officer, because I was one of the few
2 commissioners that regularly voted against officers
3 that had bad records. Y'all don't have to be afraid to
4 vote against somebody. I never was.

5 Also, I think we need to be making sure we
6 not using City resources to represent bad officers.
7 You know, like if an officer is ultimately determined
8 to have raped -- you know, including their own step
9 daughter and other young people, that's horrible. You
10 know, we should not be using any of our city resources
11 for officers that rape, murder, or sell drugs. You
12 know, so hopefully this board will continue to do
13 better. And I was pleased to see that Commissioner
14 Williams made it to the meeting last week, because none
15 of y'all will ever be able to beat my record, because I
16 was retired when I got on the board. But you all have
17 a good day.

18 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELESCHE: Next speaker?

19 PUBLIC: Good evening, Commission. Happy
20 birthday to District 5 Commissioner Beverly Watts. And
21 yes, Darryl Woods did cover some of my questions. But
22 my other questions is, there was a woman that came in
23 here, I believe, on January 7th. I won't say her first
24 name. Her name, too, was Ms. Brown, no relation. She
25 said she has been sexually assaulted. She had been

1 left in a horrible way and police were gonna follow up
2 with her.

3 They followed up with her and basically
4 closed her case. It doesn't appear that the gentleman
5 who assaulted her or allegedly assaulted her was
6 interviewed. There was no followup on her. She has
7 been going to meetings. As a matter of fact, she
8 called out some of you commissioners at Tuesday's City
9 Council meeting. She called out the women on the City
10 Council, the women on the Board of Police Commissioners
11 because she doesn't feel like she's getting justice.

12 Why, for sexual assault cases -- or any cases
13 for that matter, but particularly sexual assault cases,
14 are going to be closed, why is there not an officer
15 designated to sit down with these people and tell them,
16 we realize that it was your thought that you were
17 sexually assaulted or you feel that you were sexually
18 assaulted. Based on the evidence we located, based on
19 what we found, it's inconclusive. It's unfounded.
20 It's whatever, but this case will not be moving
21 forward. Somebody needs to have that sit-down
22 conversation face to face.

23 The other part of that is, if somebody is
24 sexually assaulted and they are asking for the body cam
25 footage when they spoke to the police, or anything

1 pertaining to that sexual assault, Conrad Mallett, they
2 should not be expected to pay for that. Somebody
3 should either bring them into the police department and
4 let them see it for free or it should be sent to them
5 for free. This woman has gone to several meetings.
6 People are discussing it online. They are asking
7 questions and wondering why she is not getting
8 resolution to this alleged sexual assault. Again, can
9 somebody look into that, particularly the women on this
10 commission that she specified by names that were
11 abandoning her.

12 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHE: Go ahead
13 Commissioner woods?

14 COMMISSIONER WOODS: Yeah. DC Bliss, is the
15 Department communicating with those who are alleged
16 victims, like if a case don't go forward, you know, to
17 have a conversation with them and being able to say
18 this is the reason why we can't go forward? I'm
19 probably sure you can't do it on every situation based
20 upon the uniqueness of the circumstances. But I'm
21 saying, as a practice, are we communicating with those
22 alleged victims in a way that is sensitive?

23 DC BLISS: Through the Chair. It's my
24 understanding that there is open dialogue between the
25 investigator and also the victim. In regards to case

1 status, you know, if there are any concerns or
2 anything, that they're addressed. Additionally, we do
3 have the Family Unit that will reach out to victims,
4 and then, you know, follow up on certain aspects of it.
5 So if there's been a deviation to that, then I need to
6 know about it, but it's my understanding that those
7 conversations are being had. No one is left out there
8 in an unknown state.

9 COMMISSIONER WOODS: Can you report to us in
10 terms of that the communication is happening more often
11 than not? In that when a case is not going forward,
12 you know, that there is a level of sensitivity in there
13 in how they're approaching alleged victims in these
14 cases, whether it be a sexual assault, homicide, or
15 whatever that major crime may be.

16 DC BLISS: Through the Chair. But I do know
17 that we address the victims. We have a very robust
18 system on keeping contact.

19 COMMISSIONER WOODS: Okay. All right.

20 DC BLISS: But I'll make sure when the
21 secretary submits it to us, that we address it and get
22 it --

23 COMMISSIONER WOODS: Well, we submitting it
24 to you now, right now. So we don't have to -- you're
25 here, right, you can take a note saying there's

1 something you want. It's on the record, now the
2 secretary can follow up with it, you know. But I don't
3 see the back and forth in terms of having the -- you
4 know, you're right here and listening, and so it's
5 being submitted to you right now, verbally.

6 DC BLISS: Understood, sir.

7 COMMISSIONER MORRIS: Through the Chair?

8 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Commissioner Morris?

9 COMMISSIONER MORRIS: Yeah, just following up
10 on what he said. The Department, we need to followup
11 with this case to make sure that the communication is
12 taken place. It's kind of insulting to me. Yesterday,
13 the Board of Ethics released a finding, members of the
14 Detroit Police Department made false allegations and
15 made a false complaint against me to the Board of
16 Ethics to open up an investigation and the Board of
17 Ethics tossed it out.

18 It's insulting when you see members of the
19 department dedicating themselves to investigations for
20 stuff that didn't happen, but closing cases on stuff
21 that did happen. We gotta get it together. We are the
22 Board of Police Commissioners. We are here to hold the
23 Department accountable. And if there's anything that
24 we did or any way that we were negligent, you know, it
25 wasn't intentional. We apologize. We rely on the

1 persons that come before us to give us accurate
2 information and to follow up. So we gotta get it
3 together. That's all I got to say.

4 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Any other questions
5 or comments? Commissioner Carter?

6 COMMISSIONER CARTER: No. I was just gonna
7 say -- through the Chair -- that this particular
8 alleged victim came down here and she opened herself to
9 all -- I mean, just exposed herself. And I think that
10 it's incumbent upon us to make sure that she gets what
11 she needs. If somebody hasn't sat down and spoke to
12 her, we should know that.

13 So I'd like to know if someone actually --
14 I'd like to know what happened and if she received the
15 communication that she should have regarding the case
16 and why it was closed. So that's my comment, Madame
17 Chair.

18 COMMISSIONER WATTS: Madame Chair?

19 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Commissioner Watts?

20 COMMISSIONER WATTS: On that point, and also,
21 could you let us know --

22 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Could you speak into
23 the speaker?

24 COMMISSIONER WATTS: It's on. I don't know
25 if something's happening with the sound today. But

1 also, could you let us know who sat down with this
2 victim? Because Commissioner Carter is correct, she
3 came down. If I'm remembering now, she opened herself
4 up very passionately, put everything out here, you
5 know, in front of us and in front of the public.

6 And so from our perspective, we just assumed
7 and we were assured that someone was gonna sit down
8 with her, sensitivity, and all the information. So I'm
9 surprised to know that that did not occur in that
10 fashion. And more importantly, we did not get a report
11 back. So please let us know, not only when, but who
12 sat down and met with her. Thank you.

13 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Any other comments
14 or questions? All right. Go ahead, Commissioner Ivey.

15 COMMISSIONER IVEY: I just want to speak as
16 one of the women of the board, an apology to Ms. Brown
17 if she felt unprotected by the women of this board.
18 And I believe most of the women of the board and men of
19 the board, as was just spoken, will diligently make
20 sure whatever she missed, get caught, and whatever she
21 need, she shall get through this process with the
22 department. So we will be diligently looking into it
23 for her.

24 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you. No other
25 commissioners? All right. Hearing none, the next

1 speaker?

2 MS. UNDERWOOD: We'll go back into Zoom. Our
3 next speaker will be the caller with the last three
4 digits 0-3-9. Can you un-mute yourself?

5 PUBLIC: What's up doe? Can you hear me
6 clearly?

7 MULTIPLE SPEAKERS: Yes.

8 PUBLIC: You can hear me, okay. Scotty
9 Boman, pay close attention. Conrad Mallett, I told you
10 about the Detroit tape. I know you done heard about
11 it. Don't give me any time planning with it. I think
12 I gotta take a different approach to this. Now Mimi
13 want what the hell she want. Y'all got Willie Bell
14 sitting up here on the board, along with all the rest
15 of you elected Detroit Board of Police Commissioners
16 members. And was appointed by a cheated-in mayor.

17 Now, all elected positions in the city of
18 Detroit have been cheated in, according to my
19 investigation. And I'm not lying about sugar, honey,
20 iced tea. Now I gotta do what I got to do to get MiMi
21 what she wants, requested, and deserves, and y'all been
22 blocking us, her, from getting what she wants. Talking
23 about Lawrence (Inaudible). I'm talking about Lawrence
24 (Inaudible), Melanie White, Willie Belle. I would run
25 down the list, but now we gonna go to 2026, and I'm

1 gonna start talking about all these elected officials
2 in the city of Detroit. (Inaudible) been cheating in
3 Detroit elections. I believe I can prove it for 2020,
4 but for 15 years, I believe now my investigation is
5 over with. So now I'm gonna do what I gotta do, get
6 MiMi what she wants. Y'all didn't want to give it to
7 her, so that's why I took it. Now I'm getting ready to
8 wave it in your face and whoever don't like it, can
9 smoke D-I-C-K, double D-I-C-K. (Inaudible).

10 MS. UNDERWOOD: Our next speaker will be
11 Devon, and after Devon, Zoom User. And then we do have
12 one person in the audience to speak.

13 PUBLIC: Hello. Can you hear me?

14 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Yes, we can.

15 PUBLIC: My name is Jake Slaughter. I'm a
16 resident of District 5. I'm calling in to voice my
17 support for the People's Body Cam Ordinance as put
18 forward by the CPTA and Detroit Alliance Against Racism
19 and Political Oppression. I think just transparency
20 and accountability is really important for any police
21 department. And I just wanted to voice my support for
22 that. Thank you.

23 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Next speaker.

24 MS. UNDERWOOD: Devon?

25 PUBLIC: Hello. My name is Devon. I'm with

1 the Detroit Alliance Against Racism and Political
2 Oppression. Yeah, I'm here today to just voice my
3 support for the People's Body Cam Ordinance. I would
4 like for the Board of Police Commissioners to do
5 whatever they can to put this in front of City
6 Council's face and urge them to vote on it, because the
7 current one is not doing enough for Detroiters. Thank
8 you so much.

9 MS. UNDERWOOD: Mr. Smith --

10 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: One second?
11 Commissioner woods?

12 COMMISSIONER WOODS: Yes, Madame Chair. I
13 was just -- you know, I was kind of alarmed by the
14 previous caller. Not this previous caller, by Mr.
15 Crawly offering his private parts or telling people to
16 go to somebody's private part. You know, I think that
17 is disgraceful. You know, we have a child in the room.
18 We got women in the room and people and that stuff.
19 And I think it's disgraceful. We don't know who's
20 listening. All this stuff is public. And we'll make
21 sure that is not on our videos and things of that sort.
22 You know, that was just shameful to say something that
23 despicable in a public meeting.

24 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Any other --

25 PUBLIC: So speaking about the Open Meetings

1 Act, which you guys are talking about. You guys
2 violated the Open Meetings Act three weeks ago, I
3 believe it was, because of -- I'm not gonna call her a
4 dinosaur because the oldest person in the room here
5 spoke to me, not through the Chair. So Commissioner
6 Dewaelsche, whenever I speak to people directly, what
7 do you tell me? Through the Chair, correct?

8 So if a person's that's friends with you
9 speaks to people directly, you should tell her, through
10 the Chair, as well. So there is a part of the Open
11 Meetings Act that says a person should not be excluded
12 from a meeting except for causing a breach of peace in
13 that meeting. And according to Conard Mallett in one
14 of the other meetings, you have to give them a personal
15 warning, correct? Corporation Counsel, you have to
16 give a personal warning.

17 MR. MALLETT: Yes.

18 PUBLIC: So if you put a person out of a
19 meeting, without giving them a warning, and you use
20 force, like your officer did with me, the Deputy Chief
21 cannot instruct a Board of Police Commissioner, who's
22 an elected official, to put a person out of a meeting.
23 So Ms. Brown from before I've been working with Ms.
24 Brown, who's been sexually assaulted, I don't believe
25 anybody up here -- sorry to say it like that -- but

1 none of the women up here are really standing with her
2 because she's been sexually assaulted and we don't have
3 -- nobody's even request that her rape kit be given out
4 to her or anything like that. She hasn't got her FOIA.
5 I see Commissioner Williams staring at me, Lavish
6 Williams, I'm gonna bring you a lawsuit one day. You
7 know I got a lawsuit. I don't why you staring at me
8 like you upset or something. You know you were --

9 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Can you speak to the
10 Chair? And what is your question?

11 PUBLIC: There we go. Like I was saying. I
12 can speak to the Board. I'm gonna speak to the Board.

13 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: I'm asking you to
14 speak to the Chair.

15 PUBLIC: So like I was saying, there's a
16 commissioner up there who was cheated in and I have a
17 lawsuit on him. Also, Officer Dion Dawson, I would ask
18 anybody on this board who has some cahoonas to file a
19 motion to receive his disciplinary history. Officer --
20 his badge number is 389. So Ms. (Inaudible) I don't
21 appreciate you saying that I have any sexual
22 relationship with anybody I bring here. I have tons of
23 woman -- anyway, so she told me what you discussed with
24 her on the phone call. I have plenty of women who I
25 work with. I have the utmost integrity.

1 So my thing is, the officers are doing bad
2 work. I met that woman the day she called me and I
3 went into action. And the next day, I had to serve
4 this officer with a PPO because he is a danger to the
5 community. He threatened to shot his girlfriend in the
6 head. Also, we need to do more for the homicide cases
7 that are wide open that are not being solved. And to
8 my commissioner, I left you a voicemail. I'm sure you
9 didn't get it. And also I want to say, EPU and the
10 Mayor's office, and all City Council they also need
11 body cameras because they are violating people's
12 rights.

13 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Next speaker?

14 MS. UNDERWOOD: Madame Chair, that's your
15 last speaker.

16 COMMISSIONER MORRIS: Through the Chair?

17 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Commissioner Morris?

18 COMMISSIONER MORRIS: I did notice that
19 Executive Protection Unit that is assigned to the City
20 Council and the mayor and things of that such are DPD
21 members and they are interacting with the public. Why
22 aren't they wearing body cameras? That's what I'd like
23 to know, DC.

24 DC BLISS: Through the Chair. I can look
25 into -- what they're processes are, when they wear body

1 worn cameras. Or if they -- during the course of their
2 duty with the council members, if they're required to
3 have them on and I'll get that to you, sir.

4 COMMISSIONER MORRIS: Thank you.

5 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Any other questions?

6 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: Through the Chair. I
7 have another question. It had to be over a month ago
8 now there was a request in a meeting of DPD to provide
9 the Board with a draft of a proposal for security at
10 our meetings so we could review that and vote on that
11 as acceptable security. I haven't seen that yet. Has
12 that come into the office at all? Or is DPD still
13 working on it?

14 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: I think Commissioner
15 Woods --

16 COMMISSIONER WOODS: Yeah, through the Chair.
17 I did speak to the Chief personally about that and he
18 said that he would get something to us very soon. He's
19 working something out to be able to make sure that is
20 accommodated.

21 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: Thank you, Madame
22 Chair.

23 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you. Any
24 other questions or comments?

25 COMMISSIONER WATTS: Yes, Madame Chair.

1 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Commissioner Watts?

2 COMMISSIONER WATTS: For the secretary, do we
3 have an update -- I know we had asked about a couple
4 weeks ago a followup with the Dawson case. Do we have
5 any update?

6 SECRETARY: Through the Chair. Commissioner
7 Watts, the last I talked to Internal Affairs, the
8 detective assigned to the case that Mr. Smith referred
9 to was continuing to be an open investigation. They
10 had reached out to the complainant. The complainant
11 had not responded on that particular day. It has been
12 a few days since I sent the e-mail to you. I think it
13 was you and Commissioner Williams, so I can follow up.
14 I know they were moving expeditiously because of a date
15 that was mentioned of March 28th. And that's all I
16 know at this time.

17 COMMISSIONER WATTS: Thank you. If you can
18 definitely let us know.

19 SECRETARY: I will. Immediately after this
20 meeting, I'll reach out McGinnis.

21 COMMISSIONER WATTS: Thank you.

22 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Any other --
23 Commissioner Boman?

24 COMMISSIONER BOMAN: Yeah, there's actually
25 two matters I wish to address. Both of them are

1 related to our serial commentator -- I don't mean that
2 in a bad way, because I definitely was one myself --
3 Mr. Crawly. One of his major issues have been -- and
4 has been and remains is concern about a proper
5 investigation into the unnatural death of Kaniesha
6 Coleman. And there have been other cases where people
7 have brought up dissatisfaction with inclusions
8 surrounding unnatural deaths where the finding --
9 official finding is suicide. And where arguments are
10 made where evidence supports not suicide, but other
11 parties being responsible for the death.

12 There's a systemic issue that is completely
13 out of the Board's control. And that is the County,
14 when the coroner -- who works for the County, not even
15 for the City of Detroit -- makes a finding of suicide,
16 that any evidence that may have been more deeply
17 investigated, had it been a ruling of homicide, does
18 not get investigated. And this is often a policy of
19 the Michigan Police, again, outside of this department.
20 And that is where we outsource our forensics.

21 So for those reasons, there is a problem,
22 whether or not in this particular case there was an
23 error, there is a problem. And it's a systemic
24 problem, but is not a problem that us as the Board of
25 Police Commissioners can solve. So I just wanted to

1 put that out there for people that feel like perhaps we
2 are not doing anything about it or ignoring these
3 concerns, that often there are just things we can't do.
4 And that other people can do, but it's not up to me to
5 tell them what to do.

6 Secondly, the other matter, the allegation
7 that I, somehow got into office as a result of voter
8 fraud. That is a rather -- requires quite a stretch
9 given that I ran completely uncontested. And what I
10 mean completely uncontested, no one submitted a simple
11 one-page form to be a write-in candidate against me.
12 We had someone who didn't have significant signatures.
13 That person could have still run against me. Nobody
14 ran against me. There were write-in votes that didn't
15 get counted because nobody who had those write-in votes
16 submitted the form. So I don't see any way possible
17 that my getting in this office had anything to do with
18 any voter fraud, so just to close that.

19 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Commissioner Woods?

20 COMMISSIONER WOODS: I think Corporation
21 Counsel and then I'll go after him.

22 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Oh, Corporation
23 Counsel.

24 CORPORATION COUNSEL: Madame Chairperson,
25 thank you. Commissioner Boman, I appreciate what you

1 said about the coroner's office. But I do want to
2 point out, some of the board members were here; you
3 were not. Chief Bettison actually, Commissioner Boman,
4 called in the Michigan State Police to take a look at
5 the homicide investigation that was done by DPD
6 involving Kaniesha Coleman. They looked through it
7 thoroughly, re-interviewed the police officers' other
8 witnesses.

9 And then the Police Chief, myself, Ruban
10 Crawly, and other members of the family sat down with
11 MSP and went through the file and MSP reiterated why
12 they came to the same conclusion as DPD. Granted, Mr.
13 Crawly and the family were not satisfied. They
14 rejected the conclusion of DPD. They rejected the
15 conclusion of MSP.

16 But I just want to point out that the
17 Department took very, very, very seriously the
18 suggestion that there has been a mistake made and went
19 to, what I think were extraordinary efforts to check
20 and recheck. These are very difficult cases. It's
21 very, very difficult for the family. But in that
22 particular instance, DPD went far and above and beyond
23 to be sure that no mistakes had been made. I'm not
24 suggesting that that will occur in every single
25 instance, but in that particular instance, Commissioner

1 Boman, it was an extraordinary effort and done in a
2 really, really transparent way.

3 COMMISSIONER BOMAN: Through the Chair, can I
4 ask Corporation Counsel a question?

5 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Commissioner Boman?

6 COMMISSIONER BOMAN: My question then is, is
7 it possible -- I mean, I assume somewhere there was a
8 record kept of this correspondence, this meeting that
9 you described. Is it possible for me to see some kind
10 of summary or transcript, anything of that nature?

11 CORPORATION COUNSEL: You know what, I will
12 ask Chief Bettison what records were kept, what
13 conclusions were drawn, what the written record
14 associates what that actually is and I'll find out.

15 COMMISSIONER BOMAN: Thank you very much.

16 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you.

17 Commissioner Woods and then Commissioner Ivey.

18 COMMISSIONER WOODS: Yeah. And through the
19 Chair. And we were briefed on it -- heavily on it.
20 I'm sure the Department don't have a problem giving you
21 a briefing on it. It doesn't require -- you know, a
22 lot of these antics as it relates to the alleged voting
23 fraud that's supposed happen in the city of Detroit,
24 and being delivered to 45 and 47 and all of that stuff.
25 He said he talked to Donald Trump about it and all his

1 team about it and all that type of stuff.

2 So if you want to take that serious, you
3 know, I wouldn't even get off into those verbal
4 gymnastics when someone wants to say that Detroit is
5 committing voting fraud and then giving it to the
6 President of the United States, and then falling into a
7 political narrative. We're not here to play
8 politatrics. We're here to be able to serve the
9 citizens of Detroit to the best of our knowledge, so I
10 wouldn't get off into that rabbit hole. Just keep your
11 ear open.

12 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Any other
13 commissioners? Commissioner Ivey?

14 COMMISSIONER IVEY: Through the Chair.
15 Corporate Counsel, is it possible that I can get some
16 of that information?

17 CORPORATION COUNSEL: Yes.

18 COMMISSIONER IVEY: Thank you.

19 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Any other comments?
20 Questions? All right. Next, there are no
21 presentations to the Board. Could I have the report
22 from the Board's secretary?

23 SECRETARY: Through the Chair. The documents
24 received as incoming communication are noted on the
25 agenda and are within the -- under the tab. The

1 announcements for this week for the upcoming meetings
2 are: Our next meeting -- the Board's next meeting is
3 next week on Thursday -- I'm sorry. I apologize.
4 Thursday, March 26th, 3 p.m. here at Public Safety
5 Headquarters. The April community meeting is Thursday
6 April 9th 6:30 p.m. in the 9th Precinct, and the
7 location is listed on the agenda. And those are the
8 matters from the board secretary's -- well, the BOPC's
9 office for this week. Thank you.

10 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHE: Thank you.

11 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: Madame Chair?

12 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHE: Yes?

13 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: I just have one
14 followup for the secretary just to make sure this
15 request is on the record. That was a request that came
16 through on Monday requesting an urgent tour of the
17 Crime Scene Services for the commissioners. And there
18 was at least one commissioner that also indicated that
19 they wanted that as well. Is there an update on that?
20 I was hoping to have that earlier this week and we are
21 at Thursday now.

22 SECRETARY: Through the Chair. That request
23 was made immediately to the Chief's office. I spoke
24 with the Chief of Staff and I will followup immediately
25 after this meeting. I do not have an update other than

1 that, but I was told that it would be coordinated and
2 arranged as soon as possible.

3 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: Thank you. Through
4 the Chair. Is it possible just to check and see if the
5 Chief has an update on that?

6 DC BLISS: Through the Chair. I'll check
7 right now.

8 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHE: Thank you. Any
9 other reporting, Madame Secretary?

10 SECRETARY: I'm sorry, Madame Chair, I didn't
11 hear that.

12 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHE: That concludes --

13 SECRETARY: Oh, that concludes the report,
14 yes, ma'am.

15 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHE: Thank you. Under
16 Unfinished Business, there's a motion. Do you want to
17 make that motion Commissioner Camille?

18 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: Thank you, Madame
19 Chair. So this is the motion being brought back from
20 last meeting which was postponed to this meeting. The
21 motion to let the Board submit a memorandum to City
22 Council requesting that they revisit the ordinance
23 related to the release of police video footage and to
24 support the proposed language from CPTA and DAARPO for
25 amending the ordinance.

1 COMMISSIONER BOMAN: Second.

2 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: A motion has been
3 made and seconded. Is there any discussion?
4 Commissioner Woods?

5 COMMISSIONER WOODS: Yes. What is the
6 difference with this ordinance and our policy that we
7 established? I know that we put a policy together as
8 it relates to what our wishes were as a board, last
9 year. And I know we said up to 30 days, you know, in
10 that particular policy. You know, I'm satisfied with
11 our policy without question.

12 If there needs to be some further discussions
13 as it relates to our policy and I'm not trying to
14 dictate to City Council as it relates to what their
15 policies and what ordinances that they want to put out
16 as a city. But you know, I'm happy to take a look at
17 our policy, if there's some room for improvement, but I
18 thought that we came up with a very powerful compromise
19 as it relates to up to 30 days, you know, and put some
20 other languages in there, as well.

21 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Any other comments?
22 Commissioner Watts?

23 COMMISSIONER WATTS: Yes. I just want a
24 clarification. So this would be not demanding City
25 Council? This is just a recommendation, correct? Or

1 asking? It's not a demand, correct?

2 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: Through the Chair.
3 It's not a demand. It's a request for City Council to
4 open back up the ordinance language and consider the
5 language that is being submitted by CPTA. You know, of
6 course, the BOPC, we don't have -- we don't approve
7 ordinances, so this is show of support for the efforts
8 that are being submitted to City Council for their
9 consideration.

10 COMMISSIONER WATTS: (Inaudible) I have
11 another question. So basically, my understanding --
12 because I did read from last Thursday, so I know it
13 says up to 30 days. However, I know with the seven
14 days -- and Commissioner Camille, you can correct me --
15 it does give provisions because sometimes you can't
16 release it in seven days. Could you explain that part?
17 Because I know sometimes you may have the Wayne County
18 Prosecutor that may need more time, or you may have
19 DPOA or anyone. So I think just give clarity on that
20 one. Were there exceptions to the rule of the seven
21 days?

22 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: Thank you. Through
23 the Chair. To Commissioner Watts, that's correct. So
24 the draft does have language in there to allow for an
25 extension of the release of the footage under certain

1 circumstances and through a very specific process.

2 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Any other comments
3 or questions? Before you do, I just want to make one
4 comment. This motion, that you just read does not say
5 consider. It says support the proposed language, so
6 it's stronger than suggesting that you consider the
7 language that is in the DAARPO and CPTA, that they've
8 submitted. So it's not consider, which is what you
9 just said, Commissioner Camille. So I just want to
10 make that clear. That's what the motion says. It says
11 to support. Okay, Commissioner? Yes, go ahead.

12 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: I just wanted to
13 clarify, as I'm reading this, I'm thinking that support
14 is referring to the BOPC supporting, not demanding that
15 City Council support, but that the Board is showing
16 support.

17 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Okay. All right.
18 I'm reading it as City Council. I think I'm
19 interpreting it both ways. Okay. Go ahead,
20 Commissioner Boman.

21 COMMISSIONER BOMAN: Yeah, I was actually at
22 a committee meeting that the City Council held, the
23 meeting at which they voted to move the existing
24 ordinance out of committee with the recommendation of
25 support. And at the time, there were public comments

1 being made, and I was among those making a comment.
2 And I had supported that with the understanding that it
3 was not the final product, but it was a beginning. And
4 Council Member Calloway, who I believe, was the mover
5 to move that forward, had said that it was not perfect;
6 that it needed amendment, but this would at least kind
7 of give it a foothold in the City Council's, you know,
8 cadre of ordinances, that it would get it there, but it
9 would definitely be needing to be amended to actually
10 be stronger and have, basically, fewer loopholes in it.

11 And that was the reason actually many of the
12 other people who -- you know, from CPTA, for instance,
13 objected to it, was because it did not go far enough.
14 And now I'm with them and I'm saying that it does not
15 go far enough with what they have currently on the
16 books. And I think taking Council Member Calloway's
17 lead on this, she did say it needed some amending. And
18 effectively, this is the type of change I think would
19 be appropriate.

20 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Yes, Commissioner
21 woods?

22 COMMISSIONER WOODS: Yeah, I know there was a
23 lawsuit regarding this ordinance; am I correct,
24 Corporation Council? Of what the ordinance -- the
25 original ordinance went in, I think DPA or the Union

1 filed a lawsuit against --

2 CORPORATION COUNSEL: Yeah, that was last
3 year.

4 COMMISSIONER WOODS: Yeah, last year. Yeah,
5 right. So -- what was the resolution?

6 CORPORATION COUNSEL: I think it's still in
7 court.

8 COMMISSIONER WOODS: It's still in court?

9 CORPORATION COUNSEL: Yeah.

10 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Commissioner Carter?

11 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Through the Chair. I
12 finally received the e-mail. My e-mail was wrong on
13 the BOPC website, so I just want to put that out there
14 that I did not receive the e-mail last week. So my
15 only issue is that I have not compared what the City
16 Council Ordinance is and what the People's Ordinance
17 is, so I would like that kind of comparison to take
18 place. If we are to vote today, I would recommend that
19 we just support opening without the People's Ordinance.
20 So supporting opening up the ordinance or reviewing the
21 ordinance or whatever it is, but without the People's
22 Ordinance.

23 So I support opening up -- looking at it
24 again, looking at the ordinance again, but I don't
25 necessarily -- because I want to make an educated

1 decision, I don't necessarily support using the
2 People's Ordinance, so that's my comment.

3 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: Through the Chair?

4 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Commissioner?

5 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: Given what
6 Commissioner Carter has shared and the understanding
7 that commissioners will want to digest this further as
8 well compare to the ordinance that's on the books, I
9 will put forth a motion to postpone to next week.

10 COMMISSIONER WOODS: Second.

11 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Is next week enough
12 time? All right. Go ahead, Commissioner Watts.

13 COMMISSIONER WATTS: Yes, I support it, even
14 though I was ready to move forward today.

15 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay. Commissioner
16 Camille made a motion to postpone this motion, right?
17 And Commissioner Watts seconded?

18 CHAIRPERSON WATTS: No -- oh, yes. Okay.

19 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Or was it
20 Commissioner Carter because you're asking?

21 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Sure.

22 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Sure. Okay.

23 COMMISSIONER WATTS: I said I was ready to go
24 forward today.

25 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay. Commissioner

1 Carter seconded it. Any further discussion?

2 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: Through the Chair?

3 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Yes?

4 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: And we can work out
5 the details on this after. I would like to work with
6 the secretary to make sure that the current language
7 can get pulled down easily for the commissioners and
8 distributed to everyone so everyone has the maximum
9 amount of time to review.

10 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you.

11 Commissioner Woods?

12 COMMISSIONER WOODS: And through the Chair.
13 Can you find out if there's still a pending lawsuit on
14 the ordinance --

15 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: The secretary, we
16 can ask the secretary.

17 COMMISSIONER WOODS: Yeah. Yeah. That's
18 what I think.

19 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay. Madame
20 Secretary, did you get that?

21 SECRETARY: So noted, Madame Chair.

22 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay, thank you.
23 All in favor indicate by sayings aye.

24 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

25 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Opposed? The motion

1 carries, thank you. Under New Business, we have a
2 motion by Commissioner Watts.

3 COMMISSIONER WATTS: Yes, Madame Chair, I'd
4 like to make a motion for the Board of Police
5 Commissioners to approve a request requesting
6 additional funding which is a small stipend increase
7 for the Board of Police Commissioners.

8 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHÉ: No. I'm sorry,
9 there's one other motion.

10 COMMISSIONER WOODS: For your policies.

11 COMMISSIONER WATTS: Oh, polices.

12 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHÉ: We're gonna take
13 that --

14 COMMISSIONER MORRIS: Went straight to the
15 money.

16 COMMISSIONER WATTS: That's Commissioner Al
17 Morris. He made me do it.

18 COMMISSIONER WILLIAMS: He just turned 21, go
19 ahead.

20 COMMISSIONER WATTS: I make the motion to
21 adopt the Policy Directive 203.16 Extreme Risk Order
22 (ERPO) Act.

23 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHÉ: Okay. A motion has
24 been made.

25 COMMISSIONER WOODS: Second.

1 COMMISSIONER CARTER: I'm sorry. Do you have
2 to make a motion? Or is that the direction?

3 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Yeah, it's a
4 recommendation from the committee?

5 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Right.

6 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: So we don't need a
7 second.

8 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Correct.

9 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: So all in favor
10 indicate by saying aye.

11 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

12 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: That motion carries,
13 thank you. Now -- no. We're going into close session.
14 Pursuant to Section 8(1)(a) of the Open Meeting Act
15 MCL15.268(a), the Department's request for the Board to
16 consider administrative leave without pay but with
17 medical benefits for Police Officer Careema Yopp, Badge
18 4360, assigned to the 2nd Precinct.

19 And I need a roll call vote. Do I need that
20 to go into closed session? Okay. I need a motion to
21 go into closed session.

22 COMMISSIONER WOODS: So moved.

23 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: It's been moved by
24 Commissioner woods.

25 COMMISSIONER JONES: Support.

1 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Supported by
2 Commissioner Jones. Any discussion?

3 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Madame Chair?

4 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Yes?

5 COMMISSIONER CARTER: I'm sorry. Are we
6 gonna come back out and go back in for the --

7 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: No.

8 COMMISSIONER CARTER: The audience is -- what
9 I'm asking is, are we gonna discuss both at the same
10 time? So should we --

11 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay. So let me go
12 to the second one and then way we can make one motion
13 to go into close session. So we have a second closed
14 session. Pursuant to Section 8(f) of the Open Meetings
15 Act, MCL15.268(f) Applicant Justin Bognear -- it
16 doesn't say what this close session is for. Madame
17 Secretary?

18 SECRETARY: It's an applicant denial from the
19 Department and an Applicant can appeal. It's a DPD
20 Applicant appeal to the Board to reconsider.

21 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay. So we will do
22 those two sessions. And now I need a motion --

23 PARLIAMENTARIAN: Madame Chair?

24 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Yes, Madame
25 Parliamentarian?

1 PARLIAMENTARIAN: I'm sorry for interrupting.
2 This is the parliamentarian. I just want to make sure
3 that the person from the second closed session is not
4 in the first closed session.

5 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Right.

6 PARLIAMENTARIAN: Even though you're doing
7 one closed session, they cannot be in on that first
8 closed session.

9 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Correct. Yes, we
10 will make sure.

11 PARLIAMENTARIAN: Okay. Thank you.

12 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you. So we
13 will have two closed sessions. The first one and only
14 those individuals that are involved in that closed
15 session will be here in this room. And then the second
16 one will be a separate one. So a motion to go into
17 closed session.

18 COMMISSIONER WOODS: So moved.

19 COMMISSIONER JONES: Support.

20 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: It's been moved by
21 Commissioner Woods, seconded by Commissioner Jones.
22 All in favor indicate by saying aye.

23 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

24 (Closed sessions at 4:55 p.m.
25 commenced at 6:00 p.m.)

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CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: I'd like to return to open session and call the meeting to order. May I have the roll call please, Madame Secretary?

SECRETARY: Commissioner Dewaelsche?

CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Present.

SECRETARY: Commissioner Boman?

COMMISSIONER BOMAN: Present.

SECRETARY: Commissioner Camille?

COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: Present.

SECRETARY: Commissioner Carter?

COMMISSIONER CARTER: Here.

SECRETARY: Commissioner Ivey?

COMMISSIONER IVEY: Present.

SECRETARY: Commissioner Jones?

COMMISSIONER JONES: Present.

SECRETARY: Commissioner Morris?

COMMISSIONER MORRIS: Present.

SECRETARY: Commissioner Watts?

COMMISSIONER WATTS: Present.

SECRETARY: Commissioner Williams?

COMMISSIONER WILLIAMS: Present.

SECRETARY: Ten present, Madame Chair.

CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you. As it relates to the first closed session, which was the

1 Department's request for the Board to consider
2 administrative leave without pay, but with medical
3 benefits for Police Officer Careema Yopp, Badge 4360
4 assigned to the 2nd Precinct. What is the pleasure of
5 the Board? Commissioner Boman?

6 COMMISSIONER BOMAN: Yeah. I would move to
7 deny the Chief's recommendation to suspend without pay.

8 COMMISSIONER MORRIS: Second.

9 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: We don't need a
10 motion. All we need is for there not to be a motion,
11 just so you know.

12 COMMISSIONER WOODS: He could.

13 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: I mean, you could
14 still do it if you want. Okay. A motion has been made
15 to deny the request made of the Chief by Commissioner
16 Boman. Seconded by Commissioner Morris. All in favor
17 indicate by saying aye.

18 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

19 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: The motion carries
20 to deny the recommendation of the Chief. Our second
21 session is related to Applicant Justin Bognear. And
22 he's appealing to the Board for reconsideration of his
23 application. What is the pleasure of the Board? We do
24 need a motion.

25 COMMISSIONER BOMAN: And we do need a motion.

1 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Yeah, we do need a
2 motion.

3 COMMISSIONER CARTER: No, you don't. There's
4 no action.

5 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Right. It'd be the
6 same. Did you want to make a motion?

7 COMMISSIONER BOMAN: Sure. I'd like to move
8 to grant the appeal.

9 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: There's no second.
10 So the motion fails.

11 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Madame Chair, I move
12 for adjournment.

13 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: No, we have one more
14 item.

15 MS. UNDERWOOD: The Parliamentarian is on the
16 phone.

17 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay. Go ahead,
18 Madame Parliamentarian.

19 PARLIAMENTARIAN: Yes?

20 SECRETARY: You asked to be heard?

21 PARLIAMENTARIAN: Can you hear me now?

22 SECRETARY: Yes.

23 PARLIAMENTARIAN: Okay. All right. When you
24 came back, I was not on the panel. I was trying to
25 interrupt, but I couldn't do it.

1 SECRETARY: Dr. Jackson, one second.

2 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay. I understand
3 I understand. We needed a two-thirds vote for the
4 second one.

5 COMMISSIONER WOODS: No, it failed.

6 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: It failed?

7 COMMISSIONER WOODS: Yeah.

8 CORPORATION COUNSEL: What is she saying?
9 Just put it on speaker on your phone.

10 SECRETARY: We attempted to put her on
11 speaker, but she has background noise. They're trying
12 to elevate her to panelist on Zoom as she was before
13 closing.

14 MS. UNDERWOOD: Can you speak, Dr. Jackson?

15 COMMISSIONER WOODS: Through the Chair. Mr.
16 Attorney, those two solid --

17 CORPORATION COUNSEL: I would defer to -- is
18 she on the phone? Give the phone to the Chair.

19 PARLIAMENTARIAN: Do you want me to come off
20 speaker?

21 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: We wanted to hear
22 what your opinion was of the two.

23 PARLIAMENTARIAN: Okay. So the motion to
24 deny the Chief's recommendation is not an order. If
25 you don't want anything, then that is the proper

1 (inaudible) don't want to adopt the Chief's
2 recommendation.

3 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHE: Okay.

4 PARLIAMENTARIAN: But a motion to deny the
5 Chief's recommendation, it is not in order. The proper
6 action would be to do nothing. Don't make any motion
7 and that will take care of itself. Okay?

8 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHE: Yes. I have it.

9 PARLIAMENTARIAN: Then if you do it today,
10 then you might do it again.

11 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHE: Okay. We were not
12 to make a motion to deny the Chief's recommendation,
13 just no action is how we -- you know, not accept it.
14 We will not do that in the future because it's not
15 proper. Okay. Commissioner Boman?

16 COMMISSIONER BOMAN: I think the second thing
17 you said may have answered my question. I just want it
18 to be clear. So currently, it will be on the record?
19 Or will we somehow make it as if it didn't happen? So
20 I'm not quite sure how that works.

21 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHE: I think we need to
22 just withdraw the motion, I guess. Withdraw the motion
23 -- what is your question?

24 COMMISSIONER BOMAN: I mean, because if I
25 made the motion and it hadn't been seconded, it belongs

1 to me and I can withdraw it.

2 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHE: Right.

3 COMMISSIONER BOMAN: But if it's been
4 seconded, then it belongs to the Body and the Body
5 voted on it, so that's why I'm trying to figure out
6 parliamentary wise what happens.

7 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHE: But it's not a
8 proper motion, so we have to withdraw both motions, is
9 what I'm hearing. It was not proper. We were not to
10 vote at all. If you don't make a motion, it's
11 inaction, that means it is not accepted.

12 COMMISSIONER BOMAN: I guess I could do it as
13 a motion to reconsider?

14 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHE: No. I think we just
15 need to withdraw both motions.

16 COMMISSIONER BOMAN: So I move to withdraw
17 both out-of-order motions?

18 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHE: Thank you.
19 Seconded?

20 COMMISSIONER JONES: Second.

21 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHE: Okay. It's been
22 moved and seconded that we withdraw the motions that
23 were made, the improper motions. All those in favor
24 indicate by saying aye.

25 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

1 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: I abstain, because I
2 don't understand what we just did.

3 COMMISSIONER WATTS: Madame Chair, I abstain.

4 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay. The final
5 item under New Business, Commissioner Watts.

6 COMMISSIONER WATTS: Madame Chair, I would
7 like to make a motion for the Board of Police
8 Commissioners to approve requesting additional funds
9 for fiscal year '27 for a monthly stipend to be
10 increased per month to \$1,130 for police commissioners
11 and appointed commissioners an increase for \$1,064.95
12 for the chairperson of the board. That's the motion.

13 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: A motion has been
14 made. Is there a second?

15 COMMISSIONER WILLIAMS: Second.

16 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay. A motion was
17 made by Commissioner Watts, seconded by Commissioner
18 Williams. Is there any discussion?

19 COMMISSIONER BOMAN: Yeah, point of order.

20 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Commissioner Boman?

21 COMMISSIONER BOMAN: Yeah, I just want to
22 know -- we got Corporation Counsel here. He may
23 already know the answer. Is it ethical and legal for
24 us to vote on our own stipend?

25 COMMISSIONER WATTS: It's just a request.

1 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: It's just a request.
2 We're not approving it for ourselves. It's a request
3 to City Council.

4 COMMISSIONER WATTS: And Madame Chair, since
5 it's discussion. This request, I understand passes
6 have been made several times, but just for the record,
7 the last time stipend was increased, I'm told is 2012.

8 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: 14 years ago. Okay,
9 any other discussion?

10 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: Through the Chair?

11 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Yes.

12 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: I'm supportive of the
13 motion and the request for this request to go forward
14 to City Council. And I understand that we're on a
15 timeline, which is why this is being brought forward
16 today. I would have liked to -- because the community,
17 the public, they're our boss. We work for them. I
18 would have liked to have the opportunity to get some
19 feedback from the community about what they thought
20 about this. But understanding that we are on a
21 timeline, I am, you know, good with moving forward.

22 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you. Any
23 other comments?

24 COMMISSIONER WATTS: Yes, through the Chair.

25 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Go ahead,

1 Commissioner.

2 COMMISSIONER WATTS: Thank you, Commissioner
3 Camille. And through the Chair. Some of us, this was
4 requested well over a month or two ago, so there was a
5 time when of course -- the financing budget, you know,
6 I think there was a difference in how the process would
7 go forth. And to this point now, as I'm told and since
8 we do have our budget hearing next week, this is where
9 the short notice came in.

10 So again, I have the same sentiment of the
11 commissioners. We always want to be transparent and
12 always want to make sure that we have the voice of the
13 people. But I can tell you and City Council -- a
14 couple of members here on City Council and some of the
15 people have already been before the City Council and
16 the Mayor's office stating the same. Not an amount,
17 but, you know, just stating increasing or requesting
18 that.

19 COMMISSIONER IVEY: Through the Chair? I
20 want to hover over that because it's the same in my
21 community, it's been asked that it happens.

22 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: If I may add, since
23 2012, it's been requested 3 or 4 times. Commissioner
24 Bell used to request it almost every other year. So
25 just so you know, it's not the first time we brought

1 this before the community.

2 COMMISSIONER WOODS: Yeah. And my
3 understanding, you guys had a budget hearing yesterday
4 and this came up during there. And you had the
5 opportunity for public comment during that time?

6 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: No. No. This was
7 not yesterday. It was a budget working session,
8 preparing for Monday's --

9 COMMISSIONER WOODS: Oh, it was a working
10 session. Okay. All right.

11 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: But we've had budget
12 hearings throughout the past couple months.

13 COMMISSIONER WATTS: Through the Chair. Just
14 a reminder, that when it goes forward, we don't know if
15 it'll be approved. Like he said, (inaudible) several
16 times in the past and no increase has happened since
17 2012.

18 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: No.

19 COMMISSIONER WATTS: Be assured, the public
20 will have an opportunity to weigh in at that time.
21 This is just simply a request.

22 COMMISSIONER WOODS: For sure.

23 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Any other questions
24 or comments? All those in favor indicate by saying
25 aye.

1 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

2 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Opposed? The motion
3 carries unanimously.

4 COMMISSIONER WOODS: Motion to adjourn?

5 DC BLISS: Madame Chair?

6 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Yes?

7 DC BLISS: Earlier, there was a question
8 regarding when Sergeant Wagner retired from the
9 department. I have that information for you and the
10 Board. It was December 1, 2017, and it was a
11 full-service retirement.

12 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you. Thank
13 you, kindly. All right. Motion to adjourn made by
14 everyone. Any discussion? All those in favor indicate
15 by saying aye.

16 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

17 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Opposed? The motion
18 carries. Thank you everyone for being here.
