3 COMMISSIONER WATTS: The meeting the
4 officially called to order. We immediately go into --
5 and welcome everyone. We immediately go into --

6 PARLIAMENTARIAN: Madame Chair, please
7 announce that there is no quorum.

8 COMMISSIONER WATTS: Yes, there is no quorum,
9 as everyone can tell. Hopefully, we will have a quorum
10 shortly. But we're gonna proceed right now with the
11 meeting. We'll go right into invocation. I want to
12 introduce via Zoom Chaplin Kirk Goodlow. Are you
13 there?

14 CHAPLIN: Yes, ma'am. I am here.

15 COMMISSIONER WATTS: Thank you so much.
16 Please proceed with the invocation.

17 CHAPLIN: First of all, I'd like to thank the
18 entire Board and Sister Underwood for the opportunities
19 that you have given to the chaplain core. Are all
20 hearts and minds clear for prayer?

21 COMMISSIONERS: Yes.

22 CHAPLIN: Oh precious Father, eternal
23 heavens, we thank you for this beautiful day you have
24 made. Let us rejoice and be glad in it. We thank you
25 Eternal Father for all the participants on this call

1 this afternoon. We ask, oh God, that you would bring
2 blessings for the Detroit Board of Police
3 Commissioners, the mayor of our great city, and to the
4 entire Detroit Police Department, and the citizens of
5 this great community. We ask, oh Father, all parties
6 continue to stand underneath your grace and mercy do
7 all things decently and in order as we move our great
8 city forward. Beloved, let us have the heart of a
9 servant and let us love one another as our Father has
10 loved us.

11 From the rising of the sun to the going down
12 the same, the God we pay homage to this afternoon is
13 worthy to be praised. So God we thank you for being a
14 God of comfort. We will wait on the Lord as he will
15 strengthen our hearts and our hands. We shall continue
16 to praise his precious name and give all glory and
17 honor and praise to him. It is in Jesus's name that we
18 pray, let us all say amen. Amen. And thank God.

19 COMMISSIONER WATTS: Thank you so much. At
20 this time, we're gonna have the introduction of the
21 commissioners. Board Secretary, please call the roll.

22 PARLIAMENTARIAN: No, ma'am. Not without a
23 quorum.

24 SECRETARY: Madame Chair, without a quorum,
25 we need to move to public comment.

1 COMMISSIONER WATTS: We will move to public
2 comment until we have a quorum.

3 MS. UNDERWOOD: We'll bring up the clock in
4 just a moment.

5 COMMISSIONER WATTS: Do we have anyone in the
6 room who wishes to speak?

7 MS. UNDERWOOD: Ms. Williams, since you're
8 here, and then we'll go into Zoom.

9 PUBLIC: I'm ready. You guys ready?

10 COMMISSIONER WATTS: Good afternoon, yes.

11 PUBLIC: Okay, hi. I've been complaining
12 about a lot of illegally activities, especially about
13 police officers and my life being in danger every day.
14 Members of the Detroit Police Department endangering my
15 life. I reported this over a year ago. Houston, it's
16 Cheryl, but the bottom line is they live underneath me.
17 I stay at 628 Delaware. I'm not on no type of drugs,
18 period, so whatever's in my system is gonna come
19 through my hair follicles.

20 LaShonda Houston's daughter continue to
21 reconcile my apartment. Tampering with my food.
22 Anything that goes into my system is attempted murder.
23 She violated me. Whatever kind of drugs she put in my
24 system for her to tint my eyebrows, cut my hair, and
25 violate my vagina, it's an issue. And I want to know

1 why this has not been addressed, all my complaints and
2 reports at the 3rd. Houston works there. This is not
3 acceptable. And I come here all the time talking about
4 the corruption of the Detroit Police Department, but
5 when you violated my body like that and I couldn't hear
6 nothing, it's an issue, clearly. And this woman act
7 like it's okay, to come in somebody's apartment, home
8 invasion, attempted murder and violate my body,
9 absolutely not.

10 And I hear it every day -- LaShonda Houston
11 getting on her daughter behind all the time
12 complaining. I told you to leave her alone. But see,
13 the thing about it, she shouldn't even be on the force
14 with a fake name. I'm tired of this. All my
15 reports -- like I said, if you're not reporting these
16 reports -- it's illegal. They gonna make sure -- my
17 attorney's gonna make sure of this. I've been coming
18 here for three years complaining about a whole lot of
19 stuff. Thank you very much and have a wonderful day.
20 I got -- oh, and don't forget about Tim who work down
21 at the 3rd, the man that raped me, with the bad eye.

22 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: Madame Chair?

23 COMMISSIONER WATTS: I think your microphone
24 is off.

25 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: Through the Chair? I

1 know Ms. Williams is here frequently. But just
2 gathering what I'm hearing from her today, it sounds
3 like more recent allegations of harm? So I just want
4 to make sure that she's had an opportunity to file a
5 police report on any of those allegations, that those
6 are in system and that DPD has received them.

7 PUBLIC: When I went, the officer told me --

8 COMMISSIONER IVEY: Can you step up to the
9 mic? Ms. Williams, can you step up to the mic?

10 PUBLIC: Okay, yes. Because I make reports
11 all the time. So when I went around to the 3rd to make
12 that complaint -- no, not a complaint, criminal report,
13 she told me -- the woman at the desk, she told me she
14 wasn't going to take my report. And I was very polite

15 I said: Yes, you are.

16 She said: Why?

17 I said: Because Chief Warfield said I can
18 come anywhere the city and make a report, so you gonna
19 tell me -- this happened to me, and you gonna tell me
20 that I don't know what I'm talking about? Your job is
21 to do your job, keep your personal opinions to yourself
22 and document it. And I wanted to make sure that you
23 she understood if you did not put in it in correct way
24 and put it under general, you're gonna be held
25 accountable, too, on a legal perspective, so

1 absolutely.

2 COMMISSIONER WATTS: Thank you, Chief, would
3 you have someone speak with her again today? And make
4 sure, because she has a right to file a report. This
5 is something that probably wasn't covered before. Just
6 make sure everything that she has, any accusations or
7 something that they covered in their report.

8 DEPUTY: Absolutely.

9 COMMISSIONER IVEY: Thank you for that,
10 Chief. I was gonna ask the same question.

11 MS. UNDERWOOD: Thank you, Madame Chair.
12 We'll go into Zoom, if there is anyone else in the
13 audience who would like to make a comment?

14 COMMISSIONER WATTS: And even after we have
15 individuals on Zoom, if anyone is still in the room
16 before we close out board presentations and would like
17 to speak, please let us know.

18 MS. UNDERWOOD: So we have three speakers on
19 Zoom. Our speaker will be Ms. Gadson, former
20 Commissioner William Davis and Bridget.

21 COMMISSIONER WATTS: Caller, are you there?

22 MS. UNDERWOOD: I'll go to the next caller --
23 we do have a Lieutenant Mark Young in the audience, and
24 then we'll work on that Zoom caller.

25 LT. YOUNG: Good evening. I'm gonna be

1 brief. I just want to say something. It's been some
2 interesting times lately, but I've never been prouder
3 to be a member of the Detroit Police Department,
4 because even in the darkness, the greatest leaders
5 shine. You see a few stories, and that's what they
6 are. You see a few incidents, and that's what they
7 are. But I've never been prouder of the men and women
8 that I see step up every day.

9 See, when I was a kid, I was a fan of the
10 Avengers and the Justice League. I get to be one. I
11 get to work with one, and no matter what comes at us,
12 we gonna shine brighter. I represent some awesome
13 people. The reason I wanted to be on the Detroit
14 Police Department is for the heros that I got to know,
15 work with, love, respect, value and appreciate. It's
16 some awesome people out there every day and no matter
17 what negativity is said, they gonna shine brighter,
18 brighter, brighter, and rise higher, higher, and
19 higher.

20 PARLIAMENTARIAN: Madame Chair, do you know
21 where Commissioner Jones is because if he comes back,
22 we have a quorum.

23 COMMISSIONER WATTS: Yes. I don't know
24 exactly where he is. He's in the hall somewhere.

25 PARLIAMENTARIAN: Okay.

1 COMMISSIONER WATTS: But exactly where he is,
2 I have no idea, but I assume he's gonna be back
3 momentarily. Because you're correct, we do have a
4 quorum with Commissioner Bowman arriving.

5 MS. UNDERWOOD: We'll ask former Commissioner
6 William Davis to speak.

7 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Good afternoon, can I be
8 heard?

9 COMMISSIONER WATTS: Yes. We can hear you.

10 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: I'm pleased to see that
11 there are so many out there today. Frequently, in the
12 past, you know, I used to be a member that never
13 missed. And I used to enjoy the fact that I was able
14 to do that. But of course, I was already retired. I
15 did 34 years with the city, you know, with the water
16 department. And I'd like to encourage people that may
17 be listening -- this is a little bit away from general
18 comments.

19 But in general, I'd like to encourage those
20 that can, make the democratic convention this weekend.
21 Of course, I will be there, especially for Saturday. I
22 think Saturday and Sunday are outstanding days. I'm
23 going to the women's lunch. We're gonna have the
24 former Vice President there. And on Sunday, we're
25 gonna be possibly voting to be the democratic people on

1 primary ballot for Attorney General, Secretary of
2 State, Board of Governors for Wayne State -- that's
3 where I graduated from -- U of M and Michigan state.

4 You know, it's good that we can get more
5 people to be more politically active. You don't have
6 to be a democrat. I'm a democrat, and I'm on a couple
7 of executive boards for being that. But we need more
8 of the Detroiters to vote that way we can possibly get
9 more funds coming into our city. The more funds we got
10 coming to our city, the more stuff we can work on to
11 improve things to help lower our crime rate. All in
12 all, it would just be good to get more working. As a
13 city (inaudible) retired, I want more people to work.
14 I want more people paying taxes so that perhaps, one
15 day, the city will be able to repay my pension cut, my
16 yearly, my cost of living. Y'all have a great day,
17 young people.

18 COMMISSIONER WATTS: Thank you. Commissioner
19 Davis, it's always glad to hear from you. Next caller?

20 PARLIAMENTARIAN: You can call the meeting to
21 order now, Madame Chair. You have a quorum.

22 COMMISSIONER WATTS: I like the gavel. The
23 meeting is officially called to order. We now have a
24 quorum. We will go right into the introduction of
25 commissioners. Is our board secretary available or

1 anyone to take the role?

2 SECRETARY: Thank you, Madame Chair. Of
3 course we know the Chair Dewaelsche is excused. Vice
4 Chair Woods, on his way. Commissioner Ivey?

5 COMMISSIONER IVEY: Present.

6 SECRETARY: Commissioner Williams?

7 COMMISSIONER WILLIAMS: Present.

8 SECRETARY: Commissioner Morris?

9 Commissioner Boman?

10 COMMISSIONER BOMAN: Present.

11 SECRETARY: Commissioner Watts?

12 COMMISSIONER WATTS: Here.

13 SECRETARY: Commissioner Carter is excused.

14 Commissioner Camille.

15 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: Present.

16 SECRETARY: Commissioner Jones?

17 COMMISSIONER JONES: Present.

18 SECRETARY: We have a quorum.

19 COMMISSIONER WATTS: Thank you. Now, could I

20 get approval of the April 16, 2026, agenda. Can I have

21 a motion?

22 COMMISSIONER WILLIAMS: To be moved.

23 COMMISSIONERS: Support.

24 COMMISSIONER WATTS: Any discussion? All in

25 favor?

1 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

2 COMMISSIONER WATTS: Any opposed? Motion
3 carries. Now, can I have a motion for approval of the
4 minutes of April 9, 2026?

5 COMMISSIONERS: So moved. Second.

6 COMMISSIONER WATTS: Any discussion? All in
7 favor?

8 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

9 COMMISSIONER WATTS: Any opposed? Motion
10 carries. Now, we'll have a introduction of the BOPC
11 staff, Chief of Police, elected officials,
12 representatives and community leaders.

13 SECRETARY: Thank you, Madame Chair. We have
14 with us this evening, of course is our Parliamentarian,
15 Dr. Francis Jackson, Teresa Blossom, Dior Mathis,
16 Candace Hayes, Ms. Joshua, Mary Barber, Ms. Tyson, Drew
17 Fries, BOPC Investigator Jerome Warfield, Sr., Senior
18 Investigator Giana Colter, Katrina Patillo, DPD HR
19 Director. Deputy Chief Kari Sloan. Our court is
20 Hanson Court Reporting. Audio by Enrique Jackson and
21 audio by Charles Henry. We have Ms. Maria Overall,
22 administrative assistant to State Representative Tyrone
23 Carter. Is Ms. Fredia Butler here? Of course, Lt.
24 Mark Young from the Lieutenant and Sergeant
25 Association, former Commissioner William Davis, and

1 former Commissioner Ricardo Moore, and Ron Thomas Vice
2 President of the Detroit Police Officer's Association.
3 Thank you, Madame Chair.

4 COMMISSIONER WOODS: What point we at now?

5 PARLIAMENTARIAN: Chair's report.

6 COMMISSIONER WOODS: The Chair's report.

7 Okay. The Chair does not have a report at this time
8 particular time. Oh, we do have a report. We had a
9 resolution. Do we have the resolution?

10 COMMISSIONER WATTS: Commissioner Williams.

11 COMMISSIONER WOODS: Commissioner Williams,
12 if you could read the first and second and then the
13 last clause?

14 COMMISSIONER WILLIAMS: All right. This is a
15 resolution honoring Virtual Patrol Operator Weston
16 Tatem, posthumously. Whereas, Virtual Patrol Operator
17 Weston Tatem began his career with the Detroit Police
18 Department on March 25, 2019. DPO Tatem began his
19 tenure as a traffic control operator and went on to
20 serve in a variety of critical roles, including
21 specialized transportation services assistance,
22 telecommunications operator, emergency services
23 deployment operator, office manager assistant, and most
24 recently as virtual patrol operator, demonstrating
25 versatility, commitment, and a strong sense of duty.

1 And resolve that the Detroit Board of Police
2 Commissioners hereby honor the life, legacy, and
3 service of Virtual Patrol Officer Weston Tatem and
4 expresses its deepest condolences to his family,
5 friends, and colleagues during this time of loss. I
6 ask for this resolution to be passed.

7 COMMISSIONER BOMAN: Second.

8 COMMISSIONER WOODS: A motion's been made by
9 Commissioner Williams and seconded by Commissioner
10 Boman. Any discussion? All in favor say aye.

11 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

12 COMMISSIONER WOODS: Anyone opposed? The
13 motion is carried. We're gonna go to the Chief of
14 Police's report, Deputy Chief Kari Sloan.

15 DC Sloan: To the Chair to the Board. Thank
16 you for having me here today to represent the chief of
17 police. I'll start with some crime stats. Today we
18 are down 7 percent in homicides. We are down
19 20 percent in nonfatal shootings, that's almost 20
20 incidents less with nonfatal shootings. We are also
21 seeing a decrease in robberies and total Part 1
22 violent -- total Part 1 property crime, we're down
23 11 percent. As the board knows that this is a focus of
24 the department right now with our Property Crimes Unit.
25 I just wanted to update on a fatal shooting

1 where we did have charges filed. On April 3, 2026 at
2 approximately 10:40 p.m., DPD was dispatched to the
3 12700-block of Roselawn for a fatal shooting. Upon
4 arrival, officers observed a 24-year-old victim who
5 have fatally wounded. Preliminary circumstances
6 revealed that shots were fired after an argument.
7 Homicide detectives identified and detained a
8 33-year-old suspect, Tyrone Carswell. On April 9th,
9 Suspect Carswell was arrested by the Tax Services
10 Section -- excuse me, he wasn't arrested until the 9th.
11 A warrant was prepared and submitted. On April 12,
12 2026, Defendant Carswell was arraigned on first-degree
13 murder and felony firearm charges. Property
14 crimes arrests have led to guns taken from felons in
15 the 11th Precinct. Officers were investigating a
16 scrapping complaint at an abandoned building on the
17 4700-block of East Outer Drive. Officers identified a
18 home in the area where materials from the building were
19 being taken. A search warrant was executed and
20 resulted in one arrest and recovery of the evidence of
21 the scrapping and two firearms and ammunition. On
22 April 12th, the suspect, who was a convicted felon was
23 arraigned on gun charges.

24 On some community updates, Hoop Dreams Shoe
25 Drive, April 15, 2026, the Detroit PAL League and

1 Local 4 News partner together to host Hoop Dreams Shoe
2 Drives across the city by donating new and gently used
3 shoes. The shoe drive collected more than 264 pairs of
4 shoes and \$3,000 in donations. Hooping with Cops is
5 currently registering boys for their 2026 season. This
6 is free youth recreational basketball league in
7 partnership with Detroit PAL and Detroit Parks and
8 Recreation. The season runs from March 30th to
9 June 13th, with games being played at Detroit PAL
10 Recreation Center. Parents can register their children
11 by calling 313-833-1600. That's 313-833-1600.

12 And the 9th Precinct is still conducting
13 their prom dress pickup over there on Gratiot. Girls
14 can pick out any of the gently used prom dress, shoes,
15 and accessories. There's various sizes and styles
16 available. On April 18th and 25th pickup is available
17 at the 9th Precinct located at 1187 Gratiot from 12
18 until 3.

19 On Saturday April 18, 2026, from 11:00 a.m.
20 to 1:00 p.m., Chief Bettison will join other local
21 chiefs and the Board of Police Commissioners Youth
22 Advisory Board Panel. This free event will take place
23 at Wayne County Community College's northwest campus at
24 8200 Outer Drive. And that concludes the report.

25 COMMISSIONER WOODS: Okay. Commissioner?

1 COMMISSIONER WATTS: Yes. Thank you, Chair.
2 Question for you -- hopefully my mic is working. Thank
3 you for that report. After this past weekend, I
4 received -- and probably some other commissioners -- a
5 lot of inquiries and I receive a lot of calls about the
6 drag racing that appeared in a lot of different parts
7 of the city this weekend. There was a lot of drag
8 racing, particularly on the area of 14th and McGraw. I
9 hear it went on to, like, 3:00 a.m. That's what most
10 of my calls centered around. I know as recently as
11 even today, a press conference releasing and talking
12 about the strategy, you know, with community
13 involvement. And for the sake of the public who really
14 experienced a lot of drag racing throughout the city
15 this previous weekend, could you really go over again
16 what the strategy is to address that?

17 DC SLOAN: Absolutely, ma'am. We have
18 details specifically designated for drag racing events.
19 We follow those that coordinate the events and try to
20 work with them to have them cancel events. But if
21 events do pop up, we are working to move the cars out
22 of the area. We often ticket spectators and those who
23 participate in drag racing. But overall, it is
24 something that we've been working very diligently on
25 over the past several years. We've been successful in

1 seeing less and less events, but it does pop up from
2 time to time, but we do have dedicated officers for
3 that.

4 COMMISSIONER WATTS: Any preventative
5 messages that's gonna be going out now? Because we're
6 still into spring -- early spring before we get to
7 summer to get that message across.

8 DC SLOAN: Through the Chair. Yes, ma'am, we
9 do post that on social media and put out the public
10 service announcements, but we can start that up.

11 COMMISSIONER WATTS: Thank you.

12 COMMISSIONER IVEY: Through the Chair?

13 COMMISSIONER WOODS: Yes?

14 COMMISSIONER IVEY: Thank you for that
15 report. I have a question for you. There was an
16 incident that took place on April the 4th in the area
17 of West McNichols and Telegraph, which is District 1.
18 There was an officer who was placed on administrative
19 duties. I wanted to know about the body cam footage.
20 Although the public did get a chance to view the
21 footage from the incident that happened from the
22 resident, has that body cam footage from the officer in
23 pursuit of this individual who broke curfew and then
24 ran into the residence, how is that being handled? Or
25 is that available for myself to view?

1 DC SLOAN: Through the Chair. Ma'am, I can
2 certainly arrange for that for you. The body worn
3 camera is automatically uploaded. And if that is a
4 Command-level investigation, they're review that. If
5 it's an investigation that's occurring at professional
6 standards, then they would be reviewing that,
7 conducting that investigation.

8 COMMISSIONER IVEY: I appreciate it. Second
9 question. This is to the Chief or Chief Warfield, I
10 have a complaint number that I received from one of
11 these citizens and I was wondering if I could get that
12 to you and you could give me some update on what's
13 going on with that situation. Thank you.

14 COMMISSIONER WOODS: He's your staff. You
15 can you call him any time.

16 COMMISSIONER IVEY: Yes, sir. Thank you.

17 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: Through the Chair. Am
18 I being heard through the microphone now? Okay.
19 Perfect. Thank you. Through the Chair to the Chief.
20 So a couple items to follow up on here. Last week I
21 requested for arrangements to shadow or do a ride along
22 with the Techs and Crime Scene Services. And I've
23 since spoken with the Chief to follow up on that
24 request, but I've yet been reached out to to arrange
25 for these logistics. Do you happen to have an update

1 on that request?

2 DC SLOAN: Through the Chair. Yes, ma'am, we
3 did submit the responses to the Chief's office. I
4 believe that should be sent to the board shortly, but I
5 can certainly work with you to get that arranged.

6 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: Okay. Thank you so
7 much. The next item I have is that request a that the
8 entire board be immediately notified upon DPD learning
9 of the arrest of any DPD member by any agency. We're
10 hearing about these things down the line. And as
11 oversight, we should be notified as soon as DPD is
12 aware.

13 DEPUTY: Through the Chair. Yes, ma'am.

14 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: Two more items here.
15 This couples up from time to time when a DPD officer
16 causes harm to a member of the public, understandably,
17 members are calling for accountability, commissioners
18 are calling for accountability. And on the surface,
19 for those outside of these processes, it can seem
20 pretty straight forward to ask for a termination of
21 officers, you know, in an attempt to make sure that
22 they're not in a position to cause harm again. And in
23 actuality, it's not that simple. There are union
24 contracts at play. Arbitrators play a roll in the
25 ultimate outcomes of these situations. So I'm calling

1 for us to schedule, as early as next week, a joint
2 educational presentation with DPD on this topic, so
3 that as commissioners we are on the same page and
4 understand what that process looks like and that the
5 community is also educated on the matter to assist with
6 conversations like these going forward.

7 DC SLOAN: Through the Chair. I will
8 absolutely make sure that happens.

9 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: And then finally, I am
10 also calling for the public release of the body cam
11 footage from the incident of Tracey Allen when she was
12 shoot by DPD as soon as it's legally allowable, the
13 full unedited video of that. That's all I have, Mr.
14 Chair.

15 COMMISSIONER WOODS: Commissioner Boman?

16 COMMISSIONER BOMAN: Yeah, I had a couple of
17 questions. The first one was the incident of the a
18 residence of the house that was punched out and it got
19 on social media. Commissioner Ivey also had already
20 brought this up. And I just wanted to get a couple
21 things cleared up. Has anyone filed a complaint
22 regarding that occurrence?

23 DC SLOAN: Through the Chair. I'm not aware
24 if a citizen complaint was filed in at that case.

25 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Through the Chair. To

1 my knowledge, no complaint has been filed.

2 COMMISSIONER BOMAN: Thank you. The second
3 is whether or not it's currently being looked at by
4 internal affairs?

5 DC SLOAN: Through the Chair. I know that
6 Professional Standards is here. He may be able to
7 answer that. Commander McGinnis.

8 CMDR. MCGINNIS: Through the Chair. Michael
9 McGinnis. April 4th, I think is the date I heard.
10 From what I heard, I don't believe it's something my
11 office is involved in.

12 COMMISSIONER BOMAN: Thank you.

13 CMDR. MCGINNIS: I can follow up, though, if
14 I have some more information. I can get with the
15 commissioner after the meeting.

16 COMMISSIONER BOMAN: Okay. Thank you.

17 COMMISSIONER WOODS: That's it?

18 COMMISSIONER BOMAN: Yes.

19 COMMISSIONER WOODS: Okay, thank you. That's
20 it, okay. I would like to go to oral communications.

21 MS. UNDERWOOD: Thank you, Mr. Chair.

22 COMMISSIONER WOODS: Yes ma'am, thank you.

23 MS. UNDERWOOD: Did we have anyone in the
24 audience? I know we have Mr. Foster and then we'll
25 have Mr. Ruben Crowley, and then we'll go into Zoom.

1 COMMISSIONER WOODS: Thank you.

2 MS. UNDERWOOD: If you just give us a moment
3 to bring up the clock. You can walk to it, but just
4 give us a moment to bring the clock up.

5 PUBLIC: All right. Through the Board of
6 Commissioners. Just a few things. For you guys that
7 are taking into account officers conduct, I think that
8 you have to take into account that they're human as
9 well, so a lot of the issue that is they face here, the
10 community face. And the stresses are equal, they just
11 have a badge and a gun. So I would just ask that prior
12 to ending someone's son's career, give him counselling,
13 therapy, and maybe a psychological exam to see if
14 they're culpable or not to go back out there before you
15 render those decisions.

16 Secondly, nobody is talking about civil
17 rights. It is important. When I had an incident at
18 Motor City Casino -- MGM, rather. I know they bring a
19 lot of money into the city. The police is working
20 there, whether it's on the inside or on the outside,
21 and they assisting me. But in the process of assisting
22 me, they did something outside of policy. They took my
23 ID and they handed it to a third party. The third
24 party entered a lien onto my vehicle. So when I was
25 out of town and a relative drove my vehicle down there,

1 they were harassed inside the casino based on a
2 misinterpretation of whoever it is or whatever was
3 going on. And I only say that is to say that the
4 police had a role in that.

5 So moving forward, I'd like to know what is
6 their policy whether it's involving civil issues or
7 third parties. And if they can just allow the third
8 parties to go purchase a report like the citizens have
9 to do to get the information that they like to get. I
10 appreciate SGT. Harper. I see her a lot as an MPO on
11 the east side. Great job, very visual. I have a lot
12 more to say, but just for the purpose of the
13 commissioners sitting up there, I'm making a complaint
14 about what I saw on TV so you guys can move forward
15 with that. We can stand on the side. You can take
16 both of these complaints. But it's gonna be
17 accountable. If the community don't stand up, I'm
18 making a complaint for what I saw. Thank you.

19 COMMISSIONER WOODS: You can see our staff
20 members back there. Next speaker?

21 MS. UNDERWOOD: Mr. Crawley?

22 PUBLIC: It's on the card, it says Mr. Rue.
23 That's what Neenee named me. Now, hey, joker, you
24 Conrad Mallett, Jr., the reason I'm here and came down
25 here is because of you and that letter that you sent me

1 from Janis Winfrey.

2 MR. MALLETT: Yes, sir.

3 PUBLIC: -- when she made all those
4 statements. I didn't threaten nobody and you a liar.
5 You were sitting next as to Janis Winfrey when she lied
6 on public record and said that she will send every
7 member of council, the mayor's office, and the law
8 department -- of which are you the general corporation
9 counsel -- the findings on the allegations of voter
10 fraud.

11 COMMISSIONER WOODS: Direct your words
12 through the Chair.

13 PUBLIC: Voter fraud by anonymous citizens.

14 COMMISSIONER WOODS: Direct your words
15 through the Chair.

16 PUBLIC: Sent the report. She said she send
17 it. She lied. And you were sitting right next to her.
18 You on the Detroit Election Commission and when she
19 lied, you didn't say nothing.

20 COMMISSIONER WOODS: You are out of order.

21 PUBLIC: You, Darryl Woods, you done called
22 people and said my name. You don't know who I know.

23 COMMISSIONER WOODS: Direct your words
24 through the Chair. Continue.

25 PUBLIC: Are you the chair?

1 COMMISSIONER WOODS: Today I am.

2 PUBLIC: Okay. Well, my words going straight
3 to you. Can I get my time rewind back before you
4 interrupted me with your nonsense, Darryl Woods? I'm
5 about sick of you. You got in Neenee's way. You gotta
6 get the F out her way. I'm not playing with none of
7 y'all. Kaniesha didn't shoot herself. I done told all
8 y'all. And Conrad Mallett over there needs to be
9 removed from representing this board and the general
10 corporation counsel for the city of Detroit. Now he's
11 Michigan Supreme Court Justice, former. I got the
12 proof and the evidence. And I gave it to Donald Trump
13 and all y'all elected officials in Detroit, even you
14 appointed, Darryl Woods.

15 COMMISSIONER WOODS: Time is out. Please
16 next speaker. Thank you.

17 MS. UNDERWOOD: The next speaker will be on
18 Zoom. We're gonna go with Ms. Tara Brown. Mr.
19 Crawley, do you mind taking a seat? Thank you. Do you
20 mind taking a seat, sir?

21 COMMISSIONER WOODS: Have a seat, sir.

22 MS. UNDERWOOD: Ms. Brown, you can be heard.

23 PUBLIC: Yes, I'm here.

24 COMMISSIONER WOODS: Yes. You may be heard.

25 PUBLIC: Good evening, Commission. Can you

1 all hear me?

2 COMMISSIONER WOODS: Yes, ma'am.

3 PUBLIC: Thank you last week for a great
4 meeting. That was a really good meeting. Very
5 fruitful. This week I wanted to ask about a followup
6 for the public for the Tracey Allen situation. There
7 are some things going around. I spoke to someone
8 affiliated with the city and what I'm hearing is not
9 good. And what I'm hearing is Officer Melvin is not
10 going to be terminated, and that Ms. Allen may still be
11 facing charges. We need to get some clarity in the
12 community about that. Because I don't care what her
13 issues were prior to being shot six times. If it
14 didn't have anything to do with that traffic stop, that
15 is a totally separate incident and we can't have
16 officers, no matter how stressed they are with badges
17 and guns out shooting citizens 5 and 6 times, that's
18 not gonna fly. Not good.

19 The other thing is, can we get some
20 information about when officers are being charged with
21 crimes, accused of crimes, because I keep hearing a
22 very disturbing story about a male officer at one of
23 the precincts allegedly assaulting another member of
24 the community, and it hasn't been charged yet. Again,
25 what is going on? Then there are things that we are

1 reading in M Codes reports that some of us don't recall
2 being mentioned during some of these meetings, so
3 that's another thing. But again, last week was an
4 excellent meeting. You all did a great job. Lots of
5 questions. Lots of information.

6 Also, I'm in District 5 near the River Walk,
7 it needs attention. Right between Mt. Elliot park and
8 the boarder patrol -- or, I'm sorry. Is it the coast
9 guard? Yeah, over there in the middle of the night,
10 y'all worried about the teenagers downtown, they right
11 over here. The other night, 11:40. It's teenagers
12 that have school the next day or at least should have
13 school the next day, playing and arguing and throwing
14 stuff at each other on the River Walk. Yeah, it needs
15 attention. Thank you.

16 COMMISSIONER WOODS: Thank you.

17 MS. UNDERWOOD: Our next speaker will be
18 Bridget.

19 COMMISSIONER WOODS: Hold on.

20 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: Can we get an update
21 from the department on how soon an official update can
22 be provided regarding the officers in the Tracey Allen
23 incident?

24 DC SLOAN: Through the Chair. Yes, I'll get
25 an update for you, ma'am.

1 COMMISSIONER WATTS: Through the Chair?

2 COMMISSIONER WOODS: Yes.

3 COMMISSIONER WATTS: Also, can we get the
4 detail down there, especially on the Atwater Riverfront
5 area, get a report and have some special attention to
6 that area. I know exactly where that area is down
7 there on Mt. Elliott, so make sure we're not having --
8 because I know the River Walk closes at 10:00 p.m.

9 DC SLOAN: Through the Chair. Yes, ma'am,
10 I'm taking notes and I'll pass that information along.

11 COMMISSIONER WOODS: And -- you haven't
12 received anything back from the prosecutor's office
13 regarding this Tracey Allen matter, have you?

14 DC SLOAN: To the Chair. No, not that I'm
15 aware of.

16 COMMISSIONER WOODS: Okay. Thank you.

17 PUBLIC: Also, the River Walk does close at
18 10 o'clock, but that stretch between Mt. Elliott Park
19 and where they close it is open.

20 COMMISSIONER WOODS: Okay.

21 PUBLIC: I don't think people know that.
22 It's on open area where people kind of congregate in
23 the evening time. So you'll have people out there as
24 late as 3 or 4 in the morning.

25 COMMISSIONER WOODS: Yes, can you make sure

1 that you pay attention -- you guys can put some special
2 intention into that and take a look and investigate
3 that for the citizens?

4 DC SLOAN: Through the Chair. Absolutely,
5 yes.

6 COMMISSIONER WOODS: Okay. Thank you. Next
7 speaker?

8 MS. UNDERWOOD: Our next speaker will be
9 Bridget.

10 COMMISSIONER WOODS: You may be heard,
11 Bridget.

12 PUBLIC: Oh, thank you. Good afternoon. Am
13 I heard?

14 COMMISSIONER WOODS: Yes, ma'am.

15 PUBLIC: Great. Thank you. I just wanted to
16 first express my appreciation for calls for
17 accountability in various aspects by previous members
18 of the public who have spoken before me, including Ms.
19 Brown who does such rigorous research. I'm calling
20 specifically myself because I have had experiences over
21 the past five and a half years since I returned to
22 metro Detroit of cars -- or drivers, rather, of cars,
23 especially SUVs, committing moving violations and these
24 moving violations, are, I know, widely known. It's no
25 public secret that drivers commonly, excessively speed,

1 go -- move into the crosswalk when the pedestrian has
2 the legal right-of-way to use the crosswalk.

3 To me, this is a continued source of stress
4 and disincentivizes(sic) me, and I imagine many other
5 people, from really enjoying areas such as Midtown that
6 are a lot of the revitalized areas, and yet still there
7 are many drivers who are committing these moving
8 violations. I've made reports on CClickFix or
9 ImproveDetroit.app, mostly to no avail. And I've
10 received the response that this area will be monitored,
11 but I've experienced no improvement in that public
12 safety.

13 And my impression was that DPD is tasked with
14 public safety. And this is a very fundamental or
15 foundational issue of public safety that people have
16 the freedom to walk, or roll if they're using a
17 mobility devices without fear that they're going to be
18 hit by a moving car. I know in 2024, Detroit was, I
19 think, the third highest rate of pedestrian fatalities.
20 That's not something that any city wants to be known
21 for, so I'm asking DPD to do a better job of
22 enforcement or prevention. Also -- I see my time is
23 up. Thank you.

24 COMMISSIONER WOODS: Thank you. You got it
25 noted?

1 DC SLOAN: To the Chair, of course I do. I
2 just wanted to also mention last week, from April 5th
3 through the 11th, our Traffic Enforcement Unit, which
4 was --

5 COMMISSIONER WOODS: Can you not approach --
6 excuse me. Have a sit, sir.

7 PUBLIC: Have a seat?

8 COMMISSIONER WOODS: You are disrupting our
9 meeting.

10 PUBLIC: I'm not disrupting --

11 COMMISSIONER WOODS: Yes, you are. You're
12 not allowed to come to our staff while they are
13 working. We have someone up there if you want to --

14 PUBLIC: This is the Board's attorney, right?

15 COMMISSIONER WOODS: No, it's not an
16 attorney.

17 PUBLIC: Well, who is this?

18 COMMISSIONER WOODS: Excuse me, sir?

19 PUBLIC: The secretary, right?

20 COMMISSIONER WOODS: You're disrupting our
21 meeting, sir.

22 PUBLIC: I'm not disrupting nothing. I'm
23 trying to pass this information.

24 COMMISSIONER WOODS: Do not approach up here.

25 PUBLIC: Well, how do I get it to her then?

1 Explain to me how I get it to her. There you go, sir.

2 Thank you. Now, could you inform all the board members
3 what you see on there?

4 COMMISSIONER WOODS: We got a mail system or
5 you can -- or give it to our staff there.

6 PUBLIC: Man, shut up. Talking to me that
7 nonsense, man.

8 COMMISSIONER WOODS: You're disrupting our
9 meeting, sir.

10 PUBLIC: You are talking to me. I didn't say
11 a word.

12 COMMISSIONER WOODS: You're disrupting our
13 meeting.

14 PUBLIC: We'll, you're saying stuff to me.

15 COMMISSIONER WOODS: Next speaker.

16 MS. UNDERWOOD: Mr. Chair, we did have a
17 speaker that we had difficulty allowing to speak, so I
18 was gonna try Ms. Gadson again.

19 PARLIAMENTARIAN: She's trying to give some
20 information.

21 COMMISSIONER WOODS: Okay, yeah, I'm sorry.
22 Thank you. Go ahead.

23 DC SLOAN: Through the Chair and to the
24 Board. I just wanted to make the board and our public
25 aware that our Traffic Enforcement Unit which moves

1 throughout the city conducted an enforcement operation
2 on April 5th through 11th throughout the west side.
3 Officers made 681 traffic stops and issued over 1500
4 moving violations, 218 of those were for speeding.
5 Traffic enforcement is very important to the
6 department.

7 COMMISSIONER WOODS: Thank you very kindly
8 for that update.

9 MS. UNDERWOOD: That was your last speaker.

10 COMMISSIONER WOODS: That was your last
11 speaker, thank you. So now we have a presentation to
12 the board by the Human Resource Bureau Director Katrina
13 Patillo.

14 DIRECTOR PATILLO: Good afternoon. Through
15 the Chair. I will be presenting two reports it's to
16 cover the report for March and for -- actually, for
17 February and for March. So for March, it's February
18 statistics, the department was currently filled at
19 95 percent. For sworn, we had 97 percent, 74
20 vacancies. There was a 3 percent. For civilian
21 professional staff, we were filled at 89 percent,
22 vacant 93 positions, 11 percent vacancy.

23 For sworn recruiting since the beginning of
24 the fiscal year we had of 3,561 applications. 897 was
25 in processing. There was 1,377 archived. 274 hired.

1 438 temporary disqualified. Permanently disqualified
2 was 303, and awaiting M Codes testing was 388. For M
3 Codes testing for the month of February scheduled, we
4 had 96 for the written test. 63 appeared, 48 passed.
5 That was a 76 percent passing rate. 15 failed, 24
6 percent. No-shows was 33. For the physical agility
7 tests, we had 117 scheduled. Two of those were
8 walk-ins. 73 appeared. 49 passed. A 67 percent
9 passing rate. 24 failed. 33 percent failure rate and
10 46 no-shows. For academy graduates, we graduated 26
11 for that month. For new hires for February, we had 24
12 sworn, 12 civilian for a total of 36.

13 Detroit residency information for February.
14 For Detroiters, we had total of 593 for sworn. 374 for
15 civilian professional staff. 12 for police assistants.
16 Non-Detroiters, 2,009. Civilian professional staff 404
17 and police assisting 10. Out of those numbers for the
18 new hires, civilian new hires, Detroit residents for
19 professional staff, four sworn and three. For student
20 interns, we have 16 Wayne State University through our
21 cohort Warren that we intern with them since January.

22 For attrition, we had 22 sworn, 15 percent
23 civilians for a total of 37. For a leave of absence
24 for FMLA sworn was 19, professional staff was three.
25 FMLA intermittent was 116 for sworn, 87 civilian

1 professional staff. Paid parental leave was 15 for
2 sworn. One for civilian professional staff. Medical
3 leave was one for sworn, two for civilian professional
4 staff. Eight military sworn. Restricted was 60 for
5 sworn, six for civilian professional staff. Disabled
6 was 30 for sworn, three for civilian professional
7 staff. And 27 sick for sworn, nine for civilian
8 professional staff.

9 For suspensions, we had a total of 26. That
10 was 22 police officer, one corporal, one detective, one
11 sergeant. And then for monthly suspensions, we had a
12 total of 22, police officers 14, investigators one,
13 sergeants two, lieutenants two -- actually, monthly
14 separations, not suspensions. Monthly separations was
15 22. 14 police officers, one investigator, two
16 sergeants, five detectives, one captain. And then for
17 our defer retirement option plan, we have 463
18 participants that are in that category.

19 Moving onto the month of March statistics.
20 The department was filled at 95 percent, sworn was 96
21 percent. 96 vacancies, 4 percent vacancy rate.
22 Civilian professional staff was 89 percent filled. 93
23 vacancies for 11 percent. For sworn recruiting since
24 the beginning of the fiscal year, total applications
25 4,070. In processing, 953. Archived, 1,652.

1 (Inaudible) 74. Temporary disqualified 530.
2 Permanently disqualified, 350. And awaiting M Codes
3 testing was 358.

4 For M Codes for the month of March scheduled
5 for the written test, 95. 61 appeared, 37 passed. 61
6 percent passing. 24 failed. 39 percent failure rate
7 with 34 no-shows. Physical agility tests scheduled was
8 106. 71 appeared. 40 passed. 56 percent passing. 31
9 failed. 44 percent failure rate. 35 no-shows. For
10 academy graduates, it was 24. For new hires civilian
11 professional staff, 32. We did not have any class in
12 the month of March for Detroit residency. For
13 Detroiters 611, police assistants 11, and civilian
14 professional staff 374. For non-Detroiters, 1,989 for
15 sworn. 404 civilian professional staff and nine police
16 assisted. Of the new hires, it was 17 Detroit
17 residents for civilian professional staff.

18 And then still our same in terms for Wayne
19 State University. And next week will be their last
20 week for Cohort 1. For attrition, total of 32. 19
21 sworn. 11 civilian professional staff, two police
22 assistants. For the leave of absence category, for
23 FMLA continuous, we had 13 sworn, three civilian
24 professional staff. FMLA intermittent, 111 sworn, 88
25 civilian professional staff. Paid parental leave,

1 seven sworn, two civilian professional staff. Medical
2 leave, two sworn, three civilian professional staff.
3 Military leave, 12 sworn, one civilian professional
4 staff. Restricted was down to 53 for sworn, four for
5 civilian professional staff. Disabled down to 23, for
6 sworn, one civilian professional staff. Sick, 28 for
7 sworn. 13 for civilian professional staff. Total
8 suspensions was 22. 20 police officers, one detective,
9 one sergeant. And then for separations, 19. 13 police
10 officers, two sergeants, one lieutenant, two
11 detectives, one commander. Total, 453 in our drop
12 defer program.

13 On this past Tuesday, we held our DPD Great
14 event which was an opportunity for citizens to come
15 out, meet the background investigators to understand
16 the application process, the M Codes testing, the
17 necessary requirements to get into the academy. We
18 also had representatives from across the department,
19 from the training center to all of our metro units was
20 out there. The Chief of Police was out there. Human
21 resources was out there talking about the civilian
22 professional staff careers. We had other various
23 agencies that was out there as well. Great attendance.

24 Also, for our next academy class, the
25 orientation will be held on next Friday. And then we

1 will say farewell to our 16 interns from Wayne State on
2 this coming Monday. And then we will welcome in Cohort
3 2. As I said before, this is an actual internship
4 program, and it's actually a course over at Wayne State
5 that they started. So we'll welcome in the second
6 cohort in the beginning of May. And then we're also
7 selecting our nominations for the mayor's fellowship.
8 Pending any questions, that concludes my presentation.

9 COMMISSIONER WOODS: Commissioner Camille and
10 then Commissioner Boman.

11 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: Through the Chair.
12 Thank you for your report, Director Patillo. I'm
13 looking at the HR monthly suspension report in, I
14 believe I'm in the March -- I'm in the April report so
15 the most recent one. And I have a couple questions on
16 here. So with the duty status of terminated, pending
17 arbitration, so a person on that duty status is
18 actually terminated, right? So they are no longer on
19 payroll while the arbitration process is in progress;
20 is that correct?

21 DIRECTOR PATILLO: Yes, that is correct.

22 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: Okay, thank you for
23 that. Curious about one of these -- because it looks
24 like the termination goes back to 2023. I would be
25 interested to understand more about why that -- why

1 that is taking so long given that we're in 2026 now.

2 DIRECTOR PATILLO: Is that the one that's
3 September 11, 2023?

4 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: Yes.

5 DIRECTOR PATILLO: Okay.

6 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: And I understand
7 probably several of these questions that I have here,
8 the details that I'm looking for would not be
9 appropriate for open meeting, so I'm hoping for a way
10 to discuss a way for the Board to be open on these.
11 Another question that I have is around, for the
12 suspended with pay, how long is typical for someone to
13 be on that status?

14 I see one that goes back to February 2025,
15 and so I would be interested to know, what's going on
16 with that case? Where does the department see that
17 going? How do we get some resolution so that
18 individual's just not on payroll and not providing
19 service to the city. And there's several on here with
20 dates that are not quite as far back, but similarly,
21 would like updates. So what is the way forward for us
22 to get details on these cases?

23 DIRECTOR PATILLO: So I will take this back
24 to the Chief's office that you're asking for and he
25 would just submit to the department that needs to

1 answer it.

2 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: Thank you.

3 COMMISSIONER WOODS: Yeah. I would say that
4 we would need a complete briefing -- even if we have to
5 do a closed-door session on every last one of these
6 that's on here so that we can be abreast and updated on
7 these, so please, express that.

8 DIRECTOR PATILLO: Okay.

9 COMMISSIONER WOODS: Commissioner Boman?

10 COMMISSIONER BOMAN: Yeah. This question is
11 really just more on format of the presentation than
12 anything else. So just simply, if I may inquire, I'm
13 wondering first of all, we have this fairly lengthy
14 document, multiple pages, actually, quite a lot of
15 pages, and every single page, even though it's in a
16 PDF, every single page is basically just an image.
17 There's no way to capture text. It's not searchable.
18 Why isn't this in the format of a searchable PDF.

19 DIRECTOR PATILLO: This has just been the
20 standard since I've been here. The reports have been
21 presented this way.

22 COMMISSIONER BOMAN: Okay. Can you look into
23 the possibility of next time you have a report, having
24 them as searchable PDFs?

25 DIRECTOR PATILLO: Searchable PDFs?

1 COMMISSIONER BOMAN: Yes.

2 DIRECTOR PATILLO: You mean you want to, like
3 Control F and -- I'm not understanding what you're
4 asking for.

5 COMMISSIONER BOMAN: Well, it's a standard
6 way in which PDFs can exist. When you've got pictures
7 where a picture, basically, it's opaque. It's
8 something that if you're running a cursor over it or
9 searching a word in a document will show up as nothing.
10 Versus, it will show up as a word and find the word if
11 you're searching the document. Or if you want to copy
12 paste part out of the document in order to ask about it
13 and you may want to put something in quotes or
14 whatever, you can just do that.

15 Generally, it's a default if you're saving
16 from a word processor to a PDF. In the case of scan,
17 you can select settings to have something scanned into
18 a file as a searchable PDF, rather than having it
19 scanned simply as a bunch of images.

20 COMMISSIONER WOODS: I think that
21 Commissioner Camille want to add onto that.

22 COMMISSIONER CAMILLE: Through the Chair.
23 Commissioner Boman got to point that I was gonna make.
24 It's a difference between scanning something in as a
25 image, opposed to creating a document say in Word or

1 some other program, and then saving it as a PDF because
2 then it'll be -- the document will be searchable. So I
3 think maybe it would be good to perhaps get together
4 offline between some staff members and some
5 commissioners that may have expertise in that area to
6 assist with the technical components of that.

7 COMMISSIONER WOODS: Yeah. Yes, sir?

8 COMMISSIONER BOMAN: Yeah. I just wanted to
9 add that not just saving a document will create it as a
10 PDF, but also the scanning itself -- and it's old
11 technology. I did this with printers, you know, like
12 20-plus years ago, at home, so it's nothing fancy. It
13 will use text recognition from the image, it'll
14 basically make it into a searchable PDF when you scan
15 the image, so that's another way to do it.

16 My other question on formatting was we had
17 tables where in order to really read it properly, I'd
18 either have to turn the computer or turn my head.
19 They're not vertical, the tables go this way. Even
20 landscape format, can you put into a PDF so that a
21 landscape formatted page will actually be rotated so
22 that the text is recognized and I just didn't see that
23 here.

24 COMMISSIONER WOODS: Okay. You can deal with
25 that offline. Thank you. You're done?

1 DIRECT PATILLO: Yes.

2 COMMISSIONER WOODS: Okay. Thank you for
3 your report and please followup with us regarding
4 the --

5 DIRECTOR PATILLO: Disciplinary?

6 COMMISSIONER WOODS: Yes. Absolutely. Thank
7 you. Madame Secretary?

8 SECRETARY: Through the Chair. You will
9 find, board members, your weekly reports, facial
10 recognition Shot Spotter for the week under Tab 6. The
11 incoming communications for the respective officers
12 which should be coming up for action as is the process
13 upon notification to the respective members of the DPD
14 as well as the unions.

15 Also, there's the memorandum for the
16 personnel training committee that was held this week.
17 The announcements this week are as follows: The next
18 board meeting is next Thursday here at DPS -- I'm
19 sorry, Detroit Public Safety Headquarters. And in May
20 our May community meeting is Thursday, May 14th at
21 6:30 p.m. We'll be in the 8th Precinct at WC3

23 Louis Auditorium at 8200 West Outer Drive.

24 The next committee meeting will be held next
25 week. The policy committee will meet at 3:00 p.m. on

1 Tuesday April 21st. Also, board members, kindly take
2 note of those items under For Your Information. A
3 reminder on the Youth Advisory Panel's symposium this
4 Saturday. I believe the time is 11:00 a.m. to
5 1:00 p.m. There are also flyers for the audience. And
6 for those on Zoom to be reminded at WC3 at the same
7 campus -- northwest campus from 11:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m.
8 Our own Chief Bettison, also with other law enforcement
9 leaders will be on the panel. And I can say personally
10 last year, it was very, very, informative. And if you
11 have a moment please choose to attend.

12 Also, there is another alert that I need,
13 board members, your response by Wednesday. And that
14 item that is under For Your Information will also be
15 sent electronically after the meeting.

16 COMMISSIONER WOODS: Okay. Thank you very
17 kindly --

18 PARLIAMENTARIAN: Mr. Chairman?

19 COMMISSIONER WOODS: Oh, yes, sir?

20 COMMISSIONER BOMAN: I had an inquiry about
21 the announcement regarding our Personnel and Training
22 Committee meeting. I was just wondering when the first
23 time that was publicly announced or the first time --
24 whichever's earlier -- the first time it was posted

6 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

7 COMMISSIONER WOODS: Anyone opposed? The

10 position, which will be internal candidates only for
11 14 days.

12 COMMISSIONER BOMAN: So moved.
