4 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELESCHE: Good afternoon,
5 everyone. Thank you for being here today. Today's May
6 7th, and it is our Board of Police Commissioners meeting.
7 I'd like to call to order the meeting, and we have the
8 invocation that will be given by Chaplain Glenn Hodges,
9 and I understand he's here in person? Yes. Thank you.

10 CHAPLAIN HODGES: Thank you. May now bow our
11 heads. Oh, Lord. Our Lord. How excellent is thy name in
12 all the earth. The heaven declared the glory of, the
13 glory of thee, and the firmament shore, Thy handiwork.

14 Day unto day utter speech. And night unto
15 night, reveal knowledge. There is no speech. Nor a
16 language where thy voice is not heard. Most gracious and
17 eternal God, First Lord, we've come before you, with a
18 thankful heart. We thank you for allowing us to gather
19 together, once again. To discuss the safety, well-being,
20 and the future of our community.

21 We thank you for every Board Commissioner who
22 has committed themselves to serve and positive change
23 within the city of Detroit. We thank you for their
24 diversity, their many years of life experiences, their
25 education, achievements, and their willingness to serve

1 this great city. Yet above all these things. Thank you.
2 That they continue to depend upon you for your wisdom,
3 discernment, and guidance as they make decisions affecting
4 the lives of many. Lord, we thank you for every member of
5 the community who has joined this meeting today. For
6 every member of the community who has joined this meeting
7 today.

8 We pray that concerns will be heard, questions
9 will be answered, and solutions found in the spirit of
10 unity and fairness and respect. We lift up our police
11 officers before you as they go into the community each day
12 to protect and serve. Cover them with your divine
13 protection, grant them wisdom in their difficult
14 situations, compassion in their interactions, and courage
15 in moments of danger and integrity in all they do.
16 Bringing them safely home to their families at the end of
17 each shift.

18 We also pray for every home represented in this
19 place today. Let them continue to be homes filled with
20 love, homes filled with peace, but most of all, homes
21 filled with your spirit. Guide this meeting, Lord.
22 Let all that is said and done be pleasing in your sight
23 and beneficial to the people of the City of Detroit.
24 In the name of Jesus, we pray. Thank you.

25 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Amen. Thank you.

1 Thank you, Chaplain. And now, if we could please have an
2 introduction of commissioners by roll call.

3 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Dewaelsche.

4 MS. DEWAELSCHE: Present.

15 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Morris.

16 MR. MORRIS: Here.

17 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Watts.

18 MS. WATTS: Here.

19 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Williams.

20 MR. WILLIAMS: Present.

21 MS. GARNIER: Nine present, Madam Chair.

22 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you. At this
23 time, we have the agenda of May 7th, today's agenda.

24 Is there a motion to approve?

25 MR. JONES: So moved, Madam Chair.

1 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: The motion has been
2 made by Commissioner Jones.

3 MS. IVEY: Support.

4 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Supported by
5 Commissioner Ivey. Is there a discussion?

6 MR. BOMAN: I made a motion to amend. I would
7 like to have a resolution added under new business that I
8 sent out in an email regarding the contract negotiations.

9 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Did you receive the
10 email from -- I'm sorry, Corporation Counsel?

11 MR. BOMAN: No but --

12 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: He's requesting that we
13 wait one week so that legal can take a look at that
14 resolution.

15 MR. BOMAN: I --

16 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay. If you want to
17 keep the motion, that's fine, we'll vote on it.
18 Just letting you know, an email came out to all of us.

19 MR. BOMAN: I don't know if I can get a read of
20 the room as to whether or not waiting a week would have an
21 effect on a vote.

22 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: It would allow us to --

23 MR. BOMAN: Okay. If waiting a week has a
24 possibility of making things better, I'll wait a week.

25 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Well, it will allow us

1 to get legal advice. That's what it will do. All right.

2 So, you're withdrawing your motion, then?

3 PARLIAMENTARIAN: Since the motion was not
4 seconded or stated by the chair, the maker of the motion
5 can withdraw it without any other approval.

6 MR. BOMAN: Okay. Yeah, I don't need a second,
7 then.

8 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: All right. Thank you.
9 So, it's been moved and seconded. Any further discussion
10 on the agenda? Hearing none. All those in favor indicate
11 by saying aye.

12 THE BOARD: Aye.

13 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Opposed?

14 The motion carries.

15 We have minutes from April 30th. Is there a
16 motion to approve those minutes?

17 MR. JONES: So moved, Madam Chair.

18 MS. WATTS: Supported.

19 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: It's been moved by
20 Commissioner Jones, supported by Commissioner Watts.

21 Any discussion?

22 All in favor indicate by saying aye.

23 THE BOARD: Aye.

24 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Opposed?

25 Motion carries.

1 At this time, could we, Madam Secretary, have
2 the introduction of BOPC staff, Chief of Police, elected
3 officials, representatives, and community leaders?

4 MS. GARNIER: Madam Chair, through the Chair, I
5 apologize. Sorry, we've had some additions in the last
6 few seconds. Present today are as follows, Jonya
7 Underwood, Teresa Blossom (phonetic), Dior Mathis
8 (phonetic), Candace Hayes (phonetic), Armani Arnold
9 (phonetic), Armecio Joshua (phonetic), Mary Barber
10 (phonetic), Felicia Tyson (phonetic), Drew Freese
11 (phonetic), Chief Investigator Jerome Warfield, Corporate
12 Counsel expected, Dr. Jackson, Parliamentarian.
13 Interpreters for the day are Angelique Taylor (phonetic)
14 and Stephanie Beattie (phonetic).

15 Hanson Court Reporting is here today as court
16 reporter. Audio Sergeant Enrique Jackson, Media Services
17 Jason Grant. Our own Chief of Police, Todd A. Bettison,
18 is present. Others registered at this time are as
19 follows. On Zoom is Marie Overall, who's Administrative
20 Assistant to State Representative Tyrone Carter and Vice
21 President of 4th Precinct Community Relations Committee.

22 Mark Young, Lieutenant Emergence Association,
23 DPOA Ron Thomas, Vice President. Also, former 2nd
24 Precinct President Fridja Butler (phonetic), Community
25 Relations Commission. Also, Nicole Fisher of 4th Precinct

1 Community Relations. We also have JG Love representing
2 City Council member Renata Miller's office, former Police
3 Commissioners William Davis and Ricardo Moore are both on
4 Zoom. And those are the individuals registered at this
5 time, Madam Chair.

6 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you. Thank you,
7 Madam Secretary. Under my report, we have a resolution
8 honoring former Police Commissioner Sharon Blaine Bernard,
9 Attorney, and this is posthumously, and I've asked
10 Commissioner Jones to please read that resolution.

11 MR. JONES: Thank you, Madam Chair.
12 As mentioned, this is a resolution honoring former Police
13 Commissioner Sharon Elaine Bernard, Esquire posthumously.
14 Whereas Sharon Elaine Bernard made a vital impact to the
15 communities she served in every role she held in her
16 lifetime, including the pivotal role of a Detroit Police
17 Commissioner. With a reputation for thorough preparation
18 and integrity, she demonstrated leadership by example and
19 received numerous awards for her decades of leadership and
20 commitment. And whereas, a native Detroiter, she moved to
21 Arkansas after marriage where she obtained her law degree
22 from the University of Arkansas and became the first black
23 woman admitted to the State Bar of Arkansas.

24 Then known as Sharon Bernard Miller, she became
25 a renowned civil rights activist and served as an Arkansas

1 delegate to the White House Conference on Aging, as well
2 as on the Arkansas Governor's Commission on the Status of
3 Women. And whereas, upon her return to Detroit, she began
4 a distinguished 30-year career at Michigan National Bank.
5 In 1979, Mayor Coleman A. Young appointed her to the Board
6 of Police Commissioners. She served with distinction and
7 became Board Chairperson during a critical period of
8 reforms for the Police Department. And whereas, former
9 Police Commissioner Bernard served on a myriad of
10 professional and civic organizations, often as Chairperson
11 of the Board of Directors. She served as Chairwoman of
12 the Detroit Urban League and worked tirelessly as a
13 friend, fundraiser and mentor for the benefit of numerous
14 organizations.

15 Former Commissioner Bernard leaves behind an
16 outstanding legacy of unwavering commitment to issues
17 affecting civil rights, children and women. She also
18 holds a unique place in city history, along with former
19 District 2 Police Commissioner Linda Bernard for siblings
20 who served on the board. And whereas the board, along
21 with the community, extends its sincerest condolences to
22 the family and friends of former Police Commissioner
23 Sharon Bernard, as her life is celebrated at the Cathedral
24 of the Most Blessed Sacrament on Friday, May the 8th,
25 2026.

1 Therefore, be it resolved that the Detroit Board
2 of Police Commissioners speaking on behalf of the citizens
3 of the great city of Detroit, hereby awards this
4 resolution posthumously to former Police Commissioner
5 Sharon Elaine Bernard for her dedication to both the
6 public and private sectors. Her unwavering commitment to
7 the city of Detroit and its citizens merits our highest
8 regard. Madam Chairman, I'd like to move that we accept
9 this resolution honoring former Police Commissioner Sharon
10 Elaine Bernard.

11 MR. BOMAN: I'll second.

12 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHÉ: Thank you. It's been
13 moved by Commissioner Jones, seconded by Commissioner
14 Boman.

15 Is there any discussion?

16 All in favor indicate by saying aye.

17 THE BOARD: Aye.

18 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHÉ: Opposed? The motion
19 carries. Thank you kindly.

20 And I just want to mention, for those who may
21 not know. Ms. Bernard is the sister of Linda Bernard who
22 was just recently on our board as Commissioner as well.
23 So, I just want to make that point. And thank you.
24 At this time, we'll have the Chief's report, Chief
25 Bettison.

1 MR. BETTISON: Good afternoon, Board.

2 THE BOARD: Good afternoon.

3 MR. BETTISON: I'll start with our crime
4 statistical report. And so, in the category of homicides,
5 we're down 8 percent. Definitely fighting last year's
6 numbers. We had historic lows, of course, then we're down
7 a few more.

8 So, this year we're at 45. Last year we were at
9 49. The category of non-fatal shootings, we have 96.
10 That's where a person was shot and didn't succumb to their
11 injuries. Last year we had 113. So that's a 15 percent
12 reduction.

13 Robberies we are even zero percent change.
14 So, 282, last year was 282. And the category of
15 carjackings zero percent change. 23 this year, last year,
16 at the same time, it was 23. Last year, we've been, we
17 finished a year with 77, which was still historic lows in
18 the category of carjackings.

19 And so, the men and women of the DPD continue to
20 work very, very hard and diligently in preventing,
21 deterring, apprehending, enforcing laws of the city of
22 Detroit. In the categories of some of the cases closed.

23 **A homicide case on April 14th. Officers from**
24 **the 11th Precinct were dispatched to a shooting at the**
25 **corner of Remington Avenue and Dequindre. Upon arrival,**

1 officers located victim suffered from multiple gunshot
2 wounds. The victim was transported to the local hospital
3 where he succumbed to his injuries. On the same day,
4 officers located camera footage that captured the incident
5 and the vehicle involved. On April 24th, suspects Deandre
6 Brown (phonetic) was arrested and on April 27th, the
7 second suspect, Dewan Freeman (phonetic), was arrested.
8 Both men have been charged with murder in the first
9 degree.

10 As I say, the homicide division is doing a
11 phenomenal job when it comes to identifying and holding
12 individuals responsible for committing the worst of the
13 worst crimes. On April 28th, members of the Detroit
14 Police Department were dispatched to a felonious assault
15 at a liquor store, in the 19500 block of Joy Road. Upon
16 arrivals, they observed a victim at the location
17 unresponsive with apparent stab wounds. The victim was
18 conveyed to a local hospital where he succumbed to his
19 injuries. Officers located the video footage captured the
20 incident.

21 It was a verbal altercation. Basically, the man
22 was stabbed to death after he attempted to talk to a young
23 lady's girlfriend. Very heinous and brutal. Members of
24 the DPD ultimately executed multiple search warrants
25 throughout the city where they were able to contact

1 witnesses who were present. And on April 29th, the
2 defendant identified as Vaquita Priest Reed (phonetic)
3 turned herself in at the Detroit Public Safety
4 Headquarters. A warrant was submitted to the Wayne
5 Prosecutor's Office.

6 In the category of traffic crimes, and we're
7 still doing our traffic enforcement. And so, on April
8 26th to May 2nd, the traffic enforcement unit conducted
9 operations in the 2nd Precinct, 11 Precinct, officers made
10 403 traffic stops, issued 972 tickets for moving
11 violations and 122 tickets for speeding. Community
12 updates. Yesterday I did my Walk a Mile Wednesday.
13 Commissioner Woods was there. Commissioner Jones, I
14 believe I saw you there. It was an amazing event.

15 We had approximately 300 people out. It was in
16 the 12th Precinct. The 12th Precinct definitely got the
17 crowd out as well as chief neighborhood liaison. And I
18 will tell you, everybody, young, seasoned, because I will
19 not say old. It was just a crosswalk of everyone. They
20 had the marching band out and food, dancing, DJ and the
21 special guest appearance, I had teased it on the media
22 that we were going to have a special guest appearance.
23 That was Madam Mayor Sheffield. She came out and we
24 walked a mile and just engaged and it was, it just felt
25 good.

1 The weather was there for us and it just
2 exceeded my expectations. So, we'll be doing it every
3 other week. I invite the commissioners, the community
4 out, as well. And it just really shows the overall
5 support that this community has for the Detroit Police
6 Department and how much we care. And it just allows us to
7 continue to engage on deeper levels and in their
8 neighborhood on their block in their street. So, nothing
9 gives me more joy than that.

10 Today we had our National Day of Prayer, and we
11 did it right outside in the corridor. And so, the Detroit
12 chaplains put that together and it was just amazing as
13 well. And then next week will be Police Week. But before
14 Police Week, we have three officers that will be going up
15 on the wall in DC. But today we unveiled them and placed
16 them on the wall right outside of here.

17 And so those officers Sergeant Shannon Wright
18 (phonetic), Corporal Rhonda Morris (phonetic) and police
19 officer Kelvin Patrick (phonetic). And so, next week,
20 I'll be in Washington DC, along with some other members of
21 the Detroit Police Department to honor our fallen members.
22 And it's another thing that I'm very, very happy to
23 report. This past Sunday, at Cleary University, and we
24 had 100 plus members, I believe, 119 to be exact. Members
25 of the Detroit Police Department that obtained their,

1 either, their bachelor's and or master's degree from
2 Cleary University. It was a spectacular event.

3 And then we have a member in here who achieved
4 just something on an even higher level. And so, you all
5 have to refer to him as something a little bit different.
6 You all know him as Mark Young, Lieutenant Mark Young, the
7 President of the Lieutenants and Sergeants Association.
8 But he was awarded his honorary doctorate degree.

9 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Yes. Congratulations.

10 MR. BETTISON: And, at this time, this concludes
11 my chief's report. And based off the agenda, you see that
12 I am making recommendations for executive appointments.

13 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Before you go into
14 that, can I just acknowledge that we had a couple of
15 people join us. Our Vice Chair Woods joined us and also,
16 Corporation Counsel Conrad Mallett has joined us.
17 Thank you. Continue.

18 MR. BETTISON: So, as the summer months approach
19 and --

20 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: I've got some
21 commissioners who want to ask questions about your report.
22 So, let's do it before you do the list of promotions.

23 Go ahead, Commissioner Watts.

24 MS. WATTS: Hi, how are you?

25 MR. BETTISON: Excellent.

1 MS. WATTS: Hi, Chief. Thank you so much for
2 your report. And also, we're looking forward to that Walk
3 a Mile coming to District 5.

4 MR. BETTISON: Absolutely.

5 MS. WATTS: I just have a quick question because
6 I received a couple of inquiries, and this goes to maybe
7 some loitering around the gas stations and the liquor
8 stores because we know spring is here. Is there any kind
9 of engagement or communication that you have with the
10 owners or your deputy chiefs, around a strategy, that way
11 residents feel, you know, not uneasy walking into the
12 grocery stores or, not grocery stores, but the gas
13 stations and the liquor store. So that was the question.

14 MR. BETTISON: Yeah, that is a excellent
15 question. And one of the things that I definitely plan on
16 doing with my media relations team is picking tough topics
17 like that to be able to educate the community as to how
18 they can help us as well. But I'm going to have to bounce
19 this ball over to Corp Counsel to answer part of the
20 question because the owner of the gas station or whether
21 it's a liquor store, a business establishment, when the
22 individual is loitering on their property, they have to
23 actually be the complainant. And they're the ones, we can
24 write the ticket, but they'll have to show up to court.
25 And so, many of times, they don't want to actually go

1 through with that step of it.

2 And so, working very closely with them to be
3 able to identify, deter, and take it to the next level.
4 That's something that we could definitely work on.
5 We have met with various business locations where that is
6 a concern in the past, but I would love to revisit that
7 and continue to work on being able to address that problem
8 because we know that that can be problematic. So, Corp
9 Counsel, did I miss anything?

10 MR. MALLETT: No, sir.

11 MS. WATTS: Okay. Yeah. Thank you. And
12 anything that I particularly can do as a commissioner,
13 please let me know on any constituent. I know in District
14 5 would love to be involved with that engagement because,
15 as you know, some of the owners, especially when you get
16 to some of the establishments, they'll say, hey, if you're
17 on this side of the sidewalk is no longer my problem or
18 property is the responsibility of the city. But anything
19 that I can do in District 5, please let me know.

20 MR. BETTISON: Would love to engage with you and
21 through the Chair, we found that some owners of the
22 establishment actually don't have a problem with the
23 individuals being there and depending on what's going on
24 and some of them have paid some. So, it's just, we're
25 going to have to take it establishment by establishment.

1 So, if you get me the problematic locations that you're
2 concerned of, we can take a strategic approach on each one
3 of them.

4 MS. WATTS: Okay. That's all I have.

5 But sometimes, on that comment too, some people don't have
6 a problem with people standing out there when they're
7 protected behind a plexiglass. Thank you, Madam Chair.

8 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELESCHE: Thank you.

9 Any other questions for the chief?

10 MS. CAMILLE: Madam Chair?

11 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELESCHE: Yes, Commissioner
12 Camille.

13 MS. CAMILLE: Thank you. Thank you, Chief, for
14 so much for your report and congratulations to your
15 members that are working to further their education.
16 That's definitely worthy efforts. So, Chief, we've talked
17 about this before. I continue to get concerns from
18 residents regarding the experience they're having when
19 calling the 911 center. We've heard some here. I've seen
20 them in some of the citizen complaints that I've been
21 reviewing, as well as in some of the block club meetings
22 that I've been attending.

23 And some time ago, I requested a copy of the
24 curriculum, which I did receive an outline. I was looking
25 for more detail, like, the Power Point presentations,

1 talking points for the instructors and things like that.
2 So, if I could please take a look at those. And also, if
3 you have a 911 new hire class coming in, it would be nice
4 to sit in on some of that instruction and just observe and
5 listen to what's being instructed there.

6 MR. BETTISON: Yeah, through the Chair,
7 Commissioner Camille, absolutely. At one point, I used to
8 directly oversee 911 when I was a commander and education.
9 But also, that is a very, very stressful job.
10 So, ensuring that with our 911 call takers, we're getting
11 them what they need.

12 The great thing about it is every one of the
13 complaints, the calls are recorded so we can actually go
14 through, and they do have a audit process with the
15 supervisors where they periodically listen to the calls
16 and coach them up. But rudeness should never be accepted.
17 And so, we're going to continue on with our training.
18 We will provide you with a copy of the curriculum and we
19 do welcome you to sit in on a class. We hire quite
20 frequently and so it shouldn't be long before we have a
21 class and I'll get you that information.

22 MS. CAMILLE: Thank you so much, Chief.
23 I'm all set, Chair.

24 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Any other questions for
25 the Chief? All right. Hearing none.

1 Before you go into the recommendations, I want
2 to just ask if we could do it this way. We have so many
3 people that are going to be recommended for promotions and
4 we wanted to group them, Chief, if possible. We're going
5 to do the first assistant chief separately, the rank of
6 assistant chief separately, the deputy chief separately,
7 and then lieutenant separately, sergeant separately, and
8 detective separately. And the reason for that is because
9 we have to make motions but we also want to get pictures
10 of each individual and the groups because the groups are
11 so big we'll have everybody come up after you make your
12 recommendations. Is that okay with you?

13 MR. BETTISON: I'm smiling and I'm pretty sure
14 that they're smiling in anticipation as well, so
15 absolutely.

16 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay. Thank you.

17 MR. BETTISON: This is a proud day for me.
18 So, my recommendation for the rank of First Assistant
19 Chief is Assistant Chief Franklin Hayes. He is a 27-year
20 veteran of the Detroit Police Department. As a police
21 officer, sergeant, and lieutenant, he was assigned to
22 various precincts to specialized units within the Detroit
23 Police Department. In April of 2018, Lieutenant Hayes was
24 appointed to the rank of captain and assigned to the 10th
25 Precinct. In March of 2019, Captain Hayes was appointed

1 to the rank of commander and assigned to the 3rd Precinct.

2 In June of 2021, Commander Hayes was appointed
3 to the rank of deputy chief and assigned to Neighborhood
4 Crime Suppression Support and Crime Strategies Bureau.

5 In March of 2025, this is under me, Deputy Chief Hayes was
6 appointed to the rank of assistant chief of police, Office
7 of Strategic Policing. Assistant Chief Hayes has earned
8 his bachelor's degree in business administration and
9 leadership. Along with Assistant Chief Hayes' education
10 and accomplishments as a Detroit police executive, he has
11 completed the Michigan State University School of Staff
12 and Command Police Executive and New Chief School, and
13 that's MACP, and the Police Leadership Institute.

14 Throughout his career, Assistant Chief Hayes has
15 continually displayed his professionalism, commitment, and
16 dedication to the Detroit Police Department and the city
17 of Detroit. He is energetic, is everywhere. You call
18 him, I have a nickname for Assistant Chief Hayes, he's my
19 Swiss Army knife because no matter what you need, no
20 matter what you need, I could, if I had a can of
21 Campbell's soup right here, he would be able to open it.
22 So that man is everywhere, just get it done. So, he's
23 more than worthy, and I recommend him proudly to the rank
24 of First Assistant Chief, and I hope that the Board of
25 Police Commissioners supports.

1 MR. WOODS: Madam Chair.

2 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Is there a motion to
3 approve the recommendation?

4 MR. WOODS: Madam Chair, I enthusiastically make
5 the motion to appoint Assistant Chief Franklin Hayes to
6 First Assistant Chief.

7 MR. MORRIS: I second that.

8 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: The motion has been
9 made by Commissioner Woods, seconded by Commissioner
10 Williams. Is there any discussion?

11 MR. MORRIS: Yes.

12 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Go ahead.

13 MR. MORRIS: I would just like to echo off
14 what the Chief said. You know, since I've taken this
15 position with the Board of Police Commissioners, and being
16 able to engage with different people throughout the
17 department, it has been an honor to work with AC Hayes,
18 and he definitely have the community, you know, and the
19 people out of the city of Detroit at heart, so I
20 definitely want to say I'm proud of him for the work
21 you've done.

22 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you.

23 Any other comments or questions?

24 MS. IVEY: Through the Chair.

25 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Go ahead, Commissioner

1 Ivey.

2 MS. IVEY: Thank you. I just want to say
3 congratulations. It is my honor to sit here to be able to
4 be part of you elevating the services that you do.
5 You are highly recommended throughout the community; you
6 are loved throughout the community. I resonate with the
7 rest of the board. It is my honor to support and make
8 sure you get this promotion.

9 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you.

10 Any other comments?

11 MS. WATTS: Madam Chair.

12 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Go ahead, Commissioner
13 Watts.

14 MS. WATTS: Ditto.

15 MR. WILLIAMS: I think, Madam Chair, I don't
16 think I've seen him look that shook and nervous in a long
17 time.

18 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Any other comments?
19 Thank you. I would just say, you know, I echo everything
20 that has been said. I have had just ongoing communication
21 with the Assistant Chief, and he works so hard, and it's
22 very well known in the community that he is, he's all
23 over, everywhere, all the time, and I thank him for his
24 support and for communicating with me on a regular basis,
25 and I'm sure all the other commissioners feel the same

1 way, and well deserved. Thank you. Commissioner Woods,
2 and then Commissioner Jones.

3 MR. WOODS: And for the record, this appointment
4 would be effective the 15th of this month.

5 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: May 15th? Okay.
6 Commissioner Jones?

7 MR. JONES: Yes, thank you, Madam Chair.

8 I just want to say how good it is to have
9 someone out there whose head is shinier than mine.

10 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: All right.

11 Any other discussion? Any further discussion?

12 Hearing none. Then all those in favor, indicate
13 by saying aye.

14 THE BOARD: Aye.

15 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Opposed?

16 Congratulations.

17 As First Assistant Chief Hayes, would you like
18 to say a few words?

19 MR. HAYES: I am a crier, so I got to keep it
20 together here. With credibility and community trust, now,
21 more important than ever. Chief, I thank you, and I'm
22 honored for you to select me for this role, and the
23 greatest police department in the country, and the world.
24 Thank you to the board for your support of the Chief's
25 recommendation. As Mother Bernice tee'd up, I'd like to

1 thank my family, my wife, my daughter, and quite frankly,
2 everyone that has supported me on my journey here at DPD.
3 To the men and women of the Detroit Police Department, to
4 the community, to the City of Detroit, I stand proud, and
5 I'm ready to serve as your first Assistant Chief of
6 Police. Thank you.

7 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Thank you. And now, if
8 we could take pictures. Chief, any board members that
9 want to get up as well? I think for this we would like to
10 get up. Board members, and the Chief, and First Assistant
11 Chief.

12 Thank you.

13 Your next recommendation, Chief?

14 MR. BETTISON: The next recommendation is for
15 Deputy Chief Kari Sloan to be promoted to Assistant Chief.
16 Deputy Chief Kari Sloan is a 27-year veteran with the
17 Detroit Police Department. As a police officer, sergeant,
18 and lieutenant, she was assigned to various precincts and
19 specialized units within the Detroit Police Department.
20 In September of 2017, Lieutenant Sloan was appointed to
21 the rank of Captain and was assigned to the Crime
22 Intelligence Unit. In June of 2019, Captain Sloan was
23 appointed to the rank of Commander and was assigned to the
24 Fourth Precinct in Crime Control Strategies.

25 In September of 2022, Commander Sloan was

1 appointed to the rank of Deputy Chief and was assigned to
2 the Detective Bureau. Deputy Chief Sloan has earned a
3 Bachelor's of Science Criminal Justice degree and a
4 Master's of Business Administration Management degree from
5 Wayne State University. Deputy Chief Sloan's education
6 and accomplishments as a Detroit Police Executive, she has
7 also completed the Senior Management Institute for Police,
8 Police Executive Research Forum, and the Crisis
9 Intervention Training. Throughout her career, Deputy
10 Chief Sloan has continually displayed her professionalism,
11 commitment, dedication to the Detroit Police Department
12 and the City of Detroit. Deputy Chief Sloan is a
13 consummate professional and I can say that I have watched
14 her grow. Our project Green Light, she was instrumental
15 in building it out. I remember when it was a cubicle up
16 on the seventh floor and she actually spearheaded it and
17 worked relentlessly and stayed there till the completion
18 to get it to be where it is today.

19 And so, I believe that she will be excellent in
20 her new assignment and continuously helping us achieve our
21 crime reduction goals in the city of Detroit.

22 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you.

23 Is there a motion to approve?

24 MR. JONES: I'll move, Madam Chair.

25 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: The motion has been

1 made by Commissioner Jones.

2 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHÉ: Support by Commissioner
3 Morris. Is there further discussion?

4 MS. WATTS: Madam Chair?

5 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHÉ: Yes, Commissioner
6 Watts.

7 MS. WATTS: I just wanted to say congratulations
8 to you. You deserve this. Since the time I've been here,
9 since January, and I've had engagement with you ,basically
10 with citizens, and I just wanted to say a couple meetings
11 we've been in you handled that very professionally with
12 leadership and you showed empathy. So, I want to say
13 thank you for that and congratulations again.

14 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHÉ: Thank you. Any other
15 comments or questions?

16 I would just like to make one as well. Since I
17 have been on the Commission this third time, I just love
18 running into, now, DC. Or, well, I shouldn't say that
19 yet. But every time I see her, she has a smile on her
20 face. She's so professional. It's good to have officers,
21 you know, at that level who are just very engaging with
22 the community, from what I have seen, and so, I'm very
23 proud that, you know, you are moving up the ladder and
24 that you will be in a leadership, higher leadership
25 position. Congratulations.

1 Commissioner Woods.

2 MR. WOODS: Well, congratulations to you and I'm
3 looking forward to see you out in the community.
4 Come walk a mile with us and be able to engage in the
5 community because, new levels, new devils, you know. So,
6 let's make sure that we're actively involved with the
7 community.

8 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Any other comments?

9 MS. IVEY: Through the Chair.

10 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: I'm sorry,
11 Commissioner.

12 MS. IVEY: I just want to say thank you for
13 your leadership. My encounter with you was professional.
14 I have to agree with the board. Your smile is infectious
15 and congratulations on your promotion and I know you're
16 going to do well.

17 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you.

18 Any further discussion? Hearing none.

19 All in favor indicate by saying aye.

20 THE BOARD: Aye.

21 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Opposed?

22 The motion carries unanimously.

23 Congratulations.

24 MS. SLOAN: Thank you. Thank you. Through the
25 Chair, I really appreciate this opportunity. I want to

1 thank you, Chief, for believing in my ability to lead this
2 department and to fill such a huge role. Enforcement
3 operations is, it's going to be a lot but I'm really
4 looking forward to filling AC Fitzgerald's shoes and
5 hoping to do as good of a job and I appreciate the board's
6 support and the encounters that we've had have really been
7 very positive and I appreciate your time and discussion
8 and thank you, Chief.

9 MR. BETTISON: You are welcome.

10 Congratulations.

11 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you.

12 Congratulations. If we could do the same, we're going to
13 come up to the front and take a picture. Thank you.

14 And continue, Chief.

15 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Woods announced an
16 effective date.

17 MR. WOODS: Yes. This is effective the 15th of
18 this month.

19 MS. GARNIER: Thank you.

20 MR. WOODS: May 15th. Thank you.

21 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you.

22 Okay. Continue, Chief.

23 MR. BETTISON: The next executive appointment,
24 Commander Shanda Starks to the rank of Deputy Chief.

25 Commander Starks is a 29-year veteran with the Detroit

1 Police Department. As a police officer, sergeant, and
2 lieutenant, she was assigned to various precincts of
3 specialized units within the Detroit Police Department.
4 In February of 2022, Lieutenant Starks was promoted to the
5 rank of Captain and was assigned to the 12th Precinct.
6 After that, she took on a new assignment at the Detroit
7 Detention Center.

8 In October of 2023, Captain Starks was promoted
9 to the rank of Commander and was assigned to the 10th
10 Precinct, and after that, the office of the Chief of
11 Police. Commander Starks has earned a bachelor's degree
12 in arts and public service administration and business
13 administration, a management degree, and a Master's of
14 Arts in Organizational Leadership. Along with Commander
15 Starks' education and accomplishments, she has been a
16 member of the National Organization of Black Law
17 Enforcement Executives, NOBLE, and the International
18 Association of Chiefs of Police. In addition, she has
19 completed the Police Executive and New Chief School, MACP,
20 and she has completed the FBI's National Academy,
21 something I have not done.

22 Throughout her career, Commander Starks has
23 continually displayed her professionalism, commitment,
24 dedication, to the Detroit Police Department and the City
25 of Detroit. She was, last assignment, was my Chief of

1 Staff. Job holds a tremendous weight and responsibility,
2 interacting with the mayor's office, City Council, the
3 Board of Police Commissioners, and the overall operation
4 and effectiveness of that office to push and get paper out
5 and everything else and ensuring that I'm there and moving
6 and doing what I need to do. So, it is with great
7 pleasure and enthusiasm that I recommend Commander Starks
8 to the rank of Deputy Chief.

9 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you.

10 MR. WOODS: Madam Chair.

11 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Mr. Woods.

12 MR. WOODS: I enthusiastically make this motion
13 to promote Shanda Starks to Deputy Chief, effective the
14 15th of this month.

15 MS. WATTS: Support.

16 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay. It has been
17 moved by Commissioner Woods, seconded by Commissioner
18 Watts.

19 Is there any discussion?

20 Commissioner Williams.

21 MR. WILLIAMS: I'm just, you know, really
22 excited to see her progress and growth through the
23 department. Me and her has had encounters before in the
24 past and I love to see when people elevate and grow and,
25 you know, for her to grow into this position, her career,

1 I love it. I enjoy it. Congratulations and kudos.

2 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Congratulations.

3 Commissioner Jones.

4 MR. JONES: I'll just make one comment.

5 Well-deserved.

6 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Any other discussion?

7 Commissioner Watts.

8 MS. WATTS: Yes, Madam Chair. In my encounter,
9 since being on the board, your engagement has been
10 professional and definitely empathy and definitely dealing
11 with any citizens that I brought to you just to get some
12 feedback or just concerns that they've had. So, I
13 appreciate your leadership and your professionalism as
14 well and your empathy toward the residents in District 5.

15 Thank you.

16 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Any other discussion?

17 MS. IVEY: Through the chair.

18 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: I'm sorry, Commissioner.

19 MS. IVEY: I don't know, my voice is super light
20 today.

21 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: I think it's the light
22 that is kind of like shining in my eyes and I can't --

23 MS. IVEY: I just want to say my encounter has
24 been very welcoming with you, your professionalism, your
25 attentiveness, just overall personality is exceptional.

1 So, congratulations and well-deserved.

2 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELESCHE: Thank you,
3 Commissioner. Commissioner Woods.

4 MR. WOODS: Yes, I've watched Commander Starks
5 really engage this community and bring a level of empathy,
6 engaging with those who have been victimized by homicide,
7 being able to raise tens of thousands of dollars for
8 funerals and to be able to love on these families.
9 And you call her at midnight, call her anytime, she's
10 answering that phone. The same goes with First Assistant
11 Chief Hayes. You call them anytime with communities
12 having, anybody in the community having a problem with
13 situations, they are there to help resolve problems.
14 And so, this is well-deserved.

15 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELESCHE: Thank you.

16 Any other comments?

17 I would just like to say my experience also has
18 been just extremely positive. She's the consummate
19 professional, as the Chief has used that term. She's very
20 respectful and keeps us up-to-date and current and I
21 appreciate that immensely and I wish you all the best.
22 And your background is just tremendous. Congratulations.
23 Thank you.

24 And any other comments or questions?

25 Hearing none.

1 All in favor indicate by saying aye.

2 THE BOARD: Aye.

3 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELESCHE: Opposed?

4 The motion carries.

5 Congratulations.

6 MS. STARK: First, I want to thank God for
7 allowing me to embark on this opportunity. I can't
8 believe I'm emotional. You did it. To Chief Bettison, my
9 mentor of eight plus years, thank you for taking a chance
10 on a lieutenant. And this honorable board, thank you for
11 your vote of confidence. I will continue serving the
12 citizens of Detroit as I have for the past 30 years.

13 I would be remiss if I didn't thank my husband
14 Steve, my two sons, my parents, family, and friends for
15 all of their support. And of course, to my sororities of
16 Delta Sigma Theta sorority. I'm looking forward to the
17 next step of assisting our chief and mayor, with her
18 mission, Rise Higher Detroit.

19 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELESCHE: Yes.

20 Chief, since we have three groups, two of which
21 are very, very large, we won't ask for comments from each
22 one of them but, you know, maybe just one big group
23 picture, as I mentioned earlier, if that's okay.

24 MR. BETTISON: Absolutely. As we approach the
25 busy time of the year for the Detroit Police Department,

1 our summer months, it is imperative that we continue to
2 fill the ranks and that our police officers have the
3 supervision that they need. And so, these individuals,
4 the lieutenants, and it's 11 of them, have studied, they
5 passed a promotional examination, and I recommend that
6 these 11 lieutenants, with the names that are before you,
7 are approved for promotion. And I would ask that all 11
8 lieutenants come up and stand before the board.

9 MR. WOODS: If you can mention their name one by
10 one, Chief, through the Chair.

11 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Yes, yes.

12 You're going to list them, right, Chief?

13 MR. BETTISON: Let me see -- or I can announce
14 them.

15 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Let's see what he's --

16 MS. GARNIER: Madam Chair, if I may, on behalf
17 of the board, thank everyone for their patience, but we
18 need everyone to be extremely careful of the cords,
19 please. We don't want you to --

20 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Yes.

21 MS. GARNIER: Nor the disconnect. Thank you.

22 MR. BETTISON: Okay. Requesting for promotion
23 to the rank of Lieutenant. Sergeant Trey Lyons, Sergeant
24 Brent Rodak.

25 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: It would be nice if we

1 knew who they were, so if you could raise your hand when
2 your name is -- okay, or maybe move up, that would be
3 great.

4 MR. BETTISON: Okay. So, Sergeant Trey Lyons,
5 Sergeant Brent Rodak, Sergeant Markila Thomas, Sergeant
6 Daniel Nielsen, Sergeant Gwendolyn Stokes, Sergeant
7 Richard Tucker, Sergeant Edward Jackson, Sergeant Robert
8 Wellman, Sergeant Roland Frederick, Sergeant Tracey
9 Miller-Pletzke, probably murdered your name, Tracey
10 Miller, and they are more than deserving, and I recommend
11 that --

12 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Did we miss someone?

13 MR. BETTISON: And Sergeant William Cook.
14 He was a late addition, I believe. Matter of fact.
15 Yep. Yes.

16 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: All right.

17 So, what we're going to do is we're going to ask
18 them, because of the cameras, and we are taping this,
19 we're going to ask you all to come and make kind of like a
20 U, in front of the tables here, and we'll take a picture
21 of the group with the chief and the board members.
22 We'll kind of like make a U, if we can. That's how we did
23 it last time, and we were able to fit everybody, and this
24 way the people on Zoom and at home can see.

25 All right.

1 MR. WOODS: Yeah, we got to make the motion.

2 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Sorry.

3 All right.

4 Is there a motion to approve the recommended
5 promotions?

6 MR. BOMAN: So moved.

7 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay. It's been moved
8 by Boman and seconded by Commissioner Ivey.

9 Is there a discussion?

10 MR. WILLIAMS: Yes.

11 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Commissioner.

12 MR. MORRIS: I just want to say, out of
13 everyone being promoted, I am familiar with Sergeant
14 Jackson. He's one of the NPO sergeants, definitely has a
15 heart for the people, a heart for the community, and is a
16 true definition of a person who's operating in their God-
17 given calling. So, congratulations.

18 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Commissioner Jones.

19 MR. JONES: Madam Chair, I just want to concur
20 with everything that Commissioner Morris has said
21 regarding Sergeant Jackson.

22 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you.

23 Any other? Commissioner Williams.

24 MR. WILLIAMS: I know Sergeant Jackson, he
25 seemed to be a subject of conversation in here, man.

1 So, you know, congratulations to Sergeant Jackson.
2 We met, he heard who I was, and the first time, in the
3 first encounter at number two, when I walked in there, he
4 already knew what I was coming in there for. And, you
5 know, ever since then, man, he has been one of the guys
6 that I can call, or he call me, and a wonderful person to
7 work with as far as the NPO's over there.
8 So, congratulations again to you for your promotion.

9 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELESCHE: Thank you.

10 Commissioner Ivey.

11 MS. IVEY: Now, I would sit here and not be
12 remiss to say I've watched you since you came into the
13 academy. I've watched you grow. You've ate barbecue at
14 our homes. So, I have to say your work is exemplary.
15 You are a dedicated member of this police force, and it is
16 my honor, my honor, my honor, my honor, to say
17 congratulations. You're going to do well. Your work is
18 going to take you far and keep doing what you're doing
19 because you do it very well.

20 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELESCHE: Thank you, Commissioner
21 Ivey.

22 Commissioner Williams.

23 MR. WILLIAMS: One more thing because Sergeant
24 Jackson, he's took all the attention. I don't want to
25 take away from all the other officers up here as well.

1 You know, I want to congratulate y'all too for your hard
2 work and dedication as you further your career too.

3 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you.

4 MR. MORRIS: And thank you for your commitment
5 to the city of Detroit and the citizens of Detroit for
6 making it this far. It just shows a reflection of your
7 work and of, you know, your service to the community.
8 So, thank you all.

9 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you.

10 Commissioner Woods.

11 MR. WOODS: And let me add that we have
12 thoroughly vetted these candidates. We have went through
13 every nick and cranny of their files, and they have deemed
14 themselves to be worthy of this particular promotion, this
15 particular promotion. And so, I just want the record to
16 reflect that, and the citizens of the city of Detroit know
17 that we have done our due diligence on these.

18 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: And the effective date?

19 MR. WOODS: Well, the effective date, that don't
20 apply to them.

21 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Oh, it doesn't. Okay.

22 All right.

23 Any other comments, questions?

24 All right.

25 All in favor indicate by saying aye.

1 THE BOARD: Aye.

2 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Opposed?

3 The motion carries unanimously.

4 Thank you all. And we're going to go up and
5 take a picture with you.

6 Chief, if we could, we have a very large group
7 coming up, and here's our recommendation from the board.
8 If we could have the individuals that you list, stand up
9 at their chairs for right now, and then we will take the
10 vote, and then they will come up for the picture after the
11 vote, if that's okay.

12 All right?

13 MR. BETTISON: Absolutely.

14 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay.

15 Let's do it that way.

16 MR. BETTISON: And you would like me to list
17 them one by one?

18 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: One by one.

19 Yeah, we want everyone's name listed.

20 MR. BETTISON: Okay. And are you going to vote
21 as a group or one by one?

22 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: We'll vote as a group,
23 you know, but we just have to have them listed one by one.

24 PARLIAMENTARIAN: The commissioners are reminded
25 that, if you want to pull a name, all you have to do is

1 say, I pull Francis Jackson, and then that person will
2 know that they will be voted on separately, after you do
3 the motion in gross.

4 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay. And those will
5 be voted separately, individually, correct?

6 PARLIAMENTARIAN: Any name that is pulled will
7 be voted on separately after the motion is adopted for
8 those who remain in the group.

9 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay. The big group.
10 Okay. Commissioner Woods?

11 MR. WOODS: Yeah, and through the Chair, I
12 believe that there may be one or two, if we got it right,
13 that we have to be able to move on for next week based
14 upon our two-week rule. And so, I'm hoping that they have
15 that straightened out in being able to make sure that we
16 can be able to go accordingly.

17 PARLIAMENTARIAN: You're saying that there's
18 going to be a motion to postpone the vote?

19 MR. WOODS: Yeah, we'll see. Let's see if they
20 got it together.

21 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Before you move on,
22 Chief, so what I'm understanding, Madam Parliamentarian,
23 is if, any of these individuals are pulled, we would vote
24 on them today.

25 PARLIAMENTARIAN: But that motion could be to

1 postpone.

2 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Oh, there could be a
3 motion to --

4 PARLIAMENTARIAN: But what the board would have
5 to do is move to adopt the Chief's recommendation for
6 promotion. During that debate, a commissioner can move to
7 postpone the motion to adopt to next week's meeting.

8 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: For the whole group?
9 Or just for those that are pulled?

10 PARLIAMENTARIAN: For those who are pulled.
11 So, let's be clear. The Chief is going to call out the 24
12 names. When you take the motion to adopt the Chief's
13 recommendation, at that time, any commissioner who wants
14 to pull a name, will say, I pull the name of Henrietta
15 Ivey, Beverly Watts, Robert Jones.

16 You then would vote on the group that remains.
17 And after that motion, then we would say, we need a motion
18 to adopt the Chief's recommendation to promote Henrietta
19 Ivey. Now, during that debate on that motion for that
20 officer alone, if someone wants to postpone, they can move
21 to postpone to next week. I'm not going anywhere.
22 I'll be here.

23 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay, Chief.

24 MR. WOODS: We may be able to make it to the
25 Piston Game.

1 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: This is more important.

2 MR. WOODS: It is.

3 MR. BETTISON: Absolutely. I agree with you,
4 Chairperson Dewaelsche, that this is more important.

5 MR. WOODS: It is.

6 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Yes.

7 MR. BETTISON: It is with great pleasure that I
8 recommend the following police officers and detectives for
9 the rank of Sergeant. I'll start with calling the names.

10 Police Officer Amir Amen-Ra. Police Officer Latoya
11 Peacock. Police Officer James Hall. Detective Shannon
12 Bullock. Police Officer Morgan Tonti.

13 Detective Jeffery Cooper. Police Officer Ian
14 McBee. Detective Shelby Kersten. Detective Caitlyn
15 Patrick-Davidson. Detective Eugene Fielder.

16 Police Officer Mitchell Griggs. Corporal David Garcia.

17 Detective LaRondo Tyler. Detective Melinda
18 Cook. Police Officer David Vazquez. Police Officer Ian
19 Marchand. Police Officer Travis Humphlett.

20 Detective David Wiggins. Detective Angela Rice.

21 Police Officer Daniel Polisuk. Police Officer
22 Anthony Porcalla. Detective Terence Barron.
23 Police Officer Nigel Villarreal.

24 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Are those the 24?
25 Chief, I think we're going to request a five-minute

1 recess. We have to just discuss something here real
2 quick. Yeah, the board members can leave the room and go
3 into the board room, and the officers can sit at this
4 point. So, a five-minute recess for the board members.

5 MR. WOODS: We can't do that. We'd have to be
6 in closed session.

7 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Can we go into closed
8 session?

9 I don't know what's going on.

10 Tell me what's going on.

11 Chief, we're not going to do the recess because
12 we would violate the Open Meetings Act, so what we're
13 going to do is we're going to go ahead and make the motion
14 to approve. And at that point --

15 MR. WOODS: Well, he's adding a name.

16 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay.

17 You're adding a name now, Chief?

18 MR. BETTISON: Yes. Are we back?

19 Am I able to add the name now?

20 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Yes.

21 MR. BETTISON: Police Officer Latoya Chavies.

22 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Is that the only name?

23 MR. BETTISON: Yes.

24 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay. Now is there a
25 motion to approve the recommendations?

1 MS. CAMILLE: Madam Chair, I would like to pull
2 Corporal Latoya Chavies.

3 PARLIAMENTARIAN: -- motion to approve first,
4 and then once we go and ask for debate, then you can pull.

5 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay.

6 Is there a motion to approve the
7 recommendations?

8 MR. WOODS: Motion to approve the
9 recommendations.

10 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: The motion has been
11 made by Commissioner Woods, seconded by Commissioner
12 Morris. Is there any discussion?

13 MS. CAMILLE: Madam Chair, I would like to pull
14 the following members. Corporal Latoya Chavies, Officer
15 Amir Amen-Ra, Officer Mitchell Griggs, and Officer Travis
16 Humphlett.

17 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay.

18 Can you repeat those names again?

19 MS. CAMILLE: Yes, ma'am.

20 Corporal Latoya Chavies, Officer Amir Amen-Ra,
21 Officer Mitchell Griggs, and Officer Travis Humphlett.

22 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Spell the last name.

23 MS. CAMILLE: H-U-M-P-H-L-E-T-T.

24 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay. All right.

25 Now we're going to vote on the motion to approve all the

1 others, correct?

2 PARLIAMENTARIAN: Yes, ma'am.

3 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay. Is there any
4 further discussion on the others? Hearing none. All in
5 favor indicate by saying aye.

6 THE BOARD: Aye.

7 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Opposed? The motion
8 carries. Those that were not pulled are approved for
9 promotion to the rank of Sergeant. Congratulations.

10 PARLIAMENTARIAN: Now you will take the
11 individual.

12 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: We're going to do each
13 individual?

14 PARLIAMENTARIAN: Yes, because they still might
15 end up being approved.

16 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Yes. Okay. I may need
17 some help with the names because I wrote down some of the
18 last names primarily. Is there a motion to approve the
19 recommendation to promote Latoya Chavies?

20 MR. WILLIAMS: I'll recommend.

21 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay.

22 The motion is made by Commissioner Williams.

23 Is there a second?

24 MR. MORRIS: I have a motion. I'll move to deny
25 the Chief's recommendation to promote Corporal Latoya

1 Chavies.

2 PARLIAMENTARIAN: What the board needs to do is
3 to have the motion to approve and vote it down.

4 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay.

5 So, is there a second?

6 PARLIAMENTARIAN: Need that motion to accept.

7 Now, you can vote it down, but you've got to have the
8 motion to accept in order to discuss this issue.

9 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Right, I have a motion
10 was made by Commissioner Williams. And I need a second.

11 Is there a second?

12 MR. JONES: I will support it.

13 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Commissioner Jones
14 second the motion. Okay. Now there's discussion.

15 Is there discussion?

16 MR. MORRIS: Yes, we received the information on
17 this partially before yesterday, the rest of it yesterday.
18 Considering the research and my due diligence that I have
19 done in the best interest of the community and the
20 citizens of the city of Detroit, I do not think that that
21 would be a good idea. Not only do I question her moving
22 up to sergeant, I question actually her being a police
23 officer with the Detroit Police Department for the
24 egregious things that I've seen. Based upon that, I'm not
25 in support of that. That's what I have to say.

1 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Further discussion?
2 Commissioner Boman.

3 MR. BOMAN: Yeah, a request for information.
4 Could Commissioner Morris please enumerate at least some
5 of the egregious things he saw and where he saw it?

6 MR. MORRIS: Okay. Yes, sir.

7 So, if you Google this officer's name on the
8 internet, you will see multiple news articles. These news
9 articles contain content where she is being accused of
10 dishonesty. She is being accused of misconduct as it
11 relates to child abuse. A citizen of the city of Detroit
12 who went into a precinct, she followed that individual out
13 to the parking lot of the precinct and called the citizen
14 bitches and hoes. And she arrested the individual on a
15 warrant before she was able to determine, before she
16 verified that there was actually a warrant for that
17 individual.

18 And that's just what's public. There's a lot of
19 things that's not non-public that is in your packet.
20 You're probably, you're not going to be able to get
21 through it all today because it's very lengthy. And I
22 just have to be transparent, Chief. I'm not able to move
23 forward on my end when it comes to this one.

24 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Is there any further
25 discussion?

1 MS. CAMILLE: Madam Chair, discussion.

2 For this particular member, I won't go into
3 detail about the information that I looked at. But what I
4 will say, in general, is that when we are considering
5 promotions to leadership positions in the department,
6 folks need to be exceptional. Because we need leaders
7 that are going to set a good example for new officers
8 coming into the department. I believe the Chief, as well
9 as this board of police commissioners, is looking to take
10 this department to new levels of exceptional service.
11 And so, it's important that we have leaders that are in
12 position to be able to show that example, as well as
13 enforce with their subordinates what's expected. And so,
14 I will not be supporting this promotion either. And thank
15 you for the opportunity to provide some comments.

16 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Any other discussion?
17 Commissioner Ivey.

18 MS. IVEY: Through the Chair. I'm a little
19 disheartened by that, that we have a officer on the street
20 with egregious encounters. And with that being said, I
21 have to support the board on that. I will not move
22 forward as well.

23 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Any other comments?
24 Commissioner Watts.

25 MS. WATTS: Just for clarification as well. And

1 it is alarming, everything. Thank you, Commissioner
2 Morris for your comments and for awareness, I wasn't
3 aware. But is any of this tied to where there's a list
4 established by the collective bargaining and it's just the
5 next person automatically have, opposed to your
6 recommendation, or how does that work? Is this a list
7 that has to go to the next person per the collective
8 bargaining unit?

9 MR. BETTISON: Through the Chair. Commissioner
10 Watts, I'm glad you raised this particular point and I'm
11 going to have Second Deputy Chief Ha. Second Deputy Chief
12 Ha, are you here? So, we have a court decision and a
13 ruling from the courts and that is standing and binding,
14 and the courts have ruled that Police Officer Chavies
15 shall be promoted to sergeant.

16 And so, I will have my lawyer go into further
17 details and for the rest of any members that will that
18 were pulled, I will request a closed-door session because
19 some of the things that we're talking and I'm all for
20 transparency, but some of the things that are of
21 particular concern, I feel that it should be discussed in
22 a closed-door session. And then, once the decision is
23 made by the board, to update the community as to the
24 particulars. So that's my request. But Attorney Ha,
25 please elaborate.

1 MR. HA: Through the Chair. Just to give you
2 some background in regards to Corporal Chavies. She was
3 denied the opportunity to take a promotional exam that
4 went to arbitration. The arbitrator ruled that she should
5 be given the opportunity to take the promotional exam.
6 We administered the promotional exam, and she was able to
7 successfully -- I'm sorry.

8 So, the arbitrator ruled that she would be
9 allowed to take the promotional exam to City of Detroit
10 Law Department, appealed it, took it to the Court of
11 Appeals and Court of Appeals upheld the decision of the
12 arbitrator. And therefore, we had to administer the
13 promotional exam. Once she went through the promotional
14 exam, her scores were high enough to be eligible to become
15 a sergeant. And once she has made the list, based upon
16 her promotional assessment by collective bargaining
17 agreement, she should be promoted. And we've had numerous
18 past arbitration decisions in regards to the topic in
19 regards to when a member becomes eligible on the
20 promotional list.

21 MS. WATTS: Thank you for that. And like my
22 earlier statement, I agree with Commissioner Morris.
23 However, I think this point was very important to bring
24 forth because I would hate for the public to think that
25 the chief is just arbitrarily not looking into anyone's

1 background and putting forth promotions. Thank you.

2 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELESCHE: Thank you, Commissioner
3 Watts. Commissioner Morris and then Commissioner Boman.
4 No, Mr. Morris and then Commissioner Boman.

5 MR. MORRIS: I agree with Commissioner Watts.
6 So, this is not nothing to say that the chief is ignoring
7 things and just pushing stuff forward. The department, as
8 he said, it had to go through arbitration, which mean,
9 obviously the department, initially, at one point in time,
10 might have disagreed or maybe just thought she was
11 ineligible at this time. So, it's not a reflection of the
12 chief or saying the chief is trying to put someone on the
13 street that's bold. So that's not what I'm implying.

14 So, my decision is based upon the city charter.
15 It gives the Board of Police Commissioners the power and
16 authority over promotions. And so, I'm -- my decision not
17 based upon that. If the court wants to, you know, I know
18 you guys deal with that in court, but if they want to send
19 something to the Board of Police Commissioners and we go
20 forward that way, then sure. But I would, in good
21 conscious, I cannot move forward without letting it be
22 known. The people of the city of Detroit elected us to do
23 this job. They elected us to make sure that they're
24 protected and that we have the right people out there
25 patrolling the streets and working in the community.

1 These things are concerning. So, what I would
2 do, I would, so that we can discuss further because we
3 haven't spoken with, I would have liked to have spoken
4 with this particular officer because I'm a product of
5 redemption or maybe there's something, maybe I could have
6 it wrong. Maybe I'm misreading it. I don't know. And I
7 would like to hear what she has to say about this. So, I
8 would, I motion the board to postpone the chief's
9 recommendation to promote Corporal Latoya Chavies.
10 I motion -- I move to postpone it till next week.

11 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: A motion has been made
12 to postpone and a second has been made by Ms. Commissioner
13 Carter. Is there any discussion?

14 MR. BOMAN: Yes, I believe I was the next person
15 to be called on.

16 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Except that we have a
17 motion, we have to take action.

18 MR. BOMAN: I will use this as an opportunity
19 then to speak against this motion. And I'm speaking
20 against the motion because I believe the public should
21 hear what's up here. For one thing, I'm looking here and
22 this is public information, that we've had, this has
23 consequences and I want the public to understand these
24 things have consequences. Officer Chavies was found to
25 have punched her daughter several times in the face and

1 body. An internal probe concluded she lied to
2 investigators about it.

3 Now, why is that last part emphasized instead of
4 punching her daughter? Because, and we've had this in
5 other cases, and the principle is Giglio impaired. And we
6 have denied officers or are denied people applications to
7 even become officers on that basis because their testimony
8 is not useful in court. And in this case, cases have been
9 dismissed because this officer's testimony was used.
10 The fact that this has and the Assistant Chief Ha
11 definitely brought up an important matter here regarding
12 the fact that there is a collective bargaining agreement
13 about that. And that is why it is so important that we
14 pass the resolution that has been postponed to next week.

15 That calls on the mayor to only appoint
16 negotiators who will negotiate a contract that is
17 consistent with the city charter and not assert the
18 authority of the board of police commissioners as the
19 current contract does. And likewise, it is essential that
20 this is why, next week, when we vote on that resolution,
21 that we must pass it. Also calling on the City Council to
22 deny any contract because they're the ones who ultimately
23 have to prove it, to deny any contract that violates the
24 city charter, specifically having language that asserts
25 the role of the Board of Police Commissioners because that

1 is the real crux of the matter here. I have spoken.

2 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay, Madam
3 Parliamentarian.

4 PARLIAMENTARIAN: The current motion is the
5 motion to postpone. All comments have to be on the motion
6 to postpone.

7 MR. BOMAN: It is because I want us to vote on
8 this now and I want us to vote against the motion.

9 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: A motion has been made.
10 It wasn't -- was it seconded? It was seconded by Ms.
11 Commissioner Carter to postpone.

12 MR. MORRIS: Yes, once again, I understand what
13 this article says. Can we postpone it a week?

14 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay. That's all I
15 need to hear is that it's to postpone. All in favor
16 indicate by saying aye.

17 THE BOARD: Aye.

18 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Opposed?

19 MR. BOMAN: Nay.

20 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay. The motion
21 carries to postpone this particular recommendation until
22 next week. Okay. Now we have a second recommendation.
23 Amir Amen-Ra. Okay. Is there a motion to approve that
24 recommendation?

25 MR. WOODS: I make a motion to approve the

1 recommendation.

2 MR. MORRIS: Support.

3 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay. The motion has
4 been made by Commissioner Woods supported by Commissioner
5 Morris. Is there a discussion? No discussion?

6 MR. WOODS: She pulled it on it. You know, this
7 is the opportunity, through the Chair. If she -- I'm
8 trying to see what was there.

9 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Yes.

10 MS. CAMILLE: Through the Chair. I didn't know
11 I was required to speak to it.

12 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Well, yeah, if you pull
13 it.

14 MS. CAMILLE: Yes, I can do that. I can do
15 that. I won't, again, I won't go into the information
16 that we were provided. But the history that I see with
17 this particular officer does not indicate to me that
18 they're ready for leadership and need some additional
19 experience and some space placed between some activities
20 that they have in their record before being promoted.

21 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Any other discussion?

22 MS. WATTS: Madam Chair.

23 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Commissioner Watts.

24 MS. WATTS: What other specific -- I'm sorry.
25 Just any details? Any more details?

1 What was researched?

2 Anything that you can give just a couple
3 examples.

4 MS. CAMILLE: Madam Chair, I don't know. Is it
5 appropriate to share what we received in confidential
6 packets on the discipline history of officers?

7 MS. WATTS: Is there any public information?
8 I'm not asking for anything that's in confidential
9 information. I'm not familiar with this individual, so
10 I'm just asking is any public information that can be
11 shared?

12 MS. CAMILLE: What was shared with me in our
13 confidential packets is what's of concern to me. And so,
14 I won't share that over the microphone.

15 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Commissioner Boman and
16 then Commissioner Morris.

17 MR. BOMAN: I'd like to move that we go into
18 executive session to further discuss this particular
19 promotion, so we can hear all the pertinent --

20 PARLIAMENTARIAN: There is not executive
21 session, it's the closed session.

22 MR. HA: Madam Chair, it would be a closed
23 session, but you would have to give the members the
24 opportunity to evoke it under the Open Meetings Act.

25 MR. WOODS: Absolutely.

1 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: So, okay.

2 MS. CAMILLE: Madam Chair.

3 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Go ahead,
4 Commissioner.

5 MS. CAMILLE: I move to postpone since we have a
6 motion on the floor to approve. I move to postpone to
7 allow the other commissioners opportunity to look at the
8 file further, before we bring this member back.

9 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Motion has been made to
10 postpone the promotion of Amin Amen-Ra.

11 MS. WATTS: Support.

12 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Supported by
13 Commissioner Watts. Any discussion?

14 MR. MORRIES: Yes.

15 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Commissioner Morris.

16 MR. MORRIS: Is it a way that we can have, like,
17 a sidebar or go in some sort of recess? Because if these
18 officers are here, their family is here and they made
19 preparation for a promotion, I would like -- I don't want
20 to hold them up. I mean, I would like to because we
21 already got one already pushed over. If this is a way we
22 can resolve this and to have discussion about this and get
23 it done today. You know, they did come out. People came
24 out. They took time out their day, and we do want to, if
25 we can resolve this, get this resolved.

1 What do you say Commissioner Woods?

2 MR. WOODS: Through the Chair. Unfortunately,
3 we've been indicated by the Parliamentarian and
4 Corporation Counsel that that that's not a viable solution
5 and based upon Second Deputy Ha, and so, you know, I think
6 the motion to postpone everyone that she named is
7 appropriate to be able to organize this better to be able
8 to vet this out.

9 PARLIAMENTARIAN: You can't do a group.

10 MR. WOODS: I understand that. I know that.

11 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Individually. We
12 already have two motions to postpone. So --

13 MR. WOODS: It's been voted --

14 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: We have a motion on the
15 floor. Any further discussion to postpone? All right.
16 All in favor indicate by saying aye.

17 THE BOARD: Aye.

18 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Opposed? Okay. The
19 motion is to postpone that. I mean, the motion carries to
20 postpone. All right. The next one is Griggs.

21 MR. WOODS: Motion to postpone.

22 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay. There's a motion
23 to postpone that promotion, that recommendation.

24 Is there a second?

25 MS. WATTS: Support.

1 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: There's no
2 recommendation because you haven't made the motion to
3 adopt.

4 MR. WOODS: Okay. I'll make a motion to
5 approve.

6 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Approve the
7 postponement?

8 MR. WOODS: No, no, you got to approve in the
9 person. Then we got to discuss, then we got to --

10 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Motion has been made to
11 approve the promotion of Griggs. Is that correct? Okay.
12 Is there a second? It's been supported by Commissioner
13 Morris. Any discussion?

14 MS. CAMILLE: Motion to postpone.

15 MR. WOODS: Second.

16 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Motion has been made by
17 Commissioner Camille, seconded by Commissioner Woods to
18 postpone. Is there any discussion? All in favor indicate
19 by saying aye.

20 THE BOARD: Aye.

21 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Opposed? The motion
22 carries. And now you're going to have to help -- is it
23 Humphlett? Humphlett. Motion to adopt to adopt or
24 approve the recommendation of the chief for promotion to
25 Sergeant of Humphlett. Is there a motion?

1 MR. WOODS: I make a motion.

2 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Motion has been made by
3 Commissioner Woods. Is there a second? Commissioner
4 Carter has seconded. All in favor -- I mean, is there any
5 discussion? A motion has been made by Commissioner
6 Camille, seconded by Commissioner Morris to postpone.
7 Any discussion? All in favor indicate by saying aye.

8 THE BOARD: Aye.

9 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Opposed? The motion
10 carries. All right. So, we have one, two, we have four
11 that are being postponed until next week.

12 PARLIAMENTARIAN: Just as a reminder to the new
13 commissioners, you cannot postpone beyond your next
14 regular meeting. Now, when you get to next week, you
15 could have another motion to postpone. But you can't
16 postpone beyond next week. And since next week is your
17 evening -- I'm not sure the board will want to bring this
18 up. I mean, that's not the parliamentarian's call, but I
19 just want to remind you that at next week's meeting, you
20 could move to postpone and kick that can to the third
21 week. But you would have to make individual motions to
22 postpone because I won't be at the community meeting.
23 I don't want you all calling me.

24 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: All right. Okay.

25 At this time, I would like to ask the 20 that

1 were approved for promotion to come up front -- oh, no, we
2 have to approve them.

3 PARLIAMENTARIAN: We did.

4 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: We approved them.

5 Okay. So come up front, so we can take a group picture
6 with the chief and the board members. Thank you.

7 Congratulations to the sergeants, the new sergeants, and
8 now we have three, I'm sorry, go ahead, Chief, our next
9 promotions.

10 MR. BETTISON: At this point, I'm recommending
11 three for the promotion to the rank of detective.

12 Police officer Jermel Mitchell, police officer Adam
13 Langford, and police officer Zazearra Carter.

14 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: It's been recommended
15 that there are three promotions to detective. Is there a
16 motion?

17 MR. WOODS: So moved.

18 MR. WILLIAMS: Second.

19 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: It's been moved by
20 Commissioner Woods, seconded by Commissioner Williams.

21 Is there any discussion?

22 MS. CAMILLE: Madam Chair.

23 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Go ahead, Commissioner.

24 MS. CAMILLE: I would like to pull officer
25 Zazearra Carter.

1 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay. Do we have to
2 have another motion, Madam Parliamentarian? Okay.
3 Any other discussion?

4 MR. BOMAN: Was it seconded?

5 PARLIAMENTARIAN: It doesn't need to be
6 seconded.

7 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: All in favor indicate
8 by saying aye.

9 THE BOARD: Aye.

10 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Opposed?
11 Motion carries to promote two of those to detective and to
12 pull Zazearra Carter. And the motion carries. Oh, no.
13 I'm sorry.

14 PARLIAMENTARIAN: Now we need to go back to that
15 individual.

16 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Right. Okay.

17 MR. WOODS: I make a motion to approve Zazearra
18 Carter.

19 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay. A motion has
20 been made to approve Zazearra Carter. Is there a second?

21 MR. MORRIS: Second.

22 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: It's been seconded by
23 by Commissioner Morris. Is there any discussion?

24 MS. CAMILLE: Madam Chair, motion to postpone to
25 allow commissioners to review that particular file again.

1 MR. BOMAN: Second.

2 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHÉ: Okay. It's been moved
3 to postpone until next week. Seconded by Commissioner
4 Camille. Seconded by Commissioner Boman.

5 Any discussion?

6 Commissioner Morris.

7 MR. MORRIS: I don't know if I missed something,
8 but this officer's, there's nothing that I see that's
9 egregious. I don't see anything. I just, you know,
10 maybe, I missed something. I don't know, but it looks
11 this looks like a great promotion to me. That's all.
12 That's all I had to say, because I don't understand why
13 we're postponing this officer and holding this officer up.

14 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHÉ: You agree?

15 So, we need to vote on the motion to postpone,
16 correct?

17 PARLIAMENTARIAN: To vote on the motion -- the
18 motion to postpone is a higher-ranking motion.
19 Commissioner Woods has it. Then the main motion, which is
20 the motion to adopt. The motion to postpone is defeated.
21 Then you're back to the motion to approve the chief's
22 recommendation.

23 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHÉ: Okay. So, for the
24 motion to postpone, any further discussion? Hearing none,
25 all in favor indicate by saying aye.

1 THE BOARD: Aye.

2 PARLIAMENTARIAN: On the motion to postpone,
3 Commissioners.

4 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELESCHE: Yes, this is a motion
5 to postpone.

6 Okay.

7 All in favor indicate by saying aye.

8 THE BOARD: Aye.

9 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELESCHE: Opposed?

10 THE BOARD: No.

11 PARLIAMENTARIAN: Roll call.

12 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELESCHE: Roll call.

13 Okay. Madam Secretary.

14 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Woods.

15 MR. WOODS: No.

16 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Boman.

17 MR. BOMAN: Aye.

18 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Camille.

19 MS. CAMILLE: Yes.

20 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Carter.

21 MS. CARTER: No.

22 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Ivey.

23 MS. IVEY: No.

24 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Jones.

25 MR. JONES: No.

1 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Morris.

2 MR. MORRIS: No.

3 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Watts.

4 MS. WATTS: No.

5 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Williams.

6 MS. WILLIAMS: No.

7 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Dewaelsche.

8 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: No.

9 MS. GARNIER: Two yay votes and --

10 PARLIAMENTARIAN: Eight.

11 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: The motion is denied
12 not to postpone, is defeated. Now we're going back to the
13 motion to approve and is there any discussion?

14 Commissioner Williams.

15 MR. WILLIAMS: Yeah. I just want to
16 congratulate Adam Langford for moving up to detective. I
17 remember when he started the academy, I actually went to
18 the graduation when he completed the academy and also he
19 was a police officer in my district at the 12th Precinct
20 and as long as I've known him, he's been a great guy,
21 honest guy, and always had his head on the shoulder. So,
22 congratulations on the promotion. He's been waiting for
23 quite some time. Let me say that.

24 MR. WOODS: Wrong person though.

25 PARLIAMENTARIAN: Yeah, Madam Chair, the motion

1 is on this particular individual.

2 MR. WILLIAMS: Was that the motion for that?

3 Okay. I thought you said open -- any discussion.

4 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: For this motion.

5 PARLIAMENTARIAN: That motion to postpone is
6 defeated. Now we're back to the motion to approve the
7 Chief's recommendation for the young lady.

8 MR. WILLIAMS: Sorry.

9 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: That's okay.

10 MR. WILLIAMS: I meant it though, but at the
11 wrong time.

12 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay. Any other
13 discussion? Hearing none. All in favor to promote
14 Zazearra Carter, indicate by saying aye.

15 THE BAORD: Aye.

16 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Opposed? The motion
17 carries.

18 So, Chief, your three detectives have been
19 approved and so I will ask that they please come up front
20 for a picture.

21 MR. BETTISON: Thank you.

22 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay. We want to
23 congratulate all those that were promoted.

24 Again, congratulations.

25 Give it a minute and then we will go to oral

1 communications.

2 Okay. We're at oral communications and public
3 comments. Please limit your comments to two minutes and
4 remember that inappropriate language and comments will not
5 be tolerated and may delay TV broadcasts and video posts.
6 Do we have our first speaker, please?

7 MS. UNDERWOOD: Thank you, Madam Chair.

8 Our first three speakers will be Ms. Fredia
9 Butler (phonetic), Josh Mann (phonetic), and Ms. Shanita
10 Williams (phonetic).

11 MS. BUTLER: Good afternoon.

12 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Good afternoon.

13 MS. BUTLER: Wake up sleeping giants.
14 Project 2025 has almost been completed. The Supreme Court
15 has ruled against the 13th, 14th, and 15th Amendments of
16 the United States Constitution that granted full
17 citizenship to former slaves and are now trying to deny
18 those promises. Many black and brown people have been
19 fired from jobs, denied citizenship, and all that
20 represented what we know, as being free, are now working
21 to deny our rights to vote. These egregious acts will not
22 stand.

23 Commissioners, people of color have bled and
24 died for us to get this far and we're not going back.
25 There will be some officers who will be disrespectful and

1 use and cause confusion. I hope you will rule justly and
2 work with Chief Bettison to do the right thing. The acts
3 of our president encouraging violence, disregarding the
4 law, and giving pardons, has already caused negative
5 behaviors of some of our officers.

6 Please do not be influenced by who appointed you
7 or who you know, but by your conscience and the law.
8 Be men and women with integrity and courage. Thank you.

9 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELESCHE: Thank you.

10 Next speaker, please.

11 MR. MANN: Hi, everybody. Thanks for what you
12 do. It's an awesome job that you all have. The Flock
13 surveillance, DPD considering getting drones. I support
14 police officers and I support drones.

15 I don't support a third-party group such as
16 Flock and Palantir having access to this data. The
17 officer that spearheaded the green light camera, that was
18 a success for the city, and I'd gear more towards that
19 than offering surveillance to a third party that's a
20 subscription-based policy. 2027 federal authorities
21 mandated that all cars have interior surveillance. Our
22 phones already surveil us. If we talk about a vacuum,
23 we're going to get ads for vacuum cleaners. We need to
24 protect law officers of the future by keeping it human-
25 based law enforcement. Just as Home Depot and every

1 grocery store opted into self-checkout lines, it took away
2 jobs, just as artificial intelligence is going to take
3 away jobs from the police community.

4 My great-grandfather was a Detroit police
5 officer and to see all these officers being promoted is a
6 beautiful thing and to assure that they have job security
7 for their kids and grandkids, we need to opt out of AI
8 surveillance as far as third party. If it's DPD owned and
9 operated AI surveillance that they control it, I'm for
10 that. But for having a third party, Ford is now going to
11 own everything that happens in your car. Same with Chevy.
12 2027 it's mandated. Now they'll be able to sell that
13 information of what you like to drink, what you like to
14 eat, the music you like to listen to, and where you're
15 considering taking vacation.

16 That is their property, just as Flock
17 surveillance. It's not our property, it's not our
18 community, it's a third party that's worldwide that offers
19 subscription. DPD wants drones, I support that. I do not
20 support Flock-based drones. I do not support Flock.

21 Thank you.

22 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Thank you. We have one
23 comment, our commissioner.

24 MR. BOMAN: I want to ask the community member,
25 if he could, please send me the information about this,

1 because I wasn't aware of it, this law requiring that cars
2 have surveillance equipment installed in them. Could you
3 send that to scott.boman@DetroitMI.gov, please?

4 MR. MANN: Yes. Thank you.

5 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you. Any other
6 comments by Commissioners? Thank you. Our next speakers.

7 MS. GARNIER: Our next speaker will be Ms.
8 Williams, Ms. Bernice Smith, and Minister Eric Blunt.

9 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Who's the next speaker?
10 Okay.

11 MS. WILLIAMS: It's been over a year and a half
12 when I came to you guys, especially you two, the Chair and
13 Darryl Woods, complaining about Cheryl Hall, LaShonda
14 Houston, and Chauncey Gardner. Officers that threatened
15 to kill me. Nothing's been done. Chief, you leaving?
16 You don't want to hear this about your officers? See,
17 this is the problem right here. It starts at the top.

18 You're not going to threaten my life and act
19 like this ain't been going on. I've been complaining
20 about LaShonda Houston daughter coming into my apartment
21 illegally. I want to get a PPO on her. I don't know her
22 first and last name, but I definitely would get it on
23 LaShonda Houston because she stays downstairs and she's an
24 ex-offender on the Detroit Police Department with a fake
25 name. I'm tired of this garbage. It start at the top and

1 it's from the bottom.

2 Now, if you don't want to hear the truth, you
3 want to suppress the truth, when you are in authority,
4 make this make sense to me. Because like I said, I come
5 here, I've been coming here for an awfully long time, and
6 this is for my case. And it's going to be a problem with
7 anybody in here who did not comply to the Constitution,
8 the law, or the charter, when you guys continue to call in
9 favors and act like this does not exist. When this woman
10 broke into my apartment, violated my vagina, drugged me,
11 and all this type of stuff, it ain't nothing being done.

12 Absolutely not. It's not acceptable, period.
13 Now, like I said, Cheryl Hall has been on the force over
14 15 years. LaShonda Houston is on the force with a fake
15 name, an ex-convict.

16 And Chauncey Gardner, his grandfather was on the
17 force. They was all at 3426 Mack Avenue. Chauncey worked
18 there. Them two live there, taking up bed spaces.
19 Michelle Hall, that's her fake name for her housing
20 voucher. So, like I said, if it's not taken care, they
21 investigating you illegal voting anyway. Send them right
22 to the Detroit Police Department so they can take it back,
23 because clearly you all can't do this job by the
24 Constitutional law or the Charter.

25 MR. WOODS: Thank you. Next speaker.

1 MS. SMITH: What a wonderful afternoon.

2 Very -- good afternoon.

3 THE BOARD: Good afternoon.

4 MS. SMITH: I'm sorry I didn't speak to you.

5 I have learned quite a bit this afternoon. It's been very
6 interesting, and I just want to let you know you did a
7 darn good job, all of you. You deserve to be called
8 commissioners today, because you took in a lot of
9 information. My only thing is, I hope that we're doing
10 all right downtown. I haven't heard any complaints about
11 the youngsters being down there disrupting the area, and I
12 hope we will continue to be in that situation, where we
13 won't have to hear anybody being arrested for disturbing
14 our city. That's all I want to know.

15 I just want to make sure that it's being taken
16 care of, and that we don't have to be worried about it
17 anymore. That's all I have to say, and hope everyone have
18 a good Mother's Day. You see what they did to me, don't
19 you? They had me going to the barbershop, y'all. Look at
20 my hair. For Mother's Day. I don't know.

21 When you get to be 92, you've got to take
22 anything from them. All right. Have a good Mother's Day
23 to those who are mothers.

24 MR. WOODS: Thank you. Next speaker.

25 MR. BLUNT: Good afternoon, Board. I'm Minister

1 Eric Blunt from Sacred Heart Catholic Church, right here
2 in Detroit. This may have seemed like a chaotic meeting,
3 but it really wasn't. Real issues that I have been
4 bringing up for the past four years were really addressed.

5 The chief had the courage to deny an officer he
6 thought wasn't fit, overturned through arbitration, so he
7 had to bring it here. And I admire you commissioners who
8 challenged those appointments and those promotions,
9 Commissioner Camille and Commissioner Boman, on how do we
10 fix this? I'm glad to hear there's going to be a vote
11 next week to talk about some type of resolution or
12 statement by this board saying, wait a minute, this union
13 contract is destroying so many aspects of good policing.
14 And if we don't address it, it will continue to fester and
15 we will continue to have the type of trouble that we're
16 having right now. So please, if you don't understand,
17 just know how the chief tried to prevent this officer from
18 being promoted.

19 The board, I believe, did its job in saying,
20 look, I don't agree. Let's postpone it. Let's look at it
21 more. Let's do something more than just rubber stamp,
22 which is what the union contract basically tells you to do
23 and demands that you do and is in direct conflict with the
24 city charter. I did not mean to cuss mother.

25 But I thank you all and keep up the good work,

1 Chief, in trying to prevent bad officers from being
2 promoted. Keep up the good work you commissioners who try
3 to challenge promotions when you know they're wrong.
4 But you know, right now, you can't do anything about it.
5 Truth crushed to earth shall rise again. No lie can live
6 forever. You shall reap what you sow. Amen.

7 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELESCHE: Thank you.

8 MS. GARNIER: Our next three speakers will be
9 Ms. Michelle George, Eddie People and Mr. Jadante Smith.

10 MS. GEORGE: Good afternoon, Honorable Board and
11 to the Chair. I do have some of my National Action
12 Network members here. Reverend Sharpton is our CEO and
13 president of NAN. And we're going to discuss.

14 My question is, are you all going to deal with
15 the officer Zachary if he comes back on the board? We
16 know that, to the police department, we know that Tracy
17 Allen was shot six times, it's no way. And it was Malcolm
18 X that said in May of 1962, the black woman is the most
19 disrespected woman dealing with racism and sexism. He
20 should not be allowed back on the board. That is
21 something we hold with police accountability.

22 Congratulations, of course, to Assistant Chief
23 Hayes. But the thing is, that's a disrespect to black
24 women. When I look at what happened to even just to veer
25 off the United States Supreme Court gutting Section two of

1 the Voting Rights Act. And even though all three of the
2 justices did a dissent, Alito attacks the black woman,
3 Jackson, no say anything about the other women. So, we
4 will as National Action Network, I call Craig Miller, and
5 I told him he's hiding behind the desk, he need to come
6 out. If you're going to bring this officer back, face us,
7 especially as black women. So, we are against that.

8 Also, and we do have our political director
9 here, Sam Riddle, and the other members and we will be
10 reporting now because when we just left New York, this is
11 what Reverend Sharpton asked us to do. We have our
12 families here, but this is what we're going to do.
13 Also, dealing with the drag racing, I did send out a
14 letter to Judge William McGonagle, the Honorable Judge, to
15 make sure those sentences reflect the injuries that
16 occurred in our community.

17 Also, I reached out Chair Eva about the Kratom.
18 It is known as gas station heroin. I reached out to the
19 Chief of Police Chief in Sterling Heights. We had that
20 discussion down at the, around the time of George Floyd.
21 But he told me he put, I text him. He said, Michelle, I
22 put an ordinance in against that Kratom that is in the
23 community. So, I just wanted you all to know he's now the
24 assistant manager of Sterling Heights.

25 So, I kept my contact. That's my comment.

1 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you.

2 MS. CAMILLE: Madam Chair.

3 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Yes, Commissioner.

4 MS. CAMILLE: I just had a question, perhaps for
5 the department, perhaps for Corporation Counsel. There's
6 been bits and pieces of information in the media in
7 regards to Tracy Allen, Zachary Melvin. Has the
8 department prepared an official update for the community
9 on where everything stands with that situation? Or is
10 that coming soon?

11 MR. MALLETT: Through the Chair.

12 Commissioner Camille, we are still waiting on the
13 prosecutor's decision. It is only until she actually
14 decides, will actually the Detroit Police Department
15 really have a full range and understanding of what the
16 opportunities are. As this board well knows, a \$25
17 million lawsuit has already been filed against the city of
18 Detroit and the Detroit Police Department.

19 Her decision will be critical to the defense
20 that we put forward. And so, we're all waiting. So, we
21 don't have an official report for the board yet.
22 It's incomplete. And we're waiting to see what the
23 prosecutor does.

24 MS. CAMILLE: Thank you, Corporation Counsel.

25 Thank you, Madam Chair.

1 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Any other comments?

2 Okay. Hearing none. Next speaker, please.

3 MR. PEOPLE: Good afternoon, Commissioners.

4 THE BOARD: Good afternoon.

5 MR. PEOPLE: My name's Eddie People, a member of
6 the National Action Network. As we say so often, we come
7 and we speak on our African American women being
8 mistreated. And I see some of our African American women
9 sitting at the table. Now, I just would like to ask, how
10 many of you would fight so hard for an officer having shot
11 one of your relatives, one of your children, maybe one of
12 your sisters or your nieces, husbands, whatever relative.
13 How many of you would have fought so hard to get a
14 policeman back on the board, back on the office, back on
15 the force or whatever?

16 Can you honestly say he shot the relative that
17 I've just spoken of and I will try my very best to get him
18 or her back on the police force having shot this
19 individual that I'm speaking of. Can you look at me and
20 say, oh, yes, I would? Now tell me that you would.

21 Now I will have each one of your names and our
22 political director for National Action Network, he will
23 give us each one of your names Saturday morning, at our
24 meeting. And he will tell the group that Mr. so and so,
25 Commissioner so and so and Commissioner so and so, they

1 all agree that they would have give all of their energy to
2 get this policeman, a police lady, back on the force that
3 tried to kill my wife, my husband, my daughter, whatever.
4 God bless you. Thank you.

5 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELESCHE: Thank you.

6 Commissioner Woods and then Commissioner Boman.

7 MR. WOODS: Let it be absolutely clear that that
8 will be untrue. This board has acted and within our
9 powers and we voted to suspend the officer without pay,
10 which was the powers that we had. And we -- that's not
11 true either, you know. But the fact of the matter is, is
12 that we have no other authority other than what we acted
13 upon. So, this board has acted within its powers, through
14 the Chair.

15 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELESCHE: Commissioner Boman and
16 then Commissioner Morris and Commissioner Camille.

17 MR. BOMAN: Yeah, I've attended every single
18 meeting of this board since being elected to it.
19 Sometimes I come in a little late, but I definitely get in
20 here by the time the chief's report is going. And I can
21 affirm that there has not been a vote to get said officer
22 back on the force by this board. So, I attended many
23 Saturday meetings myself with your political director.
24 I know you, I know him, but that's not really the point.

25 The point is simply that I want you to go back

1 there with accurate information. Now I haven't been there
2 lately because I'm working quite close to that time.
3 But the fact of the matter is no such vote has happened.
4 And we'll just leave it there.

5 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELESCHE: Thank you.
6 Commissioner Morris.

7 MR. MORRIS: Yes, I would like to say that I
8 agree with you 100 percent and that myself, I know for a
9 fact, that myself, and Commissioner Camille, got together
10 and met with someone in the department and we expressed
11 that individually we would like to see that person
12 terminated and fired from the police department.
13 The victim who was shot, we both wore shirts with that
14 victim's name on it stating that we stand with that
15 victim. And if you look at my social media page and I can
16 only speak for myself, as a commissioner, I'm not like a
17 lot of elected officials. I don't go to the balls and to
18 the dances and all of these events just to take pictures
19 with other elected officials, flipping down my social
20 media

21 (Audio cut out.)

22 -- that officer back in the street patrolling, she has
23 expressed the same thing, you know. So, I'm not here to
24 play the political game with people. I actually got
25 elected to fight for the citizens of the city of Detroit.

1 And if you look at the media that even came at a price
2 where I was fighting so hard and the powers that be tried
3 to conspire on ways to get me off this board. But because
4 the forces that are pushing me forward are stronger than
5 the ones that's holding me back, I'm still standing and
6 I'm still fighting for the people. And I will continue to
7 call on the department to terminate that officer.

8 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Commissioner Camille.

9 MS. CAMILLE: Thank you, Madam Chair.

10 So, through the Chair, as was stated, the board
11 has taken one step that it can do, which was to put this
12 officer on administrative leave without pay. And as
13 Corporation Counsel has said, the ball right now is in the
14 prosecutor's court. And so, I move that the board draft a
15 memo to Madam Prosecutor reminding her of the critical
16 role that she plays in holding police accountable in
17 Detroit and that we implore her to make the decision that
18 protects the residents. And so that's my motion is that
19 we send -- that we draft a memo and send it to the
20 prosecutor to not bring this officer back and to do what
21 she can in her power to make sure that doesn't happen.

22 PARLIAMENTARIAN: Does the commissioner want the
23 staff to do it or a commissioner to do it? When you say
24 we, that's sort of nebulous.

25 MS. CAMILLE: I'm fine with staff starting a

1 draft for the commissioners to review.

2 PARLIAMENTARIAN: Okay. So, the motion is that
3 staff will draft a resolution directed to the prosecutor.

4 MS. CAMILLE: For the board to approve before it
5 goes out.

6 PARLIAMENTARIAN: Right.

7 MS. CAMILLE: Yes.

8 PARLIAMENTARIAN: Okay. Thank you.

9 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay.
10 Is it a resolution or a letter?

11 PARLIAMENTARIAN: It can be either one.

12 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay.

13 **A motion has been made.**

14 **Is there a second?**

15 MR. BOMAN: Second.

16 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: It's been seconded by
17 Commissioner Boman.

18 MR. MORRIS: I would like to amend that.

19 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: I'm sorry.

20 MR. MORRIS: I would like to amend that motion
21 for --

22 PARLIAMENTARIAN: Let her state it first and
23 then opens it for discussion. Then you can propose an
24 amendment.

25 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay. The motion has

1 been made to draft a letter to Wayne County Prosecutor.

2 And the gist of it, if you want to mention it, is to

3 encourage her to?

4 MS. CAMILLE: To hold this officer accountable
5 within her power.

6 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: All right. And it has
7 been seconded by Commissioner Boman. Is there any
8 discussion?

9 MR. MORRIS: Yes. I would like to amend that
10 motion. I would like to direct Corporation Counsel to
11 actually draft that up, coming from a legal perspective.

12 PARLIAMENTARIAN: So, the motion properly stated
13 is to strike out staff and insert Corporation Counsel.

14 MR. MORRIS: Yes.

15 MS. CAMILLE: Second.

16 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: It has been made by
17 Commissioner Morris, seconded by Commissioner Camille.

18 PARLIAMENTARIAN: So, the motion before you is
19 on the motion to amend.

20 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Is there any
21 discussion?

22 MR. BOMAN: I'm interested in knowing the
23 Corporation Counsel's opinion on him drafting the letter.

24 MR. MALLETT: I'll be glad to.

25 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay.

1 Motion has been made to amend the motion to ask
2 Corporation Counsel to draft a letter and he's happy to do
3 it. So, all in favor indicate by saying aye.

4 THE BOARD: Aye.

5 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Opposed?

6 The motion carries to amend.

7 Now we're back to the motion as amended.

8 PARLIAMENTARIAN: Now states that Corporation
9 Counsel will draft the letter.

10 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay. So that the
11 letter being drafted for Wayne County Prosecutor will be
12 drafted by Corporation Counsel. Is there any discussion?

13 MS. CAMILLE: Discussion, Madam Chair. I just
14 want to reiterate for the record that the draft would come
15 still to the board for final approval.

16 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Right. And then it
17 will come to the board for final approval.

18 All in favor indicate by saying aye.

19 THE BOARD: Aye.

20 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Opposed?

21 The motion carries.

22 All right. Next speaker.

23 MR. PEOPLE: Thank you very much ladies and
24 gentlemen.

25 MS. GARNIER: Our next speaker is Mr. Smith and

1 then followed by Keyshawn C (phonetic). And if there's
2 anyone in the audience who wants to make a comment, just
3 fill out a comment card. And then after Keyshawn, it'll
4 be Mr. Cousins.

5 MR. SMITH: So, I just want to say for the
6 record, I do a lot of FOIAs. And so, Conrad Mallett, who
7 sits there, is a Corporation Counsel, who should not be
8 able to sit on this board because any lawsuit filed
9 against the City of Detroit goes through his office.
10 Like that's why he's able to be abreast of every single
11 lawsuit leveraged against any department within the City
12 of Detroit. He makes \$179,000.00, I believe, to be exact.
13 If not, I got the right amount in my email. I'll say it
14 out there. You know how much you make.

15 You shouldn't be on this board. There is enough
16 money in the budget on this board to have an independent
17 lawyer. Because when we talk about the law department,
18 you're sitting right here. You should not be able to
19 speak on this board, especially if you're offering jobs to
20 people.

21 Also, Officer Melvin Zachary, if he shot anybody
22 on this board, any relative, you wouldn't want him back.
23 No way he should have a second chance agreement. And we
24 have a black sergeant. She also did violate laws and
25 things like that. But she was forced into retirement.

1 And Melvin Zachary is still in the force.

2 I love how you're staring at me, Lavish
3 Williams. Keep the energy up. Keep the energy up, Chop
4 Shop Williams. Keep it up. Also, we got Booty Bandit
5 Perisher, who has violated my rights on several occasions
6 at these meetings. She put me out of the meeting.

7 Through the Chair --

8 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Let's not use any foul
9 language against people on this board.

10 MR. SMITH: Booty is not a foul language.

11 That's not foul.

12 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: It is in my opinion, so
13 stop.

14 MR. SMITH: Anyway, I'm going to speak past my
15 time. You cut my time out.

16 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: No, we're not going --

17 MR. SMITH: I'm going to keep speaking.

18 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: No, you're not.

19 MR. SMITH: So, retired detective Barbara Simon
20 also, should be arrested because of her false convictions
21 that she caused through the Wayne County Prosecutor's
22 Office. She caused several people, at least five to ten
23 people, to be in prison because of false testimony,
24 because of her interrogation tactics. Also, to you, Chair
25 Dewaelsche, I don't know what you do at SER, you seem to

1 need some training on this board. You come here week in
2 and week out.

3 You don't understand how to make motions.
4 You don't understand how to take roll call votes.
5 You don't understand when a roll call vote is to be had.
6 I understand this board better than you do.

7 I've only been here maybe a year or longer.
8 You've been on the board three times, I believe. This is
9 your third trip on the board. You don't understand how
10 the board functions, how it works. Very sad to see that.

11 Also, to Commissioner Ivey, I don't think we got
12 a real problem. I don't think you're my enemy. You might
13 not understand how to deal with criticism, whatever, but I
14 don't look at you as an enemy. But we do have a
15 commissioner up here who I do look at as an enemy, who got
16 Willie Burton arrested at a meeting. Commissioner Carter,
17 I'm very disappointed in how you sit up and you don't do
18 anything. You just sit there. We'll be talking about you
19 in the future.

20 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Your time is up.

21 Thank you.

22 Next speaker, please.

23 MR. C: Hi, how are you doing?

24 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Hi.

25 MR. C: Everybody okay? Okay. I'm here today

1 because I'm here to speak on behalf of my mother, Latoya
2 Chavies. She was denied her promotion for detective.
3 I feel as if that you guys made a judgment based off what
4 the paperwork said, and you guys don't have the actual
5 true facts from someone that was there.

6 So, I came down here, I flew all the way from
7 Arizona here just for this specific moment, just to, you
8 know, inform you guys of what happened, because a lot of
9 you don't have what happened. You know what I mean?
10 You guys have what's written down on paper and not the
11 actual actions that led there. First, I just want to say
12 that the complaint of her punching her daughter was a lie.
13 I was right there when my sister decided to lie and call
14 her dad and tell her dad that she wanted to come with her.
15 And the first thing he said is, why? And she said that
16 she punched her.

17 She wasn't even there that day. She was at work
18 completing a shift. I was never interviewed by Child
19 Protective Service at that time, because I'm the one who
20 had the whole story, since I was there. They never
21 interviewed me. They went straight to her daughter, got
22 the story from her daughter, and ran with it.

23 The CPS agent involved with it was actually a
24 close friend of our family who should never have been on
25 the case in the first place as a conflict of interest.

1 So, ladies and gentlemen, I'm telling you, my mom has gave
2 her time, energy, and love into this city. Now, although
3 there have been some allegations that have come out, but
4 what do police say? Some police officers have bad days,
5 right? Right. Okay.

6 So, what I'm saying is that I'm going to ask you
7 guys to look deeply into this, because she does deserve
8 this. You guys haven't been there when you when you guys'
9 parents have to leave out 6:00 in the afternoon, going to
10 6:00 in the morning because the powers that be can't
11 figure out how they want to staff the police and want to
12 make everyone work mandatory overtimes. You guys remember
13 that? Some of y'all remember that? 6:00 to 6:00?
14 I'm the only person that remember that?

15 Okay. Cool. All right. So that's what I'm
16 saying. I'm just asking that the Chief, Chief Bettison,
17 obviously, the commissioners review it, and make a right
18 decision, because she is a good person.

19 And besides the allegations on the paper,
20 allegations don't mean nothing. I have her polygraph
21 right here, if that would interest you guys in seeing it.
22 And she passed. A polygraph doesn't lie. She's not
23 trained to beat a polygraph. So, I'm asking, would you
24 guys at least please look at it?

25 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Thank you for your

1 time. Time is up. Okay. Commissioner Woods.

2 MR. WOODS: Through the Chair. Young man, thank
3 you for sharing. And I respect you and I respect you
4 standing up for your mom. And rest assured that we're
5 going to look into everything, you know. And we have
6 vetted all the way out and to see and make the proper
7 assessments and speaking through the Chair. But I really
8 want to applaud you for standing up for your mom.

9 MR. C: Thank you.

10 MR. WOODS: And I'm praying for you and praying
11 for your family.

12 MR. C: Thank you. I just feel like that, you
13 know, obviously, with Commissioner Morris made a couple of
14 statements, though, I feel as if Commissioner Morris,
15 you've never been a police officer. So, you've been in a
16 capacity, and you're not even allowed to be in that
17 capacity. So, what I'm saying is you -- he hasn't been in
18 that profession, so he wouldn't understand the decisions
19 that have to be split. You understand what I'm saying?
20 He doesn't understand those.

21 He's a civilian appointed -- he's in a civilian
22 appointed position. So, he doesn't understand what it is
23 when you have a civilian that can lie or somebody that can
24 go make a complaint and say you punched him in the face.
25 And now here we are. You understand what I'm saying?

1 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Commissioner Boman and
2 then Commissioner Morris. Commissioner Camille.

3 MR. BOMAN: Yeah, I'm just going to say and
4 encourage you and anyone else who has information that
5 might be relevant to us to email the board. I think you
6 said you wanted the whole board to see it.

7 MR. C: Yeah, I have the polygraph right here.

8 MR. BOMAN: You should forward that email.

9 I forget -- is it just the Detroit Board of
10 Police Commissioners? What is the general email address?
11 So, it goes to everybody.

12 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: I'm sorry, I don't mean
13 to interrupt, but she has rights. And I don't think that
14 she understands what he's doing here. And I don't think
15 that that's appropriate. I want to have a discussion with
16 him outside before we move forward with anything like
17 that.

18 MR. BOMAN: If he decides he wishes to, which
19 email address was that?

20 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: They're on the flyers
21 on the back table so she can also get that.

22 Commissioner Morris.

23 MR. MORRIS: Also, as a response to what he
24 said, the misconduct in which she was sustained in was
25 investigated by people who are police officers, who know

1 the experience and who have been on the force, which is
2 internal affairs, as well as representatives of the
3 department who have been on the force for multiple years,
4 who was vehemently against her promotion to the point that
5 she had to go all the way to the Court of Appeals. Also,
6 the things he said, it carried on 30 seconds after his
7 time was up. I'm directing the staff, if Mr. Smith comes
8 up and his time is up and you cut him off because his time
9 is up, you have to do that for everybody. When the time
10 is up, you let them know that the time is up because you
11 let him carry on 30 seconds after. I sat here and counted
12 it. Thank you.

13 PARLIAMENTARIAN: With respect, Madam Chair,
14 that's the job of the chair. That's not the job of staff.
15 Staff don't have that authority. The chair would have to
16 be the person who would have to do that.

17 MR. MORRIS: All right. Well, reroute it the
18 other way.

19 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHÉ: Okay.

20 Commissioner Camille.

21 MS. CAMILLE: Oh, Madam Chair, I yield my time.

22 I yield my comment.

23 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHÉ: Okay.

24 Any other comments?

25 Go ahead, sir.

1 MR. COUSIN: Hello, everyone. My name is
2 Charles Cousin. I come up here with gravity and extreme
3 humility. As a victim of police brutality, I moved to the
4 city of Detroit seeking refuge.

5 And I know I generally come up here to complain
6 about situations, but I just want to thank each and every
7 one of you guys. I think you're doing an amazing job.
8 Walk a Mile Wednesdays has been really therapeutic to
9 someone like me who is not necessarily a stereotypical
10 ally of the police. I love seeing all you guys there.

11 I want to take a second to talk about something
12 that's happening on the outskirts of Detroit, just in case
13 anybody out there is listening, including the feds.
14 They are kidnapping black men, throwing them in prison,
15 and charging them with disorderly conduct. And cities
16 like Warren and the city of Madison Heights, they need to
17 be investigated because they're literally trying to roll
18 us back to slavery. And I know that this comment might
19 not necessarily be directed, per se, to this board, but I
20 just felt the urge to put it on the record, that there is
21 something seriously wrong going on, on the outskirts of
22 the city of Detroit, and it affects our city. So that's
23 all I have to say. Thank you.

24 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you, sir.

25 Any comments, questions?

1 Next speaker, please.

2 MS. UNDERWOOD: Thank you, Madam Chair.

3 We're going to go into Zoom. Our first speaker is Nene's
4 Friend. Our next speaker will be Legendary Detroiter.

5 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Next speaker, please.

6 MS. UNDERWOOD: Can you unmute?

7 We will go to the next speaker.

8 Legendary Detroiter.

9 MR. DETROITER: Yeah. Yeah. I want to commend
10 the Chief of the Detroit Police Department, Todd Bettison,
11 for his appointment as the first assistant chief, Mr.
12 Franklin Hayes. I have my own reasons.

13 I said something about the man that was untrue.
14 He accepted my apology with humility and grace. So, I
15 wanted to put that out there in front of everybody in the
16 whole city of Detroit. The top two at the DPD, I rock
17 with them.

18 Now, Eva Dewaelsche, Darryl Woods, and Crafty
19 Conrad, it's turn-up time in the city of Detroit.
20 Mary Elaine Beckman's ballot is over at the Detroit
21 Department of Elections. Supposedly, she is an overseas
22 citizen voting from Germany. Supposedly, she didn't get a
23 ballot. It was flagged as undeliverable by the United
24 States Postal Service and returned back to the Detroit
25 Department of Elections.

1 And now I want to switch it straight to what
2 Nene asked me for, requested, and deserves. Her mama,
3 Kenesha Coleman, DPD case number 20-11112, did not shoot
4 herself. My word. I investigated it, found out what
5 happened, what took place, informed the correct people,
6 and now election fraud and murder cover-ups is on the
7 floor for me and Detroit City, and I am who I am.
8 You hear that, Darryl Conrad?

9 MS. GARNIER: Our next two speakers will be
10 former Commissioner William Davis and Juana.

11 MR. DAVIS: Hello, can I be heard?

12 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELESCHE: Yes, you may.

13 MR. DAVIS: Okay. I'd like to start off by
14 saying I think that was some excellent -- well, I'd like
15 to give congratulations to all the people that's being
16 promoted, and also, especially with the executive staff
17 appointments, and a special shout-out to, what was
18 Sergeant Jackson over at the 2nd Precinct, neighborhood
19 police officer who are now a lieutenant, which I think is
20 well-deserved, and hopefully before I lonely be a captain.
21 I'd also like to say that I'm in total agreement with my
22 NAN brothers and sisters in what they were saying. That's
23 all I have to say. Y'all have a good day.

24 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELESCHE: Thank you.

25 Next speaker.

1 MS. JUANA: Through the Chair, Madam President,
2 did all of the officers leave?

3 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHÉ: Yes, pretty much, the
4 ones that were promoted.

5 MS. JUANA: Yeah, I wanted to say
6 congratulations. It was a good thing to hear something
7 from the 2nd Precinct. So, I don't even want to say
8 anything more. Oh, I do, I do. I'm sorry.

9 I agree with Commissioner Morris. I forget the
10 young gentleman's name. He comes every week. He was put
11 out, and always getting put out, or, you know, his time
12 took and spoken over, just because maybe some of you all
13 don't like what he's saying, but it's not right for the
14 officer's son to overspeak his time, and then just
15 overspeak his time, and nothing was said. That wasn't
16 fair at all, and that will be my time. Thank y'all, and
17 very productive meeting. Thank you.

18 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHÉ: Thank you.

19 Next speaker.

20 MS. UNDERWOOD: Our next two speakers will be
21 Ms. Davis, and then Tanya Jackson, and that will be the
22 last speaker.

23 MS. DAVIS: Hello. Can you hear me?

24 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHÉ: Yes, we can.

25 MS. DAVIS: Hi, this is Benita Davis, and I just

1 want to include, we were talking about last week's
2 resolutions, and I brought up House Bill Resolution 192,
3 73rd Congress, June 5th. That's public law, if you want
4 to resolve any issues. Secondly, there should be no
5 promotions going on inside of the police department, where
6 there's no judicial branch under the form of government
7 they stand and operate on. So, how is it that you're
8 promoting police men and women, and there's no judicial
9 branch? Third of all, you can't be biased. You cannot be
10 prejudiced when it comes to speaking.

11 Yes, I understand a young man appearing as a
12 police officer, but at the same time, we all have the same
13 rights. So, if you're going to enforce anything, you got
14 to put that House Bill Resolution, because that will help
15 resolve all matters. We're dealing with a democracy.
16 There's no judicial branch, so there's absolutely no
17 justice.

18 And the young man is correct. These police
19 officers are out here working with the prosecutors,
20 kidnapping men and women, and incarcerating them under
21 false charges. So, as long as there's unlawful
22 detainment, excessive bail, a lack of due process, no one
23 needs to be promoted. Because otherwise, what are you
24 promoting? Celebrating the incarceration of innocent men
25 and women who are not given a fair trial, a judicial

1 trial.

2 So, yeah, that's my two minutes. I'll be back
3 next week with more facts, because everybody at this point
4 is out of order, starting with Eva, because Eva doesn't
5 even know the order at the table. She has to be
6 redirected every time she's out of order. So, imagine if
7 she's out of order, just imagine how severely these police
8 men and women are out of order. So, that's my two minutes
9 before I'm hung up on and disrespected like the rest of
10 the people.

11 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Thank you.

12 Next speaker.

13 MS. UNDERWOOD: Our last speaker will be Tanya
14 Jackson.

15 MS. JACKSON: Good afternoon. My name is Tanya
16 Jackson. So, I am a victim of retaliation from a Detroit
17 police officer. I'm finally able to speak on the matter
18 because my case is over. I'm sure everybody at the board
19 know and aware of the things he did to me.

20 I have a personal protection order out on
21 Mr. Dawson. I still have been getting harassed. This man
22 had posted personal information about me on social media.
23 He suspended, but still getting paid. How is that even
24 possible? Y'all paying him for being out with a personal
25 protection order. How is that even possible?

1 This man threatened to shoot me in my head.
2 He's a trained officer, right? How do y'all let that
3 slide? How is he being paid and being rewarded for doing
4 something bad, when he can't even work the field because
5 he had a restraining order out on him?

6 He had tried over four times to get this
7 restraining order terminated. The judge denied it.
8 He filed again. So, this will be the fifth time. I feel
9 like it's harassment at this point. Who's paying for his
10 lawyer to do this? I'm a victim, not him.

11 I spoke with the chief. I spoke with Jidante
12 and nobody's standing up because he's a police officer.
13 How is he able to make false allegations against me?
14 How is he even still getting paid? How could you, as a
15 sworn officer, you're supposed to protect, right?
16 Ain't that his job?

17 Rather, it was a friendship, a dating
18 relationship. We was dating. How is he allowed to say he
19 should have shot me in my head and did more physical
20 damage, but he's playing the victim? He's posting me on
21 social media. He's tarnishing my family, but you the
22 victim. How is he even getting paid? He should not be
23 getting paid.

24 And the PPO is still activated. It's still
25 active. How is he even able to keep filing and they keep

1 denying it because on the record, I submitted transcripts
2 of him admitting to doing these --

3 MS. UNDERWOOD: Madam Chair, that's your last
4 speaker.

5 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Commissioner Boman.

6 MR. BOMAN: Yeah, I wanted to ask if that person
7 had made a complaint with OCI.

8 MR. WARFIELD: To my knowledge, I'm not sure.
9 I can check on it and see, though. But even if they did
10 make a complaint, that would be forwarded over to IA.
11 But I can check to see if she made a complaint because of
12 the nature of what had happened.

13 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Madam Secretary.

14 MS. GARNIER: Madam Chair, if I may, this was a
15 Matter, that maybe, Commissioner Watts remembers that we
16 were, well, there was a call. Mr. Smith, I believe, was
17 the last one that raised the issue before the board.
18 But this officer, there is a matter, as I understand it,
19 having talked to, don't let me get the title wrong,
20 McGinnis, with Internal Affairs. And I believe Chief --
21 someone did. I can't recall all right now, but it has
22 been followed up, Madam Chair.

23 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay.

24 Commissioner Watts, go ahead.

25 MS. WATTS: Yes, I want to say this has, this

1 came up doing one of the first policy committee meetings.
2 And so there was a after dialogue after that. And so, we
3 did, I did direct and ask the board secretary to follow up
4 and see what was going on with this particular case. And
5 I thought it was going to go over to you, Chief Warfield,
6 but we're still waiting on any update related to that.
7 And this has probably been over a month or two ago.

8 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHÉ: Okay.

9 CIO Warfield.

10 MR. WARFIELD: Through the Chair, I'll certainly
11 follow up to see if our office did take the complaint.
12 If so, with what the status is, and you will have that
13 this week. I'm sorry, not this week, early next week.
14 Thank you.

15 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHÉ: Thank you.

16 Commissioner Camille.

17 MS. CAMILLE: Thank you, Madam Chair.

18 Question for Corporation Counsel.

19 I don't -- I know we've heard regarding this issue a few
20 times. But the young lady mentioned that she can speak
21 now because her case is over. Do you know if she's
22 referring to a lawsuit case that has concluded? Or some
23 other type of cases?

24 MR. MALLETT: I have, through the Chair,
25 Commissioner Camille, I am 99.9 percent positive she has

1 not filed a case against this officer that includes the
2 City of Detroit. Well, so if there is a and I don't know
3 if she has filed anything with the Wayne County
4 Prosecutor. She did indicate that she has a personal
5 protection order. That may be the case that she's
6 referring to. It result -- according to the young lady on
7 the phone, the judge did grant her personal protection
8 order. That may be the case she's referring to.
9 There's no civil case, Commissioner Camille.

10 MS. CAMILLE: Thank you.

11 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: The Secretary, did you
12 want to speak again? Madam Secretary?

13 MS. GARNIER: Madam Chair, through the Chair.

14 I will be willing to reach out to Internal
15 Affairs because McGinnis and I spoke about this and the
16 person assigned to that matter with this officer.
17 The last time we reported, the parties, the caller and the
18 officer, there was a matter in court regarding the PPO.
19 And it was the 20th of last month. So that may be what
20 she's referring to. But I will follow up, if you desire
21 that I do, with McGinnis to understand the status.
22 Because the last I spoke with McGinnis, they had reached
23 out to her and she had not responded. So, I will follow
24 up.

25 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Yes, I know.

1 MS. WATTS: Definitely, if I could get an
2 update, because I had requested that a month or two.
3 So, I'd be willing to update.

4 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: CIO Warfield, did you
5 want to say something about --

6 MR. WARFIELD: Yes, ma'am. Through the Chair,
7 staff did contact me and say that BPC number 260425 was
8 transferred over to the Internal Affairs Department from
9 our office.

10 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you.

11 MR. HAYES: Madam Chair. My first official act.
12 Through the Chair, I have Deputy Chief Michael
13 Parrish here to speak more as to where we are and give an
14 overview of the circumstances and also a pathway to
15 resolution.

16 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Sounds good.
17 Thank you.

18 MR. PARRISH: Through the Chair. To the rest of
19 the board. So, I confirmed with Internal Affairs, that
20 case was closed for without misconduct, except for the
21 fact that a PPO has been issued and sustained. The board
22 may remember that DPD recently submitted a policy
23 directive specific to PPOs against members that will allow
24 us to suspend based on the existence of the PPO by itself.
25 So that matter is over at disciplinary administration, and

1 we will take the appropriate measures to have the members
2 suspended without pay in accordance with that system.

3 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Okay. Does that answer
4 your question you had which case it was now? I think it's
5 Internal Affairs. Go ahead, Commissioner Woods.

6 MR. WOODS: Having said that, I would caution us
7 to, you know, have no further comment on anything until
8 things are ripe, you know, because we may have to go into
9 a closed-door session on this and we have to have the
10 appearance of, we can't have the appearance of bias, you
11 know, so we have to listen to both sides.

12 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Any other comments or
13 questions? All right.

14 Hearing none. Thank you.

15 And that was our last speaker.

16 Yes. Okay. Thank you.

17 At this time, we have the report from the board
18 secretary.

19 MS. GARNIER: Madam Chair, through the Chair,
20 tab 6, if the board will kindly note that the reports that
21 are listed are under tab 6, together with note 6I is a
22 communication that was received from that particular
23 organization and the announcement of upcoming meetings.
24 Our next meeting is Thursday, May 14th. Next week, 6:30
25 p.m., we will, the board will be in the 8th Precinct at

1 Wayne County Community College District Northwest Lewis
2 Auditorium and that's on West Outer Drive. The June
3 committee meeting will be Thursday, June 11th at the 6:30
4 p.m. hour in the 7th Precinct and it will be at the Martin
5 Luther King Jr. High School at 3200 East Lafayette in
6 Detroit. The next committee meetings are as follows. The
7 citizen complaints meeting will be Tuesday, May 12th, at
8 3:00 p.m. here at Detroit Public Safety Headquarters and
9 on next Thursday, May 14th, at 2:00 p.m., the ad hoc
10 committee for the review of bylaws and standard operating
11 procedures and those are the items under tab 6 for today,
12 Madam Chair.

13 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELESCHE: Thank you.

14 Commissioner Woods.

15 Do you have any questions?

16 MR. WOODS: Yes. It's my understanding that the
17 position for the administrative assistant's is posted, is
18 that it's posted now.

19 MS. GARNIER: The investigator --

20 MR. WOODS: Yes, for investigators.

21 Thank you, I'm sorry. Yeah, you're right.

22 Through the Chair.

23 MS. GARNIER: The positions are posted.

24 There was an email that was sent out, the matter as the
25 board may or may not remember the requisitions go through

1 finance. They were approved and immediately upon that as
2 the chair of the personnel and training knew that we were
3 ready to together with the chief, the position
4 descriptions were over and they were posted. I believe,
5 Chief, on Tuesday.

6 MR. WOODS: Yesterday. And so, if we can have a
7 staff member run up there or have them print it out right
8 quick for all commissioners, so that they can have copies
9 of the posting and spread it among their contacts.
10 I would deeply appreciate that, through the Chair.

11 MS. GARNIER: Our apologies, sir.

12 MR. WOODS: Oh, not a problem.

13 MS. GARNIER: I didn't mean to cut you off.
14 But to the other matter, during promotions, I apologize.
15 We -- it was on to have copies. So yes, we'll ask for
16 them immediately.

17 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELESCHE: Thank you.

18 MR. WOODS: Thank you. And the, excuse me,
19 through the Chair. I'm sorry. The posting is for two
20 weeks. And so, if people listening, share it among your
21 contacts, these are three investigative positions for OCI.
22 Thank you very kindly.

23 MS. GARNIER: And do remember, Vice Chair, that
24 the one is for incumbents only but he's going to bring
25 down both postings.

1 MR. WOODS: Right, right. Yes, it's three --
2 would be a that that is separate. Yep. Yep.

3 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: All right. Thank you.
4 Did you want to say something CI?

5 Okay. Any other comments?

6 All right. Hearing none.

7 Is there any unfinished business to come before
8 this board? And under news business, we have a closed
9 session pursuant to section 8A of the Open Meetings Act
10 MCL 15.268(h) to receive legal advice from Corporation
11 Counsel regarding material exempt from discussion by state
12 or federal statute. Is there a motion to go into closed
13 session?

14 MS. CAMILLE: So moved.

15 MS. IVEY: Support.

16 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: I'm sorry who made it?

17 Oh, Commissioner Camille and supported by
18 Commissioner Ivey. All in favor -- any discussion?

19 All in favor indicate by saying aye.

20 THE BOARD: Aye.

21 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Opposed?

22 The motion carries.

23 We will recess for two minutes.

24 (At 5:40 p.m., off the record)

25 (At 6:11 p.m., back on the record)

1 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Returning to open
2 session and could we have the roll call please?

3 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Dewaelsche.

4 MS. DEWAELSCHE: Present.

5 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Boman.

6 MR. BOMAN: Present.

7 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Camille.

8 MS. CAMILLE: Present.

9 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Carter.

10 MS. CARTER: Here.

11 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Ivey.

12 MS. IVEY: Present.

13 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Jones.

14 MR. JONES: Present.

15 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Morris.

16 MR. MORRIS: Present.

17 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Watts.

18 MS. WATTS: Here.

19 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Williams.

20 MS. WILLIAMS: Present.

21 MS. GARNIER: Nine present, Madam Chair.

22 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay. Thank you.

23 Under new business, we have another item.

24 It'll be brought by Commissioner Watts.

25 MS. WATTS: Yes. Thank you, Madam Chair.

1 I like to make a motion under new business.

2 I move that any BOPC committee action requiring action by
3 the full board be given one week notice to review the
4 action before vote by the full board.

5 MR. MORRIS: Support.

6 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay. It's been moved
7 by Commissioner Watts, supported by Commissioner Morris,
8 that we have one week notice before any action is
9 considered by the committee's recommendation --

10 PARLIAMENTARIAN: Is this a standing rule that
11 the commissioner is moving to adopt?

12 MS. WATTS: Yes.

13 PARLIAMENTARIAN: Okay. To amend the standing
14 rules without notice requires two-thirds.

15 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay. Two-thirds vote.

16 Let me get the motion first.

17 Now, is there any discussion?

18 Go ahead.

19 MR. BOMAN: I'm just wondering is this how -- if
20 this is any different than I said, I thought there was a
21 motion I made last week to the effect that when something
22 comes out of a committee that the board get at least one
23 week view the proposal coming out of the committee.
24 Is that --

25 MS. WATTS: Chair. I wasn't here. I believe

1 that was for policy committee.

2 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELESCHE: Okay. Madam Secretary.

3 Do you have a comment?

4 MS. GARNIER: Madam Chair, through the Chair.

5 The motion that passed was Commissioner Boman motion, any
6 future items to be voted on coming out of policy that the
7 content be emailed to all of the commissioners a full week
8 ahead of the meeting where it is to be voted at.

9 The motion passed and that was April 23rd, Madam Chair.

10 MR. JONES: Okay. But that was just one of --

11 PARLIAMENTARIAN: Motion is saying all
12 committees.

13 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELESCHE: All committees.

14 MR. BOMAN: So otherwise, would the effect be
15 the same but it would now cover more committees.

16 MS. WATTS: Correct.

17 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELESCHE: Would cover all
18 committees. All right. Any other discussion?

19 MS. CAMILLE: Motion, Madam Chair.

20 Thank you Commissioner Watts for raising this.
21 I'm in full support of this motion. I just have a point
22 of information for the parliamentarian. So, when we are
23 voting to create a standing rule, does that go into the
24 bylaws or does it stand alone somewhere?

25 PARLIAMENTARIAN: The Board of Police

1 Commissioners already has a number of standing rules.
2 So, the issue that you captured out of my brain is, it is
3 important now for staff to add this to those rules that
4 are is it -- so you have a number of rules about the
5 public being polite and not making slanderous statements.
6 You have a rule about commissioners waiting until they're
7 called upon before speaking. Those rules are at the back
8 of the Board of Police Commissioners bylaws.

9 So, what we need is to have the updated, this
10 rule, if it's adopted, and looks like it will be added to
11 those rules. Other than that, it's going to land in the
12 atmosphere somewhere and six months from now, nobody will
13 remember it. So, when I look at your bylaws, attached to
14 the bylaws are your standing rules. You're amending those
15 rules by adding this. In fact, what you're really doing
16 is amending the motion that was adopted last week to
17 really sort of strike out policy and insert all
18 committees.

19 Now you can do that, it's perfectly legal and
20 the same rules apply without notice, you need two-thirds.
21 But what is important is that this rule now then is
22 memorialized with the rest of those standing rules so that
23 future commissioners will know that this rule exists.
24 And what I would say to you, what I would advise you,
25 Commissioner Camille, is that when we are doing the bylaws

1 and the article on committees, which does not yet exist,
2 is that this would then be put in the bylaws. I think
3 it's stronger than the standing rules.

4 Now, the only problem with putting it in the
5 bylaws is that if you ever want to change it, you can't do
6 that in one meeting. Because you're going to require
7 advance notice. So, you need to think about, is there a
8 situation under which the Board of Police commissioners
9 may want less than a week to consider something.

10 MR. WOODS: Through the Chair. I think it could
11 be an impediment in some ways. When you look at, you
12 know, job postings and all of that type of stuff, you
13 know, I don't think it should be a blanket rule for
14 everything, you know, because if you get stuck in that
15 position, I suppose that we could make a motion to make an
16 exception to the rule, you know, so if you know that be
17 the case.

18 PARLIAMENTARIAN: What the parliamentarian would
19 advise under those circumstances. If you think there's a
20 situation that will arise where you may want to have the
21 flexibility to have less than a week, then the motion
22 would need to say unless there is a vote by two-thirds of
23 the board. So, you want what I, parliamentarians call,
24 get out of jail free card. So, you would, the motion then
25 would be amended to say unless there is a vote of the

1 board by two-thirds to allow less than a week's notice.

2 MR. WOODS: Yeah, so I'll make a motion to
3 amend.

4 MS. WATTS: I would go by that, as long as it
5 applies to all committee.

6 PARLIAMENTARIAN: Yes, what you would do is the
7 amendment in this case really would be added to the end of
8 the original motion. So, we would still have the original
9 motion. The amendment would be unless the board, by two-
10 thirds vote, agrees to have less than one week's notice
11 for a specific report, language along that line, that
12 amendment would give you the flexibility to decide in a
13 particular situation to have less than one week's notice
14 and the boards by two-thirds vote could then do it.
15 But then we would go back to the motion as amended which
16 essentially is amending last week's motion to strike out
17 policy and insert all committees.

18 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Okay. So, there's a
19 an amendment to the motion then?

20 MR. WOODS: Yes, I'll make a motion to amend the
21 motion and that Commissioner Watts made and include in
22 there that if a two-third majority --

23 PARLIAMENTARIAN: Vote by the board -- to the
24 notice of one week.

25 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: All right.

1 Is there a second?

2 Go ahead.

3 Wait.

4 MS. WATTS: I support it.

5 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: You're supporting?

6 Okay. The amendment to the motion was made by
7 Commissioner Woods, supported by Commissioner Watts.

8 Is there a discussion on the amendment? Okay.

9 Hearing none. All in favor indicate by saying aye.

10 THE BOARD: Aye.

11 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Opposed?

12 Okay. It's unanimous.

13 Now we're going to the original motion as
14 amended.

15 PARLIAMENTARIAN: Thank you.

16 MR. WOODS: So moved.

17 PARLIAMENTARIAN: Well, you don't need to move
18 it.

19 MR. WOODS: I don't need to move it. Okay.

20 PARLIAMENTARIAN: The motion is already pending.
21 It should have been amended now to have this get out of
22 jail free card.

23 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: So is there any further
24 discussion?

25 MR. BOMAN: I have a question.

1 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Go ahead.

2 MR. BOMAN: I wish to direct it, I think, to the
3 Parliamentary. If the language says two-thirds of the
4 board, does it mean two-thirds of the seated members or
5 two-thirds of the members present?

6 PARLIAMENTARIAN: The Parliamentarian did not
7 say two-thirds of the board. The Parliamentarian said
8 two-thirds vote. If you use the language two-thirds vote,
9 then that's two-thirds of those voting, not two-thirds of
10 the board. And as a Parliamentarian, we almost always
11 advise against the language two-thirds of the board,
12 because if two-thirds of the board is not present, you
13 can't adopt anything that requires two-thirds motion.
14 So that's not very smart. So, the language is two-thirds
15 vote. The board can decrease the notice as it wishes.

16 Now you have the ability, if some situation
17 comes up, like a job posting, to do less than one week,
18 and you have that flexibility. But it would always be
19 two-thirds vote. Now having said that, the Open Meetings
20 Act only allows elected boards to abstain under very
21 narrow specific issues. So almost always, it's going to
22 be two-thirds of everyone present. But the language is
23 two-thirds vote.

24 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay. Any further
25 discussion? Hearing none. All those in favor of the

1 motion as amended indicate by saying aye.

2 THE BOARD: Aye.

3 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELESCHE: Opposed?

4 Motion carries unanimously.

5 Motion to adjourn.

6 Is there a second?

7 Okay. All in favor indicate by saying aye.

8 THE BOARD: Aye.

9 (At 6:22 p.m., meeting adjourned)


